FIFTY-NINTH SESSION

FIRST DAY.

Wednesday Morning, September 23, 1914.

Opening Session—The 59th Session of the Detroit Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church was opened by Bishop Burt at 8:30 o'clock. He announced hymn 560 "And are we yet alive," and prayer was offered by J. B. Oliver, Hymn No. 19, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing" was then sung and the Bishop read John xv., adding some kindly words of personal experience and exhortation. Hymn 141, "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross," was sung introductory to the Sacramental Service which was conducted by the Bishop assisted by the District Superintendents and the Pastor of the Church.

Accounting City Mission Gifts—C. B. Allen moved that the action of the Annual Conference of four years ago, providing that the amounts raised for city missions be included in the statistical column of the Home Missionary Society in the Conference Minutes, be rescinded, and that the reports be now made in the column provided for that cause.

Announcements—The chairmen of the several Committees announced meetings, and F. Spence made the announcements for the Conference Session. The Benediction was pronounced by Bishop Burt.

SECOND DAY.

Thursday Morning, September 24, 1914.

Opening Services—Promptly at 8:30 Bishop Burt announced hymn No. 2, "Come Thou Almighty King," and Wm. Dawe offered prayer. "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," was then sung and the Bishop read Psalm 51 and commented on the first and second verses of the great penitential prayer.

Journal Read—The Secretary read the minutes of Wednesday's session and they were approved.

Question 14 Resumed—The characters of W. E. Marvin, W. J. Balmer, C. W. Baldwin and John Dystant were passed and they made their annual reports.

Telegram—James Pascoe moved that the Secretary send a telegram to Samuel Jennings conveying our sympathy and prayers in his sickness. The following message was sent: "Your Conference Associates send sympathetic greeting and pray for your complete recovery."

Resolution—J. E. Mealley presented the following resolution which was adopted:

Whereas, there are quite a large number of the members of this Conference who, from their reports published in the Minutes for the past five years, seem to disregard the pro rating provision of the discipline on Ministerial Support to the detriment of our Conference Claimant especially,

Therefore, we request the appointment of a committee which may consider the most flagrant cases of this seeming disregard of the law of our church, and make such report as in their judgment may lead to the correction of this evil.

Corporate Session—J. E. Jacklin took the chair and conducted the business of the Corporate Conference .(See report.)

Superannuated Preachers' Aid Society—C. W. Baldwin was called to the chair and the business of the Superannuated Preachers' Aid Society was conducted. (See report.)

Bishop Resumes Chair-Bishop Burt resumed the chair.

Time Extended—John L. Fort, Divisional Field Secretary of the Commission on Finance, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

C. Y. Triggs, representing the Freedmen's Aid Society, was introduced and spoke briefly.

Draft Announced—Bishop Burt presented a draft of \$45.12 from the Union Savings Bank & Trust Co., as agent for Jesse R. Clark, treasurer of the Trustees of the Methodist Episcopal Church. It was ordered endorsed and turned over to the Conference Treasurer.

Referred to Sunday School Committee—At the suggestion of the Bishop a discussion of the work of the Conference representative of the Board of Sunday Schools were referred to the Conference Committee on Sunday Schools for general consideration.

Benediction—The announcements were made and the benediction was pronounced by Seth Reed.

THIRD DAY.

Friday Morning, September 25, 1914.

Opening Exercises—After singing a hymn and prayer by Timothy Edwards, Bishop Burt read some verses from the 19th Chapter of St. Luke, speaking interestingly of the man Zaccheus and the practical lessons of his moral and spiritual recovery.

Journal Read—The proceedings of Thursday's session were read and approved.

Question XIV.—Question 14 was asked and the characters of those effective preachers called by the Bishop were passed and they reported their collections.

Transfers—George Ackerman to the Maine Conference, Samuel Linge to the Kentucky Conference and F. S. Goodrich to the Michigan Conference, were announced as transferred.

Withdrawal—Frank Copeland was announced as having withdrawn from the Ministry and Membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Referred—Nathaniel Dickey asked for the retired relation and on the motion of C. W. Baldwin, his case was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations and Brother Dickey spoke briefly.

Introductions—President Samuel Dickie of Albion College and Dr. C. M. Boswell, Secretary of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, were introduced and addressed the Conference.

Bishop Leaves Chair—Bishop Burt asked C. M. Boswell to preside during the interval of his absence in consultation with the cabinet.

Introductions—H. H. Hood, Superintendent of Lansing District of the Anti-Saloon League, Deets Pickett, Research Secretary of the Temperance Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Joseph B. Hingeley, Secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants, were introduced and addressed the Conference.

Bishop Resumes the Chair—Bishop Burt resumed the chair.

Peace Resolution—S. G. Gillette presented the following resolution which was adopted:

Whereas, We have met in Conference during strange and distressing times; when nearly every civilized nation of Europe is engaged in the most stupenduous war in the history of the world; when men are dying by the thousands, sacrifices to the lust of power; when many, who are related to our American citizenship by ties of blood and religion, are laying down their lives, on either side of this struggle, we are appalled at the dreadful carnage being wrought. Therefore, be it

Resolved, that we deplore the significant absence of the Spirit of the Master whom these nations profess to love and follow; that we sympathize with those who suffer on the field of battle and those who suffer no less in the homes, now bereft of loved ones; that we approve of the efforts of the President of these United States to restore the reign of the Prince of Peace to the world; that we rejoice in his foreign policy of keeping our nation out of embarrassing entangle-

ments, and the inhumanity of war; that we pledge ourselves to loyalty to the best interests of the state and to preach the Gospel of Peace on earth, Good Will to men with greater zeal than ever before; and earnestly pray for the dawn of the day when "nations shall learn war no more." That this Conference call upon all our Ministers and Churches to observe the letter and spirit of the President's proclamation to observe Oct. 4th as a special day of prayer for the Peace of the World.

Whereas, it is the rule of the Board of Stewards that Retired Preachers shall automatically become Claimants upon the Annuity Funds at the date cf retirement. Therefore, Resolved that all brethren who are to become beneficiaries of these funds shall be reported to the Board of Stewards not later than Saturday noon.

Additional Liquor Tax—A. R. Johns presented the following resolution which was adopted:

Whereas, certain interests have opposed an increased tax on alcoholic liquors under cover of a war tax when the facts are that little, if any, additional funds will be needed for the expense of the government;

Whereas, no time limit is proposed for the ending of the additional tax proposed.

Whereas, an added tax would only more deeply intrench the liquor power and tend to the prolongation of its life.

Therefore, be it resolved:

First, that we, the Detroit Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church do most vigorously protest against any additional tax upon alcoholic liquors; and

Second, that we most earnestly urge that the government cease all complicity with this most deadly enemy of the human race; and

Third, that we instruct our secretary to inform Chairman Underwood of our protest and our Michigan delegates in Congress of our wishes, requesting their efforts in the accomplishment of this purpose.

Deaconess Board Report—F. S. Rowland read the report of the Deaconess Board of Nine and it was adopted. (See re port).

Introduction—Miss H. Sophie Sprague, superintendent of the Deaconess Home of Detroit, was introduced and spoke briefly.

Question 10—Question 10, "What members are in studies of the fourth year?" was asked, and Alden R. Graves, Richard Rowe, Samuel A. Carey, Ernest L. Carless, Harry Biddlecomb, (one condition), Geo. A. Beacock, Elmer C. Dewey, George F. Hathaway and Peter Pennanen, were placed in the studies of the fourth year.

Executive Session—On motion of C. B. Allen, an executive session was ordered for Saturday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock.

Introduction—Chaplain E. H. Lougher, of Jackson Prison, Dr. Franklin Hamilton, of Washington University, Alvin Knoblock, of Detroit, Dr. Clarence Green, of Albion College, were introduced and each briefly addressed the Conference.

Endorsement of Epworth Laboratory—H. Lester Smith presented the following resolution which was adopted:

Be it resolved, That this Conference heartily endorse the plan, proposed by Professor Greene, viz., to secure the remaining Twenty Thousand Dollars needed to complete the Forty Thousand Dollar Fund required for the construction and equipment of Epworth Physical Laboratory at Albion College, the Twenty Thousand Dollars to be secured from not to exceed two hundred persons or organizations before June 17, 1915.

Be it further resolved, That it is the sense of the Detroit Conference that our pastors should earnestly assist in securing the \$20,000 before the next Commencement Day of Albion College and thus make possible the construction of Epworth Physical Laboratory during the summer of 1915.

Introduction—Rev. J. Ambrose Dunkel, Moderator of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Michigan, was introduced and brought hearty greetings to the Conference.

Report of Special Committee—J. G. Haller read the report of the special committee of five to consider the pro-rating of Ministerial support. It was adopted as follows:

Your committee to whom was committed the task of considering the matter of pro-rating all monies paid by the Churches for ministerial support, would report as follows:

The Law of the Church enjoins upon each pastor that the money paid by any church or charge for ministerial support must be pro-rated among Bishops, District Superintendents, Pastors and Conference Claimants.

We have no disposition, nor is it our prerogative to expose or rebuke pastors and churches that are delinquent in this matter. We wish only to acquaint you with the actual condition of things and to give you some facts and figures that reveal the great injury done our Conference Claimants if what is rightfully theirs is withheld from them. We further submit for your consideration the following facts: It is said that we have the largest number of Conference Claimants of any Conference in the Church and the poorest system of providing for them. We have about 327 charges, and of these 176 failed to pro-rate last year. This caused a loss of \$5,077.00 or an average of thirty dollars for each claimant.

Last year the Bishops received in this Conference 54.46% of the amount asked, District Superintendents received 97.91% Pastors, 99.91% and the Conference Claimant 77.05%.

It is evident that this discrepancy is not wholly attributable to remissness on the part of Pastors or District Superintendents, though much of it may be.

Because of these and other facts that might be adduced, we believe the time has fully come when we should stand shoulder to shoulder in this matter by renewing our efforts and bring all delinquent charges up to the standard this year. We recommend: First. That the District Superintendents be requested, the first Quarterly Conference in each charge, to call attention to this law and to urge strict compliance with the same.

Second. That at the annual sessions of this Conference the presiding Bishop shall request pastors, when they report collections all taken, also to state whether or not all monies paid for ministerial support have been pro-rated as required by the laws of the church.

Therefore, in view of the fact that, this year, the gates of the Michigan State Fair were thrown wide open upon the Sabbath day, we cannot be silent without confession of impo-tence. Individual action we may be powerless to control; but institutions which bear our common civic name and which look for patronage and support to all the citizens of the state must heed the voice of public sentiment. Therefore, representing a numerically large and influential part of the state, and ourselves an earnestly active force in Social Service, the Detroit Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church sends it most determined protest-and we affectionally appeal to the officers and directorate of the Michigan State Fair Association that they will make such regulations for the future as will preserve our heartiest co-operation and preclude the necessity of a demand for restraining legislation. We are their friends; and pray them that we may continue to be so.

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Conference convey the above protest and appeal to the Secretary of the Michigan State Fair Association as the mind of this Conference.

Anti-Saloon League Trustees—On motion of Geo. Elliott, J. G. Haller, W. B. Collins, D. M. Christian and O. H. Smith were elected trustees of the Anti-Saloon League of Michigan.

Communications—The Memorial from the Vermont Conference to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1916, relating to the support of retired supplies, was referred to the Board of Stewards.

The communication from the Montana Conference, in reference to the unification of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church South, was laid on the table.

The appeal in behalf of the Soldiers and Sailors of the Army and Navy and National Guard of the United States by the Association of Chaplains of the Military and Naval Forces of the United States was received and endorsed.

Undergraduate Association—On motion of George Elliott, the Conference heartily endorsed the Undergraduate Association of the Conference and promised its loyal co-operation and sympathy.

Bishop Resumes the Chair-Bishop Burt resumed the chair.

journal Read—The Journal of the morning was read, and approved.

Missionary Appropriations—C. W. Baldwin read the Missionary appropriations, and they were approved.

Missionary Boards—C. W. Baldwin read the nominations for the Conference Board of Foreign Missions and the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension. They were confirmed.

Resolution of Courtesy—Resolutions of gratitude for all the factors which had contributed to the comfort of the Conference and facility in performing its business, were read by William Dawe, chairman of the committee on resolutions and these were heartily adopted.

Church Sale—W. E. Marvin moved that permission be granted to sell the church at Humbolt and the proceeds turned over to the Diorite Church. Carried.

Requests for Appropriations—C. B. Allen read the requests of the Conference for the appropriations from the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension for special work, and they were adopted.

Collection for Janitor—A collection for the Janitor of the Church was taken and amounted to \$26.51.

Property Sale—The following resolution was presented by C. B. Allen and adopted by vote:

At the Conference Church Pastor Frederick Spence di rected the morning hour of worship. The venerable Dr. Seth Reed led in prayer. Bishop Burt announced the text, Romans 1:16 and in a sermon of great power boldly contrasted Modern Romanism with the Simple Gospel preached by Paul.

The afternoon hour, 3 o'clock, found the Conference as sembled for the impressive service of ordination. After certain designated members of the classes representing the Districts had related their call to the ministry the Bishop, assisted by the District Superintendents and Elders present, ordained 20 Deacons and 13 Elders. The Bishop also consecrated four Deaconesses.

At 5:00 o'clock sharp Bishop Burt presided at a great mass meeting in the Auditorium. Prof. Harry Ward, of Boston University, gave the address on the subject: "The Challenge of Socialism to Christianity."

At the evening hour of worship the Anniversary of the Foreign Missionary Society was observed, and Dr. W. F. Oldham, General Secretary, gave the address, calling Methodism to its knees before God in view of the calamity of war in which the leading Christian nations are now engaged.

Mr. Kinsey and Miss Flannigan sang solos appropriate to the sentiment of the hour.

Memoirs



ELISHA E. CASTER, D. D.

Elisha E. Caster was born March 19, 1835, in Galen, N. Y., and finished his life's course in Plymouth, Mich., Sunday, March 15, 1914, just four days before his seventy-ninth birthday. He was a member of a family of nine, only two of whom survive him, a sister, Mrs. Catherine E. Mott of Holly, and a brother, Lawton C. Caster of Garfield, Mich., both of whom attended his funeral.

From early boyhood Brother Caster was an eager student of life in its widest meanings. He had read the Bible through several times before he made a public confession of his allegiance to Jesus Christ. His conversion occurred in Rose, Mich., under the ministry of Rev. William Birdsall, during the process of a wide-reaching revival movement. At the age of twentytwo he began to preach and continued his public ministry until four weeks ago last Sunday, when he preached in Memorial church, Highland Park, with his characteristic vigor and fluency. For a full half century of stated ministry and during seven years of nominal retirement he has set forth before au-

diences from end to end of the Detroit conference the unsearchable riches of Christ.

Brother Caster entered Detroit conference in 1857 on probation, and in 1859 in full connection. He was the last survivor of a class of fourteen.

The chief charges served by him were Middleburg, Owosso, Corunna, Bay City, Marquette, Flint, (Garland Street), Detroit two pastorates—(Tabernacle church and the Old Jefferson Avenue), Romeo, Saginaw (Jefferson Avenue), Fenton, Milford, Howell and Chelsea. In addition to these pastorates there occurred six years' superintendency of the Bay City (now Saginaw) district. While on the district he spent the summer of 1891 abroad in company with Rev. Dr. E. W. Ryan, visiting Great Britain, Egypt and the Holy Land.

Since his retirement he has been in almost constant demand as a lecturer and preacher, so that he had few Sabbaths indeed of real leisure. In one locality, the home of his youth, he preached the funeral sermons of over forty of the old neighbors.

The list of his pastorates alone would furnish evidence that one of the great figures of Michigan Methodism has been removed from human vision. The churches and parsonages built and repaired would be legion; the revivals held during that half century, and the souls converted to God would make a marvelous study. On one charge he preached seventy nights in succession, and at the close received over 150 people into church membership. His great physical strength was wholly devoted to God's service. He never spared himself. His large library attests to the thoroughness of his habits

His large library attests to the thoroughness of his habits of study. His well-stored mind could produce on demand whole chapters of the Scriptures, and his memory tenaciously gripped facts, figures, names and places. Then too it became the fixed habit of life with our brother to take a sincere and active interest in the places and people where his lot was cast. This rule he carried over into the years when relieved of the specific care of churches; he was a member of the village council of Plymouth for four years, and was always interested in all phases of community welfare.

His last illness of about three weeks, was practically his only illness, for he scarce knew weakness or weariness in all the years and the swift coming of the closing days was as surprising and unexpected to himself as to all his friends.

Dr. Caster was married June 24, 1863, to Miss Harriet L. Wilbur of Bay City, Mich., and their golden wedding was celebrated last June in Plymouth. He is survived by Mrs. Caster the faithful companion of his toils and travels; by two daughters, Mrs. Ella Burnham, of West Chester, Pa., and Miss Florence Caster, a teacher in our Plymouth schools, and by a son, Dr. E. Wilbur Caster, of Detroit.

The funeral services, held in the church at Plymouth were simple and appropriate. The church was filled with sympathizing friends. The pastor Rev. Joseph Dutton, was in charge,



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and read the biographical sketch. Drs. C. B. Allen, district superintendent; W. W. Washburn and John Sweet, paid fitting tribute to his character and work, and Dr. J. E. Jacklin read appreciative resolutions adopted by the Detroit Preachers' Association. Interment was in the Riverside cemetery at Plymouth.

MRS. EMMA C. ADAMS.

Twenty--six years "the mistress of the manse," a calm, cultured, loving personality, a brief acute sickness and then the translation of Emma C. Adams to the better land. Sister Adams was born Jan. 9, 1859 at Evanston, Ill., while her father was a student at the Garrett Biblical Institute. Her father, Rev. A. L. Cooper, after his graduation, moved back to the Vermont Conference, where he served faithfully and successfully. His daughter Emma was educated in the public schools of Vermont, and pursued further studies, graduating from Montpelier Seminary in 1881 and from Boston University College of Liberal Arts in 1885. For two years she was instructor in Lasell Seminary, Auburndale, Mass. During that period she was a contrib-utor to the magazines. Sister Adams was a brillant woman. Her literary work in poetry and prose has been highly com-mended. On October 5, 1887 with her eyes fully open to the experiences of a Methodist parsonage home she married Rev. C. L. Adams. They came to Michigan and have toiled together in important charges of the Detroit conference. These twentysix golden years the missionary interests of the church appealed to her. At the time of her death she was District President of the Woman's Foreign Missionary society. In administration and in public speech she rendered conspicuous service. Mrs. G. O. Hutchings of Howell, Mich., sums up a splendid tribute to our sister in these words: "God gave her no small place in this world, to fill, and she filled it." While Flora M. Keniff of Chelsea says of her: "Her life was marked by unusual efficiency, a woman of strong and fascinating individuality. Friendship with her was always inspiring and uplifting."

On a November day, the twelfth of the month in the year 1913, this tireless worker went to her reward. The cause of her death was heart failure, that organ being literally worn out by being overtaxed for more than thirteen years due to exopthalmic goitre. She submitted to an operation during the summer, but was too much weakened to stand the strain of life longer. A few days before her death she had presided at the District Woman's Foreign Missionary society at Lake Linden where she contracted a cold, which perhaps hastened the end.

Mrs. Adams leaves her husband, daughter Gwendolin, and son, Merrill, to mourn her loss and reflect her influence on their lives. Two sisters tarry on the shores of time, Mary C. Ward of Shelby, wife of Rev. C. M. Ward, of Des Moines Conference and Rosa M. Cooper, unmarried. The funeral services

were held at the Calumet church, Nov. 10, 1913, Rev. W. E. Marvin, the District Superintendent in charge. Addresses were made by Rev. W. E. Marvin and Rev. Reuben Crosby. Interment was made at Adrian, Mich.

OBITUARY-REV. JOHN R. BEACH.

'Ere the voyager had reached the shore of man's allotted time on earth, some bright chariot of the skies swept close to earth and John R. Beach knew the limitations of flesh no more. Our brother was born in Weedsport, N. Y., November 30, 1847. He was the youngest of a family of twelve children, besides one foster sister. Early in life he was left parentless and made his home with his married sisters. He was educated in the public schools and attended the Medina Free Academy and a normal school at Syracuse. He entered the teaching profession and for eight years he pursued that calling successfully. He was principal of schools at Caseville, Cass City and other Michigan

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
towns. April 6, 1880, he was married to Miss Eliza Dopking, who was also a school teacher. While succeeding in his work he felt the call of God upon him to enter the Christian ministry. For John R. Beach, to know duty was to respond, accordingly, he joined the conference at Pontiac in 1885, Bishop Joyce presiding. In 1887 he was ordained deacon at Saginaw by Bishop Mallalieu and two years later was ordained elder in Bay City by Bishop Foss.

His appointments have been Kingston, Rochester, Ames, Saginaw, Davison, Webberville, Holly, Clio, Utica, Denton and Walled Lake. Everywhere he did patient, constructive work. He excelled as a pastor, ever coming in sympathetic touch with the sorrowing and sinning. He was a good preacher, insisting on the scriptural processes of salvation and vigorously standing for truth and righteousness.

He retired from active work at the conference of 1912. This brief retirement became to him a season of rest and comfort. The winter of 1912 was spent at St. Petersburg, Florida, with his only living sister, Mrs. E. A. Bowen, enjoying that sunny clime to the full. The whole family was together in their cottage at Orion the following summer to the great delight of In the early Fall he moved with his wife and daughter all. to a pleasant home on Olive street, Ypsilanti, where he found rest and happy relationship to our church and Dr. Leeson. The Sunday before his death he attended five services at the church and seemed to enjoy them all. Tuesday evening Jan. 27, 1914 had one been looking he would have seen a man knock at a door, deliver a delicacy for a sick person inside and with a calm, glad light in his eye start toward home. On nearing that place of comfort and rest, had you been looking, you would have seen hin slip and fall, you would have seen passing workmen carry him to his home and have seen him die ere a physician could reach him. So went John R. Beach out of life, while ministering. Who would not rather go like that than while in some selfish quest of gold? Brother Beach left a faithful wife, a son, Rev. King D. Beach of Escanaba, who please God, will carry the crimson banner of the cross, fallen from his father's hand and two daughters, Bessie M. Beach whose sweet trained voice, we trust will bless many hearts and Miss Mary Beach a well trained kindergartner. The funeral services were in charge of Dr. Ramsdell, District Superintendent and Dr. Leeson, pastor. Addresses were made by Dr. John Sweet of Detroit and Dr. A. B. Leonard of Flint. Fifteen of his ministerial brethren were at the funeral. Mrs. Leonard Hazard Peacock of Detroit, a personal friend of the family, sang two comforting songs. The pall bearers were laymen from various pastorates. Burial was in beautiful Fairview cemetery overlooking pleasant rural scenes.

OBITUARY-REV. JOSEPH SUTTON.

Having lived thirty-four years on borrowed time, passing by five months and four days the ninety-fourth milestone of life's journey, Rev. Joseph S. Sutton went to his reward, April 5, 1914. He was born at Freedom, N. J., Oct. 1, 1819. He came to Flint. Mich., in 1842 and the following year he removed to Albion. Mich., where he was converted and entered the college before the first building of that school was completed. In 1846 he joined the Michigan conference as a probationer and two years later he was admitted to full membership. He continued in the effective relation thirty-one years, retiring in 1878. His pastorates were: Paw Paw, Lexington, Almont, Grand Blanc, Pinckney, Brighton, Belleville, Denton, Petersburg and St. Clair. When the Detroit conference was set off from the Michigan in 1856 Brother Sutton became a member and continued in that relation until his death. In 1864 he was sent by the Christian Commission to City Point, Va., where he ministered to the needs

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of 8,000 sick and wounded soldiers. During the years of his retirement, he lived in St. Clair, Mich., a trusted and useful citizen. Rev. H. C. Northrup says: "I recall with gratitude untold the many fraternal conferences we had together when I was pastor at St. Clair. Highly did I esteem his counsel, for it was a real help and a substantial encouragement for me in administering the affairs of the church."

Brother Sutton is credited with having secured a legacy of \$16,000 toward the conference Claimants' Endowment Fund.

In 1854 Brother Sutton married Miss Mary Southwell of Romeo, who died two years later. In 1857 he married Miss Elizabeth Jane Brakeman, who died in 1905. Two children survive this union, Miss Stella Sutton and Dr. Frederick B. Sutton, both of Birmingham, Ala. They were with their father at the time of his death, the daughter having devotedly cared for him during the years of his retirement and last illness.

The funeral was held from the house, conducted by District Superintendent W. J. Balmer and Rev. Samuel Jennings, pastor. Dr. Seth Reed of Flint, S. D., Eva of Marine City, W. M. Todd and F. S. DeVona, assisted in the service. Interment was made in the St. Clair cemetery.

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REV. WILLIAM H. ALLMAN.

Rev. William Henry Allman, late pastor at Deckerville, died Sunday, March 29, 1914. That day had been designated: "Goto-Church Sunday," and Brother Allman had made special preparation for it, preaching in the morning at Deckerville and afternoon at Cedarville with more than usual unction. The theme was: "The Enduring Word of God."

He had just reached and entered the Maple Grove church for the evening service, and while greeting the friends assembling, fell over without a moment's warning, and passed away.

His ministry covers a period of about forty years, during which time he had never been under a physician's care, and up to the moment he was taken apparently enjoyed the best of health. His sudden removal, while a great shock to Mrs. Allman and the family, was just what he had often said he would choose for himself. Indeed, to a party riding with him from his afternoon appointment, he uttered the expression: "I want to die with the harness on."

This utterance was characteristic of his whole life and ministry. Devoted to duty, happy in his loved employ, quiet and retiring in his disposition when self interest was concerned, he was courageous and faithful even to the point of daring when conscience, conviction and duty in the interest of God and man were involved.

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His was not a ministry gifted with great flights of oratory, but with plain, earnest speech he brought home to human hearts the messages of divine truth. He was never careless nor neglectful in his preparation. His sermons revealed a thoughtful mind and a devoted heart. This made him both acceptable as a preacher and likable as a man on all charges, and resulted in a soul winning ministry, which was marked here and there by far reaching revivals and important additions to the church.

William Henry Allman was born December 23, 1851, at Concord, Mich. He is the first of eleven children of Jabez and Elizabeth Allman to depart this life.

He was converted at the age of sixteen in a revival meeting conducted by Rev. Bennett, a former member of Michigan conference. He enrolled as a student of Albion College two years later and graduated from that institution with the class of 1876, being a charter member of the Epsilon chapter of the Delta Tau Delta Fraternity at Albion.

Brother Allman entered the ministry, of the Detroit conference in the fall of 1877, and was received into membership with the conference in 1879.

His charges were as follows: Bay Port. Brooklyn, Long Rapids, Hope, La Porte, Kingston, Pinconning, Tawas City, West Bay City, (Thoburn church) Gaylord, St. Charles, Unionville, Merrill, Goodison, Port Austin, Kingston (second term) and Deckerville. From 1884 to 1889 he took a supernumerary relation for business interests, but continued preaching this time.

Brother Allman was married to Miss Mary Ferguson, of Long Rapids, Mich., October 13, 1880. Through all the viccissitudes of the itinerancy since, Mrs. Allman has been a most efficent helper, guiding well the affairs of her household and faithfully assisting in the work of the church.

To them were born five children, four of whom are living: Charles J., of Jackson, Mich.; Russell V., of Ann Arbor, Mich.; Harold F., of Albion, Mich., and Hazel L., at home.

The supreme concern of the parents was to guide their children into the "way of life" and secure for each of them a good education. In this they have been markedly successful. Charles and Russell are both graduates of Albion. Harold is an undergraduate and Hazel is just completing her high school course at Deckerville.

The funeral services were held in the Deckerville church. which was tastefully draped with white bunting and beautiful flowers. A tender and gracious spirit pervaded the entire services, chastening with peace and hope the sorrow which all hearts felt. The business houses and the high school were closed and the house filled to its utmost.

Brief and fitting addresses were made by Revs. Samuel Jennings, of St. Clair; L. N. Moon, of Sandusky; J. E. Mealley, of Port Huron and Wm. J. Balmer.

Wednesday the family left with the casket for interment in Albion cemetery. But from the grave and thought of death

we turn to thought of life and heaven and to the blessedness and glory into which the faithful servant of God has entered, and with grateful hearts we sing:

"Servant of God well done,

Thy glorious warfare's past;

The battle fought, the victory won,

And thou are crowned at last."

Services were held in the Albion church, attended by the relatives and friends resident there, at 2 o'clock Thursday, April 2, Dr. C. O. Mills had charge. Beautiful tributes were paid to the memory of Brother Allman by Dr. Dickie and Dr. Goodrich. W. J. BALMER.

MRS. E. H. BROCKWAY.

Fidelia S. Thompson was born March 31st, 1830, in Ontario county, N. Y. She came to Michigan while a girl. Mrs. Brockway died Feb. 20th, 1913. Her death came as the result of a fall a few days before.

In early life she laid the foundation for a noble and useful career. While yet a girl she was converted and during the years that followed she developed into a beautiful Christian character.

In 1855, Rev. E. H. Brockway was the junior Methodist preacher on the Mason charge. At that same time Miss Fidelia Thompson was the superintendent of the Mason public school. On August 24th of that year the preacher and the teacher were joined in holy wedlock and the two leaders began their 29 years of successful career in the ministry. In all these years Mrs. Brockway was a helpmeet indeed. Her heart was always full of love for folks, and her hands were full of good deeds. She was unceasing in her efforts to bless people wherever she went. She accompanied her husband a great deal in his pastoral labors. Her fertile brain was full of plans for the upbuilding of the kingdom. During the three years they lived in Albion to educate their daughter, her husband preached in the neglected fields outside. In Albion they not only educated their own daughter, but helped to educate many other young men and women.

Mrs. Brockway was a true mother to many. Their house was full of students and many of these were financially helped when in their school course. She has even now many sons in the gospel whom her hands helped to bring to the day of their graduation. One of these is the president of a college in the south, another a district superintendent in the west, another has been a great educator in the schools of Chicago and several are serving faithfully in the ranks of the Methodist ministry. A host of useful men and women scattered through the states will rise up in the day of eternity and call her blessed. Hers was a pure, noble, self-denying, self-sacrificing, unselfish life. These were her noble characteristics to the day of her death. After her husband's death she conducted family worship every

morning until the morning before her death when she conducted worship sitting in a chair because not able to kneel. In that last service she remembered everybody, her neighbors and friends, her church and the revival meetings. She was always thoughtful about everybody.

Two daughters are left alone to mourn their loss of a noble mother.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist church Sunday afternoon at 1:30, being in charge of Rev. C. L. Beebe, Rev. Wm. P. Mosher of Pellston, Emmet county, gave the sermon, Rev. G. D. Sherman offered prayer and E. A. Densmore gave a tribute from the Sunday school. Interment was in Maple Grove cemetery.

GEORGE T. BENNETT.

Rev. George T. Bennett was a native of Gloucestershire, England, born twenty-eight years ago the 31st day of July last. He came to Michigan three years ago and entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church being appointed as supply pastor at Unionville. At the end of that year he was received on trial in the Detroit conference and at the session of the conference at Ypsilanti in September, 1913, was admitted to full membership in the conference. His second year of service was at Central church, Bay City, and then he was appointed to Freeland, where he had just entered upon his second year, when he was called to the home beyond. Soon after conference Brother Bennett was taken with biliousness which developed into typhoid fever. He continued his work until unable to endure longer, preaching his last sermon on September 28, although at that time he was scarcely able to stand. Two days later he was taken to the General Hospital at Saginaw, where he rapidly grew worse and died on Monday, October 13, 1913, in the 29th year of his age. Brother Bennett was a man of excellent promise. He was

well endowed mentally and gave himself to the ministry of the gospel when not more than sixteen years of age, preaching as an evangelist in England for several years before coming to America. He was a good preacher, being of studious habits and applying himself with constant diligence in his preparation for his work. His examinations were always with high standings and he earned a literary degree through a correspondence course while taking his conference course of study. He was held in high esteem by his people as a preacher and as a Christian gentleman. He was planning a campaign for the raising of the debt upon the parsonage at Freeland, and was looking forward to his ministry with an eager desire to accomplish much in the Master's name for the good of his fellowmen. The particular event to which he was looking with much joy was his marriage to Miss Jennie Stingel, of Saginaw, Mich., which was to occur October 22, the cards being out before he went to the hospital. Man's plans are always subject to inter-

position from higher powers, and Brother Bennett was called to leave this world without the consummation of the purposes, which he cherished. Brother Bennett was alone in this country so far as his own family was concerned, but that fact did not prevent his being buried in a Christian way with all possible attention and tokens of affection from his brother ministers and from his present and former congregations. The services were held in Ames church, Saginaw, and the house was filled with sympathetic people, a large company coming from Freeland, from Central church, Bay City, and from Unionville. Beautiful floral tributes covered the casket. Young men of his Bible class at Freeland bore the casket to the grave, and twenty-one ministers were present to perform all possible offices of brotherly kindness.

Interment was made in Forest Lawn cemetery, Saginaw, on a lot purchased in the name of Detroit conference, and the Young Men's Bible class at Freeland ask the privilege of placing a stone to mark the resting place of their beloved pastor and teacher.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONNECTIONAL INTEREST.

One of the outstanding features of our beloved Church, is her Connectional Spirit, fostered by the various Boards and the regularly appointed agencies, organized for furthering the Kingdom of God.

We hail with delight the formal opening of our great University at Washington, D. C., and pledge ourselves in every possible way to seek and secure from our Churches the co-operation that this institution merits.

That we recognize in the Book Concern a very valuable agency for the spreading of safe, wholesome and religious literature throughout the world. We rejoice in the record of a total sales last year amounting to \$2,666,955.69 and a dividend for the support of Superannuated Ministers the largest in the history of the Church. The question of the Home Missionary and Church Extension and the Foreign Missionary Association of the Church grows rapidly.

The crisis of the hour demands that the Church should not only bring her tithes into the storehouse but give herself in the spirit of her Lord to world enlightenment and world salvation. We gladly recognize in the W. H. and W. F. Missionary Society valuable auxiliary agencies in the Missionary enterprise of the Church. The past year has been one of marked activity and some changes in our Deaconess Home. Mrs. Margaret Delight Moors, who has served the Home faithfully for a period of eight and one-half years as Superintendent, resigned her position to take effect July 1, 1914. During July and August, Mrs. D. B. Street, of Washington, D. C., the General Secretar" of the Deaconess Bureau of the W. H. M. Society, took charge of the Home, assisted by Miss Deborah B. Kerfoot, the Senior Deaconess of our Detroit Home. Early in September, Miss H. Sophie Sprague became our official head. Miss Sprague has entered upon the duties of her new position with bright promise of success.

There have been other changes in the Home during the year: Miss Alice E. Metcalf passed to her Heavenly Home, June 12, 1914. Miss Mary O. Marquis, on account of illhealth, gave up the work temporarily. Miss Grace Coventry and Miss Ethel Young have been transferred to the Cleveland Home. Miss Mabel Coggins is a second year student at the Lucy Webb Hayes Training School at Washington, D. C., and Miss Bessie Chambers is a first Year Student at the Michigan Training School at Grand Rapids. Miss A. Blanche Hall has also been transferred to another Home.

The following Deaconesses now constitute our Home and their licenses have been renewed.

Miss H. Sophie Sprague, Superintendent, the Misses De-borah B. Kerfoot. Kate A. Blackburn, Alice B. Shirey, Mary J. Harrison, Rosa M. Bradley, Cora A. Cole, Nellie O. Stevens, Ella M. Lathrop, Edith A. Wilsey, Ella M. Bateman, Mabel M. Biggs, Ethel Herren.

The Bureau has tried to accomplish two definite things this year, namely, to secure a low rate of transportation, and to equitably distribute the actual cost of carriage to and from Conference. In the first effort we have been only partially successful. Owing to the late Conference date, we could secure no excursion rates and our work in this di rection has been confined to seeking the shortest routes of travel. In the second effort we have been highly successful, every man of the Conference having paid in full the balance due the bureau. The treasurer has been able, with a close economy, to pay all claims, as our financial report will show. Among these claims we are glad to report the traveling expenses of our retired brethren.

The Bureau asks, as an aid to the further efficiency of its work a Conference date as near the 15th of September as the conveniences of other interests will permit. We request on the part of those brethren having balances due the treasurer, a check in favor of the treasurer at least ten days before the opening of Conference. We must insist that the retired men who wish to avail themselves of the courtesy of the Conference promptly state their intention to attend Conference on the request of the board.

Rules of Order

Adopted in 1869, Modified in 1875, and Adopted at Each Session Since.

1. The Conference shall meet at $8\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock A. M., and adjourn at 12 M., but may alter the time of meeting and adjourn at its discretion.

2. The President shall take the chair precisely at the time to which the Conference stood adjourned. The first half hour of the session shall be devoted to religious services, and thereafter the journals of the preceding day shall be read and approved.

3. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but, in case of an appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

4. He shall appoint all Committees, not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference, but any member may decline serving on more than one Committee at the same time.

5. All motions and resolutions introduced by any member shall be reduced to writing, if the President, Secretary, or any member of the Conference requests it.

6. When a motion, resolution, or report presented is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference, but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before action or amendment.

7. No new motion or resolution shall be made before the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following should intervene, which motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, viz.: Indefinite postponement, lying on the table, reference to a Committee, postponement to any given time, or amendment.

8. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President, to call him to order when he departs from the question, uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems the speaker out of order, or any other member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

9. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President.

10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, or more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

11. When any motion or resolution shall have passed, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration.

12. No member shall absent himself from the services of Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time such question is put by the President, except by leave of Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

14. Every member who shall be within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, excuses him.

15. No motion shall be considered unless seconded.

16. The Secretary shall keep a journal of the proceedings of the Conference, and, when approved, shall record them in a book provided for that purpose. He shall take charge of the journal and other papers of the Conference, and preserve them with care; suffer no person to take a copy of any paper during the interval of Conference, except with the consent of the Conference; and shall forward the journal and papers to the next Annual Conference.

17. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, and shall be decided without debate.

18. No preacher shall bring any charge against any member of this Conference until he has first given him information of the same, either by letter or otherwise, ten days in advance, if practicable, so that the accused may have an opportunity for defense.

19. When any brother intends to object to the passage of another's character, it shall be his duty to hand the name of the person against whom objections are to be made to the President of the Conference.

20. Two-thirds of the members present, and voting, may order the previous question on a pending motion.

[A motion to table an amendment to a resolution does not carry the resolution to the table.]

STUDIES FOR LOCAL PREACHERS.

No questions upon the Local Preacher's course will be provided unless the chairman is notified at least six weeks before Conference.

Regulations

1. The Conference has requested the District Superintendents to present the names, as candidates for admission on trial in the Conference, of such per-sons only as have attained the equivalent of a twelve grade high school edu-cation. But time previously spent either in supply work or in one of our schools in preparation for the ministry, shall be allowed in credit.

2. Each candidate for admission on trial, for admission into full membership or for ordination as local deacons or local elders, must appear before the Committee on Ministerial Equipment during the first days of the Conference session, which committee shall examine the candidate as to his personal attitude to the doctrines and discipline of the Church.

3. The examination of candidates for admission on trial and for or-dination as local deacons and local elders will be held at the seat of the Annual Conference the day before the opening session, and must be com-pleted that day. If desired, the examinations for the above purposes can be taken at the midyear examinations, as indicated in the schedule. According to the ruling of the Bishop no person can be received on trial, nor elected to beacons or Elders orders, while conditioned in any study.

4. A properly authenticated certificate showing that a candidate has already pursued and passed a satisfactory examination in a prescribed study as a regular attendant on the class room instruction, in any of our regular Theological Seminaries, Universities and Colleges approved by our University Senate, will be received in lieu of conference examination.

5. Similar certificates will also be accepted in all studies not biblical or theological from other than Methodist Schools, if of equal grade with those approved by our University Senate. The examiner in each particu-lar case must satisfy himself as to whether the work done is a fair equiv-

6. No credits, except such as may be presented from our own schools, shall be allowed or accepted, unless presented at least four weeks just pre-ceding the date of the annual Conference: and District Superintendents shall be required to rigidly always this rule. be required to rigidly observe this rule.

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7. A certificate of graduation from one of our regular Theological Seminaries will be accepted in place of an examination in all the biblical and theological studies. Also a certificate of graduation from one of our regular colleges will be accepted in place of an examination in all literary studies of the various courses.

8. A certificate of admission to any high school or academy of good standing will be accepted in place of an examination in "Elementary English." A certificate of graduation from any such school will be accepted in place of an examination for "English Branches."

9. Certificates presented for credit should show the amount of time given to the subject, text books used, and the year in which the work was done.

10. There will be two midyear examinations during the year. The first will be held at 9 a. m. on the last Tuesday in April, and the second on the first Tuesday in August, at such places as may be determined by the Chairman of the Board. The places to be duly announced in the "Michigan Christian Advocate" at least two weeks before the time of Examination in each case. At such examinations candidates can write only on the studies as prescribed in the above schedule.

11. All candidates are required to appear at the midyear examinations, writing upon the subjects as prescribed in the above plan, or furnish satisfactory excuse to the Chairman. The Registrar is authorized to give each student a five per cent higher mark on all studies on which the candidate writes at the mid-year examination.

12. Each candidate shall file with the Registrar on the Tuesday preceding the opening of the Annual Conference a written statement that he has read all the books "To be read." No substitutes for books to be read will be accepted. This rule applies also to candidates for local deacon's orders.

13. Sermons and essays may be sent to the Registrar at any time providing sufficient postage is enclosed to allow the Registrar to forward same to the proper Examiner, otherwise they may be handed in at the midyear examinations. They should be handed in as early in the year as possible. This rule applies also to candidates for local deacons orders.

14. All sermons and essays should be in the hands of the Registrar at least one month before the Conference convenes.

15. Sermons, essays and examination papers shall not be signed, but the name of the candidate shall be written on a separate sheet and attached to each of his papers. The Registrar shall forward all papers to the proper Examiner without the candidate's name, but accompanied by the number corresponding to the number of the candidate's name on the registrar's roll.

16. By order of the Conference each candidate is required to pay annually, at his first examination, a fee of one dollar. Unless the fee is paid no papers of the candidate can be forwarded by the Registrar to the several examiners.

17. Each examiner shall prepare and send to the chairman at least one month before the time of the midyear examination two different lists o at least ten questions on each subject assigned him: one list to be used at the midyear examination and the other to be used at the Conference examination. Each examiner is expected to furnish such information and suggestion concerning the books or subjects assigned him as will be most helpful to the students pursuing the course of study and preparing for the examinations. Students are invited to consult personally or by letter with the examiner shall grade and mark the papers, essays and sermons on a scale of 100, and the candidate must attain a standing of 70 in order to pass. After an examiner has marked and delivered a paper to the Registrarhe shall have no authority to change the marking without the consent of the Board.

18. All examinations shall take place in the presence of a member of the Board or of a Supervisor appointed by the Chairman, who shall collect the fees, papers, sermons and essays, and shall forward them immediately to the Registrar.

19. At the several examinations the subjects will be taken up in the order in which they appear in this schedule. After a class has written upon a set of questions, no absentee shall be permitted to write up on the same set without consent of the Board, or of the conducting examiner or supervisor. The candidate shall be required to finish writing on one study before receiving questions on another.

20. In case any candidate fails in examination on any subject, the Board of Examiners shall review his case for final marking. The candidate, if so desiring, may appear before the Board.

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
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
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
