NEW ORLEANS

German Protestant Church.—On the first Sunday of January last a meeting was held in the Baptist Church, composed of the German Protestants residing in New-Orleans, for the purpose of establishing a German Protestant congregation; a Chairman and Secretary having been chosen, the following resolutions were adopted, viz:

1.—That the Rev. Henry Hiestand be appointed pastor of the congregation.
2.—That C. F. Nagel and John Ulmer be appointed elders, and Christopher Wagner and Jacob Schroeger, deacons.

3.—That every Sunday at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, there shall be preaching in the German language, and at early candle light in the English language.

BALTIMORE, already famous for manufactures of iron, copper, cotton, and chemical articles, seems likely to become one of the greatest seats of manufacturing industry in the United States. We intend, during the ensuing summer to attempt a particular account of the products of our establishments, the sum of which will go far beyond the expectation of the most sanguine of the friends of the "System." Our advantageous location, and other natural advantages, are every day becoming more and more manifest. Iron ore, and mineral and other useful earths abound, and we are just told that a wealthy company from Pennsylvania are about to erect a new furnace, &c. about 18 miles hence, on the Philadelphia road where a body of superior ore, easy of access, has recently been discovered on the lands of Mr. Joseph Turner, of this city.—Niles' Reg.

COPPERING SHIPS.—During the last voyage of Columbus, his ships were attacked and almost destroyed by a small worm, which ate through the timber, and made the bottom of the vessels like a riddle. This suggested the idea of sheathing the bottoms of vessels with metal, and lead was at first employed. In the course of short time however, copper was found to be superior to lead and has ever since been used in preference.—London Weekly review.
—And copper in many cases, has proved inadequate. When his Majesty's ship *Clorinda*, was on her voyage to India, during or soon after the late war, she sprung a leak, which was ultimately traced to a hole eating by the white ants clean through the bottom of the ship.—We mention this instance in proof.—[Ed. Pilot.]

We have not heard whether they intend to make it a Jackson & Adams question; if they do, we'll bet them a Christmas gift the Jackson gals gets it. It is well known the Kentucky customs have not been introduced into Ohio; for each fair candidate would be under the dire necessity of making a stump speech. (Ohio Sun.)

NON-EXISTING OF HUMAN FOSSILS.
The remarkable fact, that no vestiges of human remains have been discovered with those of the more ancient inhabitants of the globe, is at present fully confirmed; nor have any fossil bones of monkeys been hitherto found. The vast diluvial beds of gravel and clay, and the upper strata in Asia, however, have not yet been scientifically explored, and both, sacred and profane writers agree in regarding the temperate regions of that continent as the cradle of the human race.—[Magazine of Natural History.]

Compassion.—Voltaire in his history of the Czar Peter, gives us the following anecdote of the Czarina: "The lenity of this princess," says he, "has been carried to a degree unparalleled in the history of any nation. She had promised that during her reign nobody should be put to death; and she has kept her word. She is the first sovereign that ever shewed this regard to the human species. Malefactors are now condemned to serve in the mines and other public works—a regulation not less prudent than humane since it renders their punishment of some advantage to the state. In other countries, they only know how to put a malefactor to death with the apparatus of an executioner, but are not able to prevent the execution of crimes. The terror of death does not, perhaps, make such impression on evil-doers, are generally given to idleness, as the fear of chastisement and hard labor renewed every day.

As there was something very extraordinary in the advancement of this princess, the reader will not be displeased with a relation of the steps by which she ascended the throne. She was born in a village called Nungen, on the banks of the lake Worthsev, in Livonia, and being her parents, who were of low condition, she became destitute of support. The parish clerk, who kept a school, took her into his house till Dr. Gluck, minister of Marienbug, happening to come to that village, eased the clerk of his burden by taking her into his family. The doctor, pleased with her behavior, treated her almost in the same manner as if she had been his own daughter, and not only had her taught spinning and sewing, but instructed her himself in literature above the knowledge of her sex. At length a Livonian serjeant in the Swedish army, fell passionately in love with her, and she agreed, with consent of the doctor, to marry him. The next day the Russians made themselves masters of Marienberg; and the General, casting his eyes accidentally on Catharine, and observing something very striking in her air and manner, took her under his protection, and afterwards into his service. Some time after, she was advanced to be house-keeper to Prince Menzikoff, who was the General's patron; here the Czar seeing her, she made such an impression on him, that he married her in the year 1611. What became of her former husband, the serjeant, is not known.
