SENATE AND PRESIDENT AT LOGGERHEADS

CHIEF EXECUTIVE HEARS SENATE CRITICISM AND WRANGLING IN LAST HOUR OF CONGRESS

(Special Service to Glendale Evening News)

Washington, March 4.—The Sixty-fifth Congress died at noon today, strangled by a Republican filibuster. When the gavel fell, Senator Sherman had been speaking since 7:30 o'clock this morning.

The filibuster prevented the passage of the railway administration appropriation, the oil land leasing bill, the army, navy, Indian, agricultural, sundry civil and general deficiency appropriation bills, and also prevented confirmation of the nomination of A. Mitchell Palmer as successor to Attorney General Gregory.

The President spent the last hour before noon in the executive rooms, fifty feet off the Senate floor, and could hear the Senators wrangling and criticising him. Much bitterness was shown, and the President himself was said to feel strongly.

During the last hour the President signed the diplomatic appropriation bill, the military academy appropriation and several others.

Immediately on adjournment the President issued a statement blaming Senate Republicans for impaired government efficiency. WHY NOT A CHRISTIAN STATE?

Strong pressure is being brought to bear upon the Peace Conference and many articles are appearing in the daily press favoring the giving over of the Holy Land to the Jews, to be erected into a distinctively Jewish State, with the boundaries extended to conform to those of Solomon's time, when Egypt was the southwestern boundary and Syria the northern. Christian nations fought many wars to free this land from the domination of the Mohammedans, the bitter enemies of the Christ, and in the Eleventh and Twelfth Centuries held it for 106 years. Now a Christian nation-Englandwith the help of her allies, all acknowledging Christ as their leader, has again conquered this Holy Land from the Saracens, who profess belief in God, but despise the Christ. "Why, then," ask some Christian people, "give this land to another people, worthy though they may be in many respects and far above the Mohammedans in nearly every way, yet who deny the Christ?" True, they believe in God, but so do the Mohammedans. But in respect to the Christ the two people are on exactly the same plane. "Why not make it a Christian state, under the protection of the League of Nations?" is asked. The land that gave birth to the Christ, which owned Him during all of His earth life, which witnessed all His miracles, which gave Him sepulcher and from which went out the teachers who established His church, which now encircles the globe-this land should be owned and ruled by followers of the Christ, not by His enemies. Should we not think on these things?

The great state of Illinois begins this year a \$60,000,000 expansion of its good roads system, thus following California's lead. Among the notable highways to be payed as a whole or in part are the National road extending entirely across the state from the state line, seven miles west of Terre Haute, Ind., to East St. Louis: the Lincoln Old Trails Highway, extending across the northern part of the state as a part of the Lincoln Highway from ocean to ocean; the Dixie Highway from Chicago south to the Ohio River, and many other stretches of highway not named. In that state the counties crossed by the highways to be paved vote bonds for the amounts necessary to pay for the improvements, the sums to be returned in full as soon as the state fund of \$60,000,000 has been accumulated through taxation already provided for. So far no county has failed to vote the bonds.
