


Bottle Onion.

## **Asparagus**

An oz. plants 50 ft. of row, produces about 200 plants; 4 to 5 lbs. per acre.

Can be started by sowing the seeds or setting out roots. A bed once properly made and planted, will last for years. When roots are one to two years old, set them 12 inches apart. The rows should be 8 to 10 inches deep, with width of 6 to 8 inches at the bottom. After spreading out roots, cover crowns with 3 inches of soil. With the growth of the shoots gradually fill in with earth until level with surface. Cultivate carefully during the cover. carefully during the season.

One pound will plant 100 feet of row; 60 pounds will plant an acre.

The best soil is a well manured, sandy loam, but very fine crops are produced on an average garden soil. After the ground is perfectly warm (usually about May 1st) sow at intervals of two weeks in order to secure a succession throughout

Sow 2 inches deep, 3 inches apart in rows 2 feet apart. Cover the season. firmly. Cultivate often, keeping a mulch of loose soil at all times. cultivation after flowering will cause many blooms to fall. Beans will be ready 6 to 8 weeks after planting.







cover with less than one inch of soil. The Beans will germinate more rapidly if placed on edge with the eye down. Bush Limas may also be planted in hills 3 feet apart one way and 2 feet apart the other, using

## Pole or Corn Beans

One pound will plant 75 to 80 hills; 20 to 30 pounds per acre.

Do not think of hurrying your crop by too early planting or you may have a failure—the seed will rot readily if the soil is cold and wet. Wait until the soil is thoroughly warmed. Use 8-foot poles, placing them 4 feet apart in the rows each way. Plant five or six Beans around each pole; let three of the best plants stand. They may also be grown in rows and supported by wire or along a wire fence; plant the seed two feet apart for this method. Top dress with good fertilizer or manure, working it in as you cultivate.



Cabbage requires deep, rich, mellow soil, high manuring, and good culture to obtain fine, solid heads. For early use, sow seeds of the early kinds in the hotbeds or in a box in the house the last of January or early in February; transplant into the open ground in April in rows 2 feet apart and 1½ feet apart in the row; or sow a bed of seed outside as soon as the soil can be worked; transplant in about four weeks. In transplanting, it is important that plant be set down to the first leaf, so that the stem may not be injured in case of o that the stem may not be injured in case of Be careful not to cover the heart of the plant. Hoe every week and stir soil deep. As they advance in growth, draw a little earth to the plants until they begin to head. To prevent splitting or bursting, go frequently over the ground and push every Cabbage that appears about to mature over sideways, which will break

some of the roots and check its growth.





## Celery

One ounce will produce about 5,000 plants; 1/4 lb. for an acre.

To have matured Celery early in the summer, sow seeds of the early varieties under glass in February; set the plants out in May. Celery seed is by no means so easy to grow as most other seeds. For Fall and Winter crops, sow the seed in April or May, depending on the condition of the soil. To get Celery seed to germinate and give you a good stand of strong plants, you must have the soil worked deep, very fine and loose, moist and warm. Sow the seed in rows a foot apart for hand cultivation. Keep moist; prevent soil from becoming dry or "crusted." In June set out the plants six inches apart in the rows, having the soil prepared. Make the rows two to three feet apart, depending on the amount you are growing and whether for hand or horse cultivation. Blanching is done by banking up the earth around the plants gradually until within a few inches of the top.

One ounce of seed will plant about 50 hills; 1 to 2 lbs. to the acre.

Cucumbers require rich, sandy soil, but do quite well in almost any good garden soil, especially if some fertilizer is mixed in where the hills occur.

As soon as the weather has become settled and warm, plant in hills 4 to 6 feet apart each way, with 8 to 10 seeds in a hill; cover one-half an inch deep, smoothing the hill off with the hoe. The seed may also be sown in rows 6 feet apart, with the seed every few inches in the row, thinning out when plants are large enough to withstand the bugs. For pickles, plant from June 1st to August 1st. The fruit should be gathered when large enough for pickling, whether required for use or not, as, if left to ripen on the vines, it destroys their productiveness.

















# **Turnip**

One ounce of seed sows 200 feet of row; 2 lbs. per acre.

To have Turnips early, sow seed in early Spring; for Winter crop, sow in July and August. Sow alone or in cornfields at last cultivation of the corn.
