8 VF from VC-53 and 7 VF from VC-51 on station awaiting assignment of target for strike in support of invasion of Iwo Jima.

The flight was ordered to make a bombing and strafing attack against enemy trucks and artillery located in target area 201 I & O. The VF were not permitted to go below 3500 ft. before the attack, and hence were unable to spot any troops or artillery positions. The area was partially obscured by clouds at 2000 ft. and this increased the difficulty. Nevertheless two strafing runs were made although for the most part results were unobserved.

All in all the attack was not too successful. There were so many friendly planes in the air at the same time that pilots had to concentrate on avoiding collision with other planes. This materially detracted from the effectiveness of the attack.

No AA was encountered.
