1. On 4 March, General LAI, MING TANG, CINC, Combined Services Forces, Republic of China and party visited the Chu Lai area. The General received a short brief on the organization, capability, and combat operations of MAG-36 from Colonel ARMSTRONG.

2. On 9 March, Lieutenant General KRULAK and party visited the Chu Lai area on an inspection visit. General KRULAK toured the Task Force X-Ray, MAG-12, and MAG-13 areas.

PART II - NARRATIVE SUMMARY

A. During the month of March 1967, MAG-36 provided continuous helicopter support for the III Marine Amphibious Force, the Second Republic of Korea Marine Corps Brigade, and I Corps Republic of Vietnam Forces. Although monsoon rains and low ceilings significantly reduced flight operations during the first part of the month, Group aircraft nonetheless flew a monthly total of 6221.3 hours, carried 19,790 troops/passengers and 3178.3 tons of cargo. In addition, MAG-36 aircraft, provided "round the clock" medical service, evacuating 1063 wounded or sick patients.

B. During the month of March 1967, MAG-36 aircraft participated in the following operations.

In addition, MAG-36 supplemented MAG-16 in their operational commitments in the northern TAOR.

C. MAG-36 aircraft reported 209 fire incidents during the month and 45 aircraft were hit by enemy fire. Eight (8) aircrewmembers were wounded in the action during the month.

D. There were 17 incidents involving downed MAG-36 helicopters.

1. Late on the afternoon of 1 March, a UH-34D helicopter from HMM-362 received multiple hits from enemy fire while attempting to accomplish an emergency medical evacuation mission in an area six (6) nautical miles southeast of Chu Lai. Due to the intense and accurate enemy fire, the pilot waved-off to prevent being shot down. The pilot then "nursed" his crippled aircraft to a secure U. S. Marine position 4,000 meters away. After an air strike by fixed wing aircraft and numerous strafing and rocket runs by the armed UH-1E's, another UH-34D from HMM-362 picked up the wounded U. S. Marines. The next day the damaged UH-34D was repaired by a squadron maintenance team and flown to Ky Ha.

2. On 3 March, one (1) CH-46A aircraft from HMM-165 received intense enemy fire and was substantially damaged during landing while on a classified mission. Four (4) other aircraft of the total nine (9) CH-46's and four (4) UH-1E's participating in the operation were also hit by enemy fire. Due to poor weather conditions and the location of the downed aircraft, recovery could not be attempted and after the guns and radios were removed, the aircraft was destroyed.

3. On 6 March, a UH-34D from HMM-362 received intense enemy automatic weapons fire while accomplishing an emergency medical evacuation mission in the NUI DANG area. After the aircraft departed the pick-up zone and was flying at 300 feet beneath the overcast, in the rain, enroute to the LSA at NUI DANG, it was hit by enemy fire. One round penetrated the pilot's front windshield and struck the pilot in his armor chest protector. Fortunately, the armor stopped the round and the pilot received only minor injuries. Other rounds hit the aircraft in the fuel cells causing the aircraft to rapidly lose fuel. The aircraft just reached the secure zone at the LSA before running out of fuel. The next day a squadron maintenance team was flown to the scene to repair the aircraft. After the temporary repairs, the aircraft was flown back to Ky Ha.

4. On 10 March, a UH-34D from HMM-362 had an engine failure while on an administration/liaison mission five (5) nautical miles southeast of Chu Lai. The pilot made a successful autorotation into a field 300 meters from a U. S. Marine base camp perimeter. The pilot made an excellent landing and there was no damage to the aircraft or injury to the crew. An LVT was used to tow the aircraft into the secure perimeter of the U. S. Marine position and the aircraft remained there overnight. The next day the aircraft was prepared for an external pick-up and was carried intact to Ky Ha by a CH-53 helicopter.

5. On 11 March, a UH-34D from HMM-362 received enemy automatic weapons fire while on a medical evacuation mission into a pick-up zone 500 meters from the U. S. Marine outpost on NUI DANG. As the aircraft approached the zone, it received enemy fire and two hits in the engine compartment. The aircraft continued to fly and the pilot quickly headed for the secure LSA zone at NUI DANG where he made a forced landing. A squadron maintenance team was flown to the scene and after completing repairs the next day, the aircraft was flown back to Ky Ha.

6. On 13 March, a CH-46A helicopter from HMM-262 had hydraulic control problems while carrying external loads from an LST that was operating off the coast of NUI DANG. The pilot made a precautionary landing on the mid-deck loading position on the LST. The LST then cruised North to KY HA carrying the "crippled" CH-46A. Upon arrival in the KY HA area, a squadron maintenance team went by boat to the LST to check-out and repair the aircraft. Late that night, the aircraft was repaired and flown from the ship to KY HA.

7. On 13 March, a CH-46A aircraft from HMM-262 experienced aft transmission difficulties while re-supplying the NUI DANG area. During the flight, the aft transmission chip detector light illuminated and the pilot made a precautionary landing in the secure LSA zone at NUI DANG. A squadron maintenance team was flown to the scene and a maintenance check revealed that the aircraft would require an aft transmission change.

The next day, the transmission change was completed and the aircraft was flown back to KY HA.

8. On 14 March, a UH-34D from HMM-362 received intense enemy automatic weapons fire while accomplishing an emergency medical evacuation pick-up in an area 3,000 meters West of NUI DANG LSA. As the aircraft was sitting in the zone waiting to load the MEDEVAC, an enemy position nearby directed automatic weapons fire at the aircraft. Before the MEDEVAC was loaded and the aircraft could get airborne, it had been hit 16 times by enemy fire. Fortunately, the emergency MEDEVAC was picked-up and the aircraft, though substantially damaged, was still flyable and made it back to the secure LSA zone. The gunner received minor shrapnel wounds. A squadron maintenance team was flown to the LSA the next day. After considerable temporary repairs, the aircraft was flown back to KY HA for further repairs.

9. On 15 March, a UH-1E medical evacuation helicopter from VMO-6 was hit by enemy fire while attempting to pick-up wounded U. S. Marines from an insecure zone 6 nautical miles Southeast of Chu Lai. After the UH-1E landed in the zone, it received a critical hit in an engine oil line. Since the friendly troops were pinned down by enemy fire and could not get the "MEDEVACS" to the helicopter, the pilot quickly took off to prevent being shot down. The pilot quickly headed for a secure U. S. Marine base camp area 2,000 meters North and made a forced landing in the secure LZ. A squadron maintenance team was flown to the scene of the downed UH-1E. That afternoon, repairs were completed and the UH-1E was flown back to KY HA. After numerous air strikes on the enemy positions, another MAG-36 "MEDEVAC" helicopter landed and picked up the wounded U. S. Marines.

10. Late in the afternoon of 16 March, one UH-34D helicopter from HMM-362 received intense enemy automatic weapons fire while accomplishing an emergency medical evacuation mission in an area 3,000 meters West of the U. S. Marine outpost of NUI DANG. As the aircraft approached the zone to pick-up the wounded U. S. Marines, it received enemy fire. While sitting in the landing zone, the helicopter was fired upon from enemy positions and on departure from the LZ, enemy fire was again received. All told the helicopter was hit 5 times by the enemy fire and one medical evacuation patient was wounded again from one enemy round that hit the aircraft on take-off. The pilot "nursed" his crippled aircraft back to the secure LSA zone at NUI DANG. A squadron maintenance team was flown to the area and the next day repair work was completed and the aircraft flown to KY HA.

11. On 16 March, one OH-46A helicopter from HMM-262 had a rotor brake failure and associated hydraulic leak while on a NUI DANG re-supply mission. The pilot shut-down in the NUI DANG LSA for repairs. The next morning a squadron maintenance team was flown to the area and after "on-the-spot" repairs, the aircraft was flown back to KY HA.

12. On 19 March, one UH-34D helicopter from HMM-362 had an engine failure while attempting to re-supply a U. S. Marine position 1,500 meters

North of the ISA at NUI DANG. The pilot guided the aircraft to a crash landing within the perimeter of the U. S. Marine positions. The aircraft hit hard, striking a large dirt mound and rolled over on its side. Fortunately, no crew members were seriously injured, but one U. S. Marine in the landing zone was seriously injured by the shattered rotor blades. The aircraft received "strike" damage. A squadron maintenance team partially disassembled the aircraft and a few days later a CH-53 picked up the hulk and returned it to KY HA.

13. On 20 March, two CH-46A helicopters from HMM-262 received intense enemy fire while attempting to insert a U. S. Marine reconnaissance patrol in an area 8,000 meters West of NUI DANG. After a fixed-wing air preparation of the small one plane zone, the lead aircraft, with 2 UH-1E gunships escorts, made his approach. As the lead aircraft touched down in the zone, the aircraft was hit by enemy fire. The aircraft received 8 hits; the crew-chief was wounded, 1 passenger was killed, and 5 passengers were wounded. The pilot quickly lifted out of the zone to prevent being shot down, and "nursed" his crippled aircraft back to the secure ISA zone at NUI DANG. That afternoon, a squadron maintenance team was flown to the ISA to repair the aircraft. Late that day, sufficient, temporary repairs were completed to enable the aircraft to be flown back to KY HA.

14. On 21 March, one CH-46A aircraft from HMM-262 had engine difficulties at QUANG NGAI AIRFIELD while on a logistics re-supply mission. The pilot could not get the number 2 engine on the aircraft functioning properly so shut down at the airfield and requested a squadron maintenance team to check the engine. A squadron maintenance team was flown to the airfield and a check of the engine revealed that an engine change would be required. The next day a new engine was installed and the aircraft was flown back to KY HA.

15. On 24 March, a UH-34D from HMM-362, while on a convoy escort made an emergency medevac pick up. The aircraft returned to Marble Mountain and was in a down status due to engine and rotor overspeed which occurred in order to lift the medevacs from the zone. The aircraft was inspected by a maintenance crew and returned to KY HA on 25 March.

16. On 26 March, four CH-46A aircraft from HMM-262 launched on the Bald Eagle mission to insert a company size reaction force where a Med-Cap team had been over-run and all Americans killed. 8 Marines and one Navy Doctor, all KIA, were Medevaced to Bravo Med.

17. On 27 March, two UH-1E gunships from WMO-6 discovered numerous VC hiding in a lake while on a Sniper Recon mission. The gunships delivered 6,000 rounds of 7.62 and 19 2.75 rockets which accounted for 25 confirmed VC KIA and 4 VC prisoners captured.

18. On 29 March, a UH-34D from HMM-362 was hit. One round entered the left center fuel cell and exited through the transmission. The other aircraft in the flight had an engine chip detector light and remained at NUI DANG.

The following day a maintenance crew was dispatched for necessary repairs and the aircraft was returned to KY HA.

19. On 30 March, one CH-46A from HMM-165 and one UH-34D from HMM-362 launched from NUI DANG at 1745 on an emergency medevac. The CH-46A encountered intense automatic weapons fire on the approach to the landing and while in the pick up zone. The aircraft received 7 hits and the gunner and corpsman were both wounded by enemy fire. The rounds penetrated the fuselage in several places and one round shattered the #2 aft control boost actuator. The aircraft was flown back to NUI DANG with the medevacs aboard. The crew was returned to KY HA and the wounded treated at 1st Med Bn. A maintenance crew was flown to NUI DANG the following day, repairs were made and the aircraft returned to KY HA.

PART III - SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

A. When not heavily engaged in combat operations, MAG-36 helicopters flew medical civic action personnel to CU LAC RE island located 25 nautical miles East of ME BA.

1. On 11 March, MAG-36 civic action personnel visited the island. Medical personnel treated 70 children, 5 men, and 25 women. Two (2) patients were evacuated to "D" Co, 1st Medical Battalion for surgery. In addition, 200 bars of soap and 100 blankets were distributed to Popular Forces personnel and needy villagers on the island. The Protestant Chaplain delivered one ton of lumber to the island for use in the World Alliance Mission Building Project. MAG-36 civic action personnel also paid a goodwill visit to the local officials.

2. On 18 March, MAG-36 civic action personnel again visited the island. More than 100 island inhabitants were treated by MAG-36 medical and dental personnel. Four (4) patients were evacuated to "D" Co, 1st Medical Battalion for surgery. In addition, 4,000 "TU-DO" newspapers were distributed to the island inhabitants.

3. On 26 March, MAG-36 civic action personnel again visited CU LAC RE island. MAG-36 "MEDCAP" personnel treated 7 male patients, 25 female patients and 43 children. In addition, 15 dental patients were treated. The island chief was given 36 care tool kits for distribution to local boatbuilders and carpenters. Six (6) tool kits each were given to the Protestant and Catholic missions on the island. Eleven (11) children were given 3 hours of language instruction and 50 pounds of soap were distributed to island inhabitants.

4. On 27 March, Colonel ARMSTRONG (Nailfile 6) was awarded the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Silver Star at the Quang Ngai ARVN Headquarters by the Chief of Staff of the 2nd ARVN Division.

5. On 29 March, Colonel ARMSTRONG was relieved as Commanding Officer of Marine Aircraft Group 36 by Colonel O. S. TOSDAL. Colonel ARMSTRONG will report to the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing for reassignment as Commanding Officer of Marine Wing Support Group 17.

6. On 29 March, at the change of command ceremony, Brig General KIM, CG of the 2nd ROK Marine Brigade awarded Colonel Armstrong a Letter of Appreciation for outstanding service during the period 24 August 1966 to 26 March 1967. The citation noted in particular MAG-36 Support of Operations Lee, Dragon Eye, Trabong, Seine, Estuary, Giant Dragon and other operations which contributed to the efforts of peace in Vietnam and strengthened ties of friendship between the Republic of Korea and the United States of America.

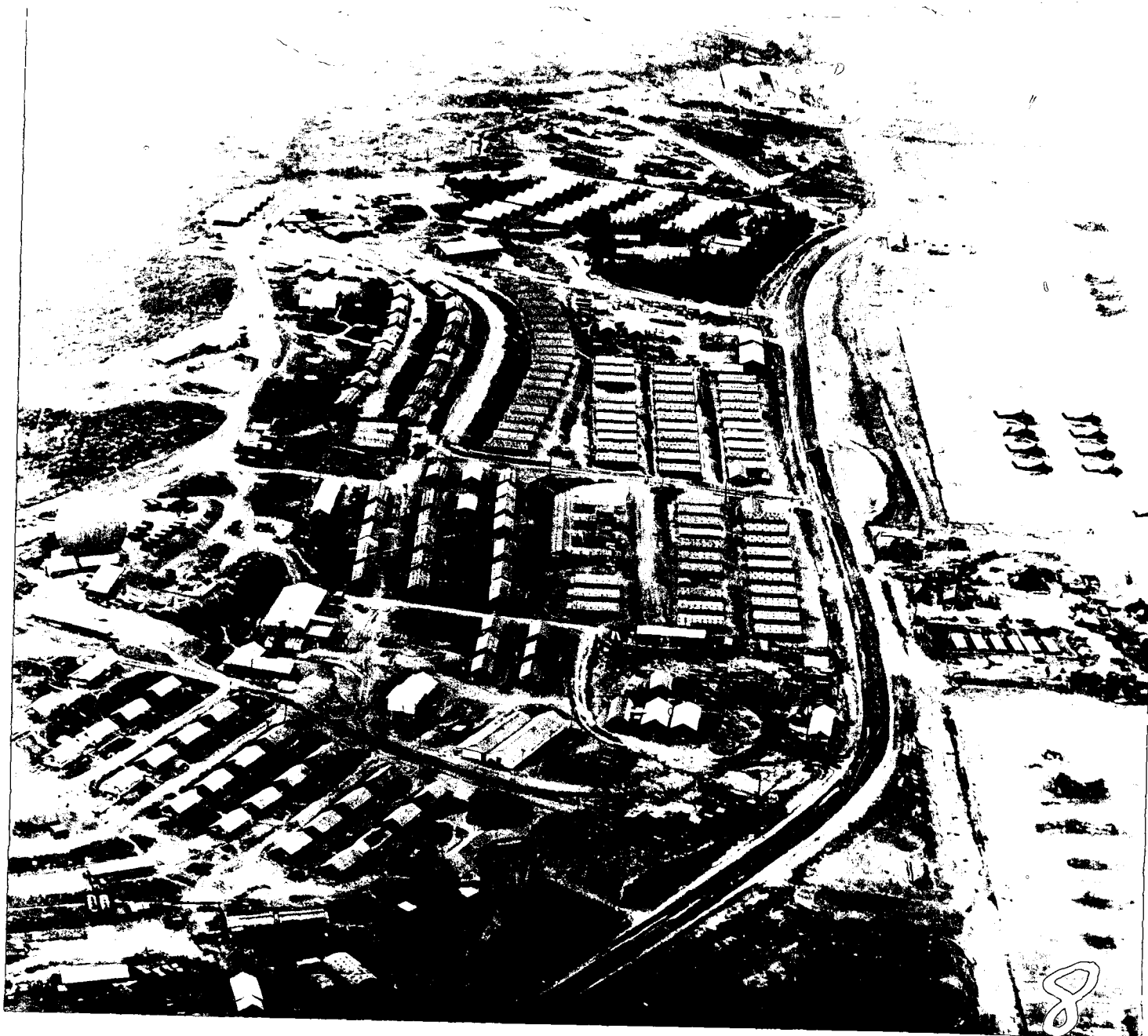
MAG-36 Command Chronology, March 1967. Tab G, Pt IV.

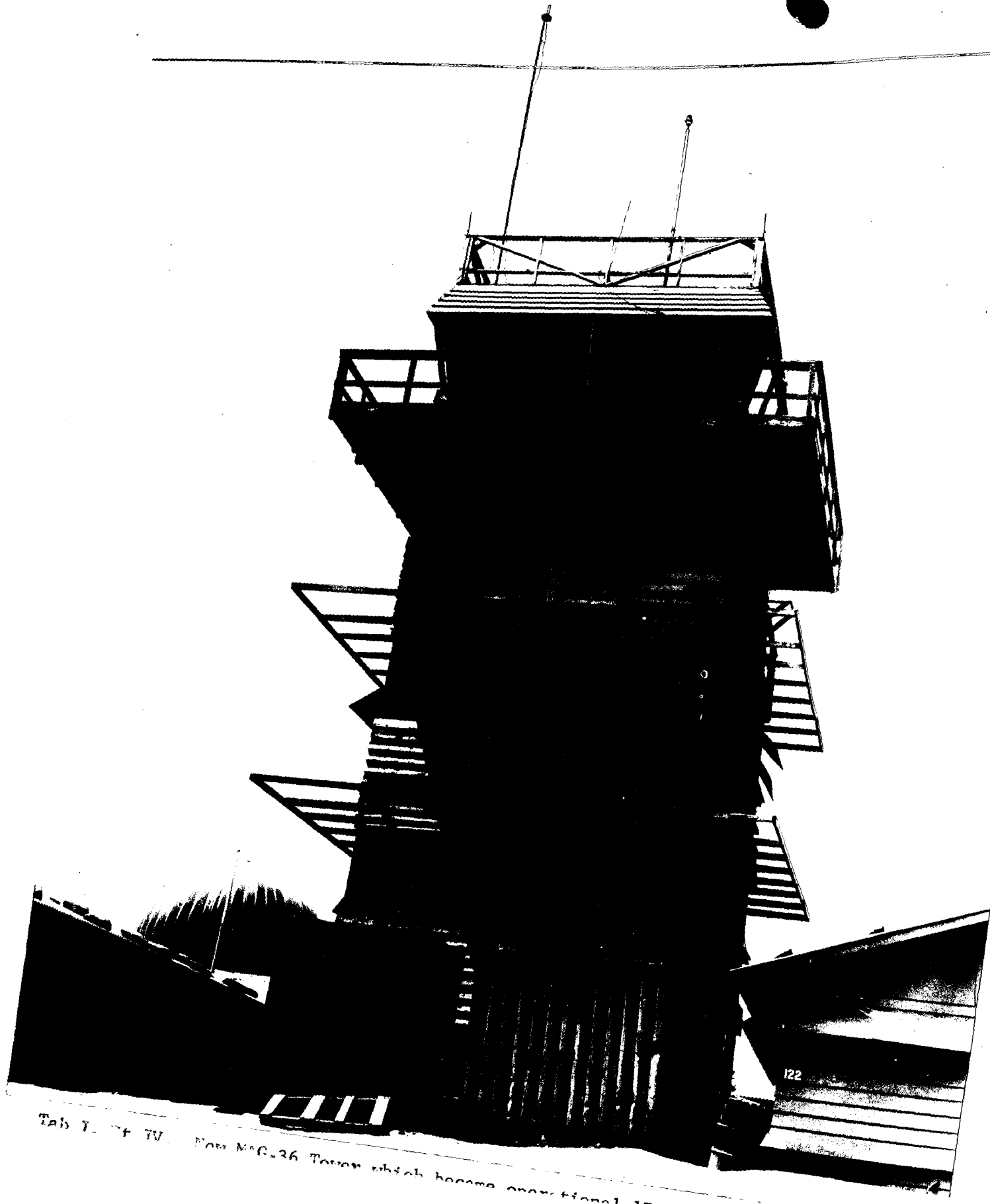
North and South parking areas of MAG-36 based helicopters. 31 Mar 1967

STILL NO LIBERTY

FOR

MAG-36 PERSONNEL

Ky Ha - the Chu Lai Installation Coordinator directive which placed off limits the hamlet of An Tan, the populated areas in the vicinity of An Tan, and the village of Ky Ha, which includes the hamlets of Sam Hai and Xuan Trung, is still in effect. Military personnel will not enter these areas except in the performance of their official duties as authorized by their commanding officers.

All Vietnamese private residences, restaurants, cafes, night clubs and catering places serving or selling alcoholic beverages are off limits.

The city of Quang Ngai (BT 650730) is also off limits to all military personnel of this command except for official military business.

Also on the off limits list is the Korean Officer's Club, near the MAG-12 area. All U. S. Military Personnel are restricted from entering this establishment.

REENLIST NOW!

This is it. This is the time to make your play. Now is the time for all of you Marines in the pay grade of LCpl and Cpl, with less than a year to do on your current enlistment to do the smart thing and reenlist.

The provisions of MCBul 1133 of 9Jun66 are due to expire on 31 March 1967, and there are no indications that they will be renewed or extended for a further period of time.

This bulletin authorizes the immediate promotion to the next higher rank upon immediate reenlistment. A Marine can be promoted up to the grade of Sergeant under these provisions. Reenlistment bonuses are paid for the new rank.

These individuals are in the area for the purpose of purchasing and/or liberating items of a luxury nature, such as cameras, radios, tape recorders, etc. They have been seen attempting to get Marines to purchase such items from the exchange for them, or offering to buy such items from the individual owner.

The trafficking in unauthorized merchandise constitutes black marketeering, which is an offense punishable under the UCMJ, and also a federal offense.

Use your smarts. Just don't have any financial dealings of any type with unauthorized personnel. If you see them in the living areas, ask them to leave. If they do not leave, report this fact to the Group Provost Marshal at NAILFILE 21, and keep them under surveillance until the PMO arrives.

ROCKET ATTACK ON DA NANG

The enemy rocket attack on Da Nang in the early morning hours of February 27, killed 12 and injured 33 American military personnel. 30 live 140mm rockets were found in the area. 2 launchers, simple four foot pipes, mounted on a five foot plank, were also discovered.

The rocket motor is ignited by a simple tail clip with an electrical wire attached. A battery of the rockets could be loaded, wired in series, and fired by application of electrical current from a battery. One or two people could do the job with very little chance of detection. Stay alert for any suspicious activity in and around our TAOR. Report anything suspicious to the S-2 immediately.

Promotion boards meet and announce the results just about every month here in the MAG. How are you considered when they convene? What do you have to offer besides time in grade? Do you do a good job or an excellent job? Do you seek added responsibilities or do just enough to get by? What have you done to make your qualifications just a little bit better than your contemporaries? If you cannot give yourself a favorable answer to these questions, then it is about time that you did something about your career deficiencies.

When your record goes before the promotion board, generally only a few members of the board will know of you personally. The recommendation given by your section head and the record contained in your service record book will convey to the board your worth for promotion.

The members of the board average the conduct and proficiency marks, consider the date of rank, time in service, awards, punishments, etc., but usually turn to the education page of the SRB and determine how much of an effort has been made by the individual for self-improvement and the development of the individual store of professional knowledge and the development of non-military skills. This one item of self-improvement is usually the item that decides who will get a contested promotion.

If the results of the squadron promotion boards continue to be published without your name being on the list, you had better examine yourself and determine what you can do to place yourself higher on the list of Marines recommended for advancement.

DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS GOES TO CAPTAIN BILLY RAY MASSEY, HMM 165

In a brief, but impressive ceremony held on 16 March 1967, Major General Robertshaw, the Commanding General, First MAW, presented the Distinguished Flying Cross to Captain Billy Ray Massey, HMM 165. The citation read as follows:

"For heroism and extraordinary achievement in aerial flight in connection with operations against insurgent communist (Viet Cong) forces in the Republic of Vietnam, Captain Massey piloted his aircraft on a night emergency retraction of a fifteen man Marine reconnaissance team, which was surrounded by the enemy forces. Despite heavy enemy fire, Captain Massey skillfully maneuvered his aircraft into the landing zone, where, unable to land his helicopter, he daringly hovered in the zone with only one wheel touching the ground until the remaining five reconnaissance team members had boarded his helicopter. His heroic efforts were instrumental in the successful retraction of the reconnaissance team and undoubtedly saved numerous Marine lives."

NAVY COMMENDATION MEDAL AWARDED TO SSgt F. D. RILEY, HMM 262

Ky Ha - In the same ceremony, Major General Robertshaw presented the Navy Commendation Medal to Staff Sergeant Franklin Delano Riley, HMM 262. This award was given to SSgt Riley for his meritorious achievement while serving as a Crew Chief with HMM 265, in the Republic of Vietnam during September 1966. While refueling his aircraft, SSgt Riley noticed a fire in one of the helicopter's engines. Completely disregarding the possibility of an explosion, he seized two fire extinguishers, climbed on the helicopter, and emptied the contents of one extinguisher into the flames. As the fire continued to burn, he quickly removed the burning filter from the engine intake and discharged the second extinguisher directly into the engine, successfully putting out the fire. His instantaneous response to an emergency, determined actions and steadfast courage were instrumental in preventing a disastrous situation from developing in which personnel, aircraft, and refueling facilities would have been jeopardized.

COST OF LIVING ALLOWANCE TO BE ELIMINATED FOR TROOPS IN RVN

The controversial cost-of-living allowance presently authorized for some 31,000 U. S. Servicemen in RVN will be ended shortly. According to the Air Force Times, approximately 60% of the men drawing this stipend were living in the Tan Son Nhut and Saigon area in air-conditioned hotels acquired as military housing.

"It is difficult for men in the field to understand why those in the air-conditioned hotels should draw more money than those in the dugouts and bunkers." I'm sure that all of us will agree to this.

REPEATED VIETNAM TOURS, THE STRAIGHT WORD

In a recent misinterpretation of the Commandant's assignment policy, the length of time Marine Corps personnel will spend in the United States before returning to Vietnam for a second tour has been a subject of much discussion.

The Commandant of the Marine Corps has explained assignment policies in regard to subsequent tours in Vietnam, and revealed the following policy.

During the initial build-up of Marine Corps forces in Vietnam, it was sometimes necessary to return a Marine to duty in Vietnam as early as six months after his return to the United States. With the build-up complete, the Marine Corps is taking all possible actions to lengthen, not reduce, interval between overseas tours. Assignment policies call for a 24 months tour in the United States prior to a subsequent tour in Vietnam.

The Commandant has directed that no personnel will be given a subsequent tour in Vietnam until all others in his same grade and specialty have had their turn in RVN. Also, no Marine will be returned to WestPac earlier than the normal 24 months period unless he is a volunteer or his transfer has the approval of the Commandant.

Personnel to be assigned tours of duty with WestPac will be assigned in the following order:

1. Marines eligible for a reenlistment incentive, who request overseas assignment.
2. Volunteers.
3. Marines with no prior service overseas. Priority will be given to those Marines longest on station.
4. Marines who have served longest in the United States since their last overseas assignment. Those who have served longest on station will go first.
5. As a general rule, Marines in the grade of sergeant and above will be assigned to unaccompanied overseas tours IAW with their overseas control date and military occupational specialty requirements.
6. No individual who has served an unaccompanied tour in WestPac/RVN since March 1965, will be assigned as a WestPac replacement unless:
 - a. He has completed 24 months in a CONUS or accompanied billet.
 - b. Or is a volunteer for such assignment.
 - c. Or his assignment is specifically approved by CMDR.

SOFT WORDS FROM THE WHISPERING PINES DISPENSARY

Due to the shortage of PPD serum, the MAG-36 Medical Department has not scheduled TB testing for the month of March. Personnel who are scheduled for rotation to CONUS during April 1967 may report to the First Hospital Company at 1300 on Fridays for skin tests. After receiving the skin test, personnel should report to the MAG-36 dispensary for their 48 and 72 hour readings. The results must be entered in the individual's shot card and in the health record. You must have a TB test before you can be returned to the United States.

ANNUAL PHYSICAL EXAMINATION REQUIREMENTS WAIVED

Annual physical examinations are waived for Navy and Marine Corps personnel assigned to Vietnam and adjacent areas. However, Naval Aviators are still required to receive annual physicals.

All personnel are urged to obtain a complete physical immediately upon return to CONUS.

FIRST AID TIPS FOR HOT WEATHER

With the coming of hot weather, stay alert for possible attacks of heat stroke and heat exhaustion. These attacks can be fatal unless promptly treated. For self protection, drink plenty of water daily, use additional salt on your foods, wear loosely fitting clothing, and protect yourself from the direct rays of the hot sun.

The symptoms for heat stroke and heat exhaustion and the treatment for personnel afflicted are as follows:

Heat Stroke

Symptoms

- 1 - Skin, hot, dry, and bright pink in color.
- 2 - Absence of sweating.
- 3 - Headache, dizziness, confusion, convulsions, and loss of consciousness may be present.

Treatment:

- 1 - Lower body temperature as quickly as possible by:
 - a - removing individual from the sun.
 - b - removing clothing.
 - c - Keeping entire body wet by either pouring cold water over the body or immersing in cold water (with ice, if possible).

Heat Exhaustion

Symptoms

- 1 - Heavy sweating.
- 2 - Skin, pale and moist.
- 3 - Dizziness and faintness.

Treatment

- 1 - Remove individual from sun.
- 2 - Loosen clothing
- 3 - Casualty should drink as much cold water as he can tolerate. (with 2 crushed salt tablets or $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt to a canteen of cold water).

MORE ON THE THIRTEENTH MONTH TOUR

Generally, the concept of the 13th month tour prescribes the arrival of the member in CONUS not later than the end of their thirteenth month. However, one will not rotate to CONUS during the same month he departed. This means, that if one departed CONUS in August, he will not return until September.

The procedure for the Group is as follows:

All personnel due for rotation CONUS are ranked according to their departure date from CONUS. For those personnel who have voluntarily entered into an extension of tour, their original departure date will be their control factor, i.e., if a person departed CONUS on the 28th of April, then extended his tour for 3 months, his control date for rotation will be the 28th of July.

Personnel with "by date" orders or EAS will be placed on the rotation roster in a position to ensure their arrival CONUS 3 to 5 days ahead of their due date.

Everyone else is arranged in chronological sequence unless some emergency demands the early return of the individual.

MARINES MUST REPORT TO III MAF TRANSIENT FACILITY

A message received from the Commanding General reminds us that all Marines and Navy Personnel must report to the III MAF Transient Facility to obtain transportation to Okinawa and other places outside of RVN. Direct reporting to the 15th Aerial Port at Da Nang is prohibited.

Emergency leave personnel will have priority and will be furnished the first available transportation to Okinawa.

NOMINATIONS FOR U. S. NAVAL PREPARATORY SCHOOL

Marine Corps Bulletin 1530 of 27 Feb 1967 announces the annual competition for appointments to the Naval Preparatory School as candidates for appointment to the Naval Academy by the Secretary of the Navy.

The Secretary of the Navy may appoint annually 85 members of the regular Navy and Marine Corps to the U. S. Naval Academy. These appointments are only awarded to enlisted graduates of the Naval Preparatory School who are recommended and qualified for such appointment.

An applicant must be not less than 17 years of age nor have passed his 20th birthday on 1 July 1967. He must be a high school graduate, or have completed enough highschool courses so that credits earned at the Preparatory School will enable his secondary school record to show the necessary 15 units required for admission to the Naval Academy.

An applicant must have a minimum CCT score of 120 or a minimum Aptitude-Area Test score of 120 (determined by the sum of the Verbal, Arithmetic Reasoning and Pattern Analysis Test Scores divided by 3)
