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

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PREFACE

In this fifth volume of the AMERICAN BIBLIOGRAPHY the literary record enters a period distinctively marked in character from what had been its prevailing characteristics up to this time. Heretofore the periods of growth into a national literature had been distinctively religious, and dominated by individuals, who impressed upon its character the stamp of their individuality, in the manner in which we are accustomed to measure the growth of all literatures by the dominant literary figure of its time. We now enter upon a period of a complete and radical change in its character, now distinctively political, in which the intellectual effort of the best minds in the Colonies sinks into the anonymity of hazardous political discussion, or into the work of governing bodies engaged in the common interests of a people in a cause for a vital principle of government. It is impossible for one to make a close study of the printed acts and works of these various governing bodies, whether in Committee, Legislature, or Congress, and not be impressed by the high principles and lofty spirit which animated the writers. They are not written in the heat of passion, but are evidently the work of calm, clear-headed, high-thinking men, who moved deliberately, weighed the consequences of each act, and after determining a line of conduct pursued it unflinchingly to the end. In the rapid growth of the Colonies from their small beginnings to their flourishing state in wealth and population, which the British government eyed only as a source of revenue for them to squander through a weak king, they saw the distinguishing hand of Heaven, and it impressed them with the belief that no design formed against them could prosper. Their whole aim, at first, was to obtain their object by peaceful retaliatory measures, and to prevent bloodshed; to oppose British pretensions on British principles; and they were prepared to thresh the questions at issue out in the public forum of political discussion.

The same fatality which led the British ministry to pass the Stamp-Act, led them to the passage of the Act for blocking up the harbor of Boston—an Act which knit the Colonies together into a closer bond than any previous event in their history. They realised their participation in events which should be considered equally culpable with Boston in the destruction of tea in December, 1773. Philadelphia had turned away from its harbor in January, 1774, the teaship sent there; New York had done the same in April; and October witnessed the firing of both ship and cargo in the harbor of Annapolis. Heretofore they had been Colonies with separate

interests, now they saw in the action of the British ministry only a revengeful measure which, unless resisted, might befall every seaport town in the Colonies, and they made the cause of Boston their own. This common feeling being well expressed in Virginia by an act, unprecedented in her history, setting apart the first of June, 1774, the date of the enactment of the Boston Port-Bill, as a day of public fasting, humiliation and prayer.

While the other Colonies were wondering what new form of ministerial arrogance was being prepared to force them into submission, New England, stunned by the blow which threatened to destroy its chief city and the centre of its learning, wealth and population during its development, reviewed their course during the one hundred and fifty years of colonization, and asked themselves the question, in what way had they changed that they should now be regarded by Great Britain as a conquered people upon whom tribute should be laid; and could not find in their Charters any provision which allowed them to be taxed without their consent, and none which treated of them as serfs upon a kingly estate. As the only episode in her history equal to the arbitrary action of the ministry. They reprinted Increase Mather's Narrative of the miseries of New-England, during the arbitrary government of Sir Edmund Andros, and recalled how this had been quickly ended by their petition to the good King George. Reprinted Elijah's mantle, in which the great end and interest New England should strive for was declared by four of its greatest ministers: Jonathan Mitchel, John Higginson, William Stoughton, and Increase Mather, in apostolic succession; and saw that, as a people, they had not wavered in their faith. Twice reprinted Thomas Prince's The Providences of God in 1746, which recalled the time when the best blood, and the treasure, of New England had been freely given to uphold the power of Great Britain in the French and Indian War; and which now did double duty in encouraging and animating the people to put their trust in God under the distresses of the rigorous execution of the Boston Port-Bill. They asked these questions of themselves and could find no answering reasons for the changed policy of the British government toward them. And, at this late day, one may still wonder in what way had the people of New England wandered from the straight, if narrow way, their leaders had marked out for them to follow from the first. When we compare the earliest printed document, The Oath of a free man, with another Oath taken by the freemen of New Hampshire in 1776, we find the same true ring in both: the same steadfastness in the truth as they saw the light; the same trust in God; the same personal honor and honesty with man.

When the tension in the Colonies had become strained almost to bursting out into open rebellion against the cruel edicts of the British ministry against the town of Boston, the needed relief from the strain came in the arrival of General Thomas Gage, who had been commissioned Governor of the Colony of Massachusetts Bay, as a fitting instrument to rigorously enforce them. The new Governor began his task by addressing to his constituents, in humble imitation of George the third when he ascended the throne, A Proclamation for the encouragement of piety, and virtue, and for preventing and punishing of vice, profanity and immorality. This pronunciamento was evidently intended more for the eyes of the king at St. James's than for the betterment of conditions in the Colony. It deceived noone; and the native sense of humor was quick to perceive its weaknesses. Trumbull, Freneau, and others of less poetical ability, made it the subject for their satire: parodied his aping of kingly manners; his assumption of superior virtue; his erroneous ideas of the moral condition of the inhabitants of the Colony he was sent to govern; and openly derided its real animus — the hidden sting in its tail, which was aimed at sedition. It made him a common target for wit and ridicule; and later, when he had fortified himself in Boston, and by his aggressive acts of actual warfare against the people he was sent to govern had precipitated hostilities which forever prevented a restoration of harmony between Great Britain and the PREFACE ix

Colonies, they formed a cordon around him, and by withholding all supplies, placed him in the ludicrous position of being himself shut up in the town he was sent to blockade, and from which he was only relieved by the arrival of General William Howe. It used to be customary in Massachusetts for elderly gentlemen to smile politely, and for school boys to openly grin, when the name of General Thomas Gage was mentioned; and, unless improved methods of teaching have banished the study of her glorious revolutionary history, they probably still do so there.

Following the plan of peaceful opposition, which had been successful in the agitation of the Stamp-Act, on the initiative of the House of Representatives of Massachusetts Bay, a General Congress of all the Colonies was called to meet at Philadelphia on the fifth of September, 1774, to take such action as would express the sentiments of the American Colonies on the measures instituted by the British government against them. In most of the Colonies who should represent them was determined by their known position upon public questions, which made the action of the representatives from twelve of the Colonies who met in General Congress on that day practically unanimous. As the result of their deliberations, they formed An Association, or solemn league and covenant not to import goods from Great Britain, and not to buy any goods which shall be imported from thence until their grievances were redressed, and framed A List of Grievances; formulated with the greatest ability and jndgment, a Bill of Rights; prepared An Address to the people of Great Britain; together with A Memorial to their fellow citizens in the British American Colonies; and An Address to the inhabitants of the Province of Quebec. In all this they acted with the same calm judgment and moderation, and pursued the same course which had formerly been successful, and which they now confidently believed would decide the issues in the interests of the Colonies. Never before, probably, were the actions of a deliberative body more anxiously awaited, or more cordially approved. The intensity of the general interest in their proceedings being shown by nearly every press in the Colonies printing the Extracts from the Votes and proceedings of the American Continental Congress.

The election for representatives in New York to attend the General Congress at Philadelphia, had been of its usual stormy nature, and foreshadowed a controversy in which, as in the Stamp-Act controversy, the friends of American liberty found arrayed against them an opposition made up of members of the Church of England. In fact, in its controversial phases, the struggle for civil liberty in the American Colonies assumes something of the nature of religious warfare, in which the dissenting churches are opposed by the established Church of England. This opposition, which was known as the tory element, embraced some men of distinguished ability in their callings who, while not numerous, were offensively active and had to be reckoned with. According to reports then current, on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean, this tory opposition, which centered in New York, and had for its means of expression the printing-office of James Rivington, was liberally subsidized from the secret service fund of the British government. The call for a General Congress precipitated a spirited controversy, which was carried on for the most part anonymously, for party spirit ran high, and was begun by Myles Cooper, then president of King's College who, under the signature of A North-American, issued through Rivington's press a pamphlet entitled: The American querist, in which he proposed, in the Socratic method, some questions relative to the present disputes between Great Britain and the American Colonies. It served the purpose of thoroughly exasperating the friends of American liberty, and was publicly burnt by the Sons of Liberty: according to the printer, in a second edition, because "it contained some queries which they cannot, and others they will not answer." The Congress having in the meanwhile met, Mr. Cooper followed his first venture into the field of controversy with an anonymous pamphlet, from Rivington's press, which was supposed to be written by, and was reprinted in London as the work of A. W. Farmer, of whom we shall presently treat, entitled:

A Friendly address to all reasonable Americans, on the subject of our political confusions, in which he pointed out the consequences which must necessarily follow violent opposition to the king's troops, and a general non-importation, in a way which the London Magazine considered very friendly to government, and inimical to the pretended American's brethren. To this Philip Livingston made a spirited reply, under the signature of A Citizen, in a pamphlet entitled: The Other side of the question: or a defence of the liberties of North America; as did also, anonymously, General Charles Lee, in a pamphlet, addressed to the people of America, entitled: Strictures on a pamphlet, entitled, a "Friendly address to all reasonable Americans," which was printed by Bradford's press in Philadelphia. To this, Henry Barry, an officer of the British army then stationed at Boston, replied, anonymously, through the press of John Howe, in a pamphlet entitled: The General attacked by a subaltern: or the Strictures on the Friendly address examined, in which a refutation of the principles advanced by General Lee was attempted. In a more personal manner, Jonathan Boucher, probably through Rivington's press, anonymously addressed A Letter from a Virginian, to the members of the Congress to be held at Philadelphia, on the first of September, 1774, in which he endeavored to dissuade the Congress from adopting non-importation and non-exportation agreements. In November, 1774, Rivington printed the first of a series of pamphlets which were signed A. W. Farmer, the initials being designed to convey the idea that they were written by a farmer of Westchester County in New York. These were later acknowledged to have been written by Samuel Seabury who, by Scotch ordination, afterwards became the first bishop of Connecticut. The first publication of the supposed farmer, addressed to farmers, and intended to arouse the unrelenting opposition of the agricultural class against the measures proposed by the Congress, is entitled: Free thoughts, on the proceedings of the Continental Congress, held at Philadelphia, Sept. 4, 1774; in it he proposed to exhibit their errors, confute their reasonings, lay open to the plainest understandings the fatal tendency of their non-importation and non-consumption measures, and to point out the only means for preserving and securing the present happy constitution. Alexander Hamilton, then a youth of seventeen years of age. directed public attention to his precocious ability by a reply to this, under the signature of A Friend to America, entitled: A Full vindication of the measures of the Congress, from the calumnies of their enemies, in which he designed to expose the sophistry, confute the cavils, detect the artifices, and ridicule the wit, of the supposed farmer, for the benefit of the farmers in New York in particular, and the inhabitants of America in general. Within two weeks Rivington printed the second of the supposed farmer's pamphlets, the salable quality of whose pseudonym he recognises by placing it upon the title page, entitled: The Congress canvassed: or, an examination into the conduct of the delegates at their grand convention, held in Philadelphia, Sept. 1, 1774. This he craftily addressed to the merchants of New York as in their interests. In December, Rivington printed a third pamphlet by the supposed farmer, intended as a reply to Alexander Hamilton, entitled: A View of the controversy between Great Britain and her Colonies, in which he included a mode for finally and effectually determining their present disputes, and preventing all future contentions. It is interesting to note the many different ways the clergy of the Church of England had for effectually settling the present and all future disputes between Great Britain and the Colonies. Besides those, like the above, modestly and diffidently advanced in the Colonies, the Reverend Dean of Gloucester also hesitatingly proposed five more different ways in one pamphlet, which was reprinted in Philadelphia; and, strangely, none of them was finally found to be the right way. In January, 1775, Rivington printed a fourth pamphlet by the supposed farmer, which gave no hint as to its authorship, but was afterward acknowledged by Samuel Seabury as his work, entitled: An Alarm to the Legislature of the Province of New-York, occasioned by the present political disturbances, in North America, which was addressed to the General

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Assembly, then in session, with the design of influencing legislation. Early in the year, Rivington also printed another anonymous attack upon the work of the Congress entitled: What think ye of the Congress now? in which an attempt was made to cloud the issues by an enquiry as to how far the Americans are bound to abide by, and execute the decisions of the Congress. This was written by the Reverend Thomas Bradbury Chandler, who had previously fostered the idea of an American episcopate. In it he incorporated, A Plan of a proposed union between Great Britain and the Colonies, which Joseph Galloway laid before the Congress and which they had so completely rejected as not even to give it a place in their proceedings. Galloway who had previously issued, anonymously, through Rivington's press, A Candid examination of the mutual claims of Great Britain, and the Colonies: with a plan of accomodation on constitutional principles, which the Monthly Review ascribed to the effects of illiberal motives, and unworthy passions, made the rejection of his plan an excuse for becoming a renegade to his country's cause in fact, as he had been before in heart. To the supposed farmer's third pamphlet, Alexander Hamilton made reply, under the signature of A Sincere Friend to America, in a pamphlet entitled: The Farmer refuted: or, a more impartial and comprehensive view of the dispute between Great Britain and the Colonies, intended as a further vindication of the Congress. Isaac Wilkins, who had issued through Rivington's press, under the signature of A Country Gentleman, Short advice to the Counties of New-York; and who was by many supposed to be the anonymous Westchester farmer, wrote a reply to Hamilton, the title of which was to be: The Republican dissected: or, the anatomy of an American whig, which was advertised by Rivington as in press in April, 1775. Besides those here enumerated, Rivington had been industriously making other anonymous additions to the tory issues of his press, some serious; some jocose, which have maintained their anonymity to the present day, and which were equally, if not more, offensive. The last sheet of A Reply to An Address to the author of A Candid examination, &c., which Joseph Galloway had written, was hardly off the press when, exasperated beyond endurance, the friends of American liberties could no longer forbear their resentment, and a party, headed by Isaac Sears, the leader of the Sons of Liberty in New York, raided the printing-office, destroyed the printed sheets and manuscript of Wilkins' work, and much more of the printer's property. Galloway's pamphlet was not published, by Hugh Gaine, until about a year after. Isaac Wilkins fled the country, a reward of one hundred pounds for his capture hastening his departure, and was thereafter a pensioner of the British government. Rivington, himself, was compelled to make public apology, and pledge to so conduct his press as not to give further offence; to sign the Association of non-importation, and declare his unalterable resolution rigidly to conform to its provisions; in addition to which he humbly entreated the pardon of those whom he had offended by his ill-judged publications, in four successive issues of his paper. Notwithstanding this abject submission to the will of the people, the political views of Rivington's New-York Gazetteer continued to give proof that it was published in the interests of the British government and not of the Colonies; color to which was given when the words "open and uninfluenced" were dropped from the heading. As the views of his paper became more and more obnoxious, the shafts of ridicule were directed against the printer by the satirists. On the 5th of November, 1775, some forty of his subscribers in Baltimore addressed to Rivington a printed circular ordering him not to send any more copies of his paper to them, and strongly intimating that if it was printed in Baltimore he would receive a coat of tar and feathers like the sample they enclosed. On the 27th of November, his printingoffice was again raided; this time the press was destroyed, and his types carried away and melted into bullets. Rivington left the city, for the pension which seems to have been awaiting all actively offensive tories in England, and when he returned upon the occupancy of the city by the British army, bore with him the somewhat empty honor of King's Printer for New York.

In December, 1774, there appeared in the Massachusetts Gazette: and Boston Post-boy, a series of seventeen political essays, extending in publication to April, 1775, under the signature of Massachusettensis, a Native of New England, addressed to the inhabitants of the Province of Massachusetts Bay, which attracted wide attention from the ingenuity of their arguments, and the brilliant and polished style of the writer. They took the side of the British government against the Colonies, and Rivington, who collected and published some of them in New York, gave them the title: The Origin of the American contest with Great-Britain, or the present political state of the Massachusetts-Bay in general, and the town of Boston in particular, exhibiting the rise and progress of the disordered state of that country. The anonymous author was long supposed to be Jonathan Sewall, the King's Attorney General for the Colony, but is now known to be Daniel Leonard. They called for reply from no ordinary mind, and John Adams, on his return from the Continental Congress at Philadelphia, undertook to answer and expose the misrepresentations and falacious reasonings contained in them, in a series of essays under the signature of Novanglus. It was an intellectual debate in which the combatants were well-matched; and so late as the year 1819, when both were reprinted together in Boston, the North American Review said: both are admirably adapted to their object, and cannot be read without emotion even now.

Events of great importance to the Colonies followed each other in quick succession during the year 1775. The battles of Lexington and Concord, in April, in which the British troops were the aggressors, were followed, in June, by that of Charlestown, at Bunker's Hill; in each of which the physically vanquished were the moral victors. With the aid of a chronological arrangement the stirring news can be followed from city to city, see it certified by the Committee of Correspondence in each place, and the clattering messenger speeding away southward until it reached the capitol of Virginia in eight days after the event. By the same agencies a constitutional post office service was established, by Benjamin Franklin, in opposition to the British post office system, which effectually cut off all government revenues from that source. In May, the Congress met for the second time and, in view of the alarming situation of public affairs, one of its first acts was to direct that Thursday, the twentieth of July, be observed by all the Colonies as a day of humiliation, fasting and prayer. The day was generally observed, and the occasion made memorable and lasting by many of the sermons being printed. On the sixth of July, they addressed A Declaration, setting forth the causes and necessity of their taking up arms, which was drawn up by John Dickinson; and followed this, two days later, by An Address, To the inhabitants of Great-Britain, prepared by Richard Henry Lee; and An Address, To the people of Ireland. The addresses were replied to in England by Mrs. Catharine Macaulay, in what was considered a masterly manner; and, anonymously, by John Lind; and by Sir John Dalrymple. The latter's performance being written, printed, and liberally distributed in Great Britain and America at the instance and expense of the British government; and was, according to the Monthly Review, well calculated by inflaming misrepresentations and invectives to aggravate the evils, and to exasperate the people of Great Britain against their brethren in America. That they did not represent the true public sentiment, or the business interests of Great Britain, is shown by the attitude of the cities of Bristol and London; and by a weekly series of political essays, modeled upon the more celebrated Letters of Junius, published from January, 1775, to June, 1776, entitled: The Crisis, which assailed the king, his court, and ministry, the Church, and the Parliament, for their stand against the American Colonies, with a boldness of denunciation, and an offensiveness of statements, far exceeding anything printed in the Colonies.

The unsettled conditions of government in the several Colonies also engaged the attention of the Congress, who advised that they consider their present governments abrogated by the hostile acts of Great Britain, and empowered them to call a full and free representation of the people,

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and establish such a form of government as will in their judgment best produce the happiness of the people, and secure peace and good order during the continuance of the disputes between Great Britain and the Colonies. In this, independence was only partially aimed at; but it appears that so early as August, 1775, it was currently reported in New York, that the Congress had passed a resolve that unless American grievances were redressed by the first of March, 1776, the Colonies would be declared free and independent of Great Britain; and so insistent had this rumor been that Henry Remsen, deputy chairman of the New York Committee, publicly denied it over his signature, and declared the report false and malicious and its author an enemy to his country. This attitude expressed the feeling of the small, conservative element, which was wellrepresented by the Reverend John J. Zubly of Georgia, composed of men who were willing to go with the public sentiment of their Colonies to any length short of absolute independence. In January, 1776, there was issued, anonymously, from the press of Robert Bell, in Philadelphia, a pamphlet entitled: Common sense, which was addressed to the inhabitants of America, on the subjects of government in general, and the English Constitution in particular; on monarchy and hereditary succession; and on the present state, and ability of America. Not promising subjects of popular interest, as we now regard them; but this work was so thoroughly in touch with the spirit of the times, and appeared so opportunely at the psychological moment when the public mind was in a receptive mood to its ideas,—the two chief essentials to popularity — that it was easily the most popular work issued in the American Colonies up to this time. Not less than twelve editions were printed, and the sales soon reached one hundred thousand copies. It advocated independency. And it crystalized a wavering and unsteady public sentiment into form; smoothed away difficulties; familiarised and accustomed the public mind to the idea; and gave the people the shibboleth of complete independence of Great Britain, as no other agency had done or promised to do. The Legislature of Pennsylvania voted its author five hundred pounds in appreciation of its value to the cause of American liberty. And it achieved for Thomas Paine a fame which will endure so long as the Republic lives. Its powerful effect upon the public mind was not underrated by the enemies to independency in any form; and there soon appeared from Bell's press, under the signature of Candidus, a reply, entitled: Plain truth, also addressed to the inhabitants of America, wherein its author endeavored to show that American independence was illusory, ruinous and impracticable; that America had no such real powers; and that reconciliation with Great Britain was the only safe, honorable and expedient course. The authorship has been attributed to various persons, and is here given to the Reverend William Smith, D. D. It was written with such outrageous zeal, and contained so many scurrilous reflections upon the favorers of American independence, as to defeat its own object; and drew from the Monthly Review the statement that a government of the tyrannical nature some have chosen to represent the Congress would not have permitted its publication if they aimed at separation. The Reverend Charles Inglis, also a clergyman of the Church of England, issued from the press of James Humphreys, junior, of Philadelphia, under the signature of Au American, a pamphlet entitled: The True interest of America impartially stated, in certain strictures on a pamphlet entitled Common sense. And Rusticus, the well-known pseudonym of John Dickinson, replied with some of his old fire to William Smith, in Remarks on a pamphlet entitled Plain truth, which was printed by John Dunlap.

Convinced, by the hostile action of the king and his ministry in withdrawing from the Colonies the protection of the crown; denying their right, and rejecting with contempt their Petition for a redress of grievances; and allowing no alternative short of abject submission; that any further endeavors to restore peace and security under British rule would be useless, the Congress then determined upon independence, by declaring the United Colonies free and inde-

pendent States. This plan had been proposed to the Congress by the Virginia Convention held May 15, 1776; and it was fitting that the honor of formulating their determination should be given to a representative from that Colony, and Thomas Jefferson, one of the ablest of the younger members of the Congress, was given this task. In Congress, July 4, 1776, was promulgated A Declaration by the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress assembled,—greatest of human documents, reverenced by its friends, admired by its foes, ever written by man. This divinely inspired document has all the majestic flow of utterance, sublimity of thought and expression, grandeur and breadth of a great epic. Time has only added to its greatness as its world-wide influences have become more and more apparent in the destinies of nations. This important step taken, the Congress strengthened their determination with the Articles of confederation and perpetual union, between the States.

The scarcity of paper for writing and printing during the revolutionary period occasioned great inconvenience in all the Colonies. In some of them the newspapers and other periodical publications were forced to suspend, and others were reduced in size, from this cause. Legislative action was required to secure for the paper mills in operation the necessary materials for paper-making; and the newspapers generally contained the printer's offer of cash for rags, which were an interchangeable commodity at the mills for paper. The need of linen cloth in the hospital service of the armies, made the use of coarser grades a necessity, and the paper generally made at the mills was of a poor quality. Even in Pennsylvania, where paper mills were most numerous, the paper was of so poor a quality as to make reading difficult and at this day sometimes uncertain. The entire country depended for its supply of paper at this time upon about ten paper mills in Pennsylvania - one, at least, of them manufacturing a good grade of paper from which the Congress obtained its supply; one mill at Norwich, Connecticut, where a superior quality of paper was manufactured; one mill at Providence, Rhode Island; and four mills at Milton, Massachusetts; with such stocks of paper, principally in New York, and Charleston, as were on hand when non-importation began. The needs of the Congress, and of the different State governments, in a time when so much depended upon united action, were, necessarily, first to be considered. And, in the general distress from this cause, the printed broadside and the broadsheet became the prevailing form of literature for governments, communities and individuals, as the pamphlet had been in previous periods. Few large works were undertaken. The pamphlet literature largely related to the political relations between the two countries, or to means and ways of defence. The almanac maker suffering most at the hands of the paper dealer; such issues as have escaped the destroying hand of time being neither creditable to the industry, or to the art. Frequently several qualities and colors of paper would be used in the same work. The public, and the publisher, accepting the inevitable necessity in the spirit voiced by Robert Bell, of Philadelphia, who pasted in every copy of his Additions to William Smith's Plain truth, a slip of coarse blue-tinted paper, on which a third of the work was printed this explanation: To every purchaser. The impossibility of obtaining white, constituted the law of necessity, for part of these Additions to appear in blue. The philosopher reacheth beyond outward appearances.— The patriot surmounteth every difficulty. And the bookseller industriously attempteth business agreeable to the prescriptions and decrees of the British and American laws of freedom concerning the liberty of the press.

In this connection it may not be amiss to take up with the student of bibliography the question of an exact description for the various forms used in the issues from the printing press—a subject upon which there is a total absence of such essential information in all manuals of bibliography and library economy, and a confusing variation of opinion on technical points in works of more general information. There are five of these forms, in order, Broadside, Broad-

sheet, Tract, Pamphlet, and Book; and the questions at issue are what constitutes each of them, and what is the essential difference between them, bibliographically. The single sheet of paper upon which the matter is imposed furnishes the basis for the description without regard to the size, or to the manner, whether in one, two, or more columns, in which the printed matter is displayed. First, the Broadside. If the printed matter is on the recto, or face, of an unfolded sheet, only, it is, bibliographically, a broadside, in folio, quarto, octavo, or sixteenmo size, as the printed sheet of paper may be. The proclamation, sheet calendar, hand bill, advertisement, and political squib, whose design is to be posted up for general information, are all of this description. Second, the Broadsheet. If the printed matter overruns the recto of an unfolded sheet, and the verso is also printed upon, it then becomes a broadsheet, and is bibliographically described as consisting of pp. (2), folio, quarto, octavo, or whatever size the single sheet of paper may be. The circular letter, and short political address, belong to this description. Dictionaries and encyclopædias make the two terms, broadside and broadsheet, synonymous: bibliographically they are not, being differentiated in the manner stated. Third, the Tract. If the single sheet is imposed in pages, and the printed matter begins and ends on a single sheet, without regard to the number of pages the sheet is folded into, it is a tract, generically from the Latin tractatus, and its bibliographical description, in extreme, is: pp. 4, if in folio; pp. 8, if in quarto; pp. 16, if in octavo; pp. 32, if in sixteenmo. In other words, the number of leaves in a tract never exceed its size in fold; and it has no signatures. Fourth, the Pamphlet. If the printed matter requires two sheets folded into pages it is then a pamphlet, probably from the French, par un filet - held together by a thread; or, palme feuillet - leaves held in the hand. Briefly, a pamphlet consists of from two to five printed and folded sheets stitched together. The rule being that a pamphlet does not exceed five printed sheets when folded in octavo. This ruling gives to a pamphlet, in extreme, twenty pages when printed in folio; forty pages when printed in quarto; and eighty pages when printed in octavo. After which it ceases to be a pamphlet, and is then a Contrary to the usually accepted belief, binding does not make the book - the four forms noted do not lose their original characters, bibliographically, when bound.
