

HALIFAX

HALIFAX, the capital and only city in the province of Nova Scotia, has a most admirable situation on the beautiful Halifax harbour. On June 21st, 1749, Hon. Edward Cornwallis, having received a liberal grant, entered Halifax harbour with something over two thousand men, women and children, and laid the foundation of the present interesting city. Lord Cornwallis was the first governor, and named the city after the Earl of Halifax.

In the city are many edifying buildings and natural attractions. The Public Gardens, the admiration of all tourists, are second to none in Canada, and equal, if not surpass, any in England. The Park and North West Arm are natural attractions, and in summer are the constant resort of thousands of people who delight in boating, bathing and driving. The yacht races on the Arm are also a feature of much interest.

Among the important buildings are the City Hall, Provincial Building, Post Office, Armories and St. Mary's Cathedral. The memorial monument erected to the memory of those who perished at Paardeburg, on the grounds of the Provincial Building, is a beautiful and most imposing structure.


Halifax is also the seat of two excellent institutions of learning, Dalhousie and St. Mary's colleges. Apart from the attractions, Halifax is most valued as a military and naval station for British troops in America, being the only naval station in Canada. Halifax is a brisk business town and on account of its situation is very strongly fortified.












