(Concluded.)

On motion of Defendant to reopen the cause, and remand the same to the District Court of the Northern District of California for further evidence and proceedings:

1. After a cause has been argued and decided, the court will not hear a motion to change the decree on affidavits taken to show facts which do not appear in the record.

2. This court will not suffer its judgment upon an appeal to be influenced in any respect by new testimony offered here, even in a case which is within its general chancery powers, much less when it is exercising merely the special jurisdiction conferred by Congress in respect to California land claims.

3. The necessity for this rule, and the legal principles on which it is founded, discussed by the Chief Justice.

4. The court does not doubt its power to open a judgment rendered at the present term and continue or rehear the cause, if, upon the record, one of the judges who concurred in the decision supposes it to be erroneous.

This cause (a California land claim brought here on appeal by the United States from the decree of the District Court) was reached on the docket at the present term, was called in its regular order, and was argued by counsel on both sides; the opinion of the court upon it was delivered, and a decree pronounced, that the decree of the District Court be reversed and the cause remanded, with directions to dismiss the petition of the claimant. (See ante, p 227.)

At a subsequent day of the term, Mr. Reverdy Johnson, for the claimant, moved the court so far to modify its order entered, as to remand the cause to the court below for further evidence and proceedings, and offered in support of the motion sundry affidavits to show by this new testimony that the court had fallen into error in some conclusions of fact stated in the opinion, and also that some of the testimony was not within the knowledge or power of the appellee when the case was heard in the District Court, but has been discovered since.

Mr. Black, for the United States, hoped the Court would relieve him from the duty of making an argument on the motion; thought that it ought not to be heard at all, and gave his reasons for that opinion.

Mr. Johnson maintained the propriety and regularity of the motion, and respectfully insisted on his right to be heard.

Mr. Chief Justice TANEY. The court cannot receive the depositions, nor hear an argument upon the motion. The point has already been decided at the present term in the case of *The United States vs. Hensley*, and a similar motion overruled.

In the case of *Southard et al. vs. Russell*, (12 How., 139,) the court held that it could not look beyond the record as transmitted from the inferior court, nor suffer its judgment to be influenced in any respect by new testimony offered here.

And that case was before us in the exercise of the general chancery powers conferred by the Constitution, in which a broad discretionary power may be exercised in order to promote the purposes of justice; for in a case prosecuted within that jurisdiction the defeated party, upon the discovery of new evidence, may, after a final decree in this court, obtain leave here to file a bill of review in the court below to review the judgment which this court had rendered. 16 How., 547.

But the jurisdiction which the court exercises in this case is a special one, created by act of Congress, and its mode of proceeding and powers are regulated and defined by the law; and it cannot, under any supposed analogy to proceedings in chancery, exercise any power beyond that which the act or acts of Congress have given. 6 Pet., 470, *United States vs. Nourse*. These acts of Congress give this court the power to hear and determine the case upon the proceedings and evidence taken in the court below certified to this court; but no power to receive or consider any new evidence, although discovered since the decree was passed. Indeed, it would have been inconsistent with the policy upon which these acts of Congress were passed to confer this power upon the court. This special jurisdiction was created in order to ascertain promptly the extent of the grants which had been made by the Mexican Government to private individuals,

and how much of the public domain still remained in the hands of the Government at the time of the cession to the United States, and had become subject to the disposition of this Government. And if a proceeding like the one now proposed was sanctioned, it would lead to interminable delays in almost every case where the decision was against the claimant, and it would be difficult to say when the rights of the United States could be regarded as finally settled in any case while a Mexican still made claim to the land under what he might allege to be a Mexican grant. And we may judge, from the character of the testimony offered in the cases which have already been before the court upon these Mexican claims, what would be the extent of the fraud and perjury to which such a privilege would lead, when the claimant had learned from the decision of the court what were the weak points of his case, and was strongly tempted by the magnitude of his claim to seek for and discover some new testimony to cure its defects.

We do not doubt the power of the court to open the judgment it has rendered at the present term, and continue or rehear the case, if, upon the record before us, any one of the judges who concurred in the decision had since seen cause to doubt its correctness. But in the absence of any such doubt the motion of the appellee is overruled.

Motion refused.

A NEGRO COLONY IN OHIO.—Below we give the progress of a negro settlement opened under the most favorable circumstances that money and friends could provide. Lands, implements, and all other things requisite to make an industrious people prosperous and happy, were freely given these pets of the Abolitionists. Let us see how these advantages have been improved, and then say, as some construe the words, that "all men are equal."

Some years ago there was a negro colony established in Brown county, Ohio. A Senator in Ohio characterizes the colony as follows: The black settlement in Brown county was made in 1819, the original number located there being four hundred and twenty, for whom two thousand acres of land were procured. From the commencement there has been no improvement in their morals or habits. Idleness and vice are the prevailing concomitants. The cost of criminal prosecutions has been very large in proportion to the number of inhabitants, and keeps up a proportionate average with their increase. In the vicinity of this settlement there is not a family within two miles who are not kept in constant dread of deprivations or injury of some sort. All valuable that can be removed is stolen. The neighbors are absolutely compelled to confine themselves to what is merely necessary to support life, for any thing beyond from 'hand to mouth' must inevitably fall a prey to these lurking vagrants, who, far worse than a gang of Gipsies, are hovering around seeking literally what they may devour. And this state of things is not confined to any section alone; it extend in a greater or less degree wherever this portion of the population is permanently located.

The local editor of the *Troy Times* is up and dressed, and ready to do his share towards footing the war bill. Hea how he talks:

We stand ready to furnish our quota of information to the assessor for our district in a condensed form and prompt style. ARREST OF A CLERK FOR ROBBERY. A San Francisco dispatch of the 16th, says: G. W. A. Jones, confidential clerk for C. Morrell, wholesale druggist, was arrested this evening for robbing the store of several thousand dollars worth of goods.

SAN JOSE RAILROAD.—There are now at work on this road 375 men and 160 horses. The grading, bridging, etc., will be completed in April.

Regular Term of the District Court. Court met at Woodland, December 15, 1862. Present, Hon. J. H. McKune, Judge; C. H. Gray, Sheriff; H. P. Hamblin, District Attorney, and E. Giddings, Clerk.

The cases on the calendar were called, and disposed of in the following order: S. W. Raveley vs. E. Giddings, Auditor of Yolo county: The plaintiff having heretofore presented his petition to the Court for a mandamus compelling the defendant, Auditor of Yolo county, to draw three warrants upon the General Fund of said county, for the sums of \$75 00 each.

Francis Wilder vs. Daniel Wilder: Continued by consent of parties. Pamela Porter vs. John Porter: Continued for the term. E. Huber vs. Chas. H. Gray, Sheriff: Continued by consent. A. B. Webb vs. Thos. Flexman: Continued for the term.

The People vs. G. W. Treadway: This case coming on to be heard, defendant filed a demurrer to indictment. Argued by N. Greene Curtis for defendant, and D. W. Welby for the people. Court sustains the demurrer and orders the defendant to be discharged from further custody.

The People vs. W. C. Wright and T. W. Wright: The Court overruled the demurrer to the indictment, and ordered that defendants have twenty days to file their answer to the complaint. Saml. Hungerford vs. S. D. Moore: Judgment for plaintiff of \$774 00 and costs.

Sarah W. Latham vs. W. N. Brooks and C. W. Reed: Plaintiff asked and obtained leave to withdraw the amended complaint, and defendant, Reed, was allowed twelve hours to answer or demur to the original complaint. David T. Bird vs. Copp & Weyand: Demurrer overruled, and defendants asked and obtained leave to answer in twenty days.

Adelia B. Guilford vs. Wm. Guilford: Decree of divorce granted. The People vs. R. C. Clark et al.: The Court overruled the demurrer, and grants defendants twenty days to answer. Elizabeth Brown vs. Archibald W. Brown: Decree of divorce granted, and the custody of Benicia Brown given to plaintiff.

Mary A. Treadway vs. Geo. W. Treadway: Ordered that demurrer be sustained and plaintiff have leave to amend her complaint, and defendant be granted 20 days to answer said amended complaint. W. B. Hagans vs. J. S. Cook: Judgment to plaintiff for \$338 00, with costs of suit.

Adolphus Mater, an alien: Ordered, that he be admitted as a citizen of the United States. Wm. Garey et al., vs. L. Keseburg: Defendant in person withdrew his answer, and consented to the entry of a decree of sale, as prayed for by plaintiffs.

James Moore vs. J. A. Hutton et al.: Judgment for plaintiff for \$409 00, also for the possession of a promissory note for \$3,285 00, and costs of suit. Stay of further proceedings granted till the further order of the Court. Wm. Keithly vs. Cyrus Barnes and Vincent Barnes: Jury found for plaintiff, and assessed his damages at \$110 00.

Joseph Cook vs. His Creditors: Ordered that the Sheriff be appointed assignee. Ryan Bro's & F. W. Ryan vs. Philo Tryon: Dismissed at plaintiff's costs by consent.

George Hebron, an alien: Ordered, that he be admitted as a citizen of the United States. In the matter of the application of Margaret M. Reid to transact business in her own name as a sole trader: Ordered, that the application be granted. Herman Doyle, Administrator, vs. A. P. McCarty et al.: Jury found verdict for plaintiff, and assessed the worth of the cattle at \$885 00. Ordered, that plaintiff recover judgment against defendant for that amount and costs, taxed at \$116 10.

Benj. Y. Watson vs. Thomas Laugour: Dismissed by consent; each party to pay his own costs.

Spencer Glascock and Sarah S. Glascock vs. Wm. Belsterling: Defendant moved for a nonsuit, which motion was sustained by the Court. Jno. N. Pendegast vs. J. T. Daly: By consent of parties referred to Ham C. Harrison, to report judgment. Eli Willet vs. His creditors: Sheriff appointed assignee. Jno. W. Baldwin vs. Spencer Glascock and C. A. Rackerby: Case continued at plaintiff's costs taxed at \$9 00. Maria E. Chase vs. Wm. H. Chase: Decree of divorce granted. Court adjourned till the 27th inst. at 11 o'clock.

EXCITEMENT IN NORTHERN TEXAS. We have been permitted by the Governor to look over the official accounts of the discovery of the secret abolition organization in Northern Texas, and the quick justice meted out to the traitors. The organization appears to be one of recent date. It purports to have been started in the North, and to embrace numbers of the Northern army in its fold. It also purports to extend to at least several companies of the organized militia of Northern Texas. How far it extends in that direction we are not prepared to say. The bulk of its membership in Texas is in Cook, Wise, Denton, Grayson, etc., counties. It also reaches down to Austin. Its first pretended object is to resist conscription. Its chief object is to keep up a spy system for the Northern army. It has a grip, a sign and a password. In case a member divulges he is to be hunted to the ends of the earth. In case of a draft of the militia to meet a Northern invasion, the members are to go along and desert when the battle comes on. The testimony elicited also points to an invasion of Texas from Kansas. It refers to a concurrent invasion by way of Galveston, and that both armies are to meet in Austin. The organization has been found to extend to all classes of the community, clergymen, professional men, farmers, etc. Among the number, we are pained to find the name of Dr. R. T. Lively of Sherman, a member of the Masonic Grand Lodge of this State and heretofore most highly esteemed, having enjoyed some of the highest offices in that body. The whole substance and machinery of the organization have been discovered. A jury of twelve good men are empaneled in each county, and the guilty parties are brought before it and the evidence taken. It is in every case so conclusive that there is no getting around it. Several of the guilty have, after condemnation, made a full confession, and while under the gallows declared that they deserved death. In Gainesville twenty-two have been hung. Trials are now going on in all the counties. The testimony goes to show that most of the initiated have joined the society since the 15th of September. It is very certain that nothing of this character could have gained any formidable dimensions in Texas. It is simply out of the question. The society is now nipped; all its members are known and will hereafter be watched.—Houston (Texas) Telegraph, Oct. 17th.
