## Easiest of all <br> bulbs to grow rapid increase in bulbs and flowers <br> for many years

The flowering season begins extremely early and lasts until quite late. As cut flowers they have few equals. Culture is the easiest possible. Plant in any good garden soil covering to a depth of about one and onehalf to twice the height of the bulb measuring from base to shoulder. Early planting is advisable, however many fine flowers are produced from plantings made after the first of February. Narcissi multiply quite freely and should be taken up during summer or early fall about every 3 or 4 years and replanted. Never remove green foliage fram the bulbs.

No garden is too small for a few Daffodils.

## What is top-soil?

How can we do it?

## Wyatt's <br> DUTCH HYACINTHS

Hyacinths never fail to catch the admiration and affection of those interested in spring flowering bulbs. In the garden plant about 4 inches deep, about 6 inches apart. A good general rule is to cover the bulb to a depth of about twice its height. Plant in good welldrained soil. It is advisable to avoid manures. For indoor use Hyacinths may be potted during autumn. Plunge pots outside in the ground and cover with a coarse mulch. Leave so until a good root system has been established, generally in about 10 weeks. Keep in a somewhat cool location after taking the pots inside. No attempt should be made to flower these bulbs before mid-February. Both sizes offered may be grown indoors or in the garden. Larger bulbs are, however, recommended for pots and the bedding size for either use.

At their best in beds and borders, Tulips like a place in the sun and put on the best show in a fertile, loamy, well drained soil. Beautiful pictures can be created with groups of 6 to 12 or more at the garden gate, doorstep, around a bench or terrace. Groups of Tulips work wonders with their showy colors in the mixed flower border or in front of evergreens or shrubbery.

If Tulips were grown in the same bed last spring, use fresh top soil if possible. Place the bulbs 5 to 6 in . apart and plant them 5 to 6 in . deep In the warmer climates, planting should be delayed till Thanksgiving or later.
