INTRODUCTION

I herewith offer my new catalog for 1938, and I wish to draw your special attention to my new giant double Shasta Daisy "G. Marconi"; also to my new Petunia "Santa Barbara", which was highly favored by everybody who saw it this summer.

Our Amaryllis won first prize at the Amaryllis show which was held in conjunction with the Los Angeles County Fair at Pomona, California, September 23rd, and in spite of the very unfavorable weather conditions we were able to make a fine display of both the Everflowering Mammoth Hybrids and the Equestris Hybrids, both varieties taking first prize.

In January and February of this year we had two heavy freezes. Several times the thermometer went as low as 24, which is the lowest in temperature and the hardest freeze this section has experienced in 60 years, and some very peculiar things happened; for instance, some varieties of Pelargoniums were frozen down to the ground, while others growing alongside of them were unharmed. I made a great many crosses with the Pelargoniums, which is a very difficult task, inasmuch as it is almost impossible to get the seeds to ripen in this climate. In November, 1936, I planted about 500 of the seedlings from these crosses out in the open field and they were about 6 inches high when the heavy frost came. Pelargoniums had never been harmed before by frosts, so the young seedlings were not protected. The result was, I lost about half of them and I might have lost some of the finest, but among those that were left were some very outstanding ones, new colors and immense flowers, many of them having 12 to 15 flowers to the stem. Some of these outstanding varieties of Pelargoniums will be put on the market in 1938. Although we received many favorable comments on our Pelargoniums sent out three years ago, I will only name such varieties as are larger and better than those heretofore put on the market.

The nursery is open week days from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., but is

closed on Sundays and holidays.

Your past patronage has been appreciated, and I can assure you that any selection you make from this catalog will assist materially in making your garden an outstanding one for beauty and admiration.

Oxnard is situated midway between Los Angeles and Santa Barbara, in Ventura county, on the main line of the Southern Pacific Railroad and on the Roosevelt Coast Highway. It is a city of about 7000 people and has a temperate climate, averaging 70 degrees the year 'round. Oxnard is one of the nicest, cleanest little towns in California.

Canadian Customers—In accordance with the ruling governing the importation of Nursery Stock from the United States into Canada, it will be necessary to obtain a permit from the Secretary of the Destructive Insect and Pest Act Advisory Board, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and file same with the Collector of Customs before shipment can be cleared. Seeds are exempt from this ruling, and may be shipped into Canada without a permit. Gladiolus bulbs come under the classification of Nursery Stock.

This ruling must be complied with in order to make delivery and we ask you, in the event of an order, to secure this permit, advising us of the number of same, that we may mark it on the outside wrapper.

Prices: The prices quoted herein are our very lowest current prices. They cancel all previous quotations made either by letter or advertisements.

Guarantee: I exercise every care to ship only first-class stock but give no warranty, expressed or implied, and will not be in any way responsible for the results of planting or forcing of any seeds, bulbs, roots or tubers sent out by me.

To satisfy my customers in every way has been my first aim. Bulbs found not true to name should be retained by the customer and I shall replace number that are untrue, free of charge. No planting stock or bulblets will be included in this case. If you have any complaints to make about any stock received from me, please do not hesitate to do so and I shall correct any error. I do not consider our transaction complete until you are absolutely satisfied.

Postage: For airmail orders, add 12c for postage. Orders for plants and Amaryllis bulbs will be sent Express Collect.

Terms: Cash with Order. Remit by bank draft, express or postal money orders. Canadian customers please remit by postal money orders. Do not remit by personal checks. Positively no C. O. D. orders accepted.

Unused U. S. postage stamps accepted up to the amount of fifty cents.

Write your address plainly, as I had orders last year which I was unable to get into the hands of the purchaser. If your handwriting is poor, please print your address.

Order Early: All orders are filled promptly the day they come in or the day after. If you do not receive your order in two weeks, please notify us promptly as there have been occasions where people sent orders which we did not receive. In such a case please repeat the order so an immediate replacement of goods can be made.

Order your Petunia and Dahlia seeds or bulbs early as they might easily be damaged if carried around by the postman in zero weather and exposed to frost for hours.

Substitution: In the latter part of the season we may be out of some varieties, so please give your second choice. In case no substitution is desired please so advise in your order.

Packing: Through years of experience I have worked out the most satisfactory method of packing seeds and bulbs and there is very little possibility of damaging them in transit, either by frost or moisture.

NOTICE: Please keep this catalogue and read it over carefully. It contains answers to most of the questions usually asked me by customers. In the future when such questions are asked we shall refer customers to our catalogue. These inquiries usually come in during the busy season and it is almost impossible to answer them all.

AMARYLLIS

(Diener's Everflowering Mammoth Hybrids)

I have given quite a bit of my time to the development and improvement of Amaryllis. I have been able to produce large flowers, faster and healthier growing plants than have heretofore been obtainable. It has also been possible to develop these flowers to the point where they will bloom several times a year. You may contrast this with the older varieties which are slow growing and bloom but once a year.

Some years ago I found some of my seedlings had flowered not only in the period of February to May but again during the summer. These were used for further breeding, and the present stock has been entirely made up from those seedlings which had flowered more than once during the year. The next development was for size. This spring some of our blooms measured sixteen inches across the flower. Many of our bulbs are flowering as much as three and even four times a year. If you should be a visitor in our nursery any time during the year you may see Amaryllis in flower. The main flowering season is still from February to May. We have over 100,000 flowering sized bulbs growing, which continually develop the year round. These bulbs can be shipped any time during the year.

In cold climates where there are no greenhouses or facilities to keep them growing, the bulbs may be dried up in the fall and re-potted in good rich soil about the end of November or first part of December. They should then be put in a window where they may get some sunlight and be free from frost. By keeping them in a living-room of average warmth, they should flower during the winter within five or six weeks after planting. Our Amaryllis may be considered an entirely different strain from the average variety on the market. It grows faster, flowers more often and brings larger flowers.

Where the ground does not freeze, our Amaryllis may be planted in the open. It is best to plant them on the south side of the house, although they will grow in the shade of a tree where the climate generally is quite warm. Our variety differs from the pink or Belladonna variety (which grows with the bulb under the ground) in that our bulbs are above the ground with only the roots in the soil. A well-fertilized soil and plenty of water are essential in raising large flowers.

Few people realize that our Amaryllis are so easy to grow. They may be grown outside during the summer and taken indoors during the winter. It is a tremendous joy to flower lovers to bring into bloom during the winter an Amaryllis with a flower 8 to 10 inches in diameter.

Due to our large stock, we are in a position to make our prices especially low. Extra fine bulbs may be had for as little as one dollar each. There are many special fancy and rare varieties that sell at slightly higher prices.

The Equestris Hybrids are nearly the same size as the Mammoth Hybrids. Their colors run more to the various shades of pink and orange with some salmon and copper colors. All these colors may be found in the seeds. Bulbs of the copper and salmon shades are not available except during the months of March and April. At the present time our marked stock of these colors has been entirely exhausted, and it will not be until the spring flowering that we will again be in a position to set aside additional stock.

In seeds you will find the greatest variety of colors, and as my type grows much easier and flowers much earlier than the old types you can raise a bunch of seedlings with very little trouble. Under favorable conditions the seedlings will start flowering trom 15 to 20 months from sowing. At the Annual National Amaryllis show of the American Amaryllis Society, April 3, 1934, at Orlando, Florida, a few dozen flowers sent from here arrived in fair condition. They were awarded a first-class certificate and were a sensation of the show. I have some very outstanding specimens, but so far, with the exception of a few, I have not named any. All go into the seed mixture, so you will find the very best ones therein.

The Amaryllis Society held a flower show in conjunction with the Los Angeles County Fair at Pomona September 23, 1937, and both my Giant Mammoth Everflowering Hybrids and Equestris Hybrids took first prize. Many visitors were surprised to see such a display of large Amaryllis flowers at this time of the year, as the flowering season for most Amaryllis is during March and April. However, my hybrid Amaryllis flower several times during the year, so discard your old type of Amaryllis and get these new hybrids.

Directions for Planting: Cultivation is simple. Soil suitable for a geranium or fuchsia is right for them. They must have shade when under glass. When bulbs are larger it is necessary in planting that just the roots be placed in the ground, the whole bulbs must be above the ground. They should be watered only when the top soil is dry. Amaryllis should be kept under continual cultivation all the year, never rested or kept dry. Soil should be changed once a year. The nearer they are kept to 70 degrees at night the more they will flower. Bulbs will be sent by American Express, charges collect.

AMARYLLIS SEEDS

Directions for Sowing: Amaryllis seeds should be sown in boxes or seed pans (in greenhouse or hot bed) containing finely sifted sandy leaf mould to a thickness of three inches. Smooth out surface of soil evenly and sprinkle thoroughly. Spread seeds closely together (so close that they touch one another) and cover with the same soil, just sufficient to hold down. Keep moist but not too wet. If air is too dry cover with glass. In case of very hot sun, cover the glass with a sheet of paper in

order to prevent the heat from burning the young plants. Plants will come up in about three weeks and should remain in the same box for two or three months. Replant in three-inch pot or in boxes about two inches apart. Seedlings, when given the proper care, will commence to flower fifteen months after sowing. Seeds may be sown at any time of the year in a greenhouse.

These new Pelargoniums, all my own creations, are second and third generation crosses from Eastergreeting. The flowers are over twice larger than the Eastergreeting type and flower the whole year around, which makes them all the more valuable. The plants are of semi-dwarf growth and in flowering resemble Azaleas. For those who grow pot plants or for bedding these are very valuable and easy sellers in any size, as they flower from cuttings and keep on flowering continually.

Through the introduction of these new varieties Pelargoniums will take on a new popularity, as the colors and size are so unusual and appealing.

No. 1. SANTA MONICA.—La France pink with large, deep red spots in the center of two upper petals. Surrounded by rose pink. Single flowers are three inches in diameter. A beauty.

No. 2. DIENER'S GIANT.—Spinel pink. Two upper petals have large, blood red spots in center. Surrounded by rose pink. Single flowers four inches in diameter. A silver dollar will not cover a single flower petal. Unquestionably the largest Pelargonium in existence.

No. 3. RUTH W. McAFEE.—Begonia rose with salmon sheen. Deep red spots in center of two upper petals. Three inches in diameter. One of the most beautiful Pelargoniums.

This is my third order for seeds with which I have had unusual success; in particular I wish to speak of the Pepper Tomato. In a small way the seeds have been planted in hotbeds and from a surplus of plants in the first year (1935) I distributed a large number to my neighbors. Such was their success that last year, as early as March and April, I was asked by those who had tried the first transplanting to reserve sufficient quantities for their use. I had to limit the supply to meet all the demands. It proved to be an unusually dry and hot season with a severe, long drouth in July. I did not lose a single plant and we all had a bounteous yield. The red sandy soil of Cape Cod seems to be well adapted to vigorous growth of these vegetables. We did not dig our Gladiolus bulbs this year, and we will not have any for sale until business in this line justifies the handling of them, which it has not done for the last two years.

GLADIOLUS PRIMULINUS HYBRID SEEDS

This is a very fine mixture of Primulinus Hybrids which have been crossed with the large Gladiolus and many beautiful things will be found among them.

How to Sow Gladiolus Seeds—In the southern temperatures, where there is only light frost or none, the seeds should be sown out in the late fall, in rows in the open, one foot apart. The seeds should be covered with a half-inch of sandy soil, about the same as onions. Water them well and keep them free from weeds. Cultivate the soil once a month. Many will flower five months after sowing. In climates where there is a heavy frost, it is best to sow the seeds in boxes or hot beds, using good sandy leaf mould soil or three- to four-year-old manure in which to sow them. Take them up in the fall and handle like the regular size bulbs.

DIENER'S DELPHINIUM HYBRID **PERENNIALS**

"Dreams of Beauty"

These Delphinium have been favorites with our customers for many years. They have done well in the tropics as well as in Alaska and all over the United States. They are very hardy against fungus diseases and mildew affects them very little, as for years we have destroyed all plants that show any mildew. They are immensely free flowering; as soon as one set of stems has finished flowering, it is replaced with another set, and this is repeated during the whole growing season. The flowers are single, semi-double and double and the colors run from sky blue through all intermediate shades to the deepest indigo blue and many have pinkish frillings. All colorings are truly exquisite and the sizes of the single flowers are the very largest; they have willowy flexible stems with very long closely set spire-like spikes. The many testimonials, treely given to us, are enough proof of their popularity.


DELPHINIUM SULPHUREUM

(Hardy Perennial)

This large flowering canary yellow variety has flower spikes 3 to 4 feet tall and is a beautiful orchid-like Delphinium, easy growing. It dies down after flowering and forms a blackish-looking bulb in the ground. They need no water during the rest period. This variety produces very few seeds. Seeds offered here are of our 1937 raising. Sow out during the fall.

Directions for Sowing: Make a soil of leaf mould with a little sand and sift through a screen. Place this soil three inches deep in a box or bed and smooth the surface of the soil with a flat board. Then sprinkle the seeds over the surface and press them into the soil with the board. Do not cover with any soil or at least very lightly, not more than the thickness of the seeds, as they will not come up if too heavily covered. Moisten the soil with a fine sprinkler and cover the seed bed with burlap. Sprinkle the burlap two or three times each day to keep moist. Remove the burlap about eight to ten days after the seeds are up and keep the soil moist at all times. Under no condition should you use a fertilizer of any kind in this seed bed. Keep snails or slugs away by making a ring around the seed bed, with air-slacked lime. Keep the young seedlings shaded with cheesecloth.

For years I have raised the finest dahlia seeds that can be produced and many of the new varieties that are on the market now came from our seeds. I have given up the dahlia bulb sales as the demand has been so low. In the future we will list only the seeds of the fancy varieties.

Every seedling raised from these seeds is new and different as they never come the same as the parent plant, and if you have anything outstanding you may make a named variety out of it. However, in such a case one should raise the seedling three years and it must be faultless in every way. Everyone has some space where fifty to a hundred dahlia plants may be grown, and if you want some real fun watch a bunch of high-class dahlia seedlings coming into flower. One must have only the best seeds as there is a great quantity of trash on the market which brings mostly singles. Dahlia seedlings will flower a month earlier than from bulbs. Plant the seedlings at least three feet apart in both directions. In locations where heavy storms prevail place a three-foot stake at each seedling at time of planting.

We do not raise any cut flowers in dahlias; everything is grown for seeds only.

Seeds of the Chrysanthemum type are much thinner than the others and do not come as fast as the other types, so give them time, just keep the seed pans in a warm location as every seed of all varieties are hand selected. Every kernel will grow if handled right.

DIRECTIONS FOR SOWING DAHLIA SEEDS

Sandy leaf mould or any good garden soil should be used. Use a box or pan to sow the seeds into. Fill the receptacle 3 inches with soil. Smooth the surface over with a smooth board, then sprinkle seed over the soil and press into the ground. The seeds should be very lightly covered with the soil, in fact, it should be shaken over the seeds with a fine sieve. Put the seeds in a warm, moist place and see that the soil is not permitted to become dry.

Glass may be put over the flats to preserve the moisture. In this case, if the sun shines on them, they should be protected by a single sheet of paper over the glass. Otherwise, too great a heat will develop between glass and soil. Remove the paper at night and in dark weather.

It will be three months before all the seeds are up, which is natural with Dahlias. Some seeds come up in four days, while others take months. When they are up, take them out of the seed box inside of three days. To do this without interfering with the other seeds, use a sharp-pointed stick and drive it down into the soil next to each seedling and lift same up. Put each plant in a 3-inch pot; they can be kept back for two or three months or until ready to go into the open. Plant in the full sun and stake early.

Every seed is hand picked and will grow if handled correctly.

LEPTOSYNE MARITIMA

(Sea Dahlia)

PETUNIA SEEDS

Petunias are still one of my greatest specialties, and we spare no trouble or expense to give our customers the finest seeds possible. This year we have had long spells of damp, foggy weather, which made it very difficult to produce seed from some of the double varieties, and so the crop is light of some double varieties. Our new variety "Santa Barbara" is a giant Pink Gloria. I exhibited some flowering plants at the Pacific Coast Seed Men's Convention at Santa Barbara, and they certainly made a hit, and I am sure they will with you.

This year we had 120,000 plants in three-inch pots. This is an expensive method of handling, but insures a higher quality of seed. Some people are under the impression that every single seed should be true to description. The Petunia occasionally has the habit of reverting to the original type so that now and then a small purplish flower will be produced. Those reverting to the old type are usually the first to bloom. Let all the young plants come up before discarding them and you will find that the majority will be as described.

Petunia seeds, when sent to the Gulf States, Florida and States near the ocean, where warm, moist salt air is prevalent, should be sowed out soon after their arrival, as the seeds will soon lose their germinating quality in this atmosphere. This is the cause of many seed failures.



SOWING OF PETUNIA SEEDS

Prepare a seed bed by taking leaf mould soil which has been mixed with some clean, white sand (use positively no fertilizer in this soil when sowing). Sift this through a fine sieve into seed pans and flats within two inches from the top. Fill the remaining two inches at the top of the receptacle with boiling water and let the water seep through the soil and let the soil then stand for a day. This will have killed all weed seeds, worms and fungi contained in the soil. Smooth over the surface of the soil, but do not pack, as Petunia seeds will not grow in soil which has been packed. After the surface is smooth, sprinkle with fresh, cold water so that the soil will settle evenly. Sow the seeds over the top. If you are in a dry atmosphere, sprinkle a very little of this sterilized soil over the seeds. In damp climates no soil covering is needed, but a sprinkling of charcoal dust is good. Place a clean pane of glass over the flats or seed pans. If the sun strikes the glass, place over it a single sheet of newspaper. Always keep the seed bed moist, but not wet. Do not sow the seeds too closely, as they are to attain three or four leaves before transplanting. The glass should be removed as soon as the seeds have sprouted. The young plants should be transplanted as soon as possible into flats, spacing them one inch apart.

Petunia seeds should be sown out four months before they are marketable.

Petunia seeds sowed out in this sterilized soil will germinate 100% and the young plants will grow faster and be more vigorous. Also, you will not be bothered with weeds and fungi. These seeds are cleaned by a process where only the fertile kernels are selected. Ants will carry off the seeds if they have any access to same. Snails will eat the young seedlings—a great many in one night. For this reason seed boxes should be placed so that snails and ants are unable to reach them. Most of the loss of the seeds occurs in this way. We would suggest in this case that the seed box be placed on small blocks of wood, the blocks resting in jars or pans, the latter containing either oil or water. The ants or snails are unable to cross the oil or water, and so cannot reach the seeds.

If you have successfully raised Petunias from seeds before, use your own method. The above is given to those who are unacquainted with the handling of Petunia seeds.

HANDLING OF YOUNG PETUNIA PLANTS WHEN GROWING IN 3-INCH POTS FOR THE MARKET

In order to have large flowers and brilliant colors in three-inch pots, a good soil is absolutely essential for the young plants.

Following Are Directions for Preparing the Best Soil: It is best to use an even mixture of leaf mould and old, rotten manure (four or five years old or from the hot bed). However, if no old manure is available, leaf mould will do. To a cubic yard of soil add a four-inch pot of fresh Portland cement, a five-inch pot of bone meal, a five-inch pot of dried blood and a regular water pail full of white sand. After mixing all of these ingredients, in a dry condition, run them through a fine screen, It is best to let this soil lie in the open in the shade of a tree or at the north end of a building to ferment for at least three months before using, but which is not absolutely necessary.

Do not add anything else, as this is the best mixture for proper results. Do not use powdered sheep manure, chicken manure or fish meal, for these ingredients act as poison to Petunias. When transplanting, the young plants should be planted so that just the root part reaches into the soil. If poor soil is used, plants will be spindly, flowers small and colors bleached out. This has been the cause of many complaints in regard to the Petunias not being large. You cannot raise good plants in poor soil in three-inch pots. Many mistakes are made in that the seedlings are set too deep. It is very essential to be careful in transplanting so that only the roots are under the ground, as when planted too deep they take much longer to start growth and many will damp off.

My Petunias should not be pinched back when young, as they are naturally stocky and of dwarf growth, which I have accomplished by years of careful selection in that direction.

I receive thousands of questions from my customers every season in regard to growing and cultivating Petunias best, and as my time is continually taken up in my work, I have tried to cover the most important of them in this article. However, there is an excellent book on the market in which nearly all the questions which are asked me are clearly explained. The name of this book is Fritz Bahr's Commercial Floriculture, which you can obtain by sending to me. (See the book page at the end of catalogue.)



OUR WAY OF SOWING PETUNIA SEEDS



PETUNIA SEEDLINGS EIGHT DAYS AFTER SOWING

As the proper way in sowing Petunia seeds is the most essential part of their success, I am showing some photographs of how we handle them to get 100% germination. The pictures were taken eight days after sowing and the glass panes standing back of the boxes have just been removed. By sowing the seeds in rows as you see here we save transplanting as they are enabled to become large enough here to plant them at once in 3-inch pots and we are also able to stir the soil up between the rows. Boxes are 4 inches high, 24 inches long, and 16 inches wide. We cover the seeds with charcoal dust only.



GERBERA JAMESONI

(Diener's Hybrids) (Transvaal Daisy)

The sales of our Gerbera seed have been very pleasing, but the double strain has not produced enough seed to fill the orders that we had on hand, therefore we are filling the orders in rotation as fast as the seeds ripen.

The back cover of the present catalog is a reproduction in actual color of my Gerbera. The picture shows these flowers in about half their actual size. I predict that these new Gerberas will be in every garden in the near future. They are even successful in the far north where the temperature goes below zero. If they are covered just before the frosts start, with 12 to 15 inches of sawdust, pine needles, straw, or leaves, they will come through the winter in perfect shape. Many of our customers have reported that they were successful with this method last winter.

During the growing season Gerberas will stand plenty of water, more so than the old type. They should be in a location where there is good drainage so that the soil may not become water-logged. Where there is little or no rain, and irrigation is used, give them plenty of water. We have discovered that to bring the seeds up easily, when they are sowed in furrows, they should be covered with clean sand and no dirt. With this method of handling, the seeds come through easily. When dirt covering is used it is impossible to cover them evenly and many are smothered trying to get through. There is very little loss when a sand covering is used.

Directions for Sowing Gerbera Jamesoni: In those parts of the country where only light frosts are liable to occur, it is all right to sow Gerbera directly in the open, in rows one foot apart. Smooth the soil, then press the surface over with a flat board, then draw the rows with a pencil so that the furrow is not deeper than one-tourth inch. Drop the seeds into the furrows, about three seeds to an inch, and then cover with fine white sand, just enough to hold the seeds down. In using a sand covering every seed will come up easily and surely, while in the old way of covering with the same soil many seeds were smothered trying to get through. Water and cover with a frame made of cheese-cloth shading. A light shade is necessary to bring the seeds up quickly. Keep the soil just moist. They should be kept in the place where sown without transplanting for at least four months, then they should be planted in the open fifteen inches apart and in rows two feet apart. It is very essential in transplanting the plants that only the roots are in the ground, the heart must be even with the top of the ground. If they are planted too deep it is hard for them to do well.

When you raise the young plants under glass and you intend to plant them out in the open, you should put them in a cold frame for about two weeks and shade them with muslin or double thickness of cheese-cloth. In this way the plants will be well hardened off and will not be burned by the sun when put out in the open. As Gerberas make very long roots if they are raised under glass they are best raised in solid benches and not in pots. It is our experience that they do not do well in pots, meaning for flower raising. But if planted out like Carnations or Roses they will do fine. They should have plenty of light.

In regard to fertilizer, fresh manure is poison to Gerberas; the best thing we have found is Vigoro; this is a well-balanced fertilizer and it should be worked in between the plants, at the rate of two pounds to one hundred square feet outdoors. The effect of the Vigoro will be noticed in the deep green foliage and the rich colors of the flowers in about two or three weeks. Gerberas are perennials and the plants can be divided after two or three years. All seeds that we send out are perfectly fresh, as we harvest the seeds the year around, summer and winter. So you will always get fresh seed. Gerbera seeds that are over six months old are practically worthless, as they will not germinate.



Directions for Sowing: In order to get best results with sweet peas they should be soaked in water from eight to ten hours and then plant them immediately. When the plants are up place a wire netting directly behind them, about four or five feet tall, and train them over this. The seeds should be planted very shallow.

Directions for Planting Cucumbers in Greenhouse.—The best way to raise cucumbers in the greenhouse is to make a ground bed of horse manure three feet high, packed as hard as possible, which has been moistened well when packed. Put over this one foot of good, old rotten manure or hot bed soil with a little sand mixed together with the manure. Then plant one row of young cucumber plants, preferably from 3-inch pots, about four feet apart, two plants to the spot, the two being about six inches apart. (The two plants are planted together so that if something happens to one there is always another plant to fill in the space.) The vines should be run over wide meshed wire netting which should stand 45 degrees. The vines should not be tied so when the manure settles there should be plenty of play. Otherwise the plants would pull out of the soil.

If fresh horse manure is not available, leaf mould with plenty of cow manure mixed will do. It must be at least three feet high in the bed and the temperature never under 70 degrees at night.

In 1916 I first got what I had in mind, a good, large tomato from a cross of San Jose Canner and Trophy, which is the Diener tomato now and which is now raised, mostly on the coast for canning, on thousands of acres, as it has proved the most satisfactory tomato for canning and for ketchup, as well as tomato juice. One corporation raises over 6000 acres of the Diener tomato.

The Ventura tomato is a smaller tomato of regular market size, weighing from four to eight ounces. It is immensely free bearing, has very solid, perfectly formed fruit, and a very fine flavor. It is the best fungi-resisting tomato yet produced.

Directions for Planting: If you have just a small garden, raise a few tomatoes in small lots. It is best to train them up on eight-foot-high 2-inch stakes. Train just one shoot, cut all side shoots away and tie the main shoot with strong twine. Set the stake at least $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 feet in the ground so it will not fall over in heavy rains and wind. Place the stakes about three feet apart. Enrich the soil by fertilizing. Water once a week, but never over the leaves. Keep the leaves and flowers dry, as otherwise the flowers would drop off. Tomatoes should not be planted a second time in the same place until three years have elapsed. By this method you will be able to raise a quantity of fruit of the finest quality. The pepper tomato has a more spicy flavor and many of my customers prefer this variety.

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
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
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
