





MEDIUM BULBS measure ¾ inch to an inch or larger, mixed sizes. These Medium Bulbs bloom splendidly, though the large bulbs make still larger spikes and more of them. Medium Bulbs are designated by the letter "M".

SMALL BULBS are designated by the letter "S". They will average nearly half-inch in diameter. Not sold as blooming sizes.

NOTE: It will help us in filling your Glad bulb orders if you will mention the size each time: Large, Medium, Small, or just the letters L, M or S.

What Size Shall I Buy?

A Large bulb usually produces two spikes of blossoms, sometimes three. A Medium bulb will produce a splendid spike, maybe two. A Small bulb is not certain to bloom, but some will bloom, producing smaller spikes.

Medium and Small bulbs are especially valuable for producing new, vigorous bulbs and many bulblets. Large and Medium bulbs best for blooms.

Prices, Terms, Delivery

I prepay Glad orders amounting to \$1.00 or more. (Except at wholesale as noted.) If Glad order less than \$1.00, please add 15c toward packing and shipping cost.

Each item on your Glad order must amount to not less than 10c.

TERMS: Cash with order, or ¼ cash with order, balance C. O. D. Or send ¼ with order, and balance any time before we are ready to ship.

pay all postage or express charges, and guarantee safe delivery. (My choice, whether parcel post or express.)

If your express office is different from your mail address, please be SURE to give express office address also when ordering.

Please do not order in smaller quantities than listed. (5 or more bulbs at the 10 rate, but must amount to not less than 10c.)

All Glad prices are prepaid to you **EXCEPT** lists plainly marked **F. O. B. Boulder.** You pay transportation if ordered at F. O. B. rates.

Second Choice, Please Sooner or later some kinds and sizes of Glad bulbs will be sold out. Saves a lot of time and correspondence if you will kindly name a few varieties that we may send in case sold out any on your order. Or say if we may send another size. Or, if you wish, say we may send something good, our selection, from kinds we have yet in good supply.

How to Send Money

I prefer P. O. Money Orders but accept checks. Banks now charge us collection fee on checks, so please avoid, if convenient to you, sending checks for small amounts. For small amounts, stamps, coin or currency usually safe if sent in our strong return envelopes. Everything considered Money Orders best for us, and less risk for you.

If You Pay Transportation

As noted above, and elsewhere in the following pages, I prepay all but wholesale lots.

BUT, many customers have been much pleased with my special proposition in the past.

If the customer pays express on Glads priced prepaid I will send extra Glads to more than offset the express charges. I'll send extra bulbs of kinds on your order, or some good kinds, my selection, or maybe both.

If order part from wholesale list and part from prepaid lists, you will find it much to your advantage to do as many others have done. Just say, "Send all at my expense and add more Glads to COVER SENDING COSTS ON PREPAID ITEMS."

On good size orders express usually cheaper, as bulbs take a special second class rate by express.

But if you specify parcel post shipment and you pay carrying charges, then we ship C. O. D. for postage. Please do not send any money in such cases for postage or try to estimate it. Nor say you will remit for postage later. We keep no postage accounts. Either express, you pay express on arrival, or parcel post, the postage C. O. D.

Any Glads priced prepaid may be ordered f. o. b. Boulder, at the prepaid prices, but I then send you more than enough extra stock to offset the carrying charges. (Order should be \$3.00 or more to take advantage of this offer.)

Send list for price on the lot, if you care to, but only for good sized lots, not a list amounting to only a few dollars. I'll make you price f. o. b. Boulder on the list. Please state definitely the kinds, sizes and quantities of each wanted.

"Betty Co-Ed," though in the decorative class, is not small. Neither is it large. Many blossoms measure 4 inches or so.

The spike is taller than usually found in the decoratives. Not inclined to crook in hot weather as much as many varieties, but usually some gracefully curved spikes, which work in fine for vase and basket displays.

The color is light cream-pink, with deeper creamy throat, a combination highly prized among Glad fans and florists.

Betty is pleasing in the garden, but shows off best when brought indoors and placed in a vase or basket all by herself.

The point is, that instead of planting just a bulb or two of "Betty Co-Ed" you should plant this by the tens or hundreds—the more the merrier. To get a real eyeful of this lovely Glad, you should see it in masses, both in garden and as a cut flower.





Culture

The aster does best when brought to flower late in the season. It comes in after many other flowers have come and gone, and will bloom right up until rather heavy frosts. However, a succession is desirable, and can be had in several ways. By planting seed at intervals of several weeks from March indoors to last of May outdoors, you can prolong the aster season a number of weeks. Planting early and late varieties at the same time will also accomplish this to a considerable extent.

Wilt Resistant Strain of Asters

If you never have trouble with Aster wilt, then the regular strains, same we and other seedsmen have always sold, will be O. K. for your garden.

But there is an Aster wilt disease caused by a parasitic fungus. If this once gets into your soil it remains there indefinitely, causing ordinary strains to wilt and die, whereas the plants of wilt resistant strains will nearly all resist this disease.

This resistance is to wilt only, not to another disease known as Aster yellows, caused by leaf hoppers. No remedy for yellows except to grow the plants entirely protected with cheese cloth sides and cover.







Make Several Thinnings

You will have stronger plants and better "luck" if you thin your plants partially when they are very small, then take out some more when you are sure of having plenty that are strong and sturdy. Later you may find so many plants doing well that still more could be specified. If plants are close together hold be spared. If plants are close together, hold the soil down around the roots of the plant that is to be left, while you pull out others around it. Thus you will not disturb the root and weaken, maybe kill, the plant that is left.



Ranunculus Bulbs Nothing produces a brighter effect than a bed of Ranunculus. The flowers are wonderfully good for cutting also. Plants about a foot high with flowers two inches or so in diameter many of them. inches or so in diameter, many of them double, in a variety of bright and pleasing

The bulbs are even funnier in appearance than those of the Anemone. They look like dried up bird's feet and of no value whatever. You'd swear they would not grow, much less produce beautiful flowers. But just plant them out in the garden any time after the ground warms up and see them do their stuff. Set these little "crowfoot" bulbs about two inches deep, pressing them firmly in the soil. (The deep, pressing them firmly in the soil. (The "claws" are bottom of bulb.) Thrive best in partial shade.

Space the bulbs 5 or 6 inches apart. Just cultivate and water moderately. **Warning!** Too much water may cause failure. Keep soil moist but not very wet. Easy to grow. fall take up the bulbs, store in dry pla away from frost. Replant the next spring.

For the Lawn's Sake

Lawns may be started or old ones renewed or renovated any time from earliest spring to October.

New lawns should be thoroughly worked, leveled and allowed to settle, then leveled again. The more care before sowing the seed the better the results. Seed will wash to the low spots and make your lawn spotted. Sow about one part clover to three parts blue grass. Use not less than pound to 200 square feet.

Sow part the seed one way and then some more crosswise, so as to avoid streaks. Rake well before and after sowing. Water gently so often that soil never dries out until lawn is green. Clover comes quickly. Blue grass comes slowly but hangs on like grim death after gets a foothold. Clover draws nitrogen from the air and enriches the ground for itself and the blue grass.

Old lawns should be re-seeded and fertilized from time to time. Use only the purest seed. Never be afraid of sowing too much seed, nor too often. Dandelion and other weed seeds are blown or carried on to the lawn. Give the lawn a break by sowing good pure grass seed several times a season to compete with dandelion seed.

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

In the meantime, I've been scouting around, trying to find a running mate for Mastodon—some good new variety that has certain qualities lacking in the Mastodon. No variety is perfect, you know.

Have tried out a number of high priced, highly praised kinds, but discarded all to date except this new find, the "GEM."

It is neither fair nor practicable to say that this or any other variety is as good as the

this or any other variety is as good as the genuine Mastodon, for, as I've suggested, one variety excels in some points, another is better in some other ways.

Whether it's Mastodon, Gem, or any other variety, your success depends greatly on getting true stock, healthy plants well packed and safely delivered. That's what you get from me.—JD.

Now about this GEM strawberry. make as large plants as the Mastodon, but it's amazing how quickly the plants "take hold" after set out, and establish themselves, "ready for business."

They soon develop new leaves and begin sending out runners early. Very soon also they begin to bloom, and unless first blossoms are picked off, berries will begin to set early in

summer.

I think it's best to pinch off first crop or two of blooms of any everbearing kind. But one thing in favor of the "GEM" is that the plants thrive and forge ahead even if berries are allowed to mature early in the season.

I'd say that EARLINESS is one of the outstanding valuable points in favor of GEM. Had I the naming of the variety, I'd call it the "Early Gem."

The berries are large, though do not average quite so large as Mastodon. Some say the flavor is better. I think this is a matter of one's own taste, but it's good. Growers claim it stands up longer than Mastodon and can be shipped farther. All in all, it's well worth a place in your garden.

Here's my idea or suggestion. I think you should have BOTH Mastodon and Gem. Everbearers "stop and go." That is, they set a crop, then rest, then set another crop. GEM leads off ahead of Mastodon with first picking. After that the two are likely to work and rest at different times, thus insuring you a more uniform supply then either one variety could uniform supply than either one variety could.

Ordinarily, a new variety would sell at much higher prices than GEM can be priced this season. I might say that GEM is not new this year. It has been grown commercially in a large way several seasons, and plants were available last season, but at higher prices than Mastodon.

The reason I can offer GEM at such reasonable rates this spring is that the variety just naturally is a good kind to increase—makes runners and new plants freely. In addition, I was "lucky" last season in having all my strawberry plantings on sandy ground that is most favorable for making new plants, with splendid fibrous roots splendid fibrous roots.

After thinking it over, I decided to make just one scale of prices for BOTH MASTODON AND GEM plants. Furthermore, you can take part each of the two kinds to get the quantity prices.

Plants are put up in bundles of 25. So make up your order, for example: 25 of one kind and 75 of the other, or 50 of each kind, to get the 100 rate. Or, 150 of one kind and 250 of another to get the 400 rate, and so on.

Suggestions for Growing Everbearing Strawberries

Give your strawberries rich, well-fertilized ground. They are heavy feeders. Rich soil and lots of water are two main requirements. Frequent cultivation is also important. Ar-

tificial watering can be given either by run-

ning water along the rows or by overhead sprinkling. I can't see any particular difference in results if you are sure to give the plants a good soaking and often.

Strong Talk About Mild Onions

One thing I never do is to promise anyone that a certain onion is very mild. Some kinds naturally milder than others, but any likely to be hot. Depends a lot on how grown. If growth is rapid, with plenty of water, the onions will be milder than if plants stunted, growth slower, and water insufficient. Some customers report that they find Mountain Sweet Spanish milder than other kinds. But why a mild onion anyhow? If want something real mild, eat an egg plant, or mushroom.

In growing onions for market, use discretion. Don't grow too many of the Crystal White Wax produced from onion plants. They are fine, but the onions must be marketed soon after matured. 

Bear this in mind. The smooth varieties, like Alaska and Ameer, may be planted very early, even in February if soil permits. They seldom, if ever, rot in the cold wet ground. Because of this these kinds are valuable. They deliver the goods early. But the wrinkled kinds—Laxtonian, Gradus, Stridah, Alderman, etc.—in fact, all the others in my list, are sweeter and should be planted fairly early. Peas thrive best in the cooler early months of the season, and do not do very well from late plantings. Beans like hot weather but peas prefer it cooler. So plant liberally early in spring. Sow rather thick, using a pound to about 75 feet of row.





I know a good gardener who plants his melons, squash and cucumbers twice, whether they need it or not. First planting is made early. If escapes frost, he has an early start. But the second planting is in same rows, but made a week or so later. In case the first planting freezes off, the second one is there all ready to pop through, and comes on earlier than if the patch were replanted after frost. Cost of seed is a small item compared with results from early crop. If both lots escape frost, the late one is hoed out. Looks to me like a mighty good plan.


