1. In accordance with the provisions of paragraphs 3 a and 3 b of Directive No. 3 from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, dated 28 September 1945; Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government, Subject: conversion of War Production Plants to Peacetime production, dated 28 October 1945; and under authority granted this Headquarters by CINCPAC Radio ZAX 6197 dated 3 October 1945, you are authorized to commence operation of your plant, and manufacture the essential civilian commodities listed in Annex No. 1 to this Permit.
2. This permit grants authority only to operate. The acquisition of materials, parts, and sub-assemblies, as well as the disposition of finished products and establishment of sales prices, will be in accord with the regulations of the Imperial Japanese Government.

This report will be written in English and will list each item, by name, type, and quantity produced by each factory, subsidiary, or sub-contractor operating under the provisions of this permit.
This report will be delivered to Corps Headquarters not later than fifteen (15) days after the conclusion of the period to which the report pertains.

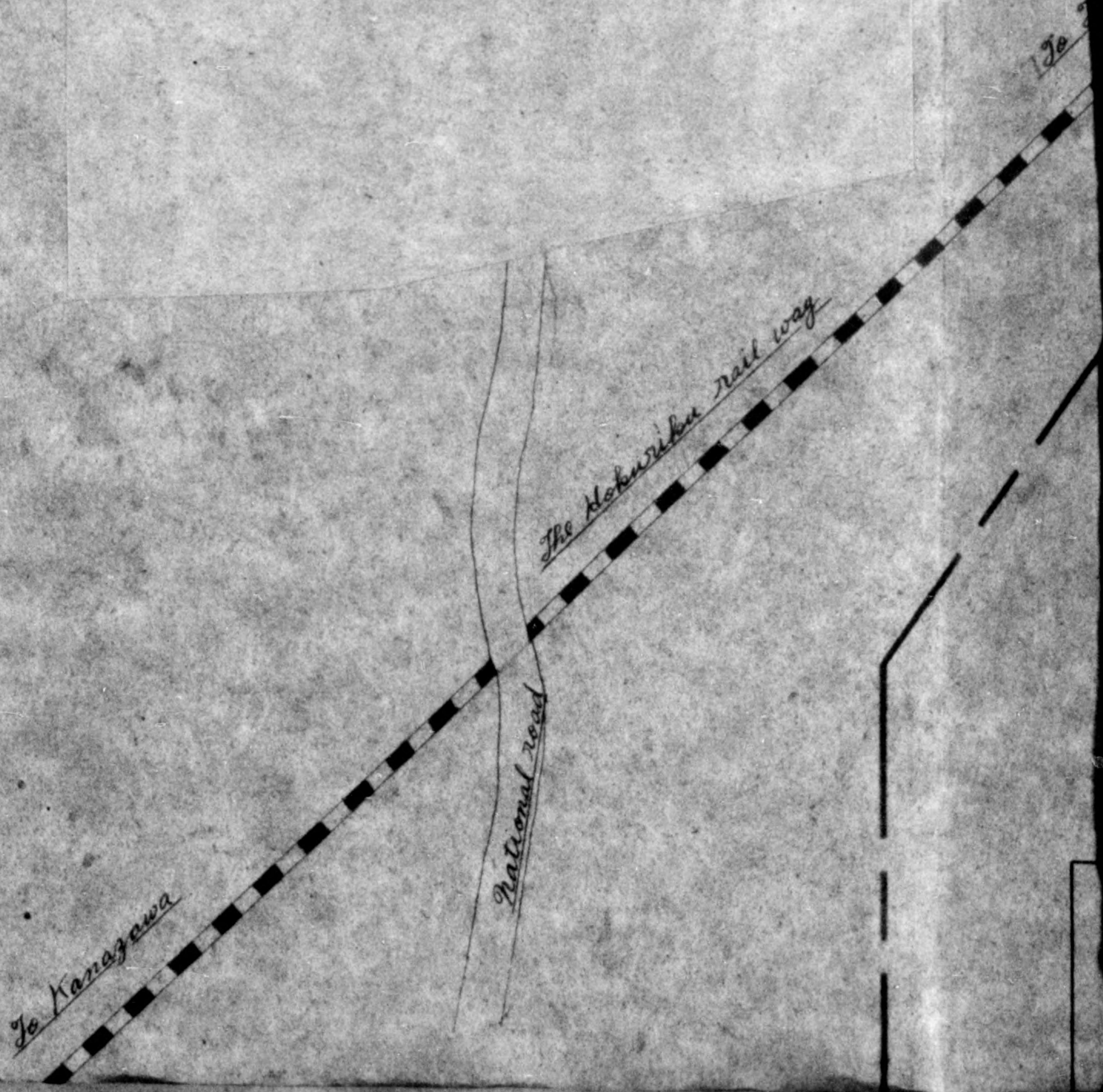

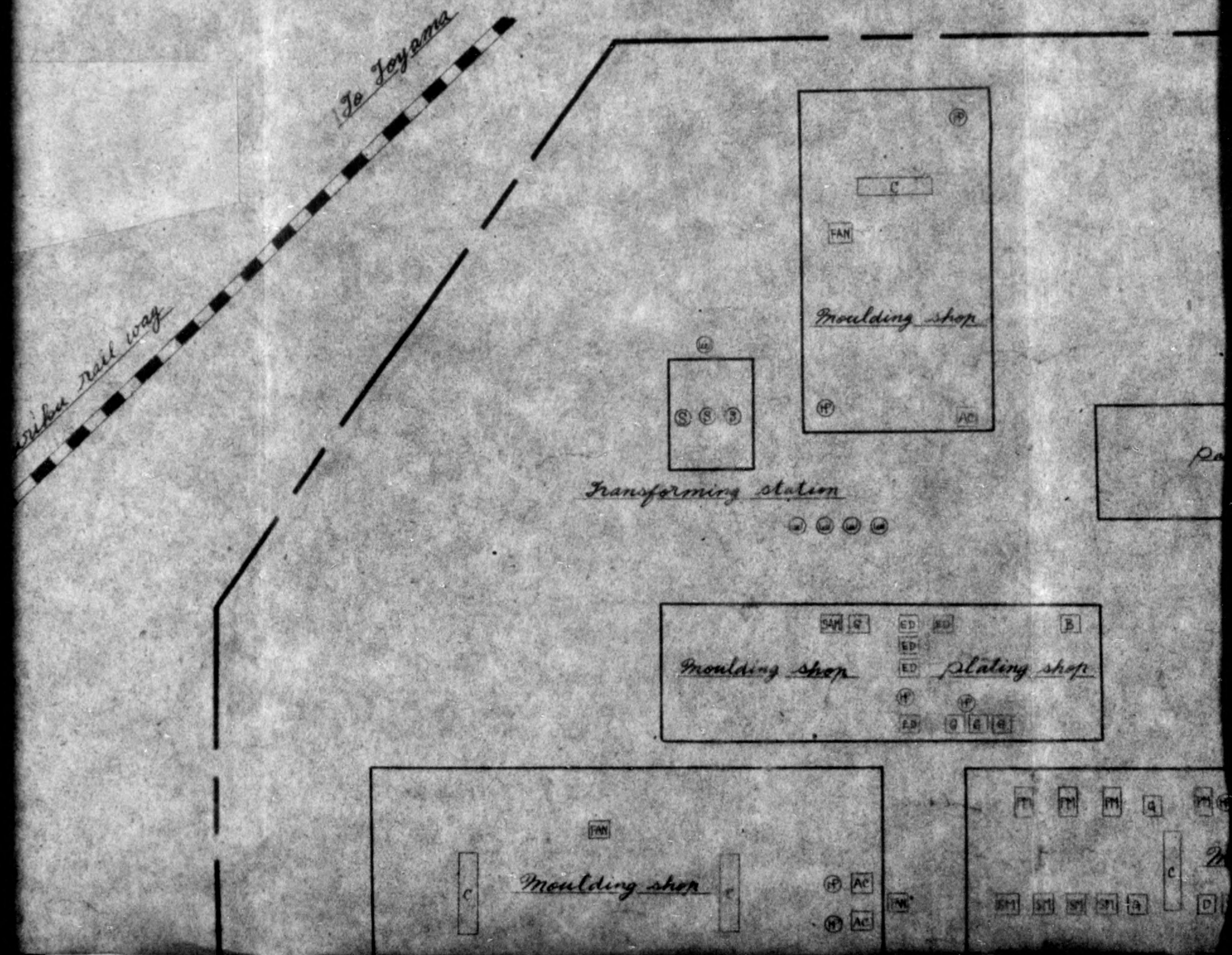

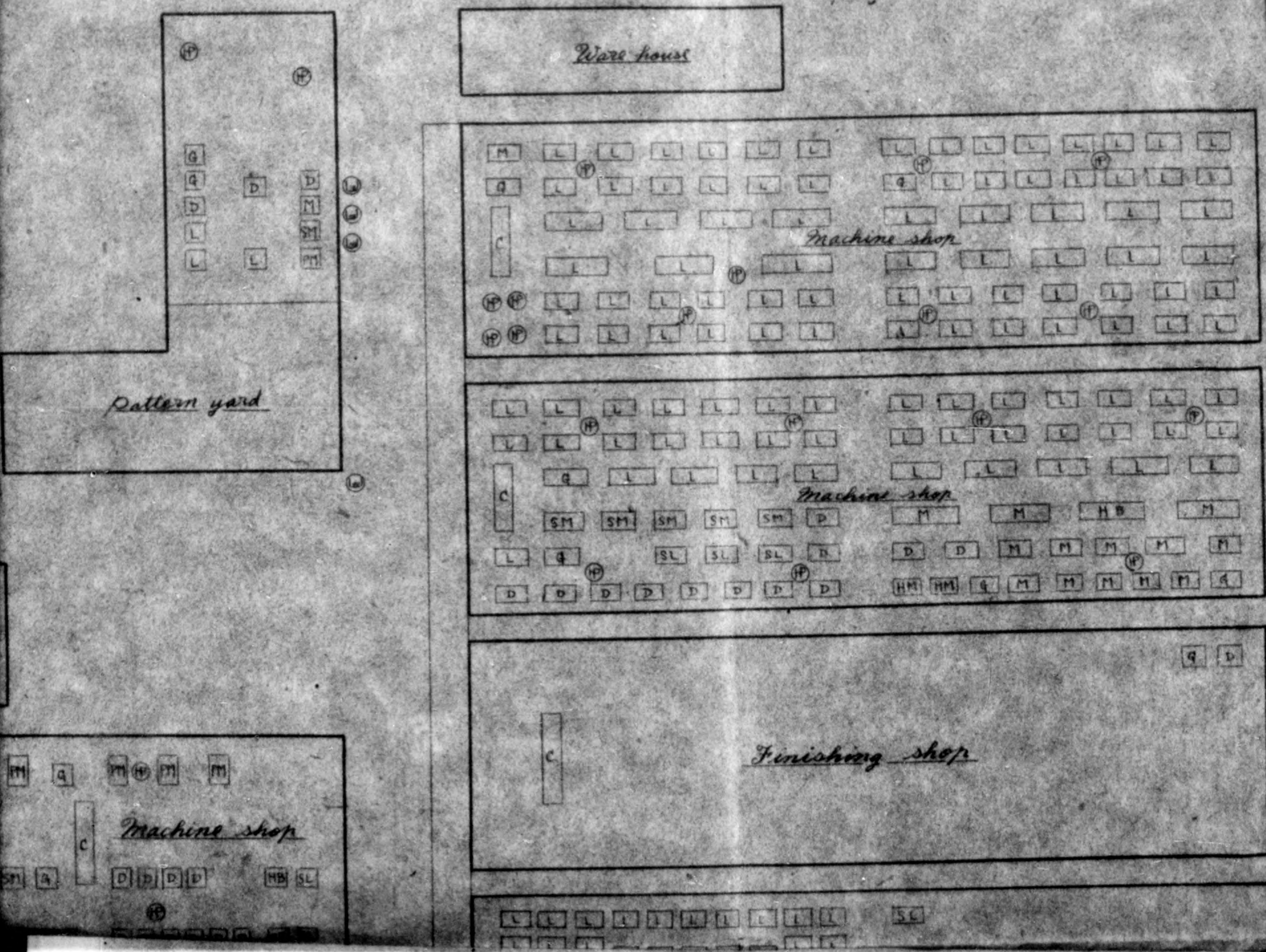
POSTING SKETCH OF BUILDINGS

The Ishikawa Seisakusho Plant, which is under the jurisdiction of the Commerce and Industry Section, Ishikawa Prefectural Government, has filed an application here enclosed for its exclusion from the list of reparations plants.

This plant was designated as a reparations plant on August 13, 1946 and has since been doing its best to custody and preserve its machines perfectly. Due to sincerity and cooperation on the part of the management and the employees, the condition of custody is considered rather good. The plant presented to the Occupation Forces an application for its exclusion from the reparations plant list for the first time on October 14, 1946, but it was turned down on April 8, 1947.

Its excellent technique won this plant a good reputation in per-war days in producing and repairing spinning and weaving machines. By order of the Army, it manufactured parts of weapons during war years, but it is now a conspicuous fact that the plant has been contributing a great deal toward prefectural industry through the resumption of its former work.

Such being the case, it is earnestly hoped that the plant will be excluded from reparations plants, in order to let it continue contributing prefectural industry through its excellent technique attained after long years. I beg leave to request that due consideration be given to this application inclosed which has been filed again by the plant.

B. Operation of plant:

Sept. 1, 1921

5. The gist of the application:

Our application for the exemption of the machines installed in this factory from reparation was rejected by Ishikawa Military Government Team on Apr. 8, 1947.

However according to the present situation, textile machinery industry hold an important position for reconstructing Japanese Economy and so it is ardently desired that at least the below-mentioned machines of this factory may be excluded from the reparation objects.

- a. The Japanese people jam-packed in the small home islands as a result of defeat in the war are facing starvation and poverty and may collapse economically at any moment. To save the people from this crisis, efforts are being made for the speedy rehabilitation of the domestic industry, but our natural resources are scarce and our raw materials in stock have been exhausted up to now. It is considered the most urgent and important measure to be taken under these circumstances to re-activate our fibre industry through your positive aids for us.

We are sincerely grateful for your permit of four million spindles to be used for the re-operation of our spinning industry.

- b. But the rehabilitation of our spinning industry is no easy task because of the imperfect preservation of spinning machines during the war and of the destruction by it, and this necessitated good spinning machinery manufacture to do their best not only in repairing damaged machines but also in producing necessary ones.
- c. The Hokuriku District had enough spinning machines for about 1,150,000 spindles in the pre-war days, and was one of noted areas for spinning industry in Japan. The excellent facilities for spinning industry that this district boasted of were all utilized for munitions production forcibly by order of the Government during the war, and must contribute all the more to the rehabilitation of Japanese industry, because the district was safe from air-raids, and it goes without saying that our factory, the only one for manufacturing spinning machineries in the Hokuriku Area, is expected to play an important part in achieving that object.
- d. Our company has been engaged in the manufacturing and repairing of textile machines since 1921, and we have excellent experiences and technics for manufacturing various spinning machines.

Specially the Quick Traverse Winder for cotton yarns produced by our plant have attained such a remarkable reputation that the cotton spinning circles of Japan has universally adapted them in recognition of their excellent quality.

e. During the wartime our plant was obliged to convert temporarily the major part of the factory to the manufacturing of naval arms parts, but immediately after the termination of the war, our plant undertook its reconversion to pre-war textile machinery manufacture, and have contributed very much to the restoration of the leading spinning companies through our energetic efforts and our plant is now on the speediest way towards reconversion among the plants which were not damaged by the war. (See Annex List 4)

f. We are now making utmost efforts for fulfilling enormous orders for our products (See Annex List 5) issued from spinning companies which rely on our excellent equipments and technics.

It is apprehended that if our equipments be removed a great setback will be brought about to our resumption of operation and its future work in the field of textile industry, and various repercussions to thereby be brought about in the business circle will be enormous.

In view of special characteristics and superior quality of machines which this factory manufactured in the past, a great deal is expected of this factory by the spinning circles and the restoration of this factory to the pre-war enterprise is deemed absolutely necessary under these circumstances.

Such being the case, it is earnestly desired that at least the below-mentioned machines of this factory may be excluded from the reparation objects.

6. State of equipment and production:

This item explains the equipment and production of this plant before, during, and after the war.
(See Annex List 1 and 2)

A. Equipment:

- a. This plant was established on Sept. 1, 1921 as manufacturing factory of textile machinery.
The machines in the possession of this plant immediately before the outbreak of the China Incident in 1937 totaled 147, and all the machines were operated for production of spinning machinery for cotton.
- b. The machines installed in this factory in 1945 was 269 more in number than those installed in 1938, but 129 of them were increased for the purpose of promoting the production of spinning machinery for cotton and ramie yarn, and were operated for the same production till 1940.
(See Annex List 6)
Therefore the machinery increased for the purpose of production of arms were only 140 during the period of which increased from 1941 to 1945.

B. Production:

- a. This plant was devoted to the production of civilian commodities—Spinning machinery for cotton & Ramie till 1940 with the exception that 12 of its machines in 1937 and 35 in 1940 were used for the production of arms parts inevitably.
- b. Since 1941 this factory diverted to production of arms parts chiefly means of the machinery increased for the purpose of production of arms parts by order of the government.
- c. Therefore the 147 machines originally installed before 1937 were operating for production of civilian commodities from beginning to end in spite of the war, and in the years following 1942, when the production of civilian commodities was extremely restricted, the above-mentioned machines were working continuously to manufacture jigs, gauges and metal pattern.

As above stated, production of arms parts increased unavoidably from 1941 by order of the Government, but this must be considered as an inevitable consequence of the circumstances at that time.

Therefore immediately after the termination of the war this factory resumed its pre-war textile machinery production.

Since then the factory has steadily been progressing for the repairing of textile machinery damaged by war.

This factory has the highest experience which will be utilized for reconstruction of our fibre industry which suffered tremendous damage during the war.

Such being the actual situation, it is most earnestly requested that the most favorable consideration be paid for the exemption of our 276 machines which are equipments necessary for our plan for production of civilian commodities. (See Annex List 1 & 6)

ANNEX 6Explanation for machines increased
from 1938 to 1945

The machines installed in this factory in 1945 was 269 more in number than those installed in 1938, but 129 of them were increased for the purpose of promoting the production of civilian commodities - Ring doubler, Quick Traverse Winder, and spinning Machinery for cotton & Ramie Yarn according to the Resolution of the first meeting of Board of Directors on the occasion of alteration to a limited company on Jan. 26th, 1937.

Though the installation of some of the 129 machines was delayed to 1940, their installation was, in every way, aimed at the production of civil-demand goods as explained in attached sheet-specially in "1. Plan for production" and "Items of Equipment Expansion Program"

Kindly Note: Attached sheet "the Resolution"

refer to Ishii Iron Works Ltd., which changed the name to Ishikawa Seisakusho, Ltd. on July 21st, 1938.

The Board decided to carry out the expansion program in which the capital was to be increased from 500,000 Yen to 1,600,000 Yen.

The 2nd Bill"Fund program in line with the above expansion program"

It was decided that the deficit be filled up with loan from banking organs and that the debt be paid little by little out of the capital to be increased in due time.

1. In accordance with provisions of Ltr. AG OCM-BA, Hq. I Corps dtd 13 Jan 47, attached enclosures are submitted as supplementary information to Ltr. this Hq, dtd 7 Nov 46, subject same as above, re: Ishikawa Seisakusho KK (15-13).

2. Prior to 1939 the above concern produced 100 percent civilian commodities using 162 pieces of equipment. Prior to 1937, 160 pieces of equipment, 100 percent, was engaged in the manufacture of textile machinery. During the period 1939 to 1941 the concern expanded its equipment and machinery to 409 pieces. During this period the total machinery and equipment engaged in the production of arms amounted to 75 pieces, and the total for commercial production 336 pieces. During the period 1942 to 1945 the concern increased the total pieces of machinery and equipment to 460 pieces in which 297 pieces were engaged in the production of arms and 163 pieces of equipment and machines producing civilian commodities, parts of textile machinery. Out of the 297 pieces of equipment and machines producing arms from 1942 to 1945, 171 machines were purchased solely for the manufacture of arms and the remaining 126 pieces of equipment and machines used during that period were machines used prior to 1937 in the production of civilian commodities. At the peak of arms production 297 pieces of machines and equipment were used, a total of 69 percent of the over all machinery. 163 pieces of equipment and machinery, or 51 percent, was devoted to the production of parts of textile machinery. However, the yen value produced on the 69 percent of machinery and equipment producing arms during that period was approximately 90 percent compared to 2 percent producing civilian commodities. This headquarters can not reason why there was such a difference in the yen percentage. It is probably due to the fact that the government was able to pay higher price for arms, than commercial industry was able to pay for parts of textile machinery.

3. In accordance with provisions of criteria outlined in Section III, par. 1, (c) (1) and (2) C 5/5, 2d 8th Army, dtd 24 Sept 46, recommendation has been made for removal of subject concern from reparations list. If deletion is not favorably considered by higher headquarters

request attention be directed to removal of that portion of equipment (162 pieces, enc 2) and twenty three (23) pieces added after termination of war.

This plant was organized at its present location in the year 1921, and had for its primary purpose the manufacture of textile machinery. It continued production of this type of equipment until 1939, when it undertook the manufacture of parts of mines. The next year it commenced production of parts of depth charges, and by the end of 1941 this plant was entirely given over to the manufacture of munitions. The production of textile machinery and of all non military goods was completely ended by 1941.

2. In view of the complete conversion of this plant to war production, starting in 1939, it is the opinion of this headquarters that this plant is properly listed as a munition plant. It would appear that the manufacture of munitions was more than a diversion from the normal operation of the plant, and represented a complete conversion of the company. This headquarters does not agree with the recommendation contained in paragraph 1, basic communication, that favorable consideration be given the request of the Ishikawa Seisakusho, for removal from the reparations list.

1. In compliance with the 5th indorsement the following information is submitted:

2. Prior to 1939 the above concern produced 100 percent civilian commodities using 162 pieces of equipment. Prior to 1937, 150 pieces of equipment, 100 percent, was engaged in the manufacture of textile machinery. During the period 1939 to 1941 the concern expanded its equipment and machinery to 409 pieces. During this period the total machinery and equipment engaged in the production of arms amounted to 73 pieces, and the total for commercial production 336 pieces. During the period 1942 to 1945 the concern increased the total pieces of machinery and equipment to 460 pieces in which 297 pieces were engaged in the production of arms and 163 pieces of equipment and machines producing civilian commodities, parts of textile machinery. Out of the 297 pieces of equipment and machines producing arms from 1942 to 1945, 171 machines were purchased solely for the manufacture of arms and the remaining 126 pieces of equipment and machines used during that period were machines used prior to 1937 in the production of civilian commodities. At the peak of arms productions 297 pieces of machines and equipment were used, a total of 69 percent of the over all machinery. 163 pieces of equipment and machinery, or 31

percent, was devoted to the production of parts of textile machinery. However, the yen value produced on the 69 percent of machinery and equipment producint arms during that period was approximately 98 percent compared to 2 percent producing civilian commodities. This headquar-ers can not reason why there was such a difference in the yen percent-age. It is probably due to the fact that the government was able topay higher price for arms, than commercial industry was able to pay for parts of textile machinery.

3. In accordance with criteria outlined in Section III, par. 1, (c) (1) and (2) Operational Directive 5/5, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 24 Sept 46, this headquarters recommended that the above named concern be removed from Reparations List. As sighted in the above cri@teria, the above concern was not originally organized for munitions production nor was it converted to munitions production through such major change and volume and character of equipment as to render them unsuitable for reconversion to peacetime puppose. The above concern has complied with all directives, and the inspection in accordance with SCAPIN-1219 was satisfactory. If reparations removes all the machinery and equipment from the above concern it will greatly jeopardize the future economy of the local area.

The Ishikawa Military Government Team has caused a further investigation to be made of the application of the Ishikawa Seisakusho K.K. for removal from the reparations list. The facts uncovered as a result of this investigation disclose that this factory was not originally organized for production of munitions, but was originally engaged in the production of textile weaving machinery. In 1941 the factory diverted a large portion of its activities to the manufacture of torpedo parts and mines. Some new machinery was brought in to enable this production to be undertaken. However, the vast majority of machinery used consisted of that which was already located in the plant. Production of textile weaving machinery parts did continue throughout the war, although neither the amount nor value of the machines produced was of major importance. It is now the opinion of this headquarters that this plant was not converted through major change, and that the manufacture of munition parts represented purely a diversion from the normal operation of the plant. Removal of this plant from the reparations list is recommended.
