FOR BUSINESS GROUND AND THE CITY COUNCIL.—The city council after three months of hesitation and deliberations have at last resolved to purchase E. The order of the day being taken, on motion of Mr. Moles, to adjourn the salary of the word us of the bar to the future their compensation be \$50 in a week.

Mr. Schmidt moved that the city surveyor be requested to have repaired the bridge at the intersection of Customhouse and Basin streets—adopted.

On motion of Mr. Lee, Pedesclaux a pede's license gratis.

Mr. Moles moved that the ordinance prohibiting hawkers and peddlars from exposing their goods for sale within the city be put in force. Made the order of the day for the next sitting.

Mr. Schmidt moved that the sum of \$75 be accorded to Mr. Carter for his services upon the occasion of the late celebration in honor of the memory of Gen. Lafayette—referred to the committee of arrangements.

The council thereupon adjourned to meet next Saturday.

LETTERS FROM ENGLAND.—By the arrival this morning of the Liverpool packet ship Virginia, Captain Harris, which sailed on her regular day, Sunday the 5th ultmo, the Editor of the Evening Post have received copious files of news from Liverpool, and Provincial papers, to the latest date. It will be seen with pleasure that there had been an increased demand for cotton in the Liverpool market, and that extensive sales of full and steady prices had taken place.

The House of Commons, the subject of preventing drunkenness by legislative interference had been taken up in the example of the United States was referred to. ENGLAND.—

London, June 6.—We mentioned yesterday the arrival of Dr. Brown from Paris with the Ordinance, which occurs much in the English Journals. By that we understood that the profligate had been sent to Paris, and against importing cotton, which he had brought with him, said he.

It is well to place September 1st, Calm weather, on the part of the articles now admitted to the port, particularly in healthy state: the demand for Yarca, particularly is extensive at remunerating prices.

The import of all sorts of cotton to the port, since last October, has been 472,000 bales, worth \$66,000 received during the same time, and of American, separately.

The price of cotton is reduced from 35c to 16c per bale.

This is the beginning of a more liberal commercial intercourse between the two countries, which we hope to see much extended.

London, June 7.—It is clear the depreciatory tone adopted by Lord Grey towards the close of his speech in reply to the Earl of Wicklow, and the adoption of a policy of conciliation, in the House of Lords and Commons, that the English Ministers had lost the reins of the Conservative party, and that, whether in cases of local or general election, whether in that of the Warwick Election Bill, or of Ireland—the determination of the Tory Lords is that nothing shall be done which Ministers propose to do.

Lord Grey and his party have already avowed their fear of the House of Lords, and the property yielding to their wishes. The House will give the Minister plenty of opportunity of submission, but is this a position? it is any minister with a heart in his body to stand out?—Times.
