TWO SCORE PASSENGERS KILLED IN COLLISION

Report that Operator Was Asleep at His Post and Failed to Hold Train.

Pueblo, Colo, March 16. Some two acore lives were crushed out early to-day in a head-on collision of two passenger trains near Adobe, Colorado, on the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, and more than a score of the victims were incinerated beyond identification by a fire that destroyed the wrecked ceaches. Many others were injured, but all probably will recover.

The wreck was due to undelivered orders, heavy mountain grades, a bilinding snowstorm, a sharp curve and the slippery condition of the rails. Only the locomotives, baggage and day coaches were wrecked, the sieeping cars escaping almost unscathed.

Many of the dead were homeseekers, bound for the Northwest. The three crushed locomotives set fire to the splintered coaches and it was hours before all the bodies were recovered, the fiames being so hot, the rescuers could not approach the debris until the fuel had burned out.



A sub-committee consisting of Senator Armstrong and one or more of these assemblymen of the committee will meet in New York probably most of next week, with Charles E. Hughes, counsel for the committee, and all bills will be gone over in the light of the arguments and information presented at the hearing by the insurance men and others, both in opposition to and in support of the bills, and such modifications as the sub-committee may deem and others, both in opposition to and in support of the bills, and such modifications as the sub-committee may deem necessary will be made. The net resolution will be presented to the full committee at a meeting to be held the last of next week. Chairman Armstrong said he hoped to present to the legislature within two weeks the bills in their final form.
