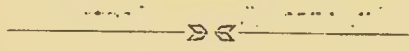

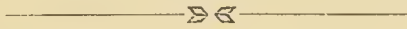



THE WAR COUNCIL MEDAL

New York, January 15th, 1921

The American Red Cross on the occasion of its annual meeting of the present year presented to each member of its War Council a memorial medal in recognition of their exceptional services during the war. This medal has been designed by Daniel C. French and executed under his direction.

The twelve medals given to the members of the War Council were struck in gold. Each bears on its rim the name of its recipient. Each is, therefore, unique and is intended so to be. In addition four copies in silver have been issued.

The interest in this medal is so great and its beauty so exceptional that the committee in charge, with the approval of the National Society, have determined to give to Chapters and members of the Red Cross as well as to art museums and lovers of art the opportunity of securing a limited number of replicas in bronze. The half tone reproduction on the preceding page will give an idea of the beauty and dignity of Mr. French's achievement. On the obverse, in high relief, is represented the symbolic head of an American soldier. Mr. French's initials, D C. F., will be found inconspicuously beneath the neck of the figure. On the reverse is a Red Cross nurse standing erect over a prostrate wounded soldier. The two figures are posed in the form of a cross and are appropriately enclosed in the typical form of an American Red Cross. On the reverse is the following inscription: AMERICAN RED CROSS. TO COMMEMORATE THE VISION AND ACHIEVEMENT OF ITS WAR COUNCIL. The diameter of the medal is $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

The subscription price of the bronze medal has been fixed at \$6.00, an amount deemed sufficient substantially to cover cost of the materials and distribution. All the medals will be numbered. The allotment and numbering of the medals will be made in the order of receipt of subscriptions. The lists will close at noon on March 15 1921, after which date no more subscriptions will be accepted. Subscriptions must be accompanied by check to the order of the American Numismatic Society and instructions for delivery should be sent, *not* to the Red Cross or the Red Cross Committee, but to THE AMERICAN NUMISMATIC SOCIETY, 156TH ST. and BROADWAY, NEW YORK, who have kindly consented to make this distribution.

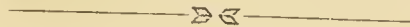

I understand that you have one of the large oval Indian peace medals of Washington which is different from any in this Society's collection.

We would greatly appreciate it if you would be willing to place this on loan here for awhile thereby giving us the opportunity of studying it and comparing it with those that we have.

My impression is that your medal is of a little later type than the large one we have, and probably by a different engraver.

While each individual medal of this series was engraved by hand and consequently will vary in some particulars from others, there are, as far as I can make out four distinct varieties of which we have three and yours is the fourth.

The first variety bears one date only - 1789. The second and third each have two dates - 1792 and 1793. The difference being large and small size, and the fourth variety has the dates 1793 and 1795.



Dear Mr. Garrett:-

I had the pleasure of looking at your Washington medal a few days ago, and it confirms my opinion that these oval Washington medals are by three different engravers, showing three styles of work.

The one of 1789, of which we have the only specimen that I have seen or heard of, is very crude and quite different from the others.

Then came the two sizes of 1792 and 1793 all of which are quite similar and evidently by the same hand. We have the large one of 1793 and the small one of 1792.

Lastly those of 1793 and 1795, with the initials J. R. (Joseph Richardson of Philadelphia), and which differ in several ways from the others.

I am very glad to have the chance of comparing your medal of 1795 with those in the Society's collection, and hope that you will not be in a hurry to take your medal away as it is of great interest and advantage to have the different varieties where they can all be seen and studied at the same time.

There is an other interesting oval engraved medal for the Treaty of Greenville in 1795, of which a specimen is in the Pennsylvania Historical Society. This is inscribed with the name and date of the treaty and bears an American Eagle - both sides the same.

exactly that of Caracalla
before he commenced to raise
a beard. The number of
the Trilunian Power is that
of Caracalla - but not of
Elagabalus.

The reverse design is
certainly that of Dionysus in
a quadriga of leopards. This
is shown by the fact that
the god holds a Thyrsus in

his left hand and a wine cup
(Cantharus) in his right hand.

These are attributes only of
Dionysus or Bacchus. The
animals are certainly spotted
leopards and not lions, which
is again only suitable for
Bacchus.

Your coin is indeed a
gem, and you are to
be congratulated in having

BAMBOO MONEY

In a letter to John Robinson, Salem, Mass., dated Aug. 11, 1912, Henry Ramsden mentions the "bamboo talley money". "Their having values written on them, as well as the names of the issuers and other legends similar to regular coinage, gives them an interest which the ordinary bamboo tallies, used for counting or checking purposes, have not got".

"I find very little has ever been said about them".

Under date of Jan. 8th, 1912, he says of a piece submitted, "this was perhaps more of a talley than actual money, as may perhaps turn out to be the case with all these bamboo pieces, although perhaps, like many other counters and tokens, may at some time or other passed as currency".

In an advertisement in the Numismatic and Philatelic Journal of Japan, for April 1913, Henry Ramsden states that the bamboo money "is supposed to have been derived from metal checks said to have been current in the city of Tsi-an-fu, the capital of Shantung, as far back as A. D. 1275..... These bamboo pieces are now found in

nearly all parts of China, although they appear to be most popular on the Yangtse and conterminous regions.

Their field of circulation was, as a rule, purely local, although no few extended over the limits to which they were first intended.....".

The Society's collection of decorations and war medals has so greatly increased during the past two years that the swing-cases for exhibiting it prove entirely inadequate. Unfortunately, one-third of the collection is not on view owing to this lack of space.

The swing-cases are hung on two sides of each of the four columns in the exhibition room, and it has been found practicable, by providing larger bases, to hang five cases instead of the present three to the columns, thereby increasing our exhibition space by two-thirds.

The additional sixteen cases will provide adequate space for this valuable collection, which is probably the largest and most important in existence. The Society feels that it owes to the memory of the late Mr. J. Sanford Saltus, its friend and benefactor, proper provision for the display of the collection in which he took such great interest and to which he contributed the largest part of its treasures.

These new cases, together with the larger bases, will cost approximately \$1,000. Two of the Society's members have already contributed \$100. each. It would be greatly appreciated if you could see your way clear to assist in the matter of raising the necessary amount for this purpose.

Dear Mr. Wood:-

I think I should like to have the British Museum catalog on Persian coins which you mention in your letter of December 16th if it does not cost very much.

I have been going over the Mohammedan coins and find there are lots of "holes" in my collection, which I hope you may be able perhaps to help me fill up.

In regard to the card which I return herewith, I might add that my collection, or rather the collection made by my father and to which my brother and I have added, consists of a pretty complete series of our Colonial and Continental coins, including a number of great rarity; a very complete series of American Mint issues; nearly 400 Patterns of the Philadelphia Mint; a good series of Hard-time Tokens; "Confederate" pieces; and hundreds of medals, including some of the rare Presidential ones. I am not adding to the above series at present. Something over one-half of the California and other private issues are also represented in the collection, ~~half~~ ^{some} of the pieces there being unique so far as I know.

I have not yet begun really to specialize, although I think I am tending that way. Aside from the Greek series which interest me at present, most of all, I have been, as you know, interest^{ed} in the Mohammedan coins and in European issues before 1500. I have also a pretty good series of Byzantine gold and a number of Imperial Roman Aureii. There is also a number of Confederate, Broken-bank and Fractional notes, but I have not yet even checked them up.





Please pardon the delay in replying to your letter of January 9th, but for the past few days I have been absolutely occupied with our Annual Meeting.

Your gold coin is a nice piece; and if you can get it at all reasonably, I would advise you to take it, because these are fast disappearing and are now becoming exceedingly rare. Unfortunately, I cannot assign it to any one locality. I should say that it was used on one of the French, rather than on one of the English, islands, as the English system of weights was different, and nearly all of the pieces used on their island had gold plugs inserted to bring up the weight to their standard. This piece was probably used at Guadeloupe although I have no means of identifying it.

From my study of these pieces, I have come to the conclusion that many of the marks impressed upon them, are the private marks or initials of the people appointed by the Island Governments to examine and test the gold coins in use on those islands.

This identical piece is Lot 1211 in the Dr. Jules Weill Collection, sold by Schulman, May 23rd, 1910. In the description of this lot, he puts: G.L. for Guadeloupe; B. for Bermuda; M. for Martinique, and L. for Les Saintes, but personally I do not consider these marks as locality marks, but endorsement marks.

The two Chinese pieces are as good as similar pieces sent to Reilly, though the inscriptions are a little different. Of the larger size, there were several weighing about the same and looking like this which varied from 15 to 22 Florins. Of the smaller size, a similar one was billed at 15 Florins. Reilly says that he is going to keep but very few, and that you can pick out as many as you want from the lot sent to him.
