
A gift of \$475,000 to Harvard for chemical research laboratory has been made by the family of E. C. Converse, one of the founders of the United States Steel Corporation.



SERVICES OF DISTINCTION

Tributes from transient visitors to some unusual feature or unexpected high quality in the various church services of Sierra Madre are not uncommon. But it is not often that such visitors take the trouble to put their appreciation in writing. The following unsigned note was placed in the hands of a member of the Episcopal choir by a total stranger recently:

"Recently it was my good fortune to spend a Sunday in the beautiful little city of Sierra Madre. At the hour of service I chanced to be passing what I afterwards learned was the Church of the Ascension. When visitors of evident taste can find local church services so well worth while, is it not rather evident that some residents are merely fooling themselves in taking a superior attitude toward the churches of their home town?

Most anybody ought to be able to find a comfortable church home in Sierra Madre, with Episcopal, Catholic, Christian Science, Bethany Temple, and Congregational Churches, and the Plymouth Brethren. Each represents a different variety of belief, or form of worship, and each has one or several claims to distinction and merit. Anyone who proclaims his inability to find interest among them indicates narrowness rather than breadth of view-

FIREARMS IN THE HOME

There was a pitiful story in the press dispatches from Fredericksburg, Va., recording the slaying of a 9-year-old boy in the darkness of his own home by his father, who mistook him for a burglar.

The father had retired early and was awakened by the footsteps of the child on the stairs. Seizing his shotgun in his half dazed condition he literally blew off his

Hundreds of instances of killing and wounding of members of families have occurred through the habit of keeping firearms in the home. Sometimes children discharge them through ignorance or carelessness, with disastrous results; sometimes they are fired accidentally while being handled by older persons and at other times are aimed deliberately at suppised intruders who prove to be members of the household, as in the case mentioned above.

If statistics were available it is safe to say that for every life saved by having a weapon at hand in the home, a dozen are sacrificed in the ways just mentioned. Keeping firearms about the house is a dangerous practice.

WHY SOME FARMERS FAIL

One of the leading bankers of the northwest attributes many of the farm failures in his section to lack of experience, lack of capital, or both, on the part of those who have failed. Among those whom he had checked up were the following, who had gone into farming:

Two circus musicians, a paperhanger, a sailor, a seagoing engineer, two wrestlers, two barbers, a cigar maker, a race horse man, a bricklayer, an undertaker, a deep sea diver, a professional gambler, a milliner and six old maids.

All of the above were falures as farmers, as might have been foretold, and their experience illustrates the foolishness of much of the "back to the farm" propaganda that is going about.

Farming is a business requiring intelligence, knowledge and above all, training of the right sort.

When a blind peddler tried to sell a pair of socks to a legless jeweler at Anadarko, Okla., recently he was offered a pair of spectacles in exchange. About as odd as some of the offers in the "swap" columns of the Sunday Times. For real amusement that department has the "funnies" beaten a mile.



How to Keep **Lemon Grove** From Freeze

Some of the latest and most interesting developments in citrus orchard frost protection were discussed at the recent meeting of the Lemon Men's Club. Those on the program were Dr. I. G. McBeth of the Leffingwell ranch of Whittier, Mr. J. B. Culbertson of Limoneira ranch at Santa Paula and Floyd D. Young of the Weather Bureau.

Dr. McBeth spoke of some of the interesting experiments which he has carried on both in the laboratory and in the field on the ranch of which he is manager. Mr. Culbertson spoke on orchard heating as it has been carried on on the Limoneira ranch, and Mr. Young gave the results of experiments with frost eliminator machines and the results that

inator machines and the results that have been obtained in the field with some of them.

When Damage Occurs

In speaking of the experimental work in the laboratory, Dr. McBeth stated that the juice of young lemons would freeze at 29½ degrees F. but that the temperature actually has to be reduced several lower than this temperature for a certain length of time before actual crystals begin to form. But when this does occur the temperature goes back up to 29½ degrees F. He stated that lemons can be kept at 28 degrees in lemons can

is at higher levels and that a freeze is when the whole atmosphere approximates the same temperature and the temperature falls very fast following a high wind. He said that in the case of a freeze they get their men out ready to fire when the temperature has reached 36 degrees.

Mr. Culbertson spoke on their method of lighting on Limoneira ranch, stating that they preferred a type of orchard heater which is easy to light and one which will require a minimum amount of attention. He also stated that 75 per cent of orchard heaters should last 20 years from date of purchasing.

Mr. Young in his talk said that they made some study of various machines which stir up the air and that he would like to see more work done in studying this type of fros eliminator. He said the cost of equipping was about double with the air stirring machine as compared with orchard heaters.
