

My organisation affiliates the principal Australian Societies concerned with investigation of unidentified flying objects (UFO) sighting reports.

Research in UFO's has been hitherto undertaken principally by defence organisations, such as the Royal Australian and United States Air Forces. Of recent months, however, the subject has become one of general scientific interest following hearings before a Committee of the U.S. Congress, and published statements made by Dr. J. Allen Hynek of North Western University who was for 18 years U.S. Air Force Scientific Consultant on UFO's.

Shortly after the Congressional hearings the U.S. Air Force announced the making of a grant of \$313,000 (U.S.) to the University of Colorado for the purpose of an analysis of the UFO problem by a team of University scientists.

The project has now been organised under the leadership of Dr. Edward U. Condon of the University of Colorado's Physics Department.

The propose of my letter is to enquire whether the C.S.I.R.O. would consider establishing a similar investigation in Australia to the Colorado Project. No doubt, there are certain advantages to be gained in such an investigation being made here at this time, arising from the possibility of exchange of information, and correlation of procedures between the two projects.

I have no doubt that full co-operation can be expected from Colorado University, since I understand that some contact has already been made between



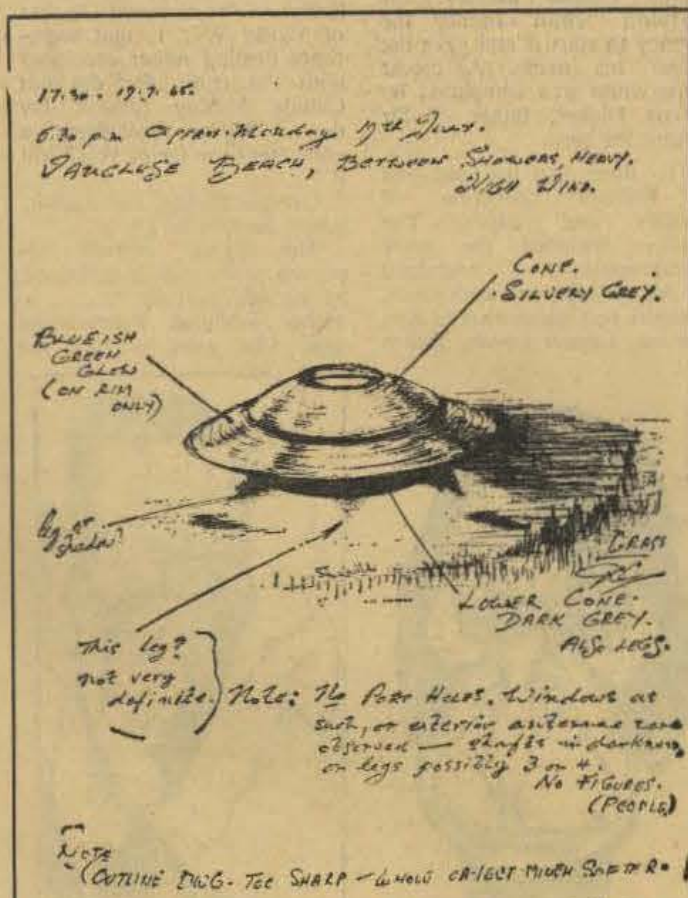
MARSH GAS, MOONSHINE or SPACEMEN?

THERE can be no doubt that Unidentified Flying Objects — UFOs — are among the most perplexing phenomena of our era. Sightings have been reported by trained and intelligent individuals: astronomers, regular army officers, physicians, radar operators, university professors, test pilots and the police.

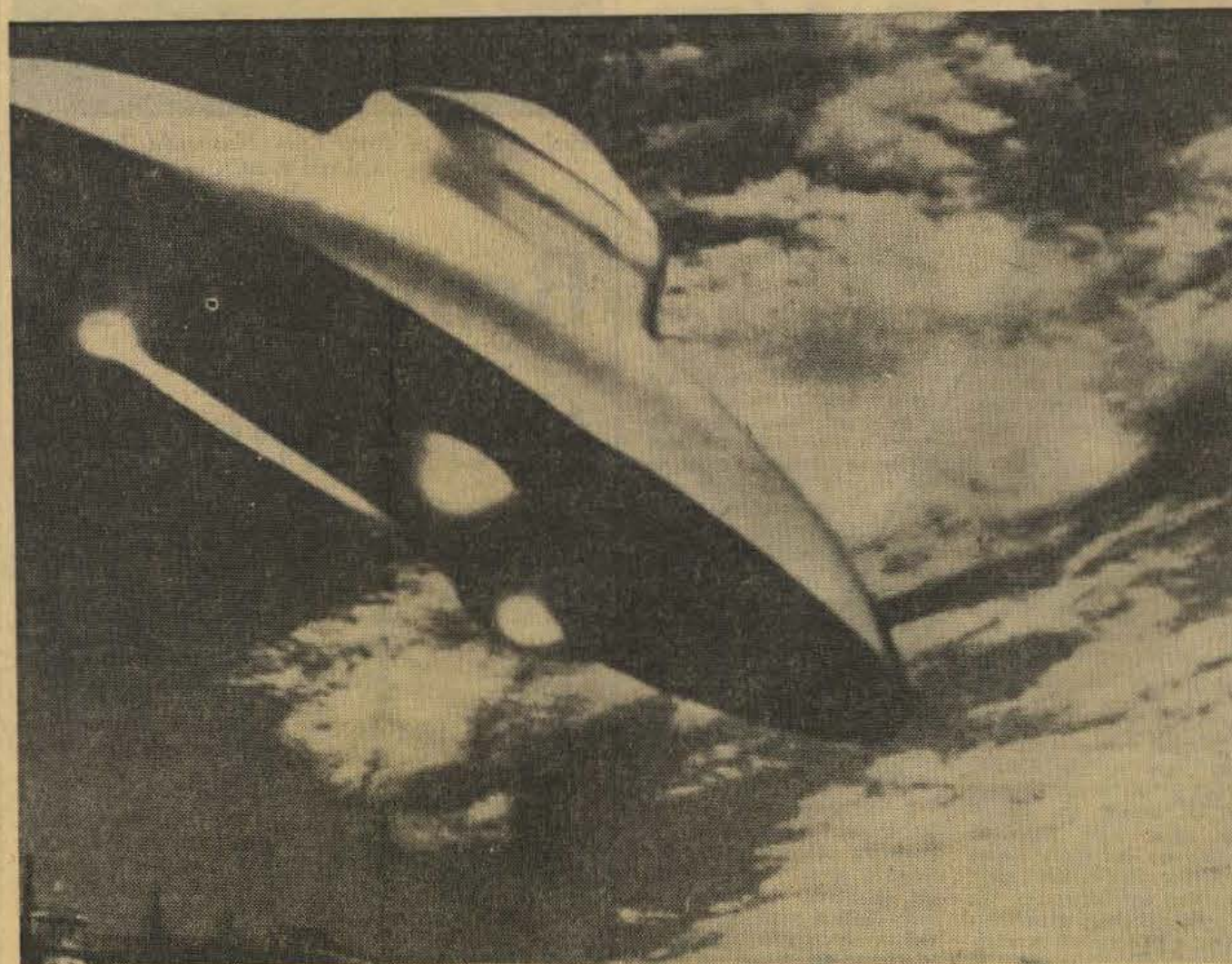

stooped old man dressed in animal skins wandered into the auditorium saying "I'm an observer from Alpha Centauri. It's been a very informative meeting". Flying saucer zealots regularly appear on television, are heard on the radio, and write for the mass magazines. Some of these crackpots say they have made trips aboard saucers, believe the saucers are flown by demigods and, in general, put discredit on any serious investigation of the phenomena. The head of the Amalgamated Flying Saucer Club of America in Los Angeles, Gabriel Green, insists he can prove that "we have been visited regularly by extra-terrestrials". Many of the 3,700 members of his group say that they have seen saucers and some claim they have travelled in the space craft, according to Mr Green — a lean, intense man who has twice run for the presidency of the USA on a "Flying Saucer" ticket.

The explanation for these types is simple: they have been conditioned by years of space-age comic strips, science fiction and TV shows. Just as a few generations ago intelligent and observant people believed in ghosts, saw them, and described them in great detail, so these individuals now see saucers.

But in ruling out the cranks, one still cannot completely rule out the possibility that some

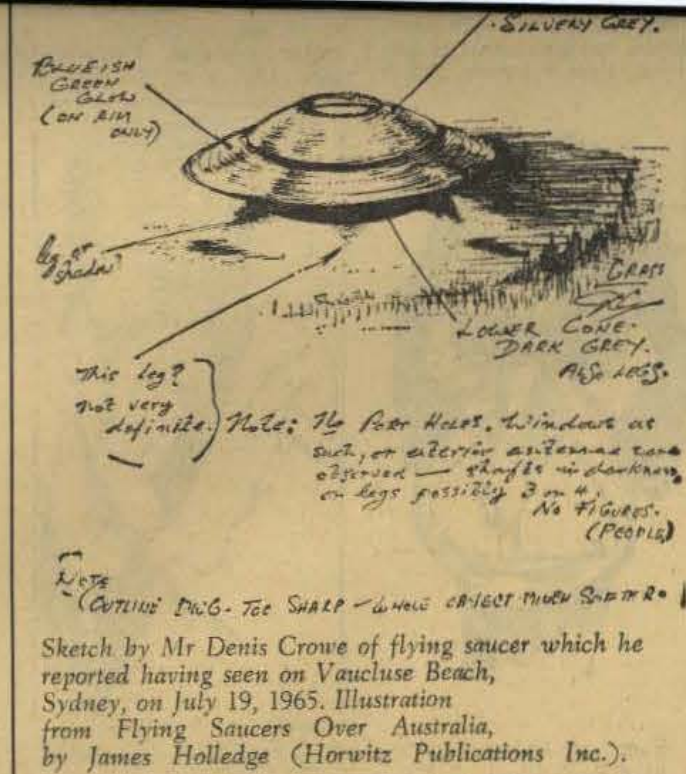

Last October the US Air Force announced that a thorough investigation of "unidentified flying objects" (UFOs) was to be conducted at the University of Colorado by a team of distinguished scientists headed by Dr Edward Condon, former director of the National Bureau of Standards. At long last, the scientific community is apparently abandoning the stance of the medieval astronomers who refused to look through Galileo's telescope at sun spots because "since the sun is perfect, it couldn't have spots, and therefore it is no use looking for them".

Dr Condon has 15 months and \$313,000 with which to arrive at some conclusions about flying saucers. As many as 100 specialists will be consulted, and the National Academy of Science has agreed to review the results of the doctor's work.

Since the announcement of the programme more than 400 letters have arrived on his desk, many of the writers wanting jobs or seeking to assist the project in one way or another. "The important thing is that a lot of people in both the physical and psychological sciences in other universities are interested", Dr Condon says. "There is no tendency to ridicule the project at that level".

One of this scientist's main problems will be to send out investigating teams whenever a new saucer sighting is reported. "Most of these things are so transient and evanescent that you are not likely to be able to get the men there with the equipment you would like them to have", he admits. It's not like rushing a medical team to an epidemic area because "an epidemic stays

there until you get there", he complains. The saucers, like the biggest fish, always seem to get away.

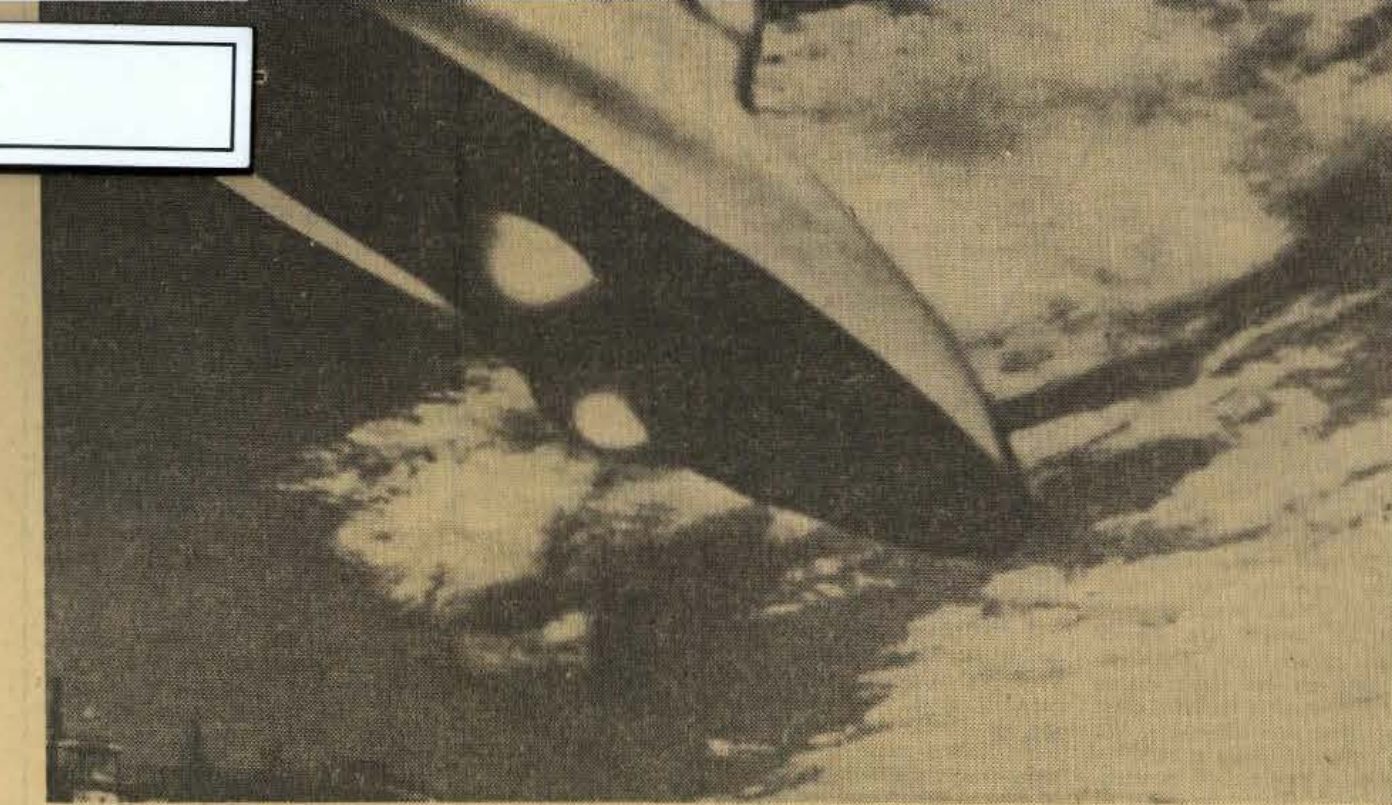
The man who probably knows more about UFOs than any other is J. Allen Hynek, head of the astronomy department at Northwestern University and, since 1948, the US Air Force's official adviser on the subject. For almost 20 years he has been monitoring the UFO situation around the world, devouring thousands of reports and interviewing hundreds of eye witnesses. Although Dr Hynek is loath to make accusations, he feels evidently that the Air Force has, to some degree, tried to sweep the UFO situation under a rug for the past two decades. In 1953 the military hastily assembled a panel of senior scientists under the direction of Howard P. Robertson from the California Institute of Technology, discussed UFOs for only four days, looked at just 15 reports and concluded that "the evidence presented on unidentified flying objects showed no indication that these phenomena constitute a direct physical threat to national security", and that "there is no evidence that the phenomena indicated a need for revision of current scientific concepts".

Since then, whenever a rash of UFO sightings has occurred, the Air Force has dutifully pointed to the "Robertson Report" as firm evidence that it is nothing serious. Now, all that will be changed. How

does one explain away the many sightings of UFOs? They have been called swamp gas, identified as weather balloons, satellites, aircraft, meteors, searchlights on clouds, and optical illusions. They definitely do not seem to be a mass hallucination because too many reputable people have seen them. It is also unlikely that they are secret military weapons, because no veil of earthly secrecy can last for two decades.

Those who doubt that UFOs are from outer space have, in recent years, been able to point to significant evidence. The space-scanning devices used by the North American Air Defence Command had not until 1965 reported any unknown objects, although they keep track of more than 1,000 items in orbit. Strangely enough however, three objects in orbit have just recently been listed as "unknown" — objects that have not been connected with any launching site or country of origin.

They were discovered last May and June by US tracking radar. Their existence was kept secret until early October while government officials debated whether to admit that they had found objects whose origin could not be determined. Secrecy prohibits US officials from discussing the sizes of the three objects. Tracking agencies have said in the past that radar could find orbiting objects as small as 12in long. Yet there have been

indications that at least two of the three objects found last May are much larger, and that they were in orbit perhaps for years before they were discovered.

Conversely, a continuing sky survey conducted by the Mount Palomar Observatory in California produced 5,000 wide-angle, high magnification photographs of the heavens.

The Harvard Meteor project of 1954-58 produced 3,300 hours of star-gazing. Another 2,500 hours were added by the Smithsonian's visual Prairie Network project. "Not a single unidentified object has been noted", the reports indicate.

Until Dr Condon's group got together, those who believed in saucers complained that detection efforts were

cursorious and ill-manned. Believers began their own semi-private organisations to track down the origin of saucers.

In 1952, APRO (the Aerial Phenomena Research Organisation) was founded, and several years later the National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena began. The latter group has seen its membership double to more

than 11,000 in the last year alone. One of its top executives Richard Hall, says there have been enough confirmed sightings to justify an intensive scientific scrutiny of UFOs, but his group declines to express a view on the nature of the saucers.

Other fringe groups are not so conservative. At a recent Los Angeles convention, a

crackpot says they have made trips aboard saucers, believe the saucers are flown by demigods and, in general, put discredit on any serious investigation of the phenomena. The head of the Amalgamated Flying Saucer Club of America in Los Angeles, Gabriel Green, insists he can prove that "we have been visited regularly by extra-terrestrials". Many of the 3,700 members of his group say that they have seen saucers and some claim they have travelled in the space craft, according to Mr Green — a lean, intense man who has twice run for the presidency of the USA on a "Flying Saucer" ticket.

The explanation for these types is simple: they have been conditioned by years of space-age comic strips, science fiction and TV shows. Just as a few generations ago intelligent and observant people believed in ghosts, saw them, and described them in great detail, so these individuals now see saucers.

But in ruling out the cranks, one still cannot completely rule out the possibility that some of these UFOs may be visitors from afar. Scientists confirm it is hard to believe that our world, alone among the countless planetary systems, is the only one where intelligent life has evolved. It remains for Dr Condon's group, within the next year, to determine whether there is life out there and if it is trying to get through to us on earth.

Unfortunately, the organization of C.S.I.R.O. is not such that it would be possible for the Commanding Officer of the relevant R.A.A.F. Base investigating an U.F.O. to correspond directly with people at a regional level.

C.S.I.R.O.'s laboratories cover research work in both the agricultural and biological sciences and the industrial and physical sciences, and these laboratories are spread throughout the Commonwealth. There is no Officer-in-Charge on a regional basis as such.

However, it would be possible to nominate officers in Perth, Adelaide, Sydney, Brisbane, and Canberra through whom the relevant R.A.A.F. Commanding Officer might get in contact. Our officer could then get in touch with this office in order to determine where a specific enquiry might best be directed in C.S.I.R.O. The normal functions of the officers I have in mind would be administrative, and they would be unable to provide any technical advice. However, if you feel the suggestion would be of assistance, I would be grateful if you would let me know.

As mentioned in my memorandum of the 7th November, it would be helpful if correspondence about these matters could be addressed to me at this office, rather than to the Organization's office in Canberra.



Please excuse this handwritten letter but I wanted to catch the evening mail & may not have done so had I waited for the typists. I would like to add a few details to today's telephone conversation. Dr. Vallee an astronomer at the University of Chicago and Professor J.A. Hynek, whom I saw in Chicago a few weeks ago are very interested in the U.F.O. phenomenon from the point of view of a scientific investigation: so am I and so are many other scientists in other countries. These gentlemen have carefully documented files on many (about 6000) sightings in many different countries. Many of these sightings are doubtful but there are a large number which it has not so far been possible to explain in terms of natural phenomena — these are the cases of interest. Dr. Vallee has at his disposal a computer program for an automatic question - answering system (which was originally developed for stellar astronomy). He has asked Dr. O. Phantos in Brazil, Professor Michel in France, myself and several other scientists in different



countries to collect data on sightings and where possible interview those who originate the report in order to determine its reliability and so weight it for future statistical analyses. This information will be coded, so that it can be punched onto an IBM card and later fed onto a magnetic library tape for use with the question - answering system. Present investigations have indicated the existence of certain patterns in this phenomenon but unfortunately much more data is required before great reliance can be placed on the results of such an investigation. Several reports from isolated observers, contiguous in time and consistent in description would appear to suggest that perhaps some observations are made sequentially along great circle routes: again more data is needed. "handing" reports have been quite frequent in South America and, I believe, in the Southern Hemisphere on a whole. What is needed is information ① as soon as it is turned in - so that the case can be correlated with other information, if possible, at Dearborne Observatory ② results of the follow-up. I would like to investigate cases myself where possible and would be very willing to be of

I stress that this is a scientific investigation and that, although my interest is extra-curricular, I feel that it is very necessary to subject those unexplained phenomena to scientific investigation.

1. The attached letter is a follow-up to a long telephone call which AI-2 took recently. You will note that one of the scientists involved in this UFO investigation is Dr HYNEK who is stated to be the scientific advisor on UFO's to the United States. Dr DUGGIN, however is acting in an extra- curricular capacity.
2. You will note that these scientists are mainly interested in the unexplained UFO's, but as far as I can make out they would like information on all sightings. As you know, we already have an official arrangement with CSIRO whereby we can pass to them any UFO report on which we would like their assistance, so it would really be only a question of stretching this arrangement slightly to pass them a copy of all reports. However, Dr DUGGIN's interest is un-official as far as CSIRO is concerned and this may cause embarrassment.
3. These scientists, with all the documents and facilities available to them, are obviously in a position to assist us in this matter, and though I am not too keen on releasing the details of the RAAF investigations or anything which may increase the interest of the general public in this field, I think we should give these scientists the information they require. However, although they would like the information as soon as possible, I recommend that we stick to our present system for UFO investigations, i.e. the nearest RAAF Base investigates the report and passes it up through Command Headquarters to Department of Air. If we change the system to allow CSIRO to get a copy of the report before it has completed the RAAF process, we may have two concurrent investigations of the same report.

The NASA Melbourne Office will be happy to assist in any way in commenting on sightings of UFO's as requested in your letter of 28th November. However, at this time it does not appear likely that any comments we might make would be particularly useful.

Satellites launched by NASA operate at such altitudes and are of such small size that it is extremely unlikely that any of these would result in the typical public report of an UFO. The mere fact that satellites are listed as "visible" in various periodic listings does not make them visible in the sense that UFO's are reported to be.

Spent launch vehicles or spacecraft or parts, such as nose-cones or aerodynamic fairings, do of course, re-enter the atmosphere when their orbital altitudes reduce, but these objects would behave very like a meteor and again would not be candidates for the typical public UFO report.



2/...

Only one class of object which NASA is currently involved with in this country might lead to public reports of UFO's and these are the high altitude balloons which we plan to fly from Mildura. These balloons, with a volume of 10 million cubic feet, relatively low altitudes of 140,000 feet maximum, and velocities corresponding to high upper air winds for periods of up to 12 hours, might conceivably lead to UFO reports. NASA is not alone in flying balloons in this country - in fact we are just now starting - but all such operations are under the cognizance of the Department of Supply, including the NASA operations. I would therefore like to suggest that you enlist the services of Mr. M. Ian Homewood, Assistant Secretary (Projects), Department of Supply, for his comments on UFO reports, since his staff is intimately concerned with Australian high altitude balloon operations.

The "Designated Authority" for the RAAF will be the Officer Commanding of the RAAF Base investigating the UFO sighting, who will be acting on behalf of the Air Officer Commanding Operational Command or the Air Officer Commanding Support Command as appropriate.
2. If it is thought that DCA may be able to help in providing information relevant to a sighting, the Base will forward a copy of the UFO report direct to the local DCA authority responsible for the area in which the sighting was made with a request for any information that could be of assistance to the inquiry.
3. Headquarters Operational Command and Headquarters Support Command will be informed of this arrangement so that all RAAF Bases will be aware of the policy of direct liaison with local DCA authorities in the investigation of UFO sightings.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

1. Sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFO's) have during recent months been receiving considerable publicity. Although it is not considered that any of these sightings give any cause for alarm or reflect a need to change the official view on this subject, it is important that the system of investigation should make the best use of resources in AUSTRALIA.
2. As you are no doubt aware the Royal Australian Air Force is responsible for the investigation of UFO's. Under existing arrangements anyone who sights an object which he cannot identify is invited to fill in a questionnaire which is designed to provide all the details necessary for an investigation. The nearest Air Force base is then required to give an assessment as to the origin of the sighting.
3. The decision to investigate reports of UFO's at RAAF base level was made on the grounds that base personnel would be familiar with local phenomena, weather conditions and aircraft movements which between them give rise to many UFO reports. There are occasions however when the investigation points to some phenomena such as a satellite as the likely explanation. In many instances RAAF units have been able to obtain information from local bodies to assist them in their enquiries, but it is now considered that all authorities that could throw any light on these incidents should be officially associated with the investigation system.
4. Your agreement is therefore sought to the proposal that whenever the UFO investigation suggests that your organization might be able to provide some assistance a copy of the UFO report should be sent to you for your comments. It is felt that in this way better use could be made of the information available within your organization and that a more accurate assessment of the likely cause of the UFO report could be achieved.

We shall be glad to cooperate in the identification of what you refer to as "Unidentified Flying Objects".

If I can be permitted a personal observation I would like to say the following:

Astronomers, by definition, are (1) trained scientific observers who spend long hours on mountain tops under completely dark skies, and (2) familiar with what objects should be present in the dark sky. Yet, in twenty years of spending a large fraction of the nights in this way - on mountain tops in Australia, California, and South Africa, I have not seen any object that could be called "unidentified and flying". Nor have any of my colleagues on these same mountain tops. Nevertheless, during the same period, members of the general public, living in the haze and glare of large cities, and unacquainted with the night sky, are constantly seeing such objects.







REPORTING AND INVESTIGATING OF AIR SAFETY INCIDENTS
WHERE RAAF AND CIVIL AIRCRAFT ARE INVOLVED

this Department

1. During a liaison visit to Depair between the Director of the Air Safety Investigation Branch, Department of Civil Aviation and the Directorate of Flying Safety, RAAF, the question of the present system of reporting and investigating air safety incidents, where RAAF and civil aircraft are involved was discussed at some length.

2. It was obvious from this discussion that DCA are experiencing difficulty in implementing the present system of reporting and investigation direct to Commands. One of the main difficulties is that DCA have no knowledge of which command an RAAF aircraft may come under. As a result of this discussion the following proposal is put forward for consideration.

3. Where air safety incidents occur which involve RAAF and Civil aircraft the following system of reporting and investigation should apply:-

is proposed.

(a) RAAF Designated Authorities should be nominated, ^{should be} ~~then~~ appointments advised to DCA and written into the scheme, with authority to investigate and report on all air safety incidents which occur in their area of responsibility.

(b) The following should be appointed as Designated Authorities:-

② AOC Operational Command - for the investigation and reporting of all ASIMs in Northern NSW and the SYDNEY Area.

① AOC Support Command - for the investigation and reporting of all ASIMs in the Victorian Area.

OC RAAF Base EDINBURGH - South Australian Area.
OC RAAF Base PEARCE - Western Australian Area.
OC RAAF Base DARWIN - Northern Territory Area.
OC RAAF Base TOWNSVILLE - North Queensland Area.
OC RAAF Base AMBERLEY - South Queensland Area.
OC RAAF Base CANBERRA - Southern NSW Area.

It is envisaged that the CATCO at Commands and the SATCO at bases will carry out the actual work of investigation and reporting for the Designated Authority.

4. With the above organization the scheme would work along the following lines:-

- (a) Where the person reporting is the captain of an RAAF aircraft.
- (b) The captain notifies the ground station controlling him at the time that an air safety incident has occurred. Full known details including aircraft call sign and destination or next point of landing should be given.
- (c) The ground station receiving the report, whether RAAF or Civil should make a written report and forward it to the nearest DCA regional director.
- (d) The RAAF captain, upon landing, and in conjunction with the base SATCO dispatches an AIM to Depair (DFS) for info command.
- (e) If the incident has occurred within the area of responsibility of the base at which the aircraft has landed the SATCO will dispatch an air safety incident message (ASIM) to the DCA Regional Director for the area, also keeping the Designated Authority informed of his actions.

- (f) The Designated Authority, through SATCO will then investigate the incident fully with the DCA Regional Director and if possible arrive at a decision and make recommendations for any necessary action.
- (g) The Designated Authority will then make a written report through Command to Depair. This written report does not absolve the captain of the aircraft from his obligation under AFO 10/D/1 from raising the normal form A182.
- (h) If the incident occurs outside the area of responsibility of the base at which the aircraft has landed the pilot in conjunction with SATCO is to dispatch an AIM as in 4(d) above, but in addition is to address a copy headed "FOR INFO AND ACTION" to the Designated Authority for the area where the incident occurred.
- (j) The Designated Authority in this area, upon receipt of such an AIM is to raise an ASIM and dispatch it to the DCA Regional Director for the area. He is then to carry out the investigating and reporting procedure with the Regional Director as outlined in para 4, sub paras (f) and (g).

3 5. Where the captain reporting the incident is a civil pilot:-

- (a) The captain makes his initial report on VHF to the ground station controlling him and upon landing makes his report to the DCA Regional Director.
- (b) The DCA Regional Director will then contact the RAAF Designated Authority in the area and the investigation and reporting procedure, so far as the RAAF are concerned, will be as stated in the previous paragraphs.

(c) If the Designated Authority is unable to complete such an investigation, ie the aircraft may have only been transitting through his area, he is to ascertain through Air Traffic Control the parent command and if possible the home base of the RAAF aircraft and have these details notified to the DCA area Regional Director. He will also ensure that a signal is sent to the captain of the RAAF aircraft at destination advising him that an ASIM has been raised and giving the pertinent details. The DCA Regional Director should forward his report, via his normal chain of command to the DCA Regional Director of the aircraft's home base.

(d) The DCA Regional Director in this area should then work through the RAAF Designated Authority to have the incident investigated and reported upon. The RAAF Designated Authority will then forward his reports through command to Depair.

6. The following are examples of how the scheme should work in practice:-

Situation. A RAAF aircraft of Operational Command ^{en}route RICHMOND to PEARCE has a near miss with a civil aircraft near KALGOOLIE. The RAAF Captain is reporting the incident.

(a) The RAAF Captain will report the incident in the first instance by VHF to DCA ground station KALGOOLIE. Upon arrival at PEARCE the captain, in conjunction with SATCO will dispatch an AIM to Depair, for info Operational Command. The SATCO will dispatch an ASIM to DCA PERTH. Full investigation will be carried out by the DCA Regional Director, PERTH and the Designated Authority RAAF PEARCE.

- (b) On completion, the Designated Authority RAAF PEARCE will forward his report to Depair via Support Command and include an information copy for Operational Command. Headquarters Operational Command will then advise the pilots home base of the outcome.

Situation. A RAAF aircraft of Support Command ^{en}route TOWNSVILLE to WILLIAMTOWN has an incident with a civil aircraft abeam AMBERLEY.

- (a) The RAAF Captain will advise the ground station controlling him that an incident has occurred.
- (b) On arrival WILLIAMTOWN, he, in conjunction with SATCO will dispatch an AIM including the address "for info and action AMBERLEY". The Designated Authority, RAAF AMBERLEY, will raise an ASIM to DCA Regional Director BRISBANE. The two authorities at AMBERLEY and BRISBANE will then investigate and report the incident fully. The Designated Authority, RAAF AMBERLEY will then forward reports to Depair via Operational Command, copy for Support Command. Headquarters Support Command will then advise the pilot's home base.

Situation. A civil aircraft ^{en}route PERTH to SYDNEY has an incident with a RAAF aircraft over ADELAIDE. The RAAF aircraft is ^{en}route RICHMOND to PEARCE and is under the control of Operational Command. In this incident DCA procedure is for the Regional Director ADELAIDE to carry out all investigation for the civil report.

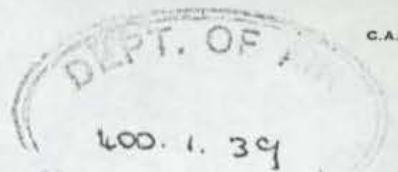
- (a) The DCA Regional Director, ADELAIDE contacts the RAAF Designated Authority EDINBURGH and the investigation and reporting procedure is carried out. The

RAAF Designated Authority forwards his reports via Support Command to Depair, copy to Operational Command.

7. In all case, if agreement cannot be reached between the RAAF Designated Authority and the DCA Regional Director, the matter is to be referred to higher authority.

8. The scheme as here outlined, if acceptable, should be circulated to both commands and to DCA for comment. Following this, a conference between DCA and the RAAF, should be called to settle upon a final scheme which is acceptable to both.

Thank you for your 400/1/39 of the 30th June, 1966.

2. Following a close examination of the draft proposals attached to your memorandum we believe that the principles and procedures expressed therein will result in an improved system for reporting and investigating air safety incidents of mutual interest and therefore we generally agree with them. However, there are some areas where we believe the system could be further improved and we submit the following supplementary proposals for your consideration :-

- (i) In paragraph 1, no R.A.A.F. Authority has been allocated responsibility for investigating air safety incidents of mutual interest occurring in either Tasmania or Papua/New Guinea. We would appreciate your including these states in the areas allocated to R.A.A.F. Commands or Bases.
- (ii) While agreeing to your proposed sub-division of South Australia/Northern Territory and Queensland into areas associated with R.A.A.F. bases, we suggest that the responsibility for investigating air safety incidents throughout New South Wales be vested in the Air Officer Commanding, Operational Command. We feel that the overlapping nature of R.A.A.F. operations in this area justifies the designation of a single authority with overall responsibility for investigations throughout the State.
- (iii) In paragraph 3(c) you state that where an incident cannot be investigated readily by the Authority located in the area of occurrence, the responsibility for the investigation, both R.A.A.F. and D.C.A., should be transferred to the Authority in the area where the pilot is based. We believe that the principal that the responsibility for the investigation remains with the authorities situated in the area of occurrence, irrespective of the location of the home base of any aircraft concerned in the incident, should be preserved. Our reasons

for this are that the majority of the information required for the investigation (e.g. personnel, logs, tapes, etc.) is available only in the area of occurrence, and the locally based investigators have a greater knowledge of the procedures and systems used in their area than investigators located in other areas.


(iv) You propose that notification to D.C.A. of R.A.A.F air safety incidents be made by A.S.I.M. We would prefer that the initial advice of incidents be passed between investigators by telephone and confirmed subsequently by written advice. We believe that telephone advice permits a freer exchange of information concerning the circumstances of the incidents and promotes discussion of mutual interest concerning the proposed handling of the investigation. We also believe that a ground unit should follow the same procedure when reporting an air safety incident of a serious nature.

(v) We suggest also that the proposed procedures should apply when an air safety incident report is submitted by ground units as well as when submitted by pilots-in-command. In this respect we are considering such occurrences as unauthorised penetrations of R.A.A.F. air space by civil aircraft etc.

3. To clarify the situation we have prepared a summary embodying the principles set out in your proposals and the amendments suggested in the previous paragraph. A copy of this summary is attached hereto for your consideration.

4. If this summary, as a basic statement of a system is acceptable to you, we suggest that we should then separately develop draft working procedures for our respective instruction documents with a view to meeting again before they are promulgated to clear away any ambiguities or inconsistencies before the new system is implemented.

5. We look forward to receiving your comments on the suggested course of action.

THE INVESTIGATION OF AIR SAFETY INCIDENTS
INVOLVING OVERLAPPING R.A.A.F. & D.C.A. RESPONSIBILITIES

(This paper proposes the framework of an Organization for the joint investigation of Air Safety Incident Reports involving overlapping R.A.A.F. & D.C.A. responsibilities. It is designed to serve as a statement of principles from which detailed working procedures could be developed.)

1. AUTHORITIES RESPONSIBLE FOR INVESTIGATION

1.1 The allocation of responsibility for the investigation of air safety incidents is based on the principle that they shall be investigated by an authority in the area in which they occur. In order to comply with this principle the following authorities shall be responsible for the investigation of air safety incidents involving overlapping R.A.A.F. and D.C.A. responsibilities in the areas shown -

1.2 The following officers shall investigate air safety incident reports on behalf of the responsible authority -

- (a) R.A.A.F. - *Command* Chief Air Traffic Control Officer, *Staff of Base Operations* where the responsible authority is the Air Officer Commanding a Command Headquarters; or *Air Safety Committee Members of the Air Safety Committee* Senior Air Traffic Control Officer, *Senior Officer* where the responsible authority is the Officer Commanding *Senior Officer* a Base.)

NOTE: Chief Air Traffic Control Officers may *Command* *instruct* appoint a Senior Air Traffic Control Officer at a Base within the area in which the incident occurred to conduct an investigation on their behalf.

- (b) D.C.A. - The Officer-in-Charge of the Air Safety Investigation Branch at the Regional Headquarters.

2. NOTIFICATION OF AIR SAFETY INCIDENTS

2.1 A pilot becoming aware that an air safety incident has occurred shall report brief details to the unit with which he has been communicating and, after landing, shall submit ^a an air safety incident report through the normal channels.

2.2 An officer in a ground unit becoming aware of an incident shall immediately inform the ^{by face to face} senior officer on duty.

2.3 The senior officer on duty shall ensure that The Air Safety Incident Report ^{shall be} is forwarded through the normal channels to the authority, within his Department, responsible for the conduct of the investigation. When the information available indicates that the safety of an aircraft has been seriously hazarded, or when the circumstances appear to constitute a serious threat to safety of other operators or when an aircraft has not been operated in accordance with the terms of a clearance he also shall pass the details by telephone to the responsible investigating authority as soon as possible.

2.4 Details of the incident shall be exchanged by telephone between the R.A.A.F. and D.C.A. investigators in the area of occurrence as soon as possible after the information is received, and these details

shall be subsequently confirmed by written advice through the normal channels.

3. INVESTIGATION

3.1 Irrespective of where an aircraft concerned in an air safety incident is based, the responsibility for the investigation shall not be transferred from area of occurrence.

3.2 Evidence available from sources under the jurisdiction of the investigator's own Department shall be obtained through normal channels.

3.3 Evidence available only from sources within the jurisdiction of the other Department shall be obtained through that Department's investigator in the area of occurrence.

3.4 On completion of the investigation the investigator shall prepare a report and submit it, together with any recommendations, through the normal channels to the appropriate Departmental authority.



Condon To Head UFO Study

The Air Force, beset for years by charges that it considers reports of unidentified flying objects to have a psychiatric rather than an aerodynamic basis, took steps last week to establish what it hopes will be regarded as an impeccably objective scientific investigation of the UFO issue. It announced that the distinguished physicist Edward U. Condon, who is noted for speaking his mind, has agreed to serve as scientific director of a far-ranging, no-strings UFO inquiry backed by \$313,000 of Air Force money. The study, under contract from the Air Force Office of Scientific Research, will be conducted at the University of Colorado, Boulder, where Condon, 64, is professor of physics and astrophysics and a fellow of the Joint Institute for Laboratory Astrophysics.

Condon, who declined to work at Los Alamos during World War II because of what he considered stifling and unnecessary security arrangements, served as director of the National Bureau of Standards from 1945 to 1951. During that time he was attacked by the House Un-American Activities Committee as "one of the weakest links in our atomic security," a charge that caused widespread indignation throughout the scientific community. In 1954, while he was director of research and development for Corning Glass Works, the Navy suspended his security clearance after he had been cleared by three government agencies. Condon publicly denounced the procedure and, rather than reapply for a clearance, resigned from Corning. He later

assailed the Eisenhower administration for "callous indifference" to political attacks on scientists.

Condon was president of the American Physical Society in 1946 and president of the AAAS in 1953. Prior to joining the Colorado faculty, in 1964, he was professor of physics at Washington University, St. Louis.

Associated with him in the UFO study will be Franklin E. Roach, an astrophysicist and air glow specialist on the staff of the Environmental Science Services Administration, Boulder, and Stuart W. Cook, chairman of the Colorado geology department. Cooperation will be sought from other institutions, and, as a final certification of scientific purity, the National Academy of Sciences will review the results of the study.

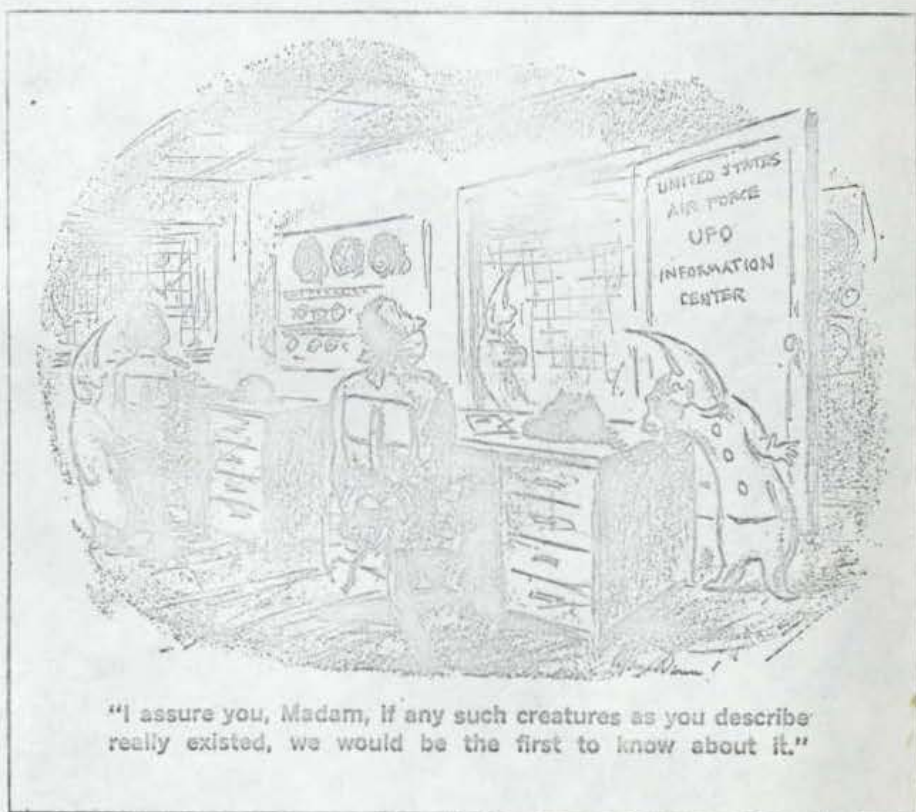
One of the first steps will be a conference around mid-November in Boulder at which Air Force officials will brief Condon and his associates on earlier UFO reports and investigations. It is hoped that detailed plans for the new study can be formulated by the beginning of February.

In connection with the study, the University announced that "the Air Force has given assurances that all information in its possession which bears on the subject will be made available to the University investigators. The University will be given everything, not merely that which is requested." The contract for the investigation is for 15 months, but the Air Force said the study may be extended if necessary.—D.S.G.

- 1. Reference folios 23 - 29.
- 2. There appears to be some confusion concerning departmental policy over UFO's. At folio 5 of file 569/5/461, there is a ministerial statement to the effect that:-

"Anyone who is interested in the sightings of UFO's can apply to Department of Air for information on this subject and is welcome to a synopsis of UFO sightings, which includes a very brief assessment of the probable cause".

This statement was made in answer to ministerial representations. It would appear however, that the policy represented by this statement may not have reflected the views of DAFI (see folio 96 on file 554/1/30) despite earlier, although perhaps inconclusive evidence of his concurrence (see folio 94 on file 554/1/30).

3. At folio 24 ^{on file 2/29/1} DAFI has proposed to DGPP, who in turn referred to DCAS, that our approach to UFO reports be liberalised. It does not appear that either DGPP or DCAS were aware of the Minister's statement. In my opinion, we must either comply with the terms of that statement or inform the Minister of our "new approach" if it is not now intended to provide the synopsis of sightings and on this I am not altogether clear from reading the files.

4. It would however, seem that agreement has now been reached that DPR is to handle all enquiries for information (see folio 15 on ^{file 2/25/1} ~~569/5/461~~). However, it does not appear that DPR has been consulted on the extent of the liberalisation proposed by DAFI in answer to his (DPR's) submission. *not consulted at yet.* Could DPR indicate his view?

5. It would also appear that there is some need for rationalisation of our files on this subject. There are at least four different files which contain a confusion of policy, reported sightings and requests for information. Three of these files are classified - two of which are secret, although there appears to be nothing on the files consistent with this classification. Could DAFI and DPR consider rationalising these files please? *which are held by DAFI* The relevant files with the exceptions of 2/25/1 and 580/1/1 ~~are~~ attached.

** Note DPR rationalised his part by opening 574/3/88; the rest of the files are DAFI's affair.*

2. As you are no doubt aware the Royal Australian Air Force is responsible for the investigation of reports of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs). Under existing arrangements anyone who sights an object which he cannot identify is invited to fill in a questionnaire which is designed to provide all the details necessary for an investigation. The nearest Air Force base is then required to investigate the incident and give an assessment as to the origin of the sighting.
3. The decision to investigate reports of UFOs at RAAF base level was made on the grounds that base personnel would be familiar with local phenomena, weather conditions and aircraft movements which between them give rise to many UFO reports. There are occasions however when the investigation points to some phenomena such as a satellite as the likely explanation.
4. In many instances RAAF units have been able to obtain information and advice from local bodies to assist them in their inquiries, but it is now considered that all authorities that could throw any light on these incidents should be officially associated with the investigation system.
5. Your agreement is therefore sought to the proposal that whenever the UFO investigation suggests that your organization might be able to provide some assistance a copy of the UFO report should be sent to you for your comments. It is felt that in this way better use could be made of the information available within your organization, and that a more accurate assessment of the likely cause of the UFO report could be achieved.

2. This is the first information we have received of the reported sighting and therefore have no record of the incident. Perhaps you may care to follow the matter up with the Department of Civil Aviation, but as it is normal practice for that Department to refer all sightings to the RAAF it seems most unlikely that they had it reported.

3. From the article you enclosed for information it appears that photographs were made of the UFO. This is most interesting and if copies can be made available should provide some interesting discussion.

4. Thank you for the copy of the report but as this is the first information the RAAF has received concerning the incident it is not possible to provide any further details.



Signed, verified reports in NICAP files show UFO speeds of 3,000 m.p.h. or more. Nothing used by the warring nations even remotely approached such fantastic speeds and maneuvers.

2. After the war, long before the first primitive space experiments, official, verified UFO reports kept piling up—sightings and trackings of UFOs singly and in formation, by expert observers in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast Guard and civil aviation. At White Sands Proving Ground, Navy scientists and technicians saw and tracked a UFO at 18,000 m.p.h., in 1948. In 1952, AF pilots, navigators and crewmen aboard a B-29 bomber saw and tracked formations of UFOs flying at 5240 m.p.h., and also tracked a gigantic craft—apparently a carrier ship—at over 9,000. (Official AF Intelligence report.) There have been hundreds of such operations—many of them before the first tiny Russian Sputnik.

3. Today, these same UFO operations continue, in our atmosphere, at such terrific speeds that any conventional aircraft or rocket would burn up from air friction. Massive verified evidence proves that some revolutionary force is involved in UFO propulsion and control—something we have not to date been able to duplicate.

REVOLUTIONARY MACHINES

4. If any of the warring nations had had such tremendously advanced devices in 1942-45, whoever possessed them could have ended the war summarily—and controlled the world. If the U.S. or the U.S.S.R. had had such revolutionary craft after WW II, the possessor long ago would have been operating in space—not with tiny "capsules" but with huge UFO-type spacecraft. Neither we nor the Russians would have kept on spending billions on outmoded aircraft and rockets. The very idea is ridiculous—and no such gigantic development could have been kept secret all these years.

Occasionally, an Echo satellite, a rocket launching or re-entry has caused mistaken UFO reports. So, occasionally, have balloons or meteors. This does not alter the basic facts:

NO earthmade device can possibly explain the UFOs' speeds in our atmosphere. This was true in World War II—and it is still true today.

If you read the "secret weapon" answer in your local paper or hear it broadcast, please try to convince the editor or newscaster that it is untrue, using the facts listed above.

UFO Photos By Airline Captain Reported

Bulletin: The following preliminary report, forwarded to NICAP by an officer of the Criminal Investigations Branch, Townsville, North Queensland, Australia, was received just before our deadline. We are trying to get further details for the next issue.

Five nights after the landing described on page 1, an Australian DC-6 airliner was "buzzed" by an unidentified flying object. According to the police source stated above, the airline captain photographed a round-shaped machine while it paced the aircraft.

This latest UFO encounter, in the early hours of May 28, 1965, involved a DC-6 operated by Ansett-A.N.A. It was on a regular flight from Brisbane to Port Moresby, New Guinea.

At about 3:25 a.m., the airliner captain, using the flight call sign of "VH-INH", radioed a Queensland airport control tower that the DC-6 was being "buzzed" by an unknown flying object. He described it as spherical in shape, flat on the top and the bottom. Exhaust gases could be seen coming from it, he reported.

For ten minutes, the UFO paced the airliner, during which time the captain took several photographs of the mystery craft. He also had two other members of the crew confirm the sighting, before the object raced ahead of the aircraft and disappeared.

CENSORSHIP REPORTED

NICAP note: Although we are reducing the number of censorship stories, following the majority's wishes in the recent poll (see page 6), we believe this case will have special interest since it shows UFO secrecy is not confined to the United States.

"He was instructed not to have the film developed in New Guinea," states the report. "He was flown to Canberra [on his return] where the film was taken from him. . . . The twelve-hour tapes with the pilot's report to the control tower also were confiscated."

It is not clear whether the film was confiscated by a government agency at Canberra, or by a representative of the airline. The understandable uneasiness of airline officials, who fear UFO-encounter stories might frighten away passengers, could be a factor. But one reference in the report indicates the Department of Civil Aviation was involved. In the May 24th landing case, on page 1, the DCA made no attempt to cover up. But since the Royal Australian Air Force is the official UFO investigating agency, the civil aviation agency may only be following orders.

In the past, Australian authorities usually have not tried to hide UFO sightings—even official Navy reports. We hope this censorship is only temporary and that the full story will soon be available.

To print the above report, a discussion of cases involving UFO interference with car ignition, aircraft instruments, radio, TV, etc., had to be omitted. It is scheduled for the next issue.

NEW PHASE (Continued from page 3, column 2)

In the Australian case, one witness was ready to fire at the UFO. In another recent case, one man actually did fire. This happened on April 3, when two couples from Seattle saw a large glowing UFO maneuvering above their cabin on Whidbey Island. Donald Peterson, a former skeptic, got his rifle and fired at the object—"to make it go away," according to his wife.

Other cases of firing by citizens are on record, besides earlier attacks by interceptor pilots.

If landings to establish contact cause frightened citizens to open fire, or if the armed forces try to capture a UFO for examination, the UFO controllers might strike back in self defense. At the very least, they would probably postpone communication plans indefinitely—or cancel them.

It would seem commonsense for our Government, and others, to start preparing citizens in case UFOs land openly, for contact. They could emphasize that the unknown space race does not seem hostile. At the same time, they could warn citizens to keep away if UFOs land and leave communications in official hands.

Thank you for your letter of 23rd March, 1965, in which you ask for information on Australia's official policy towards flying saucers and unidentified flying objects (UFOs).

2. The Minister for Air, on behalf of the Australian Government, is responsible for official policy towards UFOs. The investigation of all reports of such objects is carried out by the Royal Australian Air Force Directorate of Air Force Intelligence at the Department of Air in Canberra.

3. A considerable amount of effort is spent in investigating each report, and the observer is interviewed by selected RAAF personnel. It is the experience of Great Britain as well as Australia that nine out of ten sightings can be identified and attributed to such sources as astronomical phenomena, eg, falling meteors or planets, aircraft, weather balloons or satellites. In the United States, where more time and money is spent on these investigations, 99 per cent of sightings can be satisfactorily identified. If more effort and money were put into the investigations, we have no doubt that all such sightings could be identified and satisfactorily explained.

4. With regard to the metallic ball found in Australia, it was eventually shown to be a portion of an old fashioned type of refrigerator.

5. The RAAF has to date neither received nor discovered in Australia or overseas any evidence to support the belief that the earth is being observed, visited or threatened by machines from other planets; nor is there any evidence to prove the existence of flying saucers.

1. Further to our 554/1/30 dated 23rd December, 1960, I am enclosing copies of the Reverend Lionel Browning's report, Wing Commander G.L. Waller's investigation, and newspaper clippings referring to this and other incidents.
2. We are of the opinion that the phenomena was the result of the moon rise associated with meteorological conditions at the time of the sighting. On 4th October, 1960 moon rise (full quarter) at Cressy would have been visible shortly after 1800 hours and in an ESE direction. The objects apparently seen were near the sky-line in an easterly direction. The presence of "scud" type clouds, moving in varying directions due to turbulence in and around the rain squall near which the objects were sighted, and the position of the moon or its reflections, (could have) produced the impression of flying objects.
3. As can be seen from Wing Commander Waller's investigation, this report emanated from a genuine and reliable source and this Directorate has no reason to doubt the sincerity of the Reverend and Mrs. Lionel Browning. However, I would like to draw your attention to the attached copy of a minute to the Minister for Air dated 7th March, 1960, dealing with the subject of unidentified flying objects.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS
BOIANAI AREA - NEW GUINEA

1. Herewith is a copy of a report by Squadron Leader P.A. Lang of Directorate of Air Force Intelligence who investigated the alleged sightings by the Reverend W.B. Gill, of UFO's in the Boianai area of New Guinea in June/July, 1959.
2. I concur with Lang's findings. It seems probable that the lights observed by Mr. Gill were natural phenomena.
3. Air Ministry, London, have advised us that 90% of all sightings of UFO's investigated by them can be attributed to a variety of causes ranging from meteorological balloons to aircraft lights. The 10% usually remain unexplained because of a lack of reliable evidence.
4. An inquiry, relative to the latest views of the United States Government has been directed to the United States Air Force, Directorate of Intelligence, but no reply has yet been received.
5. In the light of our own and overseas military experience, the reported sights of UFO's by Reverend Gill do not contain sufficient additional evidence to warrant any firm opinion that illegal flights by alien countries are being made over Australian Territory.

REPORT ON THE INVESTIGATION OF UFO ACTIVITY
IN THE BOIANAI AREA - NEW GUINEA

1. On Tuesday, 29th December 1959 I visited the Reverend William Gill at his home in Sassafras, Victoria, and discussed alleged UFO activities in the area of Boianai, New Guinea.

The Reverend Gill

2. Mr. Gill is a young married man. He is obviously well-educated and has had considerable experience as a missionary/teacher in New Guinea. He stated that until late June 1959 he had not considered UFO's seriously and even now was not convinced that what he had observed in the sky were, in fact, UFO's. He added that he would be prepared to accept any logical explanation for the phenomena. He did not appear to be seeking publicity, and claimed that the report was made public by his superior in Segura. Further, he implied that the press and flying saucer organizations had distorted some of the facts.

Previous Experience of UFO's.

3. Mr. Gill stated that UFO's have been seen regularly in the Dogura/Boianai area over a long period and that a number of the white population, including government officials, professional men and missionaries, were taking an active interest in them. The first occasion that the Reverend had heard directly of UFO's operating in the area was in November 1958 when three of his friends in Dogura observed, on two separate occasions, lights travelling at high speed and at high altitude. One of these lights was said to be intermittent. In March/April 1959 he and his wife saw unexplainable lights high on Mount Purdi, which is some four to five miles south of the mission station, and which is not normally frequented by natives. These lights appeared to switch from one side of the mountain to the other with great rapidity.

Sightings of June/July 1959

4. Prior to the first sightings by the Reverend Gill, he had undertaken a trek in the jungle for a period of ten days. On his return he was informed that one of his native teachers had observed a bright light in the sky, on the evening of the 21st June. Subsequently, over a period of approximately two weeks, the Reverend observed a series of bright lights in various sections of the sky in the vicinity of his mission station. These lights were also seen by a number of his native staff (refer to copy of Reverend Gill's report held by you).

5. On the night of the 26th June the largest of the bright lights had projections along the upper edge which resembled human forms. Although features and clothing could not be distinguished they appeared to respond to hand-waving by the party of observers who concluded that they must be humans. The Reverend Gill was unable to take photographs because he had no film at the time of the sightings.

Comments

6. Many of the white and native population of the area have been seeing bright lights which travel at great speed for some considerable



time and are convinced of the existence of flying saucers.

7. Probably the constant light and the intermittent light observed in November 1958 were the USSR and US Satellites. The lights seen by the Reverend and his wife on Mount Purdi, in March 1959, could well have been light from the setting sun reflected on wet or shiny-surfaced rocks.

8. Although the Reverend Gill could be regarded as a reliable observer, it is felt that the June/July incidents could have been nothing more than natural phenomena coloured by past events and the subconscious influences of UFO enthusiasts. During the period of the report the weather was cloudy and unsettled with light thunder storms. Although it is not possible to draw firm conclusions, an analysis of rough bearings and angles above the horizon does suggest that at least none of the lights observed were the planets Jupiter, Saturn and Mars. Light refraction, the changing position of the planet relative to the observer and cloud movement would give the impression of size and rapid movement. In addition, varying cloud densities could account for the human shapes and their sudden appearance and disappearance.

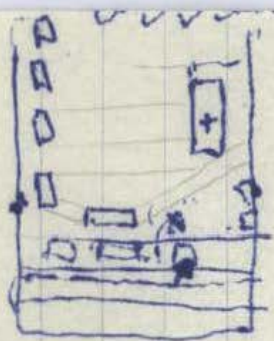

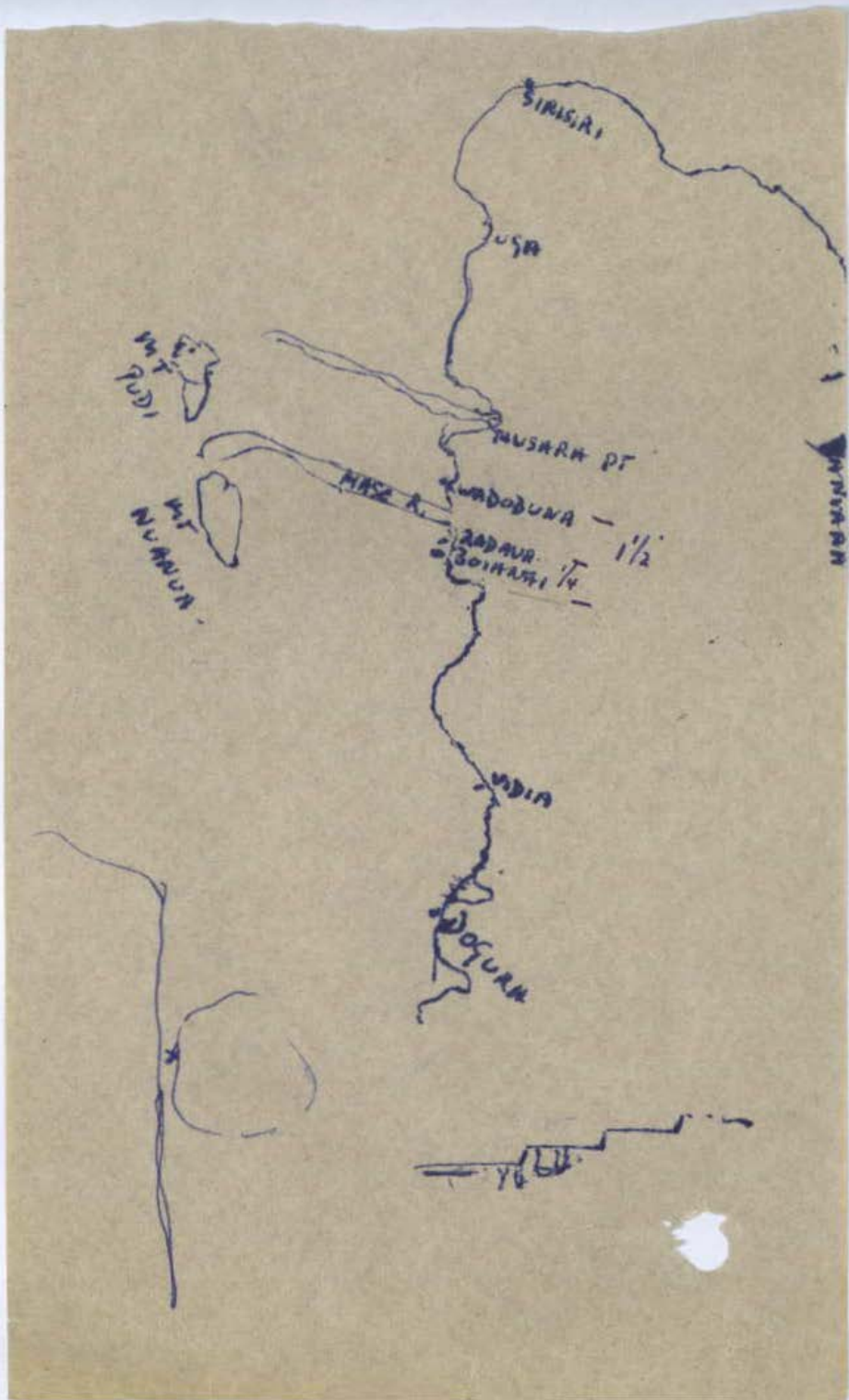

2. As, during the course of my studies of this subject, I have been unable to find any tangible proof that any of the objects sighted were manned vehicles from this or any other planet, I am particularly interested in the photograph which you possess. I would be grateful if you could provide me with a copy.

3. For your information, I am enclosing a spare copy of the Reverend Gill's report, together with a covering letter from the Victorian Flying Saucer Research Society.

Thank you for your letter of 7th November in which you requested approval to apply certain scientific studies to the investigation of unidentified flying objects.

Although the RAAF is responsible for the investigation of UFO reports, as a private citizen you are at liberty to undertake any research into this subject that you wish. However, if, as part of your experiments you propose to make electronic transmissions of any kind it will be necessary to obtain the approval of the Postmaster-General's Department. The RAAF cannot offer any official recognition or assistance.

As for the desirability of carrying out UFO research, I can only suggest that this would depend entirely on your own interest in the subject. You would undoubtedly find the study most intriguing but an unrewarding task. Considerable research has already been carried out by both official and unofficial authorities on a world-wide basis but so far, without producing any positive results. Less than 10% of all reports received cannot be explained and this is generally because of a lack of evidence.





SUMMARY

Reports of unidentified aerial objects (popularly termed "flying saucers" or "flying discs") have been received by the U.S. Air Force since mid-1947 from many and diverse sources. Although there was no evidence that the unexplained reports of unidentified objects constituted a threat to the security of the U.S., the Air Force determined that all reports of unidentified aerial objects should be investigated and evaluated to determine if "flying saucers" represented technological developments not known to this country.

In order to discover any pertinent trend or pattern inherent in the data, and to evaluate or explain any trend or pattern found, appropriate methods of reducing these data from reports of unidentified aerial objects to a form amenable to scientific appraisal were employed. In general, the original data upon which this study was based consisted of impressions and interpretations of apparently unexplainable events, and seldom contained reliable measurements of physical attributes. This subjectivity of the data presented a major limitation to the drawing of significant conclusions, but did not invalidate the application of scientific methods of study.

The reports received by the U.S. Air Force on unidentified aerial objects were reduced to IBM punch-card abstracts of the data by means of logically developed forms and standardized evaluation procedures. Evaluation of sighting reports, a crucial step in the preparation of the data for statistical treatment, consisted of an appraisal of the reports and the subsequent categorization of the object or objects described in each report. A detailed description of this phase of the study stresses the careful attempt to maintain complete objectivity and consistency.

Analysis of the refined and evaluated data derived from the original reports of sightings consisted of (1) a systematic attempt to ferret out any distinguishing characteristics inherent in the data of any of their segments, (2) a concentrated study of any trend or pattern found, and (3) an attempt to determine the probability that any of the UNKNOWNNS represent observations of technological developments not known to this country.

The first step in the analysis of the data revealed the existence

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of certain apparent similarities between cases of objects definitely identified and those not identified. Statistical methods of testing when applied indicated a low probability that these apparent similarities were significant. An attempt to determine the probability that any of the UNKNOWNNS represented observations of technological developments not known to this country necessitated a thorough re-examination and re-evaluation of the cases of objects not originally identified; this led to the conclusion that this probability was very small.

The special study which resulted in this report (Analysis of Reports of Unidentified Aerial Objects, 5 May 1955) started in 1953. To provide the study group with a complete set of files, the information cut-off date was established as of the end of 1952. It will accordingly be noted that the statistics contained in all charts and tables in this report are terminated with the year 1952. In these charts, 3201 cases have been used.

As the study progressed, a constant program was maintained for the purpose of making comparisons between the current cases received after 1 January 1953, and those being used for the report. This was done in order that any change or significant trend which might arise from current developments could be incorporated in the summary of this report.

The 1953 and 1954 cases show a general and expected trend of increasing percentaged in the finally identified categories. They also show decreasing percentages in categories where there was insufficient information and those where the phenomena could not be explained. This trend had been anticipated in the light of improved reporting and investigating procedures.

Official reports on hand at the end of 1954 totaled 4834. Of these, 425 were produced in 1953 and 429 in 1954. These 1953 and 1954 individual reports (a total of 854), were evaluated on the same basis as were those received before the end of 1952. The results are as follows:

Balloons	- 16%
Aircraft	- 20%
Astronomical	- 25%
Other	- 13%
Insufficient Info	- 17%
Unknown	- 9%

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As the study of the current cases progressed, it became increasingly obvious that if reporting and investigating procedures could be further improved, the percentages of those cases which contained insufficient information and those remaining unexplained would be greatly reduced. The key to a higher percentage of solutions appeared to be in rapid "on the spot" investigations by trained personnel. On the basis of this, a revised program was established by AF Reg. 200-2 Subject: "Unidentified Flying Objects Reporting" (Short Title: UFOB) dated 12 August 1954.

This new program, which had begun to show marked results before January 1955, provided primarily that the 4602d Air Intelligence Service Squadron (Air Defense Command) would carry out all field investigations. This squadron has sufficient units and is so deployed as to be able to arrive "on the spot" within a very short time after a report is received. After treatment by the 4602d AISS, all information is supplied to the Air Technical Intelligence Center for final evaluation. This cooperative program has resulted, since 1 January 1955, in reducing the insufficient information cases to 7% and the unknown cases to 3%, of the totals.

The period 1 January 1955 to 5 May 1955 accounted for 131 unidentified aerial object reports received. Evaluation percentages of these are as follows:

Balloons	- 26%
Aircraft	- 21%
Astronomical	- 23%
Other	- 20%
Insufficient Info	- 7%
Unknown	- 3%

All available data were included in this study which was prepared by a panel of scientists both in and out of the Air Force. On the basis of this study it is believed that all the unidentified aerial objects could have been explained if more complete observational data had been available. Insofar as the reported aerial objects which still remain unexplained are concerned, there exists little information other than the impressions and interpretations of their observers. As these impressions and interpretations have been replaced by the use of

improved methods of investigation and reporting, and by scientific analysis, the number of unexplained cases has decreased rapidly towards the vanishing point.

Therefore, on the basis of this evaluation of the information, it is considered to be highly improbable that reports of unidentified aerial objects examined in this study represent observations of technological developments outside of the range of present-day scientific knowledge. It is emphasized that there has been a complete lack of any valid evidence of physical matter in any case of a reported unidentified aerial object.

* * * * *

CONCLUSIONS

It can never be absolutely proven that "flying saucers" do not exist. This would be true if the data obtained were to include complete scientific measurements of the attributes of each sighting, as well as complete and detailed descriptions of the objects sighted. It might be possible to demonstrate the existence of "flying saucers" with data of this type, IF they were to exist.

Although the reports considered in this study usually did not contain scientific measurements of the attributes of each sighting, it was possible to establish certain valid conclusions by the application of statistical methods in the treatment of the data. Scientifically evaluated and arranged, the data as a whole did not show any marked patterns or trends. The inaccuracies inherent in this type of data, in addition to the incompleteness of a large proportion of the reports, may have obscured any patterns or trends that otherwise would have been evident. This absence of indicative relationships necessitated an exhaustive study of selected facets of the data in order to draw any valid conclusions.

A critical examination of the distributions of the important characteristics of sightings, plus an intensive study of the sightings evaluated as UNKNOWN, led to the conclusion that a combination of factors, principally the reported maneuvers of the objects and the unavailability of supplemental data such as aircraft flight plans or balloon-launching records, resulted in the failure to identify as KNOWN most of the reports of objects classified as UNKNOWN.

An intensive study, aimed at finding a verified example of a "flying saucer" or at deriving a verified model or models of "flying saucers" (as defined on Page 1)¹, led to the conclusion that neither goal could be attained using the present data.

It is emphasized that there was a complete lack of any valid evidence consisting of physical matter in any case of a reported unidentified aerial object.

Thus, the probability that any of the UNKNOWNNS considered in this study are "flying saucers" is concluded to be extremely small, since the most complete and reliable reports from the present data, when isolated and studied, conclusively failed to reveal even a rough model, and since the data as a whole failed to reveal any marked patterns or trends.

Therefore, on the basis of this evaluation of the information, it is considered to be highly improbable that any of the reports of unidentified aerial objects examined in this study represent observations of technological developments outside the range of present-day scientific knowledge.

- 1 In June, 1947, Kenneth Arnold, a Boise, Idaho, businessman and private pilot, publicly reported the now-famous sighting of a chainlike formation of disc-shaped objects near Mount Rainier, Washington. Resulting newspaper publicity of this incident caught the public interest, and, shortly thereafter, a rash of reports of unidentified aerial objects spawned the term "flying saucers". During the years since 1947, many reports of unidentified aerial objects have been received by the Air Force from many and diverse sources.

The unfortunate term "flying saucer", or "flying disc", because of its widespread and indiscriminate use, requires definition. Many definitions have been offered, one of the best being that originated by Dr. J. Allen Hynek, Director of the Emerson McMillin Observatory of The Ohio State University, who has taken a scientific interest in the problem of unidentified aerial objects since 1949. Dr. Hynek's definition of the term is "any aerial phenomenon or sighting that remains unexplained to the viewer at least long enough for him to write a report about it" (Hynek, J. A., "Unusual Aerial Phenomena", Journal of the Optical Society of America, 43 (4), pp 311-314, April 1953). Dr. Hynek, elaborating on his definition, says, "Each flying saucer, so defined, has associated with it a probable lifetime. It wanders in the field of public inspection like an electron in a field of ions, until 'captured' by an explanation which puts an end to its existence as a 'flying saucer'".



Thank you for your letter of the 25th January 1960. An officer of this Directorate has investigated Reverend W. Gill's report of U.F.O. activities in the Boianai area of New Guinea and copies of his findings have been submitted to appropriate authorities. As mentioned in our 114/1/201/(22A) dated 14th February 1957, such reports are not releasable to the public. However, although it is not possible to reach any positive conclusions, we do not believe that the phenomena observed by the Reverend Gill and his party were manned space vehicles. An analysis of bearings and angles above the horizon does suggest that at least three of the lights were planets, e.g. Jupiter, Saturn and Mars. Light refraction, the changing position of the planets relative to the observers and the unsettled tropical weather could give the impression of size and rapid movement.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

1. The Directorate of Air Force Intelligence wrote to Air Ministry London, and to the Australian Joint Services Staff in Washington on 26th November 1959 for the latest views of the British and United States Governments on Unidentified Flying Objects. You may be interested in the replies received recently.

2. Air Ministry stated that specific questions have been asked in the House of Commons concerning individual sightings reported in the press. The Air Ministry has replied to questions as they have occurred and Parliament has not at any time debated the subject. All sighting reports occurring in the United Kingdom have been processed through Air Ministry Intelligence. On an average 90% of all sightings have been explained by a variety of causes ranging from meteorological balloons and meteors to aircraft lights. Air Ministry is confident that the other 10% only remain unexplained because of lack of reliable information.

3. The Defence Department in Washington stated that "over twelve years of investigating and evaluating unidentified flying object sightings has provided no evidence to confirm the existence of the popularly-termed "flying saucers", as interplanetary or interstellar space ships". During the period June 1947 and October 1958, 6,000 reports were investigated. More than 84% of the reported UFO sightings were definitely established as natural phenomena, hoaxes, birds, or man-made objects. Insufficient data was available to thoroughly analyse and evaluate 14% of the reports and less than 2% were classified as unknown. The investigations carried out during the last half of 1958 set a record low for the number of cases classified as "unknown" - .67%.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECT "UNKNOWN"
STILL BELOW 2 PERCENT IN LATEST 1270 CASES

According to latest information tabulated by Air Force authorities charged with investigation of Unidentified Flying Objects, 1270 new UFO reports were investigated during the period July 1, 1957 through July 31, 1958. More than 84 percent of the reported UFO sightings were definitely established as natural phenomena, hoaxes, birds, or man-made objects. Insufficient data was available to thoroughly analyze and evaluate 14 percent of the reports and less than 2 percent were classified as unknowns.

Although investigations were completed on these "unknown" cases without positive or final conclusions, nothing was found to substantiate any claims that such sightings were interplanetary visitors, or so-called "Flying Saucers".

A sighting is considered unknown when the report contains sufficient information to draw at least one valid conclusion from the facts available but when the description of the reported object or its movements cannot be related to the norm. Refinements in Air Force investigative processes, however, have resulted in a steady decline in the number of UFO reports placed in this category. During the early months of the Air Force's investigation, some 20 percent of the reports were classified as unknown. These unknowns were reduced to 9 percent in 1953 and 1954, 3 percent in 1955, and 1.8 percent during the first six months of this year. It is believed that specific conclusions could be drawn for all reports if additional observational data were provided by individuals originating these reports. Also, the Air Force believes that there will always be a small number of unknowns due to high altitude phenomena which are strange to the untrained eye.

The 1270 new reports during the past thirteen months increases the total Air Force investigations conducted since June 1947 to more than 6,000.

All investigations of reported unusual aerial objects are conducted by the U.S. Air Force Air Defense Command personnel. These reports are reviewed by a select scientific advisory group at the Air Technical Intelligence Center which analyzes and evaluates, by scientific means, all information assembled by investigative teams.

Dr. J. Allen Hynek, Professor of Astrophysics and Astronomy at Ohio State University, is the chief scientific consultant to the Air Force on the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects.

His services and those of other eminently qualified civilian scientists are utilized if deemed necessary by the Air Force to further its investigation of individual cases or to perform detailed studies of the general subject. As an example, a panel of scientific consultants was called upon by the Air Force in 1953 to make an over-all examination of investigative procedures and findings on specific reports.

The panel said at that time "the evidence presented on UFOs showed no indication that these phenomena constitute a direct threat to national security." Further there was no "residuum of cases which indicates phenomena which are attributable to foreign artifacts capable of hostile acts." The panel concluded that "national security agencies should take immediate steps to strip the Unidentified Flying Objects of the special status they have been given and the aura of mystery they have unfortunately acquired."

In line with this recommendation, the Air Force periodically has made available through the national press and radio-television agencies, information on investigations and findings pertaining to cases which have received national attention. Only in a few instances were sighting reports classified to keep from compromising some elements in our Air Defense System, and no reports of sightings have been classified because they contain some authentic proof or even reasonable inferences that UFOs were real. Moreover, there are no Air Force documents which prove the existence of flying saucers or show that the earth is being observed, visited or threatened by machines from other planets.

However, because of limited personnel resources and to preclude possible embarrassment to individuals who have assisted Air Force investigators or who have originated reports later found to be erroneous, the Air Force does not honor individual requests for detailed analyses of specific cases.

AIR FORCE REPORTS UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECT SIGHTINGS DECREASE BY FIFTY PERCENT

Over twelve years of investigating and evaluating unidentified flying object sightings has provided no evidence to confirm the existence of the popularly termed "flying saucers", as interplanetary or interstellar space ships. The total number of sightings for the first six months of 1959 was only 143. This is in sharp contrast to the previous six months total of 296 or a little more than a 50 percent drop in reported sightings.

As in previous compilations, the astronomical category accounted for the highest percentage of sightings at 45 percent of the total. The unidentified category amounted to only three cases or 2 percent of the total sightings for the period.

AIR FORCE UFO STUDY
SHOWS "UNKNOWN" DECREASING

The latest tabulation of Unidentified Flying Objects reports of Air Force authorities and scientists of the Air Technical Intelligence Center, covering the last half of 1958, has set a record low for the number of cases classified as "unknown", which is down to less than 1%.

The total number of sightings for the six month period was also lower than the number reported in the preceding half-year.

From July 1958 through December 1958, 296 cases of UFO reports were analyzed. This was a 14% decrease in sightings over the first half of the year.

As in previous compilations, the astronomical category accounted for the highest percentage of sightings at 32% of the total. A new category, satellites, accounted for only 1.36% and the "unknown" category amounted to only 0.67%.



1. Herewith is a copy of a report by Squadron Leader P.A. Lang of Directorate of Air Force Intelligence who investigated the alleged sightings by the Reverend W.B. Gill, of UFO's in the Boianai area of New Guinea in June/July, 1959.
2. I concur with Lang's findings. It seems probable that the lights observed by Mr. Gill were natural phenomena.
3. Air Ministry, London, have advised us that 90% of all sightings of UFO's investigated by them can be attributed to a variety of causes ranging from meteorological balloons to aircraft lights. The 10% usually remain unexplained because of a lack of reliable evidence.
4. An inquiry, relative to the latest views of the United States Government has been directed to the United States Air Force, Directorate of Intelligence, but no reply has yet been received.
5. In the light of our own and overseas military experience, the reported sights of UFO's by Reverend Gill do not contain sufficient additional evidence to warrant any firm opinion that illegal flights by alien countries are being made over Australian Territory.

REPORT ON THE INVESTIGATION OF UFO ACTIVITY
IN THE BOIANAI AREA - NEW GUINEA

1. On Tuesday, 29th December 1959 I visited the Reverend William Gill at his home in Sassafras, Victoria, and discussed alleged UFO activities in the area of Boianai, New Guinea.

The Reverend Gill

2. Mr. Gill is a young married man. He is obviously well-educated and has had considerable experience as a missionary/teacher in New Guinea. He stated that until late June 1959 he had not considered UFO's seriously and even now was not convinced that what he had observed in the sky were, in fact, UFO's. He added that he would be prepared to accept any logical explanation for the phenomena. He did not appear to be seeking publicity, and claimed that the report was made public by his superior in Dagura. Further, he implied that the press and flying saucer organisations had distorted some of the facts.

Previous Experience of UFO's.

3. Mr. Gill stated that UFO's have been seen regularly in the Dogura/Boianai area over a long period and that a number of the white population, including government officials, professional men and missionaries, were taking an active interest in them. The first occasion that the Reverend had heard directly of UFO's operating in the area was in November 1958 when three of his friends in Dogura observed, on two separate occasions, lights travelling at high speed and at high altitude. One of these lights was said to be intermittent. In March/April 1959 he and his wife saw unexplainable lights high on Mount Purdi, which is some four to five miles south of the mission station, and which is not normally frequented by natives. These lights appeared to switch from one side of the mountain to the other with great rapidity.

Sightings of June/July 1959

4. Prior to the first sightings by the Reverend Gill, he had undertaken a trek in the jungle for a period of ten days. On his return he was informed that one of his native teachers had observed a bright light in the sky, on the evening of the 21st June. Subsequently, over a period of approximately two weeks, the Reverend observed a series of bright lights in various sections of the sky in the vicinity of his mission station. These lights were also seen by a number of his native staff (refer to copy of Reverend Gill's report held by you).

5. On the night of the 26th June the largest of the bright lights had projections along the upper edge which resembled human forms. Although features and clothing could not be distinguished they appeared to respond to hand-waving by the party of observers who concluded that they must be humans. The Reverend Gill was unable to take photographs because he had no film at the time of the sightings.

Comments

6. Many of the white and native population of the area have been seeing bright lights which travel at great speed for some considerable



time and are convinced of the existence of flying saucers.

7. Probably the constant light and the intermittent light observed in November 1958 were the USSR and US Satellites. The lights seen by the Reverend and his wife on Mount Purdi, in March 1959, could well have been light from the setting sun reflected on wet or shiny-surfaced rocks.

8. Although the Reverend Gill could be regarded as a reliable observer, it is felt that the June/July incidents could have been nothing more than natural phenomena coloured by past events and the subconscious influences of UFO enthusiasts. During the period of the report the weather was cloudy and unsettled with light thunder storms. Although it is not possible to draw firm conclusions, an analysis of rough bearings and angles above the horizon does suggest that at least some of the lights observed were the planets Jupiter, Saturn and Mars. Light refraction, the changing position of the planet relative to the observer and cloud movement would give the impression of size and rapid movement. In addition, varying cloud densities could account for the human shapes and their sudden appearance and disappearance.

Introduction to the Boianai Reports.

The reports described in the following pages constitute the most remarkable testimony of intensive UFO activity reported to civilian investigators in the entire history of UFO research. The sightings are unique in that, for the first time, credible witnesses have reported the presence of humanoid beings associated with UFO's.

One important aspect of the Boianai incidents is that the UFO's were observed closely by the witnesses for a total period of some hours; accordingly, the reports should be examined exhaustively for some clue as to the nature and origin of the craft, and for possible points of correlation with other credible reports.

BIOGRAPHICAL DETAILS OF FATHER GILL, THE PRINCIPAL WITNESS:

VFSRS investigators found Father Gill at all times cooperative and obviously deeply interested in UFO's and the implications of their presence. Prior to his sightings he discounted the possibility of their existence as manned craft. He exhibits an impressive scholarly detachment and his objectivity is evident in reading the report which follows within. Father Gill still remains reluctant to speculate as to the origin or precise nature of the UFO's - at least, until he has had an opportunity to complete some research into the subject.

THE CORROBORATIVE WITNESSES:

These numbered up to a total of 38 persons during the principal sightings at Boianai, 27 of whom signed the original statement examined by VFSRS investigators. The witnesses were all Papuan natives, several of whom were educated teachers and medical assistants.

BACKGROUND TO THE PRINCIPAL SIGHTINGS:

The Boianai sightings climaxed a relatively short but remarkably acute period of UFO activity in the vicinity of eastern New Guinea. UFO's were observed by both Papuan natives and Europeans. Sightings were reported by educated Papuans and by totally illiterate natives relatively untouched by western civilisation and quite ignorant of "flying saucers".

Introduction (continued)

TYPES OF UFO SIGHTED AT BOIANAI AND RANGE OF AERODYNAMIC PERFORMANCE:

Types: Large, manned craft with elaborate superstructure and smaller apparently remote-controlled discs with no apparent protuberances.

Performance: Hovering, pendulum swinging, tremendous spurts of speed. The manned UFO observed on June 27th was seen to cross the Bay at Boianai (approximately 30 miles wide) in less than a second. Even allowing for the admitted inaccuracy of such a calculation made by scientific laymen the range of the UFOs' performance is staggering. The reported changes of colour and light intensity are especially interesting.

EVALUATION OF THE BOIANAI SIGHTINGS:

It is submitted that the following propositions may be cited as established by these sightings :-

1. The principal witness is veracious and psychologically stable. This is admittedly a subjective impression gained by investigators, but is supported by the balance of probabilities arising from a consideration of the witness's professional standing and training. The legion of corroborative witnesses supplies supporting testimony of an objective nature.
 2. The Boianai UFO's are not psychological phenomena. The undoubted psychological element present in some UFO sightings has been demonstrated by Jung in his recent treatise. However, the limits of operation of this factor are still undefined and it would appear arbitrary to relegate the Boianai sightings to the category of mass hallucination. The reader is especially referred to Father Gill's prefatory remarks within.
 3. The Boianai UFO's are demonstrably not electrical phenomena, meteors, birds, conventional air-craft, and cannot reasonably be attributed to any of the gamut of accustomed physical rationalisations.
 4. The Boianai UFO's are advanced craft, manned by humanoid beings, capable of a fantastic range of aerodynamic performance.
 5. The Boianai sightings do not PROVE ipso facto that the UFO's are non-terrestrial spaceships; they indicate a strong LIKELIHOOD that they are such.
 6. UFO researchers need no longer enquire as to the NATURE of the UFO's but only as to their ORIGIN.

REPORT ON UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

Boianai, Territory of Papua and New Guinea, 1959

By W.B. Gill
at Boianai 14/7/59

INTRODUCTION.

These reports of observations together with relevant material combine to describe with fair accuracy what is thought to have been a series of activities in the sky at nights over and near Boianai by U.F.O.'s. Main recordings were made on the evenings of June 21st, 26th and 27th.

As chief observer and sole recorder and reporter of the Boianai phenomena on those dates (at Boianai) I would now hesitate to re-state without further long consideration backed by scientific investigation any opinions or theories as expressed in my personal letters hastily written in that period and which are included in this present material. The value (personal) lies in their subjectiveness against what I hope is objective observational data, and in the complete change of mind from scepticism to the conviction that the UFO's as observed by me cannot be explained away in terms of natural phenomena in the light of past knowledge and experience.

Consideration to the following possible factors, however, cannot be overlooked if this paper is to have any value at all as an attempted objective record.

1. Hallucination

Sketches in the body of the report may be figment of imagination or hallucination. Hallucination may have been experienced simultaneously by the 27 eye-witnesses whose names appear on the signature list.

2. Suggestion as an influence to "witnesses"

There may have been undue influence by suggestion of a European observer over a less sophisticated or inexperienced native body; there may have been influence caused by subservience of the native body of "witnesses" towards the European observer.

3. Illusion

It is possible that "freak" atmospheric conditions or subjectiveness on the part of the observer(s) resulted in a mis-interpretation of natural phenomena.

4. Unreliable Observers

Inexperience in astronomical observation. Ignorance regarding such natural phenomena as falling stars, meteors, comets, electrical disturbances in the atmosphere; the appearance and usual movements of these.

5. Variation in descriptive evidence from different sources

- (a) Mis-interpretation due to inexperience or faulty observation.
- (b) Differences in interpretations by individual observers resulting from different experiences.
- (c) Variation in distances between reliable observers and the phenomena sighted. Independent observers have noted and reported sightings from as far as twenty miles from Boianai, the source of activity.

In absence of scientific investigation into this present report, theory and hypothesis should be made with note to

the following relevant facts concerning the conducting of the main part of the observation and execution of procedure in gathering evidence and writing the report:

1. The sketch of the UFO on page 5 of the report was drawn by Papuan observer Stephen Gill Moi. It is important in one significant detail from later sketches. The "underside" is described by him and drawn as showing four "black spots". These markings are replaced in subsequent descriptions and drawings by what appeared to be four straight legs or stands pointing diagonally downwards from the "base" of the UFO.

Can it be assumed therefore that suggestion played no part in respect of this detail upon the minds of observers in subsequent sightings when all, including Stephen G. Moi, independently thought they saw "legs", though descriptions of the general shape of the whole "object" were in fact much the same?

2. Drawing up of the report was conducted in the following way:

- (a) On the night of June 26th immediately following the disappearance of the UFO through cloud, 38 witnesses were brought together into a well-lighted room.
- (b) On separate sheets of paper three observers, namely William Gill, Ananias Rarata and Stephen Gill Moi, drew what they thought they saw. Each worked in separate parts of the room. Then the sketches were compared and it was found that each resembled the other differing only in size of drawing.
- (c) Representatives of groups who thought they observed "men" on the UFO wrote their signatures under the respective headings (see page 7).
- (d) All observers were briefly addressed by the reporter and given the opportunity of signing a paper stating that a UFO as described in the sketches was seen by them. It was pointed out that they must be truthful and sign only if they believed that they saw the UFO as represented by the three drawings. 27 observers of a total of 38 voluntarily signed.
- (e) The data (1) on page 6 of the report is a copy of the original recorded during the actual time of observation by the reporter.
- (f) Diagrams on page 8 were made by the reporter and signed voluntarily under the same conditions as described in par. (d) except that the signatures are representatives of groups only.
- (g) The sketches on page 12 were made as part of a written statement by the Rev'd. D. Durie, Acting Principal of St. Aidan's College, Dogura. This statement was drawn up by him a few minutes after the observation.
- (h) The UFO's described on page 9 are significantly different in appearance from any previously described.

NOTE: The reporter not being a mathematician has attempted estimates of size and distances. It is suggested that the measurements should not be regarded as indisputable.

In this respect, as result of further practice with hand-measurement as noted on page 8 of the report, the reporter has taken the liberty of making alteration to original data. The HAND-SPAN which originally read as 8 inches now reads as five inches. Other estimated measurements should therefore be adjusted accordingly.

Dear David,

Have a look at this extraordinary data. I am almost convinced about the "visitation" theory. There have been quite a number of reports over the months, from reliable witnesses. The peculiar thing about these most recent reports is that the UFO's seem to be stationary at Boianai or to travel from Boianai. The Mt. Pudi vicinity seems to be the hovering area. I myself saw a stationary white light twice on the same night on April 9th, but in a different place each time. I believe your students have also sighted one over Boianai. The A.D.O., Bob Smith and Mr. Glover have all seen it, or similar ones on different occasions - again, over Boianai, although I think the Baniara people said they watched it travel across the sky from our direction. I should think that this is the first time that the "saucer" has been identified as such.

I do not doubt the existence of these "things" (indeed I cannot now that I have seen one for myself) but my simple mind still requires scientific evidence before I can accept the from-outer-space-theory. I am inclined to believe that probably many UFO's are more likely some form of electric phenomena - or perhaps something brought about by the atom bomb explosions, etc. That Stephen should actually make out a saucer could be the work of the unconscious mind as it is very likely that at some time he has seen illustrations of some kind in a magazine, or it is very possible that saucers do exist, but it is only a 50/50 chance that they are not earth made, still less that they should carry men (more likely radio controlled), and it is still unproven that they are solids.

It is all too difficult to understand for me; I prefer to wait for some bright boy to catch one to be exhibited in Martin Square.

Please return this report as I have no copy and I want Nor. to have it.

REPORT ON UFO SIGHTING

Place: Boianai.

Time: 1 a.m. Sunday, 21st June, 1959.

Weather Conditions: Patches of low cloud, otherwise clear. Moonlight.

Name of Observer: Stephen Moi, Teacher.

Description: (as told to W.B. Gill by the observer 23/6/59 at Boianai.

On coming out of the house at one o'clock on Sunday morning (21st June) I saw a bright light (white) silently coming out of the sky from a point about a quarter of a mile out to sea, slightly west of the Boianai station. It descended from what seemed a great height and I watched it for the space of about three minutes moving and descending eastwards and parallel to the coast. It stopped at a point a little to the east of the station and at a height of about three hundred feet. There it remained stationary for

perhaps half a minute and gradually decreased in brilliance until the shape of an inverted saucer could be discerned, which was tilted slightly backwards with part of the base visible. The object then moved upwards and disappeared from view into the clouds.

When first sighted, I thought it to have been a light similar to those dropped by 'planes during the war.

P.S. Underneath the saucer I saw about four round black spots.

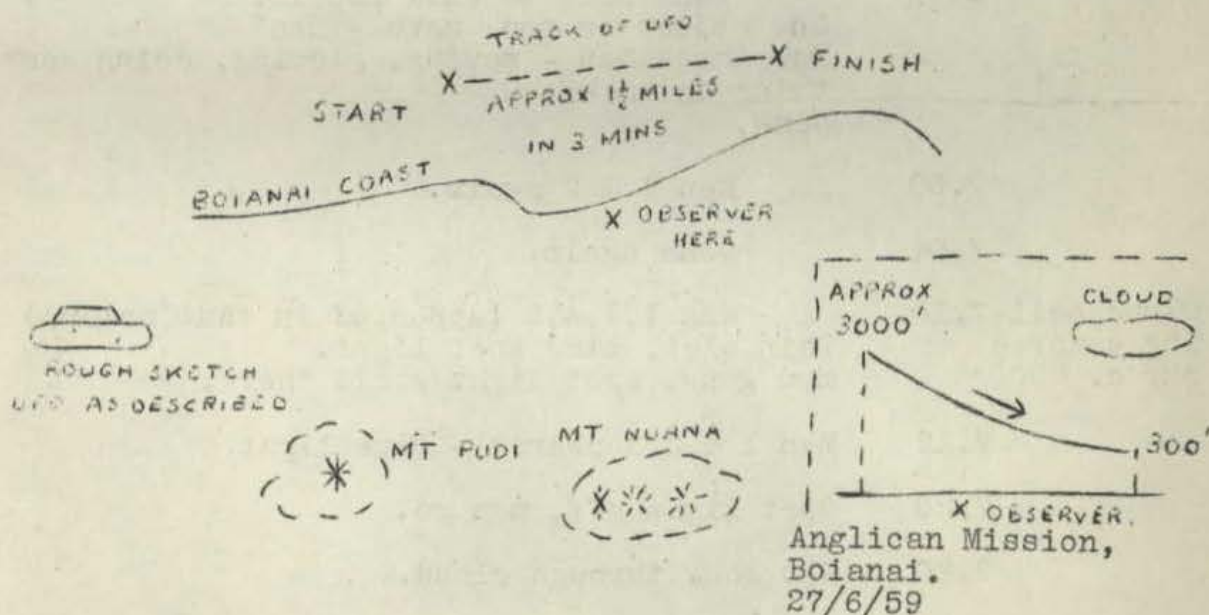

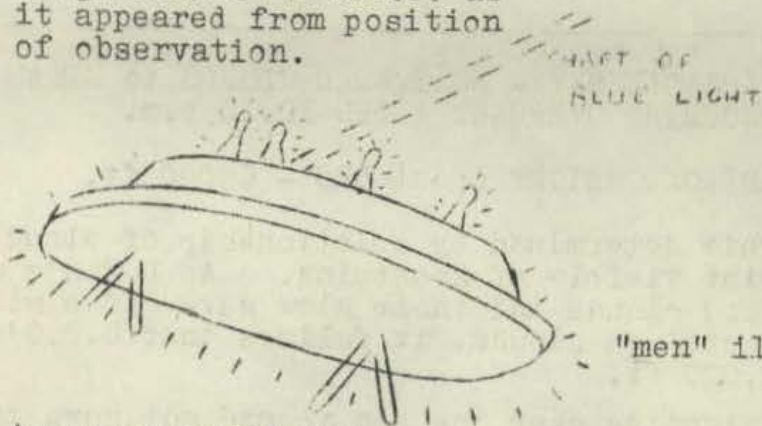

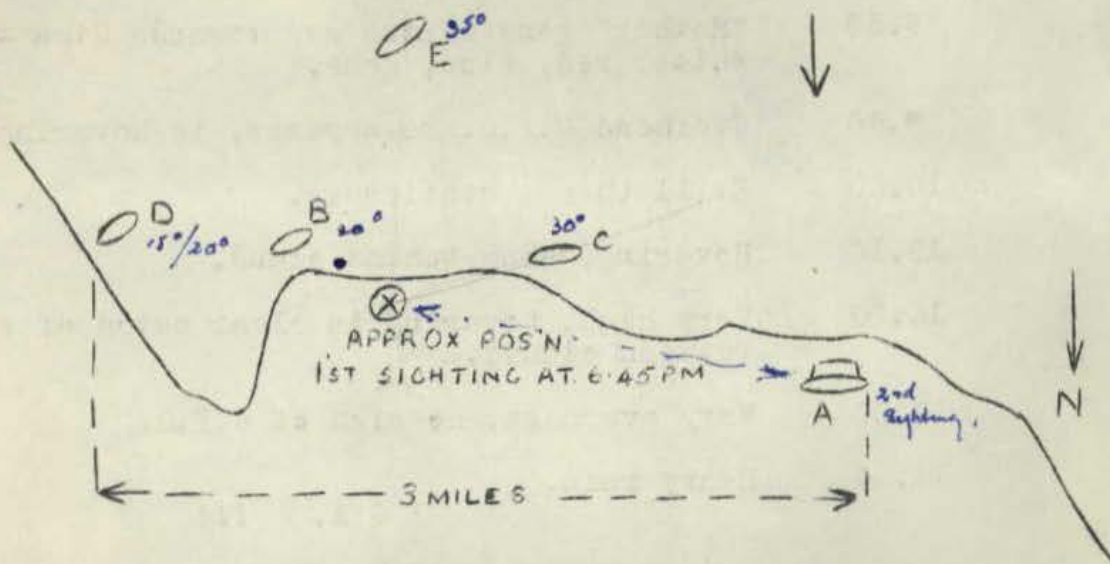

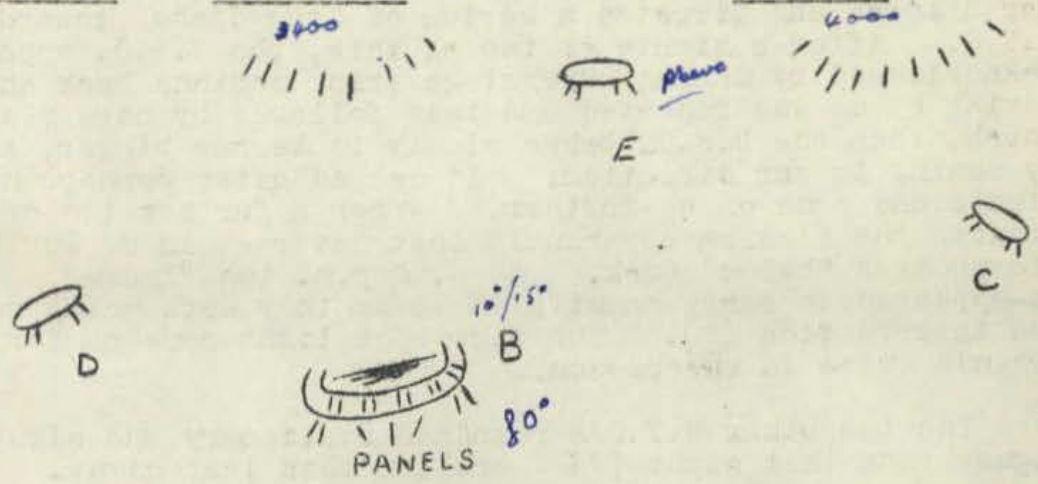

Saturday, 27/6/59.

Large U.F.O. first sighted by Annie Laurie at 6 p.m. in apparently same position as last night (26/6/59) only seemed a little smaller, when W.B.G. saw it at 6.02 p.m. I called Ananias and several others and we stood in the open to watch it. Although the sun had set it was quite light for the following 15 minutes. We watched figures appear on top - four of them - no doubt that they are human. Possibly the same object that I took to be the "Mother" ship last night. Two smaller U.F.O's were seen at the same time, stationary. One above the hills west, another overhead. On the large one two of the figures seemed to be doing something near the centre of the deck - were occasionally bending over and raising their arms as though adjusting or "setting up" something (not visible). One figure seemed to be standing looking down at us (a group of about a dozen). I stretched my arm above my head and waved to our surprise the figure did the same. Ananias waved both arms over his head then the two outside figures did the same. Ananias and self began waving our arms and all four now seemed to wave back. There seemed to be no doubt that our movements were answered. All mission boys made audible gasps (of either joy or surprise perhaps both).

As dark was beginning to close in, I sent Eric Kodawara for a torch and directed a series of long dashes towards the U.F.O. After a minute or two of this, the U.F.O. apparently acknowledged by making several wavering motions back and forth. Waving by us was repeated and this followed by more flashes of torch, then the U.F.O. began slowly to become bigger, apparently coming in our direction. It ceased after perhaps half a minute and came on no further. After a further two or three minutes the figures apparently lost interest in us for they disappeared "below" deck. At 6.25 p.m. two figures re-appeared to carry on with whatever they were doing before the interruption (?). The blue spot light came on for a few seconds twice in succession.

The two other U.F.O.'s remained stationary and high up - higher than last night (?) - smaller than last night.

6.30 p.m. I went to dinner.

7.00 p.m. No. 1 U.F.O. still present but appeared somewhat smaller - observers go to church for Evensong.

7.45 p.m. Evensong over and sky cloud covered - visibility V.L.

10.40 p.m. A terrific explosion just outside the Mission House. Nothing seen. Could have been an electrical atmospheric explosion as whole sky overcast. At 11.05 a few drops of rain. This may or may not have something to do with U.F.O. The explosion seemed to be just outside the window - NOT ordinary thunderclap - but a penetrating 'earsplitting' explosion. It woke up people on the station.

SUNDAY - 28-6-69.

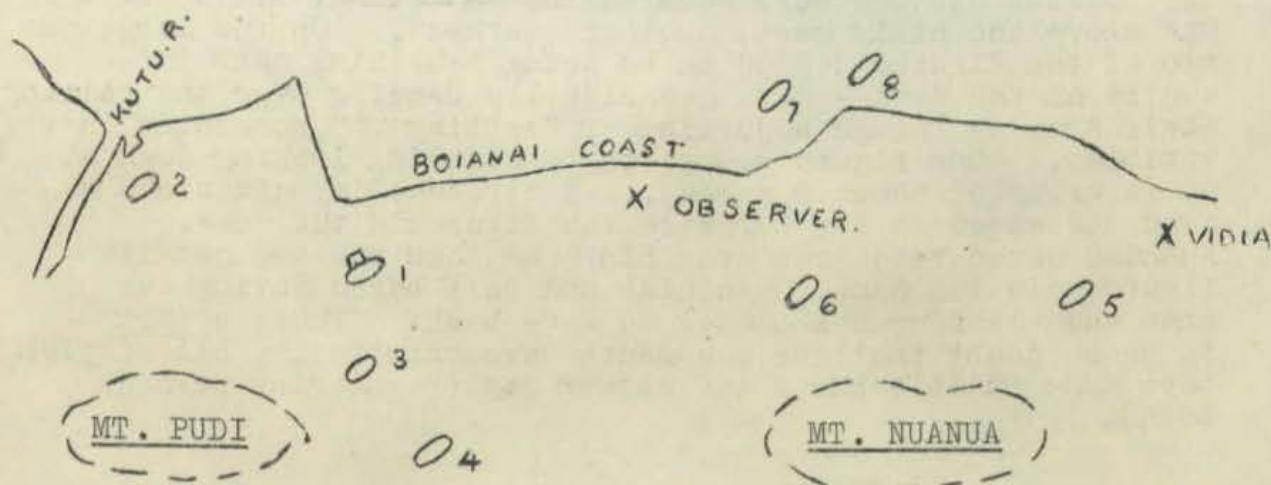

Believe it or not, Ananias, Mission boys and self exchanged hand signals (before dark Saturday) with the occupants of the "mother" ship a little after 6 p.m. There is no doubt that she occupied by at least 4 men. Assuming that men are the same size as average of earth, I have worked out size of the ship - Top "deck" - 20' diameter) the "mother"
Bottom "deck" - roughly 35') ship.

Distance of operations, therefore, as we have sighted, have been, at highest altitude 2,500 feet; lowest altitude 450 feet.

After 5 minutes it glowed again brilliantly and moved in a circular motion (see sketch) anticlockwise. Then it moved further south and down until it became obscured by the Point

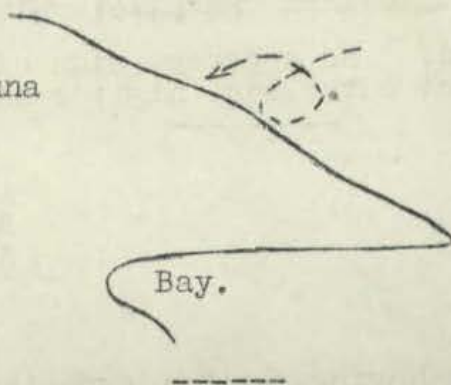

3. If the Department has not in fact investigated the reports, is the Department satisfied that these incidents do not constitute the infringement of Australian territorial jurisdiction by air-craft emanating from an alien earth nation?

In reply to your letter of enquiry of the 1. Jan. and which was initially addressed to the Dept. of Air, who in turn has advised me to direct it to me.

I regret although I have been in touch personally on a number of occasions with this dept. in relation to the above subject, that I do not feel that I could adequately express what they feel officially in reply to your questions.

However I can assure you that from those interviews I feel I can safely say that this Dept. on behalf of our government to use their own words "Have an open mind, on the subject", and whilst not committing themselves to an open statement for same they I believe are keenly interested in any factual evidence we can supply.

In regard to questions, 6 and 7 I can answer in the affirmative, and say that we not only have attempted contact with space people but have had success. In that they have taken the initiative at times and contacted us rather than we them, the result of such being that we have been directed on two occasions to go to certain places, at certain times, number of party designated, and these instructions were received three days before the incident, we obeyed strictly the instructions given and the result was an undeniable U.F.O sighting witnessed by five people and tape recorded. There was not actual contact of persons, but the UFO was certainly NOT any other known Object, this incident was reported later and three other people were happy to have a similar sighting.

Other messages of instruction have been received from them at times in which we have been alerted to world events some time prior to them happening, such as the San Francisco earthquake etc. and the Suez Canal Crisis.

I must add however that such was NOT any spiritualistic manifestation as by a medium in a dark room, but purely telepathic messages received in a perfectly normal state and to the recipient rather a shock.

INVESTIGATION OF FLYING SAUCERS

STATEMENT OF R.A.A.F. POLICY

1. The R.A.A.F. accepts reports on flying saucers and attempts an allocation of reliability. Those that fall in the reliable class are then subjected to further investigation as and when the opportunity occurs. As a result of this further investigation, a smaller number of reports are followed up and investigations are made with the Meteorological Services, the Government Astronomer and the Civil Aviation authorities in an attempt to fit the original occurrences in with any normal flying activity or meteorological phenomena.

2. As a result of investigations in the past, there is no doubt that reliable observers have reported sightings which today are inexplicable within the resources available to the R.A.A.F. Reports of this type are continuously filed in an attempt to develop sufficient depth of evidence for accurate analysis to be made. It may however, be several years before the required depth of evidence is available.



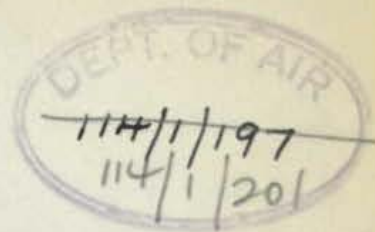

This letter is being sent to the air forces of several countries other than yours as I wish to compare the conclusions of various countries throughout the world.

In June, 1947, Kenneth Arnold saw nine (9) unknown round objects in the vicinity of Mt. Rainier in Washington state. The same day, a prospector in Oregon saw one (1) unknown object in the sky. He also saw that his compass reacted violently when the object was in the area. The United States Air Force conclusion was that ice had fallen from the upper atmosphere, and was gliding in the wind near the mountain. Pieces of similar size and shape and capable of flying in formation. Thus began the present story of "flying saucers" in the United States.

On 5 May, 1955 the United States Air Force released the "Project Blue Book Special Report No. 14", supposedly containing the latest information about UFO'S. However, the head of the same project in 1953 threw out the report as being unsound.

REPLY TO QUESTIONNAIRE ON UNIDENTIFIED

1. Q. What is the official attitude and policy of your Government in connection with so-called flying saucers?

A. At the time of the spate of flying saucers reports in 1952/54, the Australian Government adopted a 'wait and see' attitude. Reports on flying saucers from various parts of the world have been studied and local investigations have taken place. The Government has adopted the attitude that there is still insufficient evidence available to enable an accurate analysis to be made.

2. Q. The United States of America have a special commission which investigates reliable reports of unidentified flying objects. Has your Government a similar project in operation?

A. There have been insufficient reports of unidentified flying objects in Australia to warrant the formation of a special commission to investigate them. The Royal Australian Air Force accepts reports and attempts an *al*location of reliability. Reports that fall in the reliable class are subjected to further *investigation* ~~information~~ as and when opportunity occurs. As a result of this further investigation a small number of reports are followed up and investigations are made with the *M*eteorological Service, the Government Astronomer and the Civil Aviation authorities in an attempt to fit the original occurrences in with any

2. (cont'd) normal flying activity or meteorological phenomena. Reports have been filed for five years in an attempt to develop sufficient depth of evidence for an accurate analysis to be made. However, reliable reports are few and far between and it may be several years yet before the required depth of evidence is available.

3. Q. Have you had any reports of unidentified flying objects seen over your country? If so, ^{how} many? What proportion of those investigated have been found to be natural phenomena such as balloons, meteors and parhelia, etc.?

A. The R.A.A.F. has received 11 official reports of unidentified aerial phenomena in the last twelve months. Each report has been investigated, but in most cases the information received has been too sketchy. Investigations have shown that of the 11 reports, 2 were related to meteorological balloons and 5 were ~~from~~ probably high flying or night flying aircraft. Insufficient evidence was available to decide the nature of the remainder.

4. Q. Is it possible for you to supply details of any of the more reliable recent reports of flying saucers seen over your country?

A. None of the reports that the R.A.A.F. has received during the last twelve months have been, upon investigation, related to anything abnormal.

5. Q. Have you any pictures of alleged flying saucers which could be made available to me?

A. No.

With reference to your A31/1/102(G4) dated 15th November, 1957, this Department has received 11 official reports of unidentified aerial phenomena in the last twelve months.

2. Each report has been investigated to the best of our ability, but, in most cases, the information received has been very sketchy. Our investigations showed that of the 11 reports 2 were meteorological balloons and 5 were very probably aircraft. Insufficient evidence was available to decide the nature of the remainder. However, on the basis of wide investigations carried out in the United States, it is probable that the unexplained reports did not relate to anything abnormal.

3. It will be appreciated, therefore, that we have insufficient data available at this Department to be in a position to make a comprehensive study of the subject, and we have no information of any importance which is worth releasing to the public.

4. Regarding Mr. Baudish's discussions with members of the R.A.A.F. concerning unidentified flying objects, only one report has ever been received from a R.A.A.F. member, and the phenomena he reported was almost certainly an aircraft. In addition, to the best of our knowledge, none of the observations during the last twelve months took place anywhere near military exercise areas or during air force exercises.


INVESTIGATIONS INTO REPORTS OF


Thank you for your letter of 4th February requesting clarification of the attitude of the Department of Air towards investigations of reports of unidentified flying objects.

2. We have no information about Mr. Bartholomew approaching anyone in this Department^{or} of the R.A.A.F. in your area.

3. We are not in a position to comment on the alleged statement by General McArthur, which presumably was made in a private capacity, and not as a spokesman of the U.S. Government. We are enclosing an official statement released by the U.S. Air Force on the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects which appears to contain an official view on this matter.

My apologies for delay in reply but this was due to checking up of certain matters before replying to your letter of the 12th inst .

Re. Bartholomew. This chap has now returned to Adelaide and as yet has not confided in us what matters he claimed were going to be dealt with in alleged interview with you . he says now that he had interviews with Security here who advised him to see you . but this was postponed at a later date . but will reveal the matter to us in June . actually my committee have felt for some considerable time the whole of his evidence and claims to be phoney . and the subsequent events seem to strongly confirm same . should anything further occur I will keep you posted . one point however we would like to clear up is whether he DID see any such local rep. here and receive such advise . you may be able to help us clear this angle .

Re. Gen . Mac Arthur Statement . At present the full text of this is not before me as it is in a magazine out on loan but the condensed matter is as follows which covers the main details .

The Statement was made in an interview with the Mayor of Naples . Signor. Achille Lauro at the Waldorf Astoria . where the visiting dignitary said he was discussing the world political situation with the General , when the latter suddenly blurted out that he was " more concerned about interplanetary war, thana crystallization of the terrestrial cold war." . Later the Mayor. reviewed the statements made by the Gen . " He believes that because of the developments of science , all the countries of the earth will have to unite to survive and to make a common front against attack from people from other planets "

We as a society have so far felt that the evidence we hold does not confirm such a view, but are not convinced that it is entirely impossible . and realize that much evidence to support such a view may be held in Intelligence files to which we have no access . to make such an assessment . the fact that the Gen . made this statement suggests such a possibility as far as the U.S.A. is concerned .

It is because we think it possible that such evidence

could possibly be held by you that we have placed the question as we did, and as we are constantly being asked whether the U.F.O. are hostile or peaceful in this interest. that we are anxious to know the full facts, even if only for our own guidance and not for public information. as we have often expressed our desire not to cause any public panic in our public statements, and certainly would not do so without consulting your own Dept. for confirmation.

Since writing you, the papers have reported that the U.S.A. have released the films held by their Security taken some time ago by several people of U.F.O. and formally not available despite many requests. such films prove undeniably that they are certainly not of this earth by their performance as well as many other features, we are therefor wondering if it is possible that your own Dept. would be now willing to release for private showing at least, the film made in New Guinea, and held by your Dept. this film we have on report from America. has the same type of evidence to support the extraterrestrial theory.

Generally we are disappointed that your Dept. does not come more out in the open at least with us, and let us know some of the evidence which undoubtedly you must hold, even if only for our guidance so that we can make a true assessment of the matter.

We are well aware that all facts are not suitable for public consumption in large doses and that they have to be educated up to receive such, but it would give us greater confidence to know that you do appreciate our work and assist by co-operating in the above regard.

Fortunately for us, your Dept. has been always willing to hear our case, and unlike the U.S.A. not been antagonistic to our work or held us up to ridicule by publishing statements which despite evidence held by both parties, only confuse the issue, for this we express our gratitude, but appeal for more tangible evidence from your own files.

Hoping that this may be possible in the coming days, and again assuring you of our loyalty and assistance in any way.



Do you concur with the view expressed by Gen Doug . Mac Arthur . of the U.S.A that the world has to be prepared for an invasion of extraterrestrial forces . ?

What is your direction to us in the light of such and what would you desire us to do if any large scale sightings were made by the public which may cause alarm and panic .

The latter question is put because of many of our associates overseas who consider that such is very possible this year .

This my committee and myself have not regarded as completely proven . but in view of the fact that some of those observers have been rather correct in their forecasts in the past , we feel we cannot entirely overlook such a possibility as being impossible . and are therefore prepared to keep an open mind on the matter . but as this involves general public security feel that it should be handled with care and therefore the above guidance is sought in the light of our genuine desire to assist as always expressed in the past in our personal or written contact with you .

So far we have not received any reply re the case of Bartholomew of which I wrote you recently , am I to take it that the whole thing was a hoax , or that you are not prepared to make a statement in regard to the same . ?

Hoping you will treat the whole of the above in the light of a sincere and genuine desire to co-operate .

He came to us on the understanding that he was a member of a small group of men out there who were also studying the above subject . and was to have acted as liason between them and us. but a few weeks after being admitted onto the advisory staff said the committee he was attached to there had folded up.

This member has been attached to the Rosicrucian Secty. and we had to quite often demand that he keep such apart from our meetings which he tried often to introduce .

Unfortunately however he took the advantage once or twice of my absence at discussion groups to introduce some practices which border on the black magic ritual . and which has been brought him into discredit with my committee. as we do not allow any religious or political views to enter into or secty. the reasonableness of this you will see.

Regarding the intended interview with your dept. he has said that it is to do with the occult side of his studies that you are interested in . and therefore we feel it necessary to place the above information with you and strongly insist that he in no way represents this society in his views . and in fact we strongly reject all his secret black magic practices as totally adverse to our our constitution as well as our views.

We do not deny the possibility of our visitors

from space being of such a high vibration that they resemble spirit forms in their capabilities . but as this side of our subject is so much in the form of intense research and study and as little to date has been available to full explain all such ,and is so far apart from the general conception of things we like you say we have an open mind but will not certainly commit ourselves to any dogmatic statement.



- (a) A Ministerial statement in the House on 19 Nov 53 to the effect that the R.A.A.F. make detailed investigations of every report received, (which in truth we are not yet doing).
- (b) A Press release of April 1954 to the same effect.
- (c) A report completed at our request by a Mr. Turner, then of Melbourne University, in which he analysed the reports received by the R.A.A.F. to date. He recommended:-
 - (i) An increase in official interest.



2. Professor Turner accepted Keyhoe's book as being authentic and based on official releases. Because Turner placed so much weight on Keyhoe's work he emphasized the need to check Keyhoe's reliability. Encl.12A removes Keyhoe's work as a prop for Turner's work so that the value of the latter's findings and recommendations is very much reduced.
3. A suitable investigating panel would presumably require representatives from at least:-
 - (a) Commonwealth Observatory.
 - (b) Melbourne University Physics Department.
 - (c) Meteorological Bureau.
 - (d) Weapons Research Establishment.
 - (e) R.A.A.F.
 - (f) Army.
 - (g) Navy.
 - (h) D.C.A.
 - (i) Medical world - specialists in both psychology and the function of the eye.
4. Such a panel could not sit as a panel but would have to act as a number of individuals each considering each incident. Only one or two representatives could interview the people making the report and this would seriously lessen the value of the investigation. I don't think it is practicable or justified.
5. I suggest:-
 - (a) We have met our commitment to the Minister up to the date of Turner's report.
 - (b) We should continue on from Turner's work by transcribing recent and future reports onto the U.S.A.F. form at Encl.12C and forwarding them to the U.S.A.F.

 - (v) The formation of a Scientific Advisory Panel.
 - (vi) The establishment of more radar stations, manned for longer periods (!)
- (d) A visit to this Department (D/D.A.F.I. unfortunately) of the President of the Australian Flying Saucer Research Society in which he states -
- (i) That his Society are convinced of the reality of Saucers.
 - (ii) That they do a considerable amount of investigation of reported sightings throughout the country.
 - (iii) That they are concerned that these investigations do not clash with our security interests - particularly with guided weapons at Woomera.



FLYING SAUCERS

I refer to Wing Commander Dawson's DO 1A/1955 of 21 Sep on the above subject.

I have discussed with the USAF the status of Major Keyhoe. I understand that his book is written in such a way as to convey the impression that his statements are based on official documents, and there is some suggestion that he has made improper use of information to which he had access while he was serving with the Marine Corps. He has, however, no official status whatsoever and a dim view is taken officially of both him and his works.

Keyhoe and other writers on this subject have caused the USAF a considerable amount of embarrassment, and I understand that it was largely for the purpose of refuting their arguments and conclusions that the Air Force undertook Project Blue Book, a copy of which you will have received by now. I believe that this publication explains something like 98 percent of the cases reported. The Air Force issued it, not only to counter earlier statements on the subject, but also in the hopes that it would cut the ground from under a new book by Keyhoe which is soon to be published. However, subsequent to its issue the new Secretary of the Air Force refused to agree to its release to the public. This was the subject of my signal DJ650 of 17 Oct 55.

As stated in this signal, I have discussed with the USAF the extent to which the publication can be used by you in replying to the experts who are worrying you. They are quite happy to have you use it as a basis for a statement on the subject, provided you do not directly quote its contents or refer directly to it or its source.

As the Blue Book has been sent to you, I have not made any request for individual reports held by the USAF. However, if you still require them, I shall be pleased to do so. New reports of unidentified flying objects are made available to me on the reading panel, and if you wish to have copies of them, please let me know. I have not bothered to take them in the past as I felt that they would be of no use to you.

THERE'S NO SUCH THING AS FLYING SAUCERS

Australian Associated Press
WASHINGTON, Tues.
— The United States Air Force wound up an eight-year study of flying saucers today by concluding that they did not exist.

But it warned that radical new planes now being built could give the "illusion" of being saucers.

The Secretary of Air, Mr Donald Quarles, said an investigation of almost 5000 "saucer" sightings produced "no evidence of

the existence of the popularly termed flying saucers. He made public a 316-page book summarising the inquiry.

He said new planes would rise vertically, and would zoom away in level, supersonic flight, possibly giving "the illusion of the so-called flying saucer."

Mr Quarles disclosed that the U.S. Air Force had contracted with Avro Limited, of Canada, to produce what had been popularly described as a flying saucer.

The Air Force conceded the Avro vehicle "could result in disc-shaped aircraft somewhat similar" to the public concept of a flying saucer.

The study showed that the Air Force was now able to identify as balloons, aircraft, astronomical bodies or other objects all but three per cent. of the so-called flying saucers.

Those three per cent. still were listed as "unknown."

REPORT ON "FLYING SAUCERS"

INTRODUCTION

1. In order to assist in assessing two files of reports held by the Director of Air Force Intelligence concerning "flying saucers", a general inquiry into the subject matter was held by the writer. Among the books investigated were the following:-

Keyhoe:	"Flying Saucers From Outer Space"
Menzel:	"Flying Saucers"
Leslie and Adamski:	"Flying Saucers Have Landed"

In addition, numerous periodicals and magazines were found to supply odd reports.

2. The Victorian Flying Saucer Investigation Committee was helpful in supplying further information. The Committee was not aware of any connection with the R.A.A.F.

3. Some local sightings of interest were personally investigated. Such investigations were found to render considerably more information than expected. Finally, discussions were had with various staff members of the Physics Department, University of Melbourne.

4. In this way, it was hoped that a basic understanding of the problem would be achieved.

5. As regards the filed reports, it was the initial intention of the writer to analyse the evidence in an attempt to understand the basic reason causing the then recent wave of saucer reports. However, largely as a result of Keyhoe's book, it would appear that this evidential analysis is no longer necessary. Instead, an attempt has been made to assign each of the various filed reports to some particular category. This is a preliminary move in understanding the methods and motives of these "saucers" rather than determining whether they exist or not.

AMERICAN REPORTS

6. It is worthwhile studying the evidence presented by Keyhoe. This ex-Major of the U.S. Marines purports to publish U.S. Air Technical Intelligence Reports dealing with sightings of "Unidentified Flying Objects". It is almost inconceivable that this is not an official release, as they bear the testimony of Albert M. Chop of the Office of Public Information, Department of Defence, Washington. Direct official confirmation from, say, the U.S. Air Attache or the Australian Liaison Officer in Washington would nevertheless be highly desirable.

7. Some of the cases discussed by Keyhoe are summarised below (in chronological order).

1. Norfolk, Virginia - July 14th, 1952, 2112 hours

Pan-American Airways' report to A.T.I.C. of six discs seen manoeuvring below the aircraft. Description given of an abrupt change of course, colour changes, high speeds. Diameter to thickness ratio about 7/1. Joined by two more discs before departing.

2. Washington, D.C. - July 20th, 1952, 0040 - 0530 hours

Three radar stations - Air Traffic Control Centre at Washington National Airport, Control Tower at same airport, and Andrews Field, Maryland - all located echoes at approximately the same position, and some of the objects producing the echoes were seen by ground and air observers as coloured lights. The observations continued for five hours during which time the objects were found to be capable of linear acceleration in excess of several 'g'. They could reverse, perform right-angled turns and in one instance exceed several thousand m.p.h. They would outdistance any intercepting 'plane, although the interceptors could often locate their lights before they went out of sight. Their departure would be observed on the radar screen.

3. Michigan - July 29th, 1952, 2140 hours

G.C.I. radar ordered an F.94 to intercept an unknown object flying at 635 m.p.h. When at 20,000 ft., the interceptor located object on its radar as being four miles distant, same altitude, position marked visually by a light alternately flashing red, green and white. The F.94 chased the object at maximum speed for twenty minutes, during which time the flashing light remained visible in a position corresponding to the aircraft's radar. The attempted intercept was tracked by the G.C.I. station.

4. Bellefontaine, Ohio - August 1st, 1952, 1050 hours

G.C.I. radar picked up an unknown moving at 480 m.p.h. and at great height. Visually detected by ground observers. Two F.86's ordered to intercept. At a ceiling of 40,000 ft., one pilot took camera-gun photographs of a bright, round object. The radar gunsight indicated that the object was 12 - 20,000 ft. above the observer. The attempted intercept was tracked by the G.C.I. radar.

5. Hamilton Air Force Base, California - August 3rd, 1952, 1615 hours

Two discs observed from ground with binoculars. Picked up by G.C.I. radar. Six more discs arrived. Group departed before interceptors could take off.

6. Oneida Air Force Base, Japan - August 5th, 1952, midnight

Round dark object with bright light observed from control tower with binoculars. Approached base slowly, hovered nearby for several minutes, then departed. Tracked by G.C.I. radar. Appeared to split into three units.

7. Gulf of Mexico - December 6th, 1952, 0525 hours

B.29 at 18,000 ft. Four groups each of about five objects were observed at approximately two-minute intervals by three radar-scopes. Each group was travelling in excess of 5,000 m.p.h. Some of the objects were also sighted visually. One group briefly slowed down to aircraft speed, then accelerated to its earlier speed and was seen to merge with a large $\frac{1}{2}$ " blip, the whole then rapidly accelerating to more than 9,000 m.p.h. before going out of range.

CONCLUSIONS

8. If one assumes these Intelligence Reports are authentic, then the evidence presented is such that it is difficult to assume any interpretation other than that unidentified flying objects are being observed. This applies particularly to those cases where an object is independently observed to be in a certain position at the one time by means of radar, visual and/or photographic methods. Such combined evidence positively eliminates alternative explanations such as 'spots before the eyes', mass illusions, meteorological phenomena (including temperature inversion), etc. In many cases, the measured velocities and accelerations are highly indicative of objects that are intelligently controlled and whose performance is superior to that known by Western science. Indeed, the superiority is such that it is highly improbable that such objects have a terrestrial origin.

9. An extra-terrestrial origin is preferred to that of a Russian origin as, even if the Russian forces were so much in advance of the Western group that they could produce such aircraft, it is highly improbable that they would send their secret devices over enemy territory with the attendant risk of capture or breakdown. In addition, espionage would surely be more profitable if undertaken by fifth column activities rather than by the elusive aerial spotting practised by these U.F.O.'s.

10. The evidence presented by the reports held by the R.A.A.F. tend to support the above conclusion - namely, that certain strange aircraft have been observed to behave in a manner suggestive of an extra-terrestrial origin. However, as the Australian evidence is inferior to the American evidence from the viewpoint of proving the real existence of 'flying saucers', the writer has contented himself with a modest attempt at sieving the probable U.F.O. sightings from the probable 'natural phenomenon' category. This is done in Appendix I. If one could regard this initial sorting out as being sufficiently reliable, then reports categorising U.F.O. should be re-examined in an effort to understand the methods of propulsion and the motives for the visitations. Reports that are simply visual have strictly limited analysis value. Many new reports involving instrumental plotting are needed. It is possible to list a number of such recommendations.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. To increase official interest in U.F.O. reports.
2. To have at least one full-time investigator who is encouraged to interview personally any witnesses involved in an interesting report. Such interviews tend to uncover considerable information and can convert a nebulous report into one suitable for analysis.
3. Some measure of publicity to encourage people to submit their reports. A warning should be given to potential hoaxers that action will be taken if the hoax involves public expense.
4. Liaison established with the U.S. Air Force Intelligence with a view towards exchanging information and verifying Keyhoe's claim.

5. Request information from the R.A.F. and the Canadian "Project Magnet".
6. An attempt could be made to form a Scientific Advisory Panel to assist in the analysis of reports, provided that in the future these reports are more numerous and of greater detail than most earlier accounts. The first three recommendations should enhance these requirements. The U.S.A.F. and R.A.F. may even be willing to permit such a panel to examine their reports.
7. It is highly recommended that more radar sightings be gained. One radar report is worth many unsupported visual reports. Only radar can supply range, height, speed and true course. Visual aids can add shape and colour and, if synchronised with radar, true size. More radar stations are needed and they should operate for longer periods. Radar operators should be briefed as to the procedure to be adopted when a U.F.O. is suspected. They should be familiar with such things as anomalous propagation and ionised clouds.

Of course, in many cases, even if such unauthorised objects were in the vicinity, they still would not be identified with the reported sighting as the respective behaviour characteristics differ too greatly e.g. controlled level flight at 3,600 m.p.h. is uncharacteristic of present aircraft or missiles.

APPENDIX II

NOTES ON INDIVIDUAL REPORTS

Report No.1 - Bass Pt., N.S.W. - 16.7.50

1. If it is assumed that the report is genuine and that it is sufficiently accurate to warrant analysis, one is aware of an incongruity in the description. On the one hand, red and green lights that circle an area of about a mile in length for about 100 minutes are most unusual according to most U.F.O. reports and far more indicative of an aeroplane, particularly as the red light is to port, and the green to starboard. On the other hand, the estimated time for one circuit gives a speed of only 15 m.p.h. Further, the lights were reported to be stationary at one period for five minutes, and that at no time was any noise of an aircraft heard. Civil and Air Force authorities were unaware of the presence of any aircraft. If an unauthorised aircraft were to be flying between 0150 and 0335 hours, it is suggestive of subversive activities. For this reason alone, further action should have been taken by E.A.H.Q. If the report proved to be a hoax, litigation could have been invoked to deter future potential hoaxers.

2. The subsequent account of mysterious car headlights and a quarry explosion may have been due to entirely unrelated phenomena. Prompt investigation would have been able to assist in that direction. At this late stage, it would be difficult to differentiate between (a) hoax, (b) clandestine operations of a possibly subversive nature, and (c) unusual behaviour of a U.F.O.

Report No.2 - Vicinity Queensland - New South Wales - 29.11.50

3. Newspaper reports lack sufficient detail to warrant analysis. The only worthwhile reports are from Captain Herman and First Officer Quinn flying off Nambour, Qld., and Captain Boyd of the C.M.F., Sydney. The discrepancy in stated times is interesting. Captain Herman gave a duration of 8 - 10 secs. at 1908 hours which time should be accurate as he had just been given radio let-down. Captain Boyd estimated two secs. at 1918 ± 2 or 3 mins. If the discrepancy between the observed times of 1908 and 1918 hours were proved to be significant, then the object observed could not be a single meteor, but would have to be either two separate meteors or an object travelling at more than 3,000 m.p.h. If it were shown that in actual fact the two times were probably in agreement, then it is necessary to make a fit of the following two sets of observations.

4. This compromise course involves a path length of almost 600 miles in 8 - 10 secs. or an average speed of about 60 - 70 miles/second. As it has been shown (see footnote (a)) that strongly hyperbolic meteors are not to be expected, the range of meteor velocities at about 1900 hours should be between 7 and 20 miles/second when first penetrating the upper atmosphere. (Heliocentric parabolic velocity of 42.1 km/sec. when added vectorially to the earth's orbital velocity of 29.8 km/sec. gives the maximum expected meteor velocity apart from a few meteors that may have been perturbed into slightly hyperbolic orbits.) Unless a strongly hyperbolic meteor is to be postulated, it is necessary to either assert that Captain Herman's and First Officer Quinn's estimation of duration and bearing is drastically in error, or else discard the single meteor hypothesis. In view of Captain Boyd's time discrepancy, it would appear logical to prefer to discard the single meteor idea.

5. There is a further difficulty in that the colour of the light is consistently described as a brilliant green-blue. Although there has been little systematic scientific investigation into meteor spectra (see footnote (b)), it would appear that a predominant green-blue is unusual. It would be most unusual if two such meteors were witnessed within ten minutes of each other, particularly as a third was seen over Victoria on the next night.

6. On the other hand, out of the millions of meteors visible each night, there must occasionally be some sufficiently unusual to arouse the interest of the public. Until more is known of the probability of occurrence of unusual meteors, the possibility remains that two green-blue meteors were seen on 29.11.50 and a third on 30.11.50.

Usual classification is -

X - rare - mainly 3830Å (U.V.) line of Mg plus weak Ca lines.

Y - showers and sporadic - 3933Å, 3968Å, also ~6,000Å Ca lines.

Z - sporadic - many lines of Fe, hardly any Ca. (appears white)

However, Astrophysics Journal 118, 555 (1953) reports that a 5,162Å (green) line due mainly to Mg has been found emanating from a meteor. The probability that a Cu green is produced is remote as only .02% Cu is found in iron meteorites, and even less in stony meteorites, whereas the latter contain about 14% Mg. Nevertheless, the probability that the Mg green line predominates is remote.

No.5 Report - Darwin - 13.6.51

7. Theodolite data check with the position and movement of the planet Venus, except that the bearings given are out by 180°.

Report No.7 - Bridgetown - 28.11.51

8. There are some people from whom this report could possibly represent a highly distorted impression of a most unusual meteor. In this case, however, the tenor of the report is indicative of an observer sufficiently rational to suggest that he was probably observing a U.F.O.

Report No.8 - Kew - 3.5.52, 0545 hours

9. Although this may possibly be identified with the N.S.W. occurrence at 0610, it is unlikely as the discrepancy in time is probably real and the course from "Melbourne to Kew" suggests an elevation much greater than the expected 10 - 20° (see notes on 9). There is insufficient evidence to form an opinion as to its identity.

Report No.9 - Parkes, Sydney : Kiama, - 3.5.52, 0610 hours

10. An analysis of 15 separate reports indicates that an object or objects of total apparent size, that of about half full moon, passed over N.S.W. at considerable height and at an elevation of about 35° to most observers. The average duration was about half a minute. The descriptions are fairly consistent with a large slow meteor travelling horizontally or at a shallow angle and beginning to break up. Such a meteor should have been visible to Melbourne residents at an elevation of 10 - 20°. It is a pity that Victorian newspaper reports failed to supply any details, and that no official investigations were made in Victoria.

11. It is somewhat surprising that intense 'flaring' did not occur during the break-up, and that the smaller particles did not fall away more rapidly.

Report No.10 - Woomera - 27.9.52

12. From the five reports, the observed phenomenon could only be a meteor or U.F.O. A meteor that could give rise to the stated descriptions would have to be rare indeed.

Report No.11 - Woomera - 8.10.52

13. The velocity and direction of the phenomenon producing this well-defined radar echo could easily agree with the velocity and direction of the wind. The considerable height fluctuations could conceivably be explained by variable up-currents of hot air due to variations in surface contours and in soil and vegetation changes. There was insufficient data available to correlate the plotted height variation with a cross-section of the surface features. It may be worthwhile doing this.

14. To produce an echo similar to a large aircraft and yet not be visible to the observer, one could postulate the existence of a compact highly ionised cloud. A layer of snow (or ice) crystals is unlikely as the ground temperature was 84°F and freezing point would be unlikely at heights of only a few thousand feet. It is highly improbable that an ionised cloud could cross Australia from the Monte Bello's without being dispersed, but the recent atomic explosion is suggestive of a connection. Perhaps a precipitation of radio-active rain which vapourised shortly before reaching the ground could produce a locally-ionised cloud. The observed apparent breaking away of segments of the radar echo would indicate that if the echo were due to a cloud then it would be relatively short-lived.

Report No.12 - Terrigal - 30.12.52

15. The Wing Commander's evidence that the observed light or object underwent a change in course and an increase in apparent

speed should be accepted. Coupled with the observation that this was contrary to ground winds, and after considering possible effects produced by the sun, it would appear that there is a reasonable probability that a U.F.O. was sighted.

Report No.15 - Mackay - 10.5.53

16. The description given by Captain Jones is indicative of a U.F.O. Anticipatory vectoring on an internal light reflection may possibly have produced the circling movement, but it would not give the impression of flashing overhead. In any case, a pilot is well aware of illusions produced by light reflections and there was ample time to check various possibilities as to the origin of the light.

Report No.25 - Mansfield - 15.1.54

17. This report is anonymous and could be a hoax based on Captain Barker's account (see Report No.22). Conceivably, someone had a grudge against the R.A.A.F. and hoped to inconvenience them by sending them on a wild goose chase. If it is a hoax, the author has shown considerable ingenuity. If it were genuine, it would supply valuable information as the following observations may indicate.

1. Whirring noise like wind in wires - this description has been given in other (non-R.A.A.F.) reports, including more recent ones.
2. Green lights used when descending - apparently to aid navigation or for visual inspection.
3. On becoming stationary, green lights extinguished, whirring noise louder - as greater upthrust required when stationary, the whirring noise may be associated with the force required to maintain lift.
4. 12-foot rim of bright metal suggests that this part may rotate to provide upthrust and the ndse.
5. To ascend, yellow gaseous light from base of stem and whirr stops - i.e. jet thrust sufficient to dispel with the earlier means of upthrust.
6. To go forward, yellow gaseous light from side of stem - could this cause Barker's "light amber observation car"?
7. Inspection of aircraft - American reports suggest that aircraft provide a centre of interest for U.F.O.'s.
8. Green light from centre of rim apparently used for visual inspection. This agrees with the Kongwok report.
9. "Sudden roar" suggests rapid jet efflux. (Would the normally silent propulsion indicate that usually only a small mass is ejected. If so, then either the U.F.O. has a low mass or else the exhaust has high velocity.)

Report No.28 - S.E. of Woomera - 22 - 23.11.53

18. Insufficient evidence to assess these reports. It would have been worthwhile if security had pursued this matter further.

Report No.48 - East Malvern - 30.5.54

19. One of the observers of this sighting, David Reese, was personally investigated on this matter. The writer felt reassured as to the integrity of this witness. The noise described was of interest, as it was either omitted or insufficiently described in newspaper reports, and yet was repeated a week later by Jeanette Brown at East Dandenong.

Report No.52 - Sydney - 14.6.54

20. It is possible that (a) and (b) were witnessing venus, which was in that general direction at the time. However, Venus would have set before (c) and (d) were observing. Possibly (c) and (d) were watching a bright star.

Report No.56 - Dandenong - 5.6.54

21. A separate report has been submitted on this and subsequent sightings. The writer considers that this particular sighting has an extremely high probability of being a U.F.O. without any provisos.

Kongwok - 23.8.54 and 8.9.54

22. Separate reports have been submitted on these two sightings. Again a personal interview has influenced the writer into considering that these observations are of some phenomenon quite unknown to present scientific understanding. The possibility that these sightings may have been due to balloons was investigated and shown to be virtually impossible.

INVESTIGATION OF FLYING SAUCERS

STATEMENT OF R.A.A.F. POLICY

Approved By DCAS and issued in April 1957

1. The R.A.A.F. accepts reports on flying saucers and attempts an allocation of reliability. Those that fall in the reliability class are then subject^e to further investigation^{ed} as and when the opportunity occurs. As a result of this further investigation, a smaller number of reports are followed up and investigations are made with the Meteorological Services, the Government Astronomer and the Civil Aviation authorities in an attempt to fit the original occurrences in with any normal flying activity or meteorological phenomena.

2. As a result of investigations in the past, there is no doubt that reliable observers have reported sightings which today are inexplicable within the resources available to the R.A.A.F. Reports of this type are continuously filed in an attempt to develop sufficient depth of evidence for accurate analysis to be made. It may however, be several years before the required depth of evidence is available.

From time to time people report having seen unexplained objects in the sky which have come to be called "flying saucers". There have been many explanations of them - the sun shining on high flying aircraft - meteorological balloons - imagination, etc. There is another possibility that may account for some of them, which has not been suggested, so far as I know. On known dates in each year, the earth passes through meteor streams. These are the remains of meteors that have disintegrated in outer space, but which continue their original paths round the sun in the form of streams of solid particles and meteoric dust. The fact that the earth moves round the sun in a fixed path and that these debris of meteors also move round the sun in fixed paths, means that the paths of the earth and of some of these meteoric streams intersect each other on a series of dates which are the same each year. The earth sometimes takes a number of days to pass through the more important of these meteoric streams. The dates of maximum meteoric activity are - 3rd January, 21st April, 4th May, 8th June, 30th June, 28th July, 10-13th August, 10th October, 20-23rd October, 3-10th November, 14th November, 16th November, 11-13th December.

I have lists of the dates over the last several years on which people have reported having seen "flying saucers" in Australia, and have compared them with the dates on which the earth passes through the principal meteoric streams. There appears to be a noticeable relationship between these two sets of dates. By this I mean that there tends to be a grouping of flying saucer sightings round about the meteor-stream dates that it is hard to believe is by chance. And again, there is a relative absence of "flying saucer" reports during the principal gaps between meteor-stream dates. For instance, the minimum meteoric activity of the year is between January and April. These are also the months in which fewest "flying saucers" have been reported in Australia. I do not suggest that this evidence is by any means complete, or that it is, at best, more than a partial explanation of "flying saucer" phenomena. All that I suggest is that there is some evidence that people seem to report otherwise unexplained objects in the sky round about the dates on which the earth passes through the principal meteor-streams, and there seems to be a lull in the reporting of flying saucers in between these dates.

I do not suggest any more than that what I have said may be an explanation of at least a proportion of the "flying saucer" reports.

1. Reference Encl. **6A**, the following reply was telephoned to the Minister at 5 p.m. on 19th November, 1953:-

"Yes. I am aware that Services overseas are devoting some time to investigating the reports of unidentified objects and optical phenomena in the sky.

Likewise, the R.A.A.F. makes detailed investigations of every such report it receives. It has been found that the greater number of these reports coincide with the passage of large meteorites across the sky. Information concerning the meteorites is obtained from the observatories in the various States."

2. Nevertheless, all reports are still being investigated closely and recorded as an aid to further research into future reports of this nature.

UNUSUAL SIGHTINGS

A pro-forma to be used for the purpose of standardising reports of unusual sightings was forwarded under cover of my SEC.CDR/2 (5A) of 17th January, 1951.

2. This pro-forma has now been revised with a view to obtaining additional information. Future reporting should be in accordance with this new pro-forma a copy of which is attached.

3. Though it is a fact that an observer cannot judge the distance from him of an unfamiliar object in the air, observers in general seldom hesitate to give an estimated height and speed when reporting unusual sightings. Items 26 and 17 on the pro-forma have been specially annotated with a view to overcoming these two weaknesses.

4. In almost every case the only attributes of position and movement that can be measured are :-

- (a) Bearing.
- (b) Angle of elevation.
- (c) Angle through which object moves.
- (d) Angle between path of movement and horizon.
- (e) Time taken for movement in (c).

and though observers will seldom think of actually measuring these at the time of sighting an object, fairly accurate estimates can often be deduced by skillful questioning and a reconstruction of the incident.

5. The bearing of the object can be checked by reference to a good map, to prominent local features, or to celestial bodies.

6. Angle of elevation can often be checked by asking the observer to point out a cloud or other reference at the same time estimating the elevation of the object under investigation. The investigator should then measure the elevation of this. It is unlikely that an accurate means of measuring angles will be available but it should be remembered that if a foot rule be held loosely at arm's length and at right angles to the line of vision each inch will subtend an angle of about two degrees at the eye. Further simple means of measuring angles should also be memorized.

7. Angular movement can be discussed and deduced in a fashion similar to that used to determine elevation.

8. Direction of movement can also be translated to angles to the horizon or some other datum.

9. Time taken for an event to happen is very hard to estimate but it is important, and every effort should be made to estimate lapsed time as accurately as possible. In doing this it may be of help to time the observer while he re-enacts what he did and said during some aspect of the incident.

10. These new instructions do not emanate from any renewed interest in "Flying Saucers" or any new intelligence on the subject, but are merely intended to improve the standard of reporting.

R.A.F. Officers Investigating 'Saucer' Stories

LONDON, Nov. 10.

Intelligence officers of the R.A.F. are now investigating every case of "flying saucers" over Britain, according to a "Daily Express" correspondent.

The serious approach to "saucers" follows several cases in which trained observers, such as R.A.F. men, have seen flying saucers.

The latest case comes from two pilots, together in a Vampire jet at 20,000 feet over Kent last week.

They saw an object which at first seemed to be a star or bright stationary light.

The R.A.F. is now exchanging information on the subject with America.

The U.S. air force is beginning to suggest hesitantly that "flying saucers" could be inter-planetary.

Dear Wing Commander Ellen:

Thank you very much for your letter of 6 July in which you inclosed copies of previous correspondence in connection with citings of unidentified flying objects.

As I mentioned to you when I was in your office on 18 May, my headquarters is very interested in receiving reports of all unusual sightings not only in this area but all over the world. My headquarters has requested that, if possible, the following information should be reported on any unusual sighting:

1. Electrical Means. (This should be reported immediately upon sighting.) Reports forwarded by this method will include, insofar as possible:
 - a. A brief description of the object(s); shape, size, color, number, formation if more than one, aerodynamic features, trail of exhaust, propulsion system, speed, sound, manœuvres, manner of disappearances, and other pertinent or unusual features.
 - b. Time of sighting in 24-hour clock zonal time, and length of time observed.
 - c. Manner of observation; visual or electronic, from air (give speed, altitude, and type of aircraft), or surface. Any type of optical or electronic equipment used should be described.
 - d. Location of observer during sighting, giving exact latitude and longitude as closely as feasible, and/or reference to a known landmark. Location of object(s) with respect to observer, giving distance, direction, and altitude.
 - e. Identifying information of observer(s) and witness(es), estimate of reliability and experience, and any factors bearing on estimated reliability of the sighting.

- f. Weather and winds aloft conditions at time and place of sightings.
 - g. Any activity or condition, meteorological or otherwise, which might account for the sighting.
 - h. Existence of any physical evidence such as fragments, photographs and thelike, of the sighting.
 - i. Interception or identification action taken. (Such action may be taken whenever feasible, complying with existing air defense directives.)
 - j. Location of any air traffic in the general area at the time of the sighting.
2. Written Reports. These reports will expand on the points enumerated above. Photographs, sketches, and signed narrative statements of observers will be appended. Statements should be recorded in as great detail as possible, with particular attention given to times, angles of observation, and flight paths or locations. The angles of observations, locations, flight paths, etc., should be drawn on aeronautical charts or maps.

Any help you can give me in making this information available to my headquarters will be sincerely appreciated and will be handled in strict accordance with the security classification you attach to it.

A $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. fastener is to be used for minute sheets and a fastener of not more than one-and-a-half inches to attach enclosures. When there are as many enclosures on a file as can conveniently be fastened by a $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. paper fastener, a new part should be opened.
3. Minute sheets are to be attached to the left-hand inside cover and enclosures to the right-hand side.
4. Minute sheets are to be used for correspondence between branches and sections. Correspondence from and to outside bodies is to appear as an enclosure. If the enclosure is in one part, its number will be followed by the letter "A", subsequent parts being lettered "B", "C", "D", &c.
5. Minute Number 1 is to be on the printed side of the minute sheet and is to face the cover on the minute side of the file.
6. Wherever possible minutes should be made on the file. If a loose minute is used the file number should be quoted and the minute attached to the file when available.
7. Minutes must be added in numerical order and both sides of the minute sheets are to be used.
8. Files must not be passed between Branches by hand without transit slips.
9. Notes of action taken may be entered on the minute sheets, otherwise unaddressed minutes will not be made.
10. Minutes may be noted by officers placing their initials over the reference to them at the minute head and such words as "agree" and "concur" may be used to obviate separate minutes by individual addressees. An officer's initials so placed will indicate concurrence with the minute.
