The White Star liner Cretic sailed from Commonwealth pier for Naples and Genoa yesterday, after arriving from New York earlier in the day. At this port this vessel took on 25 saloon, 23 second cabin and 159 third class passengers. Jan. 7, 1921

Among the Greater Boston persons on board as the steamer left were Judge Jabez Fox, a former justice of the Massachusetts superior court; Mrs. Fox, Miss Elizabeth D. Walker of Malden and Miss Elizabeth I. Walker of Brookline, the two latter nieces of Judge Fox. The party will tour Italy, Spain and the Riviera, and will return to Boston in June in order that Judge Fox may participate in the golden jubilee of his class at Harvard.

The steamer's departure was delayed for some time by the late arrival of a New Haven passenger. Gaetano Arichielli was returned to Italy on the vessel for failure to pass the literacy tests. He arrived in Boston on the Cretic on its last trip from the Italian ports.

The return of the Cretic to Boston will depend upon whether the Italian government prohibits the immigration of citizens of that country to the United States. Officials of the line stated that the Cretic will probably not continue its present service if Italian immigration is prohibited. Manager S. J. Jackson of the White Star line, said shortly before the vessel sailed that he hoped the situation would be cleared in a manner satisfactory to both the United States and Italy.

During March there were 95 steamer and seven schooners entered here from foreign ports, and the number of passenger arrivals in the month totalled 12,350 from overseas, 645 from Canada and 20 from West Indies and Central America, a grand total of 13,015.

Major Tully Urges Americanizing Plan

ATLANTIC CITY, April 28.—An appeal for a National Americanization policy, backed by appropriate legislation and supported by adequate public funds, was voiced by Major Francis W. Tully of the Boston Chamber of Commerce at the Americanization group session of the annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

Major Tully declared that Americanization is essentially a neighborhood problem and must be carried out eventually on a neighborhood basis.

This method, he said, has proved very successful in Boston under the direction of the local Chamber of Commerce and has met with approval everywhere. The "Boston plan," he said, has also been adapted to a number of other cities where the problem is great.

**AGREE ON PLAN TO
LIMIT IMMIGRATION**

**Will Restrict Nationalities to Three
Per Cent. of Those Now Here**

WASHINGTON, May 11—Conferees on the immigration restriction bill agreed today to retain the plan of limiting immigration inflow by nationalities next year to three per cent. of the number from each nation now in the United States, but struck out House proposals to exempt from these restrictions persons subject to religious persecution and those who had left this country temporarily. The House exemption in favor of children under 18 years of parents in this country was retained.

The conference report will be presented first to the House with prospects of prompt ratification by both bodies. By conference agreement the restrictions would become effective 15 days after signature by the President.

In essential features the conference measure is almost identical with that vetoed by former President Wilson.

The appointees are: Edward S. Webster of Newton, of the firm of Stone and Webster; Charles F. Weed of Brookline, vice-president of the First National Bank of Boston; Adolph Ehrlich, executive head of the firm of C. F. Hovey Company; George U. Crocker, former treasurer of the city of Boston and Miss Marion Churchill of Arlington, president of the women's educational and industrial union.

The legislative members of the commission, appointed by President Allen and Speaker Young just before prorogation, are: Senators Pearson of Lowell, Hardy of Huntington and Emery of Newburyport and Representatives Early of Newton, Draper of Hopedale, Woodill of Melrose, Larsen of Everett and Mitchell of Springfield.

Under the resolve creating the commission, it is directed to review the work of consolidation of departments, made under provisions of the constitutional amendment adopted in 1918, and report as to whether the present division of activities conforms with the spirit of that amendment. The commission will also study the state budget system, now only a few years old, and report any improvements which may occur. It is also expected to report if any present activities of the state, entailing great expense, may be curtailed or abandoned.

ALIENS ADMITTED IN YEAR 805,228

Departures from Country In-
clude 247,718 Immigrants

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30—Immigrants admitted to the United States during the fiscal year ending June 30 numbered 805,228, as compared with 430,001 for the previous fiscal year and with an average of 1,034,940 during the pre-war years from 1910 to 1914. It is shown in figures made public today by the bureau of immigration. Non-immigrant aliens admitted during the year numbered 172,365, making a grand total of 977,593.

Departures from the country during the last year included 247,718 immigrants and 178,313 non-immigrant aliens, a total of 426,031. In the preceding fiscal year 288,315 immigrant and 139,747 non-immigrant aliens departed.

During the fiscal year 4517 aliens were deported from the United States to the countries whence they came. These included 1368 Mexicans, 359 English, 240 Russians, 272 Germans and 246 Italians. Of the total 446 were deported on charges that they were Anarchists.

Commissioner-General Husband, in an-

nouncing the figures, said immigration rapidly was assuming its pre-war rate when new percentage immigration law went into effect. The new law barely affected immigration for the fiscal year, he said, as it did not go into effect until June 3. The commissioner estimated the law probably reduced immigration that month about 50,000.

According to custom house figures during August a total of 1667 passengers arrived here from Europe, compared with 1735 of the same month in 1926. The biggest falling off this last month was in the first-class passengers—from 428 to 129. Travel by sea from the Provinces also shows a decrease of more than 2400, or from 9871 to 7462. Last month's vessel arrivals were 85 steamships and 13 schooners from foreign ports, compared with 101 steamships and 31 schooners for August a year ago.

Vessels have recently been chartered here to bring coal from ports of the Chesapeake to Boston for \$1.10 a ton and sailing vessels for \$1 a ton. This is about 200 per cent lower than last September, it was said yesterday.

The International Mercantile Marine Company operating the American, Red Star and White Star lines to Europe has issued a bulletin to its agents calling attention to the fact that American citizens now no longer need customs permits to leave for Europe, and that furthermore they are not required to produce income tax receipts before sailing from an American port. These restrictions have just been removed for the first time since the beginning of the war.

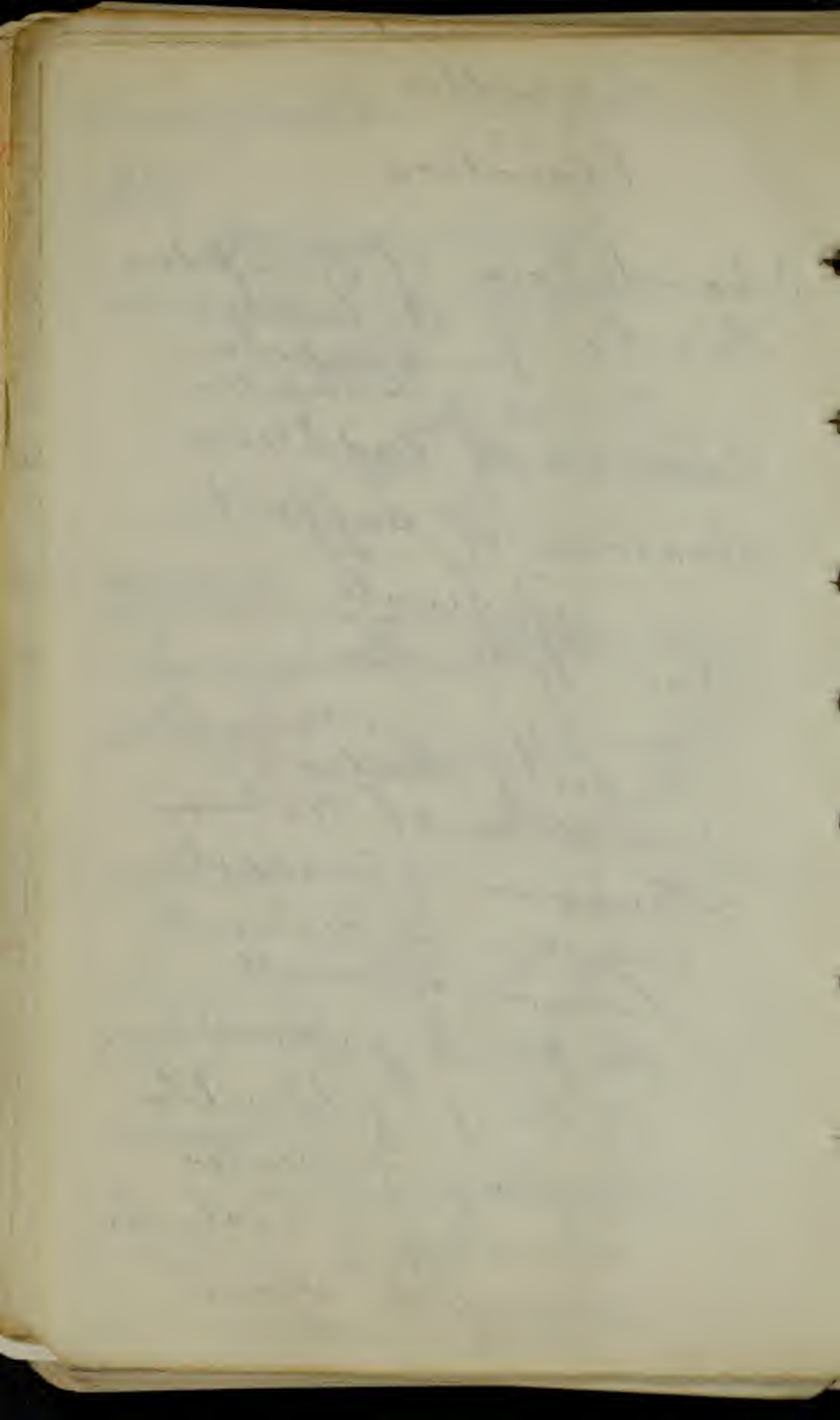

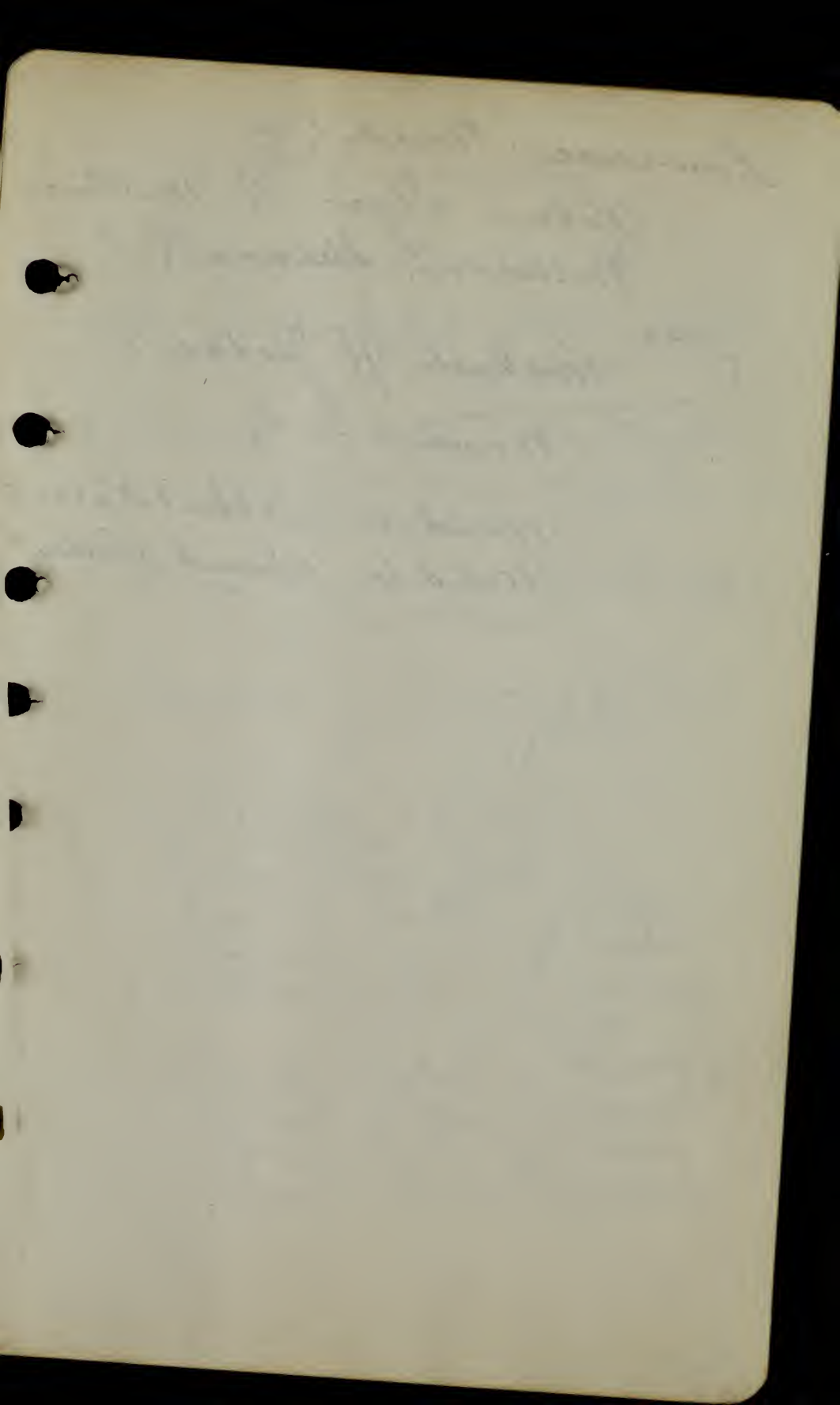
