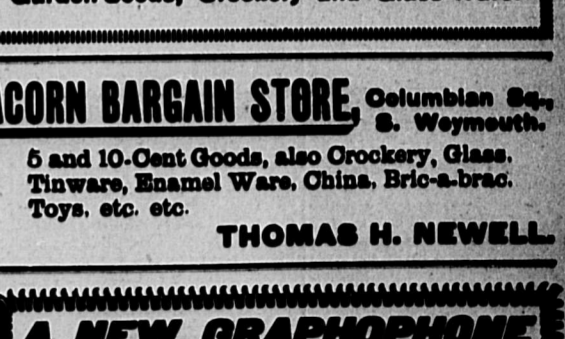
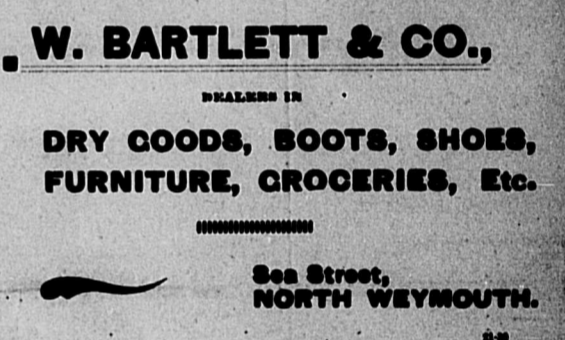

As we are about to go to press a general alarm is sounded for another breaking out of the forest fire in South Weymouth.

It is not easy to figure from the result of the election in Maine any real prediction of the probable result of the national election in November. Things are only comparable which are of the same nature in themselves and their surroundings.

As the site of an apple cannot be compared with the site of a lemon, to give any adequate idea of it is a large apple or not, so the election of a presidential year cannot fairly be compared with any election but that of a presidential year.

With the particular issues and changes in old party lines caused by the advent of Mr. Bryan as a candidate for the presidency, there can be no fair comparison, and no comparison of any weight excepting the comparison now before the people.

If this is conceded, which we think will be the case with any fair minded man, then an analysis of the returns of the election in Maine indicates a Republican loss of about 11 per cent. and a Democratic gain of about 32 per cent.

That the Democratic cause has 22 per cent more friends in Maine than it had four years ago is plainly to be seen. It is also evident that the Republican cause is supported by 11 per cent more than that of four years ago.

Therefore it would seem that nothing is indicated by the elections so far held that can throw any real light upon the result to be recorded in November, except the fact that Mr. Bryan is winning back a large part of those who left the Democratic party in 1896 and who are no longer actuated by the free trade issue, and that it will be from now on a debatable campaign to be decided in the close or doubtful states.

There are some straws of precedent that Democrats are taking some comfort in, but they are of a value almost without real value. One is that no president has been re-elected since Grant, showing that the American people like changes in their presidents.

Another is that New York has regularly, since 1860, thrown its electoral vote for the Republican party, and that this year, to keep this record of 30 years unbroken it should go Democratic.

Among the recent important political events, (aside from the Maine election) which is mentioned in another article, have been the letter of acceptance of President McKinley, the letter of acceptance of State Richard Olney, and the New York state nominations.

AWFUL FOREST FIRE.

Sweeps Over Acres in South Weymouth.

Houses Burned and People Driven From Their Homes--Firemen Struggle Against Flames and Gale.

A forest fire that started in South Weymouth last Sunday, and which occasioned two alarms on Monday, was fanned into life by the fierce gale of Wednesday, with the result that an area of hundreds of acres was swept by the most destructive conflagration that ever visited this vicinity.

The houses of David Mahar and Michael Ryan were totally destroyed and but for the energy of the firemen, many other buildings would have been similarly destroyed. The heat was terrific and it was impossible to remain in the houses. Hugo escaped from their pens and was scudding away from the path of the fire. Horses, cattle and other stock were trapped loose and the district presented a spectral appearance.

The women and children were almost distracted and swarmed along the streets, seeming to have no idea as to which way to turn in order to escape the flames which were round them in every direction. Some of these carried trinkets in their hands while others struggled with a trunk or box containing articles of value, and the sights were both pitiful and ludicrous.

The street railway passes along Union street from South Weymouth to Rockland and it was impossible to carry passengers over the route on account of the smoke and the heat. The trolley wires were cut near Hatherly post-office and the South Weymouth town line. This was necessary, and was done none too soon.

No cars were run between Rockland and Weymouth from 11 a. m. to 3 p. m. and the regular time was made, a short transfer being made at the Hatherly post office on account of the fire apparatus stationed there.

By 2.30 o'clock, the burned area extended about 1-1/4 miles in a northerly and southerly direction, and about 3 miles east and west. About 1-1/4 miles of this last direction was west of the railroad, the fire advancing toward Hingham in the line of the gale.

The danger grew in dimensions hourly, and Chief Cushing of Hingham was notified and he ordered a portion of his apparatus to the scene. The members of the departments remained on duty all night, and many of them were so exhausted that they had to be carried away from the fire.

The total damage done by the fire will reach thousands of dollars, exactly how much is not known. Michael Ryan estimates his loss at \$1500, insured for \$1000. David Mahar's loss will reach \$3000 and was insured for \$1000.
