## Broad-Leaved Evergreen Shrubs

There are no native plants more beautiful nor more useful for landscape planting than Rhododendrons, Kalmias, and other plants belonging to this class, and little comment need be made as to their beauty of flower and foliage.

Some years ago we began the propagation and planting of Rhododendrons in our nursery, and we are gradually working up a stock of plants equal to any in this country.

Planting and Cultural Directions. The roots of these shrubs grow near the surface, seeking acidity and moisture. They must have acid soil, as soil with an alkali reaction has tonic properties that will kill the plants in a year or two.

A good soil to use may usually be found in the forest-the loose, dark-colored dirt just under the fallen leaves usually contains the elements necessary to start the plants off properly the first year.

Never let the ground dry out in the summer, as this will surely destroy your plants.

Humus in some form is beneficial. Imported Peat Moss, mixed in proportion of one-fourth Peat Moss to three-fourths leaf-mold, is an ideal mixture for new plantings. The Peat Moss may be obtained from us.

All Rhododendrons and other Broad-leaved Shrubs are dug and shipped with ball of earth.
