(Concluded.)

On motion of Defendant to reopen the cause, and remand the same to the District Court of the Northern District of California for further evidence and pro-

1. After a cause has been argued and decided, the court will not hear a motion to change the decree on affidavits taken to show facts which do not appear in the record.

2. This court will not suffer its judgement upon an appeal to be influenced in any respect by new testimony offered here, even in a case which is within its general chan-cery powers, much less when it is exercising morely the special jurisdiction conferred by Congress in respect to California land

The necessity for this rule, and the legal principles on which it is founded, discused by the Chief Justice.

The court does not doubt its power to open a judgment rendered at the present term and continue or rehear the cause, if, upon the record; one the judges who concurred in the decision supposes it to be erroneous.

This cause (a California land claim brought here on appeal by the United States from the decree of the District Court) was reached on the docket at the sides; the opinion of the court upon it was delivered, and a decree pronounced, that the decree of the District Court be reversed and the cause remanded, with directions to dismiss the petition of the claimant. (See ante, p 227.)

At a subsequent day of the term, Mr. Reverdy Johnson, for the claimant, moved the court so far to modify its order entered, as to remand the cause to the court below for further evidence and proceedings, and offered in support of the motestimony that the court had fallen into testimony was not within the knowledge or power of the appellee when the case was heard in the District Court, but has been discovered since

Mr. Black, for the United States, hoped the Court would relieve him from the duty of making an argument on the moheard at all, and gave his reasons for that

Mr. Johnson maintained the propriety and regularity of the motion, and respectfully insisted on his right to be heard.

Mr. Chief Justice TANEY. The court cannot receive the depositions, nor hear has already been decided at the present term in the case of The United States vs. Hensley, and a similar motion overruled.

In the case of Southard et al. vs. Rus-

sell, (12 How., 139,) the court held that it could not look beyond the record as transmitted from the inferior court, nor any respect by new testimony offered here. And that case was before us in the exercise of the general chancery powers conferred by the Constitution, in which a ATTORNEY AND COUNSELLOR AT broad discretionary power may be excrcised in order to promote the purposes of justice; for in a case prosecuted within that jurisdiction the defeated party, upon the discovery of new evidence, may, after a final decree in this court, obtain leave here to file a bill of review in the court below to review the judgment which this court had rendered. 16 How., 547.

But the jurisdiction which the court exercises in this case is a special one, created by act of Congress, and its mode of proceeding and powers are regulated and defined by the law; and it cannot, under which the act or acts of Congress have Nourse. These acts of Congress give this court the power to hear and determine the case upon the proceedings and evidence taken in the court below certified to this court; but no power to receive or consider any new evidence, although discovered since the decree was passed. Indeed, it would have been inconsistent with the policy upon which these acts of Congress were passed to confer this power upon the court. FT. MONROE, Dec. 21.—Gen. Lee's official report of the battle of Fredericksburg, published in the Richmond papers, places the rebel loss in killed and wounded at 1,800. The same paper, however, states that over 2,000 wounded had already arrived at Richmond, and mention is also made of many more at Fredericksburg, as yet unprovided for.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 23rd.—Passengers from Lexington, Ky., to-night, report that the excitement which prevailed for some days was increased last night by the burning of a large building containing Commissary stores. It is believed that it was the work of some of Morgan's men. Martial law was declared there to-day. Every road leading to the city is closely guarded.

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—The schooner Mary E. Mangum reports having been fired at twice by the pirate Alabama while entering the port of Raseeau, Dominica, on the 27th of Nov. On the 1st of Dec. the schooner saw her taking on provisions at the Island of Guadaloupe. CAIRO, Ill., Dec. 23 .- The following

additional items in regard to the rebel raid on the Mobile and Ohio railroad have been received:

Their force consists of a full brigade, with six pieces of artillery. They first crossed the Tennessee, and marched direct to Lexington, Tenn., where they were met on the 18th, by about two Federal cavalry regiments, with two pieces of artillery, under Col. Ingersoll, who had been sent against them. A battle of three hours duration ensued, and the Federals were forced to give way. Our loss was 7 killed, 10 wounded and 124 captured. They captured our artillery. Last night the rebels commenced their retreat, having approach within seven miles of Columbus, Ky. The damage to the railroad, it is said, is not so great as might be expected. Several bridges have been burned, but it is thought the trestle work is all safe. The damages will probably be repaired two weeks.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Dec. 22.ported that Lexington will soon be visited again by the rebels in force. Floyd and Humphrey Marshall are said to have come through Pound Gap from Western Virginia and to be rapidly advancing into the center of the State.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 .- The following has just been received:

"Headquarters Department of North Carolina, Dec. 20th. To Gen. Halleck: My expedition is a perfect success. We burned the railroad bridges at Goldsboro and Mount Olive, tore up several miles of railroad track, fought four engagements, viz: at South West Pass, Kingston, Whitehall and Goldsboro, and whipped the enemy handsomely each time. "Signed GEN. FOSTER."

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 24.—A Fortress Monroe letter, dated Dec. 23d, says Gen. Foster had arrived there from Kingston. His forces had taken Goldsboro without much loss. After destroying the rebel railroad communication so that it rannot be used for some time, he returned to Newbern safely.

CAIRO, Dec. 24.—Paroled prisoners taken at Holly Springs, who have arrived

here, furnish the following facts: On Thursday night telegrams were received at Holly Springs from Jackson, Tenn., that the rebels menaced that place, and asking reinforcements. On Friday morning all the troops, except 800, were sent to Jackson. On the same night the commanding officer at Holly Springs, being apprised of rebels approaching that place, stationed pickets three miles out on all the roads. The rebels, however, seem to have come in between the roads, as no alarm was made by the pickets, and the first known of the enemy they were in the town firing on our sleeping soldiers. The surprise was so complete that no organization could be effected, and the fighting was disultory on the Federal side. They were soon overpowered and compelled to surrender. Internal Revenue Notice.

THE UNDERSIONED HAVING BEEN APpointed by the President of the United States Collector of Internal Revenue for the Fifth Collection District of the State of California, hereby gives notice that he has ap-pointed G. D. FISKE Deputy Collector for Division No. 7, comprising the county of Yolo, who is prepared to issue licenses, and to receipt for all taxes and duties now due the Government, imposed by an Act entitled "An Act to provide Revenue to support the Government, and to pay Interest on the Public Debt," approved July 1st. 1862—from all persons residing in said Division.

All duties and taxes must be reid at the

All duties and taxes must be paid at the office of the Deputy Collector. Persons liable to pay a license will be required to take out the same within ten days from the date of an application, to be made through the Assistant Assessor, and all persons neglecting so to do, will be charged ten per cent additional on the amount thereof. Manufacturers, Auctioneers and Butchers will call forthwith, and pay the duties imposed monthly, within ten days from the 1st day of each month for the month preceeding. Upon statements returned through the Assessor, Distillers will pay duties trimonthly, and Brewers monthly, within ten days from the 1st day of each month for the month preceding, according to a form of statement which will be furnished from the Deputry ('ollector's office. ty Collector's office.

"That if any person or persons shall exercise or carry on any husiness hereinafter men-tioned, for the exercise or carrying on of which trade or business a license is required by this Act, without taking out such license as in that behalf required, he, she, cr they shall, for every such offense respectively, forfeit a pen-alty equal to three times the sum of money or amount of duts imposed for such licenses.'

"That for neglect or refusal to pay the duties on manufactured articles, provided by this Act, as aforesaid, the goods, wares and merchandise manufactured and unsold by such manufacturers shall be forfeited to the United States." (Sec. 70.)
