

CAUSE OF YELLOW FEVER

Dr. Edwin Klebs, of Chicago, Makes a Valuable Discovery.

After a Series of Experiments He Succeeds in Isolating the Amoeba - Will Continue His Research.

Dr. Edwin Klebs, professor of pathology and bacteriology in the post graduate medical school at Chicago, has discovered the cause of yellow fever.

The results obtained by Prof. Klebs are looked upon as very valuable achievements of scientific pathology, as the yellow fever germs have been sought for by many persons and with great eagerness.

Prof. Klebs made his experiments on the stomach, duodenum and liver of two patients who had died of the fever in Mobile. The material was sent him by Dr. Herman Mohr of that city.

Then went to work on his own account, and by the aid of a special dye composed of fuchsin, methylene blue and methyl green he succeeded in isolating the desired germ.

The germ is not a bacillus but an amoeba. It causes inflammation of the stomach when swallowed, and then in the duodenum it assumes a true sporulating form, appearing here much like a blackberry.

While Prof. Klebs is confident he has obtained the yellow fever germ, he will not make any scientific claim in this direction until he has been able to obtain live germs and make cultures and animal experiments with them.

Prof. Klebs is well known among scientific men for his discovery of the diphtheria bacillus, known as the Klebs-Loeffler bacillus.

Facts Brought Out by a Massachusetts Legislative Inquiry.

WILL HOUSE EX-CONVICTS

Mrs. Ballington Booth Aims to Open a Hope Hall at Chicago.

Scale Upon Which Work is Now Being Done Not Satisfactory to Wife of the Leader of the Volunteers.

Mrs. Ballington Booth is coming to Chicago shortly to take up the work of establishing a home for ex-convicts. The home which Mrs. Booth intends to establish now exists in an embryonic state at 456 West Madison street, in the old Waverly theater building.

This idea of establishing homes for ex-convicts in connection with the barracks of the Volunteers was proposed by Mrs. Booth 18 months ago. It met with the approval of her husband and she accordingly started Hope hall in New York.

The Volunteers of Chicago, having secured the Waverly theater building, at 456 West Madison street, proceeded to establish a similar home. The Chicago home has housed 25 ex-convicts, 20 of whom have come from Joliet and the others from the Waupan reformatory in Wisconsin.

INDIAN HEAD GONE.

Great Blast of Dynamite Cuts Off 100,000 Tons of Rock.

Indian Head, the principal promontory in the Balisada, on the Hudson river has been blown up. Preparations for the event had been going on for several weeks. The result is that 300,000 tons of rock have been at last brought down for use as macadam paving stone.

The cliff rose 200 feet from the water's edge. It was practically perpendicular, and there was almost no break in its smooth surface.

Crowds of spectators that had come out from Coytesville and neighboring hamlets were ordered back from the dangerous ground. There were shouts of "Look out" and "Get away" until everybody was on the run for a place of safety.

HEALTH OF TWO BOOKWORMS.

Two Which Are Ailing Are Said to Be Two of the Last of Their Race.

The Lenox library officials at New York city are concerned about the health of two of their bookworms whose poor appetite and sluggish demeanor have given rise to fears that these rare and ancient gems of the worm world may soon give up the ghost.

Lenox Library for the last two years has had the only three live bookworms at present known to science. The two which are now ailing were found in a large vellum bound book on canonical law, printed in Antwerp in 1684, and it is calculated that they must be 200 years old anyway.
