

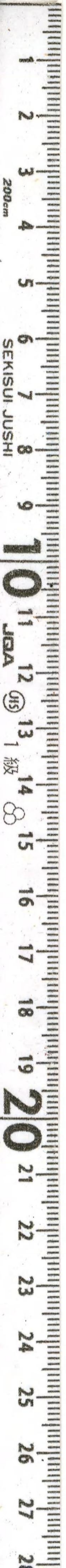

SUBJECT: Assignment and Utilization of Officers.

1. An increasing reluctance of commanders at all levels to accept and effectively utilize officers unless they meet the commander's criteria as to age, branch, previous experience or schooling has been noted. This can be attributed largely to the natural desire of all commanders to retain high quality subordinates whom they know and to reward these officers, many of whom are in grades not commensurate with their assignments, by promotion.

2. Frequently, when officers are assigned who are not known to possess fully a commander's desired qualifications, assignments are made to positions other than those for which the individuals are shown by record, to be qualified, even though appropriate vacancies do exist. In some cases these positions to which such officers are assigned are outside authorized vacancies, or the officers are given a series of temporary duties, none of which give them ample opportunity to prove their true value to the unit or reduce the unit's requirement for officers. As a result, overstrengths occur while officer requirements, as established by the unit, are not filled. Such actions are manifestly unfair to these officers as well as to the Army as a whole.

3. The Department of the Army has predicted a serious Army-wide shortage of officers during 1952. The effects of this shortage are already becoming apparent in the Far East Command. The proportion of known competent and experienced officers in the Far East Command has decreased materially during the past few months. Recent requirements have been met largely by older and less widely experienced officers, many of whom are in doubtful physical condition. Although strong efforts have been made and will continue to be made to raise the quality of incoming officers, all commanders must be cognizant of the world conditions necessitating the fullest utilization of all officer personnel. It is a specific and continuing responsibility of command to improve the quality level and broaden the experience of officer personnel.

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4. The necessity for reduction to authorized strength by 31 December 1951 and the increasing number of officers being received from the Zone of the Interior make it essential that all commanders exploit to the fullest officer manpower made available to them.

5. Assignment of incoming officers will be made to fill existing and anticipated requirements after giving full consideration to each officer's qualifications. Particular attention will be given to prevent the diversion of an officer possessing a critical MOS to a position which, though important, can be filled by other available officers. All echelons must give special attention to the reception of new officers. They must be given assignments appropriate to their grades and branch of service. If an officer fails to perform in a satisfactory manner the duties appropriate to his branch and grade, proper action will be taken under the provisions of existing regulations. Failure to take such action, when warranted, is a definite failure in the exercise of command responsibility.

6. It is desired that commanders at all echelons give personal attention to the effective utilization of available officer personnel.

1. Officers and Warrant Officers, except those with dependents present within the Far East Command, will be afforded the option of volunteering for reassignment to United States Army Pacific, Hawaii, upon selection, and being reported, for rotation. Volunteers will be considered for such reassignment under the following conditions, waiver of any provision thereof will not be granted:

a. Volunteers must be eligible for a minimum of twelve (12) months of service in United States Army Pacific, computed on the basis of a normal tour of thirty-six (36) months less the number of actual calendar months served on current tour in the Far East Command. For example: An officer who has served twenty-two (22) actual months on current foreign service tour within the Far East Command and is selected for rotation under current constructive months of service criteria would be eligible to volunteer for reassignment to United States Army Pacific (36 - 22 = 14 months remaining to serve on current foreign service tour subsequent to reassignment); conversely, an officer who has served in excess of twenty-four (24) actual months within the Far East Command on current tour prior to selection for rotation is ineligible to volunteer for such reassignment.

b. Volunteers will not be granted leave in the United States or territory of residence, in connection with change of station from the Far East Command to United States Army Pacific.

c. Movement of the dependents of volunteers from the United States, or territory of residence, to Hawaii will be subject to approval by Commanding General, United States Army Pacific. Accordingly, applications for travel of dependents will be submitted to Commanding General, United States Army Pacific, subsequent to arrival of the volunteer in Hawaii.

2. The current enlisted personnel situation in United States Army Pacific precludes extension of these provisions to include enlisted personnel.

3. Addressee commanders will indicate volunteers (eligible within the criteria specified in this directive) for reassignment to United States Army Pacific by inclusion of the designation "Vol USARPAC" following the individual's name when he is reported to this headquarters for reassignment instructions under the applicable paragraph, Part I of Report QAG-50, in accordance with instructions contained in Section V, Inclosure 1 to letter, this headquarters, file AG 200.3 (8 Nov 51)AG-PA, subject: "Rotation, Extensions and Reassignments" dated 8 November 1951.

a. Assignment instructions will be issued by The Adjutant General, Department of the Army, after consideration of Zone of Interior and United States Army Pacific requirements for the services of the officer or warrant officer concerned. These instructions will constitute final Department of the Army action on each request and in normal cases will be issued within ten (10) days after the receipt of request for reassignment instructions by The Adjutant General.

b. An authenticated request for reassignment to United States Army Pacific in accordance with the provisions of this directive will be executed by each volunteer prior to being reported as such in Report QAG-50, as specified above, and will be included in the field 201 file of the applicant upon reassignment.

c. (1) Subsequent to submission of QAG-50 report, volunteers stationed within Korea and Japan will be reassigned by the reporting unit to the Camp Drake Replacement Depot to await Department of the Army reassignment instructions. Orders issued will include the citation "Volunteer for reassignment to USARPAC, Report QAG-50 has been submitted."

(2) Officers stationed within areas of the Far East Command, other than Korea and Japan, will remain in current assignments pending receipt of such reassignment instructions.

d. Volunteers, once reported, will not depart the Far East Command until reassignment instructions have been received from The Adjutant General.

e. Formal requests, other than as indicated in subparagraph b, above, by volunteers for reassignment to United States Army Pacific, are not required to be submitted through military channels. Inclusion of pertinent information in Report QAG-50, as specified above, is the sole reporting media required for this category of personnel.

f. Requests for reassignment to United States Army Pacific submitted by officers and warrant officers prior to establishment of eligibility and selection for rotation under constructive months of service criteria then in effect will not be favorably considered.

4. Due to surface transportation schedules, travel to United States Army Pacific from the Far East Command by personnel selected for such reassignment will normally be performed via air transportation.

5. Instructions contained in paragraphs 8 - 11 inclusive, Section III, Inclosure 1 to letter, this headquarters, file AG 200.3 (8 Nov 51) AG-PA, subject: "Rotation, Extensions and Reassignments," dated 8 November 1951 pertaining to reassignment to Hawaii of individuals who have dependents, baggage, and/or automobiles within Hawaii, or who are legal residents of Hawaii, are not changed by the provisions of this directive and remain in effect.

6. Personnel, who prior to receipt of this directive, have voluntarily extended their foreign service tour within the Far East Command are not eligible to volunteer for reassignment to United States Army Pacific until selected for rotation upon expiration of such extension.

SUBJECT: Airborne-Trained Officers

TO: Unit Commanders, Headquarters and Service Command, GHQ, FEC

1. The following message, CINCFE, APO 500, AG 210.31 (15 Apr 51) AG-PR dated 15 April 1951, is quoted, in part, for information and compliance of all concerned:

"1. All airborne-trained officers below the grade of colonel assigned to your command, classified General Service with waiver, will be reevaluated immediately in accordance with standards established in AR 40-115 and ltr, GHQ, FEC, AG 200.3 (22 Jan 51) AG-PR, subj: Classification and Assignment of Personnel with Waiver for Physical Disabilities, 1 February 1951."

"2. All airborne-trained officers below the grade of colonel assigned your command who are combat qualified, including those reevaluated General Service as a result of action taken in compliance with paragraph 1 above, will be transferred to Japan Replacement Training Center, APO 613, for further assignment to the 187th Regimental Combat Team."

2. Commanders of units maintaining officer personnel records (TD AGO Form 66), will report all officers within the criteria set forth in paragraph 2, above quoted message, to this headquarters, not later than 24 April 1951, for issuance of reassignment orders. Negative reports are desired.
