





What are Wikimedia communities?

- Groups of volunteers, who self-organize and run all 13 types of projects, in about 300 languages
- Deeply passionate people, participating in the largest collaborative movement of humankind, who on average are more conflict-driven than the general population:), but have a feeling of belonging









Cool recent things

- SuperProtect was removed!
- Even veteran editors are switching to Visual Editor,
- The last elections engaged the largest number of votes (over 5.5 thousand votes),
- Great community competitions (e.g.Wiki Loves Earth: over 100,000 pictures uploaded),
- The WMF returned to undergo the community's evaluation of its program (through the FDC)

Problems

- A large and stable gender gap, as well as low Global South participation,
- Insufficient communication from the (admittedly, heavily overworked)
 Board,
- A bit of elitism and preference for things to stay as they were (even though technology and social expectations change),
- Communities do not communicate with each other and with the WMF (lists: just-above 200 users who posted more than 200 mails to all in total; meta: also relatively closed), very few inter-communities initiatives

Thoughts for the future

- new editors' acquisition and retention remain top challenges,
- relations and communication of the WMF with the communities require refinement and improvement (liaisons?),
- Finding the right balance between supporting the communities (by the WMF and affiliates) and just letting them do their thing,
- Having more meetings such as Wikimania (also locally)?
