Will you play with me?"

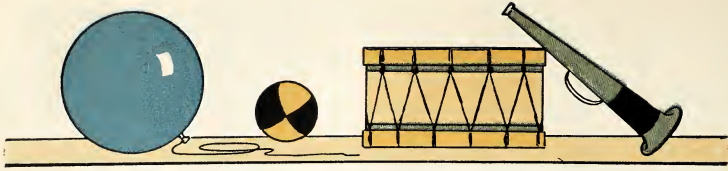

The Sun said,

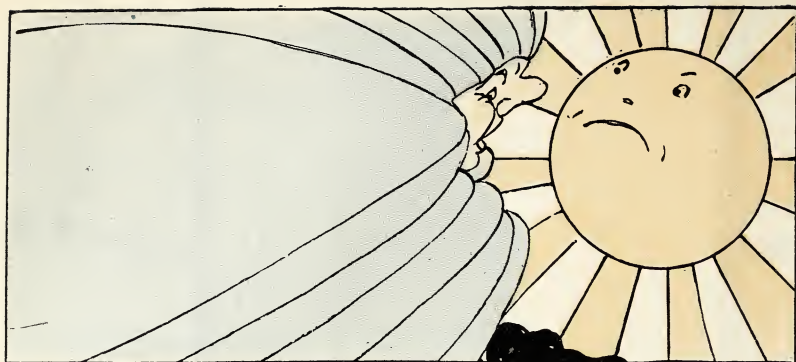

and I will have a yellow one.”

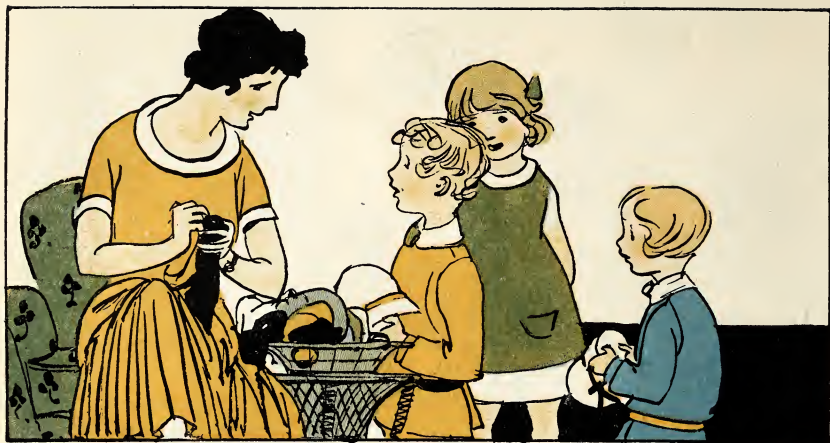
Joe said, “Thank you, Ted.

We will come again, Grandmother."

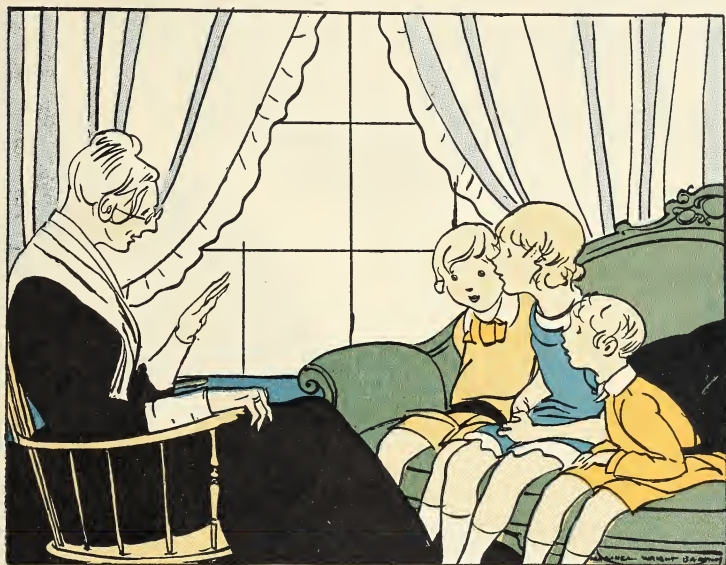

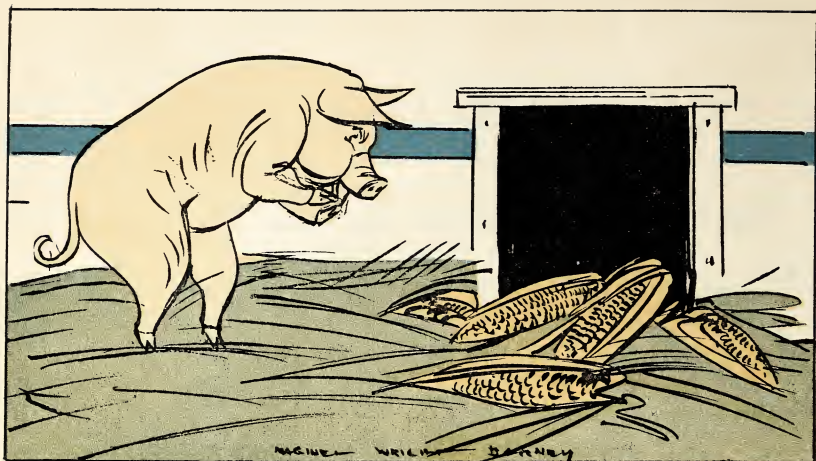

## WORD LIST

Stars mark words of highest frequency in both Gates' and Thorndike's first 500; these words are to be made part of the child's permanent sight-word vocabulary. Words used in only one selection are italicized; they may be treated as sight words and taught by context, not fixed as a part of the child's vocabulary. Parentheses inclose nonsense words and words some form of which has been used.

This book contains only 225 different words. There is a total reading vocabulary of 5471 words. Thus the average repetition per word is 23.76 times. New words are introduced on an average of 1.9 words per page.

Seventy per cent of the vocabulary is in Thorndike's first 500 words, 86% in his first 1000 words, and 98% in his 5000. Seventy-nine per cent of the vocabulary is in Gates' first 500 words, 92% in his first 1000. Excluding proper names and nonsense words, the only words not listed by Gates are "drummer," "good-by," "merry," and "turnip."

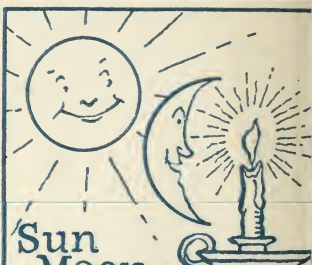
