THE WAR COUNCIL MEDAL

New York, January 15th, 1921

The American Red Cross on the occasion of its annual meeting of the present year presented to each member of its War Council a memorial medal in recognition of their exceptional services during the war. This medal has been designed by Daniel C. French and executed under his direction.

The twelve medals given to the members of the War Council were struck in gold. Each bears on its rim the name of its recipient. Each is, therefore, unique and is intended so to be. In addition four copies in silver have been issued.

The interest in this medal is so great and its beauty exceptional that the committee in charge, with the approval of the National Society, have determined to give to Chapters and members of the Red Cross as well as to art museums and lovers of art the opportunity of securing a limited number of replicas in bronze. The half tone reproduction on the preceding page will give an idea of the beauty and dignity of Mr. French's achievement. On the obverse, in high relief, is represented the symbolic head of an American soldier. Mr. French's initials, D C. F., will be found inconspicuously beneath the neck of the figure. On the reverse is a Red Cross nurse standing erect over a prostrate wounded soldier. The two figures are posed in the form of a cross and are appropriately enclosed in the typical form of an American Red Cross. On the reverse is the following inscription: AMERICAN RED CROSS. TO COMMEMORATE THE VISION AND ACHIEVEMENT OF ITS WAR COUNCIL. The diameter of the medal is 234 inches.

The subscription price of the bronze medal has been fixed at \$6.00, an amount deemed sufficient substantially to cover cost of the materials and distribution. All the medals will be numbered. The allotment and numbering of the medals will be made in the order of receipt of subscriptions. The lists will close at noon on March 15 1921, after which date no more subscriptions will be accepted. Subscriptions must be accompanied by check to the order of the American Numismatic Society and instructions for delivery should be sent, *not* to the Red Cross or the Red Cross Committee, but to THE AMERICAN NUMISMATIC SOCIETY, 156TH ST. and BROADWAY. NEW YORK, who have kindly consented to make this distribution.



I had the pleasure of looking at your Washington medal a few days ago, and it confirms my opinion that these oval Washington medals are by three different engravers, showing three styles of work.

The one of 1789, of which we have the only specimen that I have seen or heard of, is very crude and quite different from the others.

Then came the two sizes of 1792 and 1793 all of which are quite similar and evidently by the same hand. We have the large one of 1793 and the small one of 1792.

Lastly those of 1793 and 1795, with the initials J. R. (Joseph Richardson of Philadelphia), and which differ in several ways from the others.

I am very glad to have the chance of comparing your medal of 1795 with those in the Society's collection, and hope that you will not be in a hurry to take your medal away as it is of great interest and advantage to have the different varities where they can all be seen and studied at the same time.

There is an other interesting oval engraved medal for the Treaty of Greenville in 1795, of which a specimen is in the Pennsylvania Historical Society. This is inscribed with the name and date of the treaty and bears an American Eugle - both sides the same.

### THE JOSEPH HODGES CHOATE MEMORIAL MEDAL

NUMBER ONE OF A SERIES OF MEDALS COMMEMORATIVE
OF MEN DISTINGUISHED FOR PUBLIC SERVICE

The Century Association, having decided to issue a series of commemorative medals in honor of men who have been especially distinguished for public service, in the arts, in letters and in other notable activities, has appointed a committee with power to act. It is in pursuance of this determination that the first of the proposed medals is now to be issued.

In 1919 an exhibition of medals was held in the gallery of the Century Association where it attracted a great deal of attention to this field of sculpture. For this exhibition The American Numismatic Society loaned a considerable number of plaques and medals from its collection. This exhibition constituted a strong argument in support of the idea that a series of Century Association medals should be undertaken, and that these medals be made available to the members through subscriptions.

It is especially fitting that the first medal of the series should commemorate the public services of so great an American as Joseph Hodges Choate. His singular ability in many fields, his charming personality, and the very great measure of accomplishment which rewarded his efforts, mark him as one of the most gifted men that America has produced. "Patriot, Ambassador, Jurist, Orator," the medal rightly proclaims him.

The design of the medal was entrusted to Mr. Herbert Adams, one of our most distinguished sculptors, President of the National Academy of Design, 1917 to 1919, member of the Commission of Fine Arts and a personal friend of Mr. Choate. Mr. Adams' work for the Library of Congress in Washington, St. Bartholomew's Church in New York, the Bryant Statue in Bryant Park, and many statues and memorials throughout the country testify to his eminence as a sculptor. The medal which he has designed is a work of remarkable artistic quality and a very beautiful presentation of the personality of Mr. Choate.

The Committee of the Century Association desires to extend the privilege of subscribing for this medal to other societies of which Mr. Choate was an honored member. Invitations to subscribe were extended to and accepted by the Bar Association, and the Harvard Club, and the privilege of subscribing will be further extended to a limited list of collectors, amateurs and friends of Mr. Choate.

The Committee of the Century Association has been glad to avail itself of the kind cooperation of The American Numismatic Society in publishing the medal and takes this opportunity to express its cordial appreciation of its helpfulness, and has authorized The American Numismatic Society to issue this circular and to accept subscriptions for the medals.


#### BAMBOO MONEY

In a letter to John Robinson, Salem, Mass., dated Aug. 11, 1912, Henry Ramsden mentions the "bamboo talley money". "Their having values written on them, as well as the names of the issuers and other legends similar to regular coinage, gives them an interest which the ordinary bamboo tallies, used for counting or checking purposes, have not got".

"I find very little has ever been said about them".

Under date of Jan. 8th, 1912, he says of a piece
submitted, "this was perhaps more of a talley than
actual money, as may perhaps turn out to be the case
with all these bamboo pieces, although perhaps, like many
other counters and tokens, may at some time or other
passed as currency".


In an advertisement in the Numismatic and Philatelic Journal of Japan, for April 1913, Henry Ramsden states that the bamboo money "is supposed to have been derived from metal checks said to have been current in the city of Tsi-an-fu, the capital of Shantung, as far back as A. The Society's collection of decorations and war medals has so greatly increased during the past two years that the swing-cases for exhibiting it prove entirely inadequate. Unfortunately, one-third of the collection is not on view owing to this lack of space.

The swing-cases are hung on two sides of each of the four columns in the exhibition room, and it has been found practicable, by providing larger bases, to hang five cases instead of the present three to the columns, thereby increasing our exhibition space by two-thirds.

The additional sixteen cases will provide adequate space for this valuable collection, which is probably the largest and most important in existence. Society feels that it owes to the memory of the late Mr. J. Sanford Saltus, its friend and benefactor, proper provision for the display of the collection in which he took such great interest and to which he contributed the largest part of its treasures.

At the present moment the Society has no funds available in which to take advantage of such an unusual opportunity. Will you not send in a contribution?



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
