# What is Wikidata?

- Part of the Wikimedia Foundation
- Acts as a structural data repository for Wikipedia
- Uses graph database model, which allows for machine-readable access and very advanced searches

## Why use Wikidata?

- **Publicity.** As a platform, it's used by a lot of people, giving it more visibility
- **Functionality.** Advanced SPARQL queries let researchers get the most out of metadata
- **Reduce duplicated effort.** Creates a single source of truth that can populate Wikipedia, Wikimedia commons, Wikitravel, and other custom projects
- **Reusable and extendible.** It's easy to re-use Wikidata for new applications



The **Ojibwe**, **Ojibwa**, **Chippewa**, or **Sault** people of Canada and the United States. They are the second-largest First Nations population in the United States, surpassed in number only by the Cherokee, Choctaw and Sioux.

The Ojibwe people traditionally speak the Ojibwe language, part of the Algonquian language family. They are divided into several bands, including the Fires and the Anishinaabeg, which include the Ojibwe, Odawa and the Potawatomi. Historically, they were a part of the Huron-Saulteaux branch, along with the Cree, Assiniboine, and Metis.<sup>[2]</sup>

The majority of the Ojibwe people live in the United States; 77,940 mainline Ojibwe; 76,760 Saulteaux in the United States. They live from the British Columbia. As of 2010, Ojibwe in the United States numbered 170,742.<sup>[1]</sup>

The Ojibwe are known for their birch bark canoe, mining and trade in copper, as well as their maple syrup.<sup>[3]</sup> Their Midewiwin Society is a complex of detailed and complex scrolls of events, customs, memories, stories, geometry and mathematics.
