- 1. Developments in the USAGE operations over the past three months have caused us to hold up reply to your MGKW-11190 until comments were received from the Austrian station and it was possible to discuss the matter here with 1 1. We have received MASA-1030, outlining the position of the Austrian station; - 1 has returned, and the 31 December deadline date for final assessment of USAGE has now been reached. The purpose of this dispatch, therefore, is to point out what has been accomplished thus far and to record our recommendations for the future. Whether these recommendations meet with your approval or not, it is hoped that some definite and positive decision will result which can be implemented at the earliest practicable date.
- To begin, our comments on the various paragraphs in MGKW-11190 follow:
- a. Par. 1 "GRUESOME" is the proper agency to handle (USAGE), but dependent on transfer of GRUESOME to ZACABIN". When will this occur? We feel that if such transfer is not effected in the near future, it will only result in further vacillation and indecision on the ultimate disposition of USAGE. Further, we are inclined to agree to a great extent with the objections by the Austrian station to GRUESOME handling of USAGE as expressed in par. 3, MASA-1030, and to these add our own comments that no one presently on the GRUESOME staff except Clarence Foley is now authorized to read the extensive ZACABIN files on USAGE operations. Rewriting of these could not be staffed by POB, nor, probably, by the Austrian station.
- b. (1) Par. 2 "USAGE has survived various assessment periods and various deadlines never enforced". True, but due, in large part, to our previous inability to provide a final assessment based on divergent requirements and views of customer agencies. We feel that we have reached the end of these assessment periods, and make a final recommendation of transfer to SOB. We did reach the end of the latest deadline given USAGE for Hungarian operations, and enforced it by withdrawing financial support on 1 November, prior to receipt of your MGKA-11190.

This, plus the ZACACTUS support of Bjela Legia radio which this group has gained, ostensibly through USAGE, seem to indicate to us that USAGE has shown more control over this group than has been maintained previously by anyone else.

d. (1) CSR Operation

We feel that it is not now too early to say that USAGE has something here which at least merits further exploration. This we base on production stemming from this operation (plus Wash. evaluation so far received): apparently genuine courier trips, and the informal I of MOB that the operation appears sound. estimate of L J) and SOB (L 1) have been kept informed Incidentally, MOB([and consulted on this operation. JOB, which had access to the entire WACO project files but showed no interest, was not included in discussions principally because their principal group (OKAPI), is in diametric opposition to the USAGE (Bjela Legia) Slovaks. The decision to include or exclude GRUESOME in these talks, we felt was a matter for SOB to resolve. The fact that GRUESOME is not yet a part of ZACABAL, plus reasons set down above and those advanced in MASA-1030 probably account for noninclusion of GRUESOME in either specific or general USAGE discussions. We have secured a copy of the CIC report # R-1312-51 on the Bjela Legia, I has been consulted on some of the persons mentioned. I is also quite familiar with many of the persons forming part of this group. His knowledge along with that of [] has been called upon and made use of by

(2) Hungary

As pointed out in 2 b (1) above, financial support was terminated for the Hungarian operation on I November. Your vexation at the lack of success of this operation is certainly understandable, and, indeed, reflects the frustration USAGE expresses and we keenly feel. Despite withdrawal of funds, USAGE insists he will continue to attempt to establish a going operation into Hungary, and if success is achieved, again present the operation, much as he did with the CSR show. If, in addition, for possible future use by us, or by way of partial recompense for money expended, true names and biographical data of all personnel involved are desired, USAGE is willing to continue to gather same - at no additional costs, of course. In this connection, if and I have expressed interest in certain persons used in the now defunct Hungarian operation.

(3) Operation SINGER

As reported in MGLA-8552, this operation was dropped by USAGE after the three month trial period failed to produce sufficient returns to justify continuance.

(4) KOSSAREV case

Better, and perhaps luckier, file tracing on our part would have exposed the key figure, KOSTUCHENKO, as a shady character and averted this aptly termed "fiasco", wherein Van Cutsem, USAGE and ourselves were quite obviously taken, we for a sum of 500 DM.

(5) GAVRILOV case

We are preparing a paper on this case, also turned up by Father Van CUTSEM, which after a number of weakly explained delays, begins to take on the appearance of an RIS confusion operation. However, this operation is not, nor was it ever, financed, and we feel reasonably certain that no one employed by us has been blown. As no costs are involved, and defectors are currently such a primary target, we can do little else than await future developments. Our only committments in this case are to receive the body if and when he comes out.

3. The sentiments expressed in para. 4 are certainly most sound in principle and in fact and ones which we most heartily endorse. That the takeover agency must be familiar with USAGE's history could not be truer. We therefore feel, that because SOB has been kept informed of USAGE's operations, has received copies of all reports for a period of six months, and now has present on the SOB staff [], who is also familiar with USAGE from the Washington side, SOB is the logical base to handle USAGE. It does not appear to us that GRUESOME can match these qualifications. As far as the takeover agency becoming otherwise bogged down in a series of "assessment periods" and grandoise schemes", we again feel that with SOB as the takeover agency this danger is precluded, since as stated, SOB has been fully included in this current and final assessment period.

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RIS

There have been, since this period started, and there should be no "grandiose schemes" in the immediate or distant future, depending, of course upon the successor agency's adhering to the rigid policy of applying ZACABIN regulations which has imposed and enforced most stringently since taking over USAGE on a full-time case officer basis. In this regard it should be pointed out that USAGE has responded with fullest cooperation, speed and understanding. Certainly, when one looks at the PRQ's submitted, with real names, photograph-signaturefingerprint cards, plus operational details and this in addition to production, one must conclude that this last "assessment" period has been a profitable one, and at least so it seems to us at POB, should be sufficient to precipitate a decision as to disposition of USAGE. As for guarding against large payrolls for piddling returns and masses of paper on inconsequential aspects, we feel that the takeover agency now finally has the advantage of good indoctrination of USAGE thru our efforts of the last few months. His reporting is within the strict framework of the Project system. We believe he knows what we want and expect and what we do not want nor need. Costs in the CSR operations and in Austrian activities have been kept from expanding. In the CSR operation they amount to \$457.00 per month for a total of \$1828.00 for the four months it has been in existence. (\$748.00 of the total has been paid in Czech crowns, the remainder in Austrian shillings.). In that time it has produced, as pointed out above, 26 disseminated reports, operational and administrative reports, and has embraced four successful courier trips in and out of Slovakia.

With regard to the UJDRUTD proposal as originally submitted by USAGE, we feel that this should be required reading not only for the agency taking him on, but for everyone dealing with Germans or Austrians. It is significant that our complete rejection of the first proposal succeeded in reducing the large number of persons involved to the manageable number of three, which was also rejected, for reasons dealing with the L 1 station.

- 4. Our comments on MGKW-11190 being completed, a summary of the bases for our recommendation that SOB rather than GRUESOME take overhandling of USAGE is set forth as follows:
- a. GRUESOME cannot at this time take over USAGE under the conditions set forth in MGKW-11190.
- \underline{b} . The end of the final USAGE assessment period will be reached 1 January, and the sooner USAGE is transferred to an Austrian-based AIS agency the better we feel it will be for AIS, POB and USAGE's operations per se.
- c. SOB has the double advantage of foreknowledge of USAGE in the form of an ex-Wash. ZIPPER desk man ι 1 on its staff, plus full insight into the present assessment period.
- d. SOB has more interest than GRUESOME, not only in USAGE's taping possibilities with respect to intelligence mills, but also in his internal Austrian connections, and an understandable desire to control USAGE penetration of other SOB connections.



- 5. We feel, therefore, that SOB is the most logical and suitable agency to take over USAGE and his operations. For this purpose we recommend that SOB name a qualified case officer, (who does not know USAGE socially), to begin immediately after 1 February working closely with C I and accompanying C I on meetings with USAGE. It is hoped that this take-over period should be accomplished within two months time. In other words, on 1 February, POB gives up USAGE in principle, and on 1 April in final actuality.
- 6. To implement the take-over, if approved, SOB should be prepared to do the following:
- a. Provide one case officer, beginning immediately, to accompany and on weekly meetings with USAGE for a period to two months (approximately 6 or 7 meetings), or a shorter period, if SOB feels that the take-over can be accomplished within a lesser time.
- b. Provide the operating expenses for USAGE beginning 1 April or earlier. (45,820 AS, 75,000 Kc monthly).
- c. Provide such documentation as may be necessary for properly papering bona-fide couriers.
- d. Final decision on the question of continuing supply of cigarettes and operational gasoline to USAGE should be left to SOB. Because the support was included in the original agreement with USAGE and does not appear unreasonable, and because purchase of gasoline and cigarettes on the Austrian economy would involve increased costs, we see no valid reason here for arbitrary discontinuance if the operations are intended to continue. The sooner the above can be put into effect, the sooner it will aid the SOB case officer psychologically in establishing an early and effective liaison with USAGE.

7. To sum up:

- a. SOB has been cut into all USAGE proposals since the present period started. All final questions since receipt of MGKW-9897, MGKW-11190 have been referred to Washington for decision. All have been or will be in ZACABIN form.
- b. The probability of taking over internal Austrian operations being entailed has been recognized and is in fact welcomed, at least in a limited degree, by SOB. The performance of this while sloughing off the satellite operations can be accomplished by dropping defection operations and CSR operations depending, especially in case of the latter, on progress made.
- c. The possibility of using USAGE to spot and report on other paper mills in Austria is being considered by SOB, as well as establishing possible CI contacts in Sovzone Austria through USAGE's OB operations, in order to complement SOB's efforts.

- d. USAGE's satellite effort should be confined to the CSR until such time as it is felt that his operations there are solid and sound. Any expansion will depend on conformity to the pattern already set, i.e. ZACABIN regulations, small, slow, sound build-up under strict supervision and control by the successor agency.
- e. USAGE's internal Austrian show can best be molded by SOB to serve the proper interests of all parties concerned in the order of their proper priority. Incidentally, we learned from G-2 USFA (see MGLA-9557) for the first time, that USAGE's OB production is useful and worthwhile if not voluminous and also that his political and CI reporting is of value.
- 8. In conclusion, the overall assessment would not be complete without a total monthly costs for the period 1 July to 31 December 1951.

d Target date for resumption of Bjela Legia broadcasts is to be 15 January, dependent on results of meeting to be held between ZACACTUS/Bjela Legia representatives on 7 January.

4. To implement the above D requested a meeting be arranged between himself. SLAA, SLAD and an interpreter, to take place in Salzburg on 7 January. E I to act simply as radio broadcast specialist of the same agency represented by USAGE, who as has been reported, is known to SLAA as an unnamed American. The conversation will be confined to financial requirements of the broadcasts and a general policy outline. The aspect of being blown to SLAA and SLAD was discussed with [], who still desires the meeting. No other interpreters being available who could logically attend this meeting, USAGE was suggested to arrange introduction to SLAA, security ramifications of meeting USAGE also being pointed out. also had no objections to meeting USAGE personally. Inasmuch as posing as the radio specialist in the same agency as USAGE, SLAA would undoubtedly keep USAGE briefed on the conversations. POB also considered the security aspects of USAGE being known to Γ \exists and reached the conclusion that from our standpoint, no breach existed. The target date for commencement of the broadcasts left us insufficient time to refer this matter to Washington for decision.

5. [], using the cover name EDWARDS, will meet USAGE, who will use the cover name EISNER, in the lobby of the Oestereicher Hotel on 7 January, after which arrangements will be made to meet SLAA. We will report details on the conversations when received from []. We will probably also be kept fully briefed by USAGE.

Market is one of USAGE's two chief assistants, is doing agent handling and training in connection with the Slovakian project, and is trying to develop possibilities for another Hungarian operation. USAGE has indicated in conversations with that IX-1, who is not a professional intelligence officer, has a great deal to learn and needs almost constant supervison and stimulus. At this stage USAGE would probably be usualling to detach IX-1 to Vienna, and he undoubtedly wouldnot consider him qualified for semi-autonomous work. With more experience, however, IX-1 might be a good man for USAGE's Vienna representative, and we will keep the idea in mind.

3-Vien. 3-Salz.files

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CROSSRAHN, formerly known as USAGE, was originally a Zipper source who in Feb 1950 came under direct control of the Pullach station. In April 1952 he was turned over to the Salzburg station, as his mani main base of operations was in Austria.

At the time of this turnover, GROSSPAHN was directing 4 operations, as follows:

a. Slovakia

This was principally a border-crossing operation for the purpose of obtaining reports, documents etc. inside Slovakia. GROSSPAHN NKK worked through Karl SUMTCHRAST, a refugee Slovakian priest in Salzburg, who in turn recruited . a number of couriers. This operation came to a virtual end in July 1952 when the last four couriers were picked up with the while inside Slovakia. (Other couriers had previously been lost in April 52 and Dec 51).

b. Soviet Zone of Mustria OR

ORCSSRAHN runs a net of approximately eight agents who collect OR information on the Soviet Zone of 'ustria. This is at present the most productive part of the CROSSPAHN complex of operations. Since May approximately eighty reports have been received here, all but a few of which have been disseminated. The evaluations received from Wathington customer agencies have been waite varied - in general not too enthusiastic. In a number of cases they have said that the info could best be evaluated by the "rmy in Aystria. Customer agencies in the first field, on the other hand, have shown extremely favorable reactions to the reports. For example, a memo from the Chief of the Intelligence Section of USAB characterized them as "extremely useful in helping this Headquarters maintain its Air Order of Battle of Soviet Air Forces units in SowZone Austria" and said that the information in them "is of great interest to this Headquarters as well as to USAF. USAFE. USFA." They were judged "quite reliable".

c. Police Contactx

Through a police official in Salzburg & R&STRICORREGIES CARRESTED CONTRACTOR OF THE who has three or four subagents or informants GROSSPAIN receives police reports. Through this channel special checks can be made if needed. Some of the reports received duplicate [I those received from [Fost of the reports are considered to be primarily of local inherest and helpful as background information. Some are useful as CE material.

d. Socialist and Rightest contacts

CROSSPAIR receives reports from an agent who is well connected in Unper Austrian Socialist circles but who also maintains contacts in Austrian extreme rightest circles. These reports are mailingxof interest to local CRESCONDENSES. mainly Declassified and Approved for Release

1. In the middle of February 1952, XX-1 (Subject of MGI-A-9573) received a letter from Paris from HAJDU-NEMETH (para two, MGI-A-8402) dated 9 February 1952, and containing in Hungarian the following s/w message:

*Dear(XX-1): An important thing happened. A group composed of such members of MiBK as do not engage in daily politics, and led by a general staff major, visited me seeking personal contact. There were many interesting preludes, but about these only orally. I find this group of experts suitable for serious work. Our endeavors thus far might now find fruition providing we proceed wisely toward realizing our aims. You decide what should happen before we present the group. If you deem it important and necessary I will visit you in order to discuss the details. Reply requested! Excuse this ugly writing but this pen is miserable. How about my passport? Embrace. Iajos."

*Dear (N-1): I have selected the presented gentlemen and at that time the controversies began (in the MHBK), since not all of them want to follow the political course of the leadership but rather desire to remain plain soldiers. They want to fight for the liberation of the country when the hour comes. Therefore they—and a lot of others—are in favor of collaboration with the Committee as far as political representation is concerned, if not in every detail. For a start I mention three names. (Illegible)...have already worked...but were not exposed, they teld me. They are experts for sure...OliverLOVASZ, general staff major, was in...American captivity...one year old. Please check him. I had a good impression of him, would entrust him with leadership. I would tie to him as a good expert lieutenant Ervin GEVAY...old, was in Schwarzwald.. (illegible). Finally Ervin HOLIOS, captain...eight old, who is assigned

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to Captain LABNER at the group. The rest I leave to you, dear (XL-1), or better you (the "you" in plural form). Embrace you. Lajos."

- A. We have been trying without success to get HAJDU-NEMETH's visa for Austria in his Temporary Travel Document in Lieu of Pansport (furnished to him by POB through USAGE) renewed in order that he may visit IX-1. Recelless to say, we have no intention of getting XX-1 or USAGE involved in the MHBK affair, but we do believe it would be worthwhile to have XX-1 debrief HAJDU-NEMETH for more particulars. USAGE will probably return the TTD unvisaed to him this week and he will travel as far as Germany from where we will arrange to have him brought over the border if necessary.





L. It is generally inadvisable to start a conversation on any subject in a train. It is further inadvisable to walk in trains or to leiter at stations before or after the arrival of trains.

- 2. Police checks should be expected at larger radiuoad stations and also particularly on certain lines. These lines are:
 - a. Bratislava-Kuty
 - b. Bratislava-Kosice, especially offer Silina and between Kysak and Presov *
 - c, Mihalany-Cierna nad Tisou
 - d. Kosice-Medzilaborcó
 - e. Kosice-Tahanovce (special workers' trains on this line are only rarely controlled)
 - f. Breclav-Znojmo via Valtice





This does not mean that you need to labor over each report to make it grammatically and stylistically correct. You need, in fact, to give no more attention to this aspect than you normally do. However, a close duplication of our usage in the matter of setting up your pages would in itself give them an entirely new cast. Particular attention should be paid to paragraphing to achieve this effect, and the Style Book which you have been furnished should be followed as closely as possible in the matter of page composition.

As we learned from Slovakia, comrade Strecansky Ernest and Tihlarik Alexander, who for more than a year have been carrying out counter espionage for the STB in Austria, enjoy their successful work which they carried out sheltered by the foremost members of Fascist organizations in Salzburg.

On 18 August they were merrily drinking in the Cafe Grand in Bratislava in the company of an STB member and an official of the Ministry (Poverenictvo) of Information to whom they described their successful work.

Strecansky often crossed the Czechoslovak border under the name Horl as a collaborator Sidor. Slovak priests like Dr. Cik of Rome and Father Melzer of Vienna who sent letters to their relatives in Slovakia did not know in whom they were placing their confidence. Comrade Strecansky was very clever in his trade. With the help of a certain priest he even succeeded in getting into RFE from where he also very likely supplied his employers. Strecansky censored letters on both sides always according to the necessity and circumstance. This activity protected by the Slovak Fascists was really very successful.

When these two heroes arrived in the Village Bor Svaty Mikulas, they immediately visited their "girl friends" comrade Helen Hladikova and comrade Olga Sokolova who helped them in their work. Apparently the STB did not like this visit so they arrested them "pro forma" in the houses of their girl friends. Naturally on the next day they were free.

Maxian who was shot in June of this year and the seriously wounded Casta Anton and Pavlovic Peter, who were caught by the STB as a result of Strecansky's treason, were arrested and taken to the State Prison in Bratislava on Racarsky Road.

Approximately in March 1932, when I came back from Great Britain to my brother's estate in East Prussia (on which I held certain inheritance rights) I found great difficulties in getting the Government consent for the erection of a cement factory there. At that time Germany was still nominally a democracy under Reichskanzler Bruning, and the state of Prussia was run mainly by the Sozialdemokra-tische Partei, Ministerpräsident in Prussia was Herr Braun. Any industrial development, especially if proposed by the nobility, met cold disapproval. German military circles, as I was well aware, were interested in developing key industries, especially in East Prussia, because this province was completely cut off from the actual Reich. I had discussions with all party leaders (from the Deutsch-nationale Volkspartei down to the Sozialdemokratische Partei) and found interest but no support. The then Wehrkreiskommandeur in East Prussia v. Branchitacky who was particularly interested in having a cement factory installed in the vicinity of the "Heilsberger Dreieck" (a planned fortification against any eastern - then it was thought Polish - eccuration) thought it wise to come to an arrangement with the "coming" NSDAP. I spoke to the butler of my brother who was NSDAP Ortsgruppenleiter whether he could arrange a meeting fro me with Gauleiter Koch; to this he agreed provided that I would fill out a party application. I took this matter as an inferior affair and filled out an application then. I did not meet Koch, I took part in no party affairs and only in 1934, when I was already in Palestine and the Middle East heard that I had been accepted. Even then I did not pay any attention. Somehow my "party membership" followed me through Auslandsorganisation to Falestine and I was there summoned by the Landesgruppenleiter of Palestine who rebuked me for not participating in party activity, since I was an "alter Kämpfer" (a party member pre 1933), I refused to deal with the party. When I came to Germany in 1935 and negotiated with Autounion for the general agency of this firm for the Middle East I was informed that Auslandsorganisation had refused to grant me the representation because I did not comply with party directives. In fact I had greatly insulted the Landesgruppenleiter for Palestine and the Ortsgruppenleiter for Jerusalem by telling them to go to hell. I was summoned to Amtsleiter Stempel of Auslandsorganisation at Berlin and prior to seeing him I went to East Prussia, where I through my brother's former butler, Herman Kraass, who had then become a fairly high Arbeitsfront official arranged to get my party memberbook by paying the fees back to 1932. I thought that I would thereby be protected, but when seeing intsleiter Stempel found that I was

mistaken. Amtsleiter Stempel called me anything but a swine and I left in a rage after I had told him the fact that he was apparently only trying to protect his good friends the Ortsgruppenleiter and Landesleiter who had themselves applied for the Autounion representation. I left Germany and from Switzerland mailed several letters to Hess, the deputy party chieff, and others demanding an investigation. Early in 1938, after my return to Germany, I was informed that I had been cleared. This "clearance" had been greatly influenced by a journalist whom I had met in Palestine in 1933, a Diplomingenieur Leopold Itz Edler von Mildenstein, whom I had stood a number of favors including a good sum of money he needed when he was in the Middle East. I had not been aware that Mildenstein was a referent of SD, and had I known such fact it would not have enlightened me at such time. Mildenstein after my return to Germany had been very friendly to me, and after my helping him financially, had brought me in contact with his chief Werner Göttsch, (fnu) Behrends and Heinz Jost. When in Germany, and after passing the examination as foreign exe change councillor, I was notified that Auslandsorganisation had still not burried the hatchet; my new friends however informed me that as long as I did not go into politics against the Reich I had little to fear. Fossibly to increase their income, I met a showdown in winter 1937, 1938 when I was arrested by order of Franz A.Six and accused of pro-Jewish sympathies; this happened again in 1938. In both cases I was freed by intervention of Mildenstein, Göttsch, Alfred Naujoks and Jost.

I tried hard to emigrate under the false allegation that I would be able to save my money. Finally I had everything laid on for the end of September 1939. When the war broke out I was called to the Hilfspolizei. I notified "friend" Göttsch and Naujoks who assured me that they would straighten the matter out. Already in fall 1939 I was called for a briefing to Delbrückstrasse and was there informed that I would become chief of intelligence ad interim in Rumania if I wanted to save my skin, if not I would have little chances. After paying a sum of 5,000 Reichsmark to the account of Alfred Naujoks father and a further sum of Swiss francs 10,000 to the banking account of (fnu) Sanner, the Abwehrbeauftragte with ARG, and a number of further smaller sums in favor of Göttsch and friends I was nominated by Jost to Hauptheauftragter Rumanien and in April 1940 was informed that I had become Untersturmführer der SS, followed by two promotions until early 1941. SUitsch and his deputy Wilhelm Waneck had dooked up a story that I was a reliable "hiter nampfer" and ar SU applicant since 1937 - a statement brace on hothing.

It was found out during my being under arrest by Gestapo from September 1942 through April 1943 that I had actually never been an SS member and that my party membership was more than dubious. For what reasons I got away I am unable to say. Possibly to save the organizational face of the SS, whose bigshots I had met, I was demoted to SS-Mann and discharged from SS, because I was unbecoming to the dignity of SS.

Previous to this act I had been asked

a- to volunteer for Waffer 33

b- to take over other assignements of

importance abroad

c- to run the insurrection in Irak

d- to kiss Heydrich in a vulgar fashion

e- to become adjutant of Berger


and a good number of other proposals

which I had all declined.

I may also state that I have never been in the pay of SS or the party or the German Government, and I flatter myself that at least in this respect I am an exception. When Gestapo found this fact they seemed greatly baffled and disturbed.

As far as I can remember my party number was 984 212 dating back to sometime in 1932. The SS number assigned to me is not known; I believe that this number never existed since I never passed the prescribed SS school, it seems to me that I only was an "Ehrenführer" but am not sure, my respective Ausweise were taken away by Gestapo during my arrest together with the majority of my personal documents including diplomatic passports certificates etc. and were never returned to me.

Complying with the law I registered on 3 February 1950 with Registrierungsbehörde I. Instanz (Stadtmagistrat Salzburg) as SS Hauptsturmführer and with decision dated 9 February 1950 was exempted from registration according to para 4, Absatz 5 lit.f VG 47 because of my resistance activity. This decision became irrevocable. Thereby my full civil rights were reinstated.



RESISTANCE

My first contacts with resistance, which actually could not be called organized, date back to the time 1933 after Hitler took over. During the years when I was not in Germany this contact remained very looses and only increased after my return (approximately in 1937) personally had intended to emigrate to the USA and therefor participated only stronger after the outbreak of the war in September 1939 when I found that it was impossible for me to leave. Resistance planning was somehow vague and concentrated on winning international influence and thereby counteracting government plenning. The majority of resistance interested personalities were however loyal Germans and this fact made planning and working all the more difficult. Their idea of resistance sprang from anti-nazism for economic, religious, racial or humane reasons. No overall organization could exist therefor and I made it my habit to find as many friends as possible and amending their individual anti-nazism to a scheme which I called Pan-Europeanism. Gradually a collaboration developed with Gesandter von Hentig of the Foreign Office, Direktor, Abs of the Deutsche Bank and others. (Thereby I f.i. in 1941 could arrange a meeting for Mr. Harriman with Staatseekretär von Weitzäcker at Berlin). No influence however was sufficiently large to actually help. At such time I also tried to link inter-European trade and industries together as to avoid a German predominance, I found part success in Rumania and Holland but my work was stopped cold when I fell in disfavor on 5 December 1941 and was not allowed to leave Germany again. This was followed up by my arrest in September 1942. After my release in spring 1943 my former contacts were usually scared to deal with me, I commenced to gradually build up again. But always found the terrific trouble that any type of close organization was made impossible because of supervision; this included my contacts to the 20 July circle which I estimated a thoroughly german-nationalistic affair. I found contacts with Vienna resistance clergy but also there saw no immediate possibility. In 1944 my attention was called to a small group in Tyrol by my brother in law. Then rumors existed already regarding an Alpine retreat of German nazis; I thought it worth while supporting this group which lateron at least provided cover for a larger number of refugees and deserters. I finally greatly influenced the activity of this group and thereby succeeded in practically breaking up any planned German resistance, opening the way for the advancing American Army etc. until the day of the German surrender. For this activity I received one of the 47% issued "Urkunde" from the Tyrolian Landeshauptmann.

GERMAN AND AUSTRIAN CITIZENSHIP STATUS

APPLICATION for AUSTRIAN CITIZENSHIP

In March 1947 I applied for Austrian citizenship thru my legal friend Dr. Heinrich Brodfeld of Vienna. My application was recommended by the Minister for Trade (Handelsminister) Dr. Kolb in person. My application was then filed with Salzburg Landesregierung. After a considerable time I was informed by Landesrat Weisskind that my file, when being sent to Vienna, had come into Russian hands and that the MVD chief of Vienna had asked Helmer (Min.for Interior) not to grant my application. I have never been able to get a definite confirmation for this allegation. Much later I was informed through by Weisskand and later by Dr. Kwisda of the Landesregierung that actually my file was held up by a letter from Ministerial Pammer, * who allegedly after contacting CIC had found that I was undesirable. I have personally seen the Pammer letter in my file; the citizenship could pass at any time if Pammer would * draw his letter wask. The letter only generally states that Abteilung II of the Ministerium für Inneres (Generaldirektion für die öffentliche Sicherheit) does not consider it desirable that I became a citizen although I had been cleared by denazification. Since this letter is already some years old now it could easily be revoked (and Pammer takes paying advice). **

GERMAN CITIZENSHIP

Since the end of the war I have never claimed German citizenship, and it has been much longer that I have described myself German. During my stay in Germany after 1945 I have lived there as an Austrian (assuming that this was correct). With my application for my Austrian citizenship I have given a written statement that I am stateless and do not claim German citizenship nor would I do so. Although such declaration could be merely a file matter I consider

it absolutely correct and will do so in the future.

** Landeshauptmann KLAUS assured me that my citizenship would be granted on the day when the land can decide without asking the Ministry; this according to law would be on 27 April 1955 (ten years after the reinstalltion of the Provisorische Staatsregierung in Österreich). The law requires a permanent stay for 10 years (the German occupation time does not count), in which case the Land can grant citizenship.

1. The attachments, as listed below, are to complete your records on formalized operational reporting instructions passed to GROSSBAHN. The PRQ Part I form, which is not listed here, and which was passed to him during POB's handling of the case, duplicates the DYCLEMATIS form.

- a. Project Form: Similar to the DYCLEMATIS form, but with some minor variations introduced by []
- be PRQ Part II: Worked out between GROSSBAHN and I with somewhat more detail than the DYCLEMATIS PRQ Part II form, and in the German language.
- c. Non-OB P/ Report Instructions: Memorandum of 19 August 1952 from [1 to GROSSBAHN containing instructions designed to simplify the processing of non-OB reports at Salzburg Base.
- d. Contact Report Outline: Identical with the contact reporting outline in general staff use in the Austrian Station.
- Berichtsschema fur Zusammenkunfte: GROSSBAHN's version in the German language of the Contact Report Outline.

2. So far, out of these various instructions, GROSSBAHN has passed only the Berictsschema on to AA-l. He will from time to time pass on other of these instructions to AA-1 and to other of his reliable principal agents as they become needed. GROSSBAHN himself has now begun using the contact reporting outline as a matter of routine, and AA-1 has promised to do the same.

SUNJECT: Deeting between CC 2 and HH 1 on 16 October 1952

HH 1 came to Salzburg on 15 October 1952 in order to arrange for the printing of his planned "Oberoesterreichische Hauszeitung". At about 1230 hours he called me by phone (26534) and proposed a meeting at platform 7 of Salzburg main railroad station at 1730 hours.

All concerned felt that the Slovak operation was a bad risk from the start and that it was the type of sponsored-group operation which we plan consciously to avoid in the future. The arrest of AA-8 was not an unmitigated disaster, since [] as a result of this arrest met AA-1, and AA-1 has agreed to submit himself and his agents to CARRIAGE testing and to conform to strict reporting standards -- including contect reporting and full PRQs Parts I and II, as well as operational clearance procedures. A contact in Vienna has been arranged to forward such operational communications by pouch to Salzburg. SUBJECT: Funds for Office Space for GROSSBAHN

- 1. The GROSSBAHN project is being written up for approval and will be submitted within the next day or so. GROSSBAFN (formerly known as USAGE) was originally an agent of Zipper. In early 1950 he became an agent of the Pullach Operations Base, and in the spring of 1952 was turned over to the Salzburg Operations Base. Submission of the project for approval has been held up pending the receipt of full PRQ's on the principal GROSSBAHN sub-agents. Full operational clearance for GROSSBAHN has been granted.
- 2. We have been asked to make an immediate decision on the . expenditure of funds to procure secure office space for GROSSBAHN. The request is deemed urgent, because office space in Salzburg is at a great premium, and a possibility has come up which must be decided on right away. The present office quarters occupied by GROSSBAHN are not considered very secure.
- 3. The proposed new office space involves a six month payment of rental in advance. Approval, as embodied in paragraph 1 of attached cable, is therefore requested for the expenditure of up to \$800 to cover office rent and utilities for a six month period for GROSSBAHN. This will be included in the project outline.

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

GROSSBAHN - Contact Report on Meeting of GROSSBAHN with HM-1

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Attention is invited specifically to Para III of attached This reflects our trend with GROSSBAHN to attempt to work him into a position where he is making more of a contribution to the everall REDCAP effort. In reference to his closing remarks under paragraph III b, we plan to point out to him at the next meeting that we feel he was mistaken in stating to HH-L that recruitment of non-covaone residents to reconnoiter the Soviet area is satisfactory. We have found the courier/observer type sub-agent somewhat unsating-factory and are convinced that a high priority target such as REDGAP stands little chance of success if the basic groundsork must rely on this type operation. Thus, we plan to inform OROSSBAHN that be should place emphasis, with his people, on the recruitment, in place, of residents of the Soviet area, preferably those having some degree of contact with or access to Soviet personnel.

1. With reference to your communication about a charge to Salzburg Base for KCS 71,045 for GROSSBAHN, I find that some action in this matter was taken in SLZ/5708. For your convenience, following is a pertinent quotation from that memorandum:

*3. Accompanying this memorandum are a Requisition for Funds and Disbursement Voucher from POB in the amount of KCS 71,045.00 and a photocopy of a note acknowledging receipt of this sum by a GROSSBAHN representative The above-mentioned documents are sent to you in support of the T/A which you resumably have received from POB."

2. Inasmuch as the transfer of the funds has been handled in this rather unusual fashion, do you feel that the KCS should still be picked up, and charged off simultaneously, on the next Salzburg accounting? To do so would present scmething of a problem in view of the elapsed time and our lack of a receipt or any supporting paper.


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

- 1. The time has apparently come when we will have to resolve the question of GROSSZAHN's Austrian Citizenship. We have discussed the question with him on numerous occasions and in considerable details All agree the question of citizenship, as far as his value to us is fairly academic. He, at the same time, does not wish to take a step which might eventually interfere with his hope of eventually acquiring U.S. citizenship. We fail to see where citizenship status will have much bearing on this latter question as he will have to be admitted to the U.S. under special provisions in any event.
- 2. There are some personal and operational reasons why we feel it would be a good idea for him to acquire Austrian citizenship. Firstly, his son, being under documentation age, has been able to register himself in school as the sons of an Austrian citizen. The son's lith hirthday is coming up in about three months time, when he will be required to secure his own identity document. As you can see, the problem is going to become somewhat complex and embarrassing, and the son will, unless CROSSBAHN gets Austrian citizenship in the meantime, probably be declared a German citizen—for GROSSBAHN an odious thought.
- 3. Operationally, having Austrian citizenship will facilitate GROSSEAHN's travel and permit him to move around more freely with less suspicion. At the present he travels with a TTD. These documents have become so well known that they are practically a flag indicator of an intelligence personnel. An Austrian passport with necessary visas will render him considerably, less conspicuous, and it will also simplify some of his residence problems.

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"On the occasion of CCTTL's last visit to CAPOTA at Frankfurt sometime in April 1952, CAPOTE told me he was convinced that HCETTL produced plenty of phonoy reports and that he was outting him off financially. CAPOTE said that the only intelligence of value that HOETTL produced concerned the Austrian covernment, but all other, namely OB, Sungarian, and Romanian political reports, reports on North Africa, Italy and Triests were phonoy. When I maked CAPOTE say, if he know HOETTL manufactured so much paper, he subsidized him and maintained his close contact, CAPOTE replied that he was trying to determine who METTL's excellent source on internal Austrian affairs was before completely severing the compection".

The following is extracted from ROFA 6452 dated 9 April 1952 (forwarded to Salaburg as an attachment to RAS-W-407):

"He (CAPOTE) steadfastly maintains...that H'ETTL has ability and does not bons-fide internal political information which, over a period of months, has proven to be true... HOUTTL received 600 DMs conthly for his political information."

- 5. The show quotes are interesting when considered in connection with paragraph 1 of MASA 205 in which MAST is said to claim that CC-2 receives AS 2000 mouthly for a report to MOETEL, whereas he, MAST, receives only AS 4000 for his entire office. MAST's allegation does not prove that CC-2 is MOETEL's received limit source on internal Austrian affairs, but it seems not improbable. It is noteworthy that in the first half of 1950 when CROSSBAHN reports were primarily concerned with the internal Austrian scene, the largest number originated with CC-2 and MH-1.
- 6. One possibility which is extremely remote but which cannot be entirely overlooked is that CROSSBAHN himself may be closer to MOETTL than is apparent. According to SALZ 238, MOETTL approached CHUESOBE 201 in December 1951; and montioned among other things that he was collaborating "with Otto lnu (suspected here to be USACE)". There is in addition the CIC report cited in EAS-A-1 alleging CHOSSBAHN collaboration with MOETTL. There is naturally no reason to doubt CHOSSBAHN good faith on the basis of these two vague and unsubstantiated reports and it is of course possible that they refer to the CO-2 MOETTL relationship.
- As a result of five years of close collaboration with CROWNDARN, CC-2 has a fairly extensive knowledge of ORCSSBARN contacts and operations. In addition he seems to be at least some access to CA WEARNING files. In the other side of the picture,

he is immossly valuable to GROSSBAHM because of his editing abilities, his inteligence experience and his high-level contacts. Also, GROSSBAHN has no one else at present who could take over CC-2's work. There is in addition the question of what would happen to CC-2 if dropped: there is the likelihood that he would then work full time with Bonn or WHETTL.

9. The ideal solution would naturally be to replace 00-2 and to transfer him to a peripheral spot in CRESSBARN's complex, where he would rurely if ever come inside CRESSBARN's office. Actually, there seems to be no such easy and immediate way out, and any solution must be a compromise. If, after weighing the factors on each side, it is decided to keep him on for the time being, it should be with the full realization that we are dealing with a calculated risk, and that any information to which CO-2 is exposed may end up via HORTHL with other intelligence pervices.

10. To shall look forward to hearing more on the situation. In closing we quote a statement by Willi in Die Ceheine Front to which we say a hearty exens "Der Geheindianst stellt ungenein schwierige organisatorische Probleme".


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
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

The GROSSBAHN (formerly known as USAGE) operation is being used increasingly to get at the REDCAP target. Axplanxanxabaeaxaaxfar GROSSBAHN has been assigned the task of recruiting anxagant an agent (spotted by REDCAP in Vienna) as a covert photographer and resident agent spotter in the Soviet Lone. In addition, GROSSBAHE is attempting, through a sub-source in Upper Austria, to develop new personnel to collect military intelligence in Auxtrai Lower Austria, - personnel preferably having some contact with Soviet personnel.

Another development in the GROSSBAHN operation was the report received via a CIC informant that GROSSBAHN's chief office assistant was keeping well known it light a fabricator of widespread connections. - 2. It is our understanding that Austrian citizenship can be secured in one of three ways:
- a. If the applicant has resided here for less than four years, he may apply to the Provincial Landeshauptmann and if his application is approved it moves on to the Council of Kinisters, the can grant citizenship on the ground that this action is beneficial to the national interest. All applications clear through the Minister of the Interior and pass over a desk for security scrutiny.
- b. If the candidate has resided here for ten years or more, he files an application for citizenship at the office of the Landeshauptmann, who has the authority to grant or deny this request without further clearance on a higher level.
- c. If the individual has resided here from four to ten years he files an application with the Landeshauptmann, and if it is approved it goes to the Minister of Interior, who is authorized to grant or deny the request, as he sees fit.
- 3. We assume that CROSSBAHN fits into Category "c" and if this is the case, it will be necessary to clear his application through the Salzburg Landeshauptmannschaft and have it sent to Vienna when _______ is away from his desk (i.e., summer vacation in August-September) and trust that he doesn't have a black flag on CROSSBAHN's file card which indicates that all inquiries on the individual are to be called to _______ is personal attention.

] and I talked to GROSS: AHN about tandeshauptmann KLAUS on the afternoon of 30 December 1952, immediately after your departure from Salzburg. He confirmed in general what we had told you sbout his relationship with KLAUS. Briefly, his working contact to KLAUS has been through CC-2, although KLAUS has been aware of the fact that CC-2 was a representative of GMSS AHN's and GROSSBAHN himself has had a friendly direct contact with KLAUS. The contact has not been operational, but rather in the nature of support, cover, and backstopping. With no prompting on our part GROSSBAHN volunteered the fact that it would be valuable to him if he had some means of taking over the contact directly, without going through CC-2. To our way of thinking, to put GROSS MAIN in a position to drop a descreet hint that he is informed about -- not responsible for -- the impending transfer of Ouvp funds would be an admirable means of achieving a takeover which would leave a lasting impression on KLAUS. We do not believe that ... that would necessarily point to an intelligence tie in, or much less be an indication of GROSSBAHN's precise U.S. sponsorship; ratheritt would be an impressive but simple indication that he enjoys the confidence of highly placed american officials.

2. OR SSEAHN describes KLAUS as most discreet, an honest and reliable public servant, ambitious for position but not a Madfahrer. His wife, OROMSHAHN says, is more ambitious for money than position, but KLAUS nevertheless apparently intends to remain in politics rather than returning to his profession of lawyer. If the OeVP loses strength in Land Salzburg KLAUS will of course lose his present appointment, but he has been mentioned as a possibility for Minister of Education in the Bundesregierung. If the OeVP loses out, GROSSEAHN will still retain a good working contact to the Socialist WKISSKIND, who will no doubt stay in the Landesregierung as a deputy governor or some fairly influential position.

For example, there has been a report on the main L personality; another on a figure ☐' operation; several on Willi HOETTL! in the relations to CAPOTE; one on a German IS approach to an agent of a Czech PC operation; one on a group of persons of interest in the ROESSELSPRUNG case; several on ZIPPER agents and activities. In additio to these CE reports relating to out operations, ther have been a number concerning personalities of general intelligence interest to us. The CE coverage has been mainly of Austria, but some report have dealt with Germany and Slovakia.

SUMMARY:

In terms of the project objectives, GROSSBAHN has been quite successful in furnishing the desired coverage:


- a) His OB reporting has been extensive and commetent, highly regarded by local customers, although the reaction of Washington customer agencies has been varied (some of the material has been evaluated in Washington as known and of slight interest)
- b) GROSSBAHN has only recently been asked to contribute to the REDCAP program. He successfully recruited the prospective agent he was asked to approach. He is nog attempting to develop leads to possible REDCAP agents through his own sub-sources.
- c) GROSSBWHN's CI/CE coverage has been very helpful, both in terms of our own operations and the general CE scene. A particular advantage has been his ability to do namechecks on request speedily and in detail.
- d) The Shovakian operation which was beginning to produce reports and documentation collapsed in July 1952 with the arrest of the couriers in the CSR. Sinc. then the emphasis has been mainly on the furnishing of leads to the Satellite operations, rather then on having GROSSBAHN actually mount such operations himself.
- e) In 1950, when under the direction of the Pullach Operations Base, GROSSBAHN was asked to desist from furnishing reports on the Austrian political scene, in favor of other targets. Although he now does not furnish political reports on a regular basis, he fulfills specific requests.
- f) The use of GROSSBAHN in the ICEBERG program is in the planning stage, and he has so far not been approached in this matter.

SECURITY ASPECT:

GROSSBAHN's Slovakian operation ended in July 1952 when his last remaining couriers were picked up while on a mission inside Czechoślovakia. Following this, STAA, the Slovakian priest in Austria, involved in the operation was dropped. So later was XX-1, GROSSBAHN's case officer for the operation. These steps were taken to seal off GROSSBAHN from any efforts by CIS to follow up leads obtained from the captured couriers. There are no indications that GROSSBAHN's security has been endangered by the collapse of the Slovakian operation.

A serious threat to GROSSBAHN's security has come to light, however, through allegations that CC-2, GROSSBAHN's office assistant, has close connections with Willi HOETEL (well-known intelligence peddler suspected of connections with RIS, inter alia) and has disclosed classified information to him. These allegations were made by Karl HASS, a CIC informant, who also knows HOETEL well. CC-2 has on his own initiative submitted his resignation, to be effective 31 January 1953. CC-2 wis to be entertagated in the field in early January and we are awaiting the report of the result before submitting a full report on the security compromise.



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

3c. GROSSBAHN

- 1) GROSSBAHN once again. furnished all the intelligence reports published by Salzburg Base. He was involved in tying up the loose ends in the loss of the Slovak operation and in the loss of the Soviet Zone OB observer AA-8. Although his reporting fof October did not suffer, the restriction of certain members of the AA-1 net to the Vienna area caused a significant drop in subsequent periods. The proposal to use SLAG as a trainer for bi-lingual Hungarinn Slovaks was disapproved by Headquarters. This decision was relayed to GROSSBAHN, who performed the masty job of firing SLAG without a murmur.
- 2) A serious development in the @ROSSBAHN case came to our attention during this period with the allegations by GRUESONE 201 that CC-2 was reporting on GROSSBAHN's activities to the noted fabricator Willi HOETTL. Further details on this bothersome matter have been reported separately and will be summarized in future progress reports.

3e. KANDRAC/CUERK/WIDENER/OATIS Case

At Headquarters' request Salzburg Base attempted to mount, primarily through GROSSBAHN, a temporary CE coverage of the Salzburg area which worked very smoothly and inconspicuously. KANDRAC and WIDENER were spotted quickly upon arrival and through a bit of good luck we did achieve contact with them through the person of James Hodgson of G-2, IB. Although Salzburg's proposals for delving deeper into the proposed operation to free Oatis were vetoed by Headquarters, we believe through judicious use of GROSSBAHI's police contact (PP-1) and our own staff resources, we we were in a very advantageb us position to make an aggressive, secure follow-up in this case.

- 5a. Turing the period nine OB reports obtained from the GROSSBAHN AA-1 operation were published; four reports were of the marginal Soviet vehicle numbers in Vienna series which we are continuing per G-2 request. Two concerned airports at Voeslau and Wiener in Neustadt; two twere non stroop and naval units in Rhosterneuburg, and one concerned Soviet armored vehicles in Liesing.
- b. Also dispatched following the practice of disseminating Political or Economic Reports thru Vienna, four SBG's on Political Organizations were sent to Vienna for release as EAV's. Again, all reports originated with GROSSBAHN'
- c. In addition a total of 10 reports were sent by Disposition Form to G-2 USFA (contents sent Headquarters separately). Of these eight GROSSBAHN reports concerned mostly low-level CI and OB particulars...

- l. The "other incident" which we make reference to in Para, seven of EASA-819 is as related herein.
- 2. Attached hereto is GEOSSEAHN's unnumbered report, dated 18 December 1952, in which he describes some rather discouraging spisodes which took place on the night of 17 December in the Dixie Expresso in Salzburg. Shortly after he submitted the report, we went over it in detail with him and pointed out that we felt that a bit more judicious, lucid thinking and action on his part would probably have extricated him from the two predicaments without their assuming the proportions which they did. We were especially critical of his conversation with OFFCZAREK and were somewhat bothered by the connotation of his trying to straighten out the boundaries between two spheres of jurisdiction.
- 3. On 16 December 1952, we did show GROSSRAHN a copy of ZIPPER BV S report number 5743, which had been passed to us by
- J. Our season for doing this was merely as a reminder to CROSSEAHN that he should not relax his security guard; he was still a figure of interest in the Salzburg area. He, indidentally, is mentioned in an extremely offhand manner in the report; the final paragraph merely stating the VOLLER previously worked for GROSSEAHN in the ZIPPER organisation.

he We are always extremely careful in handling KUBARK correspondence which must be brought to GROSSRAHM's attention and take pains to sterilize to the Mth degree. Due to the wealth of material which we are constantly taking up with GROSSRAHM, we have had little reason to sterilize the mon-KURARK material to the same extent. This was founded on two basis premises; there was no previous occasion to doubt GROSSRAHM's powers of discretion and the pure mechanical difficulties at sterilizing the voluminous non-KURARK material which we constantly refer to him on almost a day to day basis.

5. Due to the fact that we had shown CROSSRAHN this report just the day prior to his meeting with OFFCZAREK, we closely questioned him

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at the same time we were discussing the report in general, as described in Para. 2, on his use of the terminology "I did not appreciate the publicity he had tried to give me" as mentioned in Para. 4. We suspected, but not too strengly at the time, that he might pessibly have had reference to the ZIPPER report. He stated that he was harking back to the old days just after he separated from ZIPPER when he was the subject of much interest on the part of ZIPPER personnel in the Salaburg area. We, naturally, accepted his explanation and let the matter drop other that for the aforedescribed security implications.

- 6. On 11 January 1953, Description of the third agency rule.

 3alsburg, advised us that OFFCZAREK's version differed considerably from that reported by CROSSRAHN. OFFCZAREK alleged that he had been accessed by CROSSRAHN and that CROSSBAHN had made specific reference to the EVS report in his discussion with OFFCZAREK. This naturally placed POB in a difficult position with ZEPPER due to an apparent violation of the third agency rule.
- 7. On 13 January, we re-questioned GROSSBAHN on his report of events on the night of 17 December, but he failed to alter his original version in any manner.
- 9. Prier to this incident we had made up our minds that GROSSEAHN was badly in need of a rest and vacation and this lent considerable weight to our decision. As reported in reference, we had him checked medically and packed him off for a month without making any more of an incident of the OFFCZAREK affair. We could see little point in pursuing the matter to the point of getting unpleasant especially in view of his condition. On his return from vacation, we feel it best to let the matter ride and straighten it out later through the use of Carriage.

10. We, naturally, dislike having this shadow of a doubt hanging over CROSSBAHN and will do all we can to resolve it at the earliest opportunity.

CLU Comment: Whatever the precise truth of this incident may eventually develop to have been, we will of course in the future be forced to adopt a more stringent policy in written briefs

SUBJECT: Project GROSSBAHN (Formalization and Renewal)

- 1. Project GROSSBAHN was originally established under ZIPPER, transferred from ZIPPER in February 1950 and turned over to PULLACH Operations Base for control. In the spring of 1952 control was transferred to the Salzburg Base. The attached project outline is the first attempt at formalization of the operation.
- 2. The objectives of this project are: a) to provide OB information on the Soviet Zone of Austria; b) to assist in Salzburg Station's REDCAP program; c) to furnish CI/CE coverage, police surveillance and checks; d) to provide leads to, and possibly handle, personnel for the ICEBERG program; e) to furnish aid and support for Satellite REDSKIN operations; f) to provide political coverage when requested; and g) to build up a local support structure.
- 3. The principal agent, GROSSBAHN, has worked for U.S. intelligence since the end of the war. His sub-agents are CC-2, CC-3, CC-4, PP-1, AA-1, HH-1, and XX-1. Details on their respective backgrounds are given in paragraph (4) of the attached Project Outline.
- 4. GROSSPAHN knows that he is working for CIA. He has a loose cover of journalistic and publishing interests.
- 5. GROSSBAHN is motivated primarily by a desire to become an American citizen (no commitment has been made); control is based on his financial dependence on salary we pay him and the possibility of compromise. He has been favorably carriage-tested. The subagents' motivation is primarily through personal respect for GROSSBAHN; control is also maintained through GROSSBAHN.
- 6. The estimated total yearly cost of Project GROSSBAHN is \$20,000 (compensation, GROSSBAHN and sub-agents, \$14,540; travel expenses \$1,005; and operational expenses \$4,455).
- 7. A possible security threat to Project GROSS PAHN has arisen in the case of agent CC-2, who has been in contact with Dr. Willi HOETTL, an intelligence peddler suspected of being in contact with the Soviets. CC-2 submitted a resignation effective 31 January 1953



Phase I

1. On Friday, 10 April 1953, Grossbahn switched suitcases with another person, later identified herein, while enroute from Salzburg to Attnang-Pucheim on the Arlberg Express. The following are the details in his own words:

a. On Friday, 10 April 1953, I left Salzburg by the Arlberg in the direction of Attnang at 1805 hours. I travelled in the last second class compartment of the first second class carriage (in the direction of the locomotive) next to the third class carriages. Because of a broken water pipe the compartment was flooded and I changed after probably five minutes into the adjacent compartment. There were two other men, occupying the window seats, in this compartment. I left my two suitcases on the rack and after possibly ten minutes went into the third class, where I had seen SLAA. I passed his compartment and he stepped out. After making sure that I did not know anybody and after asking him whether he knew anybody, which he didn't, I conversed with him. I suddenly noticed that the train had already passed Voecklabruck station and therefore parted in a hurry and rushed to my compartment. There was no other stop by the train until tnang. When I reached my compartment I found the two other men still. sitting in their seats but there was no light in the compartment - it had become almost dark by then. I put on my coat, grabbed (what I believed to be) my two bags, rushed for the door and left the train then went to the exit where my wife waited for me with the car. Arriving at home I left the two suitcases in the hall and went to meet our guests.

b. On Saturday, 11 April, at about ten in the morning I went to "my suitcases" to take out my black briefcase which contained one yellow envelope in which I had placed

I found to my utter dismay that I had either grabbed a wrong suitcase or that somebody in my absence had exchanged mine for another one. This other suitcase, also brown but slightly smaller, contained two shirts, one with an Innsbruck textile mark, a small toilet set with razor, brush (also with an Innsbruck mark) one used night shirt (flannel), and one Tiroler Zeitung dated 31 Jan. 1953.

- c. I thereupon called the Linz railroad lost property office and asked whether somebody had given notice to have exchanged a suitcase. Linz immediately contacted the stations where a stop of the Arlberg was scheduled: Attnang, Wels, St. Valentin and Vienna (Westbahnhof), I was then informed that no notice had arrived so far. The official wanted my name, I informed him that I was going to take the wrong suitcase to Wels, where I was going in any case, he in turn was going to inform Wels. (I did this as not to disclose my identity). I drove to Wels with my wife, she parked some distance from the station and I rushed there on foot. I arrived shortly before moon, the official in charge of lost property had already left but a man from the ticket office was already informed. He in my presence once more called Linz, where no further news had arrived, and from where he was informed that before Monday morning no further news could come because the offices were closed until then. form where I described the suitcase, the compartment and the time and requested that in case of it being found it should be forwarded to the Wels lost property railroad office. I had to give a name and address and gave: Albert A. EISNER, APO 403, U.S. Army.
- d. We then went to Salzburg where I had hoped to find notes in my office regarding the coments of the contact letter—which could have been a damaging document—but I found none. I did not get an answer when calling the office (yours). I then returned to my home. I intentionally did not call Wels again from my home on Monday morning as not to give traces that could have been followed but called you requesting to see you this morning. Providing that time allows I will call Wels from Voecklabruck, where I am not known at the post office.
- e. My suitcase did not contain any other indicative information regarding my person but a number of letters from my family in Germany without addresses, dirty laundry without initial marking, a number of German and American journals.
- f. As far as I can recollect the contact letter with 22-1 does not blow him except his so far used Vienna address on Malerstrasse of Vienna's first district.
- 2. The contact report which he mentions under paragraph b was forwarded to Headquarters as Attachment B to reference. Attached at B is a set of photos which are copies of the photos also mentioned under paragraph b. These photos had not as yet been forwarded as we felt they were of insufficient importance to distribute. They represent ZZ-l's efforts during a spell of extremely bad weather and many are fairly unclear. The set of photos which were in the suitcase were unmarked, unlike those attached. We have coded the pictures according to the Grossbahn report (P/34015) attached at A merely as a guide to the coverage entailed.

- 3. Grossbahn held an extremely brief meeting with ZZ-1 in Liezen, Steiermark on 14 April 1953—taking all security precautions possible under existing circumstances—and warned ZZ-1 to stay out of the Soviet Zone and at home, until further notice. He was not told the reason why. Explanation was that there had been an indication of increased security measures on the part of the Soviets and it was felt prudent to keep him out of the area until things returned to normal.
- 4. In spite of Grossbahn's optomistic paragraph f, a thorough examination of the contact report indicates clear leads to ZZ-1's true identity—leads which an aggressive and unfriendly service would have little trouble picking out and following down, if they were so inclined. (See contact report, para. IV.a(7).)
- 5. We try to excuse Grossbahn on the grounds that this sort of accident or incident could happen to any of us. We have not as yet given him the brutal tongue lashing he deserves for he is in such a depressed mood over the affair that we are afraid of pushing him too far. We cannot answer why he had sensitive information in his suitcase—why he walked off and left it to chat with SLAA of all people on the Arlberg Express of all places. These answers we will furnish at a later date.

Phase II

- 6. Attached at C is Grossbahn's report covering the receipt of a letter from one M. MAHLER, Anichstrasse 24, Innsbruck, and the circumstances attendant thereto. As part of this attachment, are photocopies of the postcard from XX-1 to Grossbahn which, fortunately, furnished the only clue by which MAHLER was enabled to ultimately track down the owner. XX-1 had mailed the postcard to Grossbahn in a covering envelope, hence the appearance that the postcard was ready for mailing but had never been dispatched. This offered a ready made cover story—Grossbahn could explain (and he did) that Dr. KINACH, a friend from Germany, actually XX-1, had asked him to mail the card to some friends in Austria, but that he had forgotten to do so and had left the card in his suitcase.
- 7. PP-1 did not go to Innsbruck immediately to check on MAHLER. Rather we are having the check performed through routine channels.

Phase III

8. Grossbahn traveled to Innsbruck the night of 22 April—after stopping by Wels to pick up MAHLER's suitcase—and effected the exchange. His report covering the trip is attached at D. It would appear as though the suitcase fell into the hands of a completely trustworthy and exceptionally intelligent person. MAHLER appears to be decided pro-West—note his compliments to Grossbahn on the fine job he is doing. We wish there were some way in which we could express our thanks to MAHLER—possibly even offer him some type of remuneration for his fine handling of the episode—but we feel it is best to let the matter close out without attaching further significance to it.

SECURITY DEPORTATION

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9. As soon as PP-1's traces are in on MAHLER-and we see no reason now why his report should be unfavorable-we will reactivate ZZ-1, but will insist that he change boarding houses in Vienna and avoid contact with his former acquaintances from Frau PFALZ's house.

10. We are convinced, after this affair, that there is a Goddess of Good Luck, who must look over our left shoulder and does favor us with an occasional

11. We will develop the answers to questions posed in paragraph four and do plan on following up with a stern lecture to Grossbahn on the sheer foolhardiness of his initial steps which culminated in his near compromise of a promising new source. He will also be reminded that this security breach is being entered in his record, and just so with the rest of us, no one can afford to set up a string of such incidents without expecting to eventually suffer the consequences.

1. Grossbahn was seen by way of a repeat exemination on 20 January 1951. Original physical examination was on 5 May 1952.

- 2. It was the undersigned's opinion that the above individual was manifesting numerous gastrointestinal symptoms as a result of considerable anxiety. It is not impossible that he may have had some reactivation of an old duodenal ulcer. At any rate, the magnitude of symptoms was directly proportional to the degree of nervous tension he experienced.
- 3. Therapy consisted of a rather rigid ulcer regimen combined with a sincere attempt to develop some insight on the part of the patient regarding the factors leading to his psychosomatic complaints.

- 1. As requested in reference B, we are attaching a revised budget prepared by Grossbahn and amended by us. He made no recommendation for an increase for himself (under CC-1)-the 8,500 AS, representing a 17% increase, is our insertion.
- 2. We feel Grossbahn's comments in paragraph one of his report are valid. We have no supporting statistics at hand but, judging from our own experiences, we feel he has understated the rise in cost of living since the summer of 1951, by setting the increase at 50%.
- 3. Note that we have included CC-4 in the new budget, although clearance has not as yet come through on her. We presume we can expect her clearance at any time in the near future and thus it appears a sound idea to include her salary. We have also added the salary of CC-5, on whom POC was received in DIR Ololi8. XX-1 is still carried in the new figures, though we do expect his transfer to RFE to come about shortly. When he leaves, naturally, the budget will be reduced accordingly.
- 4. The allowance for transporation we have eliminated entirely as the 900 AS set in the budget in reference B was entirely too low. Some misunderstanding seems to have creeped into this 900 AS offer, for in actuality it was strictly a one-shot affair which Grossbahn had to snap up on the spot or pass up entirely. Today, it is impossible to arrange for the rental of a car for this figure. We have deleted this item from the new budget for we are in the throes of attempting to work out something else locally and will report on this matter separately.
- 5. The regular budget totals 45,350 AS monthly, which we calculate at \$1,744.23 in dollar equivalents. Grossbahn does draw a certain amount of miscellaneous PX supplies which he uses as gifts to unregistered sources and persons of peripheral aid. These purchases average about \$20.00 per month. The value of the gasoline and cigarettes he has listed is \$30.00 and \$50.00 per month respectively. This means the total dollar equivalents, per month, for the Grossbahn operation, should be calculated at \$1,844.23. We express the total sums involved in dollar equivalents due to the fact that currencies required by the operation vary from month to month and we do not wish to be restricted by having the entire budget on a set schilling basis. While the bulk of currency required each month will be Austrian schillings, expressing in dollar equivalents, we feel, will leave us free to substitute other currencies as specific needs arise. Advice would be appreciated if there is any objection to this scheme. 2

E. General.

1. GROSSBAHN.

- a. <u>Budget</u>: A revised budget has been submitted under EAVA-3801 (SOB/1268). No increase in funds was requested, rather a reduction of \$4.31 per month was recommended in spite of the fact that general increases were suggested for all but a few personnel. This was due to recent attrition in the GROSSBAHN operation—dropping of agents CC-2, CC-5, and XI-1. The monthly budget is now set at the dollar equivalent \$1,604.23. Detailed breakdown is contained in EAVA-380((SCB-1268).
- b. Training. During the past month, we have centimed reviewing with GRCSSBAHN in detail the Basic Operations Course lecture material we reported turning over to him in EASA-1520. Due to the heavy agent mosting schedule which GRCSSBAHN is now handling personally, difficulty is being experienced in finding sufficient time to devote to formal training. Much of the meeting time with his case officer is devoted to reviewing operations, offering operational guidance, planning the course of present operations and discussing ways and means of developing new operations. Wherever possible, time is taken for academic instruction but this is probably averaging an hour per week—certainly too little time. However, a brighter side to the training problem is that due to the fact that GRCSSBAHN is now functioning as a F/A—is out in the field handling his sources—he is actually receiving invaluable on—the—job training. We feel this working training more than compensates for the lack of formalized training.

SECURITY SECURITY

- c. Security. There were no new security developments during the period. We are satisfied that GRCSSBAHN answered the questions we put to him early in June truthfully (see para. 3.a.(2) of EASA-1580) and we have thus abandoned our plans to re-run him on LCFIUTTER.

 has advised us against running a routine re-test as results are usually valueless and may have a negative effect on the agent. Unless something specific crops up, we do not plan to re-test.
- d. Vehicls. The issuance of a vehicls (see para. 3.a.(3) of EASA-1580) removed the last obstacls standing in the way of our insistance that GROSSBAHN assume the role of P/A and handle his own agents. GROSSBAHN's becoming completely mobile has been one of the most rewarding operational innovations in recent months. He is now keeping, personally, six to eight agent meetings per month, a schedule which would have been impossible without the vehicle.
- e. <u>Files</u>. While GROSSBAHN's records are now completely on microfilm, a portion of his files still remain in Frankfurt. These will be retrieved before mid-August, as GROSSBAHN is experiencing difficulty in incorporating file traces in his reports.
- f. Major Problems. These problems were threefold: U. S. citizenship, Austrian citizenship and a KUBARK contract. We are well on our way to securing a U. S. visa for GROSSBAHN (see EAVA-3501(SCB/1327) and EAVA-3857 (SCB/1453)) through MOB. The need for Austrian citizenship has evaporated since GROSSBAHN's son's birthday has passed without disastrous results and he secured his ID card as the son of a stateless father. We have offered GROSSBAHN a contract which he ultimately refused on the grounds that he has been operating on KUBARK good will for over six years now and feels that he can continue to do so without a formal document. We are planning on GROSSBAHN's departing Austria to reach the U. S. on or about 15 October 1953 for the primary purpose of filing his first papers toward U. S. citizenship. He is to be turned around as quickly as circumstances will permit and is to assume a role of spotter, recruiter and developer of new operations on his return to Austria.
- 2. CC-4 reported for duty on 22 June. Her performance to date has not been impressive. GROSSBAHN states she is an 8:CO to 5:CO type, has no devotion to duty and seems anything but impressed with the importance of the new field in which she finds herself. We have told GROSSBAHN that chances are it will be difficult to justify his retention of two secretaries in view of his newly planned role after return from the U. S., possibly even difficult to justify one secretary. If anyone is retained, it will be CC-3. We should leave the opportunity open to dismiss CC-4 on rather short notice in the near future. GROSSBAHN has been told to discuss CC-4's poor performance to date with her, stress that he is not at all pleased with her and that she is to consider that she will continue on probation for at least 60 more days. We will discuss CC-4 again with CROSSBAHN in early August and, if she continues uninspired, we will probably recommend that she be dropped.

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- 3. CC-15. POC has been requested in EASA-1524. Although POC probably will be granted prior to GROSSBAHN's departure for the U. S., no recruitment of CC-15 will take place until GROSSBAHN's return. This will be placed on the agenda of GROSSBAHN's new tasks—to recruit and develop whatever potentials CC-15 might have.
- 4. AA Operation. This operation has ceased to exist, as a group. AA-2 has been told by the Soviets that he need no longer appear on a regular basis-they will summon him if and when needed. Arrangements are being made among the Bundesheer planners to transfer AA-2 to the Gendarmerie (he is an ex-officer) then quietly arrange his transfer to the Gendarmerie School in-Carinthia, safely out of convenient Soviet reach. AA-2 is being given 60 days severance pay and is being dropped as of 31 July. At his last meeting with AA-1 in Vienna on 6 and 7 July, GROSSBAHN broached the idea of his taking over AA-6 and sub-sources AA-61, AA-62 and AA-63 directly. AA-1, surprisingly enough, was enthusiastic about the idea and admitted that AA-6 and sub-sources had been rather disappointing to date and that a fresh viewpoint and control could only bring salutary results. Arrangements have been made for AA-1 to drop contact with this sub-group and for GROSSBAHN to come into direct contact with AA-6. This will be done prior to 15 August. If this group has no potential against the REDCAP target, they will be dropped. AA-1 has been instructed that he is to sever contact with any and all peripheral personalities he has been using in a casual manner and to cease all personal OB reporting. In substance, this means that the AA group has been completely dissolved or removed from the direct control of AA-1. As firm plans are drawn up for the disposition of GROSSBAHN's present assets, we will, in all probability, recommend that VOB take over direct control of AA-1 principally for his コリレ potential value against the I targets.
- 5. AA-1 Cut-Out. The ideas which we expressed in para. 3.f. of EASA-1580 (inserting a cut-out between AA-1 and KUBARK) were not concurred in by a and a during briefing of 29 June. Subsequent events have proven the fallacy of these plans and the soundness of this decision. Therefore, plans to secure such a cut-out are abandoned. We have not advised AA-1 of this. Wather, we have encouraged him to continue his spetting efforts, however, stressing that any candidates must measure up to stiff requirements on our part. This leaves us free to disqualify spotted persons for the cut-out position, but at the same time permits us to look over AA-1's candidates and measure them against KUBARK targets and standards.
- 6. As reported in paragraph 4, foregoing, at AA-2's last meeting with the Soviets on 30 June, they stated that he would no longer be required to call at their offices regularly. They indicated they would probably look him up again in the fall. Arrangements are underway, initiated by AA-1 through his official Austrian channels, to transfer AA-2 to the Gendarmerie and assign him to the Gendarmerie School in Carinthia. We are preparing a final consolidated report on all of AA-2's meetings with the Soviets which will be forwarded shortly. He is being dropped as of 31 July.
- 7. AA-3. This agent is now described by GROSSBAHN as WW-1 due to his severance from the former group. GROSSBAHN has had three meetings with this agent since the last progress report. He has reported some data on the

Gendarmeria school at Ebelsberg--principally their intelligence endeavors-of marginal interest. We still do not have a clear idea on his possibilities because he, himself, is still unsure of just what he is going to be capable of doing. At present, his personal logistical problems are receiving almost his full attention (moving his family from Vienna, settling in a new apartment. getting oriented in his new job) and we have, by no means, conducted a thorough assessment of this agent for this reason. If we cannot clarify our plans on WW-1 prior to GROSSBAHN's departure, we will recommend that he be kept dormant during GROSSBAHN's absence and that he be fully assessed and developed on GROSSBAHN's return.

- 8. HH-1. We are making little progress in securing worthwhile results from HH-1. He has been over a month now compiling data on the SPARROWS, a father and daughter team in the Soviet Zone, whom we feel may have some REDCAP potential. Except for the SPARROWs and a few marginal tidbits he has submitted on Linz and Urfahr, HH-1 gives all the earmarks of being a poor investment in terms of both time and money. We are giving him until 31 August to produce (he has been told this) or he will be dropped. While prospects with HH-1 are rather bleak, and the contact has been generally unrewarding, a sizeable redeeming feature in his favor is the fact that we were led to - 1 (see para. 9) who bears all the sarmarks of being a solid REDCAP asset. Nevertheless his retention cannot be based on one performance alone and unless he shows real promise of leading us to equally rewarding operations, it is problematical whether he will be retained beyond August.
- 1. (Formerly L 1 and/or L 1). PRQ, Part I, with operational details and request for POC was forwarded under EASA-1621. Progress to date with E Is debriefing was summarized by P I in EASA-1692. This agent is in periodic personal contact with Soviets and is in almost constant contact with persons (principally younger females) who are in touch with Soviets. To date, we have accumulated a fair amount of operational intelligence on the Soviets in Urfahr and surrounding areas, plus some biographical and pictorial is sub-sources. This agent will be phased to direct case officer handling in the near future. For details, see paragraph F.2.i. under Future Plans.
- 10. PP-1. The question of PP-1's transfer to Vienna and subsequent phasing over to a full idea REDCAP support role, has been held in abeyance pending COM and COPS decision on planned meeting with I J. The major problem involved is one of continuity-- I should be met by someone close to or the person who will be his future contact in Vienna, so that the operation with him, if undertaken, can be earried on without an artificially induced strain. This would be the case if he were first contacted by an SOB case officer because, if the initial meeting proved successful, it would then be necessary to phase him over to a VCB case officer as his official position and residence are both in Vierna. From what GROSSBAHN tells us, the PP-I transfer can take place at any time. We are holding it up, however, hoping that the planned meeting with I will place us in a better position to insure that PP-1 gets the best assignment possible in Vienna to carry on against the REDCAP target.

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down—a lead to a photographer in Waidhofen/Thaya who allegedly is in direct contact with Soviets—which he carried off with a fair performance, taking into consideration his inexperience and youth. We will gradually give him more assignments of this type as it is felt he is basically sound, can give us fair performance, and can be learning by doing. Although a REDCAP asset, agent will attend the Communist Youth Festival in Bucharest during the first half of August because the opportunity he presented to secure intelligence, plus photos, on a satellite country appeared too potentially valuable to overlook. He was able to secure sound cover for his planned photo activities by obtaining photo commissions from Communist publications in Austria. In addition, his travelling with Adolf LECHNER, leading Communist youth figure in agent's home town and a long time acquaint ance, will lend him general everall cover during the entire trip. For further details on this agent, see paragraph f.2.k. under Future Plans.

F. Future Plans.

- 1. In the light of GRCSSBAHN's planned trip to the U. S. and return to Austria in the role of spotter, recruiter and developer of new operations, it is vital that we dispose of—either by direct takeover, suspending or dropping—his present operations prior to his departure. While our planning has not progressed to the point of being able to offer precise details, we do have a rough framework in mind against which we will work in breaking up his operations.
 - 2. The following paragraphs give the details:
- BAHN's absence. In addition, she will hold down the office and allow us a contact with persons who will be kept dormant during this period, should the need arise.
- b. <u>CC-4</u>. We can see little justification, in view of our planned future role for GROSSBAHN, for the retention of two secretaries. Unless unforeseen significant developments take place prior to GROSSBAHN's departure, or CC-4 has other possibilities we are not aware of at the moment, she may be dropped.
- c. CC-15. We do not plan any further activity with this contact prior to departure data. CC-15 will be one of GROSSBAHN's first developmental targets upon return.
- d. AA-1. AA-1 is to be phased over to direct VCS case officer control prior to GRCSSBARN's departure, to be run as a single egent against future possibilities vis-a-vis \Box $\exists \land \Box$ \Box Precise details will be worked out with COPS and submitted.
 - e. AA-2. This agent has been dropped as of the end of July 1953.
- f. AA-3. This agent is now described by GROSSBAHN as WW-1 as he has no present connection with the AA group. Inasmuch as we do not, as yet, have a clear view of exactly what Ww-1's capabilities are, he should probably be classified as still developmental. As such, we intend instructing GROSSBAHN that he is to place the Ww-1 operation on a suspended status during his absence, and to place WW-1 wish on the developmental list to be looked into closely on his return.

SECULTURE ...

g. AA-6, AA-61, AA-62 and AA-63. This sub-group is almost completely unassessed. GROSSBAHN will establish direct contact with AA-6 prior to 15 August. If the group has no REDCAP potential, they will be dropped after a thorough assessment has developed this. If they do have a potential, in all likelihood we will be unable to properly develop this group prior to GROSSBAHN's departure, in which case the AA-6 sub-group would also be placed on the list of assets to be properly developed by GROSSBAHN on his return.

- h. HH-1. This agent has been given until 31 August to produce against the REDCAP target. It appears at present that he may be dropped at that time. However, should the SPARROWS or other HH-1 possibilities not apparent at the moment, show real promise, we will hold HH-1 dormant during the period of GROSSBAHN's absence and develop him fully on GROSSBAHN's return. Firm recommendations on the fate of HH-1 will be submitted.
- i. ____ This agent will be phased to direct REDCAP case officer control as quickly as possible. We will LCFLUTTER him on 28 July, allow for two GROSSBAHN meetings after the LCFLUTTER test for the purpose of smoothing any ruffled feathers that the test might raise and so as not to throw too much at the agent at once, then phase control directly to _____ At the moment, we see no reason why _____ will not be a direct REDCAP asset by 15 August.
- j. PP-1. We plan on phasing F?-1 to direct VOB control prior to GROSSBAHN's departure. The local police, CI/CE coverage will be placed in the hands of PP-3, who will be contacted by CC-3, in GROSSBAHN's absence. We plan on seeing CC-3 at least once a week at GROSSBAHN's office (at night) while he is in the U.S. We will thus be able to pass along routine requests to PP-3 (or to any other dormant agents, as a matter of fact) and receive through her routine reports.
- G. Recommendations. We will shortly furnish our suggestions on the hardling of GROSSBAHN while available in the U.S. While the primary task is to get him started on his first citizenship papers and back to Austria as promptly as possible we nevertheless feel that some advantages might accrue as a result of Headquarters getting a first hand look at (and a chance to talk with) GROSSBAHN.

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N.B. Reference paragraphs D.6., E.4. and E.6., we may have failed to make the matter of AA-2's transfer to the Gendarmerie and subsequent transfer to the British Zone absolutely clear. According to GROSSBAHN, AA-2 has for some time, even prior to his initial Soviet contact on 4 March, desired to gst into the Gendarmerie and become an officer in the embryonic Bundesheer. With or without pressure from the Soviets, he would have made the transfer in time—the Soviet slackening of interest in him has given him an incentive to make the move now. It is entirely his idea and we have had nothing to do with influencing his decision. While we are not enthusiastic about the transfer at this time—the Soviets may look on the move with certain suspicion and consequently may revive their interest in him-there is little we can do to prevent it. We cannot insist that he remain in place, available to the Soviets indefinitely, for he finds such a future prospect repugnant and nerve-wracking. As a compromise measure, we see no objection to allowing him to work out his own future as he sees fit and to drop him as of 31 July 1953. There will undoubtedly be a social correspondence between AA-1 and AA-2 after the latter transfers. If the Soviets become interested in AA-2 again, we could expect him to inform AA-1, who, in turn, should inform us.

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- 3. GROSSBAIN will complete two forms on 16 July: Application for Registration and Immigration Visa Application Scratch Sheet. These will be turned over to on 17 July, together with necessary photographs (five copies 24 x 24), plus original Lirth certificate and either original or photocopy of marriage certificate. In addition, it will be necessary to furnish a certificate of good conduct. GROSSBAIN can secure such a certificate from Salzburg police sources as the certificate need only state that he has not been convicted of any criminal, moral, or political crimes.
- 4. The speed with which it is necessary to furnish the foregoing listed forms and documents is necessitated by the fact that UNOSUBAIN should be gotten on the waiting list as promptly as possible. Once he is on the list, issuance of the visa can be timed in operational terms, subject to the progress which we can make in phasing GROSSBARN's present operations over to direct handling or dropping them. In any event, we have set arrival in the U.S. at approximately 15 October 1953 and will have the phasing of GROSSBARN's operations completed in time for him to depart as scheduled.
- 5. No Afradavit of Support will be necessary. I assures us that he can furnish the Munich Consulate with a certificate that GROSSBARN's entry is in the best interests of the U.S. Government and that he will not become a public charge while there. This will serve in lieu of the usual afradavit.

 I states that the only point on which difficulties may arise is the question of getting CROSSBAIN past the physical examination. He does have a record of lung infection in his youth, though this did not appear in his medical examination at MOB, which was conducted on 5 May 1952. (A copy of C

Its medical report is attached at A.) We plan to secure the chest x-rays which were taken in May of 1952 and have these on hand to assure the Munich Consulate medical examiner that the chest condition is arrested, should the need arise.

- 7. In regard to the question of GROSSBAIN's possibly striking a stumbling block with the INS people upon entry, we are of the opinion, and judging from what [] told us, there appears no reason to assume the INS people should have a reason for having a particular interest in GROSSBAIN. It would seem to us that any derogatory information would have to originate from here. If there appears to be no security objection to the issuance of a visa from Germany, could INS, in some other manner, learn of GROSSBAHN's NSDAP and SD background? Do they perform a routine screening on all persons entering? Any preliminary steps Headquarters can take to insure against GROSSBAHN's possibly becoming entangled with INS would be well worth the effort.
- 8. We have discussed the problem of eventually securing U. S. citizenship for the rest of the family (wife and 1h year old son) with GROSSLAHN. He (and we agree in this) sees no other course than to let his hife sit in Austria while he is in the U. S. and face the problem of starting her on the way to U. S. citizenship at a later date. The son, we have assured him, represents no problem, provided his divorce decree from his former whie will not bind him in some manner.

CROSSPANN states that there is no official entry in court records that his former alfa has any rights in regard to the chald. He has agreed with her, informally, to let her see the boy on more important Austrian holidays. He has discussed with her in general terms (under cover of sanding the boy to school in the U. S.) the son's future and she has assured him that she will not stand in the way of any such future plans. In summation, GROSSZAHN prefers to clarify his own status in regards to U. S. citizenship first and tackle the problems of his wife and child at a later date. He realizes that we will lend whatever aid is possible under the circumstances, but that the future is unpredictable and he may be left completely to his own devices in working out the family's future citizenship.

9. We, naturally, will advance GNOSSEAN sufficient funds to purchase his round-trip air ticket to the U. S. In addition, we plan on advancing him the sum of \$205.00 for per diem, figured at the average rate of 39.00 per day (standard U. S. per diem rate) on the basis of his being absent from Austria for approximately his days.

Recommendations.

It will be necessary that GROSSBAHN reach the U. S. within four months of the time that a visa is granted to him. We thus recommend that a visa be secured for GROSSBAHN within the next month and that we plan, both operationally and administratively, on his departing Austria so as to reach the U. S. approximately. 15 October 1953.



2. Von BOLSCHWING has been working for US Intelligence organizations for the past eight years, six of which have been spent in Agency-sponsored intelligence activities. Because of his services on behalf of US Intelligence organizations, it is considered desirable to assist von BOLSCHWING to come to the United States on an immigration visa, but we do not wish to aponsor him under Section 8 of the CIA act of 1949.

Thas indicated that because of Von BOLSCHWING's membership in the MSDAP and the SD (details of which are set forth below), his entry into the United States must be cleared with the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Since von BOLSCHWING has been advised by case officers that all reasonable assistance will be given him to come into this country on an immigration visa, the use of your good offices in taking the matter up with I and MS is rerequested.

VON BOLSCHWING'S US VISA

Von BOLSCHWING was issued immigrant visa # 14846 at the American Consulate General in Munich on 24 August 1953. It was granted under the German quota. The expiration date is 23 December 1953. We have been informed that von DLSCHWING's arrival in the U.S. may be expected approximately 1 November 1953.

BACK THOUND DATA ON YON BOLSCHITING

The information given below was furnished by von BOLSCHWING himself. Results of all checks made by the Agency confirm the diographical data submitted by

According to von BOLSCHWING, he ran into difficulty when in March 1932 he tried to get Government consent to erect a cement factory in East Prussia.

After discussing the problem with leaders of all parties, and meeting with interest, but no support, he was advised by the military district commander in East Prussia to take the matter up with the "cowing" NSDAP. Von BOLSCHWING then contacted the Gauleiter through his brother's butler who was a local NSDAP group leader. The butler agreed to arrange the meeting on condition that Von BOLSCHWING fill out a Party application form; Von BOLSCHWING did so, although he considered the application as a mere for ality. He took no part in Party affairs, nor did he meet the Gauleiter. In 1934, when in the Middle East, he learned that the application had been accepted. He did not participate in any Party affairs, and was rebuked by the group leader in . Palestine for this. In 1935 when he was in Germany negotiating for the general agency of the Autounion firm in the Middle East, he was informed that the Auslandsorganisation (section of the NSDAP dealing with Germans abroad) had refused to grant him the agency because he had not complied with Party directives. In an atte pt to protect himself against these charges, he arranged through his brother's butler to get him Party membership book by paying the fees back to 1932.

RELATIONS WITH SD and SS

In the winter of 1937-38, and again in 1938, von BOLUCHWING was arrested by the Cestapo and accused of pro-Jewish sympathies, out was freed by the intervention of highly-placed SS connections who offered him protection in returt for payment. When the war broke out in September 1939 he was called to the Hilfspolizei, but through the help of the highly placed connections just mentioned, he was made SD chief of intelligence ad interim in Rumania. In arranging the appointment the SS connections "cooked up" the story that von BOLSCHWING was a reliable old-time Nazi and that he had been an SS applicant since 1937. In April 1941 von BOLSCHWING was informed that he had become "Untersturmführer" in the S3; two promotions were given him between then and early in 1941. From 1939 until February 1941 he was in Rumania as chief of SD intelligence under Foreign Office cover. At the end of this time, because of disagreement with the Mazi Party on their policy toward the Rumanian Iron Guard, he got into serious trouble. Several months later he was sent on an intelligence mission to Greece where he this time disagreed with the Party's automatic arrest policy, was relieved of his command and returned to Berlin. Through the influence of SS General JOST, he was assigned in August 1941 to IS work in Holland, from which he tried to build a line to Portugal to contact Wester: intelligence directly. When JOST fell into disgrace von BOLSCHWING was recalled to Berlin in December 1941 and henceforth was under watch by the Gestapo. He was under medical treatment until July 1942, but in September 1942 was arrested by the Gestare and kept in Gestare confinement in Berlin until April 1943. During this time he claims it was discovered that his Party membership was "more than dubious" and that had "actually never been an SS member" (apparently it was found out that the stories made up by von BOLSCHWING's sponsors to get him the SD assignment in Bucharest were untrus). In a seeming effort to save fuce, the SS demoted him from officer to enlisted man rank and then discharged him from the SS.

AUTI-NAZI and RESISTANCE ACTIVITIES

After his release by the Cestapo, von BOISCHWING obtained a position in Vienna as manager of the Austrian branch of a pharmaceutical concern. His second wife, whom he married in 1943, is part Jewish. Von BOISCHWING made contact with members of the Bienna resistance clergy; in 1944 through his brother-in-law he made contact with a small resistance group in the Tyrol. In February 1945 he was arrested by the Gestapo, Vienna, but was released after giving a bribe. He then fled with his wife to the Tyrol where he worked in a resistance group with which he had been in contact for some time. For his activities on behalf on Austrian Resistance he was awarded the Tyrolean henor certificate in May 1946.

Complying with Austrian law, von ECLSCHVING registered in February 1950, indicating that he had held the rank of Haurtstürmführer, but was informed several days later that through a decision made by Austrian authorities he was exempted from registration because of his Austrian resistance activities.

INTELLIGENCE ACTIVITIES ON BEHALF OF US

Von BOLSCHWING met the incoming American troops in the Tyrol, worked with their security forces several months, and carned repmendations from these units for his work. From the end of 1945 through 1946 he worked for the US Military Government, mostly in the Garmisch-Partenkirchen area (southern Bavaria). Since June 1947 he has been employed in Agency-sponsored intelligence activities.

PRIOR-TRIP TO THE UNITED STATES

As of possible interest to the present problem is the fact that von BOLSCHWING visited the United States in 1939. At that time he wanted to emigrate to the United States and made a preliminary trip to look over financial possibilities here. He returned to Germany, intending to emigrate with his wife and infant son, but the outbreak of war made these plans impossible.

a. Informal file memo signed \(\subseteq \subseteq \), dated 22 April 1948 states that one Dr. Bollschwing, alias Otto MAIER, is working for the Waldmann-TIB group) and is in-close-contact with Graf MERAN as well as other U. S. net personalities at the Hotels zum Hirschen and Elefant.

b. CIC report dated 9 August, "Dutch Claim #133 Investigation Report" gives information on attempts to locate Baron Otto von BOISCHWING, alleged holder of the two items (sic). Apparently the investigators attempted to locate von Bolschwing at Helbrunnerstrasse 5 and Neutorstrasse 12, Salzburg, without success. (A pencilled note on this report states that von Bolschwing is a TIB operative, and the Salzburg addresses were listed for purposes of IRO immigration.)

c. A note to the files, signed C 3, dated 8 March 1950 states that the Austrian Police and Ministry of Interior are investigating Otto Bolschwing for his SS and NSDAP affiliation. SS Hauptsturmfuehrer, NSDAP Pg. 984212. Subject is to become long range top (TIB) informant of (quite - special still. St.)

d. A TWX message from CIC Vienna to CIC Salzburg, dated 10 June 1949, alleges that Subject Aryanized the PHARMACHEMIE firm. Former owners have complained to the Ministry that they are having trouble recovering their property, as Subject appears to be under US protection, possibly CIC. Investigation is requested into Subject's background and present activities and former owners of firm determined in order to answer informal inquiry from PSO here. (Presumed to be Public Safety Officer, Vienna.)

A CIC file card on one fru Bolschwing alleges that he uses the aliases GOLIER and GOHIA-aged 40 in 1951, former SS Lieutenant.

f. A TWX msg. from CIC Salzburg to CIC Vienna (apparently in reply to msg. at d, above) states that von Bolschwing unknown in Salzburg. Gives SHAEF

card trace and refers to OSS Austria report, dated 31 August 1945, Subject, "Detailed Interrogation of Kapitaenleutenant JONETZ, Fritz" as containing considerable data on Subject and the PHARMACHENIE firm.

g. An informal note, entitled "Translation of Informant's Notes" dated 10 March 1950, states that Otto Albrecht von Bolschwing (TIB operative, Altmuenster bei Gmunden No. 130) subsequent to WW I, proceeded to the Near East where he engaged in business along with one fmi BORMANN. It is believed this business concerned construction materials and was located in Haifa, Palestine, It is reported that in 1936 he acted as an SD agent. During 1937 he was expelled from Palestine by British authorities, possibly on the basis of his intelligence activities for the German Government. Subsequent to 1937 and the beginning of WW II, Bolschwing was engaged by the SD and Abwehr as an agent in Greece, Rumania, and Holland. During 1941 he was arrested by the SD on undetermined charges and imprisoned in a Concentration Camp. Released during 1941-1942, he proceeded to Vienna, where he engaged in the direction of a firm known as PHARMACHEMIE, a medical supply establishment, which was utilized by the Abwehrstelle in Vienna as a cover for its activities. At that time Bolschwing functioned as an agent of Section I-M, of the Abwehrstelle, Vienna, and for the Naval Intelligence Section of the same Headquarters. The SS officers list notes Bolschwing as having been appointed an SS Hauptsturmfuehrer on 30 June 1941. Subsequent to the cessation of hostilities, Bolschwing was denounced by a source believed to be reliable, as a member of the notorious SD Sonderkommando "Eichmann". Recent information stemming from a reliable source within the Austrian Police system indicates that the Austrian Ministry of Interior is attempting to locate Bolschwing and charge him, under Austrian law, with failure to register as a member of the NSDAP and SS.

h. An undated demunciation (#239), Eidesstattliche Erklaerung, states (in German), "I, Dieter Wisliceny, born 15 July 1910 in Regulfkon, East Prussia, single, Evangelical, presently confined in Bratislava, swear, state and declare under oath, concerning the members of the Abt. IVa of the former SS Obersturmbahnfuehrer Adolf Eichmann: (There are listed 25 former members of the SS, SA, and SD, including one von Bolschwing, after whose name appears the following additional data.) Otto Albrecht von Bolschwing is from East Prussia, a business man in the Near East after WW I. Owned a construction materials firm along with a Wilhelm Maria BORMANN in Haifa. Through fmu MIL-DENSTEIN from 1936 on in contact with the SD. Expelled from Palestine in 1937 by the British, he went to Berlin. Here he was a collaborator of the SD and . AST. Later for Amt VI in Rumania, Greece, and Holland. Here arrested and placed in a concentration camp on HIMMIER's orders. There some two years until the Spring of 1944. Last a resident of Vienna. Personal Description: Since I last saw Bolschwing in 1938, I can only give an approximate description. About 45 years old, very slender, dark, formerly had a dark mustache. Very intelligent, speaks several languages, definitely perfect English and French. Bolschwing was divorced from his wife. (This same document contains the following information on Leopold Edler von MILDENSTEIN, probably idential with the fnu MILDENSTEIN listed above: He was Austrian, from 1936 to 1937 in the SD. After a conflict with HEYDRICH separated from the SD. Later in the Propaganda Ministry, allegedly referant for the Middle East Press. Residence and living conditions unknown to me in recent years.)"

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i. An OSS, Detachment A, report (Austria), c/o II Corps, Msg Ctr. APO 19, US Army, SCI/Unit A, Salzburg, ISX-48, dated 31 August 1945, was prepared from the detailed interrogation of Kapitaenleutnant JONETZ, Fritz, I-M (Eins Marine) officer, Abwehr, Stuttgart, Brest, Nantes, Vienna, and Salzburg. (We presume this report is available to Headquarters.) The personality index accompanying this report lists Otto Albrecht von Bolschwing, director of PHARMACHEMIE import and export company near Vienna. Lives in Vienna. About 1.85 cm. 35 years old, blond bleached hair, blue eyes, thin face, thin body, suffers from stomach disease. In 1942 arrested by SS without reason and released after 7 months imprisonment. Since end of 1943 with I-M Abwehrstelle, Vienna, working in connection with PHARMACHEMIE. On P. 21 of this report JONETZ states that he was commissioned to locate a cover firm for agent work. Dr. Max FRANZKE, economic advisor with I-M Abwehrstelle, Vienna, got in touch with August RUB, manager of the Vienna branch of the Frankfurter Handelsbank. whom he envolled to aid in the scheme. RUB, in turn, finally contacted Bolschwing, the director of the Hamburg pharmaceutical firm PHARMACHEMIE. Bolschwing had been in the SS before and had been arrested by the Gestapo without any reason. JONETZ intervened for him and finally had him released, thereby earning Bolschwing's gratitude. A contract was drawn up between the Frankfurt Handelsbank and the firm, setting up a Vienna branch, which was to be the only sales outlet for the parent firm in Hamburg. It was given the name of PHARMA-CHEMIE HANDELS A.G. JONETZ states that there was a secret clause which gave him the right to employ and dispatch as salesmen as many agents within the firm as he chose. Setting up this cover took a long time and could not be used for agents in Turkey. It was valuable for agent work in Italy. In the late Summer of 1944, JONETZ reports that he pressured the PHARMACHEMIE firm to set up a branch plant near Feldkirch on the Austrian side of the Austro/ Swiss border for the purpose of agent work towards Switzerland. One Unteroffizier Fritz STRENKERT was selected to work out of the Feldkirch branch, though in actuality he was head of the Swiss/Near East agent chain. He spent some time in the area with a W/T operator establishing his cover as Swiss representative of the firm. Ottomar von HAHN was the Italian "representative" of the firm. In May 1944, HAHN was dispatched to Italy and returned in July the same year with orders for 8 million lire worth of chemicals, plus proposals for his future intelligence work and for recruiting of sub-agents. It was planned to establish a depot of PHARMACHEMIE somewhere behind the Italian front, which would have given HAHN an excellent base of operations; however, the imminence of defeat prevented this plan's activation. The Feldkirch branch never got into operation, though considerable material and some personnel were dispatched there shortly prior to the close of hostilities.

j. One other trace, in which Baron fnu Bolschwing is described as a West German Intelligence operative, was reported in EASW-1 and EASA-105.

2. Subject has been debriefed and ICFHITTERED by both and I on the new information contained in the foregoing paragraphs. The results of these sessions will be pouched separately. There is, in essence, no indication that he is engaging in deception on any of the aforecited information. Except for minor variations, he voluntarily confirmed all checkable information in our possession.

A. SINOPSIS. The following paragraphs reflect progress within the Grossbahn operation for the period indicated.

1. Salient developments were:

- a. Orderly termination of the Grossbahn operation and disposition of Grossbahn in the U. S. is in process.
- b. Processing of reports from the 15 > Bucharest trip.
- c. Phase-over of I and I planned for 7 October and 15 October respectively.

- Efforts on this agent were confined to debriefing him on his recent crip to Bucharest and reviewing with him the photographs he took on the trip. We have submitted two batches of KURIOT material (see EAVA-4404 and EASA-2144). Yet to processed are all the photographs, dead drops and meeting sites in Bucharest, and the operational reports on his trip. One cable was dispatched regarding the rumor that a plane had dropped anti-Communist leaflets during the Youth Festival (see SSAIZ-1700). Though [] picked up this rumor in Bucharest, he could find nothing confirmatory. We plan to phase operation of []; to [] on or about 7 October 1953.
- 3. HH-1 and . See EASA's-2106 and 2154. Lengthy interrogation failed to bring forth any significant admissions on the part of HH-1, despite continued ICFIUTTER indications that he was practicing deception regarding his contacts to the Soviets. In interrogating HH-1 we were mainly interested in two points: how HH-1's possible Soviet connections might affect our plans vis-a-vis . and the general CE implications regarding the Grossbahn operation. Indications (secured from both HH-1 and . are that the latter has not been compromised to the Soviets, and we plan to proceed with . I's taking . over directly, under maximum security. Tentative takeover date is 15 October. HH-1 was dropped as a Grossbahn agent effective 31 August, with the CE ramifications regarding the Grossbahn operation generally unresolved.
- 4. PP-1. We have instructed this agent to proceed with plans to effect his transfer to Vienna. Details concerning a VOB takeover will be worked out jointly with them, and Headquarters will be informed accordingly.
- D. Future Plans. Present plans call for the Grossbahn operation, as such, to be completely phased out and Grossbhan on his way to the U. S. by 15 November. PP-1 and AA-1 will be turned over to Vienna; CC-3, PP-3, — and — will come under direct case officer control at SOB. The balance of agents, with the exception of EE-1 who may be of value in the Idnz area, will be dropped.

B- In a Memorandum to Chief/Liaison Control Branch, PI, from Chief dated 19 Nov.1953, EE/A stated that; "It is understood this (backstopping ingement with Dept. of Defense) will apply only in cases where reference are needed for employment in private industry and is non-sesitive jebs. The individual (GROSSBAHN) will be instructed to refrain from applying for sensative jobs with the United States government which will entail a thorough

C- There is no single piece of paper in the GROSSBAHN files (three volumes of the XII numbered files appear to be missing) which spells out the exact circumstances of his having received a U.S. immigration gisa. AXXA Extracts of a number of documents indicate the following. U.S. immigration visa #14846 (German Quote) on application number I-264531 issued at the American Consulate General in Munich on 24 Agg. 1953 after CIA had recommended isuueance. As a supporting document GROSSSAHN was issued

Berlin, Germany. He arrived in New York City on 2 Feb. 1953 aboard the Andréa

D- Information relating to GROSSBAHN's NSDAP and SS connections

Grossbahn has asked a question which has us fairly well stumped. What should his answer be in the event the question of NSDAP membership arises after his entry into the U.S., for example, on the citizenship application forms? We have told him he is to deny any party, SS, SD, Abwehr, etc. affiliations. Our reason for doing so runs as follows: his entry into the U. S. is based on our covert clearance. In other words, in spite of the fact he has an objectionable background, ODURGE is willing to waive their normal objections based on our assurance that Grossbahn's services to KUBARK have been of such a caliber as to warrant extraordinary treatment. Should Grossbahn later, overtly and publicly, admit to an NSDAP record, it strikes us that this might possibly leave ODURGE with little recourse than to expel him from the U. S. as having entered under false pretenses, KUBARK assurances notwithstanding, for the matter would then possibly be considered as public knowledge and ODURGE would be forced, for appearances sake, to follow the letter of the law. At the same time, we feel such instructions might give Grossbahn a degree of control against us, should he decide he wants our help again at some future date—an altogether undesirable situation. What has Headquarters' experience been on this point? Have we instructed Grossbahn incorrectly? Cabled advice would be appreciated, as time to the planned departure date is running 2. U. S. Contact Arrangements. We have discussed this question further with Grossbahn. We have spelled out to him clearly that he is to use the arrangements which we have requested in reference (answer also desired by cable) only for the purpose of advising where monies due him are to be deposited and in cases of dire emergency. We have told him that our interpretation of this last point allows for life and death matters only-for example, if he were on the verge of being expelled from the U. S. We, at the moment, can think of ho other reason why Grossbahn might have to contact Headquarters. He has been warned that under no circumstances is he to attempt any contact with the overtall KUBARK office. It has also been suggested to him that he would probably be better ter off not trying to pick up a social contact with any of his former case of cers or KUBARK acquaintances. 3. Nousehold Goods. With reference to paragraph 2 of EFF4-2379, we caked in DIN 27255 for an estimate of the shipsent charges, since we must get the project assended in order to get funds for this purpose. We hope that the estimate will be as reasonable as possible, for in view of the current economy drive, it will be difficult to get approved if the estimate is high.

4. U.L. Contact Arrangogonte.

a. The question has been raised as to whom GRESTARR should contact if he encounters difficulty at the time of entry into the United States. This problem will not arise, as the arrangements to be made with ADRAR will include their having a men to meet GRESTARR's plane and guide him through the insignation formalities. We shall cable dotails before GRESTARR's departure.

b. Arrangements are being made to set up a cost office box so that GHONSTANN can context us and advise where he would like the belance due him to be sent. This post office box will be in effect for nix months, and GHONSTANN can use it during that time if he has any other reason to commicate with us. As a matter of fact, we would appreciate being kept generally revised of his job-seeking efforts, and would particularly like to be informed when he lands a definite job. Although we plan to provide for the letter drop for the limited period of 6 months, we could extend its validity in case of necessity.

5. Meierances. This problem is a rathor difficult one to solve, porticularly on a long-torm basis. What we are working on is as follows: we are trying to arrange for a particular officer in ODIBET to serve as a back-stop when Cattabana is eaked by a prospective employer for a reference for his employment during the time he worked for HIPPA and KHARA. GEOSSBANA should state he was a contract employee and that only this particular individual would know of the details of the arrangement. Full details will be sent you as soon so the arrangements with this udibat officer are completed. We would like to point out, however, that this cover areated for GRESSBANN is not a particularly study one. It would not stend up under investigation by the PRI, for example. But as GRESSBANN is not a citizen, he will not apply for a government job where he would be investigated by the PRI. Nor would be be likely to apply for any consitive position which would entail PRI investigation. With these reconventions in mind, the cover created for him should fit his noed, i.e., that of a reference address to which a prospective employer in business or finance sight write.

In connection with the references to be furnished, it would be a great help if we were informed of Od. 325ABN's plans for job hunting. Boss he know yet in which part of the country he would most likely sottle? Ross he have say leads or countrests? Where does he intend to go upon arrival in New York? We realise that it may be extremely

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difficult for 64 %15443 to make any definite plane from anstrin, and any information given us now would be governal in nature. However, it is necessary for us to know on a developing basis about his job-recking so that the references furnished a prospective employer can bear connection with the type of position being applied for. For this reason we have suggested in paregraph 4b above that after arrival in this country ha continues to keep us informed of his progress until he is settled in a job.

The arrangement with CDISA has no definite period of validity, although it is expected that as long as the pertioular CDISAN individual who is briefed on the matter now remains in his present assignment it can be continued, and that if he leaves, he would ask his replacement to continue the arrangement. But we wish to explasive that the cover address is primarily meant for the initial period following CHRYSENHA'S arrival in the United States.

We are waiting now to hear whether this cover can be arranged. If it cannot, we may have to build a private business cover for the period of his employment with us. Hence, the request in DIR 27255 for information as to the exect nature of his present cover.

6. Admouledment of Farty Kembership. He have discussed at longth the question raised in EASA-2412 concerning the enguer GERESBAHR should sake to any inquiries put to him about his Farty membership once he has arrived in the States. Assuming that he has not denied Mesi affiliations on his vice epulication form, he should definitely not deny his record if the matter comes up in dealings with the sutherities and he is forced to give a point-blank ensuer. Thus, if asked, he should admit membership, but attempt to explain it away on the basis of extensiting circumstances. If he were to make a felse statement on a citizenship application or other official paper, be would get into trouble. Actually, GENERALN is not entering the US under false pretenses, as ONUTE will have information concerning his pest record is a secret file. Es will enter legally under an WARR interpretation of the provisions of the immigration law applicable to his case. (If cause we are asking that they grant such a favorable interpretation.) We would very much like to recommend to GROWSHAM, both for his sake and our own, that he steer clear of any consitive jobs and that, even then he decomes a citizen, he not try for any per ravient position.

7. Citizenship. We have checked with indigration the current requirements regarding citizenship. A purson coming in on an isalgration viza files no first papers under the regulations now in force. To become a citizen he must reside in the Mi five years, of which the last six menths prior to application for citizenship must be in the district where he files his application. During the five-year pariod, he can go abroad, but not for a period exceeding six menths at any one time. For information purposes, we are enclosing a copy of the form now in effect, although naturally there may be a number of changes five years from now.

- 1. The extremely lucid presentation of "The Grossbahn Problem", contained in reference & has been most gratefully received. It completely dispels a few of the doubts which recently have been gathering in our minds as to the probable outcome of this unusual disposal case.
- 2. We were just on the verge of pouching a Grossbahn Progress Report giving a resume of what we had done to date and recapitulating the points on which we were awaiting word from you when reference A arrived. All of the points we raise have been answered by your dispatch, with the exception of an accommodation address for CC-3 when she departs for Germany. This, however, is a separate problem and can and should be handled as such. Herely in order that the administrative side of the Grossbahn operational file might be kept up to date, and we are not adjudged lax in keeping up with our progress reporting, we would like to allow the Progress Report to stand as is and submit it as an attachment to this dispatch. We find the charting of things yet to be done, as shown in the Progress Report, helpful in keeping in mind precisely where we want to go.
- 3. We should, now, like to go over some of the specific points in reference A so that you will be completely informed as to what is happening here:
- a. Re. paras. 1 and 2: Grossbahn certainly will not depart Austria without the final word from you. We have adapted this policy since final termination was first decided, for we could well imagine the chaos should Grossbahn arrive at a port of entry without the way being completely prepared. Secondly, as you point out in paragraph 1, there is just the remote possibility that something unforeseen of a security nature might crop up at the last moment so that the entire plan would have to be abandoned. We, too, feel (and certainly hope) that all security checks will give him a reasonably clean bill of health, but one never knows in this business.
- of MOB has informed us that there should be no difficulty in renewing Grossbahn's visa, using the old number, and we do plan on getting this into motion about 15 December. As we have stated in paragraph 4

of the attached Progress Report, it will be about mid January 1954 before we can get the Grossbahn group on their way. First cause for delay was the ODURGE waiver; second cause was receipt of information that they had to move as a unit and the group would be delayed until visas were secured for the wife and son. Coupled with these two main reasons were the logistical problems connected with closing out their household and arranging for shipment of their effects to the U.S.

- c. Re. para. 3, <u>Household Goods</u>: See paragraph 6 of attached Progress Report. We plan on seeing Grossbahn as soon as possible. If he still has no word from his Hamburg contact, we will instruct him that he is to bring in a Linz or Salzburg mover and secure an estimate <u>immediately</u>. We will cable as soon as we have a figure.
- d. Re. para. 5, <u>U. S. Contact Arrangements</u>: We are indeed pleased to hear that Grossbahn will be escorted through ODURGE formalities on entry. See paragraph 4 of Progress Report attached; the Grossbahn group will move via ship rather than plane as originally planned, reason being that Grossbahn's wife simply refuses to fly. Final arrangements, then, with ODURGE should reflect this change. We will cable the ship, ETA, and point of entry when known. We presume the latter will be New York but will confirm this.
- e. Re. para. 5, <u>References</u>: The arrangement you suggest follows right along with what we have told Grossbahn tentatively. We will expect details on the final arrangements as soon as they are confirmed. We will certainly brief Grossbahn to steer clear of applying for any sensitive positions where he might be the subject of a searching security investigation. Your point here is extremely well taken. We also will have Grossbahn prepare for us a rundown on exactly what he has done to date in regard to job hunting and what his tentative plans are for the future. We will also have him answer the other specific points you raise in paragraph 5, i. e., where he will go after arrival in New York, in which part of the country he will most likely settle, and what leads and/or commitments he might already have. He will be instructed to keep you informed after arrival (through the P. O. Box mentioned in paragraph 4b) on his success in job hunting.

Grossbahn's file at the Munich Consulate. Failing this, we are sending him word tomorrow (10 December) to let us have the exact wording of the political and military information furnished. Needless to say, the Munich Consulate was given true information, however brief, which seems to be the basic question involved. However, in compliance with your request in the Addendum, we will cable the precise wording as soon as we have it.

- 4. As indicated in the foregoing, we will secure all desired information from Grossbahn and pouch it as soon as we can. We do plan on giving Grossbahn a sterile and general brief on the main points of reference A that he needs to know.
- 5. We wish to express our thanks once more for the fine run-down you have given us in reference A. It was indeed an eyeopener, for we had no idea of the problems you were facing rather, we never set down and added them up as you did-end we thought we had troubles!

- A. Synopsis. Except for agents PP-3 and EE-1, the phase-out operation is completed. We are awaiting final word on the ODURCE waiver before we complete arrangements for movement of the Grossbahn group. As plans stand at present, we expect them to depart the area during the period 15 to 31 January 1954. Grossbahn is performing a few last minute assessments for us prior to his departure.
- B. Specific Action Required of Headquarters. We should like to briefly summarize the various points on which we are awaiting word from Headquarters:
 - 1. Final ODURCE waiver (latest reference is DIR-29146, indicating that word is expected about 4 December 1953).
 - Accommodation address (mail only) for Grossbahn US contact. (EASA's 2379 and 2412).
 - 3. Answer on Grossbahn action should question of Nazi Party membership arise after his US entry. (EASA-2412)
 - 4. Employment references for period 1946 to 1953. (EASA-2379)
 - Decision on shipment of household effects after estimated costs are submitted by SOB. (EASA-2379)
 - 6. Contact arrangements for CC-3 in Germany. (EASA-2580)

C. Developments.

1. Phase-over of agents. The following former Grossbahn agents were phased over to direct case officer control on dates indicated:

Still remaining to be handled are agents PP-3 (the remaining Police source in Salzburg) and EE-1 (Grossbahn's priest friend) in Linz. We will probably assign an SOB case officer (as yet undecided) to handle PP-3 and intend to establish a loose contact with EE-1 in Linz. He appears to be a fairly valuable casual contact, as he is probably one of the most politically active Jesuits in the area. WW-1 (formerly AA-3) was dropped on 30 November 1953 for lack of initiative, lack of interest, and general unsuitability as an agent.

- 2. <u>CC-3</u> and <u>CC-4</u>. <u>CC-4</u> is being dropped effective 31 December 1953. She will probably secure private employment in the Salaburg area. <u>CC-3</u> will be dropped at the time that Grossbahn finally departs for the US. We hope to be able to furnish an address for her in Germany, in the event she feels she can be of use to KUBARK again. (See EASA's 2579 and 2580.)
- 3. Visas. Grossbahm's visa is already secured. This was reported in EASA-1992. Application for the wife's and son's visas were made at the Munich Consulate on 13 November 1953. There should be no complications; both have passed their physical examinations, and it is only a question of time before the actual visas are issued. We will probably have to renew Grossbahm's visa (it expires on 23 December 1953); however, MOB assures us this should present no problem.
- 4. Departure Date. Our secondary plan called for Grossbahm and son to depart Austria, by air, about 15 December, with the wife following by boat about 15 March 1954. This was in order that she might close out the household and give Grossbahm a chance to get established in a new job in the US before she joined him. On 13 November 1953 we learned that this plan was impossible, that they had to move as one family group. This, coupled with recent delays cable from Headquarters in securing the final ODURGE waiver (see most recent cable DIR-29146 on this problem) means that it will probably be somewhere about 15 to 31 January 1954 before we actually get the Grossbahn group moving on their way to the US. We have still not made any reservations for them for surface transportation during the planned departure period due to the lack of final confirmation from Headquarters that entrance into the US is insured. When final word is received, we plan to attempt, for security reasons, to secure the reservations in Munich, possibly with the assistance of MOB. We will advise Headquarters by cable of ship, date, and port of entry, as soon as this information is available.
- 5. Grossbahn Interim Assignments. We have instructed Grossbahn that he is to perform assessments on the following persons, while he is marking time in Salzburg:

- a.

 J -A Socialist Landrat in Salzburg who is an extremely influential member of the Socialist Party.
- 6. Household Effects. Grossbahn, prior to the receipt of DIR-27255, was instructed to secure an estimate of the cost of moving his household goods via surface transportation to the US. He turned this nattor over to a Hamburg chipping firm with whom he maintains good connections and as yet has not received the final answer. He did furnish them with all necessary measurements and weights. As soon as we have the answer, this information will be cabled to Headquarters.

Termination of Project GROSSBAHN

- 1. Approval is requested to terminate the GROSSBAHN project which was approved 27 February 1953 for the period 1 February 1953 through 31 January 1954, and to pay termination benefits of \$4000.
- 2. It has been deemed advisable for operational reasons to terminate the project and to assist the principal agent (also known as GROSSBAHN) to come to the United States with his family. He has been a principal agent since February 1950, and for three years previously was employed by ZIPPER.
- 3. The termination benefits of \$\\$\\$4000 would include a sixmonth termination bonus to the principal agent, a two-month termination bonus to the office assistant of the principal agent (who has been employed for over five years), and fare to the United States for agent, his wife and son. It would also partially cover shipment to the United States of agent's household effects \(\) We feel these termination benefits are justified by reason of agent's loyal services on behalf of U. S. Intelligence since 1947.
- 4. The total amount approved for the project was \$20,000. According to the Accounts office of the Finance Division, a total of \$8384.20 had been spent on the project from 1 February 1953 until 30 November 1953. Thus the \$4000 requested for termination expenses would not necessitate any additional funds for the project.
- 5. It is desired to terminate the project in early January 1954, at which time the principal agent is expected to end his services for the Agency and depart from Austria.
- 6. All GROSSBAHN clearances are cancelled with the exception of PP-1 and AA-1 who are being turned over to the Vienna Station.

Adolf EICHMANN

- 1. This memorandum is for information only.
- 2. In our effort to locate all available information on EICHMANN, the SS man who, according to the newspapers, was seized by the Israelis on 23 May 1960, we have made a concentrated search through various captured German documents. Among the items on EICHMANN we have found a report dated 4 November 1937 which was prepared by EICHMANN, then an SS master sergeant, and one fnu HAGEN, then an SS first sergeant. The report provides details on the trip which EICHMANN and HAGEN took during September 1937 and contains data on a number of agents and informers who worked for the RSHA. Other captured records have brought to light the names of additional agents and informers. Details are provided in the attached interim report.
- 3. A final report will be forwarded to your office as soon as all inquiries, investigations, and research are completed.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Adolf EICHMANN

- 1. On 4 November 1937 Adolf EICHMANN, then an SS master sergeant, and fnu HAGEN, then an SS first sergeant, prepared a report on their trip of September 1937 to various countries, including Israel (then Palestine). According to the report, Dr. Franz REICHERT, then a representative of the German news agency D. N. B., in Jerusalem, was one of EICHMANN's principal agents. Among subagents REICHERT handled was Felwel POLKES, aka Felbel POLKES, aka Feivel POLKES, a Jew who resided at that time in Tel Aviv. The report stated that POLKES had no profession and that his only means of livelihood was the money paid to him "by us" through REICHERT. He received a total of 20 pounds per month: ten pounds were his monthly salary; five pounds were a special payment; and another five pounds were given to him to pay one of his sub-agents, fnu KLEIN of Halfa. The report stated that POLKES had another sub-agent, one fnu SCHALOMI (or Schalomi lnu), who was a member of HAGANA.
- 2. Another captured German document is a progress report for the period I July to 31 July 1937, prepared by the unit of which EICHMANN was a member. It states that Felbel POLKES had the task of furnishing information on "HAGANA, political developments in the Near East, and universal organization of Judalsm." Still other captured records contain extensive and detailed reports on HAGANA and other world-wide Jewish organizations. A study of these reports will be made in order to determine whether they were prepared on the basis of information furnished by POLKES and his sub-agents.
- 3. RID's central index contains no record on POLKES. However, a check of the records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has brought to light the following information:

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"Feivel POLKES

Parrived in U.S. January 1, 1954 at New York for business. Departed January 13, 1954. Occupation - Business Executive. Born - September 11, 1900, in Schol, Israel. Nationality - Israeli. Race - Hebrew. Israeli passport #11538 issued February 17, 1953. Wife's name - Lisa. Address - 43 Hillel Street, Haifa, Israeli. Destination in U.S. - 7704 - 141 St., Queer N.Y. White hair, grey eyes, 5'6". Also in U.S. - before in October 1953."

- 4. The office of Security, it has been possible to determine that the above-cited address in Queens consists of garden apartments. Number 7704 on 141 Street, one of these apartment houses, consists of six individual residences (apartments). Five of the residents at this address have moved there since 1954. The sixth apartment is occupied by the family of William H. WHITE. We shall endeavor to determine the names of the other five apartments who lived there in January 1954.
- 5. We are conditing investigations on the following agents or contacts who worked directly or indirectly for EICHMANN in 1938:
 - a. Fm: GENTZ, D. N.B. representative in Cairo. His area of activity was Egypt and the Near East; his principal task was the observation of development of "the Jewish State." He was in contact with Dr. REICHERT.
 - b. Wilhelm M. BORMANN had been expelled, presumably from a country in the Near East. German attempts to have the expulsion order rescinded had failed; and at the time (January 1938) BORMANN was temporarily residing in Berlin. His area of activity had been the Near East, and he collaborated with Dr. REICHERT and fnu GENTZ. Occasionally Dr. REICHERT used him as a courier.
 - c. E. F. ELMHURST operated in the United States. His area of activity was given as "America," and his task was observation of "anti-national socialist boycott leagues.
 - d. Henri ARCHARCHE, a lawyer, resided in Alexandria, Egypt.
 - e. Samy MOUSFY, an editor, resided in Cairo, Egypt.
 - f. Icrahim CHANTI, aka SHANTI, owner and editor-in-chief of the newspaper, Ad-Difah, reported through Dr. REICHERT.

- l. It has been brought to our attention that subject has applied to ICA for employment and is supposedly being processed for a position in India. Therefore, it has been suggested that your office be apprised of certain phases of his background; the facts cited below indicate that subject's past activities could result in political embarrassment to ICA and to the U.S. Government.
- 2. Examination of captured German documents has brought to light voluminous information about Adolf EICHMANN, his office, his subordinates, and his agents. It has not been possible to complete a thorough analysis and prepare a detailed report because of the very large number of documents involved.
- 3. According to the captured records, subject became a member of the Nazi party on 1 April 1932. His party membership number was 984212. From 1937 (or earlier) until about 1939, he appears to have been a principal agent of the Department II, Section 112 of the RSHA (the German Security Service Headquarters). At that time, EICHMANN (and several other persons who have been tried as war criminals) was a member of this section. The examination conducted thus far has not made it possible to ascertain whether EICHMANN was subject's case officer in the early years of their service with the RSHA. It does, however, appear that by 1938 EICHMANN directed at least one or two specific phases of subject's work.
- 4. The chief of Department II, Dr. Franz Alfred SIX, appears to have excercised a considerable degree of supervision of Section 112. The captured records contain evidence that, at least on one occasion, SIX, EICHMANN, and subject conferred in detail about certain anti-Jewish activities of Section 112 and gave subject specific guidance. Other papers indicate that Dr. SIX and EICHMANN were well acquainted with subject and with his work. In 1960, Dr. SIX was reported as residing in a small town in southern Germany. In 1956, he was part owner of a publishing firm in West Germany.

- 5. In 1937 or 1938, subject appears to have been directly involved in foreign currency manipulations. Specifically, at that time, the Nazis were exerting pressure upon persons of the Jewish extraction in order to get them to leave Germany. As a result, many Jews sold their property in preparation for emigration. The Nazi laws stipulated, however, that only a limited amount of German currency could be taken out of Germany by Jewish emigrants and that additional sums of money could be taken out only if the sums were officially converted to currencies of other countries. As these transactions could be made only at official installations, the Nazis exchanged the funds at a rate inflated in their favor and used the proceeds for financing their intelligence (i.e. RSHA) activities. Subject was directly involved in these manipulations, having gained his experience in fiscal matters while working for "Overseas Traders, Ltd." in Jerusalem, Beirut, and Cairo from 1933 to 1936. In 1936 he was expelled from those areas by the British authorities.
- 6. He then continued these financial activities for the RSHA in Berlin and later in Vienna.
- 7. Probably in April 1940 he became a staff member of the RSHA and held the rank of SS 2nd Lt. He was promoted to the rank of SS 1st Lt. in July 1940 and to captain in January 1941. In May 1940 he was working for the RSHA in Bucharest, and was closely associated with von KILLINGER, the German Envoy to Rumania. Von KILLINGER's activities have been linked with EICHMAN's attempts to exterminate the Jews and he has been considered a war criminal. It has not, however, been possible to establish whether the accusations are founded and whether von KILLINGER has been brought before a war crimes tribunal.
- 8. The above information about subject may be passed to ICA. However, the information cited below should not be made available to other agencies without the approval of pertinent CIA offices.
 - a. Shortly after WW II, subject was employed by the West German Intelligence Service. While with this service, he also performed various assignments for this Agency and indicated loyalty toward the U.S. and a desire to switch employers.
 - b. Subject was employed by this Agency as a contract agent from about 1950 to 1954. In the course of his association with us, he never provided full and correct details of his RSHA employment and failed to advise us that he had been involved with several war

criminals. He acknowledged to us that he had been a member of the Nazi Party, but claimed that he was compelled to join. He said further, that he had been able to alter the official records to show that he had joined the party at an earlier, more advantageous date. He entered the U.S. without Agency sponsorship. We did, however, indicate to the Immigration and Naturalisation Service that we were aware of his membership in the Nazi party, but that we felt it was relatively inconsequential, particularly in view of subject's excellent service in our behalf. It is presumed that this certification is a matter of record with the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

- c. Several months after the Israeli Government's announcement of EICHMANN's seizure, the German authorities reinstituted active investigation of EICHMANN and of several other persons accused or suspected of war crimes. In the course of the investigation, three representatives of the West German Ministry of Justice were sent to Washington, D.C., on detail and spent more than a month examining captured records. The records containing the desired evidence—among them many which we have examined and which we have used as a basis for the above statements—were microfilmed and sent to Germany for use in the investigation and presumably for use as evidence in future war crime trials conducted in Germany.
- d. Finally, it has also been brought to our attention that the Israeli Government has obtained certified reproductions of many of these captured records. It is presumed that the copies are to be used as evidence in the forthcoming EICHMANN trial.
- 9. It is our assumption that subject may be named as EICHMANN's collaborator and fellow conspirator and that the resulting publicity may prove embarrassing to the U.S. if subject becomes associated with ICA or its activities. It is suggested that the ICA be advised of the facts contained in the captured records so that they can weigh the risks involved. Similarly, it is suggested that you consider informing the FBI concurrently as there may be in this case a violation of U.S. statutes.

Thas been advised twice in the last few days that there is a possibility that GRCSSBAHN might come to India as a high ray contract employee in the Indian Investment Center. The chief of the Indian Investment Center, a very high powered employee named BOURDRES, is considering two candidates:

A. GROSSBAHN, whom BOURDRES vastly prefers, but who, as he was informed by ICA telegram to Delhi ICA TO 20-1193, was not available. BOUDRES attributed this to a poor recommendation by someone in KUBARK to Mr. SLAGHT of ICA's Private Enterprise Office, who told BOUDRES that the references of the agency previously employing GROSSBAHN in Austria were not entirely favourable and were enough to definitely stop consideration of GROSSBAHN. BOUDRES, very anxious to have GROSSBAHN, is attempting to reopen this issue and since GROSSBAHN said in a letter that he had a friend in India (an unnamed friend - I) there was a great search on the part of TCM to find this friend. Finally, Philip Van Wyck, head of the Investment Program in TCM. asked - If he knew GROSSBAHN and I said he did and favourably so. [I has thus let it be known to the chief of the Industry Branch of TCM that he knows GROSSBAHN and considers him favourably.

- B. The other candidate is ANDRE MAXIMOV, born 23 May 1905 in Moscow, a legal partner in the firm of Spence, Hotchkiss, Parker and Duryee in New York, who lists as one of his character references the present Chief of FE Division of
- I knows of the GRCSSBAHN case, it would seem that KUBARK 2. From what [has done an injustice to him by giving TCM a less than enthusiastic report. While of course we do not plan to use GROSSBAHN operationally, we are certain that due to his friendship with \ Tand his natural inquisitive flair, he would assist the Station wherever possible through motives of friendship and patriotism. Naturally, any use of him would be cleared in advance according to regulations.

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

SUBJECT: Otto Albrecht Alfred von BOLSCHWING

- l. During a period beginning shortly after the conclusion of World War II and extending into 1954, Subject conscientiously performed useful work, at first indirectly and then directly, for the United States in Austria. At this time he made no secret of having been a nominal member of the NSDAP and of having held assimilated SS rank. He also claimed, however, that he had consistently and effectively impeded the true aims of the Nazi party. As a reward for his loyal post-war service and in view of the apparent innocuousness of his party activities, Subject was given certain covert but official assistance in immigrating to the United States in 1954.
- 2. Following the Israeli arrest of Adolf EICHMANN, an examination of captured German documents bearing on EICHMANN's activities coincidentally revealed that Subject had concealed from United States Government representatives the true aspects of his NSDAP membership and most of the details of his relationship with the RSHA. The most significant single fact revealed was that, at least in the years prior to the war, he was a principal agent of Department II, Section 112,

of the RSHA. At that time EICHMANN and several other persons who have since been tried as war criminals were members of this section. It has not thus far been possible to determine whether EICHMANN supervised all of Subject's activities in this period, but it does appear that by 1938 EICHMANN directed at least one or two specific phases of Subject's work. All that has come to light so far indicates that his activity for the EICHMANN office had to do with the manipulation of private funds away from Jewish owners in connection with immigration proceedings, and nothing to date has connected him with EICHMANN's genocide activities. As a matter of fact, at this point in the examination of records it is unclear as to how far into the war years Subject's collaboration with EICHMANN extended.

3. A possibility exists that in the course of the EICHMANN trial or in West German trials of lesser war criminals, Subject's true record may come to public notice. Certified reproductions of many of the captured German documents are in the possession of the Israeli Government, and some months after EICHMANN's arrest representatives of the West German Justice Ministry spent more than a month in Washington examining and microfilming relevant captured documents. It is also to be noted that Subject has been identified in at least two books on EICHMANN which have been published since EICHMANN's arrest: He is mentioned, with an unimportant variation in the spelling of his name, on page 154 of Tuviah Friedman's The Hunter

as a principal agent of the "Jewish Department", and he is mentioned as "Otto von Butschwing" on pages 73 and 77 of Quentin Reynolds'

Minister of Death as the assistant to the head of German intelligence in Palestine in 1937. The latter book ascribes to him the role of getting "acquainted with members of the Haganah in hopes of finding some who would work with the Gestapo".

- 1. This memorandum is for your information and concurrence in the recommendations contained in paragraph 5.
- 2. Subject, a former agent of the Austrian Station, who, under L 3 cover, was assisted in his immigration and naturalization by CIA, has been trying for some months to gain employment with ICA. He is apparently particularly well qualified for the position, which is with an Indian governmental or semi-governmental financial advisory body sponsored and in part staffed by ICA. In the normal course of events he probably would have had no difficulty obtaining the position. However, in the aftermath of EICHMANN's arrest

 Tof CI/R&A discovered evidence in captured German documents that Subject had concealed from us the true facts of his Nazi Party membership and his true relationship with the RSHA, including the fact that he was once a principal agent of EICHMANN's office. What we knew on the EICHMANN connection was passed to Mr. Charles Keating of I on 6 February without recommendation pro or con, but ICA by E pointing out that Subject's connection with EICHMANN might at some point come to public attention. Mr. Keating was of the opinion that the possibility of later adverse publicity would rule out Subject's employment, but said that he would undertake to attempt to make any turndown appear to be for simple administrative reasons and not on security grounds.
- 3. Recently an associate of Mr. Keating's advised the interested ICA man in India that Subject was being turned down on security grounds, and the representative in India wrote Subject that it appeared that he had enemies in Washington. Meanwhile, with the help of the president of the company employing him, ex-Governor Driscoll of New Jersey, Subject had marshalled an imposing array of individual congressional support for his employment by ICA. Mr. Keating advised L I yesterday that he has congressmen on his back about Subject, and asked for a memorandum from us briefly outlining the derogatory information.

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4. Furthermore, Subject has been in telephonic contact with L I of E/H, and [I of the CI Staff requesting advice as to how to proceed to erase any governmental objections to his employment. Since I will receive another call from Subject this evening, 10 May 1961, he has been instructed to tell Subject that the reason for his turndown was new information on his RSHA activities discovered in research of German documentary material connected with the EICHMANN trial. Subject will be advised that he should write ICA immediately withdrawing his application for personal reasons, and send copies to the various persons whom he has enlisted in his support. If he refuses, he is to be advised that the information will be forwarded to these persons with resultant unpleasantness to himself. If he requests a I will meet with him to detail the meeting, both . [I and [information which has been uncovered and make it clear to him why he must write the letters to protect himself.

5. If Subject refuses to cooperate in withdrawing his application, EE will advise Legislative Counsel of the situation and provide blind memoranda for use with the appropriate Members of Congress. A duplicate of this memorandum will be given to Mr. Keating of ICA. If Subject is willing to write the suggested letters, Mr. Keating will be so advised and asked to keep us informed of any further repercussions.

- 2. The point was gotten to with dispatch, and was introduced by calling to his attention derogatory references to him in recent books by Quentin Reynolds and Tuviah Friedman. He said that he was unfamiliar with the books. When he dismissed the references as ridiculous he was told that the books were in fact supported by a comparatively cursory review of captured German documents dealing with Adolf EICHMANN's activities. It was clearly pointed out that the documents on EICHMANN, as well as a detailed review of his own NSDAP records, established the fact that he had told Agency representatives far less than the truth about his Nazi activities. It was explained that although the Agency had been to an extent had no one was mad at him, and the purpose of our meeting was in no sense punitive. The purpose of the meeting, it was explained, was to draw to his attention the scandal that might result if he pressed his desire for employment and his congressional sponsors were caught out in the publicity that might break at any moment.
- 3. BOLSCHWING was quick to appreciate the fact that, without regard to the merits of the charges, the damage was done as far as his government-sponsored employment was concerned. He vigorously expressed his intention, however, after getting his sponsors off the limb, to clear his record. It was pointed out to him that it was our regretfully considered opinion that it would be impossible for him to clear his record, and I explained that I had personally

reviewed the record and that, favorably disposed toward him as I was. it would be impossible for him to convince me. Furthermore, even if he were able to dispose of the charges he insisted were mendacious the record which he acknowledged would still show NSDAP and SS membership and activities which would make him a pariah in the circles for which he was striving. As for disproving any of the charges, he was reminded, even a court of law could not undo the publicity damago, and in any event it was doubtful that he would want the anguish and expense of legal trial before a West German or Israeli court. With this he heartily agreed. He wanted to know if this were a likelihood, and was told that although the documents were available to friendly governments we thought it unlikely that Germany or Israel would take any action against him. But, he was reminded, there was not even faint assurance that his name would not come up in the trials of others. He also wanted to know if ICA was aware of this derogatory information and was told that it was our impression that only the small section of ICA dealing in security matters knew of them, and that if he moved quickly in withdrawing his application the operating officials would probably not learn them.

4. To me, at least, BOLSCHWING's protestations of innocence seemed essentially pro forma and put forward in order to maintain his self respect with us. It is of some significance, suggesting at least that the reason for the discussion was not a complete surprise to him, that he had made a point of bringing with him his Austrian denazification certificate--really rather a pathetic paper under the circumstances. Although initial efforts at a chronological review of his relations with the party were cut off as pointless, he was for the most part pretty much permitted to talk himself out on the subject of his innocence. Of his own accord he came fairly early in the discussion to the position that in deference to the things he loved best--primarily his wife and secondarily the United States and the people here who had be friended him-he could not fight the situation or attempt to clear himself. At this point he volunteered the fact that he understood that he now could never work for the government, and he went on to wonder aloud if he could best spare his present employer, ex-Governor Driscoll, any future embarrassment by quickly finding other civil employment. He mentioned suicide twice. The first time it was received and treated lightly; the second time he was told that that idea did not fit in remotely with his avowed primary interest of sparing his wife and others disgrace and pain.

5. BOLSCHWING realized that apart from the present possibilities of scandal his status as a United States citizen might well be endangered by an expose of the facts. On this he was told that, there being more to the record than the Agency had bargained for,

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we could do very little to protect him; the most we could do was not to surface the affair ourselves and to endeavor to confine any know-ledge of it to security type channels. It would be a public outcry which would damage him, he was told.

- 6. Early on in the discussion BOLSCHWING's main worries centered around his wife and how he could use her health as an excuse for withdrawing his application without making her aware of the true situation. The health question itself presents almost no problem, because both he and his wife some months ago suffered serious automobile accidents from which she, at least, has not fully recovered. However, what and how to tell his wife revolves, he says, around the fact that she is by nature emotional and fearful, has already been quite depressed lately, and in no event is the sort of person who could live out her life with a guilty secret. After hours of discussion he settled finally on telling her that as a Devisenberster prior to World War II he had extensive dealings with emigrating Jews which now are subject to adverse misinterpretation.
- 7. Depressed as BOLSCHWING unquestionably was, and groping as he was for solutions in what must have seemed an insoluble situation, he showed surprising resilience and apparent courage. From the beginning there was no question at all that his first and critical step was to withdraw immediately his application for employment and to inform his sponsors that he had done so. He asked us to draft a telegram for him-for this purpose to be sent to Mr. Slaght of ICA and a letter to be sent to the congressmen who had interceded for him. He had, incidentally, shown us copies of the letters written on his behalf by the individual congressmen, and in each case they had plugged for him unequivocally and agressively. The telegram to Slaght was to be sent that night or first thing the next morning, and the letters were to go to the congressmen as soon as possible. He was also to send a similar letter to Mr. Bourdres, the ICA field man in India who was in communication with him, and he was to follow up his telegram to Slaght with a telephone call and a letter. The question came up of whether or not he should send any sort of a letter I in India who had expressed an interest in his ICA employment, and it was decided that he should not. There might be something to be said for having him write \sqsubset a straight faced version of his withdrawal for health reasons in order to make matters easier for [], but the question was complicated by the fact that, according to BOLSCHWING, Bourdres is Is Agency affiliation. This decision can, of course. be changed if it seems more desirable to have him write to but I would tend to favor not writing, and informing C I by RYBAT communication of what has happened.

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8. BOLSCHWING is tough and rescurceful; I don't expect him not to go through with the withdrawal of his application, but over the long haul he is not apt to let sleeping dogs lie. Given enough time for rationalization it is likely that at some time in the future he will come up with ideas for clearing his record and reinstating himself as a first class citizen.

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BOLSCHWING in Austria shortly after the end of World War II. He used him as an agent for quite some time and eventually von BOLSCHWING immigrated to the U.S. and settled in East (or West) Orange, N.J., where he worked for RCA. He continued to maintain social contact with II. When Adolf EICHMANN, the infamous SS war criminal, was seized by the Israelis, I conducted a search for captured German documents that contained information about EICHMANN. I was able to locate numerous records some of which clearly showed that von BOLSCHWING had been a member of the SS in the early days of the Hitler regime and that at that time, he had served in the same unit as EICHMANN. At the same time that I was amassing the documents containing this I believe he information, von BOLSCHWING contacted wrote him a letter and asked him to come and visit him) and told him that he was afraid for his life, in light of what had happened I came and told me about his former to EICHMANN. Then L agent's fears and I showed him the information which I had been I was very surprised, said neither he nor able to find. E others who had worked with you BOLSCHWING had known about his connection with the RSHA and expressed the belief that we would not have used him at that time had we known about it. As the public excitement of the EICHMANN case mounted, von BOLSCHWING remained in contact with L I'. but he never admitted the true facts of the case, although he indicated that he had had some very minor connection which was grossly exaggerated after the war. He feared that because of these disproportionate exaggerations something untoward might also happen to him. Throughout the weeks of the EICHMANN crisis, I' tried to keep him from panicking and eventually the entire matter faded into the background and I heard no more about it.

5. In s reason for wanting to contact me on 8 May 1970 concerned von BOLSCHWING, who, I sexplained, now lives in California and is an officer of a commercial firm which has obtained a classified defense contract. For this reason an investigation of von BOLSCHWING is to be conducted and I wanted to know whether I thought that von BOLSCHWING's previous Nazi background would have an adverse effect upon his being cleared. Although I skirted around the direct point for awhile, there was no doubt that what he wanted from me was either an assurance that there would be no adverse

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effect or - he implied - action to insure such result.

also offered to call DC/CI (he used — I's name - I do
not know whether he knows of — I's relatively recent
promotion) if it was necessary as backing to help me answer his
questions.

- 6. I told I that I have nothing to do with such matters, that I presume that the request will arrive in routine fashion and that some analyst or other will work on it and will have to evaluate the information in the record against the details in the request for clearance. I also said that I could not second guess an analyst and would have no idea how such information would effect a case at this time. I indicated that he wanted to tell von BOLSCHWING what the chances for a clearance are and said that he would be going to the West Coast during the following week (II-15 May 1970). I left no doubt in his mind that I could not help him in this matter.
- 7. The entire conversation was very friendly in tone (we had always been on very friendly terms in the past) and L promised to contact me socially in the future. He received no information or committments from me and I did not indicate explicitly that I know his request to be most improper.

- I. Reference is made to your requests dated 2 and 28 July 1970 concerning Subject (CIA Batch Number 0173, Sequence Number
- 2. The following information was furnished by Subject, himself; some of the biographical data has been confirmed by other sources. (Comment: It should be noted that Subject's information did not reveal the full extent of his Nazi Party affiliations.)
 - Subject stated that in March 1932 he encountered difficulty in obtaining the German Government's consent for the building of a cement factory in East Prussia. Upon advice that Subject come to an arrangement with the "coming" Nazi Party, he agreed to apply for Party membership, considering his application a mere formality. In 1934 when Subject was in Palestine, he learned of his acceptance by the Party but did not participate in any Party activities, and was subsequently rebuked by the Auslandsorganization (coordinated branches of the Nazi Party formed outside of Germany and included Germans permanently or temporarily resident abroad) for his non-participation.

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On Subject's return to Germany in 1935, he was refused representation of a Middle East firm because he had failed to comply with Party directives. Through family contacts, Subject procured his Party membership book by paying the fees back to 1932. Subject left Germany for Switzerland and from there wrote letters to the deputy Party chief demanding an investigation. On his return to Germany in 1937, Subject was informed that he had been cleared (Subject claimed that this "clearance" came through a friend for whom he had done some favors in the Middle East). Subject was arrested in the winter of 1937/38 and again later in 1938 and was accused of pro-Jewish sympathies. In both instances, Subject was freed due to friends' intervention and payoffs by Subject. In 1939 Subject was told that he should accept the position of chief of intelligence ad interim in Romania if he wanted to protect himself. In April 1940, Subject became "Untersturmfuerher" (Company Commander) in the Schutz Staffel (SS), and two promotions were given him between then and early 1941. From 1939-February 1941 he was in Romania as chief of Party Security and Intelligence Service (SD) under Foreign Office cover. Subject got into serious trouble because of his disagreement with the Party on its policy toward the Romanian Iron Guard and several months later he was sent on an intelligence mission to Greece where he disputed the Party's automatic arrest policy. Subject was then relieved of his command and sent to Berlin. Through the influence of an SS General, he was assigned to intelligence work in Holland in August 1941 where he claims to have tried to establish a line with Portugal to make direct contact with Western intelligence. When the afore-mentioned SS General fell into disgrace, Subject was recalled to Berlin and was put under watch by the Gestapo. In September 1942, Subject was arrested by the Gestapo and remained under

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arrest until April 1943. He claimed that, during this time, it was discovered that he had never actually been an SS member and that his Party membership was "more than dubicus." Subject was then demoted and discharged from the SS. (Subject claimed that this was a face-saving move by the SS.) Subject stated that he was never in the pay of the SS or the Party and that both his Party and SS memberships were fraudulent, procured by bribery as self-protection both politically and materially. Subject claimed that he attempted to thwart Nazi alms from within. All Subject's identification and personal documents were confiscated upon his arrest and were never returned. j Subject later fled to Tyrol, Austria, where he worked in a resistance group. Subject reported for registration with the city magistrate of Salzburg, Austria, as an SS Hauptsturmfuerher, but, according to a decision of 9 February 1950, was exempted from registration because of his Austrian resistance activities, and his full civil rights were re-instated.

3. In a report dated 28 September 1953 from a source whose reliability can no longer be established, it was noted that subsequent to World War I Subject proceeded to the Near East where he engaged in business along with one fou BORMANN. The business was believed to have been concerned with construction materials and was located in Haifa, Palestine. It was also reported that in 1936, Subject acted as an SD agent. In 1937 Subject was expelled from Palestine by the British authorities, possibly on the basis of his intelligence activities for the German Government. Subject then proceeded to Berlin, Germany, and collaborated with the SD and the Abwehr offices, and later worked for the Foreign Affairs Department (AMT VI) of the German Security and Intelligence (RSHA) in Romania, Greece and Holland. After Subject's release in 1943, he went to Vienna, Austria, where he engaged in the direction of a firm known as PHARMACHEMIE, a medical supply

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establishment which was reportedly utilized by the Abwehr office in Vienna as a cover for its activities. At that time, Subject reportedly functioned as an agent of Section I-M of the Abwehr office, Vienna, and for the Navai Intelligence Section of the same Headquarters. The SS Officers list noted Subject as having been appointed an SS Hauptsturmfuebrer on 30 June 1941. After the cessation of hostilities, Subject was denounced by a source believed to be reliable, as a member, of the notorious SD Sonderkommando "EICHMANN."

- 4. From the end of 1945-1946 Subject worked for the United States Military Government in the area of southern Bavaria. From 1947-1954 Subject was employed in intelligence activities sponsored by this Agency, and at that time, this Agency was unaware of the extent of Subject's Nazi background.
- 5. Following the Israeli arrest of Adolf EICHMANN, this Office undertook a detailed examination of captured documents bearing on EICHMANN's activities, and, as a result, discovered that Subject had concealed most aspects of his Nazi Party membership and his RSHA activities. In the years prior to, and early in the War, Subject was a principal agent of the RSHA and was definitely working under EICHMANN's direction. It appears that by 1938 EICHMANN directed at least one or two specific phases of Subject's work. The records indicate that Subject's activity dealt with the manipulation of Jewish properties away from their owners in connection with remigration proceedings. As yet, nothing connects Subject with EICHMANN's more serious crimes and it is still unclear as to how far into the War years Subject's collaboration with EICHMANN extended. The most significant single fact revealed was that, at least in the years prior to the War. Subject was a principal agent of Department II, Section 112 of the RSHA.
- 6. Subject has been identified in two books on EICHMANN. Subject was mentioned in Toviah FRIEDMAN's book, The Hunter, as a principal agent of the "Jewish Department" and in Quentin REYNOLD's Minister of Death he was named as the assistant to the head of German intelligence in Palestine in 1937. The latter book ascribes to Subject

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the role of getting "acquainted with members of the Haganah (at that time, a Jewish underground organization) in hopes of finding some who would work with the Gestapo."



There is no indication that PASH ever had contact with Bishop Valerian Trifa and no indication in Trifa's file C PASH was a contact of or even known to Trifa. PASH was interested in the Russian Orthodox Church (ROC) in San Francisco, California, and in May 1971 he alerted this Agency, after his return to active Army duty, of his concern that the ROC was possibly penetrated by Soviet intelligence. You may wish to contact the FBI for further information on Subject. PASH was a military detailee of this Agency from 1951 to 1953 and returned to NAZI WAR CRIMES DISCLOSURE ACTIVE duty after that time.

B. Artur Adolf Konradi

KONRADI was a German intelligence chief in Romania from 1938 to 1940. The latest information on KONRADI was from the British Army Prisoner of War interrogators which indicated that in 1946 KONRADI was in Dusseldorf, Germany, address Finkenweg 46, Dusseldorf, Bissingheim. KONRADI was never contacted or debriefed by this Agency. There is no information on his German intelligence contacts in Romania.

C. Dr. Heinrich Graf Von Meran (Merna)

MERAN has been described as secretary of the German Legation and a German agent during World War II in France, Turkey, and Austria. The files reflect no post-1944 information or address, and therefore no indication whether MERAN is still living.

D. Otto brecht Alfred Von Bolshwing

As of this date we have surfaced two CI memoranda which we are prepared to make available to the Department of Justice via however, because this individual was involved in illegal activities, guidance from the Office of General Counsel is required. As we discussed in our meetings of 27 December 1978 and 18 January 1978, our files indicate that Von Bolschwing may not have been totally frank when he neglected to mention past membership in the Nazi Party on his Naturalization Application. According to his "Application to File Petition for Naturalization," dated 4 February 1959, at paragraph 13, he has never been a member of the Nazi Party. Our records, however, indicate that he may have been a member of the Nazi Party for several years, with the membership number of 984212. (S)

Von Bolschwing has commented in writing on this period, and his position seems to be that his Party membership was either erroneous or fraudulent, or both. Nevertheless, our records do indicate that he may have been a Party member, and this would in turn indicate that he may have violated Title 13 of the U.S. Code by failing to note this on his application. (S)

- 1. The attached letter to Martin Mendelsohn of the Justice Department Special Litigation Unit has been prepared for your signature. Because of the possible significance of this case, I felt you should be advised of the details. (U)
- 2. In July of 1978, Mr. Mendelsohn was considering using Von Bolschwing as a witness against Valerian Trifa in U.S. v. Trifa. Trifa is believed to be a Nazi war criminal who falsified his naturalization papers when he emigrated to the United States. Mendelsohn is instituting "quasi-criminal" denaturalization proceedings against him. Mendelsohn knew of Von Bolschwing's membership in the Nazi Party, but evidently felt he could be a useful witness. On 18 July 1978 Gene Thirolf of Mendelsohn's office wrote the Agency, requesting a name trace on a number of potential witnesses, including Von Bolschwing. (S)
- 3. The DDO search turned up the following information. Von Bolschwing worked for the U.S. Military Government from 1945-46 in southern Bavaria. He worked in intelligence activities sponsored by CIA from 1947-54. The U.S. Government at that time was not aware of the extent of his Nazi background. When Adolph Eichmann was arrested in 1960, and of CI/R&A discovered evidence in captured German documents indicating that Von Bolschwing had concealed the extent of his Nazi Party membership, and also his connections with Adolph Eichmann, from the U.S. Government. The Agency apparently became aware of these facts in 1961. (S)
- 4. Early in the war, Von Bolschwing had worked under Eichmann, evidently in connection with the confiscation of Jewish properties. There is no evidence that he was involved in Eichmann's more villainous activities. (S)

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WARNING NOTICE INTELLIGENCE SOURCES AND METHODS INVOLVED

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5. Throughout his association with the Agency, Von Bolschwing has described himself as an opportunistic businessman who acquired his Nazi Party membership and military position through bribery, fraud, extortion and family connections. He paints the picture of a man who has survived, and possibly prospered, by continually duping and victimizing the hapless Nazis and the oafish Gestapo, something along the lines of a "Hogan's Heroes" episode. He recounts how he had been continually warned and arrested by the Gestapo, only to be released through bribery and connections, all the while working to thwart Nazi aims from within. Although Von Bolschwing's story sounds a bit self-serving, the Agency apparently had no concrete information to contradict it until 1961, following the Eichmann arrest. (S)

- have to advise the Justice Department of Von Bolschwing's activities, and of their scope, and I did so in my letter of 2 February 1979 to Mr. Mendelsohn and in the meeting with Messrs. Mendelsohn, and Thirolf on 27 February 1979. At that meeting, Mendelsohn and Thirolf were given the details concerning Von Bolschwing's activities. The next day, Mendelsohn sent a letter formally requesting access to our records. (S)
- 7. It now appears that the Justice Department is viewing Von Bolschwing more as a defendant than a witness. In the event Von Bolschwing is prosecuted in the quasicriminal denaturalization proceedings, and his past relationship with the Agency becomes public knowledge, the Agency will likely be critized on three grounds:
 - (1) It is possible that the Agency either knew or should have known in 1947 of Von Bolschwing's Nazi activities from captured German documents;
 - (2) The Agency discovered in 1961 that Von Bolschwing had worked under Eichmann and had possibly falsified his naturalization papers, yet remained silent; and
 - (3) According to the Chief of CIA's Eastern Europe Division, in a memorandum dated 10 May 1961, Von Bolschwing "was assisted in his immigration and naturalization [in 1954 and 1959] by CIA..."



The obvious questions will then arise: Did the Agency know the full extent of Von Bolschwing's activities in 1947? Were captured German documents in Berlin concerning Von Bolschwing examined in 1947? If not, why not? If so, did they describe Von Bolschwing's activities? Why did the Agency remain silent in 1961 when Von Bolschwing's relationship with Eichmann was discovered? And what was the extent of Agency "assistance" to Von Bolschwing when he emigrated to the United States? Did the Agency encourage him to omit his Nazi Party membership from his application? Was a secret arrangement made with INS in 1959? (S)

- 8. We should also anticipate discussions with the Justice Department in the near future concerning the amount and nature of information that can be declassified for prosecution. Classified information that might be relevant to the case would include information relating to CIA liaison with INS, the identities of possible witnesses, and the text of CIA records on Von Bolschwing (which measure approximately two linear feet). (S)
- 9. The DDO will be advising the DCI of the situation in a DDO Spot Report. (S)

SUBJECT: Request from Department of Justice DATE: 12 March 1979 to review Operational Files on Otto Von Bolschwing

- 1. This is to inform you that on 1 March 1979 the General Counsel received a request from the Department of Justice to review certain operational files on Otto Von Bolschwing, a U.S. citizen of German origin who from 1947 to 1954 was engaged in intelligence activities in Vienna, Austria sponsored by this Agency. OGC has forwarded this request to the DDO. The request was in response to an earlier OGC memorandum to Justice Department, itself responding to a name trace and records search which noted that in Subject's "Application to File Petition for Naturalization," dated 4 February 1959 he neglected to mention his past membership in the Nazi Party. Justice wishes to review pertinent files to investigate possible violation of Title 18 of the U.S. Code by failing to note this on his application.
- 2. A cursory review of the operational files indicates that from the end of 1945-46, Subject worked for the United States Military Government in southern Bavaria. He was picked up by the Austrian Station in 1947 for whom he worked under Army cover until his immigration to the United States with Agency assistance. Whereas the Station was not aware of his Nazi Party membership at the time he was picked up, in 1949 at our request Von Bolschwing wrote his autobiography outlining the circumstances of his Nazi Party membership. A thorough analysis of the files will be required to determine if there is information in them that reveals why Subject did not report this at the time of naturalization proceedings. Information pertinent to Justice's interest will of course be provided for their review.
- 3. A copy of this report is being made available to the Assistant for Public Affairs in the event public attention is drawn to this case as a result of the current effort by the Justice Department and Congress to denaturalize some alleged Nazi war criminals. It should be emphasized that available information does not connect Subject with war crimes, but the possibility of adverse press treatment cannot be precluded.

SUBJECT: Otto Von Bolschwing - Research into Eichmann 201 File in Response to DOJ Request

The following files were searched in an effort to find captured German documents pertaining to Otto Von Bolschwing:

- Eichmann 201 file including bulky documents. document which refers to subject in Eichmann's 201 file is already in Von Bolschwing's file. The document is an undated (but presumably 1960) Memorandum for the Record concerning information retrieved from German documents as a result of the Eichmann case. There are six transmittal memoranda in an RJ series which forwarded captured German documents pertaining to Eichmann to the Israeli service: RJ's 1974, 1964, 1956, 2110, 2090 and 2913 - June-October 1960). Copies of the attachments are not in the files. In early 1978, the RJ files, which had been maintained by CI/ITG, were given to the Israeli Desk who screened them, incorporated documents found relevant into 201 files and destroyed the rest. The Israeli Desk has a microfiche record of all the RJ's but not of these particular It is possible that the attachments never went attachments. into the file in the first place. There is no indication of whether a copy was kept or not.
- Archives' files containing captured German documents had already been given to the IMS/FOIA, Privacy and Litigation Group in response to a previous request to CI Staff. Pertinent archives files were again retrieved, using a machine listing number of titles which CI Staff provided. Remaining archives files (which had not gone to National Archives) which were searched were a file of index cards which contained neither Eichmann's nor Von Bolschwing's name and a correspondence file from 1960-1972 which contained CI leads developed from captured German documents. The only reference in their file to either Eichmann or Von Bolschwing was the previously cited 1960 Memorandum for the Record.
- Complete traces were run on Eichmann and Archives' documents resulting were also searched. None had any information on Von Bolschwing.

After becoming a United States citizen, he had a wide-ranging business career. Former Nazi reportedly had U.S intelligence ties

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — A former Nazi SS captain who died this year after giving up his U.S. citizenship said in newly released documents that he worked for several U.S. intelligence agencies, the Sacramento Bee reported.

The documents, obtained by the newspaper through the Freedom of Information Act, also show that Otto von Bolschwing admitted in 1970, long after he was granted U.S. citizenship, that he had had thes with Adolf Eichmann, since executed for war crimes.

Von Bolschwing had been charged with concealing his Nazi Party membership when applying for U.S. citizen-

Von Bolschwing died March 7, 1982, at age 72. He had voluntarily given up his U.S. citizenship in an agreement under which he would not be deported as long as his health was bad. He suffered from stypra nuclear palsy, a rare and incurable brain disease.

Nazi-hunters in this country had accused him of war crimes, including the persecution and forced emigration of Jews, and encouraging the 1941 Iron Guard rebellion in Romania, during which Jews were killed.

But Von Bolschwing was not allowed to reply to the charges in public because the U.S. Department of Justice has obtained a court order sealing his answer — the government apparently feared revealing military secrets.

Von Bolschwing contended that he aided U.S. intelligence agencies during and after World War II. Justice Department documents carry testimony saying the Central Intelligence Agency had instructed him to keep secret his activities prior to applying for citizenship in 1945.

The Bee reported that it obtained a copy of an interrogation conducted on Dec. 22, 1970, in which Von Bolschwing admitted ties with the Nazi Party, the elite SS corps and Eichmann.

In the interrogation, he said he fell out of favor with the Nazis in 1942, was arrested by the Gestapo and held seven months without charges. Later he moved to Vienna where he acquired a small business.

After the July 1944 attempt on Adolf Hitler's life, a friend warned that he was to be arrested. Von Bolschwing said he fled to the Tyrol and hid in a mountain but in the Otz Valley until U.S. forces arrived.

After the war, Von Bolschwing said he worked for several U.S. intelligence agencies. He said he came to the United States in 1954 with his son Gus, now a San Francisco attorney.

In 1959, Von Bolschwing became a U.S. citizen, and started a career as a financial officer and consultant. His health began deteriorating during the 1970s.
