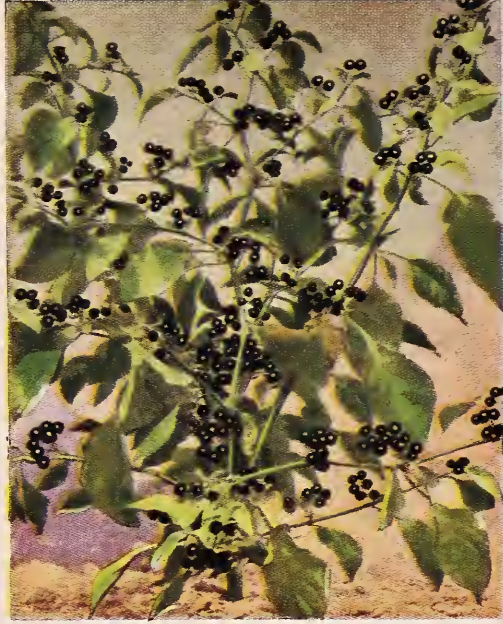

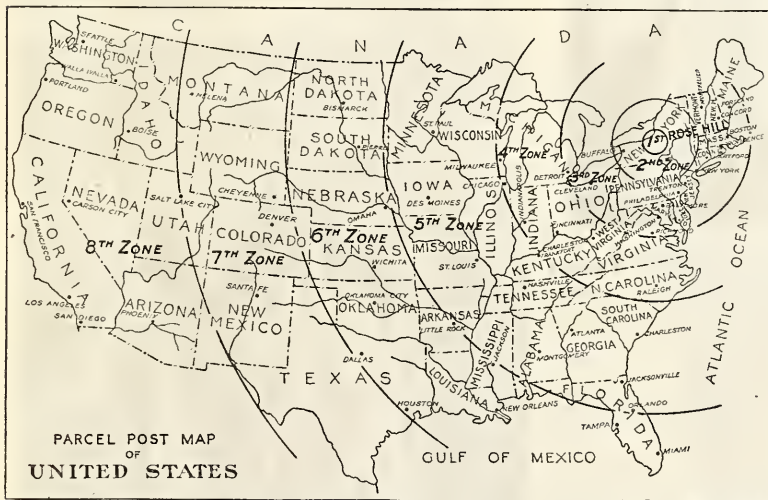

Notice I offer Beans by the half pound and pound, instead of by the pint and quart.

One-half pound equals about $\frac{1}{2}$ pint.
One pound equals about 1 pint.
Two pounds equals about 1 quart.
Fifteen pounds equals 1 peck.
Sixty pounds equals 1 bushel.

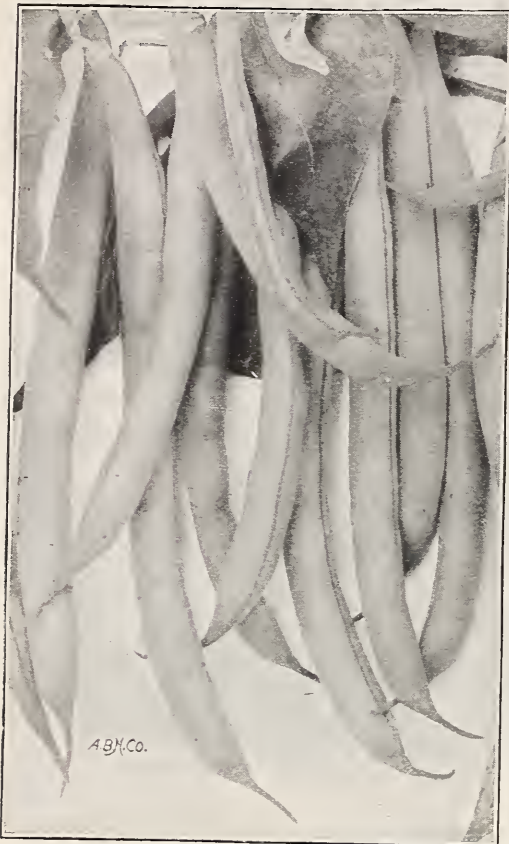

Remember the Lima Bean is a native of warm climates and requires warm weather to grow to perfection. They are sensitive to cold and moist weather and cannot be planted un'til after the ordinary snap beans.

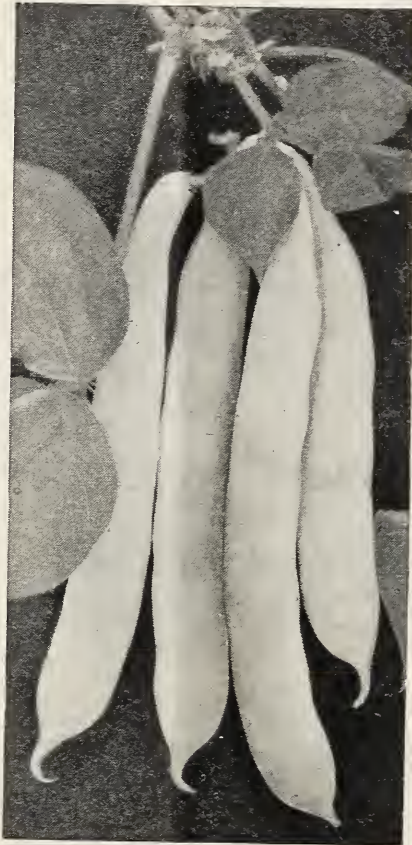

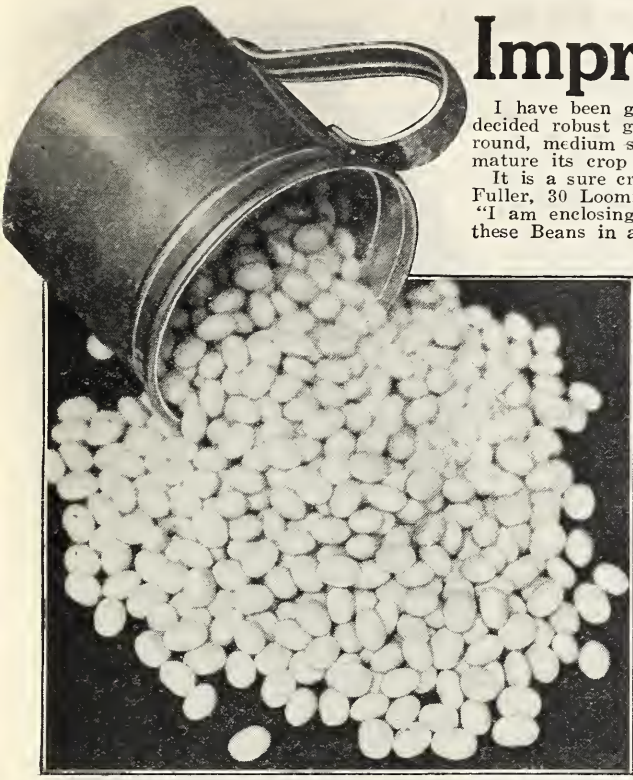
Improved 1200-to-1 Bean

See Front Cover

I have been growing this Bean for several years endeavoring to improve it each season. The plants are of decided robust growth branching freely, producing great quantities of pods in clusters well filled with nearly round, medium sized, pure white beans, of the best quality. It ripens very evenly and if given good cultivation will mature its crop in about 75 days.

It is a sure cropper and has made wonderful records. Read the report of one of my customers, Mr. Chas. H. Fuller, 30 Loomis St., Montpelier, Vt., as follows:

"I am enclosing a copy of a record I made of the 1200 to 1 Bean. From this you will see that I tried out these Beans in all kinds of soil. I did not put much labor or attention to all I planted but with a few hills I did, and got what I consider a big crop. If I had planted all of my 900 Beans (15 packets), in my best soil and then given them one-half the care I gave to other vegetable production I certainly would have gotten a tremendous yield of Beans.

On an average of about 2,250 square feet or about one-twentieth of an acre I planted 900 Beans (15 packets), which cost me \$1.00.

The fall season was very wet from continual rains and I had much difficulty in drying out my vines, but notwithstanding this handicap I had 4 bushels of Beans which is a yield of 80 bushels to the acre, 4,800 pounds which at quoted market price would return a net amount of \$528.00.

I have many other splendid reports on this Bean from all parts of the country, but do not have space here to print them.

This Bean when introduced was named 1,200 to 1—but this does not indicate or mean that all plants will produce such large yields, for the season, soil, time of planting, care, etc., has everything to do with production. Mr. Fuller produced 358 pods and 2,247 beans from 1 bean planted, see his report above.

Plant only 1 bean in a hill on soil not wet or too rich, or the vines will throw out tendrils and run too much to vine. Remember this is a shell bean for soup or baking and not a snap bean. Try it.

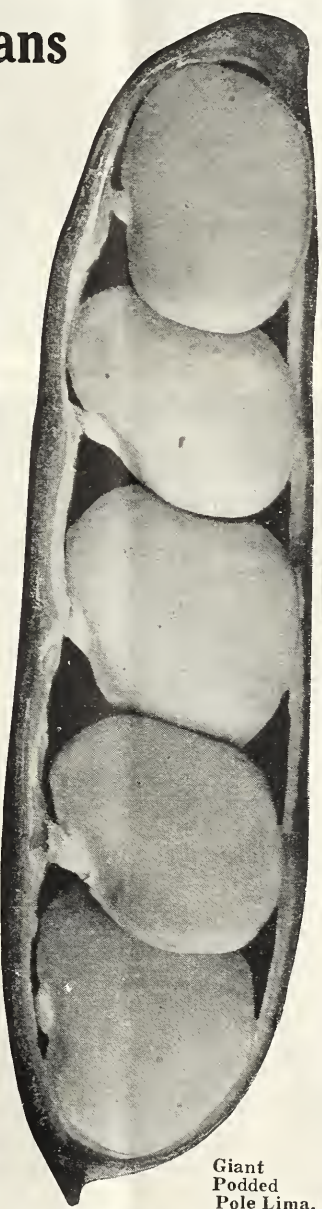

New Guinea Gourd Bean

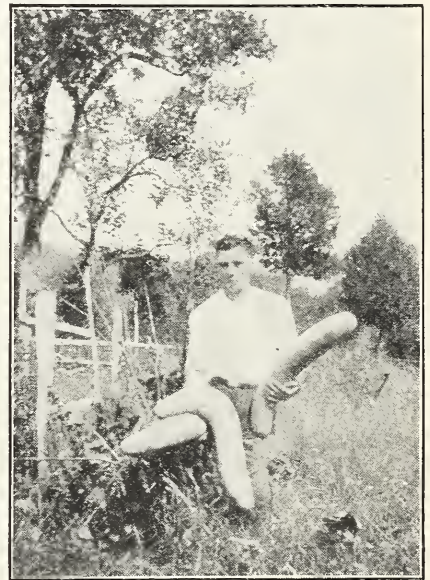
Weight 15 pounds or more each.

The vines will climb an arbor or any support to a height of 20 to 30 feet, or it will run a long on fences. Fruits grow from 3 to 4 feet in length and 4 to 6 inches in diameter. They are used in the same manner as Squashes and Egg Plant being sliced and fried.

One of my customers, Mr. Elmer Wills, sends me this photograph and writes as follows: "I enclose picture of myself and Gourd Beans, the three weighing 45 pounds, grown from seeds you sent me."

You should try this Bean for it is both useful and ornamental.

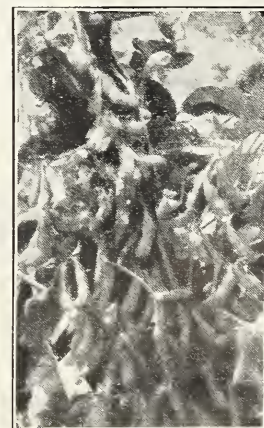

The Coffee or Soja Bean is a great yielder, and is easily grown in any ordinary garden soil where it usually grows very prolific. I believe it is worth trying and I have a limited quantity of seed stock to offer this season at attractive prices. It can be planted in May and cared for and harvested the same as other beans.

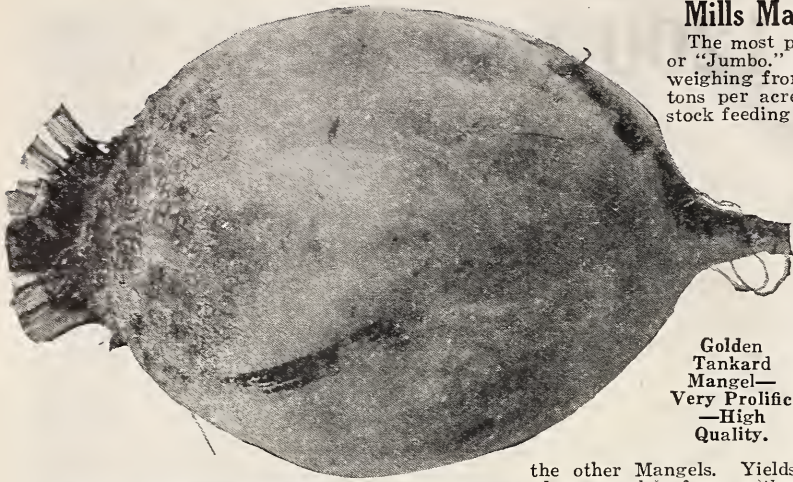
Coffee Bean.

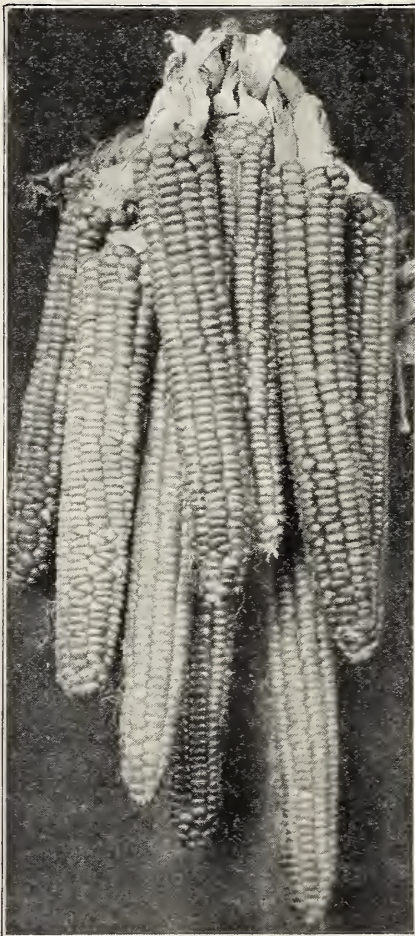

It grows quite tall and stools out from the roots, a single grain producing from 3 to 6 stalks, with large heads filled with round, plump, light colored seeds. It makes excellent feed for horses and cattle, and for chicken feed there is nothing better. A row of this corn will produce a great quantity of fodder and grain.

The meat is snow white, covered with a thin shell or skin of brown color. If planted in early spring a big crop of nuts may be expected in the fall. In the South they are much planted for feeding of hogs and poultry which do their own harvesting.

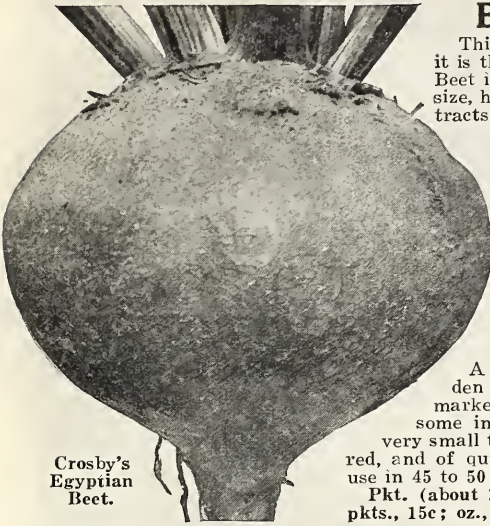

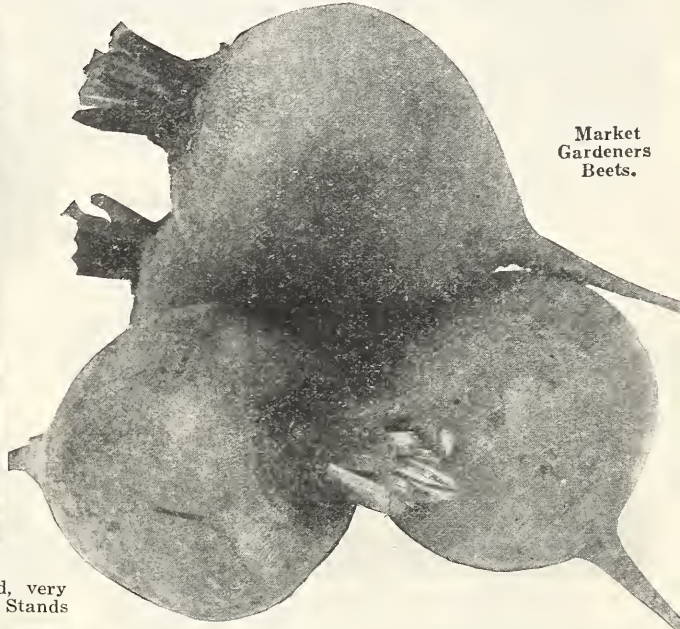
Early Pickling Blood Beet

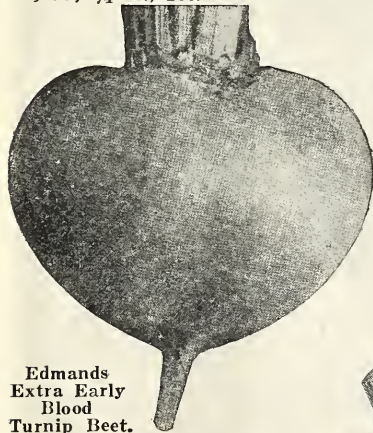

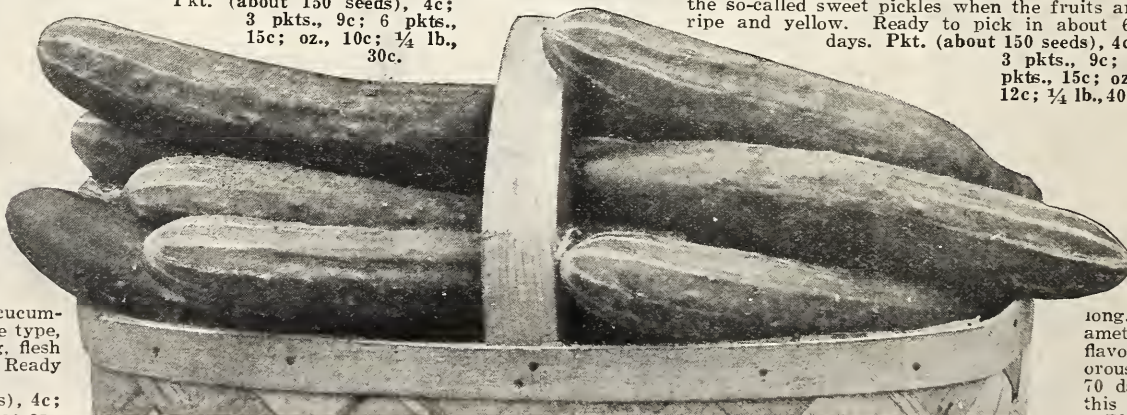

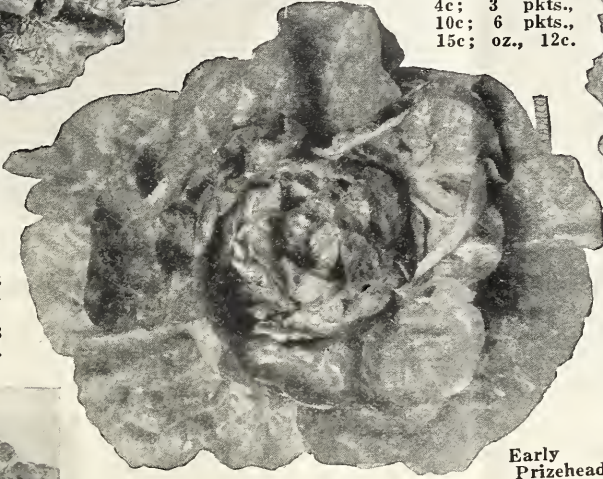

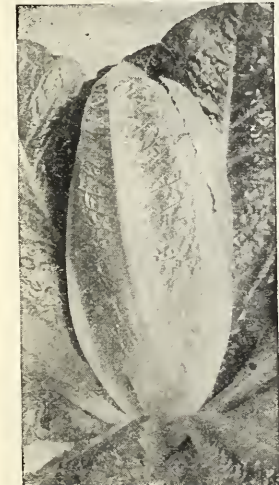

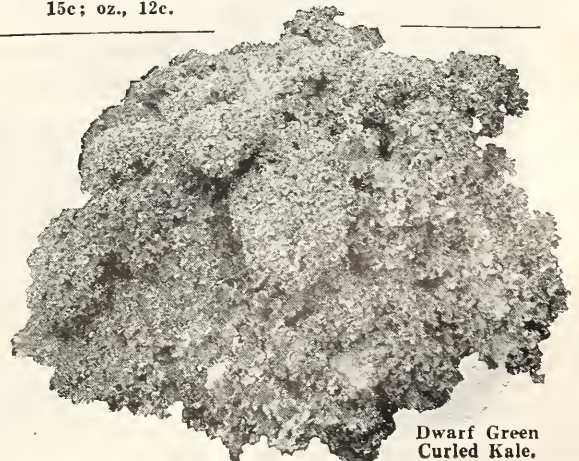

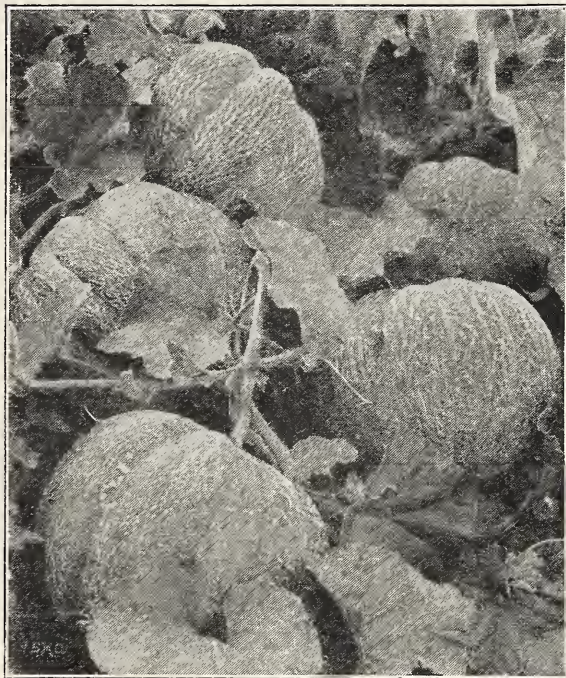

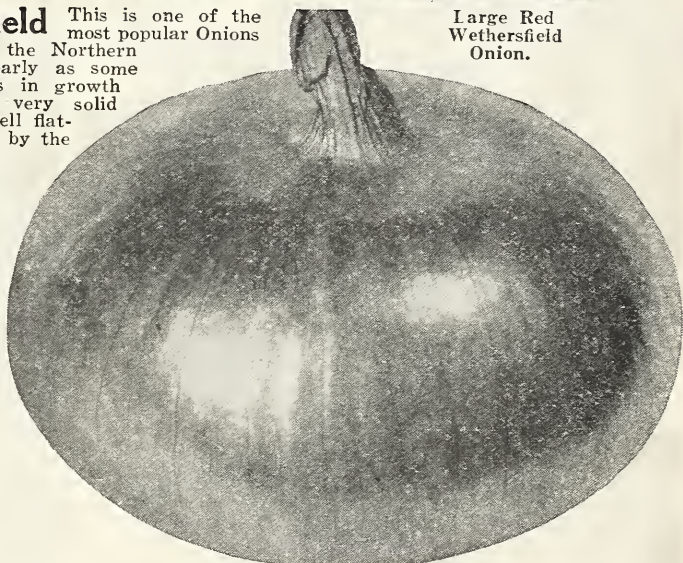

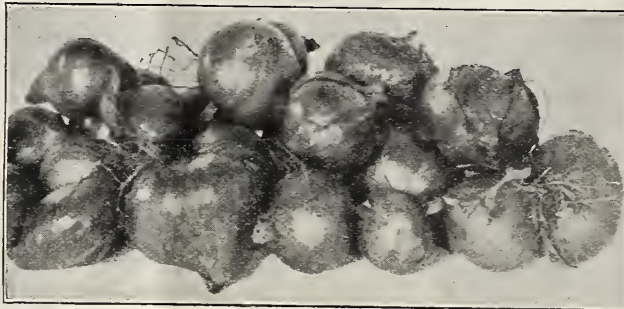

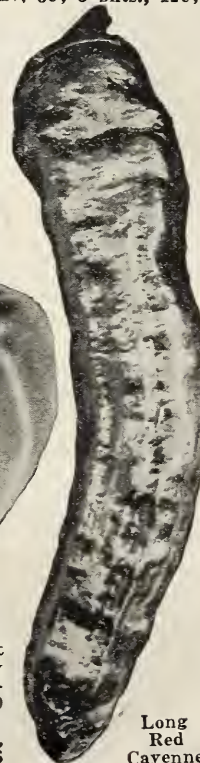

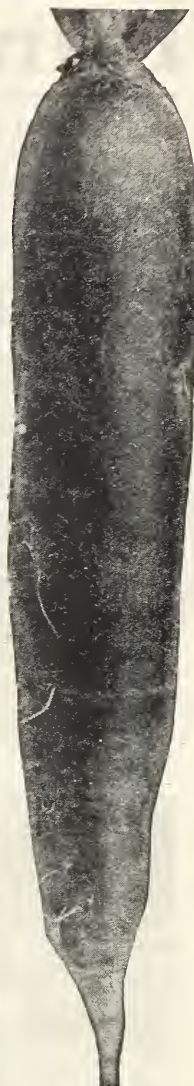

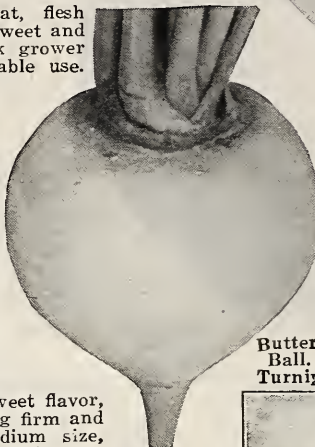

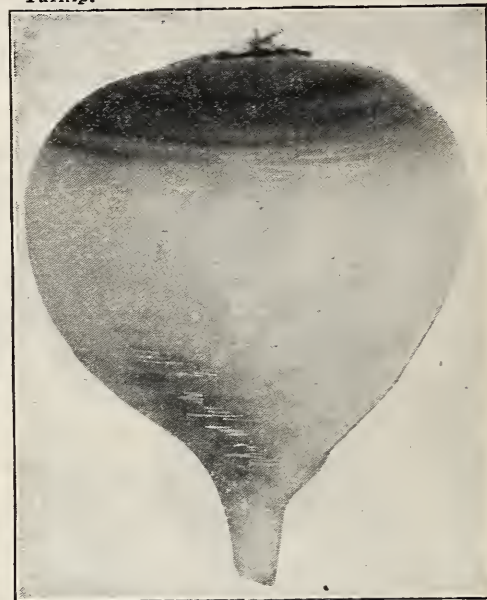

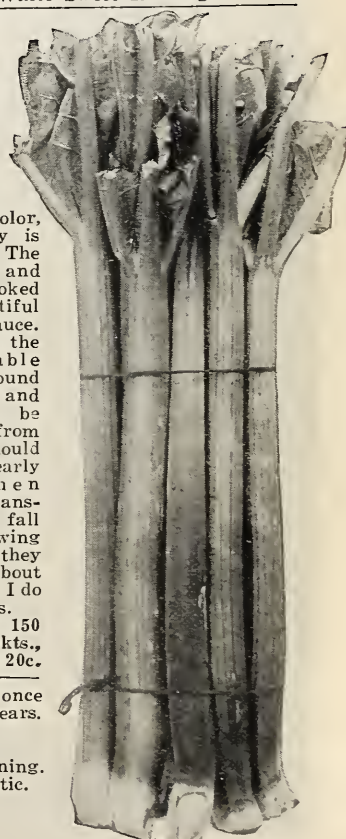

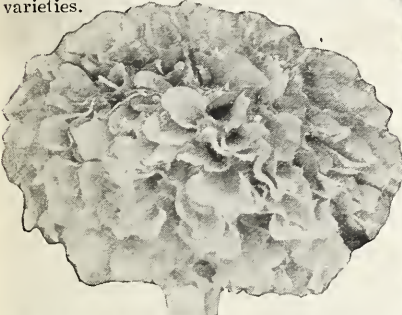
