## Plants of Special Interest.



### *Achyranthus Verschaffeltii*—*Ireseni Herbstii*.

A beautiful new ornamental foliaged plant, having dark crimson leaves, with ribs and stem of a bright carmine purple amaranth, veined metallic, the plant forming a neat, compact bush of about 18 inches in height, well adapted either for pot culture or for the open borders of the Flower Garden. Price, 20 cents each; \$2.00 per dozen.

### *Ageratum Variegatum*.

A great acquisition to our variegated plants. Leaves finely variegated, yellow and green, shaded with crimson. Flowers blue, as in the well known *A. Mexicanum*. Very free grower and a profuse bloomer. Price 20 cents each; \$2 per dozen.

### *Aloysia Citriodora*—*Lemon Verbena*.
