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

L.—Youngest son of the late John Galt, Esq., the author of many well known works of fiction in English literature, who was for some years a Commissioner of the Canada Land Co. B. at Chelsea, Eng., 6 Sept., 1817. Ed. in England. M. 1st, Elliot, dau. of the late John Torrance, Esq. of Montreal; 2nd, Amy, sister of the above. Is Presdt. of Guarantee Co. and of the Accident Insu. Co. of North America. Was for many years in the service of the British America Land Co., and held the office of Chief Commr. of the Co. for a considerable period. Was

Presdt. of the St Lawrence and Atlantic Railroad in 1852-53, and car-Presdt. of the St Lawrence and Atlantic Railroad in 1852-53, and carried out the amalgamation of that line with the Quebec & Richmond, Atlantic & St. Lawrence, Toronto & Guelph, at d Montreal & Toronto, forming the railway system now known as the Grand Trunk Railway, of which line he was a Govt. director, 1857-58. Conducted negotiations on behalf of Canada for a commercial treaty with France and Spain, 1879. Author of Canada from 1849 to 1859, and other pamphlets of public interest. Created a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, 1869, and advanced to the dignity of a Knight Grand Cross, 25 May, 1878. LL.D. (Hon.) of Edinburgh, 1883. Received a diploma of Honor for special services in connection with the International Fisheries Exhibition in London, Eng., 1883. Established North West Coal and Navigation Co., 1832. Opened the first Coal Mine in the N.W.T. of Canada, and in 1885, constructed 109 miles of Railway, connecting Mines with C.P.R. Apptd. chairman of the Railway Commission. The consolidation of the public debt, with provision for its redemption; the encouragement of direct foreign trade; the abolition of the canal and Lake St. Peter tolls; and the issuing of Provincial Notes as currency, are among the most noticeable features of Sir A. T. Galt's financial administration. Sat for Sherbrooke (county) in L. A., Can., from 1849 to 1850, when he resigned his seat; and for Sherbrooke (town) from 1853 until the Union. Elected by acclamation at g.e. 1867. Was High Commissioner for Canada in England, 1880 to 1883.—290, Mountain Street, St James' Club, Montreal; Rideau Club, Ottava.

Hon. WILLIAM McDougall, C.B., Q.C.—S. of the late Daniel McDougall, Esq., of St. Mary's, Ont., and grands. of John McDougall, Esq., a native of Scot. and a U. E. Loyalist, who served in the British Commissariat service during the Am. revolution; settled in N. S. at the termination of hostilities, and subsequently removed to U. C. B. in Toronto, 25th Jan., 1882. Ed. there and at Victoria Univ., Cobourg. M., 1st. 1845, Amelia Caroline, dau. of Joseph Easton, Esq., of Millbank (she d. Jan., 1869): 2nd, 18 Nov., 1872, Mary Adelaide, dau. of John Beatty, Esq., M. D., formerly a professor in Victoria Univ., Cobourg, Ont. Admitted as an Attorney, U.C., 1847. Called to the Bar U.C. in Hilary Term, 1862. Appointed a Q.C. 18 August, 1881. Founded (1848) the Canada Farmer, an agricultural journal, subsequently merged in the Canadian Agriculturist, which he published and edited until 1858. Founded (1850) the North American,

a Reform newspaper, of which he was chief editor, until it was merged in the Toronto Daily Globe, in 1857. Was the leading political writer on the Daily Globe from 1857 to 1860. Represented Can, at the New York Exhibition, 1853. Was Seey, of the Constitutional Reform Asso. of U. C. 1859; a mem. of Ex. Connoil and Commr. of Crown Lands, Can., from May, 1862 to March, 1864 (in the Sandfield Macdonald-Dorion Administration), when the Govt. resigned; Prov. Secy. (in the Taché-Macdonald Union Administration) from June, 1864, and Acting Minister of Marine (with charge of Provincial gun-boats on the lakes), from July, 1866, until the union of the Provinces, 1867. Sworn of the Privy Council, and was Minister of Public Works for the Dominion. from 1 July, 1867, until Commissioned Lieut.-Gov. of Rupert's Land and the North-West Territories, Oct., 1869. Created C.B. (Civil) 1867. Was Chairman of the Commission apptd. to open trade relations with the West Indies, Mexico and Brazil, 1865-66. Was a delegate to the Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864, to that at Quebec in the same year; and to the Colonial Conference in London to complete the terms of Union of B. N. A. Colonies, 1866-67. Delegate to England, with the late Sir G. E. Cartier, to confer with Imperial authorities on the defences of the Dominion, and for the acquisition of the North-West Territory, 1868-9. Appointed Govt. Trustee of Canada Southern Railway Municipal Bonds, 1870; Commr. for Ont. for the settlement of the North-Western Boundary of the Province, 1871. Sent to England by Dominion Govt., 1873, as Special Commr to confer with Imperial Govt. on subject of Fisherics, and to make arrangements in Scandinavia and the Baltic Provinces for the Emigration Department. Author of Six Letters to the Hon. O. Mowat, Attorney Genl., on the amendment of the Provincial Constitution (Toronto, 1872). Sat for North Oxford in Can. Assem. from 1858 to 1863; for N. Ont. from g.e. 1863 to July, 1864; and for North Lanark from Nov. 1864, until the Union, when returned to Commons for same seat, and continued to represent it in that house until g.e. 1872, when defeated. Was an unsuccessful candidate for North Wentworth, 1854; for Was an unsuccessful candidate for North Wentworth, 1854; for Waterloo at g.e. same year; for Perth at g.e. 1857; and for East York in the Ont. Assem. at g.e. 1875. Returned for S. Simcoc in the Ont. Assem., 26 May, 1875, on death of sitting mem., and held the seat until he resigned, Scpt., 1878, to contest Halton for the Commons, which he represented until g.e. 1882. An unsuccessful candidate for South Grenville at g.e. 1887. Co.; and of the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. Apptd. a Commr. to report on route of proposed Baie Verte Canal, 1875. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., from 24 May, 1862, to 29 March, 1864, and from 24 Nov., 1864, until the Union. Was Minister of Finance from 24 May, 1862, to 15 May, 1863; Receiver General from latter date to 29 March, 1864; to 15 May, 1863; Receiver General from latter date to 29 March, 1864; Postmaster General from 24 Nov., 1864, to 30 August, 1866; when a second time appointd. Minister of Finance, which office he held until the Union. Sworn of the Privy Council, 1 July, 1867, and was Minister of Inland Revenue from

that date until apptd. Lieut.-Governor of Ontario, July, 1868, in which office he remained until Nov., 1873. Created C.B. (Civil), 1867. 

The Supreme Court of Canada, and Exchequer Court of Canada.

The Supreme Court is composed of a Chief Justice and five Puisne The Supreme Court is composed of a Chief Justice and five Puisne Judges, five of whom constitute a quorum. It has both original and appellate jurisdiction.—Original, as to (1) habeas corpus in criminal and extradition cases; (2) judicial opinions to the crown; (3) private bills and petitions therefore referred by the Senate or House of Commons; and (4) civil suits in which the validity of a Dominion or Provincial Act is questioned. Appellate, in appeals (1) from the Exchequer Court; (2) from the Provincial Courts; (3) in habeas corpus cases; and (4) in electiou cases.

The Exchequer Court has original jurisdiction (1) in revenue cases; (2) in civil suits when the Crown for the Dominion is plaintiff; (3) controversies between the Dominion and a Province or between two Provinces.

Bellerose, Lieut. Col., Hon. Joseph Hyacinthe, J.P. (De La Naudière.)

S. of the late M. H. Bellerose, Esq., merchant, Three Rivers, P.Q., by Sophia La Maitre de Lottinville. B. at Three Rivers, 12 July, 1820. Ed. at the Coll. of Nicolet and St. Hyacinthe. M., 1847, Henrietta, dau. of Lieut.-Col. Armand, and sister of Hon. J. F. Armand, Senator. Has been for many years Vice-Presdt. of the Sovereign Fire Iusu. Co.; Mayor of his Municipality; Commr. under 2 Vict., c. 29, Stat. L.C., and Presdt. of the Union Navigation Co. Has been long and prominently connected with the Vol inteer Militia movement in L.C., and in 1859 was Commander of the whole Force in Military District No. 8. Is now Lieut.-Col. commanding Laval Reserve Militia. In 1858, H. M. the Queen, being desirous of showing her estimation of his military services, charged Sir E. W. Head, then Gov.-General, to offer him a captaincy in the 100th or "Prince of Wales Royal Can. Regiment," then being organized, a position he accepted, but subsequently, for private reasons, resigned, notwithstauding that he had passed the necessary examinations therefor. On two occasions declined important appts. under Govt., and after the death of Sir G. E. Cartier, refused a seat in the Cabinet owing to the unsettled

policy of Govt. on Man. Amnesty and N. B. School questions, but principally on account of Pacific Railway charges then pending. Sat for Laval in Can. Assem. from g. e. 1863 until the Union, and for same seat in the Commons from that event until called to the Senate, 7 Oct., 1873. Represented Laval in Quebec Assem. from the Union until g. e. 1875, when he retired, and was, during the whole of that time, Chairman of the Contingent Committee, and, as such, effected great reductions in the House expenditure; was for some years Chairman of the Private Bills Committee of the Senate. During the session of 1871 he was offered the Speakership of the Leg. Assem., Quebec, for the next Parlt., which he then accepted, but during the recess, owing to party dissensions, he thought the Govt. was endangered, and had an interview with the Premier, Mr. Chauveau, the result being the continuation in office of the late Speaker. Botsford, Lieut. Col., Hon. Amos Edwin.

Second s. of the late Hon. Wm. Botsford, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court, N.B., and formerly Speaker of the Assem. of that Province; and grandson of Amos Botsford, Esq.; a U. E. Loyalist, formerly of Newton, Conn. who was Speaker of the first Assem. elected after N.B. was constituted a separate province. B, in St. John N.B., 25 Sept. 1804. Ed. at Sackville. M. Sept., 1864, Mary, relict of the late J. F. Allison, Esq., of Sackville. Was for many years engaged in agricultural pursuits. Was Presdt. of the Prov. Board of Agriculture, N.B., and Lieut. Col. 2nd Batt. Westmoreland Militia. Was Presdt. of the Dominion Rifle Asso. from its organization, until

1871, and is now a Vice-Presdt. of that body. Was a mem. of the Ex-Council, N.B., from 1838 to 1840, when he resigned; and a mem. of L. C. same Province from 1833 until the Union. An unsuccessful candidate for Westmoreland in N. B. Assem. 1830. Was Senior Judge of Common Pleas for Westmoreland for several years; a Commr. with E. B. Chandler, 1836, to settle the boundary line between N. S. and N. B.; a delegate 1839 to Washington respecting border difficulty; delegate to Quebec during Govt. of Lord Durham, to discuss matters connected with the general interests of B. N. A.; Commr. with Col. Robinson and Joseph Bouchette, Esq., to settle disputed boundary between Can. and N. B.; and a delegate a second time to Washington respecting a Reciprocity Treaty with the U.S., 1852. Moved and carried, 1855, an addition to Standing Orders of L. C. of N. B., to allow the public to be present at the deliberations of that body, which, up to that period, had been carried on with closed doors; moved resolutions in the same house, March, 1866, approving of the Union B. N. A. Colonies. Was requested to form an Administration for N. B., 1866, but declined. Was Speaker of the Senate from 3 June to 5 June, 1872, and again from 16 Feb. to 19 April, 1880. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Conservative.—Sackville, N.B.

DE BOUCHERVILLE, Hon. CHARLES EUGENE BOUCHER, M.D., (Montarville.)

Descended from Lieut. Gen. Pierre Boucher, Sieur de Grobois, Governor of Three Rivers, in 1653, and founder of the Seigniory of Boucherville. S. of the late Hon. P. Boucher de Boucherville, a member of the L. C. Can., by Amelie, sister of the Hon. C. C. S. de Bleury. B. at Boucherville, P.Q., 4 May, 1822. Ed. at St. Sulpice Coll., Montreal Conducted his medical studies at Paris, where he graduated. M., 1st, Susane, dau. of R. L. Morrogh, Esq., advocate, of Montreal; 2nd, Miss C. Lussier, of Varennes. Was a member of the Ex-Council and Speaker of the L. C., P.Q., from July, 1867, to Feb., 1873. Entrusted with the formation of a new Cabinet on the resignation of Mr. Ouimet, a duty which he successfully accomplished 22 Sept., 1874, when he and his Ministers were sworn into office, he (Mr. De B.) taking the portfolio of Secy. and Registrar and Minister of Public Instruction; transferred to Department of Agriculture and Public Works, 27 Jan., 1876. Dismissed by Lieut. Gov. Letellier de St. Just in March, 1878. Sat. for Chambly in Can. Assem. from g. e., 1861, until the Union. Called to L. C., P.Q., July, 1867. Called to Senate, 12 Feb., 1879. A Conservative.—Boucherville, P.Q.

BOYD, Hon. JOHN.

B. at Maugherafelt, Co. Derry, Ireland, 28 Sept., 1826. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. John, N.B. In 1838 entered the wholesale warehouse of Messrs. Holdsworth & Daniel, and in 1853 became a partner in the firm, under the style of Messrs. Daniel & Boyd. M. 1852, Annie E., dau. of Cereno P. Jones, of Weymouth, N.S. Is a dir. of the Sun Life Insur. Co. Has been associated with almost every progressive movement in St. John, whether municipal, political, or social, for many years past, and has always been a warm advocate of the establishment and extension of railway communications. Took a prominent part in the agitation in favour of Confederation from the time of its inception, when it was very unpopular, until its triumph, and on public platforms in various parts of N. B., energetically advocated and defended the principle of Union. Has long been identified with Provl. educational movements. Called to the Senate 11 Feb., 1879. A Liberal Conservative.—St. John, N.B.

CARVELL, Hon. JEDEDIAH SLASON.

B. at Newcastle, Miramichi, N.B., 16 March, 1832. M. at St. John, June, 1861, Alice Caroline, 2nd dau. of Thomas Hanford, Esq. Was Mayor of Charlottetown, 1877-78. Is a merchant, and is Spanish Vice-Consul for P.E.I. Called to the Senate, 12 Dec., 1879. A Conservative.—Charlottetown, P.E.I.; Rideau Club; Halifax Club.

CASGRAIN, Hon. CHARLES EUGENE, C.M., M.D.

Paternal ancesters belonged to an ancient family at Ervault, in Poitou, France. The first to come to Can. was Jean Baptiste Casgrain, an officer in the French Army, who landed about 1750. His son Pierre was Lord of the Seignories of Riviere Ouelle and L'Islet. Maternally descended from Jacques Babie, an officer of the Regiment of Larignan-Saliers, who landed in Quebec in 1665, and whose descendants of that name have occupied high and responsible positions in the country. S. of the late Hon. Charles Euseble Casgrain, Lieut. Col. unattached, who sat for Cornwallis in the L. C. Assem. from 1830 to 1834; was a mem. of the Special Council of L. C. from 1838 to

1840, and at his death held the office of Asst. Commr. of Public Works, Can., by Anne Elizabeth, dau. of the late Hon. James Baby, at one time Speaker of the L. C. of U. C. B. at Quebec, 3 Augt., 1825. Ed. in Classics at the Coll. of Ste. Anne's, Quebec, and in medicine at McGill Univ., Montreal. M. in 1851, Charlotte Mary, dau. of Thos. Chase, of Detroit, Mich., formerly of Quebec. Began to practise in Detroit in 1851, but removed to Sandwich in 1856. Is Coroner and Jail Surgeon for Essex. Was Capt. of the Sandwich Co. V. M., and subsequently surgeon to the troops stationed at Windsor and Sarnia during the Fenian raids in 1861 to 1864. Was for two years a mem. of the Municipal Council of Windsor and has been a mem. of the Board of Education for 18 years. Was elected first Presdt. of the St. Jean Baptiste Soc. of Essex in 1864; General Presdt. of all the French Soc. of Essex in 1883, and as such presided at the French-Canadian Convention held at Windsor in 1883. Created a Knight of the Order of the Holy Sepulchre in 1884. Is a brother of the Abbé H. R. Casgrain and of P. B. Casgrain, M.P. for L'Islet, and father of J. E. Casgrain, M.P.P., Quebec. Called to the Senate, Jan., 1887. A Liberal Conservative. - Windsor, Ont.

Chaffers, Lieut. Col., Hon. William Henry. (Rougemont.)

S. of the late Lieut. Col. William U. Chaffers, by Catherine H. Blanchette; and grands. of W. Chaffers, Esq., M.D., of Liverpool, Eng. B. in Quebec, 2 Augt., 1827. Ed. at Chambly and Montreal. M., 1840, Louise, dau. of the late James O'Leary, Esq., M.D., formerly a surgeon in H.M. service (she d. 1870). A merchant. B. at Ballyshannon, Irel., 2 May, 1825. Came to this country early in life, and was ed. at St. John. M., Nov., 1853, Miss Margaret Morris. Is a retired merchant. Called to the Senate, 14 March, 1868. A Liberal.—5 Chipman's Hill, St. John, N.B.

DICKEY, Hon. ROBERT BARRY, Q.C.

S. of the late R. M. Dickey, Esq. B. at Amherst, N. S., 10 Nov., 1812. Ed. at Windsor Academy. M., Oct. 1844, Mary Blair, third dau. of the late Hon. Alex. Stewart, C.B. Called to the Bar N. S., Jan., 1834. and to that of N. B., 1835. Apptd. a Q.C. 1863. Has retired from active practice. Has been a dir. of the N. S. Electric Telegraph Co., and Consular Agent for the United States at Amherst. Was a delegate from N. S. Govt. to Eng. on the subject of Intercolonial Railway, 1858 and 1865; and to the Charlottetown and Quebec Union Conference, 1864. Was a mem. of the L. C. of N. S. from Jan., 1858, until the Union. Missionary Soc.; Supt. of the Wesleyan Central Sunday School, St. James Street, Montreal; and a dir. of the International Bridge Co.; Vice-Presdt. of the Guarantee Co. of North America and of the Accident Insu. Co. of North America. Was a life mem. of the L. C., Can., from 27 May, 1847, until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. Apptd. mem. for Victoria in the L. FLINT, Hon. BILLA.

Apptd. a J. P. 1836. Was first Presdt. of the Board of Police, Belleville; Reeve of Belleville; Mayor of that town, 1861; and Reove of Elzevir for 21 years up to 1879; and Warden of Hastings, 1863. Sat for Hastings in Can. Assem. from 1847 to 1851, when defeated, and for South Hastings from 1854 to 1857. An unsuccessful candidate for Trent Division, L. C., Can., 1861. Represented that division from 1863 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Liberal.—Belleville, Ont.

GIRARD, Hon. MARC AMABLE.

S. of the late Amable Girard, of Varennes, P.Q., by Josephite Daunais. B. at Varennes, 25 April, 1822. Ed. at St. Hyacinthe Coll. M. 1878, Aurélie Lamothe, widow of Alfred Versailles, Montreal. A Notary. Called to the Bar of Manitoba, 1871. Was a mem. of the Ex-Council,

and Treasurer of Manitoba from Sept., 1870, until March, 1872, when he resigned; and Premier of the Province, with the office of Prov. Secy., from 8 July to 2 Dec., 1874, when he and his Government retired. On the reconstruction of the Norquay Government in Dec., 1870, took the office of Prov. Secy., and subsequently became Minister of Agriculture and Presdt. of the Council. He retired Jan., 1883. Apptd. senior mem. of the Ex-Council for North-West Territories, Dec., 1872. GOWAN, Hon. ROBERT JAMES.

Only s. of the late H. H. Gowan, Esq., who, emigrating from Irel., settled in the Tp. of Albion, and became Clerk of the Crown and Pleas, Co. Simcoe. B. in Co. Wexford, Irel., 22 Dec., 1817. Ed. in Can. M., 1853, Anna, dau. of Rev. S. B. Ardagh, M.A., Rector of Barrie. Called to the Bar U. C., 1839, and apptd. Judge of the Dist. of Simcoe, 17 Jan., 1843, a position he held until his retirement in Oct., 1883. Much of the legal reform and regulation of the procedure of the several courts of law in Ontario is due to him. Assisted in the consolidation of the Statutes of Can. in 1858; in 1869 in the consolation of the Criminal Law, and in 1876 in the consolidation of the Statute Law of Ontario. Was a mem. of the Board of Arbitrators apptd. to settle the differences between the Govt. and the contractors for the Public Buildings at Ottawa; apptd. chairman of the Board of Judges for Ont. 1869; a mem. of the Commission to inquire into the constitution and jurisdiction of the several Courts of Law and Equity in Ont., 1871, and on 14 Augt., 1873, apptd. a mem. of the Royal Commission to investigate

the charges against the Ministry in connection with the Canadian Pacific Railway contract. Has been for many years the Chairman of the Barrie Collegiate Institute. Called to the Senate 29 Jan., 1885. A Liberal Conservative.—"Ardranen," Barrie, Ont.

GRANT, Hon. ROBERT PATTERSON, J.P.

S. of the late Lewis Grant, Bookseller and Publisher, Inverness, Scot. B, there 12 April, 1814. Ed. at the Inverness Royal Academy. Came to Can. 1833. Went to N. S. 1835. M., 1840, Annie, dau. of the late James Carmichael, of New Glasgow. Has been Presdt of the Pictou Bank. Contested four elections in the Liberal interest, in only one of which was successful; on that occasion he was elected to the N. S. Assem. from the N. R. of Pictou, which seat he held from 1859 to 1863. Has always been a Liberal, but differed from his political friends on one question—the question of Confederation, which he favoured. Represented Sorel in L. C., Can., from 1858 until the Union. An unsuccessful candidate for Richelieu in Quebec Assem. at g. e. 1867. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. Hamilton, Hon. John. (Inkermann.)

A member of the family of Hamilton of Hamwood, Co. Meath, Irel. The family claims descent from Hugh Hamilton, a son of Sir James Hamilton, of Evandale, in the Kingdom of Scot., who settled in Irel. 1616. (See Burke's Landed Gentry.) Third s. of the late Col. George Hamilton, of Hawkesbury, Can., who died in 1837, by Lucie Craigie. B. near Quebec, 16 Dec., 1827. Ed. in Montreal. M., 1st, Rebecca L., dau. of the Rev. John Lewis, B.A., of Cork, Irel.; 2nd, Ellen Marion, dau. of Wm. Wood, Esq., of Seale Lodge, Surrey, Eng. (she d. Jan., 1872); 3rd, June, 1873, Jeannie, relict of the late John Major, Esq., and dau. of the late Charles Cambie, Esq., formerly of Castletown, Tipperary, Irel. A mem. of

the extensive and long established lumber firm of Hamilton Bros.; proprietor of the Hawkesbury Mill, Ont.; a dir. of the Bank of Montreal, and of the Williams Manufacturing Co. Has been Presdt. of the Merchant's Bank of Canada. Was Reeve of Hawkesbury for four years and Warden of the United Counties of Prescott and Russell for three years. Sat for Inkerman in L. C., Can., from 1860 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Conservative.—Evandale House, Hawkesbury, Ont.; Tyrella House, Sherbrooke Street, Montreal; St. James Club; Rideau Club.

HAYTHORNE, Hon. ROBERT POORE,

Descended from a family of merchants and bankers belonging to Bristol, Eng. S. of the late Ald. Haythorne, who was four times Mayor of Bristol, who was largely engaged in the Spanish wool trade, and subsequently owned landed property in Gloucestershire, by Miss Curtis, of Mardyke, Bristol. B. at Clifton, Bristol, 2 Dec,, 1815. Ed. there. Emigrated to P. E. I. about 1842. M., 1861, in P. E. I., Elizabeth Radcliffe, eld. dau. of Thomas Scott, Esq., Belfast, Irel. Is a Magistrate. Was a mem. of the late Hon. G. Cole's Administration in 1867; after his retirement continued to sit in the Administration of Hon. Joseph Hensley, and, on that gentleman's elevation to the Bench, succeeded him as Presdt. of the Council and leader of the Govt., in which he continued until 1870, when he resigned. On 2 April, 1872, four days before the meeting of Parlt., was entrusted with the formation of a new Govt., a duty in which he was successful; and in Feb., 1873, he, with his colleague, Hon. D. Laird, formed a delegation to Ottawa on the subject of the union of P.E.I. with Can., on the result of which mission his Govt. went to the country, but not being sustained he accordingly resigned, 18 April, 1873. Sat in the elective L. C. of P. E. I. from 1867 to 1874. Called to the Senate on the admission of P.E.I. as a Province of the Dominion, 18 Oct., 1873. A Liberal.—Marshfield, Charlottetown, P.E.I.

HOWLAN, Hon. GEORGE WILLIAM.

B. in Waterford, Irel., 19 May, 1835. Emigrated with his parents to P.E.I., 1839. Ed. at the Central Academy there. M., 1 Oct., 1866, Miss Olson, of St. John, N.B. (she d. in April, 1876); 2nd, 1881, Miss Doran, of Kingston, Ont. A merchant and shipowner, and largely engaged in the fish trade. Is Vice-Presdt. of the Dominion Board

of Trade, and a Governor of Prince of Wales Coll. Consular agent for the U.S., and Vice-Consul for Sweden, Denmark and Norway. Entered Ex-Council of P.E.I. 1866, and remained a mem. of the Govt., a part of the time being co-leader, almost uninterruptedly up to 30 June, 1873. Was a delegate to Washington on trade matters, 1869, and to Ottawa, with Hon. Messrs. Pope and Haviland, May, 1873, to settle terms of Union with Can., which terms were unanimously adopted by both Houses of the Legislature. Sat for Prince (1st Dist.) in Provl. Assem., from 1862 until June, 1873, when apptd. Collector of Customs at Charlottetown, which office he resigned in Sept. following, in order to contest Prince for the Commons, for the purpose of strengthening the Conservative party, but he was defeated by a small majority. Was in Provl. Assem. a strenuous advocate of the building of P.E.I. Railway. Called to the Senate on P.E.I. entering the Dominion, 18 Oct., 1873. Resigning in 1880, he was reapptd. 5 Jan, 1881. A Liberal Conservative.—Alberton,

Kaulbach, Lieut.-Col. Hon. Henry Adolphus Newman, LL.B., Q.C.

Of German descent. Great grands. of Martin Von Kaulbach, Esq., an original grantee and settler of Lunenberg, N.S., in 1752. Grands. of Henry Kaulbach, Esq., who was apptd. High Sheriff of the same Co. by Gov. Wentworth, in 1798, and held that office, with others of distinction, until 1828, when he resigned the office of High Sheriff in favour of his son, Lieut.-Col. John Henry Kaulbach, who held it to his death in 1879. Eldest son of last named High Sheriff, by Sophia Fredericka, dau. of Adolphus Newman, Esq. B. at Lunenburg, N.S., 28 Dec., 1830. Ed. there at Grammar School, and in classics under tutorship of Rev. J. C. Cochrane, D.C.L, and in Harvard Univ., Cambridge, U.S., where he graduated LL.B. M., 1st, Eunice Sophie, only child of the late John Harris, Esq., of Thornhill, Kings, N.S. (she d. 1879); 2nd, Sept., 1880, Sophia Anne, dau. of H. G. Ryland, Registrar, of Montreal. Called to the NS. Bar, 1855. Apptd. Q.C., 1873. Is an extensive land proprietor and shipowner. Apptd. Lieut.-Col. 1st Regiment Lunenburg Co. Militia and Volunteer Artillery in 1859. Sat for Lunenburg Co. in House of Assem., N.S., from g. e. 1863, until the Union. During that time he was a mem. of the N.S. Central Board of Agriculture, and an ardent advocate of the Federal Union of all the Provinces of British North America, and of free schools by direct taxation. The Acts of Union and Free Schools being accomplished, he again contested his Co. at g. e. 1867, was defeated by the opposition to free schools and the Union. Called to the Senate 27 March, 1872. Q.C. 16 Oct., 1880. Was Batonnier of the Bar, Montreal, from 1 May, 1879, to 1 May, 1881. Is Prof. of Law in Laval Univ. Was a mem. of the L. C., P.Q., from 4 March, 1882, until called to the Senate, 12 Jan., 1884. A Conservative.—71 Hubert Street, Montreal.

LEONARD, Hon. ELIJAH.

B. 10 Sept., 1814, near Syracuse, State of New York, moved to Can. in 1830, and became largely interested in manufacturing. Has been Mayor of London, Ont., and a dir. of the London and Port Stanley Railway. An unsuccessful candidate for London in Can. Assem. at g. e. 1854. Represented Malahide division in L. C. Can. from 1862 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Liberal.—Talbot Street, London, Ont.

LEWIN, Hon. JAMES DAVIES.

Descended from the Lewins of Womaston, Radnorshire, Wales, a family of private country gentlemen. B. at Womaston, Radnorshire, I April, 1812. Ed. at Kingston (Wales) Grammar School. M., 1832, Sarah Ann, dau. of the late Sheriff Clarke, N. B., a U. E. Loyalist (she d. 1882.) In early life entered the service of the British Govt., and in that service came to N. B. in 1830, and continued thus for twenty years, when upon the abolition of the Dept with which he was connected, was elected in 1855 Presdt of the Bank of N. B., maintaining that position ever since. Called to the Senate, 1876. A Liberal.—St. John, N.B.

McCallum, Hon. Lachlan.

B. in the Island of Tiree, Argyleshire, Scot., 15 March, 1823. Came to Can. in 1842. M., Oct., 1854, Priscella Dawson Thewlis. Is a contractor, shipbuilder and shipowner. Was Reeve of the united Townships of Moulton and Sherbrooke for several years. Was Captain of the Dunnville Naval Company, which he commanded at Fort Erie during the Fenian Raid, June, 1866. An unsuccessful candidate for Haldimand in Can. Assem. at g. e. 1863. Sat in the Commons from g. e. 1867, until g. e. 1872, when defeated. Sat in Leg. Assem., Ont., from g. e. 1871, until 1872, when he resigned in consequence of the passing of the Act abolishing Dual representation. Re-elected tothe Commons at g. e. 1874; unseated on petition, 12 May, 1875. Re-elected 22 June, 1875, and sat until the dissolution of that Parlt. in 1887. Called to the Senate 5 Feb., 1887. A Liberal Conservative.—Stromness, Ont.

McClelan, Hon. Abner Reid.

Descended from an Irish family which came from Londonderry to N. B. in the latter part of the last century. Youngest s. of the late Peter McClelan, Esq., J.P. B. at Hopewell, N.B., 4 Jan., 1831. Ed. there and at Mount Allison Academy. M. Annie J., dau. of W. J. Reid, Esq., Collector of Customs, Port Harvey. Is a retired merchant. Was one of the Governors of Mount Allison Wesleyan Coll., Såckville, N.B., and Vice-Presdt. ef the Alumni Soc. of the Academy and Coll. of that name. Has been for a number of years Commr. of the Civil Court and Auditor of the Municipality of Albert. Was a mem. of the Government of N. B. as Chief Commr. of Public Works, from April, 1866, until the Union. Sat for Albert in N. B. Assem., from 1854 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Liberal.—Riverside, Hopewell, N.B.

McDonald, Hon. William, J.P.

Descended from a Scottish family. Grandfather emigrated from the Island of Uist, Scot... and settled in the Co. Inverness, N.S. B. at River Dennis Road, Inverness, N.S., Oct., 1837. Ed. there and at St. Francois Xavier Coll., Antigonish. M., Feb., 1865, Kate, dau. of Mr. Donald McDonald, of East Bay, C.B. A merchant. Has been postmaster of Little Glace Bay, which position he resigned previous to g. e. 1872. Sat for Cape Breton in

the Commons from g. e. 1872, until called to the Senate, May, 1884. A Liberal Conservative, and in favour of protecting the native industries of the country from unequal foreign competition.—Little Glace Bay N.S.

McInnes, Hon. Thomas Robert, M.D., C.M.

Fourth s. of the late John McInnes, Esq., formerly of Inverness, Scot., and latterly of Lake Ainslie, N.S., by Mary, third dau. of Capt. Edward Hamilton, of Paisley, Scot. B. at Lake Ainslie, N.S., 5 Nov., 1840. Ed. at Normal School, Truro, N.S., and Harvard Univ., Boston, U.S. M., 5 Oct., 1865, Mrs. Webster, relict of the late Geo. M. Webster, Esq., of Dresden, Ont. Elected by acclamation Reeve of Dresden, Ont., Jan., 1874. Was Mayor of the City of New Westminster, B.C., from Jan., 1876, to Jan., 1878. Physician and Surgeon to the Royal Columbia Hospital since May, 1874. Apptd. Medical Superintendent of British Columbia Lunatic Asylum, July, 1878. Sat for New Westminster in the Commons from 26 March, 1878, until apptd to the Senate, 24 Dec., 1881. Thoroughly independent in politics. Favours compulsory voting and equitable reciprocity with the U.S.-Mary Street, New Westminster, B.C.

McKay, Hon. Thomas.

Eldest s. of the late William McKay who came from Sutherlandshire, Scot., and settled in the Co. of Pictou, N.S. B. in Co. Pictou, N.S., 8 Jan., 1839. Ed. there. M., Nov., 1868, Miss Jessie Blair, of Truro. A merchant. First returned to Parlt. for Colchester, at g. e. 1874. Unseated on petition 14 Nov., 1874; re-elected and sat from 17 Dec., 1874, until May, 1881. Apptd. to the Senate, 24 Dec., 1881. A Liberal Conservative.—Truro, N.S.

McKindsey, Hon. George Crawford.

(she d. 1868); 2nd, 1871, Susan Molton, relict of the late James Fraser, Esq., of Newburgh, N.Y. Was for many years head of the firm of W. McMaster & Nephews, wholesale dry goods merchants, Toronto. Is a mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of Toronto; Presdt. of the Freehold Permanent Building and Saving Soc.; Vice-Presdt. of the Confederate Life Asso; a dir. of the Toronto General Trust Co.; and of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway, and of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, of which he was the founder and for many years the Presdt. Held for several years the office of Chairman of the Can. Board of the Great Western Railway Co. Is chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Coll., which was erected and furnished by him at an expense of over \$100,000. Represented Midland Division in L. McMillan, Hon. Donald, M.D.

M., in St. Thomas, 17 Nov., 1857, Amy Ann, daughter of Amasa Lewis, Esq., J.P., Aylmer, Ont. Is a J.P. and an Asso. Coroner for Glengarry. Was for some years a mem. of the County Council, and has been a Vice-Presdt. of the Medical Asso. of Ont. Is an hon. mem. of the Celtic Soc. Called to the Senate, 12 Jan., 1884. A Conservative.—Alexandria, Ont.

MACDONALD, Hon. WILLIAM JOHN.

Descended from Somerled, Thane of Argyll and Lord of the Isles. Third s. of the late Major Alexander Macdonald of Valley, North Uist, and Glendale, Isle of Skye. B. in Co. of Inverness, Scot., 29 Nov., 1832. Ed. there. Came to B. C. in 1851. M., 17 March, 1857, Catherine, second dau. of Capt. J. M. Reed, of Hon. H. B. Co's. service. Has acted as Capt. of Militia and a Collector of Customs. Elected Mayor of the city of Victoria, 1866, and again in 1871. Served as a mem. of first Board of

Education; Road Commr., etc. Sat for Sooke in V. I. Assem. from 1859 for several years, and was also a mem. of the L. C. of B. C. Apptd. to the Senate on B. C. entering the Dominion, 13 Dec. 1871. A Liberal Conservative.—Armadale, Victoria; Union Club, Victoria, B.C.

MACFARLANE, Hon. ALEXANDER, Q.C.

Of Scottish descent. S. of the late Hon. Donald Macfarlane. B. at Wallace, N. S., 17 June, 1818. M. Anne, dau. of Amos Seaman, Esq., of Minudie, N.S. Called to the Bar of N.S. Dec. 1844. Apptd. Q.C. June 1867. Is a Surrogate of Vice-Admiralty; and Presdt. of the Spring Hill Mining Co. Sat for Comberland in N.S. Assem. from 1856 until the Union. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council of N. S. from 1865 to time of Union, and holds rank and precedence as such by patent from the Queen. Was one of the delegates from N. S. to the Colonial Conference in London, to complete terms of Union, 1866–67. Called to the Senate, 10 Oct. 1870. A Conservative.—Wallace, N.S.; Halifax Club.

MACINNES, Hon. DONALD.

B. at Oban, Argyleshire, Scot, 26 May, 1824. Came to Can. in 1840. M., 30 April, 1863, Mary Amelia, fourth dau. of the late Hon. Sir J. B. Robinson, Bart. Commenced business in Dundas and subsequently removed to Hamilton. Has long been one of the leading merchants and manufacturers of Canada. Is Presdt. of the Bank of Hamilton, of the Canada Cotton Co. of Cornwall, and of the South Saskatchewan Valley Railway Co., and a dir. of the Canada Life Insu. Co. Was chairman of the Royal Commission apptd. 16 June, 1880, to inquire into the organization of the Civil Service of Canada. Called to the Senate, 24 Dec., 1881. A Liberal Conservative.—"Dundurn," Hamilton; Rideau Club; Toronto Club; St. James Club; Manitoba Club.

MACPHERSON, Hon. Sir David Lewis, K.C.M.G., P.C.

B. in Scot. 12 Sept., 1818. Ed. at the Inverness Royal Academy. Came to Can. 1835. M. June, 1844, Elizabeth Sarah, eldest dau. of William Molson, Esq., of Montreal, and grand-dau. of Hon. John Molson, in his lifetime a mem. of the Ex-Council of L.C., and Presdt. of the Bank of Montreal. Is a mem. of the firm of Gzowski & Co., contractors, who have constructed several branches

of Can. Railways and other important works; a mem. of the Corporation of Hellmuth College, London, Ont.: a dir. of Molson's Bank; of the Western Canada Permanent Loan and Savings Co, and of the Guarantee Co. of North America. Was Presdt. of the Inter-oceanic Railway Co., incorporated for the purpose of constructing a railway across the continent to British Columbia, 1872. Arbitrator for the Province of Ontario under the B. N. A. Act, "for the division and adjustment of the debts, credits, liabilities and properties of U. C. and L. C," 1868. Has been Vice-Presdt. of the Montreal Board of Trade. and Presdt. of the St. Andrew's Soc. of Toronto. Author of a pamphlet on Banking and Currency (Toronto, 1869), and also of several pamphlets, between 1877 and 1882, dealing with the public expenditure, etc. Created a K.C.M.G. 29 July, 1884. Represented Saugeen Division in L. C. Can., from Oct.. 1864, until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. Apptd. Speaker of the Senate and a mem. of the Cabinet, without portfolio, 11 Feb., 1880, and continued as such until 17 Oct., 1883, when he resigned the Speakership and was apptd. Minister of the Interior. MERNER, Hon. SAMUEL.

S. of Jacob Merner, farmer, in Reichenbock, Canton of Berne, Switzerland. B. there, 29 Jan. 1823. Ed. there. Came to Canada with his parents in 1837. M. in Preston, Ont., Nov. 1845, Mary Ann, dau. of Joseph Grasser, of Wilmot, Ont. Was in business for some years as an iron founder and furniture manufacturer. Has for many years been instrumental in settling in the Province all the Swiss people immigrating to Can. Was Warden of the Co. of Waterloo in 1873, and has been Reeve of New Hamburg for several years. Was an unsuccessful candidate for South Waterloo in the Leg. Assem., Ont., at the bye-election in 1877. Sat in the Commons for same seat from g. e. 1878 to g. e. 1882, when he was defeated. Called to the Senate Jan. 1887. A Conservative.—New Hamburg.

MILLER, Hon. WILLIAM, Q.C.

Descended on paternal side from a family that emigrated from Belfast, Irel., in 1720, and settled in Maine, U.S., a branch of which removed to Colchester, N.S., in 1760, great grandfather being one of the original grantees

of the Township of Truro. S. of Charles Miller of Antigonish, N.S., by Eliza, dau. of Richard Smith, Esq., who with his family came to N.S. from Co. Wicklow, Irel., and settled at Antigonish in 1811. B. at Antigonish, N.S., 12 Feb. 1835. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. Andrews, and the Antigonish Academy. M. Oct. 1871, Annie, dau. of the late Hon. James Cochrane, of Halifax, N.S. Called to the Bar, N.S., May 1860. Apptd. Q.C., 1872. Sat in N.S. Assem. from g.e. 1863 until the Union, and while in that House rendered important assistance to the Union cause. Being in favor of Confederation but opposed to the financial conditions and other details of the Quebec scheme of Union, it was on his suggestion and with his assistance, that the compromise was effected whereby the delegation to England was appointed in 1866, in order to secure, under the auspices of the Imperial authorities, such modifications of that scheme as would make it more acceptable to the people of N.S. Was nominated a delegate to the London Colonial Conference of 1866-67, but declined the appointment. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, 1867. Was Chairman of Private Bill Committee of the Senate during several sessions; also Chairman of the Contingent Committee (Internal Economy) of that House for some years. Has twice refused a seat on the Bench-once when offered by Premier Mackenzie, and afterwards when offered by the Govt. of Sir J. A. Macdonald. Was Speaker of the Senate from 17 Oct. 1883 until the dissolution of Parliament in 1887. Liberal Conservative—Halifax; Arichat, N.S.

Montgomery, Hon. Donald.

· Sixth s. of the late Daniel Montgomery, Esq., who emigrated from Argyllshire, Scotland, to P.E.I., upwards of a century ago, and for more than thirty-five years represented Prince County in the Provl. Assem., by Miss Penman, of New Eng. B. in Princetown, P.E.I., 19 Jan., 1808. Ed. there. M., 1st, 1835, Miss Ann Murray (she d. April, 1858); 2nd, May, 1861, Louisa, relict of the late Lawrence W. Gall, Esq. Sat for Princetown in Provl. Assem. of which he was Speaker for four years, from 1838 until 1862, when the L.C. being made elective, he was returned to that body and became Speaker, an office he continued to hold until March 1874. Called to the Senate on P.E.I. entering the Union, 18 Oct., 1873. A moderate Conservative.—Park Corner, P.E.I.

O'Donohoe, Hon. John, Q.C.

Descended from the ancient family of his name, having their chief seat at Glenflesk, Kerry, Irel. B. at Tuam, in Galway, 18 April, 1824, and ed. at St. Jarlath's Coll. there. Arrived in Toronto in 1839, and has continued to reside there ever since. M., 1848, Charlotte Josephine, dau. of Dr. Bradley, of Toronto (she d. 1854) Was engaged in commercial pursuits for some years. Called to the Bar, Ont., Hilary term, 1869. Apptd. Q.C. 4 Oct. 1880. Is a Captain in the Militia. Sat as an Alderman in the City Council of Toronto, 1857, and again in 1859, and on those occasions was Chairman of the Finance Committee, and represented the corporation at the Board of Governors of Toronto General Hospital. Was Secy. of the St. Patrick's Benevolent Soc. during the Presidency of the late Hon. Robert Baldwin, and held the office of Presdt. for many vears after Mr. Baldwin's retirement. Was County Crown Attorney of the County of York and City of Toronto, from 1872 to Jan. 1874, when he resigned in order to become a candidate for Parlt. Elected Presdt. of the 'Ontario Catholic League," 3 April, 1871. Was an unsuccessful candidate for East Peterboro, in Ont. Assem. at g.e. 1871, and for Toronto East in the Commons at g.e. 1872. First returned to Parlt. for East Toronto at g.e. 1874. Being unseated on petition, 26 Nov. 1874, he was again unsuccessful for the same seat. Called to the Senate 10 June, 1882. A Liberal.—Jarvis St., Toronto.

ODELL, Hon. WILLIAM HUNTER,

S. of the late Hon. William Franklin Odell, who held the office of Provl. Secy. of N.B. for 32 years, and was employed under the British Commrs. in 1817-18 in charge of the survey and location of the boundary between N.B. and the U.S. under the Treaty of Ghent. Grands. of Hon. Jonathan Odell, who, at the breaking out of the American Rebellion, was residing in New Jersey. His property being confiscated, he joined the British Army, was afterwards employed by General Sir Guy Carleton (Lord Dorchester) in many important and confidential trusts and became a mem. of the Ex. Co. and Provl. Secy. N.B., in 1784. B. in N.B., 26 Nov. 1811. Ed. at King's Coll., Fredericton, where he graduated B.A. 1832. M., the eld. dau. of the late Hon. Mr. Justice Bliss, of Halifax. Called to the Bar. N.B., 1838. Apptd. Clerk of the Supreme Court, N.B., which office he subsequently resigned on being apptd. Deputy Provl. Secy., Registrar and Clerk of

the Ex. Council, N.B., 1838, and subsequently, in 1844, filled the latter position on its being constituted a separate and distinct office. A Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, 1847, and a member of the L.C. of N.B., by Royal Warrant, 1850, where he sat until the Union. Was a member of the Ex. Council, and Postmaster General, N.B., from 1865 until the resignation of the Govt. the following year. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Conservative.—Rookwood, Fredericton, N.B.

OGILVIE, Lieut.-Col. Hon. ALEXANDER WALKER, J.P. (Alma.)

Descended from a younger brother of Gilchrist, Earl of Angus, a valiant soldier, who, in the 13th Century, was rewarded with the lands of Ogilvie in Banffshire, Scot., and assumed the name of the estate. The family is celebrated in history for having long preserved the Crown and Sceptre of Scot., from the hands of Cromwell. Parents came to Can. in 1800, where his father served during the war of 1812 and during the rebellion of 1837 as volunteer cavalry officer. B. at St. Michel, near Montreal, 7 May, 1829. Ed. in Montreal. M. Sarah, dau. of William Leney, Esq. In 1854, founded the firm of A. W. Ogilvie & Co., largely engaged in the grain trade and proprietors of the Glenora Mills, Montreal. Retired from the firm in 1874. Is a Lieut.-Col. of Montreal Cavalry (retired list); Presdt. of the St. Michel Road Co.; Chairman of the Montreal Turnpike Trust, and of the Montreal Board of Directors of the London (Eng.) Guarantee Co.; a dir. of the Sun Life Insu. Co.; the Edwardsburg Starch Co.; Montreal Loan and Mortgage Co., and the Montreal Investment Co. He has been an Alderman for the City of Montreal: Presdt. of the Workingmen's Widows' and Orphans' Benefit Soc., and of the St. Andrew's Soc. Sat for Montreal West in Leg. Assem., P.Q., from g.e. 1867, when returned by acclamation, until g.e. 1871, when he declined re-nomination. Re-elected at g.e. 1875, and sat until g.e. 1878, when he again declined re-nomination. Called to the Senate 24 Dec., 1881. A Conservative pure and simple.—Edgehill Avenue, 1160 Dorchester Street, Montreal.

PAQUET, Hon. Anselme Homere, M.D. (De la Vallière.)

S. of the late Timothée Pâquet, Esq., by Marie F. Robillard, both of the parish of St. Cuthbert, P.Q. B. at St. Cuthbert, 27 Sept., 1830. Ed. at the Coll. of L'Assomption. M., at L'Assomption, Sept., 1854, Delle Marie A. H. Gariepy. Is a Licentiate of Coll. of Physicians and Sur-

geons, L.C., Professor of Medical Clinic at the Hôtel Dieu Hospital and of Hygiene and Public Health at the Montreal School of Medicine and Surgery, and of the Medical Faculty of Victoria Univ.; Presdt. of the Permanent Building Soc. of the Co. of Berthier; and a dir. of the Ville Marie Bank at Montreal. An unsuccessful candidate for De La Naudière, L.C., 1863. Sat for Berthier in Can. Assem. from 1863 until the Union, and for same seat in the Commons from that event until 9 Feb., 1875, when called to the Senate. A Liberal.—St. Cuthbert, P.Q.

Pelletier, Hon. Charles Alphonse Pantaléon, C.M.G., B.C.L., Q.C., P.C. (Grandville.)

S. of J. M. Pelletier, a merchant and farmer, by Julie Painchaud, sister of the late Rev. C. F. Painchaud, founder of the Coll. of St. Anne, P.Q. B. at River Ouelle, P.Q., 22 Jan., 1837. Ed. at St. Anne's Coll. and at Laval Univ., from which he obtained degree of B.C.L., 15 Sept., 1858. M., 1st, 1861, Susanne, dau. of the late Hon. Chas. E. Casgrain, M.C.L. (she d. 1862); 2nd, Virginia A., second dau. of the late Hon. M. P. DeSales La Terrière, M.D., who sat in the Parlt. of L.C., and afterwards in that of United Called to the Bar, L.C., 1860. Apptd. Q.C. by the Govt. of Quebec, 21, Jan., 1879. Has been Syndic of the Quebec Bar, and was elected three times Presdt. of the Soc. de St. Jean Baptiste, Quebec. Is a dir. of the Quebec Fire Assur. Co. and of the Quebec and Charlevoix Nav. Co. Was for several years Major 9th Batt., or Voltigeurs de Québec. Was in command of that batt. during the Fenian raid of 1866; retired, retaining his rank, in Sept. 1866. Was a candidate for Kamouraska at g.e., 1867, when special return was made and the constituency was unrepresented for some months. First returned for that seat Feb. 1869; re-elected at g.e., 1872, and again, by acclamation, at g.e., 1874. Sat for Quebec East in Quebec Assem. from Feb. 1873 to Jan. 1874, when, in consequence of the operation of the Act respecting dual representation, he resigned his seat in that body, in order to remain in the Commons, and in which he continued (representing Kamouraska) up to 1877. Sworn of the Privy Council, in Jan. 1877, as Minister of Agriculture, which office he held until Oct. 1878, when he resigned with his colleagues. Was Presdt of the Canadian Commission for the Paris Universal Exhibition of 1878, for which service he was created a Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George (29 Oct., 1878). Called to the Senate in 1877. A Liberal.—Cor. Ste. Ursule and St. Louis Streets, Quebec: Garrison Club, Quebec.

PLUMB, Hon. JOSIAII BURR.

S. of an Episcopal clergyman, of English descent on both sides. B. in his father's parish, East Haven, Conn., U.S., 25 March, 1816. M., in 1848, the youngest dau. of the late Hon. Samuel Street, of Niagara Falls (she d). Was at one time largely engaged in banking and in the early railroad enterprises in the U.S., and was for many years Manager of the State Bank at Albany, N.Y. First returned to Parlt. for Niagara at g.e., 1874. Unseated on petition, 22 Oct., 1874; re-elected 19 Dec., 1874. Was a candidate at g.e., 1878, when his opponent was declared elected by a majority of two votes. Subsequently that gentleman was disqualified, and, four votes having been struck off his list for bribery, the seat was awarded to him. An unsuccessful candidate for North Wellington in the Commons at g.e., 1882. Successfully led the Senate most of the session of 1886, during the ill health and absence of Sir Alex. Campbell. Called to the Senate, 6 Feb., 1883. Apptd. speaker of the Senate, April 1887. A Conservative.—Niagara, Ont.: Toronto Club: Rideau Club.

Poirier, Hon. Pascal.

Ancestors fled from N. S. at the time of the expulsion of the Acadians by the English in 1775 and settled at Grandique, Shediac, N.B. B. in Shediac, 15 Feb., 1852, and ed. at St. Joseph's Coll. Memramcook, N.B. M., 1879, at Montreal, Mademoiselle Anna Lusignan. Is a Barrister of N.B. Was Postmaster of the House of Commons from 1872 until 9 March, 1885, when called to the Senate. A Liberal Conservative.—*Richibucto, N.B.*

Power, Hon. Lawrence Geoffrey, LL.B.

Eld. and only surviving s. of the late Mr. Patrick Power, who represented the Co. of Halifax in the Commons from 1867 to 1872, and from 1874 to 1878. B. Aug. 1841, at Halifax, N.S. Ed at St. Mary's Coll., Halifax, Carlow Coll. and the Catholic Univ., Irel., and Harvard Law School, Cambridge, Mass., where he took the degree of LL.B. in 1866. M., 23 June, 1880, Susan, dau. of Mr. M. O'Leary, of West Quoddy. Was admitted to the Bar in December, 1866. Was for six years an Alderman of the City of Halifax, and for ten years a member of the Board of School Commrs. of the same place. Was for ten sessions Clerk Assistant and Clerk of Bills of the Assem. of N. S., having been three times elected by the House.

Was actively engaged in the preparation of *The Revised Statutes of N.S.*, Fourth Series, 1874, and Laws and Ordinances relating to the City of Halifax, 1876. Is a mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of Halifax, and an Examiner in the Faculty of Law of that institution. Called to the Senate 2 Feb., 1877. A Reformer.—South Park Street, Halifax, N.S

READ, Hon. ROBERT.

Eldest s. of Robert Read, Esq., an extensive farmer, in the Co. Suffolk, Eng. Born at Fressingfield, in that County, 11 Dec., 1814. Ed, at Laxfield, Suffolk. Came to Can. in 1836. M., 2 July, 1840, Margaret Campion. Was for many years engaged in general business, tanning, distilling, and agricultural pursuits. Has been a dir. of the Grand Junction Railway. Sat for Quinte Division in L.C., Can., from Oct., 1862, until the Union. Represented East Hastings in the Commons from the Union until called to the Senate, 24 Feb., 1871. A Conservative.—Belleville, Ont.

REESOR, Hon. DAVID.

Of German descent. B. in Tp. of Markham, Ont., 1823. Ed. there. M. Emily, eldest dau. of the late Daniel McDougall, Esq., of St. Mary's, Ont., and sister of Hon. W. McDougall, C.B. Founded the Markham *Economist* newspaper, of which he was editor for some years. Has been Warden of York and Peel. Represented Kings Division in L. C., Can., from 1860 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Liberal.—*Yorkville*, Ont.

Robitaille, Hon. Théodore, M.D. (Gulf.)

Descended from one of the oldest French families in Canada; one of his grand-uncles, Messaire Robitaille, was chaplain to the Active Militia Force of L. C. during the war of 1812, in which all the family took an active part on the loyal side; a second grand-uncle, the Rev. Louis Brodeur, after spending seven years as a missionary in N. B., was apptd. curate to the parish of St. Roche des Aulnets, where he died, bequeathing his wealth to the Ste. Anne Coll., of which he was one of the founders; another grand-uncle, Jean Robitaille, Esq., was a mem. of the Can. Leg. from 1809 to 1829. S. of the late Louis Adolphe Robitaille, N.P. born at Varennes, P.Q., 29 Jan., 1834.

Ed. at the Model School of that place, in the United States, at the Seminary of Ste. Therese, the Laval Univ., and at the Univ. of McGill Coll., Montreal, at the latter of which he graduated M.D., May, 1858. M., Nov., 1867, Marie Josephine Charlotte Emma, dau. of P. A. Quesnel, Esq., and grand-dau. of the late Hon. F. A. Quesnel, for many years M.L.C. of Canada. Sworn of the Privy Council, and was Receiver-General of Canada from 30 Jan., 1873, until 5 Nov. same year, when he resigned with his chief, Sir John Macdonald, on the Pacific Railway matter. Sat for Bonaventure in Can. Assem. from g. e. 1861 until the union, and in the Commons from g. e. 1867 until July 1878. Sat. for Bonaventure in Quebec Assem. from g. e. 1871 until until Jan., 1874, when he retired in order to confine himself to the Commons. Was Lieut-Gov. of the Province of Quebec from 26 July, 1879, until Sept., 1884. Called to the Senate 28 Jan., 1885. A Conservative.— New Carlisle, P.Q.; Rideau Club.

Ross, Hon. James Gibb. (Les Laurentides.)

B. in Scot. 18 April, 1819. Came to Can. when a young man, and has since been extensively engaged in the timber trade and shipping. Is Presdt. of the Quebec Bank, and a dir. of the Guarantee Co. of North America, and of many other commercial and industrial enterprises. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Quebec Centre in the Commons at g. e. 1873 and 1878. Called to the Senate 12 Jan., 1884. A Conservative.—Quebec.

Ross, Hon. John Jones, M.D. (De La Durantaye.)

S. of G. McIntosh Ross, Esq., of St. Annes, formerly a West Indian merchant, by Marie Louise Gouin. B. at Ste. Anne de la Pérade. M., 1856, Marie Arline, dau. of Lieut.-Col. Lanouette, of Champlain. A physician and surgeon. Is Vice-Presdt of the Prov. Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons; Honorory Presdt. of the Champlain Agricultural Soc.; and a mem. of the Agricultural Council of Quebec. Elected Vice-Presdt. of the North Shore Railway Co., 1875. Was a mem. of the Ex Council, Quebec, and Speaker of the L.C. from 27 Feb., 1873, to Aug., 1874, when he resigned; re-appointed 27 Jan., 1876, and retained position until March, 1878, when Ministry was dismissed by Lieut.-Governor. Re-apptd. mem. of the Ex. Council, and Speaker of Leg. Council, 31 Oct., 1879. Was Commr. of Agriculture and Public Works from July, 1881, to March, 1882, when he retired from the Cabinet. On

the resignation of the Mousseau Ministry, he formed an Administration, 23 Jan., 1884, becoming Premier and Commr. of Agriculture and Public Works. Resigned with his colleagues Jan., 1887. Sat for Champlain in Can. Assem. from g. e. 1861 until the Uniou, when returned to Commons and Leg. Assem. Resigned his seat in the latter on his appointment to L. C., Quebec, 1867. Continued to represent Champlain in the Commons until g. e. 1874, when he retired. Called to the Senate 12 April. 1887. A Conservative.—Ste. Anne de la Pérade.

Ryan, Lieut. Col. Hon. Thomas. (Victoria.)

B. at Balinakill, Co. Kildare, Irel., 21 Aug., 1804. Ed. at Clongowes Coll. M., 1871, Duding, 2nd dau. of Charles N. F. DeMontenach, Esq., grand-dau. of the late Baroness de Longueuil, and relict of the late Oliver Perrault de Linere, Esq., of Montreal. Is one of the Catholic Commissioners of Education for the Prov. of Quebec, and has been a dir. of the Bank of Montreal. Is now a dir. of the Dominion Type Co., and of the Montreal and Western Land Co. Limited. Was for many years a partner in the Quebec and Montreal firm of Ryan Bros. & Co.; retired from business in 1863, and in same year was elected by acclamation for the Victoria Division in L. C., which division he continued to represent until Confederation. He was one of the Commrs. appointed in 1865 to proceed to the West Indies, Mexico and Brazil to open trade relations between those countries and Can. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Liberal Conservative -304 Peel Street, Montreal; St. James Club.

SANFORD, Hon. WILLIAM ELI.

A lineal descendent of Thomas de Sanford, who was knighted by William the Conqueror on the battlefield of Hastings (see Burke's Landed Gentry). The American branch of the family settled in Redding, Connecticut, and one of its members, Ezekiel Sanford, Engineer, built Fort Saybrook, Conn., 1626. B. in the City of New York in 1838. Removed to Hamilton, Ont., on death of his parents, when in the seventh year of his age. M., 1st, in 1859, Emeline, only dau. of the late Edward Jackson, Esq. (she d. 1860); 2nd, in 1866, Harriet Sophia, dau. of the late Thomas Vaux, of Ottawa. Is head of the extensive wholesale mercantile and manufacturing firm of W. E. Sanford & Co. Has been Vice-Presdt. of the Hamilton Provident Bank; a dir. of the Portage and Westbourne

Railway, and a mem. of the Senate of Victoria Univ. Called to the Senate, March, 1887. A Conservative.— Hamilton, Ont.

SCHULTZ, Hon. JOHN CHRISTIAN, M.D.

Of Danish descent. S. of the late Wm. Schultz, merchant, of Amherstburgh, Ont., and his wife, Eliza, dau. of Wm. Riley, Esq., of Bandon, Irel. B. at Amherstburgh, Ont., 1 Jan., 1840. Ed. in Arts, at Oberlin, Ohio, and in Medicine at Queen's Univ., Kingston, and at Victoria Univ., Cobourg. Graduated as M.D. 1860. M. at Winnipeg 1868, Miss Agnes Campbell Farguharson, of Georgetown, British Guinea. Went to the North-West in 1860 and practised his profession in Fort Garry, now Winnipeg. Was also largely interested in the fur trade. Was leader of the Canadian party at the time of the Rebellion of 1869-70; was seized, imprisoned and sentenced to death by Riel, but escaped. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex-Council for the North-West Territories, Dec., 1872. Is a mem. of the Dominion Board of Health for Manitoba and North-West Territories; Presdt. of the North-West Trading Co.: a dir. of the Manitoba South-Western Colonization Railway, and one of the Board of Governors of the Manitoba Medical Board. First returned to Parliament for Lisgar in the Commons on Man. entering the Dominion, March, 1871, and sat until g. e. 1882, when he was defeated. Called to the Senate 22 Sept., 1882. A Liberal Conservative. - Winnipeg; Maria St., Ottawa; Rideau Club; Manitoba Club.

Scott, Hon. Richard William, Q.C., P.C.

On paternal side descended from an influential family in the Co. Clare, Irel. S. of the late W, J. Scott, Esq., M.D., who after serving on the medical staff of the army during the Peninsular war, came to Can. and subsequently became Registrar of the Co. of Grenville, Ont., by Sarah Ann, dau. of the late Capt. Allan McDonnell, of Matilda, Dundas, Ont., formerly an officer in the King's Royal Yorkers. B. at Prescott, 24 Feb., 1825. Ed. at Prescott. M. Mary Ann, dau. of the late John Heron, Esq., of Ottawa. Called to the Bar of U. C., Easter Term, 1848. Apptd. a Q.C. 1867. Was Mayor of Ottawa 1852. Elected Speaker of the Ont. Assem. 7 Dec., 1871, but resigned on being apptd. a mem. of the Ex Council and Commr of Crown Lands for that Prov. on 21 same month, in which office he remained until 7 Nov., 1873, when

sworn of the Queen's Privy Council. Was Sec. of State from 9 Jan., 1874, until Oct., 1878. Has since been leader of the Opposition in the Senate. Sat for Ottawa in Can. Assem. from 1857 to 1863, when defeated; and for same seat in Ont. Assem. from g. e. 1867, until Nov., 1873, when he resigned. His principal legislative achievement is the Separate School Law of Ont., which he prepared and carried in 1863, as a private member, a measure which was the means of removing a vexed question from the political arena, and of allaying much public irritation. SENECAL, Hon. Louis Adelard. (Mille Isles.)

Ancestors came from France, father being a farmer in Co. of Vercheres, P.Q. B. at Varennes 10 July, 1829, and ed. there and in Burlington, U.S. M., 1850, Delphire, dau, of Lieut.-Col. Dansereau, merchant, Vercheres. Is a commander of the Legion d'Honeur, France. Is a financier, and Presdt. of the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Co. Has been General Superintendent of the Government Railways of the Province of Quebec, and Presdt. of the North Shore Railway and of the Montreal City Passenger Railway. Opened to navigation in 1857, the Yamaska River, between Sorel and St. Aimé, and the St. Francis River between Sorel and St. Francis. Constructed the Richelieu, Drummond and Arthabaska Railway, now a portion of the South-Eastern Railway, the Laurentian Railway, from St. Therese to St. Lin; the St. Eustache Railway, from St. Therese to St. Eustache; the Berthier Railway; the Lanoraie, Joliette and St. Felix des Valois Railway; the L'Assomption Railway, and is now building the Basses Laurentides Railway. Built and worked for two winters the Ice Railway on the St. Lawrence, from Montreal to Longueuil. Sat in the Commons for Drummond and Arthabaska from 1867 to 1871, and in the Quebec Assem. from 1867 to 1872. Called to the Senate 12 March, 1887. A Conservative and a Protectionist.—Montreal.

SMITH, Hon. Frank, P.C.

B. at Richhill, Armagh, Irel., 1822. Accompanied his father to Can., 1832, and settled near Toronto. M. the dau. of John O'Higgins, Esq., J.P., of Stratford, Ont. Car-

ried on business in London from 1849 to 1867, when he removed to Toronto, where he continues his extensive wholesale grocery trade. Was an Alderman of London for several years, and Mayor of the city, 1866. Is Presdt. of the Northern Railway Co., of The Home Loan Co., of the London and Ontario Investment Co., Limited; Vice-Presdt. of the Dominion Bank, and a dir. of the Dominion Telegraph Co., of the Consumers' Gas Co., Toronto, and of the Northern and Pacific Junction Railway Co. Was Presdt., during its existence, of the Northern Extension Railway Co. Sworn of the Privy Council, 29 July, 1882. Called to the Senate, 2 Feb., 1871. A Conservative.—72, Bloor Street, East, Toronto; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.

Stevens, Hon. Gardner Green. ($Bedford_{\bullet}$)

S. of the late Gardner Stevens, Esq., one of the early settlers of the Eastern Townships. B. in Brompton, P.Q., 13 Dec., 1814. Ed. there. M., 1847, Relief J., dau. of the late Sidney Spafford, Esq., of Compton. Is Presdt. of the Stanstead, Shefford and Chambly Railway, and the Park Assoc. of Waterloo, and Vice-Presdt. of the Eastern Townships Bank. Has been Mayor of Waterloo, and Warden of Shefford. Called to the Senate, 19 Feb., 1876. A Liberal.—Waterloo, P.Q.

SULLIVAN, Hon. MICHAEL, M.D.

B. at Killarney, Co. of Kerry, Irel., 13 Feb., 1838. Came to Can. in 1842, and settled at Kingston, Ont. Ed. at the Regiopolis Coll., and graduated M.D. at Queen's Coll., 1858. M., 7 June, 1867, Mary Brown, Kingston. Was apptd. Lecturer in Anatomy in Queen's College, 1872, and, upon establishment of the Royal Coll. of Surgeons and Physicians in affiliation with Queen's Univ., was apptd. Professor of Anatomy. Is now Professor of Surgery and Histology; is a Trustee of Kingston Hospital and a mem. of the Ontario Medical Council. Was Presdt. of the Medical Assoc of Can., 1883. Has been an Alderman and Mayor of Kingston. Served as Purveyor-General during the North-West Rebellion, 1885. An unsuccessful candidate for Kingston in the Commons at g.e., 1882. Called to the Senate, 29 Jan., 1885. A Conservative.— Kingston, Ont.

SUTHERLAND, Hon. JOHN.

S. of Mr. Alex. Sutherland, a native of Sutherland-

shire, Scot., who, after serving in the British Army during the Poninsular campaign, came to this country, and settled in 1815 within the present limits of the city of Winnipeg. B. there, 23 Aug., 1821, and ed. at St. John's. M. the second dau. of John Macbeth, Esq., of the same place. Is a dir. of the Winnipeg Trusts Co., and of the Commercial Bank, Manitoba. Was a mem. of the Council of Assiniboia from 1866 until it was abolished. Apptd. High Sheriff of Manitoba, 1870, but resigned on being called to the Senate, 13 Dec., 1871. An Independent.—Bellevue House, Kildonan, Man.

Thibaudeau, Hon. Joseph Rosaire. (Rigaud.)

Descended from a French family mentioned in history as being in existence during the Reign of Louis XV., and which, on the breaking out of the French Revolution in 1789, emigrated to Acadia, and thence to L.C. B. 1 Oct., 1837, at Cap Santé, Co. of Portneuf. M., 9 Dec., 1873, Marguerite LaMothe, eld. dau. of Guillaume LaMothe, Esq., Postmaster of Montreal. Mem. of the firm of Thibaudeau Bros. & Co., Montreal. Vice-Presdt. of the Royal Canadian Insur. Co. and of the Montreal (otton Co., and a dir. of the North American Life Assur. Co. and of the Bell Telephone Co, and local dir. at Montreal of La Banque Nationale. Called to the Senate, 14 Jan., 1878. A Liberal.—Montreal.

TRUDEL, Hon. François-Xavier Anselme, Q.C. (DeSalaberry.)

S. of F. X. Trudel, Esq., a farmer of St. Prosper, P.Q., by Julie Langevin, a grand-dau. of A. Hamlin, Esq., Seigneur de Grondines: and grand-s. of Oliver Trudel, Esq., of St. Geneviève de Batiscan, who represented Champlain in L.C. Assem, for a lengthened period. B. at Ste. Anne de la Pérade, P.Q., 29 April, 1838. Ed. at Nicolet Coll. M., April 1864, Marie-Zoé-Aimée, dau. of the late Hon. Louis Renaud, Senator for DeSalaberry Division. Called to the Bar L.C., Dec. 1861. Apptd. a Q.C., 16 Oct., 1880. Was editor of La Minerce (Montreal) for a short time, 1860. One of the authors of the Programme Catholique (1871), and has written largely in the French-Canadian periodicals of the day. Author of several political pamphlets-amongst others, "Nos Chambre Haute," 1880. Is the founder, co-proprietor and editor of the French daily, L'Etendard, the monthly, La Revue Canadienne, and the weekly, L'Ourrier. Has been for several years Presdt. of the "Cercle Literaire" and of the "Union Catholique," of Montreal. Sat for Champlain in Quebec Assem. from g.e. 1871 until g.e. 1873. Called to the Senate, 31 Oct., 1873. A Conservative.—29, St. James Street, Montreal.

TURNER, Hon. JAMES.

B. in Glasgow, Scotland, 31 March, 1826, and ed. at the High School there. Came to Can. 1848. M., June, 1850. Caroline Green, of Kingston, Ont. Has been for many years in business as a wholesale grocer. Is Vice-Presdt. of the Bank of Hamilton, and dir. of the Northern and Pacific Junction Railway. Called to Senate 12 Jan., 1884. A Liberal Conservative.—Hamilton, Ont.; Rideau Club.

VIDAL, Lieut. Col., Hon. ALEXANDER, P.L.S.

Family originally from Spain. Removed to England in 17th century. Eld. surviving s. of the late Capt. R. E. Vidal, R.N. B. in Berkshire, Eng., 4 Aug., 1819. Ed. at the Royal Mathematical School, Christ's Hospital, London, Eng. Accompanied his father to Canada, 1834, and settled in Sarnia following year. M., Dec., 1847, Catherine, eld. dau. of the late Capt. W. E. Wright, R.N., of Moore, Lambton (she d. 19 April, 1882). A P.L.S., and practised his profession from 1843 to 1852. Is Lieut. Col. Lambton Reserve Militia; County Treasurer of Lambton. Was manager of the Sarnia branch of the late Bank of Upper Canada, from 1852 until the failure of that institution, 1866, and held same position in service of Bank of Montreal from that time until 1875, when he resigned. Elected Chairman of the Dominion Prohibitionary Convention, Montreal, Sept., 1875. Is Presdt. of the Dominion Alliance for Total Supression of the Liquor Traffic. An unsuccessful candidate for the Commons at g. e. 1872. Sat for St. Clair Division L. C., Can., from Sept., 1863, until the Union. Called to the Senate 15 Jan., 1873. A Conservative.—Sarnia, Ont.

WARK, Hon. DAVID.

Descended by both parents from Scotch families that settled in Ulster in the 17th century. B. near Londonderry, Irel., 19 Feb., 1804. Came to N.B. 1825. M. Annie Elizabeth, dau. of Isaac Burpee, Esq., of Sunbury, N.S. A retired merchant. Is a mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of N.B. Was a mem. of the Ex Council N.B., from 1858 to 1862, and Receiver General for a few months, 1867. Sat for Kent in N.B. Assem. from 1845 to 1851, when apptd. to L. C. of that Province, where he remained until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation May, 1867. A Liberal.—Fredericton, N.B.

PART III.

Explanation of Technical Parliamentary Expressions.

WITH BRIEF DESCRIPTIONS OF THE DUTIES OF HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS.

Acceptance of Office.—Under the Rev. Stat. of Can., Cap. 2, Sec. 9, the holder of an office of emolument under the Govt. of Can., the Sheriff, Registrar, Clerk of the Peace and County Crown Attorney in any of the provinces, is ineligible to sit in the House of Commons. Under Sec. 12, any member of the Commons accepting office must vacate his seat in Parliament. Exception is made as to a Minister of the Crown, provided he is elected to Parliament while he holds such office. A minister may be transferred from one office to another without re-election.

Adjournment is a postponement of the sittings or proceedings of the House from one time to another specified for the re assemblage. It is a right belonging to each House, and there are no restrictions to this power. By previous permission of the House, the Speaker may leave the Chair for a certain number of hours, but this does not amount to an adjournment and cannot be noted as such by the Clerk. The adjournment of one House does not adjourn the other. The Crown may, pending an adjournment, summon by proclamation either House or both, and may direct either House or both to adjourn to any particular day. An individual member may, for a time, interrupt the progress of business by successive motions for adjournment, which may be repeated indefinitely, with this restriction: no second motion to adjourn can be made until after some intermediate proceeding shall have been had. The motion in committee, that the chairman report progress, is equivalent to a motion to adjourn the debate. Adjournment does not close the debate, but a member who moves the adjournment of a debate or who is in possession of the floor at the time of the adjournment, is said to be in possession of the House, with the right to re-open the debate which had been interrupted. This is not the case, however, when committees of the Whole House adjourn.

AGRICULTURE, MINISTER OF, has the control and direction of Agriculture, Immigration and Emigration, Pub-

lic Health and Quarantine, the Marine Hospital, Quebec, Arts and Manufactures, the Census and Statistics, Patents of Invention, Copyrights, Industrial Design and Trade Marks, and Experimental Farms.

ALIENS are incapable of voting for the election of members of Parliament in Canada, neither can they be candidates for seats as members for any constituency.

AMENDMENT, AN, is the mode by which the decision of the House in a question may be intercepted, by submitting for its consideration an alternative proposition, either wholly or partially opposed to the original question.

AUDITOR GENERAL, THE, is an officer appointed by the Gov. Gen. under the Great Seal of Can. for the complete examination of the public accounts and for reporting therein to the Ho. of Commons. He holds office during good behavior but is removable by the Gov. Gen. on address of the Senate and Commons. Salary \$3200.

Avoidance of a Decision, An, may be effected by proposing an amendment to the original question, or by substitution in its stead of another question, such as the adjournment of the House, or of the debate; "the previous question," or "that the orders of the day be now read," or by enforcing the adjournment of the House, owing to the absence of a quorum. Moving that a Bill "be read this day six months," or "this day three months," is a mode of throwing it out without coming to an express declaration against the principle of the measure.

Ballot, The.—(See election of members.)

BILLS (MONEY).—All Bills relating to public income and expenditure, and all Bills usually called Money Bills, must originate in the Commons and be introduced by the Government.

BILLS (PRIVATE) are chiefly introduced to enable individuals or bodies corporate to undertake works of public utility at their own risk and chiefly for their own emolument and benefit; but there are other Private Bills which frequently come before Parliament, such as Bills for adjusting claims to property between individual claimants, and Bills relating to divorce, naturalization, etc., etc. The expenses of legislation in such matters must be paid by the parties seeking the relief; and a de-

posit of \$200 must be made immediately after the second reading of the Bill. After the second reading, if all the rules of the House have been complied with, Private Bills go to the Committee, and it is before this Committee that proper attention must be given by the parties interested. Individuals or companies may appear by Parliamentary Agents.

Bills (Public).—A Bill is the draft or skeleton of a Statute. Any Bill which the Senate can originate may be introduced and laid on the table by an individual Senator, without the previous permission of the House; but in the Commons no Bill can be brought in, unless a motion for leave be previously agreed to. Permission having been granted, a Committee is appointed to prepare the Bill. It is then brought in and read the first time without amendment or debate, and a day is appointed for the second reading, previous to which it is printed, and a copy furnished to each member. The Bill, after the second reading, is referred to a Committee of the Whole House, at the sittings of which its details are considered as its principles were at each of its several readings. Members are at liberty to discuss its principles at any of its stages, but no one is considered to have declared decisively in favour of its principles unless by his vote he supports its second reading. In Committee the Bill is debated clause by clause; the blanks left for amount of penalties, salaries or grants, etc., are filled up, and sometimes the Bill is entirely remodelled. The blanks, as they are called, which are usually filled up in italics, are agreed to without a question being put, unless a member should propose to after them. The next proceeding is, that the Chairman of the Committee should make a report to the House of the changes that the Bill has undergone, which he does by presenting it to the Speaker in its altered form. The report of the Committee is agreed to without discussion, the Bill is ordered to be printed, and it is then read the third time, when any further amendments can be made. If a new clause be added it is called a rider. The last question but one is that the "Bill do pass;" after this nothing remains except to determine its title, which used to be a general one for all the Acts passed in the session, but in modern times distinct titles are used for each Statute. During the progress of the Bill, the House may divide on the following questions: 1st, on the second reading; 2nd, that it be committed; 3rd, on the consideration of report of Committee, in case of amendment; 4th, or that the Bill be re-committed;

5th, that it be read the third time; 6th, that it do pass; 7th, the title of the Bill. These are quite exclusive of any division in the Committee, or any amendments, or of any clauses added to or expunged from the measure, in or out of the Committee. Alterations are not usually proposed in a Bill until after the principle has been disposed of on the second reading. Immediately after the passing of a Bill, it is taken to the Bar of the Senate, desiring their concurrence, where it passes through the same form as in the Commons. If the bill be rejected, no further proceedings ensue. When the Senate agrees with the Commons in the principle of the measure, but differ on matters of detail, the Bill is returned to the Commons bearing the amendments the Senators propose; these are considered by the Commons, and if disagreed to, the Bill is returned back to the Senate with a message assigning reasons for the disagreement. A conference usually follows, but if both Houses remain inflexible, the Bill is dropped. The same proceedings are adopted, mutatis mutendis, when the Bill originates in the Senate. The Bill, having thus passed both Houses, remains with the Senate, except in the case of a Bill of Supply, which is sent back to the Commons, to be by them presented at the Bar of the Senate to the Representative of the Sovereign. assent of the Crown is the final proceeding which converts a Bill into an Act of Parliament.

Budget, The.—Is the financial statement laid annually by the Finance Minister before Parliament, of the estimated public income and expenditure of the following year, commencing 1st July. In it he mentions what taxes it is proposed to repeal, reduce, or augment, and what new ones are to be imposed. In his speech on this occasion, the Minister reviews the financial condition of the country, comparing the income and expenditure of the previous year with those of preceding years, justifying the changes that are proposed to be made and estimating their probable effects.

Chairman of Committees.—He presides when the House is in Committee, and sits at the table in the seat of the Clerk of the House. His vote is never given in Committee, except when, on a division, the members are equal. If the Speaker leave the chair, he may call upon him to preside as Deputy Speaker.

CLERK OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS is appointed by the Crown by commission under the great seal. It is his duty

to make minutes, not of the arguments used in the House, but the decisions at which it arrives—in other words, to make a true and faithful record of all the proceedings in which it may be engaged; to see that they are correctly printed and distributed to the members; to read aloud all such documents as the House may order to be read; to perform the duty (without taking the chair) of president or moderator, during the choice of a Speaker, putting a question and directing a division in the same manner that a Speaker would do. He sits at the upper end of the table, with one assistant.

CLERK OF THE CROWN IN CHANCERY is appointed by the Crown. He issues writs for elections, makes certificates to the House of Commons, in due form, of the return of members, and performs other functions relating to elections. He attends the House with election returns, and amends the same when so ordered. The various proclamations, summoning, proroguing and dissolving, are issued by command out of Chancery. At the close of a session, when the Governor attends the Senate to give the Royal assent to bills, it is the duty of this officer to read the titles of the bills in the English and French languages.

COMMITMENT.—Parliament can punish all contempt of their authority, or disobedience of their mandates. Each House is armed with power to repress any aggression committed upon its rights, or any interference with its privileges, but in the case of the Commons, the operation of this power is limited to the session of Parliament, committals by that House being invalidated by a prorogation. Either House can delegate to a committee the power of sending for papers and records, and of enforcing the attendance of necessary witnesses.

Committees.—Are, first, those of the Whole House, which may be to consider certain resolutions, as to the nature of which considerable latitude prevails; or the House itself resolves into such Committee to consider the details of a Bill, the principle of which may be discussed at any or all of its other stages; or there may be Committees for financial purposes, as those of "Supply," or "Ways and Means," (which see.) Secondly, Select Committees, chosen by ballot or otherwise, for some specific purpose. The number composing such bodies seldom exceeds fifteen members, except by permission of the House. Thirdly, Committees on Private Bills (which see.) When the whole House is in Committee, the Speaker

vacates the chair, the Mace is placed under the table, and some member is called to preside, who sits in the seat of the Clerk of the House.

COMMONS HOUSE OF,—According to the theory of the English constitution, the House of Commons represents the whole population. Although the members returned by the country voters are presumed to represent the interest concerned in agriculture, and the members returned by towns have their attention most directed towards the interests of trade, yet it is unconstitutional to suppose that members are delegates of any special community. Each member is held to represent the interests of the nation. The proceedings of the Commons are regulated by Standing Orders. The Speaker takes the chair at 3 p.m. daily. If there be a quorum, the business is proceeded with; if not, the House is adjourned to the next day, at 3 p.m. Early meetings take place before the termination of the Session, in order to expedite business and bring matters to a close; the House does not usually meet on Saturday, nor does it assemble on any holiday. No one can be admitted to hear the debates without an order from the Sergeant-at-Arms, which is generally obtained through a member. Twenty members, including the Speaker, constitute a quorum.

Conference, A, is a species of negotiation between the two Houses of Parliament, conducted by managers appointed on both sides, for the purpose of producing concurrence, in cases where mutual consent is necessary; or for the purpose of reconciling differences which may have arisen. It is the sole privilege of the Senate to name the time and place for holding a conference, no matter by which house it may have been demanded. Reasons in writing for the course resolved to be taken are usually furnished to the managers on both sides, in which case it is simply called "a conference." Should this proceeding fail, "a free conference" must be held, which gives an opportunity for the managers individually, and unrestrained by any precise form of agreement, to urge such reasons as, in their judgment, may best tend to influence the House to which they are addressed. A free conference is usually demanded after two conferences have been holden without effect. After one free conference, none other but free conferences can be held touching the same subject.

CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS.—The trial of election peti-

tions is now regulated by Rev. Stat. of Can., Cap. 9, which transfers the entire jurisdiction to the Courts of Law. A petition, complaining of undue election, must be presented within 30 days after the day of publication in the Canada Gazette of the receipt of the return to the writ of election by the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, unless it questions the return or election upon an allegation of corrupt practices, &c., in which case it may be presented at any time within 30 days after the day of payment. At the time of presentation of a petition, a deposit of \$1000 in gold or Dominion notes, is to be made with the Clerk of the Court, by those presenting it, as security for payment of all costs, charges and expenses, that may become payable by the petitioner.

COUNT OUT.—If a member takes notice of the number present, the Speaker counts the House, and if 15 Senators in the case of the Senate, and 20 members in the case of the House of Commons, be not present, the Speaker adjourns the House without question put, until next sitting day.

DEPUTY SPEAKER.—See Chairman of Committees.

DISFRANCHSE.—Is the act of taking away the privilege of the franchise.

Dissolution.—Is the civil death of the Parliament, and may be effected at pleasure by the Crown or by length of time (five years.) It puts an end to the representative character of the members, and a Parliament cannot be assembled until after a general election.

Division, A.—Is the mode of taking the votes of each House of Parliament. The proceedings in taking the sense of the House on a question, are similar in the Senate and Commons. Members for and against a question are distinguished in the Senate as "Contents" and "Noncontents;" in the Commons as "Yeas" and "Nays."

DIVORCE BILLS.—The B. N. A. Act, 1867, places Marriage and Divorce within the exclusive legislative jurisdiction of the Canadian Parliament. The provinces, however, in which Divorce Courts existed prior to Confederation, continue their functions. The portions of the Dominion in which no such court exists are Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba and the North-West Territories. Bills of Divorce originate, although not necessarily, in the Senate, and

proof of adultery must be established to the satisfaction of a select committee appointed to hear the evidence. Proceedings are conducted with judicial exactness, the petitioner and respondent being represented by solicitors or counsel.

Double Returns.—When two members are returned for one place, they may be sworn, but neither should sit or vote until the matter has been finally determined. As under the Rev. Stat. of Can., cap. 8, sec. 61, the returning officer, in case of an inequality of votes, shall give a casting vote, double returns will be of infrequent occurrence.

DOUBLE ELECTION.—A member returned by two constituencies must, within seven days after the expiration of the time limited for the presentation of petitions against returns, elect for which he will serve.

DROPPED ORDERS OF THE DAY.—Are the questions put by members, notices of motions and orders standing upon the Order Paper, not taken up when called or not reached owing to an adjournment of the House. They are set down on the paper for the next sitting day.

ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT.—Writs for the Election of Members on the occasion of a new Parliament are issued by the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, upon direction of the Governor-General, and during a Parliament upon the Speaker's Warrant. The election is by Ballot, and the procedure is set out in Rev. Stat. of Can., Chapter 8.

Election Petitions.—(See Controverted Elections.)

EXPULSION OF MEMBERS is a power possessed by the House of Commons. It has been exercised from time to time to free Parliament from the presence of discreditable members, such as men found guilty of forgery, perjury, &c., or as a punishment for offences committed against the House itself. The last occasion, 1874, was that of Louis Riel.

FINANCE, MINISTER OF, AND RECEIVER-GENERAL has the supervision, control and direction of all matters relating to the financial affairs, public accounts, revenue and expenditure not assigned to any other department.

FISHERIES, DEPARTMENT OF, administers all laws relat-

ing to the subject of sea, coast and inland fisheries and the management and protection thereof, and is presided over by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

Franchise.—The term means the right to vote at an election for a member of Parliament. Cap. 5 of the Rev. Stat. of Can. regulates the exercise of the Franchise.

Geological and Natural History Survey is under the control of the Minister of the Interior. The object of the survey and museum is to elucidate the geology and mineralogy of Canada, and to make a full and scientific examination of the various strata, soils, ores, coal oils and mineral waters, and of its recent fauma and flora, so as to afford correct and full information to the mining metallurgical and other interests of the country as to its resources.

GOVERNMENT ORDERS are the bills brought in by the Government, and which they are entitled to place at the head of the list of orders of the day. It is generally the practice to call Government orders according to the convenience of the Ministers.

High Commissioner for Canada acts as representative and resident agent of Canada in Britain, takes charge of the immigration offices and agencies in Britain under the Minister of Agriculture, and carries out such instructions as he receives from the Governor in Council respecting the commercial, financial, and general interests of Canada in Britain and elsewhere. (Salary \$10,000.)

INDEPENDENCE OF PARLT.—Under Rev. Stat. of Can., Cap. 2, Sec. 10, no contractor with the Govt. of Can. is eligible as a mem. of the Ho. of Com., or shall sit or vote therein. Any member interested in any contract, sale of goods, for which the public money is paid, thereby vacates his seat, and is liable to forfeit \$200 for each day he sits or votes thereafter. Exception is made in favor of shareholders in certain incorp. companies, persons upon whom contracts devolve, lenders of money to the Govt., and Militia Officers and men. Under Sec. 18 Senators, are subject to the same disabilities and forfeiture.

INLAND REVENUE, MINISTER OF.—Has the control and management of the collection of excise duties; collection of stamp duties; internal taxes; standard weights and measures; administration of laws relating to timber cull-

ing and measurement, and the collection of slidage and tonage dues, and collection of bridge and ferry tolls and rents, and tolls on private canals.

Instruction, An.—Empowers a Committee of the whole House to consider matters not otherwise referred to them, and restricts or extends the order of reference to a Select Committee.

Interior, Minister of the.—Has the control and management of the affairs of the North-West Territories, and of all Crown Lands, the property of Canada, including Ordnance and Admiralty lands, and all other lands not specially under the control of other departments, excepting the land connected with Marine Hospitals and Light Houses, and St. Paul's, Sable, and Portage Islands. He has also the control and management of the Geological Survey of Canada.

JUSTICE, MINISTER OF.—Is ex officio H. M. Attorney General of Canada. He is the official legal adviser of the Governor General, and the legal member of H. M. Privy Council for Canada; he sees that the administration of public affairs is in accordance with law; has the superintendence of all matters connected with the administration of justice in Canada, not within provincial jurisdiction; advises upon the provincial Acts and proceedings, and generally advises the Crown in all legal matters. As Atty. Gen. he is entrusted with the powers and charged with the duties which belong to the office of Atty. Gen. of England, by law or usuage, so far as applicable to Canada, and to the provisions before Confederation. He advises the Heads of the several Departments upon matters of law; is charged with the settlement and approval of all instruments issued under the great seal of Canada; has the superintendence of penitentiaries and prison system, and the conduct of all litigation for or against the Crown.

Leave of Absence from the service of the House is granted to members for a specified time, on reasonable cause assigned.

Marine, Department of.—Administers the laws relating to pilots, beaches, light-houses, harbours, piers, vessels belonging to the Govt. of Can., except gunboats, harbour commissioners and masters, classification of vessels and examination and granting certificates to officers in the merchants' service, shipping masters and offices, in-

spection of steamboats, inquiries into causes of shipwrecks, and the superintendence of marine and seamen's hospitals.

Members of Parliament are under a constitutional obligation to attend the service of the House, and the House is empowered to punish neglect of this duty by committal to custody. The service on committees may be enforced in like manner.

Members, Introduction of.—Members elected during the existence of Parliament, after taking the oath of allegiance and subscribing the roll, appear at the bar of the House and claim their seat, the custom being an introduction by other members, who announce that these requirements have been fulfilled. A member who has been unseated and re-elected, must again sign the roll and take the oath. Since 1879, all new members, including Ministers, after re-election have been introduced.

MINISTRY, THE.—Is the administration, under the name of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, which exercises the powers of the Crown, in accord with Parliament, and more especially with the House of Commons. Some eminent party leader, who either has or hopes to obtain the confidence of the majority of the House of Commons, is authorized by the Governor-General to form a Ministry, the members of which he selects from those favorable to his policy, he himself being the Prime Minister. The Ministry exercises supreme authority, and includes the executive, the legislative and the judicial powers of the Crown, and in it, for the time being, the whole of the governing power of the Sovereign's representative is vested. See Queen's Privy Council for Canada.

Motion, A.—The offer of a substantive proposition for adoption by the House, such as a motion for leave to bring in a bill, or of a resolution expressive of an abstract opinion.

Named.—For a member to be named by the Speaker is a signification that, in his opinion, he has incurred the displeasure of the House.

Notes and Proceedings, The, are the entries printed and published daily of the transactions of the House made at the table by the Clerks, from which the journals are compiled.

Notices of Motion.—The notice of an intended motion must, as a rule, appear on the Business Paper of the House on the day when it is to be moved.

OATHS OF MEMBERS.—New members may take and subscribe the oath at any time during the sitting of the House before the orders of the day and notices of motion have been entered upon, or after they have been disposed of, but no debate nor business may be interrupted for that purpose.

Order.—By this word is meant obedience to certain rules and regulations intended to facilitate the despatch of business, and preserve that decorum necessary in all deliberative assemblies. The rules by which the business of Parliament is conducted are of two kinds; one kind the House possesses in common with all deliberative assemblies—another is peculiar to its own existence and powers. For the proper application of all these rules, the Speaker or Chairman's decision is had, and to this decision due deference is at all times paid. The Speaker. while in the Chair, takes no part in the debate, it being his duty to regulate the manner in which business shall be transacted; to confine those members who address the House to the subject under consideration; to give his opinion in all things which relate to order; to put the matter in dispute into the form of a question, upon which the votes of the members are taken, and to declare the majority as soon as it is communicated to him by the Clerk. It is also his duty to state when the business of the House is closed, and to see that its transactions are correctly and properly recorded. After routine, he calls upon the member whose motion stands first on the paper of notices, or who is otherwise entitled to precedence. A motion must be seconded or falls to the ground; being seconded, the motion is handed in writing to the Speaker, who has to read it before debate can be had upon it; having been read, objections may be urged. There are several ways by which a motion may be opposed; it may be met by a direct negative, or by an amendment, or by a motion to postpone, or by proceeding to the next order of the day, or by moving the previous question, or by the simple motion of adjournment. A motion once read cannot be withdrawn without the permission of the House. Unless a speech is made objecting to a motion, neither mover nor seconder can speak a second time except in explanation. If, however, a debate does arise, in which opposition is offered to the

mover of a motion, he has the right to reply; but this privilege does not belong to the mover of an amendment. All are permitted to explain. The debate being ended, the Speaker or Chairman puts the question, and calls upon those in favour to say "Yea," and those of a contrary disposition to say "Nay." He then declares that in his opinion the "Yeas" or the "Nays" (as the case may be) have it. If his decision is questioned, the House divides, the "Yeas" rising and their names being taken down, the "Nays" following, the numbers are counted from the record and declared. Should a member, when the voice of the House is called for, say "Yea," and should he afterwards, on division, vote "Nay," and attention is called to the fact, his vote will be recorded "Yea." The simply calling for a division, when the Speaker has declared that "the Yeas have it," would not, however, require the record of his vote adversely as "Nay," the Canadian rule differing herein from the English. When an amendment has been moved, the vote is taken on the amendment, and then on the original question. Should the amendment be adopted, it then becomes the substantive motion, and may be amended in the same way that the original motion was amended. Thus a number of successive amendments to the original motion may be disposed of. Any member is at liberty to interrupt another by "rising to order," which means that he rises in his place and calls the attention of the Chair and the House to a breach of order then being committed. In debate it is contrary to order to mention any member by name; the same rule prevails in Committee of the Whole, except as regards the Chairman, who is sometimes called by his name, and not Mr. Chairman.

ORDERS OF THE DAY, THE.—Are the bills set down for consideration on a particular day.

PARLIAMENT, the name of the Supreme Legislature of Great Britain, was first used in the reign of Henry III. It was first applied in Canada by the B. N. A. Act.

Parliamentary Agents.—In England all the business for private corporations and individuals is transacted by Parliamentary Agents, who conduce to the interests of their clients, as well as to the convenience of Committees and Members through their familiarity with Parliamentary practice. Their employment is sanctioned in Canada, every agent being (Rule 72) personally responsible to the House and to the Speaker for the observance of the

rules, orders and practice of Parliament, and for the payment of all fees and charges; and all agents must have received the express sanction and authority of the Speaker. As a rule they are professional gentlemen.

- 10. Petitions.—The following rules respecting Petitions should be carefully observed, as deviation therefrom will involve rejection:—
- (1.) Petitions involving public expenditure, such as grants of money or lands, claims for arrears of pay or for remuneration for public service rendered, or other demands imposing a burthen upon the people, cannot be received by the House, which has not the power of initiating such imposition.

Petitions of this nature should be addressed to "His Excellency the Governor-General in Council." The correct form is to forward them to the Secretary of State, who will then, "by command," refer them to the Ministers of the Crown to whose Department their subjects respectively relate; and they will thereafter be dealt with Departmentally, in the same manner as any official letter or communication received direct from the parties interested. In point of fact, however, the forwarding of such petitions by members of Parliament, with covering letter, direct to the Department concerned, at any time and without waiting for the session, is practically the best course. In this way, petitions may be brought before the executive in ample time for consideration before the meeting of Parliament, when the representatives can, if desired, bring on a discussion upon the merits of the case.

Although such petitions may not be presented to the House, which has not the power of granting them, it is quite in order (after proceeding as above) to bring them under the cognizance of Parliament by moving an address to His Excellency for them, and any other papers connected with them in the Departments, to be brought down; and the Government, upon its responsibility to Parliament, can then be brought to account for the exercise or non-exercise of the power vested in it of granting the pecuniary or other relief prayed for.

(2.) It has been decided that aliens, non-residents of the Dominion of Canada, have not the right of petitioning this Parliament. An exception to this rule was made during session of 1878.

- (3.) Petitions may be either written or printed; provided always, that the signatures of at least three petitioners are subscribed on the sheet containing the prayer of the petition.
- (4.) Signatures to petitions must be original; no agent should sign a petition to Parliament for any purpose. No chairman can sign for a public meeting, but the common seal of a *corporation* is received as the petition of the whole body.
- (5.) All petitions must be in respectful and temperate language, and must not contain any matter in breach of the privileges of the House, such as animadversion upon the conduct of the Parliament, or reference to any subject under debate, or to a motion in course of preparation.
- (6.) Petitions to the House of Commons should be addressed: "To the Honorable the Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled; the statement of grievance or cause of complaint should be clearly and succinctly set forth, and they must close with a specific prayer, thus:

"Wherefore your petitioner prays that," &c., setting forth

the redress and relief that is sought.

- (7.) The member presenting a petition should endorse his name thereon, and present it in his place in the House, confining himself, when doing so, to the statement of the parties from whom it comes, the number of signatures attached to it, and the material allegations it contains. He is responsible that it does not contain impertinent or improper matter.
- (8.) After a lapse of two days for scrutiny by the Speaker and Clerk of the House, every petition which proves to be properly receivable is (*Rule* 86) "brought to the Table by direction of the Speaker, who cannot allow any debate, or any member to speak, upon or in relation to such petition; but it may be read by the Clerk at the Table, if required; or if it complain of some present personal grievance, requiring an immediate remedy, the matter contained therein may be brought into immediate discussion. In ordinary course, it may, upon motion, be referred to a committee, or resolutions may be based upon it," etc.

PREMIER, THE.—Is the head of Her Majesty's Government in Canada—is the connecting link between Her

Majesty's representative and her Privy Council for Canada; selects his colleagues in the Ministry, and is virtually responsible for the entire patronage of the Crown.

Previous Question, The.—Is a mode of attempting to avoid a direct expression of opinion upon a motion. It is effected by proposing, in lieu of the original motion, a motion "That this question be now put." A vote is taken on this, and if negatived, the original motion is practically rejected, although the motion may be proposed again at a subsequent sitting.

PRIVILEGE, A QUESTION OF, is founded on a matter directly concerning the privileges of the House, recently arisen, and calling for its immediate interposition. Such a matter may be considered without notice, and takes precedence of all other business.

Privileges of Members.—Under Rev. Stat. of Can., cap. 2, sec. 3, every member of the Senate and House of Commons enjoys the like privileges, immunities and powers as at the time of the passing of the B. N. A. Act, 1867, were enjoyed by the British House of Commons, and such privileges as are, from time to time, defined by any Act of the Parliament of Canada. These privileges include freedom of speech and person, and freedom from legal arrest and seizure under process from the Courts of Law and Equity. This does not extend to indictable offences, or to actual contempts of the Court of Justice. They are exempt from all duties, the performance of which might interfere with their prompt atiendance to their Parliamentary calls.

Privileges of Parliament.—Amongst the privileges

which the Commons claim are:

The power of committing individuals to prison; the power of publishing matters which, if not issuing from such high authority, might become the subject of proceedings in a court of law; the power of directing the Law Officers of the Crown to prosecute persons accused of offences against the laws or affecting the privileges of Parliament; and finally, of doing anything not directly contravening an existing Act of Parliament, which may be necessary for the vindication and protection of its own rights, in the exercise of its constitutional functions. Privilege of Parliament, such as it is, continues for a convenient time after prorogation and dissolution.

PROPERTY QUALIFICATION of members of the Commons is not now necessary. A Senator must be possessed of \$4000 real and personal estate over and above all liabilities.

Proposation of Parliament, is an interruption of its sittings by Royal authority. All unfinished business terminates and dies with a prorogation. Prorogation never extends beyond forty days, but it may be repeated from time to time by proclamation, and continue to be renewed until it is intended that Parliament shall meet for the despatch of business. The Crown can summon Parliament to meet at any time by giving fourteen days' notice. By the British North America Act, 30 Sec., it is provided that "there shall be a Session of the Canadian Parliament once, at least, every year, so that twelve months shall not intervene between the last sitting," etc.

Public Works, Minister of, has the charge of dams, hydraulic works, the construction and repair of harbours, piers and works for improving the navigation of any water, works for facilitating transmission of timber, roads and bridges, public buildings, vessels, dredges, scows and machinery for the improvement of navigation, telegraph lines and all other property which belong to Canada.

QUALIFICATION OF ELECTORS.—A voter in a Commons election must be of the full age of twenty-one years, a British subject, and otherwise qualified as shewn in the table on page 84.

QUEEN'S PRINTER, is head of the Department of Public Printing and Stationery, and subject to the Secretary of State.

QUEEN'S PRIVY COUNCIL FOR CANADA, THE, is the Council to aid and advise in the Government of Canada. B. N. A. Act, 1867, Sec. 11.

RAILWAYS AND CANALS, MINISTER OF, has the charge and direction of all Govt. railways and canals, and of all works and property appertaining or incident thereto; also of railways and canals placed under his charge and direction by any Act or Order in Council.

REVISING OFFICER, revises and completes, in accordance with the *Electoral Franchise Act* the lists of persons entitled to be registered as voters in the electoral district for which he is appointed. He holds office during good behavior.

ROYAL ASSENT, the Act by which the Crown agrees to a Bill. It is usually given at the end of a session, unless there is urgent necessity for the Act becoming law without loss of time, in which case the Governor-Goneral, or the person administering the Government, comes down to the Senate Chamber, and there, in the presence of both Houses, gives his assent. His Excellency specially manifests his assent to the Supply Bill. Bills to which the Royal Assent is not given are pronounced to be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, and are mentioned in the Official Gazette as having been reserved for Her Majesty's consideration. Unless a reserve is made in the Act itself, so soon as the Royal Assent is given, the Act becomes a Law, and can be proceeded on before any competent Court.

Senate, The, is composed of 78 members appointed by the Crown, distributed as follows: Ontario 24, Quebec 24, Nova Scotia 10, New Brunswick 10, Manitoba 3, British Columbia 3, and P. E. I. 4. A Senator must be a natural born or a naturalized British subject, of the full age of 30 years, resident in the Province for which he is appointed and possessed of real and personal estate to the amount of \$4000 over and above all liabilities. The time for the Ordinary Meeting of the House is 3 p.m., unless some other time shall have previously been ordered. If a quorum is not present at thirty minutes after the time of meeting, the House is adjourned until the next sitting day. Fifteen members, including the Speaker, constitute a quorum. The Speaker of the Senate is an officer appointed by the Crown.

Sergeant at Arms.—This officer, although in attendance on the House of Commons, is appointed by the Crown. It is his duty to obey the commands of the House, to apprehend and take into custody all those who are committed for any offence by the House. All the messengers and servants of the House, except the Clerks, are under his orders. He has a seat within the Bar, and directs all arrangements for the maintenance of order in the approaches thereto, and in the galleries. He is, of course, in immediate attendance upon the Speaker, from whom he takes all orders in connection with his duties. He is assisted by a Deputy.

SPEAKER.—He is the presiding officer of the House. He reads all communications which come from the Queen's Representative or the Senate to the Commons; he has to present and read such addresses and petitions as are carried up to the Governor-General by the whole House, and to deliver the usual speeches, on the part of the Commons, when presenting the Supply Bill, and other Bills calling for peculiar note and remark. Through him all witnesses and prisoners at the Bar of the House are examined, and he directs all arrangements when the House is to be addressed by counsel. It is his duty to deliver the reprimand of the House to any one who has incurred the penalty of receiving it; it is also his duty to issue warrants of committal or release for breach of privilege; to communicate with any parties, when so instructed by the House. It is his duty to closely examine the provisions of Private Bills so as to protect the public against any surprise, or undue encroachment or injury. He controls and regulates the conduct of subordinate officers of the House, and enforces the Rules of the House; he cannot join in any debate unless in Committee of the Whole House. As the presiding officer of the House, he has all the duties attached to such an office. The Speaker is chosen by the members of Parliament, and holds his office until the Parliament in which he is elected is dissolved. Should a member persevere in disobeying the order of the Speaker, and of the House, the Speaker may "name him," a course uniformly followed, as the term implies, by the censure of the House. In extreme cases, the Speaker may order members or others into custody until the pleasure of the House is signified. On divisions, when the numbers happen to be equal, he gives the casting vote, but he never otherwise votes.

State, Secretary of, has charge of the State correspondence, and keeps all State records and papers not specially transferred to other departments. He is Registrar-General and registers all summons, proclamations, commissions, letters patent, writs and other instruments and documents issued under the Great Seal, and all bonds, warrants of extradition, warrants for removal of prisoners, leases, releases, deeds of sale, surrenders, and all other instruments requiring registration. The Department of Public Printing and Stationery is under his control.

STRANGERS may be admitted to the galleries of the House by ticket procured from the Sergeant at Arms. If any member shall take notice that strangers are present, Mr. Speaker, or the Chairman, (as the case may be)

shall forthwith put the question that strangers be ordered to withdraw, without permitting any debate or amendment; provided that Mr. Speaker, or the Chairman, may, whenever he thinks proper, order the withdrawal of strangers.

Supply.—All proceedings which relate to the public income and expenditure must originate with the Commons, and must be begun by resolution moved in Committee of Supply, which is always a Committee of the Whole House. In the course of the session, estimates are submitted to a Committee of Supply, and resolutions moved thereon, granting to the Crown the sums requisite for the management of the various departments of the Government, and the support of various public and private institutions. Such as are confirmed by the Committee of Supply are reported to the House, where they are again reconsidered, and adopted or rejected as the case may be. Upon these a Bill is passed, and this Supply Bill furnishes authority to the Government for disbursing the various sums appropriated. The Senate may reject this or any other Money Bill, but they cannot alter or amend the substance of a Supply or Money Bill; such a course would be regarded as an invasion of the privileges of the House of Commons. Before any Bill can be introduced authorizing the expenditure of any public money, resolutions must be moved in Committee of Supply, agreed to there, reported and confirmed by the House.

Treasury Board, consists of the Ministers of Finance, Customs, Inland Revenue and Justice, the Secretary of State and one of the Ministers composing the Queen's Privy Council nominated by the Governor in Council. The Board acts as a Committee of the Queen's Privy Council in all matters relating to finance, revenue, and expenditure or public accounts referred to it by the Council. The Minister of Finance is Chairman, and the Deputy Minister of Finance is ex officio Secretary of the Board.

WAYS AND MEANS.—As the Committee of Supply relates to the expenditure of the country, so the functions and duties of a Committee of Ways and Means have reference to the funds by which such expenditure is to be met. Loans, duties, taxes, excise and revenue of every description, are submitted to the Committee of Ways and Means. The propositions of Government on this

subject are reduced to resolutions, submitted, considered and decided on, and such as are agreed to are reported to the House. The series of resolutions in com., when reported, is read the first time, pro forma; then the second time, en bloc, (not the first resolution the second time, as formerly the practice in Canada) at which place general discussion of the subject takes place. The resolutions are then read singly, when discussion is confined to the subject matter of each. Those which may be adopted are embodied in a Bill or Bills, and in due course and form become the law of the land. As in the case of Supply Bills, the Senate may reject these Bills, but can not amend them, nor can the Senate insert a pecuniary penalty in any Bill.

Returned at g.e. 1878, but being unseated on petition was re-elected 27 Jan. 1880. Elected for present seat at g.e. 1882, and again at last g.e. A Conservative.—Cornwall, Ont.

Bernier, Michel Esdras, J.P. (St. Hyacinthe.)

Ancestors came from Cape St. Ignace, below Quebec. Youngest s. of the late Etienne Bernier, farmer, St. Hyacinthe, by his wife, Julie Lussier. B. there 28 Sept., 1841, and ed. at the St. Hyacinthe Seminary. M. 28 Nov., 1865, Alida, dau. of the late Simeon Marchesseault, one of the chiefs in the Rebellion of 1837, and who was afterwards exiled to the Bermudas. Admitted to practice as a notary, 15 June, 1867, and is a mem. of the Notarial Board, P.Q. Is engaged in farming, and has been for several years Presdt. of the St. Hyacinthe Agricultural Soc. Has been Secy.-Treas of the Council of the Co. of St. Hyacinthe, since 1864, and of the Council and School Commissioners of the Parish of St. Hyacinthe. Was Official Assignee of the Dist. from 1868 to 1880. Is a Dir. of the Bank of St. Hyacinthe; of the St. Hyacinthe Manufacturing Co., and is a mem. of the firm of N. Bernier & Co., extensive grain and flour dealers. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882 and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal and favors commercial independence and all measures calculated to develop the resources of the country.—St. Hyacinthe, P.Q.

Blake, Hon. Edward, M.A., Q.C., P.C. (West Durham and West Bruce.)

Eld. s. of the late Hon. William Hume Blake, a distinguished jurist of U.C., who sat in the Can. Assem. from 1847 to 1849; was Solicitor-Genl. for U.C. for a short time

in the Lafontaine-Baldwin Administration, and subsequently Chancellor of that Prov., by Catherine Hume, grand-dau. of William Hume, Esq., of Humewood, M.P. for Wicklow, in the British House of Commons; and grand-s. of the late Rev. Dominick Edward Blake (of the family of Blake, of Castlegrove, Galway), Rector of the Kiltegan and of Loughbrickland, and Rural Dean, by Anne Margaret Hume, of Humewood. B. in Tp. of Adelaide, Middlesex, Ont., 13 Oct., 1833. Ed. at Univ. of Toronto, where he took first-class honours in classics and received the degree of M.A., 1858. M. Margaret, dau. of the late Right Rev. B. Cronyn, Lord Bishop of Huron. Called to the Bar U.C. in Michaelmas Term, 1856; apptd. Q.C., 1864. Is ex officio a Bencher of the Law Soc. of Ont., and is Treasurer of that body. Was for a short time one of the examiners in, and lecturers on, Equity Law for the U.C. Law Soc. Is Presdt. of the Toronto General Trusts Co. Elected Chancellor of Toronto Univ., 1876. Returned for South Bruce in Ontario Leg. Assem. at g.e., 1867, and was leader of the Opposition in that body from 1868 until 20 Dec., 1871, when called upon to form a Govt. for Ontario. which he succeeded in doing, accepting for himself the position of Presdt. of the Ex-Council in the same (without salary); resigned the Premiership of Ontario and seat in Assem., 25 Oct., 1872. Sworn of the Privy Council, 7 Nov., 1873, and was a mem. of Mr. Mackenzie's Administration (without office and without salary) from that date until Feb., 1874, when he resigned. Declined the Chancellorship of Ontario, Dec., 1869, and the Chief Justiceship of the Supreme Court of the Dominion, May, 1875. Apptd. Minister of Justice, 19 May, 1875. Resigned, Sept., 1877, and exchanged to the portfolio of Presdt. of Council. Resigned Presidency of Council, 31 Jan., 1878, in consequence of continued ill-health. Visited England on public business, 1876. Returned for South Bruce and for West Durham in Leg. Assem., at g.e., 1871 (elected to sit for former place.) First returned to the Commons for West Durham at g.e, 1867; re-elected by acclamation, and also returned for South Bruce at g.e., 1872 (elected to sit for last-named seat), for which he was again returned at g.e., 1874; re-elected by acclamation on his being apptd. to office, 2 June, 1872. Was a candidate for South Bruce at g.e., 1878, when he was defeated. Elected to present seat on resignation of sitting member, Mr. Burk, 17 Nov., 1879. Re-elected at g.e., 1882 and 1887, for the constituencies of West Durham and West Bruce. Elected leader of the Opposition. 1880. The following statement of Mr. Blake's political views is summarized from his speeches

as a private member: "An Independent Liberal: believes that the basis of the franchise should be widened, and that efficiency instead of influence should be the passport to the public service; thinks political progress essential to political vitality, and advocates the fullest freedom of discussion on all topics affecting the public interests; supports the adoption of a system of proportional representation, whereby, among other improvements, the strength of the various opinions held by the people may be more nearly represented in Parliament; considers that, as the franchise is not merely a right, but a trust, the wilful neglect to vote should be followed by temporary disfranchisement; is opposed to the appointment of Senators for life by the Administration, and desires their selection for a term of years by the Provinces; thinks that the future of Canada depends very largely on the development of the great North-West; advocated the construction, as rapidly as the resources of the country would permit, of the sections of the Pacific Railway necessary for communication between that country and our interior seaboard, in conjunction with an extensive scheme of exploration and colonization; believes that the cultivation of a national spirit is requisite to the success of the Union; that the present form of connection between England and Canada does not possess the element of permanence; that, as the child grows into the man, so the State will come to maturity, and that (notwithstanding the enormous difficulties which surround the scheme) there is a possibility and hope of re-organizing the Empire on a Federal basis, so as to reconcile British connection with British freedom."-84, Grosvenor Street, Toronto: Toronto Club.

Borden, Frederick William, A.B., M.D. (King's, N.S.)

S. of the late Dr. Jonathan Borden, who practiced his profession in King's, his native Co., for thirty years. B. in Cornwallis, King's, N.S., 14 May, 1847. Ed. at King's Coll., Windsor, in Arts, where he took the degree of A.B., 1866; and at Harvard Medical School, Boston, in Medicine, where he graduated M.D., 1868. M., 1 Oct., 1873, Julia M., dau. of J. H. Clark, Esq., of Canning. First returned to Parlt., at g.e. 1874; re-elected at g.e. 1878; an unsuccessful candidate at g.e. 1882; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—Canning, N.S.

Bourassa, François. (St. John's.)

Eldest s. of Capt. Francois Bourassa, farmer of Montebello, P.Q., and brother of M. Napoleon Bourassa, the well known Can. writer and painter. B. at Lacadie, June 1813. Ed. there. M. Feb. 1832, Dlle. Sophia Trahan. A farmer. An unsuccessful candidate for De Lorimier in L.C., Can., 1862. Sat for present seat in Can. Assem. from 1854 until the Union, when returned to Commons; reelected by acclamation at g.e. 1872; again at g.e. 1874; re-elected at g.e, 1878, 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—Lacadie, P.Q.

Bowell, Hon. Lieut.-Col. Mackenzie, J.P., P.C. (North Hastings.)

B. at Rickinghall, Suffolk, Eng., 27 Dec., 1823. Came to Can. with his parents, 1833. M., Dec. 1857, Harriet Louisa, eld. dau. of the late Jacob G. Moore, Esq., of Belleville. Was a Major 49 Batt. of Volunteer Rifles, and served upon the frontier during the American war of 1864, and in 1866, during the Fenian troubles. Has been Vice-Presdt. of the Dominion Editors' and Reporters' Asso,; Vice-Presdt. of the Agricultural and Art Asso. of Ontario; Presdt. of the Hastings Mutual Fire Ins. Co., the Farren Manufacturing Co., the Dominion Safety Gas Co., and Presdt. of the Belleville and North Hastings Railway. Was editor and proprietor of the Belleville Daily and Weekly Intelligencer newspaper for a lengthened period; and has also been Presdt of the Ontario Press Asso. Held the Chairmanship of the Board of School Trustees. Belleville, for eleven years; and was for eight years Grand Master of the Provl. Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario East. Elected Most Worshipful Grand Master and Sovereign of the Orange Asso. of B. A., 1870—an office he continued to hold until he resigned in 1878. Was Presdt. of the Tri-Annual Council of the World. Moved the resolution for the expulsion of Louis Riel from the Commons, which was carried 16 April, 1874. Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of Customs, 19 Oct., 1878. First returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1867; re-elected at g.e., 1872, 1874, 1878, 1882, and at last g.e. A Conservative.—William Street, Belleville; Rideau Club.

BOWMAN, ISAAC ERB. (North Waterloo.)

Descended from a Swiss family that emigrated to Pennsylvania in early part of 18th century. S. of Mr. John B. Bowman, who removed from that State to U.C., 1820. B. in Woolwich, Waterloo, Ont., 1832. Ed. at Rockwood Commercial Academy. Is Presdt. of the Mercantile Fire Insu. Co. Has been Township Clerk and Treasurer of Woolwich, and Local Superintendent of Schools. Sat in Can. Assembly from 1864 until the Union. Returned to the Commons by acclamation at g.e., 1867, at g.e., 1872, and again at g.e., 1874. An unsuccessful candidate at g.e., 1878 and 1882. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—St. Jacob's, Ont.

BOYLE, ARTHUR. (Monck.)

Of Irish parentage. B. in Thorold, Ont., March 1842. M., in Dunnville, Sept. 1868, Annie E. Cormick. Is a dry goods merchant. Was Reeve of Dunnville 1877, 1878 and 1879, and Warden of the Co. of Haldimand in 1878 and 1879. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Monck at the g.e. for Ont. Leg. Assem., 1886. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative; favors legislation of a more stringent character in connection with the Temperance question.—Dunnville, Ont.

Brien, James, M.D. (South Essex.)

Father and mother emigrated from Enniskillen, Irel., in 1846, and settled in Tp. of Howard, Co. of Elgin. B. there 4 Feb., 1848. Ed. in London, Ont., and at the Royal Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons, Kingston, Ont. M., 7 Sept., 1880, Addie, only dau. of Rev. C. Burdette. Was the first Reeve of the village of Essex Centre, and a mem. of the Co. Council of Essex for three years. Has taken an active part in the promotion of agricultural interests, and has been for many years a dir. of various agricultural societies in Essex. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—Essex Centre, Ont.

Brown, Adam. (Hamilton.)

Descended from the Browns of Milntown, Langholm, Dumfries-shire, Scot. B. in Edinburgh, Scot., 3 April, 1826. Ed. at Rev. Dr. Black's Sch. in Montreal. M., 1st, in Hamilton, in 1852, Maria, dau. of the late Capt. Evatt (she died); 2nd, in 1862, Mary, dau. of Thomas Harley Kough, solicitor, Shrewsbury, Eng. Is a member of the firm of Brown, Balfour and Co., wholesale merchants. Was Presdt. of the Hamilton Board of Trade for several years; Presdt. of the Dominion Board of Trade, and

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Chairman of Board of Water Comm'rs. for construction of Hamilton Water Works. Has been Presdt. of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway, and of the Northern and Pacific Junction Railway, and is now a dir. of the latter company. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative, and a staunch advocate of the National Policy.—Hamilton, Ont.

Bryson, John. (Pontiac.)

Eld. s. of the Hon. George Bryson, M.L.C., P.Q (whom see). B. at Fort Coulonge 30 Nov., 1849. M., 30 Dec., 1874, Mary, dau. of the late Thomas Bryson, Esq. (who died in 1881), mem. in Leg. Assem., P.Q., for Pontiac. Is a lumberer and farmer. Has been Mayor of Mansfield since 1882. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, and reelected at last g.e. A Conservative. Fort Coulonge, PQ.

BURDETT, SAMUEL BARTON, LL.D. (East Hastings.)

Grands. of U. E. Loyalist settlers in the Co. of Prince Edward, Ont. B. in the Tp. of Tyendinaga, Co. of Hastings, 30 Sept., 1843. Ed. at Albert Coll., Belleville. M., 13 April 1870, Tryphena, dau. of D. D. Wright. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1869. Took the Law Course in Albert Coll. and obtained degree of LL.D. in 1879. Is Dean of the Faculty of Law and Examiner and Lecturer in Commercial Law in Albert Coll. Represents this Coll. in the Senate of the Univ. of Toronto. Was a promoter and a dir. of the Belleville and North Hastings Railway. Has been a mem. of the Town Council, Belleville and chairman of Committees. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—Belleville, Ont.

Burns, Kennedy Francis. J. P. (Gloucester)

B. at Thomastown, Tipperary, Irel. 8 Jan. 1842. Ed. at Halifax and St. John. M. 24 Sept. 1864, at Bathurst, Harriet, dau. of John McKenna, Esq. A merchant and millowner. Served in the Vol. Militia Force for a number of years and retired with the rank of Captain, in 1874. Sat for present seat in Leg. Assem., N.B., from 1874 to 1878. First returned to the Commons at g. e. 1882 and re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—Bathurst, N.B.

CAMERON, HUGH, M.D., J.P. (Inverness.)

Family camo from Fort William, Inverness-shire, Scot. B. in the Co. of Antigonish, N.S., 18 March 1836. M., Nov. 1865, Eunice, fifth dau. of Hon. John McKinnon, M. L. C., Antigonish. Graduated M. D. at Univ. of Philadelphia, March, 1861, and at the School of Practical Obstetrics, same city, Aug., 1861. Represented Inverness in the Commons from g. e. 1867, until 1872. Sat in the L.C., N.S., from March 1879 to May 1882, when he resigned. Re-elected to the Commons at g. e. 1882 and again at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—Mabou, N.S.

CAMPBELL, ARCHIBALD. (Kent, Ont.)

Grandf. the late Malcolm Campbell, came from Argyleshire, Scot. about 1812 and settled in New York State. Removed with his family in 1830 to the Tp. of Howard, Co. of Kent. B. in the Tp. of Howard, 27 April, 1846. Ed. at the Common and High Schs. of the Co. M., 8 Feb. 1871, Miss Burk of Colona, California. Is a merchant miller. Has been a mem. of the Town Council of Chatham for several years, Deputy Reeve of Chatham, in the Co. Council, and chairman of the Finance Committees. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal, and a believer in the opinions of Hon. Edward Blake on the public questions of the day as enunciated by him from various public platforms.—Chatham, Ont.

CAMPBELL, JOHN. (Digby.)

Great grandf. Colin Campbell, of the Barcaldine family, b. at Inverary, Scot.; emigrated to New York and thence to N. S. at the Am. Revolution, and sat for 25 years in the N. S. Legislature. Grandf. was Registrar of Deeds at Digby. Father late Hon. Colin Campbell, sat from 1854 to 1867, and 1874 to 1878 in N. S. Assem. and was one of the mem. by whose vote N. S. was brought into Confederation. B. at Weymouth, N. S. 16 July 1849. Ed. there, and at Abbey Park Institution and St. Andrews, Fifeshire, Scot. M. in London, Eng., 13 July, 1871, Emma Harriet Mundy of Etwall, Derbyshire. Was in business in London, Eng. from 1871 to 1882. Is now a merchant. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Weymouth, N.S.

Campbell, Robert, J. P. (South Renfrew.)

Eldest s. of the late Dugald Campbell, a native of Argyleshire, and Isabella McLaren, of Killin, Perthshire, Scot. B. at Glenurquart, Scot., 20 March 1818, and came with his parents to Can. and settled in Lochiel, Co. of Glengarry, Ont., in 1820. M. at Hawkesbury, 16 Jan. 1845, Elizabeth, youngest dau of the late Adam Lothian, Esq., of the Tp. of Lochiel. Commenced lumbering early in life and was for many years manager of the extensive lumbering business on the Bonnechere River, of the late John Egan, Esq. Is senior partner of the firm of Robert Campbell & Son, lumberers. Is a J.P., and has been a Municipal Councillor. Was an unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g. e. 1878. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1882 and re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal and opposed to the policy of the Govt. of Sir J. A. Macdonald.— Eganville, Ont.

CARGILL, HENRY. (East Bruce.)

Father and mother, natives of the Co. of Antrim, Irel., settled in the Co. of Halton, Ont., about 60 years ago. B. in the Tp. of Nassagaweya, Co. of Halton, and ed. there and at Queen's Coll., Kingston, Ont. M. 13 Mar., 1864, Margaret Davidson, Co. of Halton. Is a manufacturer of lumber and general merchant. Has been postmaster of Cargill. Is Reeve of the Tp. of Greenock. First returned to Commons at last g. e. Resigned, and was reelected 2 April 1887. A Conservative.—Cargill, Ont.

CARLING, Hon. John, P. C. (London.)

Youngest s. of Thomas Carling, Esq., of London, Ont., a native of Yorkshire, England, who came to Canada in 1818, and settled in Middlesex, Ont., 1819. B. in the Tp. of London, Middlesex, 23 Jan. 1828. Ed. at the Common Sch. there. M., Hannah, eldest dau. of the late Henry Dalton, Esq., of London, Ont. Was a mem. of the firm of Carling & Co., brewers, London, a dir. of the Great Western Railway for a number of years, and also a dir. of the London, Huron & Bruce and London and Port Stanley Railways. Elected a Water Commr. for London in 1878, and subsequently appointed a Chairman of the Board. Was returned as a mem. for London to the Can. Assem., 18 Dec., 1857, and held the seat continuously from that time until Confederation. Was Receiver General of Can. in 1862. Was elected in Aug. 1867 for the

Commons, and held the seat up to the g. e. 1874; and also returned to the Leg Assem. Oct. 1867, holding the portfolio of Minister of Agriculture and Public Works in the Sandfield Macdonald Govt. from July 1867 until December 1871, when the Gov. was defeated and retired from office. Sworn of the Privy Council and was Postmaster General from 23 May, 1882, until 25 Sept., 1885, when he became Minister of Agriculture. Re-elected to Commons at g. e. 1878, 1882, and again at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative. —London, Ont.; Rideau Club.

Carpenter, Major Franklin Metcalfe, (South Wentworth.)

Grandfather, a native of Eng. after emigrating to the United States came to Can. with the U. E. Loyalists and settled in the Tp. of Saltfleet, Ont. B. there 31 Jan. 1843, and ed. at the Public Sch. M., 24 Nov. 1880, Catherine H., dau. of John A. Gairdner, of Orono. Is a farmer. Has been a Municipal Councillor, Reeve of Saltfleet and Warden of the Co. of Wentworth. Entered 77th Wentworth Batt. V. M. as Lieut., May 1872, and was promoted to be Major 17 Mar. 1882. Was elected for South Wentworth at g. e. June 1879 but was unseated on petition. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—

Caron, Hon. Sir Joseph Philippe Rene Adolphe, K.C.M.G., Q.C., P.C. (Quebec County.)

Eld. surviving s. of the late Hon. R. E. Caron, Lieut. Governor of the Prov. of Quebec. Born in the City of Quebec, 1843. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec, at Laval Univ. and at McGill Univ., at which last institution he graduated B. C. L. 1865. M., 25 June, 1867, Alice, only dau. of the late Hon. François Baby, who represented Stadacona division in L. C. of Can. for several years. Studied law with L. G. Baillargé, Esq., Q. C., and subsequently with Hon. (now Sir) John Rose, Bart., and was called to the Bar, L. C., 1865. Appt. a Q. C. 19 May, 1879. Is a member of the extensive law firm of Andrews, Caron & Andrews, Quebec. Was a dir. of the Stadacona Bank. Was Vice-Presdt. of the Literary and Historical Soc. of Quebec, 1867. Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of Militia, 9 Nov. 1880. Created a K.C.M.G., 25 Augt. 1885 in recognition of his services in aiding in the suppression of the North-west Rebellion 1885, while Minister of Militia. An unsuccessful candidate for Bellechasse at g. e. 1872. First returned to Parlt. March 1873;

re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1874 and again returned at g. e. 1878. Re-elected by acclamation on appointment to office. Re-elected at g. e. 1882 and again at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—Daly Street, Ottawa; Toronto Club; Rideau Club; St. James Club; Quebec Garrison Club.

Cartwright, *Hon. Sir Richard John, K. C. M. G., P. C. (South Oxford.)

S. of the late Rev. R. D. Cartwright, Chaplain to the Forces at Kingston; and grands. of Hon. Richard Cartwright, a U. E. loyalist, who was a mem. of the first Parlt. of U. C., which met in 1792, and continued to hold a seat in that body until his death, 1815. B. at Kingston 4 Dec., 1835. M., Aug. 1859, Frances, eld. dau. of the late Col. Alex. Lawe, H. E. I. C. S. Was Presdt. of the late Commercial Bank of Can. Author of a pamphlet on the Militia question (1864). Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of Finance of Can., 7 Nov., 1873, which position he held until the resignation of Mr. Mackenzie's administration, Oct. 1878. Proceeded to England on public business, 1874 and 1875, and again in 1876. Sat for Lennox and Addington in Can. Assem. from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons for Lennox at g. e. 1867; again at g. e. 1872; again on his appt. to office; and by acclamation at g. e. 1874. An unsuccessful candidate at g. e. 1878, elected for Huron on resignation of Mr. Horton, the sitting mem., 2 Nov. 1878. An unsuccessful candidate for Wellington County at g. e. 1880. Returned by acclamation for South Huron on the resignation of the sitting mem., Mr. McMillan, Dec. 1883. Re-elected at g. e. 1887. Created a K. C. M. G., 1879. A Liberal.—King Street, Kingston, Ont.; Rideau Club.

CASEY, GEORGE ELLIOTT, B.A., J.P. (West Elgin.)

S. of the late William Casey, Esq., of Southwold, Elgin, Ont., and formerly of Westmeath, Irel., by Sarah, dau. of the late Geo. Elliott, Esq., a native of Omagh, Irel., who came to Elgin, then a portion of the Talbot Settlement, in 1817, and took a prominent part in local affairs. B. in Southwold, March 1850. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. Thomas, and at the Univ. of Toronto, where he graduated [with honors in classics] June 1871. M., 27 Dec., 1877, Sarah Isabella, dau. of the late Jas. L. Biggar, M.P. Is Presdt. of the Chess Asso. of Can. and of the Star Loan Co. of St. Thomas, Ont., and a mem. of the Council of the Dominion Rifle Asso. First returned to

Parlt. at g.e., 1872; re-elected at g.e., 1874, 1878, 1882, and again at last g.e. Was Govt. whip under the Mackenzie Administration. Began agitation for Civil Service Reform in the English Competitive System in 1875, and has succeeded in getting his plan endorsed by the several Committees dealing with the subject, as well as by the Civil Service Commission of 1880. Introduced Bill in 1879 to avert trouble arising from irregular dealing with ballots by Returning Officers. A Reformer.—Fingal, Ont.

CASGRAIN, PHILIPPE BABY. (L'Islet.)

Descended from an ancient French family, originally belonging to Airvault, in Poeton, France, a member of which came here in the early years of French settlement in Canada, served in the French Army, and became possessed of the Seigniories of La Bouteillerie, St. Denis and L'Islet de Bonsecours. S. of the late Hon. Charles Eusèbe Casgrain, who sat for Cornwallis in L. C. Assem. from 1830 to 1834; was a mem. of the Special Council of L.C. from 1838 to 1840, and at his death held the office of Asst. Commr. of Public Works, Can.; by Anne Elizabeth, dau. of the late Hon. James Baby, at one time Speaker of the L.C. of U.C. B. in the city of Quebec, 1827. Ed. at Ste. Anne College. M., 1854, Matilde, dau. of the late Col. Perrault, and grand-dau. of the late F. X. Perrault, for many years Prothonotary of the Dist. of Quebec. Called to the Bar L.C., 1850. Was Deputy Prothonotary of Superior Court, Quebec, for thirteen years, up to 1872, when he resigned to enter Parlt. Author of Letellier de St. Just et son temps, a sketch of Canadian politics for the last forty years. First returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1872; reelected by acclamation at g.e., 1874. Re-elected at g.e., 1878, 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal in the true English sense; favours Political Independence, unless the colonies have a more direct influence in the councils of the British Empire.—Collins Street, Quebec.

Chapleau, Hon. Joseph Adolphe, Q.C., LL.D., P.C. (Terrebonne.)

Ancestors came from France, and were early settlers in the Seigniory of Terrebonne. B. at Ste. Thérèse de Blainville, Terrebonne, P.Q., 9 Nov., 1840. Ed. at the Coll. of Terrebonne and at St. Hyacinthe. M., 25 Nov., 1874, Marie Louise, dau. of Lt.-Col. King, Sherbrooke. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1861. Created Q.C., 1873. Created a Commander of the Legion of Honor (France), 10 Nov.,

1882, and of the Order of St. Gregory the Great (Roman) A dir. of the Pontiac and Pacific Junction Railway Co., and of Le Crédit Foncier Franco-Canadien. Has been a Professor of the Laval Univ. (Criminal Jurisprudence) and is now Professor of International Law in the section established in Montreal. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Solicitor-General from 27 Feb., 1873, until 8 Sept., 1874, when the Government resigned. Apptd. Prov. Secy. and Registrar 27 Jan., 1876, which position he held until the dismissal of Govt. by Letellier de St. Just, 1878. Became leader of the Conservative Opposition, and was called upon to form a Govt., when Mr. Joly resigned, on the 30 Oct., 1879. Was Premier and Minister of Railways and of Agriculture and Public Works until he resigned to enter the Dominion Government. Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Secy. of State of Can., in succession to Hon. J. A. Mousseau, who succeeded him as Premier of P.Q., 29 July, 1882. Apptd. a Commr. 4 July, 1884, and proceeded to B.C. for the purpose of investigating and reporting on Chinese Immigration into Canada. Unsuccessfully contested Verchères for House of Commons at g.e., 1872. First returned to Leg. Assem. for Terrebonne, by acclamation, at g.e., 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e., 1871, and again on his appt. to office in 1873. Again returned at g.e., 1875, and by acclamation. on his second appt. to office in the De Boucherville Govt. in 1876. Re-elected at g.e., 1878, also on accepting office in 1879, and again at g.e., 1881. Elected for Terrebonne in the House of Commons, 23 Aug., 1882, and again at g.e., 1887. A Conservative.—Windsor Hotel, Montreal; St. James Club; Quebec Garrison Club; Rideau Club; 160 Cooper Street, Ottawa.

CHARLTON JOHN. (North Norfolk.)

Father came from Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Eng., in 1824. B. near Caledonia, N.Y., 3 Feb., 1829. Ed. in New York. Came to Can. with his father's family, in 1849, from Ellicottville, N.Y., where his father had been for many years in the employ of the Holland Land Co. M., 1 Nov., 1854, Miss Ella Gray. Is a timber and lumber dealer, and carries on business in Canada, Michigan and New York. First returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1872; reelected at g.e., 1874, 1878, 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—Lyndoch, Ont.

CHISHOLM, DONALD. (New Westminster, B.C.)

Parents came from Inverness-shire, Scot., and settled on the Lower South River of Antigonish, N.S., about the beginning of present century. B. there 1822, and ed. there. Unmarried. Went to California in 1849, and to B. C. in 1858. Was for some years a merchant in New Westminster, and has been President of the Board of Trade. First returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1887. A Liberal Conservative.—New Westminster, B.C.

CHOQUETTE, PHILLIPPE AUGUSTE, LL.B. (Montmagny.)

Ancestors came from Amiens, Picardie, France, in 1643, and settled at Varennes, Co. of Verchères. S of Joseph Choquette and Marie T. Audet, his wife. B. at Beleil, Co. of Verchères, in 1854. Ed. at St. Hyacinthe Coll. and at Laval Univ., where he graduated B.C.L. in 1880, having previously taken the Silver Medal given by the Governor-General. M., 29 Aug., 1883, Marie, dau. of A. Bender, Prothonotary, and a grand-d. of the late Sir E. P. Taché. Is in practice as an advocate. Has been for some years a contributor to the newspaper press, and publishes Le Sentinelle newspaper. Was an unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e., 1882. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal and a Free-trader.—Montmagny, Q.

CIMON, SIMON XAVIER. (Charlevoix.)

Third s. of the late Hubert Cimon, Esq., merchant, Murray, Bay, P.Q. B. there 3 Dec., 1829. Ed. in Quebec. M., 9 Nov., 1848, Marie Claire, dau. of the late Pierre Garon, Esq., M.P., of Rivière Ouelle. A contractor, and built the Provl. Parlt. Buildings in Quebec and other works. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e., 1867, defeated at g.e., 1872. An unsuccessful candidate for same seat in Leg. Assem., P.Q., at g.e., 1875; and again in 1879 on the death of the sitting mem., Mr. P. A. Tremblay. Re-elected to Commons 19 March, 1881, on the sitting mem. being unseated, and re-elected at g.e., 1882, and again at last g.e. A Conservative, but opposed to the Govt. of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—Murray Bay, P.Q.

. CLAYES, GEORGE. (Mississquoi.)

S. of the Rev. Dana Clayes. B. in the State of New Hampshire, in 1831, and came to Bedford, Can., with his

uncle, George Clayes, in 1846. Left Can in 1850 for Cleveland, Ohio, where he was in mercantile business for some years. Subsequently removed to Omaha, Nebraska, and while there was twice elected a mem. of the State Legislature. Returned to Bedford, 1866. M. his cousin Miss Sophia Clayes. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e., 1878 and 1882. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—Bedford, P.Q.

COCKBURN, GEORGE RALPH RICHARDSON. (Centre Toronto.)

B. in Edinburgh, Scot., 15 Feb., 1834. M., 1866. Mary, dau. of Hampden Zane, Esq., of Kentucky, U.S. Ed. at the High Sch. and at the Univ. of Edinburgh, where he graduated in 1857 with the highest classical honours, carrying off the Stratton Prize. Continued his classical studies in Germany under Prof. Zumpt. Engaged for some years as a classical teacher at Merchiston Castle Academy and at Montgreenan House Academy. Came to Can. in 1858 to assume the Rectorship of the Model Grammar School for U.C. Was apptd. in 1861 Principal of Upper Canada Coll., Toronto, where he continued for nearly twenty years, after which he travelled through Europe during two years, acquainting himself with the various systems of Government. Is Presdt. of the Toronto Land and Investment Corporation, and a Dir. of the Ontario Bank; the London and Canadian Loan and Agency Co.; the Building and Loan Asso., and of the Glasgow and London Insur. Co. Was a mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of Toronto for twenty years. First returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1887. A Conservative.—Toronto; Toronto Club; Rideau Club, Ottawa.

Colby, Charles Carroll. (Stanstead.)

Paternal ancestors emigrated from Chester, Eng., to New Hampshire, before the Am. revolutionary war. S. of the late Dr. F. M. Colby, a well-known medical practitioner, who came to Stanstead, 1832, and represented that county in L. C. Assem. from 1834 until the suspension of the Constitution, 1837. B. at Derby, Vt., 10 Dec., 1827. Came to Canada with his parents in 1832. Graduated at Dartmouth, Coll., N.H., July, 1847. M., Dec. 1858, Miss Harriet Child, of Waybridge, Vt. Called to the Bar L.C. 1855. A director of the Massawippi Railway; of the Crown Mining Co; and of the Waterloo and Magog Railway. Was Vice-Presdt. of the Quebec Temperance and Prohibitory League, 1872. First returned to Parlt, at g.e. 1867; re-elected

by acclamation at g.e. 1872, and again at g.e. 1874; reelected at g. e. 1878 and 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Stanstead, P.Q.

COOK, HERMAN HENRY. (East Simcoe.)

Fifth s. of the late Capt. George Cook, a U.E. Loyalist; nephew of Capt. John Cook, who represented Dundas in the U.C. Assem. from 1829 until Responsible government was obtained, when he resigned; brother of J. W. Cook, Esq., who represented Dundas in the Can. Assem. from 1857 until 1861; and brother of S. S. Cook, Esq., who lately represented the same Co. in the Ont. Assem. B. in Tp. of Williamsburg, Dundas, Ont., 26 April, 1837. at Iroquis Grammar School. M., 1861, Miss White. A lumber merchant. An unsuccessful candidate for North Simcoe in Leg. Assem. at g.e. 1871. First returned to Commons for North Simcoe at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874. Unseated on petition, 11 Nov. 1874; re-elected 23 Dec., same year. Elected for East Simcoe in Leg. Assem. at g.e. 1879, but resigned 1882. Elected for present seat in the Commons at g.e., 1882, and re-elected at the last g.e. A Reformer.—200 Dowling's Avenue, Parkdale, Ont.

Costigan, Hon. John, J.P., P.C. (Victoria, N.B.)

B. at St. Nicholas, P.Q., 1 Feb. 1835. Ed. at St. Ann's Coll. M., 1855, Harriet, dau. of Mr. J. R. Ryan, of Grand Falls, N.B. Has been Registrar of Deeds for Victoria, and Judge of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas, N.B. Sat for present seat in N.B. Assem. from 1861 to 1866, when defeated. Returned to Commons at the Union; re-elected at g.e. 1872, 1878, 1882, and again at last g.e. Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of Inland Revenue 23 May, 1882. Moved an address, 20 May, 1872, praying His Excellency to disallow the N.B. School Act, on the ground "that said law is unjust, and causes much uneasiness among the Roman Catholic population;" and on 14 May, 1873, "that the Govt. should advise His Excellency to disallow the Acts passed by the N.B. Legislature," which was carried. On 6 May, 1874, moved for an address to Her Majesty, praying to cause an Act to be passed amending the B. N. A. Act 1867, by providing that every religious denomination in N.B. shall continue to possess and enjoy all such rights with regard to their schools as they possessed and enjoyed at the time of the passage of said Act, etc., which motion was subsequently withdrawn. On 8 March, 1875, moved resolution praying for the passage of an Act amending the B. N. A. Act, by providing that the Roman Catholic inhabitants of N. B. shall have the same rights, privileges, etc., as to separate and dissential schools, etc., as are enjoyed and possessed by the Roman Catholic minority of Ontario and the Protestant minority of Quebec, which, after amendment, was carried. In session 1877 moved for an inquiry into the case of Prof. O'Donoghue, charged with having aided in the North-West Rebellion. In session of 1882, moved and carried, an address to Her Majesty passed on the "Costigan Irish Resolutions" praying that she would grant Home Rule Government to Irel., for the release of the "suspects" and other ameliorations. A Conservative.—Grand Falls, N.B. Rideau Club, Ottawa.

Coughlin, Timothy. (North Middlesex.)

S. of Daniel Coughlin, of the Co. of Cork, Ireland, who emigrated to Canada in 1832, and settled in the Tp. of Yarmouth, Co. Elgin, and from there removed to the Township of Stephen, Co. Huron, in 1846, where he still resides. B. in Tp. of Yarmouth, Co. Elgin, 8 Jan. 1834. Ed. in the Common Schools of the Townships of Yarmouth and Westminister. M., 22 May, 1870, Mary Ann, dau. of Michael Glavin, of the Tp. of Biddulph, Co. Middlesex. Is a farmer. Was Tp. Treasurer of Stephen for 15 years, and is now Reeve of same Tp. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1878; re-elected at g.e. 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Offa, P.O., Co. Huron, Ont.

Coulombe, Charles Jeremie, M.D. (Maskinongé.)

B. at St. Cuthbert, Co. of Berthier, P.Q., 1846. Ed. at the Coll. of L'Assomption. M., 1879, Marie Noémi Bernier. Is a practising physician. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—St. Justin. P.Q.

Coursol, Michel Joseph Charles, Q.C. (Montreal East.)

S. of the late M. Michel Coursol, an Officer of the Hudson's Bay Co., by Marie Mélanie, dau. of M. Joseph Quesnel, the well-known Canadian poet and dramatist. B. at Amherstburg, Ont., 3 Oct. 1819. Ed. at the Montreal Coll. M. the daughter of the late Hon. Sir Etienne Taché, who was on two occasions Prime Minister of Canada. Studied law with C. S. Cherrier, Esq., Q.C., who subsequently became his step-father, and was called to the Bar, 1841; apptd. a Q.C., 1873; apptd. Joint Coroner

for the Dist. of Montreal, 30 June, 1848; Inspector and Superintendent of Police for City of Montreal, 2nd Feb., 1856; Judge of the Sessions of the Peace for Montreal 1870; a Commr. under 31 Vic. ch. 94, 23 Nov. 1869; and Commr. of Police for the Dominion, same date. Was a Commr. apptd. to inquire into the state of the Montreal Registry Office, 23 April, 1850; and has held the Office of Mayor of Montreal. Created a Knight of the Order of Charles III. of Spain, 1872. Resigned Judgeship, Sept. 1878, in order to contest Montreal East for the Commons, in which he was successful. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1882 and 1887. A Conservative.—"Souvenir," Dorchester Street, Montreal; St. James Club, Montreal.

COUTURE, PAUL. (Chicoutimi and Saguenay.)

B. at St. Chosle, Co. Bellechasse, 15 April, 1833. Ed. in Quebec. M. 10 June, 1857, Philomène Boulanger. Is a farmer. First returned to Parlt at last g. e. An Independent.—Notre Dame Laterrière, P. Q.

Curran, John Joseph, Q.C., B.C.L., LL.D. (Montreal Centre.)

S. of the late Charles Curran, a native of Co. Down, and Sarah Kennedy, Co. Wexford, Irel., who came to Canada early in the present century. B. in Montreal, 22 Feb. 1842. Ed. at. St. Mary's Coll. Montreal, and at Ottawa Univ. Graduated B.C.L. at McGill Coll. 1862. M., in 1865, Mary Elizabeth, youngest dau. of the late Mr. Patrick Brennan, Montreal. Called to the Bar, P. Q., March, 1863, and apptd. a Q.C., 20 Jan., 1882. The Manhattan Coll., N.Y., under the presidency of Cardinal McCloskey, conferred the degree of LL.D. on him, June 1881. Has been a frequent contributor to the magazines, periodicals and newspaper press. Is Presdt. of the Alumni Asso. of the Ottawa Univ. Unsuccessfully contested Shefford for the Commons at g.e. 1874. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—

Daly, Thomas Mayne. (Se!kirk.)

S. of the late T. M. Daly, Stratford, Ont., who represented Co. of Perth in the Leg. Assem. of Can., from 1854 to 1863, and North Perth in the House of Commons and Ontario Assem. at different times from the Union to 1875. B. at Stratford, Ont., 16 Aug., 1852. Ed. at Upper Canada Coll., Toronto. M., 4 June, 1879, Margaret Annabella,

dau. of P. R. Jarvis, Esq., Stratford. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1876, and practises his profession in Manitoba. Was a Town Councillor of Stratford 1880-81, and a mem. of and subsequently Chairman of the Public School Board. Removed to Man. July 1881. Elected first Mayor of the City of Brandon, 1882, and re-elected 1884; Chairman of the Western Judicial Dist. Board of Man. 1884; a Bencher of the Law Soc. of Man.; member of the Protestant Board of Education for Man.; Vice-Presdt. for Selkirk of the Liberal Conservative Union of Man., and Presdt. of the Liberal Conservative Assoc. of the Co. of Brandon. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, but opposed to the disallowance of charters for lines of railway incorporated by the Leg. Assem. of Man.—Brandon, Man.; Rideau Club.

DAOUST, JEAN BAPTISTE. (Two Mountains.)

S. of J. B. Daoust, Esq., by L. St. Germain. B. 18 Jan., 1817, at St. Eustache. M., 10 Jan., 1842, Miss Z. St. Maurice, dau. of J. St. Maurice, Esq., of St. Laurent. Apptd. Magistrate and Commissioner of Small Causes, and has held various municipal offices. Elected by acclamation in 1854 for Two Mountains to the Leg. Assem. of Canada, which seat he held from that date until the Confederation of B.N.A. Provinces in 1867, when he was elected to the Commons by acclamation, and continued to hold the seat until 1872, when he retired a short time from political life. Held the position of Deputy Warden of Penitentiaries of the Prov. of Quebec for three years. Re-elected to the Commons, 11 March, 1876, by acclamation, on the resignation of Mr. Globensky, the sitting member. Re-elected at g.e. 1878, and by acclamation at g.e. 1882. at last g.e. A Conservative.-St. Eustache.

DAVIES, LOUIS HENRY, Q.C. (Queen's, P.E.I.)

S. of Hon. Benjamin Davies, M.P.P., and grands of Nathan Davies. Esq., who came to P.E.I. about 1812. B. in Charlottetown, P.E.I., 4 May, 1845. Ed. at the Central Academy and Prince of Wales Coll. M. at St. Eleanors, P.E.I., July 1872, Susan, fourth dau. of the late Dr. A. V. G. Wiggins. Called to the Bar, P.E.I., 1866, and apptd. a Q.C., 26 Nov., 1880. Is a dir. of the Merchant's Bank of P.E.I. Was counsel for the tenantry before the P.E.I. Land Commission, presided over by the Right Hon. H. C. Childers, and was one of the Canadian counsel before the International Fishery Commission at Halifax, 1877. Was

Solicitor Genl., 1869, and again in 1872–73. Was leader of the Opposition in the Leg. Assem. until Sept. 1876, he became Premier and Attorney Genl. His Administration resigned March, 1879. Sat in Leg. Assem. P.E.I., from Nov. 1872 until g.e. 1879, when he was defeated. First returned to Commons at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—Water Street, Charlottetoun, P.E.I.

DAVIN, NICHOLAS FLOOD. (Assiniboia, West, N. W.T.)

Descended from an Irish family settled in Tipperary for some generations. B. at Kilfinare, 13 Jan., 1843. Ed. at the Common Sch.; by private tuition; at a Coll. affiliated to London Univ., and afterwards at Queen's Coll., Cork. Called to the English Bar by the Hon. Soc. of the Middle Temple, Hilary Term, 1868. Is a journalist. Was sent by the Canadian Govt. to Washington, U.S., 1879, to inquire into the system of management of Indian Industrial Schools. Was Secy. to the Royal Commission respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway, 1880–81, and Secy. to the Commission apptd. in 1884 to enquire into the Chinese Immigration question. Was a Delegate to Ottawa in 1884 to represent the requirements of the N. W. before the Domin. Govt. An unsuccessful candidate for Haldimand in the Commons at g.e. 1878. First returned to Commons at last g.e. A Conservative, and favors a broad and generous policy for developing and peopling the North-West.—Regina, N.W.T.; Albany Club, Toronto.

DAVIS, DONALD WATSON. (Alberta, N.W.T.)

Father and mother natives of the State of Vermont, but of English and Scotch descent. B. in the town of Londonderry, State of Vermont, 1849, and ed. there. Settled in Macleod about 1870. M., 1887, Lillie, dau. of James Griev, Esq., J.P. Is a merchant and general stock dealer. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Macleod, Dist. of Alberta.

DAWSON, SIMON JAMES, C.E. (Algoma.)

Connected on both father's and mother's side with old historic Scotch families; maternal grandfather, for a long period, heir representative to the estates and honors of the ancient house of Glengarry. B. in Scot. Ed. there. Came to Canada when young. A Civil Engineer. Apptd. by the Govt., 1851, to plan and superintend the construction of extensive works then contemplated on the St. Maurice,

to open up the vast pine regions of that river and its tributaries, which works he carried out successfully. Apptd., 1857, to explore the country from Lake Superior westward to the Saskatchewan, and report upon its adaptability for settlement, and the practicability of opening up communications therewith. The reports of his explorations while in this service drew general attention to the N. W. Territories, at that time but little known, and did much to dispel the then prevalent idea that they were in great part sterile, and to a large extent within the regions of perpetual frost, as had been asserted by different writers, who, in the interests of the fur traders, wished to exclude settlement. Resigned the office after completing the reports, and carried on business for some years as a timber merchant on the St. Maurice. In 1868, called upon by the Govt, to commence the construction of the route to Red River, now known as the "Dawson Route;" and, in 1870, although but comparatively little had been done, owing to the limited means appropriated therefor, put through the Red River expeditionary force under Sir Garnet (now Gen. Lord) Wolseley, when all other means of reaching the country to subdue the insurrection had proved unavailing. Was joint Commr., with Lt. Gov. of Manitoba and the Indian Commr. of the North-West, in concluding a treaty with the Salteaux tribe of the Ojibbeway Indians, 1873. Resigned charge of the Dawson Route on becoming a candidate for Algoma, for which he was returned at g. e. for Ont. 1874-5. Resigned his seat in the Leg. Assem., and was returned for the Common at g. e. 1878. Re-elected at g. e. 1882, and again at last g. e. Independent in politics, but elected as a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald's Govt. Has stated in the Legislature that, in his opinion, it would be to the advantage of the Dominion that the great central region known as Algoma, extending from the 81st to 95th meridian, that is, from French River to the Lake of the Woods should be formed into a separate Province.—Port Arthur; Queen's Hotel, Toronto; Toronto Club; Russell House, Ottawa.

Denison, Lieut. Col. Frederick Charles, C.M.G., (West Toronto.)

Second S. of the late Colonel George Taylor Denison, of Rusholme, Toronto. B. 22 Nov., 1846. Ed. at Upper Can. College. M., 22 April, 1874, Julia, second dau. of the late O. T. Macklem, of Chippewa, Ont. Called to the Bar of Ont., 1870. Was an Alderman of the City of Toronto from 1878 to 1884. Served as a Lieutenant in the Admin-

istrative Batt., V.M.; on service at Niagara in 1865, and on 20 Aug. of same year was Gazetted Cornet in the Gov. General's Body Guard, in which capacity he served during the Fenian Raid of 1866 on the Niagara Frontier. as Orderly Officer to Sir Garnet (now Lord) Wolseley in the Red River Expedition of 1870 and was mentioned in despatches. Apptd. Captain in 1872, Major in 1876 and Lieut. Colonel in 1884. Went to Egypt in command of the Canadian Voyageurs employed by the Imperial Govt. in the campaign in the Soudan for the relief of General Gordon, and while accompanying General Earle's column, took part in the battle of Kirbekan, (received Egyptian medal and two clasps), was mentioned in despatches by Lord Wolselev and for his services in the campaign was made a C. M. G. Is the author of the Historical Record of the Governor General's Body Guard, and is a Fellow of the Royal Historical Soc. of Eng. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Holme House, Rusholme Road, Toronto: Rideau Club.

DE SAINT GEORGES, JOSEPH ESDRAS ALFRED, B.C.L., M,D., (Portneuf.)

Third s. of the late Laurent Aurez de St. Georges, Esq., N. P., of Cape Santé by Adelaine, dau. of the late George W. Allsopp, Esq., Seigneur of Jacques Cartier and d'Auteuil, who for many years represented Portneuf (then Hampshire) in the L. C. Assem., and grand-dau. of the late Hon. Geo. Allsopp. Provl. Sec'y of the Prov. of Quebec. B. at Cape. Santé, 4 Aug., 1849. M., 2 Feb., 1875, Laura, dau. of Hon. Isidore Thibaudeau, of Quebec. Graduated as M. D. at Univ. of Vic. Guillaume d'Upton, 24 July 1877, Marie, dau. of Francis Maher, Esq., merchant. Called to the Bar of P. Q. 1879. Has been a J. P. for the dist. of Three Rivers and Presdt. of the Agricultural Soc. of St. Maurice since 1878. Was editor of Le Constitutionnel, 1875; one of the editors of Le Canadien, 1875-7, and of Le Foyer Domestique, 1878; chief editor of Le Messenger de Nicolet, 1882-4, and one of the editors of Le Journal des Trois-Rivières. Sat in Leg. Assem. Quebec from 1878 to 1881. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Yamachiche, P.Q.

DESJARDINS, ALPHONSE. (Hochelaga.)

Family settled in Can. before the cession to Eng. B. at Terrebonne, P.Q., 6 May 1841. Ed. at Masson Coll. and the Seminary of Nicolet. M. 1st, 19 May, 1864, Virginie, eld. dau. of the late Hubert Paré, Esq. (she d. Feb. 15, 1879); 2nd, 24 May 1880, Hortense, dau. of Jos. Barsalou, Esq., Montreal. Called to the Bar, L. C., 1862, and practised his profession in Montreal until 1868, when he abandoned law for journalism, and became one of the editors of L'Ordre. Was for some years chief editor and one of the directors of Le Nouveau Monde. Retired from journalism in Sept. 1879. Is Presdt. of the Jacques Cartier Bank. Created a Knight of the Order of Pius the IX, 30 July 1872, after his return from a visit to Rome, where he had the honour of being admitted to an audience with His Holiness. Took an active part in the organization of the Canadian Papal Zouave contingent, which went to assistance of the Holy Father, in 1868. Was one of the authors of the Programme Catholique, first published April 1871, which was prepared for the purpose of being offered to the Conservative party as a basis on which the several opposing sections of that party, then engaged in a warm contest, might agree. Doyon, Cyrille, (Laprairie.)

B. 28 Oct., 1843, at St. Isidore, Co. of Laprairie. Ed. by the St. Sulpicians and at the Petit Séminaire de Montréal. M. 2 Aug., 1869, Vitaline, second dau. of Joseph Riopel, farmer, Ste. Julienne, Co. of Montreal. Is a farmer and a manufacturer; a Commr. of Small Causes, and J.P. Was Mayor of his parish from 1872 to 1875, and has been an inspector of the Farmers' Assur. Co'y. and of the Sovereign Assur. Co'y. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Nationalist.—St. Isidore, Co. Laprairie, P.Q.

Duchesnay, Lieut.-Col. Henri Jules Juchereau. (Dorchester.)

Descended from the old French family of that name which settled in Can. in 1645 and became Seignors of Beauport, Fossambault, Gaudarville, &c. Many scions of the family have served in the French and English armies. S. of the late Hon. E. H. J. Duchesnay, who died a senator in 1871. Mother is a sister of Cardinal Taschereau. B. 6 July 1845. Ed. at Quebec Seminary and at Laval and McGill Univ. M. 21 Sept. 1869, Caroline, dau. of C. Têtu, Esq., Quebec. Called to the Bar, P. Q., 12 Sept. 1866. Is Lieut.-Col. commanding 23rd Batt. Beauce. Has been Presdt. of the Lévis and Kennebec Railway. Mayor of St. Mary, Beauce; Warden of the Co. of Beauce. and Dist. Magistrate for the Dist. of Beauce. Has been Inspector of Mines, Chaudière Mining Division, and chief of Divisional Mounted Police. First returned to Parlt, at last g.e. A National Conservative.—La Beauce, P.Q.

DUPONT, FLAVIEN. (Bagot.)

S. of Flavien Dupont, Esq., by Nathalie Fournier. B. at St. Simon, 1847, and ed. at St. Hyacinthe Coll. Unmarried. Admitted to practice as a notary, 3 Oct. 1873 Has been Secretary and Treasurer of the Co. of Bagot, and of the Agricultural and Colonization Soc. of the same Co. First returned to Parlt. for present seat in Leg. Assem., P.Q., 7 July, 1876; an unsuccessful candidate at g. e. 1878. Elected for present seat in the Commons on the resignation of the Hon. J. A. Mousseau, 2 Sept., 1882, and reelected by acclamation at g. e. 1887. A Conservative.—St. Liboire, P.Q.

EDGAR, JAMES DAVID. (West Ontario.)

Belongs to the elder branch of the Edgars of Keithoch, Forfarshire, Scot. B. in Eastern Townships, P.Q., 10 Aug., 1841. Ed. there. M., Sept. 1865, Matilda, second. dau. of the late T. G. Ridout, Esq., of Toronto. Called to the Bar, · U.C., Michaelmas Term, 1864. Is a dir. of the Confederation Life Assoc., of the Globe Printing Co., and of the Midland Railway Co. Author of The Insolvent Act of 1864, with notes, forms, &c., (Toronto, 1864;) An Act to amend the Insolvent Act of 1864, with annotations; Notes of Decisions, &c., (Toronto, 1865.) Has been a frequent contributor to the daily press and periodicals, and is author of several pamphlets. Was sent to British Columbia in 1874 by the Dominion Govt., to arrange terms for the postponement of the construction of the C. P. Railway. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1872, and sat until g. e. 1874. Unsuccessfully contested Centre Toronto at g. e. 1872. Elected by acclamation for present seat 22 Aug., 1884, upon the resignation of the sitting mem. Re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal. -93 Bloor St., Queen's Park, Toronto; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.

EDWARDS, WILLIAM CAMERON. (Russell.)

B. in the Tp. of Clarence, Ont., 1844, and ed. at the Ottawa Grammar Sch. M., Jan. 1885, eldest dau of Wm. Wilson, Esq., of Clarence. Is a lumber manufacturer. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g. e. 1882. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—Rockland, Ont.

EISENHAUER, JAMES DANIEL, (Lunenberg.)

Family came from Germany originally. B. at Lunenburg, N.S., 1 Jan., 1832, and ed. at the Academy there. M. 17 Dec., 1859, Miss Mary Ann Begg. Is a West Indian Merchant and the largest exporter of fish from Can. to West Indies. Is Presdt. of the Lunenburg Marine Assoc., and Treasurer af N. S. Wood Pulp and Paper Co. Sat in the N. S. Ho. of Assem. for three terms in succession, since 1867. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal; opposed to Protection, in favor of a Revenue Tariff.—Lunenburg, N.S.

ELLIS, JOHN VALENTINE. (St. John City.)

Of Irish descent. S. of Michael and Margaret Ellis. B. at Halifax, N.S., 1835, and moved to St. John, N.B., in 1857. M., at Fredericton, N.B., 1864, Mary Caroline, eldest dau. of the late Saml. Babbitt, Esq. Is editor of the St. John Daily Globe. Was Postmaster of St. John for a short period. Sat in the Ho. of Assem., N.B., from g. e. 1882 until Jan. 1887, when he resigned to become a candidate for present seat. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—St. John. N.B.

Ferguson, Charles Frederick, M.D. (North Leeds and Grenville.)

Family from Drumgunnion, Co. Leitrim, Irel. S. of Mr. Robert Ferguson, of the Tp. of Kitley, Leeds, Ont. B, there. Graduated as M.D. at Queen's Univ., Kingston, 1859. M. Miss Bell, of Oxford, Co. Grenville, sister of the late Robert Bell, Esq., C.E., who represented Russell in the Can. Assem. previous to Confederation. First returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1874. Unseated, on petition, 10 Nov., 1874; re-elected 16 Dec. same year; re-elected at g.e., 1878, 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Kemptville, Ont.

FERGUSON, JOHN, M.D. (Welland.)

Descended from an Irish family of Scotch extraction, whose estates lay in Galloway and Ayrshire. In 1660, James Ferguson, a younger s. of the family, became possessed of large property in the Co. Cavan, Irel., in which he settled. His s. Thomas, and grand-s Richard, entered the army, the latter taking part in the troubles of 1743 as an officer in the King's Black Horse (now the 7th Dragoon Guards), under the Duke of Cumberland. Grandf., Henry Ferguson, held a commission in the Cavan Militia, and took an active part in the Irish Rebellion of 1798. Came to Canada in 1824, and settled in London Township. Graduated M.D. at Victoria Coll., Toronto, 1864. A farmer. Is Coroner for the Co. of Middlesex. Firt returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1882 and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and approves of the policy of Sir John A. Macdonald.—Niagura Falls, Ont.; Rideau Club: Toronto Club.

FISET, JEAN BAPTISTE ROMUALD, M.D. (Rimouski.)

S. of Henri Fiset, J.P., of St. Cuthbert, P.Q. B. there 7 Feb., 1843. Ed. at Montreal Coll.; graduated as M.D. at Laval Univ., 1867. M., Aimée, dau. of Honoré Plamondon, Esq., Quebec. Has been a Councillor and Mayor of the town of Rimouski. Is Surgeon of Provisional Batt., Rimouski Militia. An unsuccessful candidate for Rimouski in Quebec Assem., April 1872. First returned to Parlt for present seat at g.e., 1872; re-elected at g.e., 1874 and 1878; an unsuccessful candidate at g.e., 1882; re-elected at last g.e. Was the Liberal "whip" from 1878 to 1882. A Liberal.—St Germain de Rimouski.

FISHER, SYDNEY ARTHUR, B.A., J.P. (Erome.)

S. of Dr. Arthur Fisher, of Montreal, whose grandf. came to Can. from Dunkeld, Scot. B. in Montreal 12 June, 1850. Ed. at the High Sch. and McGill Coll. there, and afterwards at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, Eng., where he graduated B.A. Unmarried. Is a farmer and J.P. for the District of Bedford, P.Q. Was an unsuccessful candidate for present seat at election, held Oct. 1880, after death of sitting mem. First returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1882, and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal, and favors a revenue tariff as opposed to a Protective Policy.—Alva Farm, Knowlton, P.Q.; Rideau Club.

FLYNN, EDMUND POWER. (Richmond, N.S.)

B. in Cape Breton, 19 Aug., 1828. Ed. there. A merchant. Is a Coroner for Richmond. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N. S., from Nov. 1867 until Jan. 1874, and Commr. of Crown Lands from April 1871 until date last mentioned, when he resigned. Sat for Richmond in N. S. Assem. from g.e., 1867, until Jan., 1874, when he resigned and was elected to the Commons. Re-elected at g.e., 1878; an unsuccessful candidate at g.e., 1882; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—Arichat, N.S.

Foster, Hon. George Eulas, B.A., D.C.L., P.C., (King's, N.B.)

Descended from a U. E. Loyalist, who settled in N. B., 1783. B. in Carleton Co., N.B., 3 Sept., 1847. Ed. at the Common and Superior schools, in King's Co., and at the Univ. of N.B., where he graduated B.A. June 1868.

Spent 1872-3 at the Univ. of Edinburgh, Scot., and at the Univ. of Heidelberg, in Germany. Was Principal of Victoria Co. Grammar Sch., 1868-9; of Sunbury Co. Superior Sch. 1870; Classical and Mathematical Teacher, Baptist Academy, Fredericton, 1871, and Principal of the Ladies' High School, Fredericton, 1872. Held the Professorship of Classics and History in the Univ. of N. B. from Sept. 1872 until January 1879. Received Degree of D.C.L. from Acadia College, N.S., 1883. Has held the highest position in connection with the leading Temperance organizations in Canada and the United States. Sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Minister of Marine and Fisheries 10 Dec., 1885. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1882. Resigned, and re-elected 7 Nov., 1882. Re-elected on appointment to office and again at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative. Favors a civil service system which shall, so far as consistent with the peculiar circumstances of our country, conform to the system in vogue in Great Britain; a moderate protective tariff, such as shall maintain our markets for our own manufactures, and at the same time not conduce to the formation of exclusive monopolies; a wise economy in the administration of the finances of the country, and an enlightened, progressive and comprehensive general policy.—Apohagui, Kings Co., N.B.

FREEMAN, JOSHUA NEWTON. (Queens, N.S.)

Descended from Edward Freeman, who arrived in the colony of Massachusetts from Devonshire, Eng., in 1635, and from Col. William Freeman, who came to Liverpool, N.S., from Massachusetts, about 1763. B. in Liverpool, N.S., 6 Oct., 1816, and educated at the Grammar Sch. there. M., 1st, Sarah Elizabeth, dau. of John Campbell, Esq., for many years M.P.P. for Queens, N.S.; 2nd, at Melbourne, Australia, Elizabeth, dau. of Mr. Moody, formerly of Yarmouth, N.S., and 3rd, Mary, widow of the late Rev. John Mills, of N. B. Is a merchant, and was High Sheriff of Queens Co. from 1864 to 1882, when he resigned. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e., 1882. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Liverpool, N.S.

GAUDET ATHANASE. (Nicolet.)

S. of the late Hon. Joseph Gaudet, M.L.C., Quebec. B. at Gentilly 20 June, 1848. Ed. at Nicolet Seminary. M., 1870, Sara, dau. of the late Alexis Poissin, Gentilly.

Is a merchant, farmer, Captain in the 80th Batt. V.M., and has been Mayor of Gentilly since Jan. 1882. First returned to Parlt., 23 April, 1884, on the resignation of Mr. Methot, who was apptd. to L. C., Quebec. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e., 1887. A Conservative National-ist.—Gentilly, P.Q.

GAUTHIER, JOSEPH, (L'Assomption.)

B. at St. Lin, Co. of L'Assomption, 1842, and ed. there. Is a merchant and a farmer. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal Nationalist.—L'Assomption, P.Q.

Geoffrion, Hon. Felix, P.C. (Verchères.)

S. of M. Felix Geoffrion, by the late Catherine Brodeur. B. at Varennes, P.Q., 4 Oct. 1832. M. Oct. 1856, Almaide, the youngest dau. of Lieut.-Col. Joseph Dansereau, of Vercheres. Is a Notary. Was a Registrar for Vercheres from 1854 to 1863. Has been President of the Montreal, Chambly and Sorel Railway. Moved for select Committee, 1874, to inquire into causes of the difficulties existing in the N. W. Territory, 1869-70, of which Committee he became Chairman, and prepared report submitted to Parlt. Sworn of the Privy Council, and apptd. Minister of Inland Revenue, 8 July 1874. Sat for present seat in the Can. Assem. from 1863 until the Union, when returned to Commons. Re-elected by acclamation on his appointment to office. Resigned portfolio in consequence of serious illness, Dec. 1876, retaining his seat in Parlt. Re-elected at g. e. 1878, 1882, and again at last g. e. A Liberal.—Vercheres, P.Q.

GIGAULT, GEORGE AUGUSTE. (Rouville.)

S. of Pierre Gigault, by Margaret Wait. Brother of the Rev. F. Gigault, R. C. Priest, of Lowell. B. 23 Nov. 1845, in St. Mathias. Ed at St. Hyacinthe Coll. M., at Beleil, 12 July, 1870, to Miss Isabella Dillon. Was admitted as Notary on 16 Oct. 1867; a mem. of the Board of Notaries for the Prov. of Quebec. Was Mayor of St. Cesaire from Jan. 1875 to Jan. 1878. Was Postmaster of St. Cesaire from Dec. 1870 to Feb. 1874. While Mayor, was instrumental in having waterworks built in St. Cesaire. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1878, and re-elected at g. e. 1882 and 1887. A Conservative.—St. Césaire, P.Q.

GILLMOR, ARTHUR HILL. (Charlotte.)

S. of Daniel Gillmor, Esq., J. P., of St. George, N. B., and grands. of Arthur Hill Gillmor, of Hillsborough, Co. Down, Irel. B. at St. George, 12 March, 1824. Ed. at St. Andrew's Grammar Sch. M., 1846, Miss Howe, of Maine, U.S. A mill owner. Sat for Charlotte in N. B. Assem. from 1854 until 1866, when defeated on Confederation question. Was Provl. Secv. in Mr. A. Smith's Anti-Confederation Government, 1865. Contested Charlotte unsuccessfully for Commons at g. e. 1872. First returned at g. e. 1874; re-elected at g. e. 1878, 1882, and at last g. e. A Liberal.—Broadway, St. George, N.B.

GIROUARD, DÉSIRÉ, Q.C., D.C.L. (Jacques Cartier.)

A descendant of Antoine Girouard, Private Secretary to Chev. de Ramezay, Governor of Montreal, 1720-3. B. at St. Timothé, Co. Beauharnois, 7 July, 1836. Ed. at the Montreal Coll. and graduated in Law in McGill Univ., from which he has received the degrees of B. C. L. and D. C. L. Called to the Bar of L. C. 13 Oct. 1860, and apptd. a Q.C. 16 Oct., 1880. M., 1st, Mathilde Pratt, dau. of the late John Pratt; 2nd, Essie Cranwell, sister of Samuel Cranwell, of New Orleans; and 3rd, Edith Bertha, youngest dau. of John Beaty, Esq., M.D., Cobourg. Author of Treatise on Bills of Exchange, the Insolvent Act, Laws of Marriage, etc., etc. Founder, with W. H. Kerr, Q.C., and other leading Barristers, of the Revue Critique, and well known by his contributions on constitutional law and international questions, which have received notice from the press in this country, and also from that of the United States, England, and France, among others, his Papers on the Treaty of Washington, The Indirect Alabama Claims, Church and State, The Pacific Scandal, Royal Commissions, etc. Until 1872 he devoted himself exclusively to his profession, wherein he obtained success, principally as a commercial lawyer. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g. e. 1882. An unsuccessful candidate for Beauharnois at g. e. 1874. Re-elected for present seat at g. e. 1878, 1882, and again at last g. e. Promoted and carried during the session of 1882, the Bill authorizing marriage with a deceased wife's sister. Was Chairman of the Committee on Privileges and Elections during Parlt. of 1882-6. A Conservative.—Residence, "Quatre Vents," Dorval, Co. Jacques Cartier.

Godbout, Joseph, M.D. (Beauce.)

S. of Joseph Godbout, farmer, a descendant of the first settler in St. Vital de Lambton, Co. of Beauce. B. there 12 May 1850. Ed. at the Seminary in Quebec and at Laval Univ., where he graduated in medicine. M. 8 Oct. 1878 at Quebec, Rachel Audet, who d. 21 Jan. 1881. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A National Conservative.—St. François, Beauce, P.Q.

GORDON, DAVID WILLIAM. (Vancouver.)

Grands. on paternal side of John Gordon, who emigrated from Coventry, Eng., to India, and thence to America, served in the Royalists Forces during the Revolutionary war, removed with other U. E. Loyalists to Canand finally settled in the Township of Camden, Co. of Kent, Ont. S. of Michael Gordon, who, with his brothers, served in the Militia, under Gen. Brock at the taking of Detroit; was at the battle of Chrysler's Farm, and other engagements during the war of 1812, 13 and 14. His residence and crops were destroyed by the American General, Harrison, when he ascended the River Thames in pursuit of Gen. Proctor and Tecumseh. B. in the Tp. of Camden, Ont., 27 Feb., 1832. Served apprenticeship to the building trade with Smith & Fisher, of Wallaceburg, Ont. Emigrated to California in 1856 and thence to B. C. in 1858, and settled in Nanaimo in 1861. M., 3 Sept. 1864, Emma Elizabeth, eldest dau. of James Robb, Esq., J.P., of Comox, (she d. 15 Feb., 1882). Is a contractor and builder and head of the firm of Gordon & Co., wharf owners. Twice declined the offer of Commissioner of the Peace. Was one of the promoters, and for many years on the Committee of Management of the Nanaimo Literary Institute. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Nanaimo in Leg. Assem., B. C., at g. e. 1876, and on the resignation of the sitting mem., John Bryden, was elected to the House in June 1877. Sat two sessions, and was one of the Committee that arranged the Order of Business, which terminated the dead lock in the Assem. in 1878. Was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat at g. e. 1878, and an unsuccessful candidate for present seat in the Commons at g. e. 1878. First returned to the Commons, 4 Aug., 1882. Re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative, and in favor of Sir John A. Macdonald's Govt. Was chiefly instrumental in inducing the Elliott Government in B. C. to carry through the Assem. the Bill known as "The Coal Mines Regulation Act, 1877."—Nanaimo, B. C.

GRANDBOIS, PAUL ETIENNE, M.D. 4 (Témiscouata.)

B. in 1846 at St. Philomène, Co. of Chateauguay. Ed. at St. Sulpice Coll., St. Thérèse de Blainville Little Seminary and Laval Univ. M., in 1873, second dau. of the late George Pelletier, Esq., merchant, of Fraserville. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1878; re-elected at g. e. 1882, and again at last g. e. A Conservative.—River du Loup, (en bas) P.Q.

GUAY, PIERRE MALCOLM, M.D. (Lévis.)

Ancestors came from Saintonge, France, and were among the first settlers of Levis Co. B. at St. Romuald d'Etchemin, 26 March, 1848. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary and at Laval Univ., where he graduated M.D. in 1872. M. 1874, Marie Louise Antoinette, dau. of T. E. Roy, Esq., formerly sergeant-at-arms of L. C. Quebec. Is a Governor of the Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons, Prov. of Quebec. and Mayor of the village of St. Romuald d'Etchemin. First returned to Parlt. 1885, upon the sitting mem. Mr. Belleau, being unseated. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal. —Etchemin, P.Q.

Guilbault, Edward. (Joliette.)

Guillet, George. (West Northumberland.)

Father, John Guillet, was a native of the Island of Jersey, and his mother, Charlotte, second dau. of John Payne, was born in Frome, Somersetshire, Eng. B. in Cobourg, Ont., 1840, and ed. at the Public Sch. there and at Victoria Coll. Unmarried. Is a merchant. Sat in the Cobourg Town Council for seven years; was Mayor for four years and on retiring was offered re-election by acclamation. Was a Commr. of the Town Trust for four years. Was instrumental in obtaining the extension to the Inland waters of Can. of the clauses of the Merchants' Shipping Act of 1873, which secured to seamen a first lien and the right of recovery of wages in rem and by summary process. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat in Leg. Assem., Ont., at g.e. 1879. First returned

to Parlt., 19 Dec. 1881 on resignation of the late Hon. Jas. Cockburn. Re-elected at g.e. 1882. Unseated by Judgment of the Supreme Court 17 Mar., 1885. Re-elected 7 April, 1885, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and in favor of tle maintenance of British connection; of Reciprocal trade relations with the U.S.; the abolition of canal tolls, and the extension of the Franchise, but opposed to universal suffrage.—Cobourg.

HAGGART, JOHN GRAHAM. (South Lanark.)

S. of John Haggart, Esq., formerly of Breadalbane, Perthshire, Scot., but latterly of Perth, Lanark, Ont., by Isabella Graham, of the Isle of Skye, Inverness-shire, Scot. B. in Perth, Ont., 14 Nov., 1836. A mill-owner. Was for several years Mayor of Perth. An unsuccessful candidate for South Lanark in Leg. Assem., Ont., at g.e. 1867, and in 1869. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874, 1878, 1882, and at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Perth, Ont.; Rideau Club.

HALE, FREDERICK HARDING. Carleton, (N.B.)

Father was a native of Irel., and came to Can. when a child. B. at Northampton, Co. Carleton, N.B., 8 Dec., 1844, and ed. there. M., first, Miss McGee (she died); second, Emma E., dau. of the late Moses Boyer. Is a lumber merchant. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—Woodstock, N.B.

Hall, Robert Newton, B.A., LL.D., Q.C. (Sherbrooke.)

S. of Rev. R. V. Hall. B. at Laprairie, P.Q., 26 July, 1836. Ed. at Burlington, (U.S.) Univ., where he graduated B.A. in 1857. M., at Compton, 15 Oct., 1862, Lena, dau. of the late A. W. Kendrick, Esq. Called to the Bar of L.C. at Montreal, 7 Oct. 1861. Apptd. Q.C., 11 Oct. 1880. Was Batonnier of St. Francis Section of the Bar, 1877 to 1881; General Batonnier of the Bar of the Prov. of Quebec in 1878, and is Dean of the Faculty of Law Bishop's Coll., Lennoxville. Received the degree of LL.D., from the Coll. in 1880. Was a Govt. dir. of the Canadian Pacific Railway, 1873. Is Presdt. of Massawippi Railway; a dir. of the Quebec Central Railway, and Presdt. of the Sherbrooke Gas and Water Co. Was one of the promoters and first Presdt. of the Eastern Townships Agricultural Asso. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, by acclamation. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Sherbrooke, P.Q.

Hesson, Samuel Rollin, J.P. (North Perth.)

Parents born in Irel.; Came to Can. in 1832. B. in the Co. Antrim, Irel., 25 Sept. 1829. Ed. at Dundas, Ont., Grammar School. M., 21 Nov., 1855, at Simcoe, Ont., Miss M. J., eldest dau. of John Polley, Esq., founder of Simcoe. Is a merchant. Was Postmaster of Sebringville for seven years. Apptd. J.P., for the Co. of Perth in 1857. Was repeatedly elected as Town Councillor of Stratford by acclamation, and was Mayor of that town in 1875. Is a dir. of the Stratford Gas Co., and Chairman of the Stratford, Lake Huron and Georgian Bay Railway Trust Board. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1878, and re-elected at g.e. 1882 and at g.e. 1887. A Conservative, strongly impressed with the advantage of a Protective and National Policy to to the young Dominion.—Stratford, Ont.

HICKEY, CHARLES ERASTUS, B.A., M.D., C.M. (Dundas.)

Fifth s. of Major John Hickey, of Williamsburg, Ont., a descendant of a U. E. Loyalist, who, after the Am. Revolution, settled on the farm still owned and held by the family. B. at Williamsburg, 24 March, 1840. Ed. at Victoria Univ., Cobourg, and McGill Univ., Montreal. Graduated in Arts at the former, May 1863, and in Medicine at the latter, May 1866. Was Valedictorian of the class. M., 18 Sept., 1873, Mary Elizabeth, sister of Dr. W. George Beers, of Montreal. Was Inspector of Common Schools for the Tp. of Winchester for two years, and an Examiner of Common School Teachers, for Co. Dundas for two years. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative, and a thorough Canadian in fact and in policy.—Morrisburg, Ont.

Holton, Edward, B.C.L. (Chateauguay.)

Only surviving s. of the late Hon. L. H. Holton, who represented Chateauguay in the Commons from the Union until his death, March 1880. B. at Montreal, Sept. 1844. Ed. at private schools and McGill Univ. Called to the Bar of Quebec, June 1867. M., Oct. 1873, Helen, dau. of Mr. Wm. Ford, of Kingston, Ont. Returned to Parlt. upon the death of his father, April 1880. Re-elected at g.e. 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—1675 St. Catherine Street, Montreal.

Hudspeth, Adam, Q.C., (South Victoria.)

S. of Robert Hudspeth, a native of the north of Eng. who came to Can. in 1834, and was head master of the Newcastle Grammar Sch. at Cobourg, from 1842 to 1852. B. in Cobourg, 8 Dec., 1836, and ed. there by his father. M., July, 1868, Harriette, dau. of R. S. Mills of Brockville, a retired Chief Factor of the H. B. Co. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1867, and apptd. a Q.C. 1881. Is a Bencher of the Law Soc. of Ont.; Deputy Judge of the Co. of Victoria, and was Revising Barrister for North Victoria, 1885. An unsuccessful candidate for South Victoria in the Leg. Assem. at the bye election held July, 1875. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. Resigned, and re-elected 20 April, 1887. A Conservative.—Lindsay, Ont.

Innes. James. (South Wellington.)

S. of Alex. Innes, of Huntley, Aberdeenshire, Scot. B. there 1 Feb. 1883. M., 3 Sept. 1873, in London, Eng., Hellen Gerrard, of Forgue, Aberdeenshire, Scot., and widow of the late Jonathan Date, planter, Grenada, West Indies. Was a School Teacher in Scotland for five years. On coming to Can. in 1853, he became a Reporter and Journalist, and has edited and published the Guelph Mercury since 1862. Was a High School Trustee for a number of years, and was a Chairman of the Guelph Board of Education for one year, 1s a dir. of the Guelph Building and Savings Soc. and of the Guelph Gas and Electric Light Co. First returned to Parlt, at g. e. 1882, aad re-elected at Jast g.e. A Liberal.—Guelph, Ont.

IVES, WILLIAM BULLOCK, Q.C. (Richmond and Wolfe.)

S. of Eli Ives and Artemissa Bullock; of English extraction. First settled in Connecticut; moved to the Co. of Stanstead among the first settlers on the Lake Memphremagog. B. in the Township of Compton, Co. Compton, 17 Nov. 1841. Self educated, after taking course in Compton Academy. M., 17 Nov. 1869, at Cookshire, Co. of Compton, Elizabeth E. only dau. of the Hon. J. H. Pope, M. P., Minister of Railways. Called to the Bar P.Q., 1857. Apptd. Q.C., 11 October, 1880. Is Presdt. of the Dominion Cattle Co., Texas, and a dir. of the International Railway Co. of Maine. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1878; re-elected at g.e. 1882, and again at last g.e. A Conservative.—Sherbrooke, P.Q.

Jamieson, Joseph. (North Lanark.)

S. of the late William Jamieson, who came from Gettystown, Co. of Londonderry, Irel., 1818, and settled in Perth, Ont., where he was one of the first settlers. B. in Sherbrooke, Co. of Lanark, 15 March, 1839. Ed. at Perth Grammar School. M., 2 Nov. 1865, Elizabeth, eldest dau. of Robt. Carss, Esq., of Fitzroy, Co. of Carleton. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1869. Has been Reeve of Almonte and Warden of Co. of Lanark. Is Chairman of Board of License Commrs. for N. Lanark. An unsuccessful candidate for N. Lanark at g.e. 1878, and again 22 Jan.. 1880, on the death of the sitting mem., Mr. D. Galbraith. First returned to Parlt. at g.e, 1882 and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and a supporter of the National Policy.—Almonte, Ont.

Joneas, Louis Zepherin. (Gaspé,)

Of Norman descent. S. of Leon Joncas by his wife Esther Beaudin. B. at Grand River, Co. of Gaspé 26 July, 1846, and ed. at the Coll. Masson, Terrebonne. M., 18 July, 1870, Emerentienne Blouin, a sister to Rev. F. A. Blouin, Curé of Carleton and General Vicar of the Diocese of Rimouski. Is an accountant and general agent. Apptd. to represent Can. at the International Fisheries Exhibition in London, Eng., in 1883. Delivered before the Congress in connection with the Exhibition, a descriptive account of the fisheries of Can., which has been published and distributed throughout Europe by the Dominion Govt. Was sheriff of the Co, of Gaspé from 1875 until 1887, when he resigned, to run for the Commons. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. An Independent Conservative. Grand River, Co. of Gaspé, Q.

Jones, Hon. Alfred Gilpin, P.C. (Halifax.)

Paternal ancestor, Josiah Jones, emigrated from Eng. to Boston, Mass., as early as 1665; grandfather, Stephen Jones, a graduate of Harvard Coll., was an officer in the King's American Dragoons, and settled in N.S. at the close of the Am. revolutionary war, where he died in 1830. S. of the late Guy C. Jones, Esq., who held the office of Registrar of Deeds, Co. Digby, N.S. B. at Weymouth, N.S., Sept. 1824. Ed. there and at Yarmouth Academy. M. 1st., 1850, Margaret Wiseman, dau. of W. Stairs; (she d. Feb. 1865). 2nd, 1867, Emma, dau. of Edward Albro. Esq., Halifax. Is principal of the firm of A. G. Jones & Co., West Indian

merchant's; Governor of the Protestant Orphan's Home; and of Dalhousie Coll.; Prest. of the Nova Scotia Marine Insur. Co., and a dir. of the Acadia Fire Ins. Co. Was Lieut.-Col. commanding the 1st. Halifax "Brigade" Garrison Artillery for some years. Sat in the Commons for Halifax from 1867, to 1872, when defeated. Re-elected at ge. 1874, but resigned Jan. 1878, in consequence of alleged breach of the Independence of Parlt. Act. Sworn of the Privy Council and held the office of Minister of Militia in the Mackenzie administration from Jan. 1878 to Sept. 1878. An unsuccessful candidate at g.e. 1878 and 1882. Reelected at last g.e.—"Bloomingdale," North-West Arm, Halifax; Halifax Club.

KENNY, THOMAS EDWARD. (Halifax.)

Eldest s. of Hon. Sir Edward Kenny, a former mem. of the Queen's Privy Council for Can (whom see). B. in Halifax 12 Oct., 1833. Ed. at Stonyhurst Coll., Eng., and at St. Jervais Coll., Liege, Belgium. M., in New York, 2 Oct., 1856, Margaret Jones, second dau. of Hon. M. Burke, of N. Y. Is senior partner of the mercantile and shipping firm of T. & E. Kenny, Halifax, which was established 1825. Is Presdt. of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax; a dir. of the N. S. Cotton Manufacturing Co. and of the North Sydney Marine Railway Co.; a Trustee of the Western Counties Railway Co. and a mem. of the Royal Commission on Railways. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Thornvale, Halifax, N.S.

Kirk, Lieut.-Col. John Angus, J.P. (Guysborough.)

Grands. of William Kirk, a native of Dunfermline, Scot., formerly in the British Army, who served during the American Revolutionary War, and afterwards settled in N.S. S. of Angus Kirk, Esq., J.P. B. at Gleuelg, N.S., 1 March, 1837, and ed. there. M., 1864, Sarah Susannah, dau. of Timothy McLean, Esq., St. Mary's (she d. 9 Oct., 1882). Is a farmer, and was Lieut.-Col. 5th Guysborough Regt. of Militia. Held the office of Custos Rotulorum for the Dist. of St. Mary's until the incorporation of the counties in 1880. Was Councillor of the municipality of St. Mary's from Nov. 1880 until Nov. 1886, when he declined re-election. Was Warden for three years. Was a Commr. with Messrs. Annand and Allison to inquire into the system of managing Inebriate Asylums in the United States and neighboring Provinces in 1873. Carried through Leg. Assem., N.S., 1868, a measure greatly restricting the grant-

ing of licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors in N. S. Returned for present seat in Leg. Assem., N. S., at g.e., 1867; re-elected at g.e., 1871, but resigned, in March 1874, to run for Commons. Elected for Commons at g.e., 1874; defeated at g.e., 1878; re-elected at g.e., 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal, and in favor of a revenue tariff. Believes the present tariff burdensome to the farmer and the masses of the people, and against the interests of the Maritime Provinces generally. Favors a separation of Nova Scotia from the Dominion.—Cross Roads, St. Mary's, Guysborough Co., N.S.

Kirkpatrick, Lieut.-Col. George Airby, LL.D., Q.C. (Frontenac.)

Fourth s. of the late Thomas Kirkpatrick, Esq., Q.C., a native of Coolmine, near Dublin, who represented Frontenac in the Commons from the Union until his death, March 1870, by the dau. of the late Alex. Fisher, Esq., Judge of the Midland District. B. in Kingston 13 Sept., 1841. Ed. at Kingston Grammar Sch., at High Sch., St. John's, P.Q., and at Trinity Coll., Dublin; graduated at latter institution as Moderator and Silver Medallist, Dec. 1861, and received the degree of B.A. and LL.B. Became LL.D., June 1883. M., 1st, Oct. 1865, Frances Jane, dau. of the late Hon. John Macaulay (she d. 20 Jan., 1877); 2nd, 26 Sept., 1883, Isabel Louise, youngest dau. of Sir D. L. Macpherson, Senator. Called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1865. Appt. a Q.C. 11 Oct., 1880. Is Presdt. of the Kingston Water Works Co. and of the Canada Locomotive Works, Kingston; Lieut.-Col. commanding 47 Frontenac Batt. V.M.; Presdt. of Dominion Rifle Asso. and dir. of the Kingston and Pembroke Railway. Commanded the Wimbledon Rifle Team, 1876. Was an Hon. Commr. at the Colonial and Indian Exhibition, Loudon, 1886. First returned to Parlt., April 1870, on death of his father, the sitting member; re-elected by acclamation at g.e., 1872; again returned at g.e., 1874; re-elected at g.e., 1878, and by acclamation at g.e., 1882; re-elected at last g.e. Was Speaker of the House of Commons from 8 Feb., 1883, until 1886. A Liberal Conservative.—Closeburn, Kingston, Ont.; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.

Labelle, Capt. Jean Baptiste. (Richelieu.)

A descendant of a very old French-Canadian family, the progenitor coming to Can. as a soldier. S. of Toussaint Labelle, navigator. B. at Sorel, P.Q., 27 May, 1836, and

ed. at the Parish Sch. M., 1860, Delphine, dau. of N. Crebassa, Esq., Sorel. Was for upwards of 25 years in command of a steamer of the Richelieu Line between Montreal and Quebec. In 1880, he became General Passenger Agent, at Montreal, of the Q., M., O. & O. Railway, and in 1883 apptd. General Manager of the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Co. An unsuccessful candidate for Richelieu in the Quebec Assem. at g.e., 1868. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Montreal.

LABROSSE, SIMON, J.P. (Prescott.)

S. of Pierre Labrosse, who founded St. Eugène, Ont., in 1854. B. at St. Benoit, Co. of Two Mountains, P.Q., 1836. Ed. there. M. Miss M. Ethier, of St. Joseph, Co. of Two Mountains. Is a merchant. Has been a Councillor, Deputy Reeve and Reeve of the Township of East Hawkesbury, and Warden in 1874 for the United Counties of Prescott and Russell. First returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1882, and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—St. Eugène, Ont.

LANDERKIN, GEORGE, M.D. (South Grey.)

S. of late Mr. James Landerkin, a native of N.S., who settled in Co. of Simcoe, Ont., 1824. B. at West Gwillimbury, Simcoe, 1839. Ed. at Victoria Coll., Cobourg, where he graduated M.D., 1862. M., 1870, Miss M. Kirkendall, of Elora, Ont. First returned to Parit. at g.e., 1872; reelected at g.e., 1874; defeated at g.e., 1878; re-elected at g.e., 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—Hanover, Ont.

LANDRY, PIERRE AMAND, Q.C. (Kent, N.B.)

Of Acadian descent. S. of Amand Landry, Esq., who sat for Westmoreland in the N.B. Assem. from 1846 almost uninterruptedly up to 1870, when he retired from public life, by Miss Pelagi Casey. B. in Dorchester, N.B., May 1, 1846. Ed. at St. Joseph's Coll., Memramcook. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1870. Apptd. Q.C. 11 Nov., 1881. First returned to Leg. Assem., N.B., for Westmoreland, at g.e., 1870. Defeated at g.e., 1874. Returned at g.e., 1878, and again at g.e., 1882. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council and Chief Commr. of Public Works, 13 July, 1878. Resigned 25 May, 1882, and on the same day apptd. Provl. Secy. Resigned, with his colleagues, Feb. 1883. Resigned his seat in Leg. Assem., Aug. 1883, and elected for present

seat in Commons on retirement of Mr. Girouard.—A Conservative.—Dorchester, N.B.

Lang, John. (East Peterborough.)

S. of James Lang and Agnes Stewart, his wife, natives of Renfrewshire, Scot. B. in the village of Keene, Ont., 10 April, 1839, and ed. in the Common Sch. there. M., 9 Nov., 1866, Elizabeth Shearer. A farmer. Sat in the Otonabee Tp. Council for 16 years, and in the Co. Council for 12 years, being always elected by acclamation. Was Warden of the Co. of Peterborough in 1884, and is now Reeve of Otonabee. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—Jermyn P.O., Ont.

LANGEI IER, CHARLES. (Montmorency.)

Is a younger brother of F. C. S. Langelier, M.P. for Quebec Centre (whom see). B. at St. Rosalie, Co. of Bagot, 23 Augt. 1853. Ed. at the seminary of Quebec. M. 2 Augt. 1882, Georgiana Marie Louise Lucile, dau. of Geo. LaRue Esq., Inspector of Revenue, Quebec. Graduated in law and took the Dufferin Gold Medal at Laval Univ. Called to the Bar, P.Q., 1875. Sat in Quebec Leg. Assem. for Montmorency from g. e. 1878 to g. e. 1881, when he was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e. 1882, and for Bellechasse in the Quebec Assem. at g.e. 1886. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—Quebec.

Langelier, François Charles Stanislas, Q. C., L L. D. (Centre Quebec.)

S. of Capt. Louis Sébastien Langelier, by Julie Esther Casault. Descended on father's side from Sébastien Langelier, who came to Can. from Fresquieme, near Rouen, France, 1659, settled at Sillery, near Quebec, and thence removed to L'Islet, of which family the celebrated Bishop Langelier, was a mem., and on mother's side from the Casaults of Granville, France, to which the late L. J. Casault, founder of Laval Univ. belonged. B. at Ste. Rosalie, Bagot, P.Q., 24 Dec. 1838. Ed. in Classics at St. Hyacinthe Coll., and in law at Laval Univ., where he graduated with honors, 1861. M. 2 Feb. 1884, Virginie Marie, dau. of the late I. Légaré, Esq., Quebec. Called to the Bar L. C. 1861. Apptd. a Q.C., 1878, by the Govt. of Quebec and in 1880 by the Dominion Govt. Is a mem. of the Senate of Laval Univ., and has been Professor of Civil Law

and Political Economy in that Institution for over fifteen years, previously held the chair of Roman Law. Was Secy., of the first Colonization Soc. established in Can. and has been Presdt. of the Institut Canadien. Has been since 1882, and is still, Mayor of the City of Quebec. Was a member of the Ex. Council and Comm. of Crown Lands, from 8 Mar. 1878, and Treasurer of the Province of Quebec, March, 1879, in the Joly administration. Resigned with his colleagues, Oct. 1879. An unsuccessful candidate for Bagot in Leg. Assem., P.Q. at g. e. 1871. Elected for Montmagny in that Leg. 16 Dec. 1873, on the resignation of the sitting mem. Elected for Portneuf at g.e. 1878, but an unsuccessful candidate at g. e. 1881. First returned to the Commons, for Megantic, 10 July, 1884, on Mr. Frechette, the sitting mem. being unseated by the Court. Elected for present seat at last g. e. A Liberal.—Quebec.

Langevin, Hon. Sir Hector Louis, K.C.M.G., C.B., Q.C., P.C. (Three Rivers.)

S. of the late Jean Langevin, Esq., formerly Asst. Civil Secy. under the Earl of Gosford and Lord Sydenham, during the periods those noblemen held office of Governor General, by the late Sophie Scholastique La Force, whose father, Major La Force, went with his militia men to the frontier in the war of 1812, and whose grandfather was Acting Commodore of the British fleet on Lake Ontario during the American Revolutionary war; and brother of His Lordship the Right Rev. Jean Langevin, Bishop of St. Germain de Rimouski. B. in the city of Quebec, 26 Aug., 1826. Ed. at the Seminary of that city. M., 1854, Justine, eldest dau. of the late Lieut. Col. Charles H. Tetu, J.P (she d. 30 Oct. 1882). Studied law first with the late Hon. A. N. Morin, and afterwards with the late Hon. Sir George E. Cartier, and was called to the Bar, L. C., Oct. 1850. Apptd. Q.C., 1864. Was editor of the Mélanges Religieux (Montreal) from 1847 to 1849, and also of the Journal d'Agriculture (same city); and at a later period (1857) of the Courier du Canada (Quebec). Sat as a mem. of the City Council, Quebec, for some years, and was Chairman of the Water Works Committee. Was Secy.-Treas. and afterwards Vice-Presdt of the North Shore Railway Co.; Mayor of Quebec from Jan. 1858 to Jan. 1861, and during his incumbency visited England on matters affecting the city finances, etc.; for two years, 1861 and 1862, Presdt. of St. Jean Baptiste Society (Quebec); and 1863 and 1864 Presdt. of the Institut Canadien, same city. Author of Le Canada, ses Institutions, etc., a prize essay (Quebec, 1855), and of Droit Administratif,

ou Manuel des Paroisses et Fabriques (Quebec, 1862) second edition, being published by him in 1878. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., from 30 March, 1864, until the Union; and held the office of Solicitor-General, L.C., from 30 March, 1864, to Nov. 1865; and Postmaster General from latter period until the Union. Was sworn of the Privy Council, 1 July, 1867, when apptd. Secretary of State of Canada, in which office he remained until transferred to the Public Works Department, 8 Dec., 1869. Was, while at the State Department, ex officio Registrar General of Canada, and Supt. Genl. of Indian Affairs. Was a Commr. to assist Mr. Speaker in the management of the interior economy of the House of Commons; also, Chairman of the Railway Committee of the Privy Council. Created a Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath (Civil) by Her Majesty, 1868; Knight Commander of the Roman Order of Pope Gregory the Great, 1870; Knight Commander of the most distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, 24 May, 1881. Was a delegate to the Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864; to that in Quebec in same year; and to the London Colonial Conference, 1866-67, to complete terms of Union of B.N.A. Provinces. In 1871, at the desire of the Privy Council, visited British Columbia with a view of acquiring a knowledge of that new Province in relation to the Pacific Railway and its western terminus, and also of studying the requirements of the Province, and ascertaining personally what public works were necessary for it. On his return, he published a report containing much information about British Columbia, and making known its present position and immense wealth and resources, (Ottawa, 1872). Acted as leader of the L.C. Conservatives in the session of 1873, during the absence in England of Sir George E. Cartier, and elected by the Conservative members, after Sir George Cartier's funeral in Montreal, June, 1873, as the Conservative leader in the Province of Quebec. Sat for the Co. of Dorchester in the Can. Assem. from g.e. 1867 until the Union. Returned to Commons by same constituency from the Union, until 1874, when he retired. He had ceased to be a Cabinet Minister, with his colleagues in Nov. 1873. He also represented Dorchester in Local House from g.e. 1867 to g.e. 1871, when returned for Quebec Centre by acclamation; retired Jan. 1874. Elected for Charlevoix, Jan. 1876; again returned for same constituency, April 1877, after being unseated on petition. Contested Rimouski unsuccessfully at g.e. 1878. Sworn as Postmaster General, 19 Oct, 1878. Apptd. Minister of Public Works, 20 May, 1879. Elected by acclamation for the city of Three Rivers, 17 Nov. 1878, on resignation of

the sitting mem., and by acclamation at g.e. 1882. Reelected at g.e. 1887. Is a mem. of the Railway Committee
of the Privy Council. On 5 April, 1879, was chosen by the
Governor General in Council to proceed to England and
lay before the Imperial Government the views of the CanMinistry in connection with the proposed dismissal of M.
Letellier de St. Just, the Lieut. Gov. of the Province of
Quebec; the result of such mission being the recognition
by the Imperial Government of the constitutional rights
of the Canadian Government to remove Lieut. Governors
for proper cause. During his absence in England, 20
May, 1879, was apptd. Minister of Public Works. A Conservative.—Corner of St. Louis and St. Ursule Streets, Quebec;
45 Slater Street, Ottawa; Rideau Club.

Laurier, Hon. Wilfrid, B.C.L., Q.C., P.C. (Quebec East.)

Family among the first established in La Nouvelle France. S. of the late M. Carolus Laurier, P.L.S. B. at St. Lin, L'Assomption, P.Q., 20 Nov. 1841. Ed. at L'Assomption Coll. M., 13 May 1868, Miss Lafontaine. Obtained degree of B.C.L. at McGill Univ. 1864. Studied law with Hon. R. Laflamme, Q.C., and was called to the Bar, L.C., 1865. Apptd. Q.C., 11 Oct. 1880. A dir. of the Royal Mutual Life Ins. Co. Edited Le Defricheur newspaper for a short time. Was a Delegate to the Dominion Prohibitory Convention, Montreal, 1875. Sat for Drummond and Arthabaska in Quebec Assem. from g. e. 1871 until Jan. 1874, when he resigned in order to contest the seat for the Commons, in which he was successful, Sworn of the Privy Council as Minister of Inland Revenue, Sept. 1877, which office he held until the resignation of the Govt., 1878; defeated in Drummond and Arthabaska upon appealing to his constituents; elected immediately after for Quebec East, upon resignation of Hon. I. Thibaudeau. Re-elected g. e. 1878, 1882 and again at last g. e. A Liberal.—Quebec: Rideau Club: The Garrison Club, Quebec.

LAVERGNE, JOSEPH. (Drummond and Arthabaska.)

S. of the late David Lavergne, Esq., of St. Peter, whose ancestors came to Can. from Limoges, France, in 1650 and of Marie Genevieve Delagrave, whose ancestors came from Berri, France, about 1750. B. at St. Peter, Co. of Montmagny, 29 Oct. 1847. Ed. at St. Anne's Coll. M., Nov. 1876, Emily, dau. of J. E. Barthe, Esq., ex-M.P.P. for Yamaska. Called to the Bar of Prov. of Quebec 1869.

Is partner of Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, M.P. Is Mayor of Arthabaskaville and Warden of the Co. of Arthabaska. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal and a Prohibitionist.—Arthabaskaville, P.Q.

LISTER, JAMES FREDERICK. (West Lambton.)

Eldest s. of George, fifth s. of Capt. James Lister, of the British Revenue Service, by Josephine, second dau. of Capt. James Davis, R.N. B. at Belleville, Ont., 21 June, 1843, and ed. at the Grammar School, Sarnia. M., in Aug. 1864, Eliza, only dau. of Mr. Andrew Alexander. Studied law with his uncle, F. Davis, Esq., now Judge of the Co. of Middlesex, Ont.; admitted an Attorney, 4 Sept., 1865 and called to the Bar of Ont., Trinity Term 1875. Has been Crown Prosecutor at the Assizes for some years. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1882 and re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal.—Sarnia.

LIVINGSTON, JAMES. (South Waterloo.)

B. in East Kilbride, Scot. 29 Nov. 1838. Ed. there. Came to Can. 1856. M., June 1861, Miss Louisa Liersch of Baden. Is a merchant and largely interested in flax cultivation and manufacture of linseed oil for several years. Has been Reeve of the Tp. of Wilmot. Elected to represent South Waterloo in Leg. Assem. Ont., at g. e. 1879. Resigned May 1882 to run for present seat in Commons. First returned to Commons at g. e. 1882 and reelected at last g. e. A Reformer.—Baden, Ont.

LOVITT, JOHN. (Yarmouth.)

Family of Norman French origin, came over to Eng. with William the Conqueror, and settled in the Co. of Bucks; a branch of the family removed to Mass. and from there to Yarmouth, N.S. in 1766. Eldest s. of the late John W. Lovitt. B. at Yarmouth, 9 Oct. 1832. Ed. at the Academy there. M. 26 Jan. 1860, Elizabeth, second dau. of the late Robt. Guest. Is a master mariner and shipowner. Was a dir. of the Pacific Insu. Co. from its formation until it ceased to do business. Is a dir. of the Bank of Yarmouth, the Yarmouth Water Co. and Township dir. of the Western Counties Railway Co. Sat in the N. S. Ho. of Assem. for Yarmouth from g. e. 1874 until 1878, when he was not a candidate. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal and opposed to the National Policy. Favors reciprocal trade with the U. S. and a

repeal of the B. N. A. Act so far as it applies to N. S.— Yarmouth, N.S.

Macdonald, The Right Hon. Sir John Alexander, G.C.B., D.C.L. (Oxon), LL.D., Q.C., P.C. (Carleton, Ont., and Kingston.)

Eld. s. of the late Hugh Macdonald, Esq., of Kingston, Ont., and formerly of Sutherlandshire, Scot. B. in Glasgow, Scot., 11 Jan. 1815. Ed. at Royal Grammar School, Kingston, under Dr. Wilson, a Fellow of Oxford Univ. M. 1st, Isabella, dau. of the late Alexander Clark, Esq., of Dalnavert, Inverness-shire, Scot., (she d. 1856); 2nd, 1867, Susan Agnes, dau of the late Hon. T. J. Bernard, a mem. of Her Majesty's Privy Council of the Island of Jamaica. Studied law with the late Mr. George Mackenzie, and was called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1836. Apptd. a Q.C 1846. A Bencher, ex-officio, of the Law Society of Ontario. Is the grand representative in Can. of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Eng., and holds the rank of a Past Grand Senior Warden of the Freemasons of Can. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council of Can. from 11 May 1847 to 10 March 1848 (in the Administration of the late Hon. Mr. Morris); from 11 Sept. 1854 to 29 July 1858 (in the McNab-Morin, the Taché-Macdonald and the Macdonald-Cartier Administrations); from 6 Aug. same year, to 23 May 1862 (in the Cartier-Macdonald Administration); from 30 March 1864 until the Union (in the Taché-Macdonald and the Belleau-Macdonald Administrations); and was, during these several periods, Receiver-General from 21 May to 7 Dec. 1847; Com. of Crown Lands from latter date to 10 March 1848; Attorney-General for U.C. from 11 September 1854 to 29 July 1858, when as Prime Minister, he and his Cabinet resigned, being defeated on the seat of Government question. Returned to office 6 August same year, as Postmaster-General, a position he resigned the following day, on his re-appointment as Attorney-General, U.C. which he continued to hold until the defeat of the Administration on the Militia Bill, May 1862, when he and his colleagues again retired from office. The late Sir George E. Cartier and he led the Opposition in the Assem, until the defeat of the Sandfield Macdonald-Dorion Govt., when the Taché-Macdonald Govt. was formed, 30 Mar. 1864, and he returned to his old office of Attorney-General, and was Govt. leader in the Assem. from that time until the Union of the B. A. Provinces, 1867. Held the office of Minister of Militia Affairs jointly with that of Attorney-General, from Jan. to May 1862, and from Aug.

1865 until the Union. Was requested to take the place of Sir E. P. Taché as Prime Minister, on the death of that gentleman in 1865, but waived his claim in favour of Sir N. F. Belleau. Has been a delegate to England and other countries on public business on many occasions, and was a delegate to the Conference in Charlottetown in 1864, which had been convened for the purpose of effecting a Union of the Maritime Provinces, to that which succeeded in Quebec, same year, to arrange basis of Union of all B.A. Colonies: and was Chairman of the London Colonial Conference, 1866-7, when the Act of Union, known as the "British North America Act," was passed by the Imperial Parlt. On 1 July, 1867, when the new Constitution came into force, was called upon to form the first Govt. for the new Dominion, and was sworn of the Privy Council and was apptd. Minister of Justice and Attorney-General of Can., an office he continued to fill until he and his Ministry resigned on the Pacific Railway charges, 6 Nov., 1873. On the resignation of the Reform Administration, Oct. 1878, formed the present Government, in which he became Minister of the Interior. Resigned this Portfolio and became Presdt. of the Council and Superintendent-General of Indian Affairs, 17 Oct., 1883. In 1871 was apptd. one of Her Majesty's Joint High Commissioners and Plenipotentiaries, together with Earl de Gray (now Marquis of Ripon), Sir Stafford Northcote Sir Edward Thornton, and Right Hon. Montague Bernard, to act in connection with five commissioners named by the President of the United States, for the settlement of the Alabama claims, and of matters in dispute between Great Britain and the United States, the labours of which Joint High Commission resulted in the Treaty of Washington, signed at Washington, U.S., on 8 May, 1871. Received degree of D.C.L. (hon.) from Oxford Univ., 1865. Is also LL.D. of Queen's Univ., Kingston, and of McGill Univ., Montreal, and a D.C.L. of Univ. of Trinity Coll., Toronto. Created K.C.B. (civil), July 1867, and a G.C.B., Nov 1884. Created a Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Order of Isabel la Catolica (of Spain), Jan. 1872. Nominated a mem. of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, July 1872, and sworn in Aug. 1879. Unanimously elected leader of the Can. Liberal Conservative Opposition, 6 Nov., 1873. Sat for Kingston in the Can. Assem. from Nov. 1844 until the Union. Returned for same seat in Commons at g.e., 1867; at g.e., 1872, and at g.e., 1874. Unseated on petition, 21 Nov., 1874; re-elected 29 Dec., 1874. Contested the city of Kingston at g.e., 1878, when he was defeated. Immediately afterwards was elected by acclamation for

Marquette, Man., which he vacated, on acceptance of office as Premier and Minister of the Interior on 17 Oct., 1878. Was then elected for Victoria, B.C. Elected for Carleton and Lennox at g.e., 1882, and subsequently decided to sit for the former constituency. Elected for the constituencies of Carleton and Kingston at g.e., 1887. The following are among the principal measures which have been carried through Parlt. by the Right Hon. Knight, viz.:—The secularization of the clergy reserves; the improvement of the criminal laws; the promotion of public instruction; the consolidation of the statutes; the extension of the municipal system; the reorganization of the militia; the settlement of the seat of Government question; the establishment of direct steam mail communications with Europe; the establishment of additional penitentiaries, criminal lunatic asylums and reformatory prisons, and providing for the inspection thereof; the providing for the internal economy for the House of Commons; the reorganization of the Civil Service on a permanent basis; the construction of the Intercolonial Railway; the enlargement of the canals; the enactment of a stringent election law; the ratification of the Washington Treaty; the Confederation of B. N. A., and extension and consolidation of the Dominion. In his position as leader of the Opposition, Sir John, on several occasions, gave the late Government the benefit of his ability and long experience in perfecting several of their most important measures, notably the Insolvent Act and the Act constituting the Supreme Court of the Dominion. During the summer of 1880, Sir John visited England in company with Ministers of Railways and Agriculture, where they arranged the contract for the construction of the Pacific Railway, to which Parlt. has given effect. Visited Eng. again Nov. 1884, and while there he was recognized as the pioneer of the idea of Imperial Unity. He attended the Conference held in London on 18 Nov., 1884, at which the Imperial Federation League was formed, and he moved the appt. of a General Committee to conduct its affairs. - Earnscliffe, Ottawa; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.

Macdonald, Peter, M.D. (East Huron.)

Parents, from Inverness, Scot., settled in Pictou, N.S., in 1830, and removed to Co. of Huron in 1846. B. in Pictou, N.S., 14 Aug., 1835, and ed. in Toronto. M., 21 Feb., 1865, Margaret Ross. Is a practising physician. Has been Mayor, Reeve and Councillor of the town of Wingham, and Chairman of the Board of School Trustees for a

number of years. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal. Favors Senate and Civil Service reform, and the delegation to Canada by the Imperial Government of the power of making her own treaties with foreign Powers.— Wingham, Ont.

MacDowall, Day Hort. (Suskatchewan.)

Second s. of Henry MacDowall, of Garthland, Scot., vide Nesbitt's Heraldry. B. in 1850 at Carruth House, Renfrewshire, Scot. M., 12 Aug., 1884, Miss Blanchard. Ed. at Windlesham, Surrey, Eng., and Trinity Coll., Glenalmond, Scot. Is a lumber manufacturer. Was a Capt. in the Renfrewshire Rifle Vol. from 1872 to 1879. Accompanied Gen. Middleton's force through the late North-West Rebellion, and took charge of the party despatched by the General through the rebel district from Humboldt to Prince Albert. Sat in the N.-W. Council for the Dist. of Lorne from 5 June, 1883, to Sept. 1885. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Prince Albert, N.W.T.; Manitoba Club, Winnipeg; Wanderers' Club, Pall Mall, London, England; Rideau Club, Ottawa.

MACKENZIE, Hon. ALEXANDER, P.C. (East York.)

Third s. of the late Alexander Mackenzie, of Logierait, Perthshire, Scot., by Mary, second dau. of Mr. Donald Fleming, of the same parish; and grands. of Mr. Malcolm Mackenzie, of Strathtummel. The family, consisting of the parents and seven sons, came to Can. 1842. One of the sons—the late Hope F. Mackenzie, Esq.—represented Lambton, and afterwards North Oxford, in the Can. Assem. for some years. B. near Dunkeld, Perthshire, 28 Jan. 1882. Ed. at the public schools of Moulin, Dunkeld, and Perth. M., 1st, Helen, dau of the late Mr. Wm. Neil, of Irvine, Scot. (she d. 2 Jan., 1852); 2nd, 17 June, 1853, Jane, eldest dau. of the late Mr. Robert Sym, of Perthshire, Scot. In youth learned the business of a builder and architect, and after arrival in Can. became a contrac-For some years edited the Lambton Shield, a Reform journal. Is Presdt of the Sovereign Fire Ins. Co., also of the North American Life Ins. Co., and a dir. of the Building and Loan Asso. Was Major 27th Lambton Batt. of V. I. for some years, up to Oct. 1874, when he resigned. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, and Treas. of Ont. (in Mr. Blake's Administration), from 21 Dec. 1871 until Oct. 1872, when he retired with Mr. Blake for the purpose of confining themselves entirely to Dominion politics. Declined

a seat in the Can. Cabinet on the occasion of the retirement of Mr. Brown, 1865. Was leader of Ontario Reform Opposition in House of Commons from the Union until 1873, when elected leader of the whole Opposition party, and continued in that position until 5 Nov., 1873, when, owing to the resignation of Sir John Macdonaid, he was called on to form a new Administration, a duty he succeeded in accomplishing on the 7th of the same month, when he and his colleagues were sworn of the Privy Council, he (Mr. M.) taking the office of Minister of Public Works, which he held until he resigned, with the other members of the Ministry, Oct. 1878. Proceeded to the Mother Country in June, 1875, and while there was presented with the freedom of Irvine, Dundee and Perth, and visited Her Majesty at Windsor Castle. During a visit to Scot., 1881, for the benefit of his health, was presented with the freedom of Inverness. Sat for present seat in Can. Assem. from 1861 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1867, and at g.e. 1872; again at g.e. 1874; re-elected by acclamation on his appt. to office; and again at g.e. 1878. Elected for present seat at g.e. 1882 and again at g.e. 1887. Represented West Middlesex in local House from g.e. 1871 until Oct. 1872, when he resigned. Several important measures owe their existence to Mr. M. as a private mem., viz: the Act amending the Assessment Act of U.C. (1863); that consolidating and amending the Acts relating to the Assessment of Property, U.C. (1866); and the highly useful measure for providing means of egress from Public Buildings (1866). As Chairman of Committee on Municipal and Assessment Laws (1866), wrote and framed the greater part of the General Act on Municipal Corporations, etc. All the measures of his Government, including the enactment of a stringent election law, with the trial of election petitions by judges, and vote by ballot; the abolition of the real estate qualification of members; the better administration of penitentiaries; the enactment of the Marine telegraph law, which virtually abolished the monopoly of the Cable Company; the establishment of a Dominion Military College, and improvement of the militia system; the enlargement of the canals; the permanent organization of the Civil Service; the establishment of a Supreme Court for the Dominion; the reduction of postage to and from the U.S.: the free delivery of postal matter in cities and towns; the opening of direct mail communication with the West Indies; the construction of a trans-continental telegraph line; the better administration of Government Railways; an improved copywright law; the adoption of a final route for the Pacific Railway; the opening of negotiations, conducted on our behalf by our own delegate in person, between Can. and the U.S., for the establishment of an equitable Reciprocity Treaty between the two countries; a new insolvent law; and the establishment of a Territorial Government for the North-West, have all been, more or less, moulded and directed by him. In addition, two very important questions, which for some time agitated the public mind and threatened the gravest complications —the Manitoba amnesty and the New Brunswick school questions—were satisfactorily adjusted during Mr. M's. administration. A Liberal; and "has always held those political principles—which by some in England may be considered peculiar—of the universal brotherhood of man, no matter in what rank of life he may have taken his origin. Has believed, and now believes, in the extinction of all class legislation, and of all legislation that tends to promote any body of men, or class of men, for the mere fact of their belonging to a body or class, to a higher position politically than any other class in the country. In our great colonies, while no fault is found with the political organization of the Mother Country, or any other country, we take our stand simply and completely on the ground that every man is equal in the eye of the law. and has the same opportunity, by exercising the talents with which God has blessed him, of rising in the world, in confidence of his fellow-citizens—one man quite as much as another. Believes thoroughly in party government, and that it is utterly impossible to conduct the government of a new country without it. While an earnest advocate and upholder of the present connection with the Mother Country, he will always endeavor to maintain Canadian rights and to bring Canada into prominence in the eyes of the world."-Toronto; Toronto Club.

McCarthy, Dalton, Q.C. (North Simcoe.)

Descended from an Irish family, his father being a solicitor of Dublin, and grandfather, Bucknell Henry McCarthy, a mem. of the Irish Bar. B. at Oakley Park, near Dublin, 10 Oct., 1836. Ed. at Rev. Mr. Harnman's School, Blackrock; at Rev. Mr. Flynn's School, Dublin; and at Barrie Grammar School. M., 1st, 21 Oct. 1867, Emma Catherine, dau. of Edmund G. Lally, Esq., of Barrie; 2nd, 15 July, 1873, Agnes Elizabeth, relict of Richard B. Bernard, Esq. Called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1859. Apptd. a Q.C., 18 Dec., 1872. Is a Bencher of the Law Soc., Ont. Was Presdt. of Agricultural Soc. of North

Riding of Simcoe, until its dissolution by the division of the North Riding into East and West Ridings, since which time he has been Presdt. of the West Riding Agricultural Soc. Has also been Presdt., since formation, 1873, of the Liberal Conservative Asso. of North Riding of Simcoe. Contested North Simcoe unsuccessfully, 1872–74. First returned to Parlt. for Cardwell, 14 Dec., 1876. Returned for North Simcoe g.e. 1878, and re-elected at g.e. 1882 and again at last g.e. A Conservative.—Toronto; Rideau Club.

McCulla, William Armstrong. (Peel.)

Descended on the paternal side from an old family in Sligo, Irel. B. in Sligo, 1837. Ed. there and in Can. M., Elizabeth McBride, dau. of one of the first settlers in the Tp. of Chinguacousy. Is a builder. Has been a mem. of the Municipal Council for thirteen years; Mayor of Brampton for three years. Reeve three years and Warden of the Co. of Peel; Presdt. of the Water Works Committee and a mem. of the Public School Board. Was Presdt. of the Lib. Conserv. Asso., Co. of Peel, for nine years. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Brampton, Ont.

McDonald, John Archibald. (Victoria, N.S.)

Parents came from Uigg, Isle of Skye, Scot. Second s. of Lauchlin McDonald, North East Margaree, N.S. B. there, 25 Feb., 1851. Ed. at Horton Academy and Acadia Coll., Wolfville, N.S. M., 27 Jan., 1885, Katie Jeanette, only dau. of the late Thos. Hume, of Halifax. Called to the Bar, N.S., 8 Dec., 1877. Was one of the Ex. Committee of the Cape Breton Exhibitions in 1880 and 1884. Is a Trustee of the Baddeck Academy and has been Clerk to the Municipality of Victoria. Sat in the Nova Scotia Assem. from g.e. 1882 until g.e. 1886, when he was not a candidate. First returned to the Commons at last g.e. A Conservative.—Baddeck, Cape Breton, N.S.

McDougald, John, J.P. (Pictou.)

S. of Dougald McDougald and Elizabeth Fraser. Ancestors came from Inverness-shire, Scot. B. in Blue Mountain, Pictou Co., N.S., 13 March, 1848. Ed. at New Glasgow Grammar School. A merchant. M., 9 Nov., 1882, Maggie J. McLeod, of Westville. Appointed a J.P. in 1879. Elected County Councillor of the Municipal Council of Pictou Co. in 1879, and subsequently in 1880,

1882 and 1884. First returned to Parlt. 18 June, 1881, on the elevation of Hon. James McDonald to the Office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of N.S. Re-elected at g.e. 1882, and again at g.e. 1887. A Liberal Conservative, and in favour of protection to native industries.— Westville, N.S.

McDougall, Hector Francis, J.P. (Cape Breton.)

Grand parents from the Island of Barra, Scot. S. of Malcolm McDougall, merchant of Christmas Island, and Mary McNeil. B. at Christmas Island, Cape Breton, 6 June, 1848, and ed. there. M., at Arichat, C.B., 6 Sept., 1875, Christina, dau. of Allan Cameron, of Antigonish, N.S. Has been a J.P. since 1873. Sat. in Leg. Assem., N.S., from g.e. 1878 to June 1882. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.S., from 22 Oct., 1878 to 23 May, 1882. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat in the Commons at g.e. 1882. Elected, July, 1884, on the appt. of the sitting mem. to the Senate. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Christmas Island, C.B., N.S.

McGreevy, Thomas. (Quebec West.)

McLelan, Hon. Archibald Woodbury, P.C. (Colchester.)

A descendant of a family which came from Londonderry, Irel., in the last century and settled in N.S. Only s. of the late G. W. McLelan, Esq., who sat in the N.S. Assem. for a lengthened period. B. at Londonderry, N.S., 24 Dec., 1824. Ed. there and at Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy. M., 1854, Miss Caroline Metzler, of Halifax.

Was in mercantile business in early life, and latterly engaged in ship-building and ship-owning. Is a dir. of the Cobequid Marine Insu. Co. Sat for Colchester in N.S. Assem. from 1858 to 1863; for Northern Colchester from latter date until the Union, and for Colchester in the Commons from the Union until called to the Senate, 21 June, 1869. Was opposed to Confederation until "better terms' were yielded to N.S. Apptd. one of the Commrs. for the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, June 1869. Was Commr. from Can. at the Intercolonial Fisheries Exhibition in London, Eng., 1883, and received a diploma of honor for special services rendered in connectton therewith. Sworn a mem. of the Cabinet and apptd. Presdt. of the Privy Council, 20 May, 1881, on which occasion he resigned his seat in the Senate and was elected for present seat. Apptd. Minister of Marine and Fisheries, 10 July, 1882; Minister of Finance, 10 Dec., 1885, and Postmaster-General, 27 Jan., 1887. Re-elected at g.e., 1882, and at last g.e. Mongenais, who sat for Vaudreuil, in the Commons, from 1878 to 1882. A trader. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—Rigaud, P.Q.

McMullen, James. (North Wellington.)

Second s. of Archibald McMullen, who emigrated from the Co. of Monaghan, Irel., in 1846, and settled near Fergus, Ont. B. in the Co. of Monaghan, Irel., in 1833, and came with his father to Canada in 1846. Ed. at the Common School, Fergus. M., 30 Sept., 1858, Mary Ann, youngest dau. of Robert Dunbar, Esq., late of Guelph, Ont. Is a merchant. Has been a Councillor and Reeve of Mount Forrest. Was a dir. and Vice-President of the Georgian Bay and Wellington Railway, and is now a dir. of the Grand Trunk, Georgian Bay and Lake Erie Railway. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882 and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal. Supports the autonomy of each Province; in favor of reducing the number of senators, and Parliamentary representatives, and making the former elective; opposed to giving tracts of land to colonization companies, and opposed to a discriminating tariff.—

McNeill, Alexander. (North Bruce.)

Eldest s. of the late Mr. John Mara, of Toronto, Ont. B. and ed. there. Settled in B.C. 1862. M. Alice Telfer, only dau of F. J. Barnard, Esq., ex-M.P. Is a merchant and a J.P. Sat in Leg. Assem. for Kootenay, from g.e. 1871 until g e. 1875, when returned for Yale. Re-elected at g.e. 1878, and sat until the g.e. 1886, when he was not a candidate. First returned to the Commons at g.e. 1887, by acclamation. Was Speaker of the Leg. Assem. from 25 Jan., 1883, until the dissolution in 1886. A Conservative.—Kamloops; Union Club, Victoria, B.C.

MARSHALL, JOSEPH HENRY. (East Middlesex.)

Family, natives of Eng., resided in the Co. of Longford, Irel., for 15 years, prior to settling in Canada. B. in London, Ont., 1854. Ed. at the Collegiate Institute and at Hellmuth Coll., London. M. at London, Amy, only dau. of Richard Law Crump, of Algoa Bay, South Africa. Is a farmer. Has represented his Co. as Reeve and Warden for five years. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Cedar Terrace, London Tp., London, P.O.

Masson, James, Q.C. (North Grey.)

S. of Thomas W. S. Masson, Esq., of Seymour, Co. of Northumberland, Ont., and grandson of Capt. Thomas Masson, R.A., whose residence was at St. Andrew's, Scot. B. in the Tp. of Seymour, Ont., 17 Feb., 1847. Ed. in the Common Sch. and at Belleville Grammar Sch. M., 29 July, 1873, Jessie, fourth dau. of Rev. D. Morrison, of Knox Church, Owen Sound. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1871,

and apptd. Q.C., Oct. 1885. Was Master in Chancery at Owen Sound, from 1873 to Dec. 1885, when he resigned. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—

MILLS, Hon. DAVID, LL.B. (Bothwell.)

Elected a mem. of the Council of Public Instruction for Ont. (representing the School Inspectors) Aug. 1875. Sworn as Minister of the Interior, Oct. 1876, which position he held until resignation of Govt., Oct. 1878. An unsuccessful candidate for a seat in the Council of Public Instruction, Ont., 1874. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1872; at g.e. 1874; at g.e. 1878; defeated at g.e. 1882, but subsequently awarded the seat by the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada. Re-elected at last g.e. An advanced Liberal.—Palmyra, Ont.

MILLS, JOHN BURPEE: (Annapolis.)

Youngest s. of John Mills, Esq., merchant and ship-owner, Granville Ferry. Ancestors came from Yorkshire, Eng., and settled in N.S. about 1770. B. at Granville Ferry, 24 July, 1850. Ed. at Acadia Coll., Wolfville, N.S., graduating with Honors in 1871. Received degree of M.A., 1877. M., 23 Oct., 1878, Bessie, second dau. of A. W. Corbitt, Esq. Attended the Law Sch. at Harvard Univ. for one year, and was called to the Bar, N.S., 1875. Was a mem. of the Municipal Council of Annapolis from 1882 to 1887, and is a dir. and office-holder in several local corporations. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative. Believes in "Canada for the Cana-

dians" if fair reciprocal trade relations cannot be obtained from the United States. Regards the Repeal and Annexation cries with contempt.—Annapolis Royal, N.S.

MITCHELL, Hon. Peter, P.C. (Northumberland, N.B.)

Parents came from Scot. to N.B., and settled on the Miramichi, in that Province, 1818. B. in Newcastle, Miramichi, 1824. Ed. at the Grammar Sch there. M., 1853, Mrs. Gough, of St. John. Called to the Bar, N. B., 1848. Has been an extensive shipbuilder. Author of A Review of President Grant's Recent Message to the United States Congress Relative to the Canadian Fisheries, and the Navigation of the St. Lawrence River (Ottawa, 1870.) Sworn of the Privy Council, July 1867, and was Minister of Marine and Fisheries from that date until 5 Nov. 1874, when he retired from office with his Chief, Sir John A. Macdonald. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from 1858 to March 1865, when his party was defeated on an appeal to the people on the scheme for the Confederation of B. N.A. In April, 1866, after the resignation of the Smith Cabinet, was called upon to form a Government, in connection with the Hon. R. D. Wilmot, which he did, holding the office of President of Ex. Council from that date until the Union. Was a delegate to Quebec in 1861, and again in 1862, on the subject of the Intercolonial Railway; to the Union Conference, in same city, 1864; and to the London Colonial Conference to complete terms of Union of B.N.A. Provinces, 1866. Sat for Northumberland in N.B. Assem. from 1856 to 1860, when apptd. to L.C., same Province, where he remained until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867; continued to sit in that House until ge. 1872, when he resigned, and was returned for Northumberland in the House of Commons by acclamation. Re-elected at g.e. 1874; defeated at g.e. 1878; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1882 and re-elected at last g.e. An Independent Liberal.—Montreal; Rideau Club; St. James Club, Montreal.

Moffat, Robert. (Restigouche.)

S. of the late Geo. Moffat, Esq., M.P. for Restigouche. B. at Campbellton, Co. of Restigouche, 5 March, 1844. Ed. at the Academy, Annan, Dumfries-shire, Scot. M., 20 Oct., 1876, Margaret, youngest dau. of David Sadler, Esq., Deputy Crown Land Surveyor. Is a merchant. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—Dalhousie, N.B.

Moncrieff, George. (East Lambton.)

S. of W. G. Moncrieff, London, Ont., and grands. of the late Rev. John Moncrieff, Professor of Hebrew, Glasgow, Scot. B., 1842, at Musselburgh, Scot. Was a pupil in the Southern Academy, Edinburgh, in 1854. Came with his parents to London, Ont., and attended the classes of the late Professor McGauley. M., 1872, at the Tp. of Adelaide, Isabella, eldest dau. of Thomas Thompson, Esq. Called to the Bar, U.C., 1864. Was Reeve of the village of Petrolia 1867 and 1873, and Mayor of the Town of Petrolia 1874. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Petrolia, Ont.

Montague, Walter Humphries, M.D. (Haldimand.)

S. of the late Joseph Montague, farmer, in the Tp. of Adelaide, Co. of Middlesex, Ont. B. there 21 Nov. 1858. Ed. at the Common Sch. of the Tp., the High Sch.; Woodstock Coll., Toronto Sch. of Medicine and at Victoria Univ. where he graduated M.D. 1882. Is a Licentiate of the Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons, Ont., and of the Royal Coll. of Physicians, Edinburgh, Scot. M. 19 Mar. 1879, Augie, dau. of Elias Furry, Esq., J.P., Reeve of South Cayuga, Co. of Haldimand. Was an unsuccessful candidate at g. e. 1886 for present seat in Leg. Assem. Ont. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative. —Dunnville, Ont.

MONTPLAISIR, HYPOLITE. (Champlain.)

S. of Mr. Paschal Montplaisir, by Victoire Crevier. B. at Cap de la Madelaine, P.Q., 7 March 1839. Ed. at Three Rivers. A farmer. Has been Secretary and Treasurer of Schools, and Mayor of the parish. Second s. of the late Thomas H. Assem. of U.C. for Simcoe, in 1829. B. at Bond Head, Tp. of West Gwillimbury, Co. of Simcoe, 19 Jan. 1843. Ed. at Newmarket Grammar School and Univ. of Toronto,

where he was Gold Medallist in Modern Languages, and graduated in Arts in 1863. Called to the Bar of Ontario in 1868. For four years one of the Examiners in and Lecturer on Equity for the Law Soc. Elected a member of the Senate of the Univ. of Toronto in 1873 and 1878, and elected Vice-Chancellor of the Univ. in 1881 and 1882. Is Presdt. of the Farmers' Loan and Savings Co., and the Victoria Rolling Stock Co., and a dir. of the Toronto General Trusts Co. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1882 and re-elected at last g. e. O'BRIEN, Lieut.-Col. WILLIAM EDWARD. (Muskoka.)

Eldest s. of Edward G. O'Brien, from the Co. of Clare, Irel., one of the first settlers in the Co. of Simcoe, Ont., B. at Thornhill, Ont., 10 Mar. 1881, and ed. at U.C. Coll. Toronto. M. in 1864, the only dau. of the late Col. Loring, Toronto. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1874. Is engaged in farming. Is Lieut.-Col. commanding 35th Batt. (Simcoe Foresters) Vol. Milt. Commanded the York and Simcoe Regt. during the North-West Rebellion, 1885. Was an unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e. 1878. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—The Woods, Shanty Bay, Ont.

Ouimet, Lieut.-Col. Hon. Joseph Alderic, LL.B., Q.C. (Laval.)

Family one of the oldest in the Dist. of Montreal. S. of M. Michel Ouimet, J.P. B. at St. Rose, P.Q., 20 May, 1848. Ed. at the Seminary of St. Therese de Blainville; graduated as LL.B. at Victoria Coll., Cobourg, 1869. M. 30 July, 1874, Theresa, dau. of Alfred La Rocque, Esq., of Montreal, by Dame Emelie Berthelet. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1870; apptd. a Q.C. 11 Oct., 1880. Is head of the law firm of Ouimet, Cornellier & Lajoie, Montreal. Apptd. a mem. of Board of R. C. School Commrs. for Montreal, 1874. Is now a dir. of Montreal City and District Savings Bank; Presdt. of the Laval Agricultural Soc. and Lieut.-Col. of the 65th Batt. Volunteer Rifles (Mount Royal.) Commanded the Batt. throughout the North-West Rebellion Campaign, 1885, and rendered valuable services in the Edmonton district by pacifying the Indians and persuading the Half-breeds to support the Dominion Govt. Is Chairman of the Council of the Dominion Rifle Asso. First returned to Parlt. Nov. 1873; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1874 and 1878. Re-elected at g.e. 1882, and

again at last g.e. Apptd. Speaker of the House of Commons, 13 April, 1887. A Liberal Conservative, and was returned as an independent supporter of Sir John Macdonald. Is strongly in favour of Provincial autonomy. Supports a protective tariff; and any well devised scheme for the improvement of the country. Patterson, James Colebrooke. (North Essex.)

S. of the late Rev. James Patterson, formerly of Kingston, near Dublin. B. at Armagh, Irel., 1839. Ed. in Dublin. Is a practising Barrister of Ont. Was Reeve of Windsor for several years. First returned to Parlt. for the North Riding of Essex in the Leg. Assem., Ont., at the g.e. Jan. 1875. Resigned, and was returned to the Commons at g.e. 1878. Re-elected at g.e. 1882, and again at last g.e. A Conservative.—Windsor, Ont.; Rideau Club.

Perley, William Goodhue. (Ottawa City.)

Descended from Allan Perley, a native of Wales, Eng., who arrived in Charlestown, near Boston, Mass., 12 July, 1630. S. of John Perley, of Enfield, State of New Hampshire. B. there, 4 June, 1820, and ed. in the Common Schools of the country. M. 1st., 14 Sept., 1846, Mabel Ticknor (she d.); 2nd, 20 June, 1866, Georgianna M. Gale. Is a lumberman and was one of the promoters of the Canada Atlantic Railway. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative and a Protectionist.—Ottawa.

Perley, William Dell. (East Assiniboia.)

S. of Hon. W. E. Perley, of Sunbury, N.B., a descen-

dant of Allan Perley, who emigrated from Wales to Mass. in 1630, and some of whose descendants were U. E. Loyalists. B. at Gladstone, Sunbury, 6 Feb., 1838. Ed. at Sackville Academy and the Baptist Seminary, N.B. M., 20 Sept., 1860, Pheebe Augusta Slipp, of Hampstead, N.B. Is a capitalist and engaged in farming. Was a mem. of the Municipal Council of Sunbury for seven years, and was a mem. and chairman of the first Municipal Council of Wolseley, N.W.T. Sat in the North-West Council from Sept. 1885 to Feb. 1887, and was a mem. of the delegation from N.W.T. to confer with the Dominion Govt. on N.W. matters in 1886. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Wolseley, N.W.T.

Perry, Stanislaus Francis. (Prince, P.E.I.)

An unsuccessful candidate for Prince in House of Commons, Sept. 1873. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1874; defeated at g.e. 1878. Re-elected to Ho. of Assem. 1879, and again at g.e. 1882 and 1886. Resigned 1887 and was re-elected to the Commons at g.e. 1887. A Liberal.— Tignish, P.E.I.

PLATT, JOHN MILTON, M.D. (Prince Edward.)

Grand parents came from Duchess Co., State of New York, about 1790, and settled in Hallowell, Co. of Prince Edward, when that district was in a state of nature. B. in the Tp. of Athol, Co. of Prince Edward, in 1840. Ed. at Fort Edward Institute, N. York State, the Normal School, Toronto, and Victoria Coll., Cobourg, at the last of which he graduated M.D. M. 1872, at Hallowell, a dau. of the late Arthur Branscombe, Esq., whose parents came from N.B. Was a Public School Inspector for ten years; is a graduate of the Military School, Toronto (1866), and is Surgeon to the 16th Batt. V.M. Was the first editor and publisher of the Picton New Nation, which subsequently merged into the Times. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at g. e. 1887. A Liberal.—Picton, Ont.

POPE, Hon. JOHN HENRY, P.C. (Compton.)

B. in Eastern Townships, P.Q., in 1824. Ed. at the High School in Compton. Engaged in agricultural pursuits in early life. Is Presdt. of the International Railway of Maine, and of the Compton Colonization Soc.; one of the Trustees of the St. Francis Coll., Richmond, P.Q.; and a dir. of the Eastern Townships Bank. Commanded the Cookshire Volunteer Cavalry for many years, and retired, retaining his rank as Major, 1862. Sworn of the Privy Council, and was Minister of Agriculture from 25 Oct., 1871, until 5 Nov., 1873, when he retired with Sir John A. Macdonald, on the Pacific Railway Question. Apptd. Minister of Agriculture 17 Oct., 1878. Minister of Railways and Canals 25 Sept., 1885. Sat for present seat in Can. Assem. from 1857 until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat at g.e. 1854. Returned to Commons by acclamation at g.e. 1867, on his appt. to office, at g.e. in 1872; at g.e. 1874; and again at g.e. 1878. Re-elected at g.e. 1882, and again at g.e. 1887. During the summer of 1880 visited England in company with Sir John A. Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper, and took an active part in the negotiations which led to the Pacific Railway contract, since ratified by Parlt. Liberal Conservative.—Cookshire, P.Q.; Rideau Club.

PORTER, ROBERT. (West Huron.)

B, in Ayrshire, Scot., 29 Jan., 1833. A farmer. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e. 1878 and 1882. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Elmvale, P.O.

PREFONTAINE, RAYMOND FOURNIER, B.C.L. (Chambly.)

Family settled in Chambly towards 1680. B. in Longueuil, P.Q., 16 Sept., 1850. Ed. by private tuition, and at the Jesuits Coll., Montreal. M., 20 June, 1876, Hermantine, dau. of J. B. Rolland, Esq., Paper Manufacturer, Montreal. Received the degree of B.C.L. from McGill Univ., and was called to the Bar, L.C., 1873. Was Mayor of Hochelaga from 1879 to 1884, and is now an Alderman of Montreal. Is Presdt. of the Young Liberals Assoc. of Can. Sat in the Quebec Assem. from g.e. 1875 until g.e. 1878, when he was an unsuccessful candidate. Upon the sitting mem. being unseated he was re-elected 26 June, 1879, and sat until g.e. 1881, when he was again an unsuccessful candidate. First returned to the Commons

July 1886, upon the resignation of the sitting mem., Mr. Benoit; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal and a Nationalist.—Montreal.

Purcell, Patrick. (Glengarry.)

Father was a native of Kilkenny, Irel., and mother of Glengarry, Argyleshire, Scot. B. in Glengarry, Ont., 1 May, 1833. M. 1852, Isabella, dau. of Angus McDonald, of Glengarry. Is a Railway and a Canal contractor, and constructed St. Peter's Canal, N.S.; Section 21 of Intercolonial Railway; 250 miles of Canadian Pacific Railway, west from Port Arthur, and several other important Railway and Canal works in Can. and the U.S. Has been Reeve of the Tp. Charlottenburg. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Reformer.—Summerstown, Ont.

PUTNAM, ALFRED. (Hants.)

Family of Scotch origin, settled in Massachusetts. B. at Noel, Co. of Hants, N.S., 1836. Ed. at the High Sch., Maitland. M., Jan. 1866, Miss Maggie Fleming. Is a shipbuilder, and Presdt. of the Hants Co. Marine Insur. Co. Sat in the Ho. of Assem., N.S., for Hants, from 1874 to 1878. First returned to Commons at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Maitland, N.S.

REID, JAMES. (Cariboo.)

Third son of James Reid, by Ann, youngest dau. of Thomas Maxwell, whose father came from Scotland and settled in the north of Ireland, 1770. Parents emigrated to Canada, 1832, and settled in the Tp. of Hull, P.Q. B. in the Tp. of Hull, 1 Aug. 1839. Ed. at the Common Schools. M., 14 Feb., 1883, Charlotte, youngest dau. of Nicholas Clarke, Manotic, Ont. Went to British Columbia in 1862. Engaged in mining and mercantile pursuits. A mem of the firm of Reid & Hodgson, Quesnelle. Presdt. of the Quesnelle Quartz Mining Co., Cariboo. First returned to Parlt. 31 March, 1881, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. J. S. Thompson. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at g.e. 1887. A Liberal Conservative. Favors protection to native industries, and in order to encourage emigration to new districts, main roads and other facilities of ingress should be projected ahead of settlement. — Quesnelle, B.C.

RINFRET, COME ISIAE, M.D. (Lotbinière.)

S. of F. J. Rinfret, Esq., merchant, by C. Thibaudeau, a sister of the Hon. Isidore Thibaudeau. B. Sept. 1847, at Cape Sante, Co. Portneuf. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec. M. Miss N. Laliberté, at St. Croix, in 1873. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1878. Re-elected at g.e. 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—St. Croix, Co. Lotbinière, P.Q.

RIOPEL, LOUIS JOSEPH, LL.B. (Bonaventure.)

Family among the first established in la Nouvelle France. S. of Louis Riopel, Esq., and Julie Mercure, of St. Jacques l'Achigan, Co. of Montcalm. B. there, 11 Nov. 1843. Ed. at l'Assomption Coll. and Laval Univ., where he graduated LL.B., July, 1880. M., 24 Nov., 1875, Marie Louise, dau. of the late L. A. Robitaille, Esq., N.P., of Varennes. Admitted as a Notary, Oct. 1865, and practised as such until July, 1880, when he was called to the Bar, P.Q. Was Superintendent of Colonization Works for the Co. of Bonaventure from 1869 to 1873, and Crown Land and Timber Agent from May, 1873, to Nov., 1881. Returned for present seat in the Leg. Assem. of Quebec at g.e. 1881 but resigned his seat in June, 1882, to become a candidate for the Commons, when elected by acclamation. Re-elected at g.e. 1887. A Conservative.—New Carlisle, P.Q.; 21 Ste. Genevieve St., The Cape, Quebec.

Robertson, Alexander. (West Hastings.)

A descendant of the Robertsons of Strowan, "who were noted for their bravery and fine physique." S. of Wm. Robertson, a native of Glenelg, Inverness-shire, Scot., who came to Can. in 1827, and settling in Trenton, Ont., engaged extensively in lumbering. His mother was Jane Simmons, of Murray, Ont., a dau. of a U.E. Loyalist. B. at Trenton, Ont., 5 Dec., 1838. Ed. at the Grammar School, Belleville. M., 16 June, 1870, Mary Georgina, dau. of Robert Stewart, M.D., Belleville, (she d. 17 April, 1874.) Called to the Bar, U.C., Michaelmas Term, 1864, and is senior member of the law firm of Robertson & Thomas. Was a member of the Town Council of Belleville from 1864 to 1869, and was elected Mayor in 1870. Became the first Mayor after its inauguration as a city in 1878, and was re-elected by acclamation in 1879. Is a Knight Templar of the Masonic Order; a Forrester; has several times been Presdt. of the St. Andrew's Soc., and the Curling and Cricket Clubs of Belleville; is a director

of the Hastings Building and Loan Soc., and a Trustee of St. Andrew's Church. On the appointment of Hon. Robert Read to the Senate in 1871, he declined election by acclamation to the Commons for East Hastings. Elected to the Leg. Assem., Ont., for present seat at g.e. 1879, but was subsequently unseated through corrupt practices by agents. Re-elected 6 Jan. 1880. Resigned his seat to become a candidate for the Commons, and was first elected at g.e. 1882. Re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—

Belleville, Ont.

ROBERTSON, JAMES EDWIN, M.D. (King's, P.E.I.)

Descended from the Robertsons' of Perthshire, Scot. S. of Peter Robertson, by Annie McFarlane, dau. of John McFarlane, Esq., of Montague, P.E.I. B. at New Perth, King's Co., P.E.I., 8 Oct., 1841. Ed. at McGill Univ., Montreal, where he graduated M.D. M. at Charlottetown, 1879, Elizabeth, dau of James McFarlane, Esq. Was elected to the Ho. of Assem., P.E.I., in 1870, by acclamation, and again by acclamation in 1872, and was a mem. of the Haythorn-Palmer Administration until 1873. Reelected 1876 and was a mem. of Davies Administration for a few months in 1878–9. Defeated at g.e. 1879. Reelected at g.e. 1882, but resigned to run for the Commons at g.e. 1882. Polled an even vote with his opponent, Mr. A. C. Macdonald, to whom the seat was finally awarded. Elected at g.e. 1887. A Liberal—Montague, P.E I.

ROBERTSON, THOMAS. (Shelburne.)

S. of Hon. Robert Robertson, ex-Commr. of Mines and Public Works, N.S., who represented Shelburne in N.S. Leg. from 1855 to 1878, by Sarah, dau. of the late William Richan, of Yarmouth. Grands. of the late Wm. Robertson, U.E. Loyalist, who removed from New York to Shelburne in 1783. B. 13 Sept., 1852. Ed at Barrington M. 10 Jan. 1884, Josephine Hume, dau. of J. G. Allan, Esq., Lockport, N.S., and grandniece of the late Joseph Hume, Esq., M.P. Was apptd. to Civil Service of N.S. in 1868, and retired by resignation in 1877. Filled important positions in Mines and Works and Provincial Secy's. Depts., also in connection with the Immigration Dept. Is a prominent member of Independent Order of Oddfellows. Historiographer of Grand Lodge of the Lower Provinces of B.N.A. and was representative of that body in Grand Lodge of the United States for the years 1876-77. Author of the History of the Co. of Shelburne, N.S., (an essay) and History of the Co. of Digby (prize essay, King's Coll., Windsor, N.S.) Unsuccessful candidate for Ho. of Assem. N.S. at special election held in Jan. 1878. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1878; re-elected at g.e. 1882, and again at g.e. 1887. A Liberal, and favours Free Trade and advanced temperance legislation.—Barrington, N.S.

ROBILLARD, HONORE. (Ottawa City.)

Grandfather came to Can. from Normandy, France. B. at St. Eustache, Q., 12 Jan., 1835. Ed. at the Coll. in Ottawa. M., 1st, 14 Feb., 1860, Philomene Barrette; 2nd, 26 May, 1879, Marie E. G. Richer. Is a Contractor and a J.P. Was Reeve of Gloucester Tp. in 1873. Sat in the Leg. Assem., Ont., for Russell, from g. e. 1883 until the dissolution of the Assem. in 1886. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal-Conservative.—Ottawa.

ROOME, WILLIAM FREDERICK, M.D. (West Middlesex.)

Grandparents came from Eng. and were among the early settlers in Western Ontario. B. 21 Nov., 1841., in Tp. of Oxford, Co. of Kent, Ont. Ed. at the Common Sch., Univ. of Michigan, where he graduated M.D., and at the Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons, Ont. M. 22 Jan., 1869, Maggie, dau. of the late J. D. Anderson, Merchant. Has been a Municipal Councillor and Chairman of School Board for a number of years. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Newbury, Ont.

Ross, Arthur Wellington, B.A. (Lisgar.)

Eldest s. of Donald Ross, Esq., of East Williams, Co. of Middlsex, Ont. B. 25 March, 1846, in the Township of East Williams. Ed. at Nairn Village Sch., Wardsville Grammar Sch., Toronto Normal Sch., Univ. Coll., and graduated at Toronto Univ. M. 30 July, 1873, Jessie Flora, dau. of Donald Cattanach, Esq., of Laggan, Co. of Glengarry, Ont. Was Inspector of Public Schools for the Co. of Glengarry, from Sept. 1871 until Nov. 1874. Settled in Man., June, 1877; called to the Bar 1878; began the practice of Law, and was elected a Bencher 1880. Soon became the largest real estate owner in the Prov. Was chosen to represent Man. and the N. W. in the Howland Syndicate to build the C. P. R., and has been at various times connected with nearly every large enterprise having for its object the advancement of the interests of the Prov. First elected for Springfield in Leg. Assem., Man., at g. e.

1878, and re-elected at g. e. 1879. Resigned and was elected for present seat in the Commons at g. e. 1882. Re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1887. A Liberal-Conservative.—Winnipeg; Manitoba Club, Winnipeg.

ROYAL, JOSEPH, D.C.L. (Provencher.)

B. at Repentigny, P.Q., 7 May, 1837. Ed. at the Jesuits' Coll., Montreal. Called to the Bar L.C., 1864, and to the Bar of Manitoba, 1871. As an advocate has been retained in many important cases, the most notable of which were those of the Queen vs. Ambroise Lepine, and the Queen vs. Naud, tried at the Manitoba Criminal Assizes, Oct. 1874, for the execution of Thomas Scott, under the Provisional Govt. of Louis Riel, and in which he was associated with Hon. J. A. Chapleau, Q.C., as a counsel for the defence. Retired from practice in 1880, and is now Agent for Le Crèdit Foncier F. Canadien for Man. Has been a prominent writer on the French-Canadian newspaper and periodical press for a lengthened period. Edited the Montreal Minerve from 1857 until 1859, when he established L'Ordre, which he conducted until 1860. Was the founder of La Revue Canadienne, 1864, to which he contributed, at different periods, many valuable and interesting papers. In 1867 founded, with others, Le Nouveau Monde (Montreal), of which he became chief editor. In 1871, shortly after his removal to Manitoba, established Le Metis, which he ceded in 1882 to Hon. Mr. La Riviere, who changed the name into that of Le Manitoba. Is leader of the French-speaking people in Manitoba. Author of Vie Politique de Sir Louis H. Lafontaine (1864), and many other important contributions to French Canadian literature. Was one of the Secretaries to the Montreal Cent. Commit., and took an active part in organizing the Papal Zouaves, who were sent to the assistance of the Holy Father, 1868. Elected First Vice-Chancellor of the Univ. of Manitoba, 1877, and has been re-elected every year since. Apptd. a Commr. for the Consolidation of the Statutes of the Province, in May, 1877, together with the late Chief Justice Wood. Elected Speaker for the first Leg. Assem. of Manitoba, 1871, an office he vacated March, 1872, on being apptd. a mem. of Ex. Council, and Provl. Secy. of the Province; resigned with the Govt. 8 July, 1874. Re-apptd. to the Cabinet, with the offices of Provl. Secy. and Minister of Public Works, 3 Dec., 1874. Resigned office of Public Works, and accepted that of Atty.-Genl., May, 1876, which he held until resignation of Govt., when he was offered and

accepted portfolio of Min. of Public Works in the new Administration, 1878. Early in 1878 a difference of opinion having arisen between the Premier and Mr. Royal, the latter resigned. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council for the North-West Territories, 1873. Was the first Supt. of Education (apptd,) 1871 for Manitoba, and as such exerted himself in having the law explained and carried out in every locality; resigned Mar., 1872, on his appt. to office. Obtained the command of a cavalry troop, composed of natives, at the time of the Fenian raid, Oct., 1871, and was detailed on an important scouting expedition in the southwest of the Province. Discharged the administrative duties of Atty.-Genl. from 3 Dec., 1874, until 1878, and personally supervised the important legislation of 1875-76, introduced by the Davis-Royal Govt., which included the County Municipalities Act; the Administration of Justice Act; the Electoral Law; the Act respecting trial of Controverted Elections, and the Act for the abolition of Leg. Council. Is also the author of the School Law, 1871; of the system of registration of deeds, and of the mode of establishing and collecting vital statistics. Has been a delegate to Ottawa on several occasions on the subject of "Better Terms," and the enlargement of the boundaries of Manitoba. In Oct., 1875, was successful, with Mr. Davis, in securing a readjustment of the financial arrangements of Manitoba with the Dominion. Received the Confederation Medal from the Dominion Govt., Oct., 1885. First returned to the Leg. Assem., Manitoba, for St. Francois Xavier West by acclamation, Dec., 1870, on the erection of Manitoba into a Province of the Dominion; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1875, and again at g. e. 1878. Elected for present seat on appt. of Mr. Dubuc, the sitting member as Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, Manitoba, Dec., 1879, and re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1882. elected at g. e. 1887. A Conservative.—Provencher Avenue, St. Boniface; Winnipeg; Manitoba Club.

RYKERT, JOHN CHARLES, Q.C. (Lincoln.)

German descent; s. of George Rykert, who formerly represented Lincoln in the old Upper Can. Parlt. B. at St. Catharines, 10 March, 1832. Ed. at U. Can. Coll. M. 19 Oct., 1854, Annie, dau. of Col. Sheldon Hawley, of Trenton, Co. Hastings. Called to the Bar, U. C., Hilary Term, 1854. Apptd. a Q.C. 13 Aug., 1881. Reeve of Township of Granthan and St. Catharines for 20 years continuously. Warden of Lincoln five times. Presdt. of the Agricultural

and Arts Asso. of Ont. in 1865, and in 1880, and has been elected unanimously a member of the Board since 1865. Chairman of St. Catharines Collegiate Institute Board since 1863. First returned to Parlt. in 1860, and again in 1861 by acclamation. Sat in Parlt. until the fall of 1863. Elected to the Leg. Assem., Ont., by acclamation at g. e. 1867, and again in 1871. Re-elected in 1876. Was defeated in 1875 by Capt. Neelin, but unseated and disqualified him for bribery, and was elected over him in 1876, his disqualification being removed. Returned to Commons at g. e. 1878, and re-elected at g. e. 1882 and 1887. A Conservative.—St. Catharines, Ont.

SCARTH, WILLIAM BAIN. (Winnipeg.)

Belongs to the family of Scarth of Bin-Scarth, Orkney Islands, Scot. B. in Aberdeen, Scot., 10 Nov., 1837. Ed. in Edinburgh and Aberdeen. M. at Hamilton, Ont., April 1869, Jessie Stuart Franklin, dau. of Dr. John Macaulay Hamilton, R.N. Was director or manager of several large British and Canadian companies in Toronto, and is now Managing Director of the Canada North-West Land Co.; Secty. and Dir. of the Canadian Anthracite Coal Co., and Dir. of the North British Canadian Investment Co. Was an Alderman in Toronto for two years; also a High Sch. Trustee. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Winnipeg; Rideau Club; Manitoba Club.

SCRIVER, JULIUS. (Huntingdon.)

Descended from U. E. Loyalists, who came to Canfrom Dutchess County, N.Y., at the close of the revolution. B. at Hemmingford, P.Q., 5 Feb., 1826. Ed. at the Univ. of Vermont. M. Miss Francis M. Stevens, of Potsdam, N.Y. Formerly in business as a merchant. Was Presdt. of the Quebec Frontier Railway. Sat for Huntingdon in Quebec Assem. from the Union until Sept. 1869, when he resigned, and was returned to Commons by acclamation. Re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1872; and again returned at g. e. 1874. Re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1878, and re-elected at g. e. 1882. Re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1887. A Liberal.—Hemmingford, P.Q.

SEMPLE, ANDREW. (Centre Wellington.)

Parents were natives of Lanarkshire, Scot., and emigrated to Can. from Glasgow in 1841. B. in Glasgow 10 June, 1837, and ed. at the Common Sch. in Co. of Simcoe.

M. 19 Oct., 1866, Margaret Potter. Is a farmer and custom miller. Is a J. P., and was for two years a Councillor and two years Reeve of East Garafraxa. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—Fergus, Ont.

SHAKESPEARE, NOAH. (Victoria, B.C.)

S. of Noah Shakespeare, Esq., of Brierley, Hill, Staffordshire, Eng. B. in 1839, and ed. there. M. there in 1859, Miss Elizabeth Pearson. Is a general agent. Elected, 1885, Presdt. of the B. C. Agricultural Asso., and Presdt. of the B. C. Fire Insur. Co. Served in the Municipal Co. of Victoria for four years, and was elected Mayor of the city of Victoria, B.C., in Jan. 1882. Is Presdt. of the Mechanics' Institute. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1882, and re-elected at g. e. 1887. A Liberal Conservative, and strenuously opposed to Chinese immigration to any part of the Dominion.—Victoria, B.C.

SHANLY, WALTER, C.E. (South Grenville.)

Third s. of the late James Shanly, Esq., a mem. of the Irish Bar formerly of "The Abbey," Queen's County, Irel., who emigrated to Can. in 1836, and resided in the Co. of Middlesex, Ont. The family, of Celtic origin, is of great antiquity in the Co. of Leitrim. B. at "The Abbey," parish of Stradbally, Queen's Co. Ed. by private tuition. Unmarried. A Civil Engineer. Was resident Engineer under the Board of Works, Can., on the Beauharnois and Welland Canals, from 1843 to 1848; Engineer of the Ottawa and Prescott Railway from 1851 to 1853; Engineer of the Western Division of the Grand Trunk Railway (Toronto to Sarnia) from 1851 to 1859; Engineer of the Ottawa and French River Navigation Surveys from 1856 to 1858, and General Manager of the Grand Trunk Railway from 1858 to 1862. Constructed the Hoosac Mountain Tunnel, Massachusetts, 1869-75. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1863 until Confederation, when returned to the Commons. An unsuccessful candidate at g.e. 1872 and 1874. Re-elected by acclamation, July 1885, on the death of the sitting mem. Mr. Benson, and reelected at last g.e. A Conservative.—Montreal.

SKINNER, CHARLES NELSON, Q.C. (St. John, N.B.)

S. of Samuel Skinner, a contractor and builder, a descendant of a family which settled in N.B. before 1775. B. in St. John, 12 Mar. 1833. Ed. in the Common and

Grammar Schools there. M., 25 Jan, 1865, Eliza Jane, dau. of D. McLaughlin, of St. John. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1860, and apptd. a Q.C. 1873. First returned to the Ho. of Assem. for St. John in 1861. Was defeated on the Confederation Question, which he favoured, in 1864; reelected in 1866. Was Solicitor Gen. from Aug. 1865 until 1868, when apptd. Judge of Probate. First returned to Commons at last g.e. A Liberal.—St. John, N.B.

SMALL, JOHN. (East Toronto.)

Eldest s. of the late Charles Coxwell Small, Clerk of the Crown and Pleas for U. C., and grands. of the late Major Small, who came to Canada as Clerk of the Crown and Pleas and Clerk of the Executive Council, from Cirencester, Eng., with Governor Simcoe, in 1792. SMITH, SIR DONALD ALEXANDER, K.C.M.G. (Montreal West.)

B. in Morayshire, Scot., in 1821. Ed. there. M., Isabella, dau. of the late Richard Hardisty, Esq., at one time an officer in the British Army, and afterwards of the Hudson Bay Co. Has been for many years in the service of the Hudson Bay Co., and now holds the office of Resident Governor and Chief Commr. of that corporation. Is Vice-President of the Bank of Montreal, and a Dir. of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co., and was created a K.C.M.G. for his services to the country in connection with the latter undertaking. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council for N. W. Territories, Oct. 1870. Was a Special Commr. to enquire into the causes, nature and extent of the obstruction offered in the N. W. T. to the peaceful ingress of Hon. W. McDougall, and for other purposes, Dec. 1869. Represented Winnipeg and St. John in the Manitoba Assem. from the first meeting of that body, I871, until Jan. 1874, when he resigned, in order to confine himself to the Commons. First returned to the Commons for Selkirk on the admission of Manitoba into the Union, 1871; re-elected at g. e. 1872, 1874 and 1878. Upon petition, the election of 1878 was voided. M. 25 May, 1880, Helen, dau. of the late James Burns, East Whitby. A Farmer. Was Dêputy-Reeve of East Whitby in 1878, and Reeve in 1883, and has been a Trustee of Columbus Public Sch. since 1869. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g. e. 1882. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Columbus, Ont.

Somerville, James. (North Brant.)

Family came from Fifeshire, Scot., in 1833, and settled in Dundas, Ont. B. in Dundas, 7 June, 1834. Ed. at Common and Grammar Schools. M., 1858, Janette, dau. of Mr. Alex. Rogers, of Co. Dumfries, Ont. Was editor and proprietor of the Dundas True Banner, (Reform), up to 1886. He established the True Banner in 1858, previous to which he was editor and proprietor of the Ayr Observer, (Reform), which he established in 1854 and disposed of in 1858, on his removing to Dundas. Has filled every municipal office, and has been Warden of the Co. of Wentworth, and Mayor of Dundas. First returned to the Commons at g. e. 1882, and re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal.—Dundas, Ont.

Sproule, Thomas Simpson, M.D. (East Grey.)

S. of James Sproule, a native of Tyrone, Irel., who emigrated to Can. in 1836, and settled in the Co. of York, Ont. B. in the Tp. of King, Co. of York, 25 Oct., 1843. Ed. in Common Sch., Univ. of Victoria and Univ. of Michigan: Graduated M.D. 1867. M., 7 Sept., 1881, Mary Alice, second dau. of M. K. Flesher, Esq., ex-M.P. of East Grey. Was in Glenelg Tp. Council, 1877. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1878; re-elected at g. e. 1882, and again at last g. e. A Liberal-Conservative.—Markdale, Ont.

STEVENSON, JAMES. (West Peterborough.)

S. of a native of the Co. of Fermanagh, Irel., who came to Can. and settled in Port Hope in 1840. B. in Irel. about 1817. Is a Merchant. Has been Mayor of Peterborough for six years, and still holds that office. Is Chairman of the Joint Board of Education and of the Town Trust. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Peterborough.

St. Marie, Captain Louis. (Napierville.)

B. at St. Constant, Co. of Laprairie, 30 April, 1835, and Ed. in Beauharnois. M. 1860, Precille, dau. of the late Michel Carm, Iberville. Is a Merchant. Has been a Municipal Councillor and Mayor of St. Remi. Has been a Capt. in the 51st Batt. V. M. since 1866, and was on active service with his Co. during the Fenian Raids in 1866 and 1870. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—St. Remi, P.Q.

SUTHERLAND, JAMES. (North Oxford.)

S. of the late Alexander Sutherland, who came to Canada in 1841, from Caithness-shire, Scotl., settled in the Tp. of Ancaster, Co. of Wentworth, afterwards moved to the Tp. of East Zorra, Co. of Oxford, in 1855, by his wife, Allison, dau. of the late John Renton, of Ancaster. B. 17 July, 1849, in Tp. of Ancaster, Co. of Wentworth. Ed. at the Grammar Sch., Woodstock. Unmarried. Is a member of the Municipal Council of Woodstock. Was Reeve from 1878–79, and Mayor for 1880. A member of the High School Board. Senior member of the firm of Jas. Sutherland & Co., Ontario Vinegar Works, Hamilton, Ont. First returned to Parlt., 9 Dec., 1880, on death of the late member, Mr. Thomas Oliver. Re-elected at g.e. 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—Woodstock, Ont.; Rideau Club.

TAYLOR, GEORGE. (South Leeds.)

Second s. of the late William Taylor, Esq., by his wife Ann Graham, who emigrated from the Co. of Wexford, Irel., and settled in the Co. of Leeds, Ont., in 1818. B. in the Tp. of Lansdowne, Co. of Leeds, 31 March, 1840. Ed. in the Common Sch. there. M. at Gananoque, 10 Sept., 1863, Miss Margaret Latimer. Is a merchant. Was Reeve of Gananoque for five years, and Warden of the

United Counties of Leeds and Grenville, in 1879. Apptd. County Auditor for 1881 and 1882. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative; believes protection of industries is and will be a necessity in Canada for many years.—Gananoque, Ont.

TEMPLE, THOMAS. (York, N.B.)

S. of Charles Temple, Esq., of Bampton, Oxfordshire, Eng., by his wife Hannah Spiers. B. at Bampton, 3 Nov. 1818. Ed. at the Common Sch. in Eng. Came to N.B. in 1832, and has since resided in Co. of York. M., 1842, Susannah, dau. of Solomon Howe, of Southampton, N.B. Served in the York Light Dragoons, during the troubles in regard to the boundary line between N.B. and the State of Maine in 1838. Was High Sheriff of Co. of York from 1864 to 1883. Is a dir. of the People's Bank, Fredericton, and of the St. John Safety Fund Insu. Co. and has been Presdt. of the Fredericton Railway Co. since 1868. First returned to Parlt. at election held 29 Jan. 1884, to fill the seat vacated by the death of Mr. John Pickard. Re-elected at g.e. 1887. A Conservative.—Fredericton, N.B.

THERRIEN, OLAÜS. (Montcalm.)

Family, originally from Normandy, France, settled in Can. about 1775. S. of Pierre Therrien, farmer, by his wife Elaine Derosier. B. at Sainte Anne des Plaines, Co. of Terrebonne, 3 Sept., 1860. Unmarried. Ed. at the Petit Seminaire, Ste. Thérèse, and in law at Laval Univ. Called to the Bar, P.Q., 9 July, 1885. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Sainte Juliènne, P.Q.

THOMPSON, Hon. JOHN SPARROW DAVID, Q.C., P.C. (Antigonish.)

S. of John Sparrow Thompson, a native of Waterford, Irel., who was for a time Queen's Printer, and afterwards Superintendent of the Money Order System of N.S. B. in Halifax, N.S., 10 Nov., 1844, and ed. at the Common Sch. and the Free Church Academy there. M. 1870, Miss Annie E. Affleck. Called to the Bar, N.S., July 1865, and apptd. a Q.C. May 1879. Was counsel on behalf of the U.S. Govt., acting with the American lawyers, before the Fishery Commission sitting at Halifax under the Washington Treaty. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council and Atty. Gen., N.S., 22 Oct., 1878, and was Premier and Atty.

Gen. N.S. from 25 May, 1882, until 25 July, 1882, when apptd. a Judge of the Supreme Court of N.S. Resigned, 25 Sept., 1885, and was apptd. Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada. Sat in the House of Assem. N.S., from Dec. 1877 until elevated to the Bench. First returned to the Commons 16 Oct., 1885, and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Ottawa; Halifax Club; Rideau Club.

TISDALE, Lieut-Col. DAVID, Q.C. (South Norfolk.)

Grands, of Ephraim Tisdale, a U.E. Loyalist, who first settled in N.B., afterwards removed to U.C., and took part in the battles of Queenston Heights and Lundy's Lane in 1812. B. in the Tp. of Charlotteville, Co. of Norfolk, 8 Sept., 1835. Ed. at the Simcoe Grammar Sch. M. 16 Nov., 1858, Sarah Walker. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1858. Apptd. a Q.C. 1872. Has been Reeve and Councillor of Simcoe for several years, and has been a mem. of the Co. Council of Co. of Norfolk. Is Presdt. of the J. E. Potts Salt and Lumber Co., of Michigan and Wisconsin. Entered the Militia service in 1861, and is Lieut.-Col. commanding 39th Norfolk Rifles, V.M. Was thanked in general orders for successfully dispersing with his Batt. an American mob assembled at Port Dover to witness a prize fight. Was an unsuccessful candidate for North Norfolk in the Commons at g.e. 1874. First returned to Commons at last g.e. A Conservative. - Simcoe, Ont.

Trow, James, J.P. (South Perth.)

B. in Newton, Montgomeryshire, North Wales, 16 Dec., 1825. Ed. at Welchpool. Came to Can. 1841. M., 1847, Miss Mary Moore, of Blenheim, Oxford, Ont. A conveyancer. Is Vice-Presdt. of the British Mortgage and Loan Co., of the Perth Mutual, and a dir. of the Ont. Mutual In. Assoc. Is Reeve of North Easthope, an office to which he has been elected by acclamation twenty-two years in succession. Has been Warden of Perth. Sat for South Perth in Leg. Assem., from 1867 until 1871, when defeated. First returned to the Commons at g.e. 1872; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1874; re-elected at g.e. 1878, 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—Stratford, Ont.

Tupper, Hon. Sir Charles, G.C.M.G., C.B., D.C.L. (Cantab.), P.C. (Cumberland, N.S.)

Family originally from Hesse Cassel; went to Guern-

sey, thence to Virginia, and subsequently, at the termination of the American revolution, removed to N.S., with other loyalists; it is connected with the family of the late Major-Genl. Sir Isaac Brock, K.B., hero of Queenstown. S. of the late Rev. Chas. Tupper, D.D., of Aylesford, N.S. B. at Amherst, N.S. 2 July, 1821. Is an M.A. and D.C.L. of Acadia Coll., N.S. Took degree of M.D. at Edinburgh, and obtained the diploma of the Royal College of Surgeons, same city, 1843. M., Oct., 1846, Miss Frances Morse, of Amherst. Is Governor of Dalhousie Coll., Halifax (apptd. by Act of Parlt., 1862). Was Presdt. of the Can. Medical Asso. from its formation, 1867, until 1870, when he declined re-election. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Provl. Secy., N.S., from 1857 to 1860, and from 1863 to June, 1867; and Prime Minister of that Prov. from 1864 until he retired from office with his Govt. on the Union Act coming into force, 1 July, 1867. Was a delegate to England on public business from the N. S. Govt., 1858 and 1865; from the Dominion Govt. (with respect to the N. S. difficulty) March, 1868; leader of the delegation from N. S. to the Union Conference at Charlottetown, 1864; to that in Quebec in the same year, and to the final Colonial Conference in London to complete the terms of Union, 1866-67. Holds patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Ex. Councillor, N.S. Created C.B. (civil) by Her Majesty, 1867; K.C.M.G., 24 May, 1879, and G.C.M.G., Jan., 1886. Author of A Letter to the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Carnarvon on the Union Question (London, Declined a seat in the Can. Cabinet, 1867, and the Chairmanship of Intercolonial Railway Board, 1868. Sworn of the Privy Council, June, 1870, and was Presdt. of that body from that date until July, 1872, when he was transferred to the Inland Revenue Dept., and there remained until 22 Feb., 1873, when apptd. Minister of Customs; resigned office with Sir John Macdonald, 5 Nov., 1873. Was Minister of Public Works from 7 Oct., 1878, to 20 May, 1879, and Minister of Railways and Canals from that date to 24 May, 1884, when apptd. High Commr. for Canada in London. Apptd. Executive Commr. for Can. at the International Exhibition, Antwerp. 1885, and Executive Commr. for the Dominion at the Colonial and Indian Exhibition, London, 1886. Sat for Cumberland in N. S. Assem. from 1855 until the Union, when returned to Commons, in which he sat until 24 May, 1884. The following are some of the measures which were introduced and carried through the Legislature of N. S. by the honmem.:—The Jury Law; Education Act, providing free schools; Equity Judge Act; Windsor and Annapolis

Railway Act; Bill providing for a Quarantine Station and Hospital; Representation Bill; Executive and Legislative Disabilities Act (the first Act passed by any of the Provinces prohibiting dual representation); an Act reducing the number of mems. in the Assem. from 55 to 38 on entering the Union, and an Act relative to certain public officers and their salaries, which abolished the office of Financial Secy. and Solicitor Genl., and largely reduced the expenditure for salaries; he also inaugurated the movement and moved the resolution for the Union of the Maritime Provinces, 1864, under which delegates were sent to Charlottetown in that year; and the resolution authorizing delegates to be sent to London to arrange the terms for the Union of N. S. and N. B. with Can. in 1866. Among the important measures introduced by him in the Federal Parlt. may be mentioned the Act prohibiting the sale or manufacture of intoxicating liquors in the N. W. T. of Canada; the Consolidated Railway Act of 1879; the Act granting a charter to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, in 1881; the Act of 1884 granting a loan to that Company; the Railway Subsidies Acts of 1883 and 1884: and the Act of 1884 respecting an agreement between the Province of B. C. and the Dominion of Canada. Visited England in the summer of 1880, in company with Sir John A. Macdonald and Hon. J. H. Pope, for the purpose of negotiating for the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway, the result being the contract ratified by Parliament. Was High Commr. for Can. in England, 24 May, Apptd. Finance Minister, 27 Jan., 1887. Returned to Commons for present seat at g. e. 1887.—Ottawa; Rideau Club; Halifax Club.

Tupper, Charles Hibbert, LL.B. (Pictou.)

Second s. of the Hon. Sir Charles Tupper, M.P., (whom see). B. at Amherst, N.S., 3 Aug., 1855. Ed. at McGill Coll. and Harvard Univ. M., Sept. 1879, Janet, dau. of Hon. James McDonald, Chief Justice of N. S. Called to the Bar, N. S., 1878. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1882, and re-elected last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—" Armdale," Halifax; Halifax Club; Rideau Club.

TURCOT, GEORGE. (Megantic,)

B. at Ste. Marie de Beauce, 9 Sept., 1851, and ed. at the Coll. there. After working upon his father's farm for some years he began business as a merchant. Has been Chairman of the Board of School Commrs. for eight years and Secretary of the Municipal Council of Ste. Julie for four years. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—Ste. Julie de Somerset, P.Q.

TYRWHITT, Lieut.-Col., RICHARD. (South Simcoe.)

S. of William Tyrwhitt, and grandson of Richard Tyrwhitt, Esq., Recorder of Chester, Eng. B. in the Co. of Simcoe, Ont., 29 Nov., 1844. Ed. by private tutors, and at Dinan and Rouen, France. M., 26 April, 1870, Emma, second dau. of the late Rev. G. Whitaker, Provost, Trin. Coll., Toronto. Is a farmer, and Lieut.-Col. of the 36th Batt. V. M. Served as a Lieut. in a Provisional Batt. on Niagara frontier in 1866, and in the North-West rebellion campaign, 1885 (medal). Commanded the Wimbledon Team in 1866. First returned to Parlt. for present seat 16 Feb., 1882, on the death of the sitting mem., Mr. W. C. Little. Re-elected at g. e. 1882 and 1887. Was also an unsuccessful candidate for North York at g. e. 1887. A Conservative.—Farmcote, Bradford, Ont.

VANASSE-VERTEFEUILLE, FABIEN. (Yamaska.)

Youngest s. of Francois Xavier Vanasse-Vertefeiulle, farmer of the parish of St. David, Co. of Yamaska, and of Angelique Dupuis, his wife. B. at St. David, 6 Nov., 1849. Ed. at Nicolet Seminary, and admitted to the Bar at Montreal, 12 Jan., 1875. M., Miss Mary Claire Elmire Desève, youngest dau. of Alexandre Desève, Esq., Advocate, Montreal, 17 Jan., 1877. Was Presdt. of L'Institut Legal of Montreal, 1873; Secy. of the Club Cartier, 1874 to 1875, and Vice-Presdt. of the same institution from 1877 to 1879. Is one of the collaborators of the journal L'Opinion Publique. First rèturned to Parlt. for present seat 7 July, 1879 in place of the sitting mem. Re-elected at g. e. 1882 and 1887. A Conservative.—418 St. Denis Street, Montreal.

WALDIE, JOHN. (Halton.)

B. in Hawick, Roxboroughshire, Scot., 22 April, 1833. Ed. in the Co. of Halton. M., 1st, in Sept., 1859, Mary Ann Thompson, of Tp. of Nelson, (she d.); 2nd, in Dec., 1885, Sarah Jarvis, of Tp. of Trafalgar. Is a Lumber Manufacturer. Was Reeve of the Tp. of Nelson for two years; Reeve of the Village of Burlington for five years, and Warden of the Co. of Halton for two years. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—Toronto.

WALLACE, NATHANIEL CLARKE. (West York.)

Third s. of Capt. Nathaniel Wallace, of Woodbridge, who came to Can. from Sligo, Irel., in 1834. B. in Woodbridge, Co. of York, 21 May, 1844. Ed. at the Public School there, and for a short time in 1863 at Weston Grammar School. M., 7 June, 1877, in the city of Ottawa, to Belinda, youngest dan of the late James Gilmour, of Ottawa. Taught Public School from 1864 to 1869, when he went into business. Is now a merchant and flour miller. Was First Deputy Reeve of the Tp. of Vaughan from 1874 to 1879, and was Warden of the Co. of York in 1878. Has been for many years Co. Master of the Orangemen of West York, and was Grand Treasurer of the Orange Grand Lodge of Ont. West, from 1877 to 1883, when he resigned. Takes an active interest in Agricultural Societies. Is President of the York Farmers' Colonization Co, the operations of which are in the North-West. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1878. Re-elected at g. e. 1882 and 1887. A Liberal-Conservative. - Woodbridge, Ont.

WARD, HENRY ALFRED. (East Durham.)

Grands. of Thos. Ward, a native of London, Eng., who came to Can. in 1792 as barrister's clerk with John White, first Attorney General of U. C., and afterwards became a barrister, Judge of the Dist. Court, and Registrar of the Co. of Durham. S. of Geo. C. Ward, barrister, who succeeded his father as Registrar. B. 20 Aug., 1849. Ed. at Public Schools in Port Hope. Unmarried. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1871. Was a councillor for seven years and mayor of Port Hope in 1885. First returned to Parlt., 24 Aug., 1885, on the death of the sitting mem Col. Williams. Re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative.—Port Hope; Rideau Club, Ottawa; Albany Club, Toronto.

WATSON, ROBERT. (Marquette.)

Father, the late George Watson, came to Can. from Edinburgh, Scot., in 1847, and settled in Elora, Ont. Mother, a native of Inverness-shire, Scot. B. in Elora, 30 April, 1853, and ed. at the Common School, Salem, Co. of Wellington. M., 15 July, 1880, Isabel, dau. of Duncan Brown, Esq., of Lobo, Ont. Is a millwright by trade. Is now engaged in the grain trade, land breaking and railroad contracting. Went to Manitoba in 1876. Has been in the Municipal Council of Portage la Prairie for two

years. First returned to Parlt. at g, e. 1882, and re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal, and opposed to the policy of Sir John A. Macdonald.—Portage la Prairie, Manitoba.

Weldon, Charles Wesley, A.M., D.C.L., Q.C., (St. John.)

Eldest s. of Hon. John W. Weldon, a Judge of the Supreme Court of N. B., who died 1885. Mother, Frances Chandler (who died in 1844), was youngest dau. of Hon. Judge Upham, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of N. B., at its first organization. Judge Upham was a Massachusetts Loyalist, and took part in the Revolutionary war as a Colonel of Dragoons, and was Aide-de-Camp to Lord Dorchester till the close of the war. B. at Richibucto, N.B., 27 Feb. 1830. Ed. at Academy and King's Coll., Windsor. N.S.; graduated 1847. Honorary D.C.L., 1884. M. at St. John, N. B., March, 1860, to Annie, only dau. of John Tucker, Esq. Called to the Bar of N. B., 1852. Appt. Q. C. 1873. Presdt. of the N. B. Electric Telegraph Co. Is Presdt. of Law Soc. of St. John and a Bencher of the Barristers' Soc. N.B.; a Governor of King's Coll.; and a dir. of the William Parks & Son Co., Limited, the Dominion Safety Fund Life Asso., the Brunswick Antimony Co., the New Brunswick Railway Co. and of the Fredericton Railway Co. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1878; re-elected at g. e. 1882, and again at last g. e. Was strongly opposed to the Confederation of the Provinces, and was a supporter of the Mackenzie Govt. Opposed to the National Policy and the present Govt.-St. John, N.B.; Rideau Club.

Weldon, Richard Chapman, B.A., Ph. D., (Albert, N.B.)

Grands of Andrew Weldon, a native of Yorkshire, Eng., who came to Westmoreland Co., N.B., towards close of 18th century. Paternal grandmother was Sarah, sister of Rev. William Black, the founder of Methodism in the Maritime Provinces of Can. B. in Sussex, N. B., 19 Jan., 1849. Ed. at the Superior Sch. in Upper Sussex; took degree of B. A. at Wesleyan Coll., Sackville, N.B.; subsequently studied at Yale Coll., U. S. for two years where he obtained the degree of Ph. D. Studied International Law in Heidelberg. M. 1877, Maria, eldest dau. of Rev. G. W. Tuttle, Methodist Minister, then of Stellarton, N. S. Called to the Bar of N.B. Was a Professor in Wesleyan Coll., N.B., from 1875 to 1883, and has been from the latter date Professor of Constitutional Law in Dalhousie Univ. Halifax, and Dean of the Law Faculty of the Univ.

First returned to Parlt at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative. —Halifax, N. S.; Elgin, Albert Co., N.B.

Welsh, William. (Queen's, P.E.I.)

S. of Charles Welsh, Esq., of Charlottetown, who was the s. of William Welsh. Fsq., of Killagowan, Co. of Wexford, Irel. Descended by mother from the Merediths of Rarey, Queen's Co., Irel. B. on lot 49, P.E.I., 22 Nov., 1822. Ed. at the Central Academy, Charlottetown. M. there, 31 Jan. 1854, Maria J. dau. of Thos. Pethick, Esq. Is a shipowner and merchant. Apptd. a Lieut. in Militia, 1846, Capt. 1848, and Major in 1873. Apptd. a J. P. 1852. Sat in H. of Assembly, P.E.I., from 1874 to 1878 when he resigned. First returned to Parliament at last g. e. A lumber merchant and a dir. of the Pontiac and Pacific Junction Railway Co. Has been Reeve of the Tp. and Town of Pembroke. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g. e. 1872, and in Nov. 1873. Sat from g. e. 1874 until 14 Sept. same year, when unseated on petition. An unsuccessful candidate at the election which followed. Re-elected 26 July 1875 on Mr. Murray being unseated. Re-elected at g. e. 1878–'82, and again at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—Pembroke; Rideau Club.

WHITE, Hon. THOMAS, P.C. (Cardwell)

Father emigrated to this country from Co. Westmeath, Irel., in 1826, and carried on business for many years in Montreal as a leather merchant. B. in Montreal, 7 Aug. 1830. Ed. at High School, Montreal. M. in 1853, Miss. Vine, of Quebec. Was engaged in mercantile pursuits in early life, and subsequently studied law for four years with Hon. Sidney Smith, Q.C., Cobourg. Served in Peterboro' and Hamilton as mem. of Grammar School Boards; was for some time Reeve of Town of Peterboro'. Representative for a number of years of the Montreal Bd. of Trade in the Dominion Board; member for three years of Ex. Co. of Dominion Board, and representative

for five years of that body at the National Board of Trade of the United States. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1878. Was an unsuccessful candidate for S. Wentworth in 1867 for the Leg. Assem., Ont.; for the Commons in Prescott Co., Ont., 1874, and for Montreal West in 1875, and again in 1876, the aggregate majority in the first First returned to three elections being only sixteen. Commons for present seat 1878, re-elected at g. e. 1882, and again at last g. e. Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of the Interior 5 Aug., 1885. A Conservative. Has been a mem. of the Sunbury Municipal Co. and Warden of the Co. An unsuccessful candidate for the Ho. of Assem. at g.e. 1886. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and a supporter of the National Policy. Favors any measure tending to bring about a closer reunion of Imperial interests.—Belmont, Oromocto, N.B.

WILSON, JAMES CROCKET. (Argenteuil.)

S. of Samuel Wilson and Elizabeth Crocket, his wife, both natives of Rasharkin, Antrim, Irel. B. there, 19 July, 1841. Ed. in Montreal, at McGill Normal Sch. M. 6 Nov., 1865, Jeanie, third dau. of the late Wm. Kilgour, of Beauharnois. Is head of the firm of J. C. Wilson & Co., Paper Manufacturers, Montreal, with mills at Lachute. Has been an Alderman of the City of Montreal since 1880. and was Chairman of the Light Committee for four years, Is a Life Governor and Vice-Presdt. of the Montreal Dis-

pensary; a Governor of the Protestant Insane Asylum of the Prov. of Quebec, and one of the Board of Protestant Sch. Commrs. of Montreal. Was Presdt. of the Fish and Game Protection Club of the Prov. of Quebec for two years, and Presdt. of the Irish Protestant Benevolent Soc. of Montreal for two years. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—584 Craig St. Montreal.

WILSON, JOHN HENRY, M.D. (East Elgin.)

Grandfather a U.E. Loyalist, a veteran of the Am. Revolutionary war. S. of Mr. Jeremiah Wilson. B. near Ottawa, Ont., 14 Feb. 1833. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. Thomas, and at Univ. Coll., New York. Graduated M.D. at Victoria Univ., Cobourg, Ont., 1858. M. 1869, at Toledo, Ohio, U.S., Amelia A., dau. of George Ryerson Williams, Esq., of U.E. Loyalist descent. Has been Professor of Anatomy in Victoria Univ. Sat in Leg. Assem. Ont., from g.e. 1871, until g.e. 1879. First returned to Commons at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal and opposed to the present Govt.—St. Thomas.

WILSON, URIAH. (Lennox.)

Father a native of Eng. and mother from Irel. B. 17 Mar., 1841, in the Tp. of North Fredericksburg, Co. of Lennox. Ed. at the Common Sch., Napanee. M. 1867, Mary Moyle, Napanee. Is a boot and shoe merchant. Was Councillor for Napanee in 1875, Deputy Reeve 1879, Warden of the Co. of Lennox 1882, Reeve of Napanee 1884-5, and Mayor 1886. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Napanee, Ont.

WOOD, JOHN FISHER. (Brockville.)

S. of John Wood, a Railroad Contractor, who came from Dundee, Scot., and settled at Brockville, where he married Mary Ann, dau. of the late Thos. Madden, of Ballycastle, Co. of Mayo, Irel. B. 12 Oct., 1850, in the Tp. of Elizabethtown, Co. of Leeds, Ont., and ed. at Farmers-ville Grammar School. Called to the Bar, Ont., Easter Term, 1876. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1882, and reelected at last g. e. A Conservative.—*Brockville*, Ont.

Wood, Josiah, M.A. (Westmoreland.)

S. of Mariner Wood, a merchant in Sackville, N.B. B. there 18 April, 1843. Ed. at Mount Allison Wesleyan

Coll., Sackville, where he graduated in 1866. M., 14 Jan.. 1874, Laura S., dau of Thompson Trueman, of Sackville, Called to the Bar, N.B., 1866. After practising a short time he relinquished the profession to enter mercantile pursuits. Is also a private banker and a shipowner and is largely interested in farming and stock-raising. Unsuccessfully contested Westmoreland for Leg. Assem., N.B., at g. e. 1878. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Sackville N.B.; Rideau Club.

WRIGHT, Lieut.-Col. ALONZO. (Ottawa Co.)

S. of the late Lieut.-Col. Tiberius Wright, and grand-s. of the late Philemon Wright, formerly of Woburn, Mass., who came to Can., 1797, founded the Village of Hull, on the Ottawa, and became the first representative of the Co. of Ottawa in the L. C. Assem. B. at Hull, P.Q., 26 Feb., 1825. Ed. at Potsdam Academy, N.Y. M. Mary, eldest dau. of the late Nicholas Sparks, Esq., of Ottawa City. A farmer. Is Lieut.-Col. of the Ottawa Co. Reserve Militia. Sat for present seat in Can. Assem. from 1862 until the Union, when returned to Commons by acclamation; reelected by acclamation at g. e. 1872; again returned at g. e. 1874, 1878, 1882, and 1887. A Liberal-Conservative.—Ironside, Hull, P.Q.; Rideau Club.

YEO, JAMES. (Prince.)

Second s. of the late Hon. James Yeo, of Porthill, P.E.I., who came from Devonshire, Eng., 1827, and held a seat in the Provincial Assem. for a period of thirty years. B. at Porthill, 31 Oct., 1832. M., 1855, Sarah Jane, dau. of Wm. Glover, Esq., formerly of Devonshire, Eng. A merchant, shipbuilder and shipowner. Sat in the P. E. I. Assem. from 1872 until the Union with Can., and also held a seat in the Ex. Council. First returned to Commons on P.E.I. entering the Dominion, Sept. 1873; reelected at g. e. 1874, 1878, 1882, and 1887. A Liberal.—Porthill, P.E.I.

Michigan, 17 Oct., 1874, Josephine, eldest dau. of the late Col. T. F. Broadhead. Is an editor and publisher. Established the St. Catherines Daily and Weekly News with Mr. R. Matheson in 1872, and the Amherstburg Echo with Mr. J. A. Auld in 1874, and which he still edits. Was a mem. of the St. Catherines Public School Board in 1873-'74, and since then a mem. and Chairman of the Amherstburg Public School Board. Has been for five years Reeve of the Town of Amherstburg; a dir. for eleven years and Presdt. of the South Essex Agricultural Soc; a dir of the South Essex Farmer's Institute, and was for eight years Secy, of the South Essex Liberal Asso. Eldest s. of H. F. Bronson, Esq., a native of Warren Co., New York State, who settled in Can. 1853. B. at Bolton, Warren Co., in 1844. M. at Norfolk, Virginia, in 1874, the only dau of Prof. N. B. Webster. Ed. in Ottawa and at Sandy Hill, New York State. Is a mem. of the firm of Bronson and Weston, extensively engaged in the manufacture of sawn lumber. Was a mem. of the City Council of Ottawa for seven years, and a mem. of the School Board of the city for fourteen years. An unsuccessful candidate for Carleton, Ont., in the Commons at g. e. 1882. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g. e. A Liberal.—Ottawa.

CHAMBERLAIN, THEODORE F., M.D. (Dundas.)

Only s. of the late Dr. Ashern A. Chamberlain, of Farmersville, Ont. B. at Smith's Mills, 6 July, 1838. Ed.

Descended from an old Highland family, originally from Inverness-shire. Grandparents were U. E. Loyalists who settled in the Co. of Glengarry. B. in the Tp. of Toronto, Co. of Peel, 17 March, 1830. A merchant. Is a dir. of the Central Bank of Canada and Vice-Presdt. of the Haggart Manufacturing Co. Has been Warden of the Co and Reeve of Brampton. First returned to Leg. Assem. for present seat, 19 Feb. 1873, on death of sitting mem.; re-elected at g. e. 1875. Unseated on petition 14 June, 1875, but judgment subsequently reversed on appeal. Re-elected at g. e. 1879, 1883, and again at last g. e. A Liberal, and supporter of Mr. Mowat.—Alderlea, Brampton, Ont,

CLANCY, JAMES. (West Kent.)

Is a lumberman. Has been Reeve of Chatham on several occasions. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e. 1883 and re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative.—Wallaceburg, Ont.

CLARKE, Lieut.-Col. CHARLES, J.P. (East Wellington.)

B. in Lincoln, Eng., 28 Nov. 1826. Ed. at Waddington, Lincolnshire, under Mr. George Boole, afterwards Prof. of Mathematics in Queen's Coll., Cork. M., 1st, June 1852, Emma, dau. of Jas. Kent, Esq., Selkirk, Ont., 2nd, 1881, Rose Helen, dau. of Jas. Halley, Esq., Ponsonby, Ont. Came to Can. in 1844 and engaged in farming. Was Reeve of Elora for several years. Edited the *Journal* and

Express (Hamilton) from 1848 to 1850, and the Backwoodsman (Elora) for some years. Was the author of a series of letters, signed "Reformator," appearing in the Toronto Mirror in 1850, which advocated advanced Liberal principles, and were widely copied by the Reform press. Contributed the "Planks of the Platform" laid down in the North American, edited by Hon. Wm. McDougall. Lieut.-Col. commanding the 30th Wellington Batt. Volunteer Rifles. Acted as Permanent Chairman of Committees of the Whole House in Ontario Assem. during one Parlt., and also as Chairman of Public Accounts Committee. First returned to Leg. Assem. in 1871, for Centre Wellington; re-elected by acclamation in 1875, and after contests at the g.e. 1879 and 1883, in which he was successful; was elected by acclamation at g.e. 1886. Was Speaker of the House from 6 Jan., 1880, until the dissolution of the Assem. in Jan. 1883, and again from 23 Jan., 1884, until the dissolution of the Assem, Dec. 1886. A Reformer and a supporter of Mr. Mowat.—Elora, Ont.

CLARKE, EDWARD FREDERICK. (Toronto.)

Third s. of the late Richard Clarke, merchant in Bailieboro', Co. of Cavan, Irel. B. at Bailieboro', 24 April, 1850. Attended the National Model Sch. there. Came to Can. and settled in Toronto 1864. M., 30 Dec., 1884, Charlotte Elizabeth, dau. of Daniel Scott, Esq. Is printer and publisher of the Sentinel newspaper. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g.e. 1886. A Liberal Conservative.—10 Harbord St., Toronto.

CLARKE, HENRY EDWARD. (West Toronto.)

Family came from Co. of Fermanagh, Irel. B. in Three Rivers, Quebec, 20 March, 1829, and ed. at a private sch. there. M., in 1856, at Three Rivers, Anne, dau. of the late Thomas Kennedy, Montreal. Is a manufacturer of trunks, &c. Has been an Alderman in Toronto, and is now a dir. of the Federal Bank. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g.e. 1883, and re-elected at g.e. 1886. A Conservative.—Toronto.

CONMEE, JAMES. (West Algoma.)

S. of Matthew Conmee, a native of Sligo, Irel., who settled near Belleville, Ont., and engaged in the lumber trade, and afterwards removed to the Tp. of Sydenham,

Co, of Grey. B. in Sydenham, 13 Oct., 1849. Ed. at the Common Sch. and at Owen Sound Grammar Sch. M., 1875, Emily Florence, dau. of Joseph Cox, of St. Vincent, Co. of Grey. Enlisted in the 8th N.Y. Cavalry, under the late Gen. Custer, and saw service in the late American civil war. Since then has been largely engaged in railway construction in Can. and the U.S. Is now extensively engaged in the lumber trade. Is a J. P., and has been a Councillor and Mayor of Port Arthur. First returned to Leg. Assem. on the division of Algoma into two constituencies, June, 1885. A Reformer.—Port Arthur.

CRAIG, THOMAS DIXON. (Durham East.)

B. in London, Eng., 20 Nov., 1842, and brought to Can. when six months old. Ed. at Toronto Univ., where he graduated in 1864. Was gold medalist in metaphysics. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Port Hope, Ont.

CREIGHTON, DAVID. (North Grey.)

Of Irish parentage. B. in Glasgow, Scot., 1 April, 1843. Came to Can. with his parents, 1855. M., 15 Oct., 1873, Miss Jane Elizabeth Kramer. Has been editor and publisher of the Owen Sound *Times* newspaper since 1864. First returned to Leg. Assem., 30 Oct., 1875, on sitting mem. being unseated and disqualified. Re-elected at g. e. 1879, 1883 and 1886. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to Mr. Mowat.—Owen Sound.

CRUESS, JOHN S. (West Victoria.)

Is a farmer. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Linden Valley, Ont.

S. of Mr. J. S. Fraser, of Brockville, Ont. B. there 1839. M. Miss Lafayette of the same town. Called to the Bar, U. C., Trinity Term, 1865. Apptd. a Q. C., 1876. Is a Bencher of the Law Soc., Ont. Is Presdt. of the

Catholic Literary Asso., of Brockville. Was one of the originators of the Ont. Catholic League. Is a director of the Ontario Bank. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council, 25 Nov., 1873, and was Provl. Cousin of the late David Gibson, who formerly represented North York in the old Parlt. of Can., and who was prominently associated with the late W. Lyon Mackenzie in the troubles of 1837. B. 1 Jan. 1842, in the Tp. of Toronto, in the Co. of York. Ed. at Central Sch., Hamilton, and Univ. Coll., Toronto. Took the degree of B.A., 1863, carrving off the Prince's prize of that year, together with the silver medals in classics and modern languages, and the prize in Oriental languages. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1867. Entered the law course at the Univ. of Toronto, receiving the degree of LL.B. and the gold medal in May, 1869, and afterwards was examiner in that faculty for the years 1871 and 1872. Ed. at Port Hope High Sch. and at Trinity Medical Coll., Toronto, where he graduated M. D. M., 17 Sept. 1878, Emma Hawkins, of Canton, near Port Hope. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. GOULD, ISAAC JAMES. (North Ontario.)

Descended from a Quaker family, formerly resident in Pennsylvania. Father, the late Joseph Gould, represented North Ontario in the Parlt. of the Prov. of Can. for seven years. B. at Uxbridge, 13 Nov., 1839, and ed there. M., 23 Sept., 1862, Rebecca, dau. of Ira and Nancy Chapman, Uxbridge. Is a farmer, lumberman and owner of grist and woollen mills. M., 1876, Augusta H., dan. of the late Jacob Young. Public School Inspector for Haldimand Co. for five years. Called to the Bar, Ont., in 1876. Hess, John George. (North Perth.)

Grandfather was proprietor of a woollen mill in Beerfelden, Grand Duchy of Hessen, Germany. Father succeeded him in the business, but having compromised himself in the Revolution of 1848, found it necessary to emigrate to Can. B. in Beerfelden, 3 Nov. 1838, and ed. there. HUDSON, WILLIAM PARKER. (East Hustings.)

Father was a native of Redford, Eng., and mother of Antrim, Irel. B. 13 Feb., 1841, in Tp. of Thurlow, Co. of Hastings. M., 10 Jan., 1866, Jane, dau. of James Fargey, Thurlow. Is a carriage maker. Has been Treasurer of the Township and County Agricultural Soc. for several years, and is Deputy Reeve of the Tp. of Thurlow. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e. 1883, and re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative.—Roslin, Ont.

INGRAM, ANDREW B. (West Elgin.)

Grandfather was a native of Tyrone, Irel., and, after nineteen years' service in the British Army under the Duke of Wellington, came to Can., and died in the Co. of Halton, Ont., 1854. B. 23 April, 1851, at Strabane, Co. of Wentworth, and ed. at Morriston, Ont. M., 1 June, 1882, at St. Thomas, Miss Elizabeth McIntyre. S. of Francis Leys, a native of Aberdeenshire, Scot. B. in Pickering, Co. of Ontario, Can., 27 Jan, 1834. Ed. at private sch. and subsequently at Toronto Academy. M., 24 Aug., 1865, Helen Emma, dau. of the late William Arthurs, merchant, Toronto. Called to the Bar, U. C., 1860. Was an unsuccessful candidate for East Toronto at g. e. 1879 and 1882. S. of John Lyon, who came to Can. from Scot. in 1832, and settled in the Co. of Halton, Ont. B. in Glasgow, Scot., 21 Oct., 1829. M., 1856, Miss Sarah Moore, of Esquesing, Ont. Is a lumberer and a merchant. First returned to Leg. Assem. for Algoma on resignation of the sitting mem., Sept., 1878. Re-elected at g. e. 1879. After re-election at g. e. 1883, upon proceedings being taken to unseat him, he resigned. The constituency was then divided, and he was elected for present seat in 1885. A Reformer.—Michael's Bay, Ont.

Mack, William, J.P. (Cornwall and Stormont.)

Parents came to Can. from Lanarkshire, Scot., in 1828, and settled in the Co. of Huntingdon, P.Q. B. in Scot., 29 Feb., 1828, and ed. at the Common Sch. in Huntingdon, M., 10 May, 1855, Agnes, dau. of the late Wm. Henderson. Began the grist milling trade in Cornwall in 1849, at which he still continues. Master, Isaac. (South Waterloo.)

Of German descent. Father, John Master, came to Can. from Pennsylvania, about 1819. B. in the Tp. of Wilmot, Co. of Waterloo, Ont., 19 March, 1835, and ed. there. M., 28 April, 1857, Lydia, second dau. of Samuel Fried, late of Blenheim, Co. of Oxford. Is a farmer. Has been Deputy Reeve of the Tp. of Wilmot for several years. First returned to Leg. Assem. for present seat, March 1878, on the death of the sitting mem. Again returned for present seat, 18 Oct., 1882, to fill vacancy created by resignation of J. Livingston, elected to the Commons. Re-elected at g.e. 1883, and again at last g.e. A Reformer.—Washington, Ont.

McAndrew, John Alfred, B.A. (South Renfrew.)

Second s. of John McAndrew, formerly of Argyleshire, Scot., who settled in Renfrew, in 1842, and Mary, dau. of the late John Tormey. of Richmond, Co. Carleton, Ont. B. at Renfrew, 27 Dec., 1859, and ed. at the Renfrew Common and Grammar Schs.; Upper Canada Coll.; Toronto Univ. and Univ. of Edinburgh. Called to the Bar, Ont., Sept. 1885. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Liberal.—Renfrew, Ont.

McKay, Angus, M.D. (South Oxford.)

Parents came to Can. from Sutherlandshire, Scot. B. in the Tp. of Oxford, Co. of Oxford, Ont., 2 Oct., 1852. Ed. and graduated at Trinity Coll. Elected a Bencher of the Law Soc., Ont., 1870. Is a dir. of the Ontario Investment Asso. First returned to Leg. Assem. for present seat, Aug. 1872, on resignation of sitting member; re-elected at g.e. 1875, 1879, 1883 and 1886. Is the Leader of the Opposition in the Leg. Assem. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to the present Government.—Albert Street, London, Ont.; Toronto Club.

METCALFE, JAMES HENRY. (Kingston.)

S. of John Metcalfe; grandfather, James Metcalfe, resided in the Village of Bainbridge, Yorkshire, Eng. B. in Kingston, Ont., 8 Jan. 1848. Ed. at the Public Sch. and Collegiate Institute. M., at Kingston, 5 Aug. 1869, to Margaret Jane, second dau. of Fraser Clute, Esq., of South Fredericksburgh. MORGAN, WILLIAM. (South Norfolk.)

Only s. of the late John Dwyer Morgan, of Walsingham, Ont., a native of Glamorgan, Wales, who carried on a mercantile and lumbering business in Walsingham for many years, and was also a member of the Co. Council of Norfolk. B. 8 Dec., 1848, at Stirling, Co. of Hastings. Ed. at Common Sch. Unmarried. Has been Reeve of the Tp. of Walsingham for several years. Has taken an active part in military matters, having had command of No. 3 Co. 39th Batt. of the Rifles, for a period of 15 years. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g.e. 1879, and re-elected at g.e. 1883 and 1886. A Liberal Conservative.— Walsingham Centre, Ont.

MORIN, Lieut.-Col. James E. (Welland.)

S. of Michael Morin and his wife Ellen Nash. B. in the Co. of Limerick, Irel., 12 May, 1848. Ed. at Common Schools and at a Commercial Coll. in U.S. M., 14 Sept., 1870, Jeanette A. Wilson. Is a merchant. Is Clerk of the Tp. of Bertie and Lieut.-Col. 44th Batt. V.M. Has been auditor of the Co. of Welland. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g.e. 1883, and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal. —Ridgeway, Ont.

Mowat, Hon. Oliver, Q.C., LL.D. (North Oxford.)

Eldest s. of the late John Mowat, Esq., formerly of Canisby, Caithness-shire, Scot., who, after serving in the British Army during the campaign in Portugal and Spain under Lord Wellington, came to Can. 1816, and settled at Kingston, by Miss Levack; and bro. of the Rev. Prof. Mowat, of Queen's Univ., Kingston. B. in Kingston, 22 July, 1820. Ed. there. M., 1846, Jane, second dau. of the late John Ewart, Esq., of Toronto. Studied law first with Hon. (now Sir) John A. Macdonald, and with Mr. Justice Burns. Was called to the Bar, U.C., in Michaelmas Term, 1841. Created a Q.C. in 1856. Is a bencher ex-officio of the Law Society of Ont., and head of the law firm of Mowat, Maclennan & Downey. Sat in the City Council of Toronto for two years. Has been Presdt. of the Canadian Institute, Toronto. a Commissioner for consolidating Public General Statutes for Canada and Upper Canada, respectively, in 1856. Sat in the Quebec Union Conference, 1864. Has been Presdt. of the Evangelical Alliance of Ont. since 1867. Sat for South Ontario in Can. Assem. from 1857 until he retired from public life, 1864. An unsuccessful candidate for Kingston, 1861. Was Prov'l. Secy. (in the Brown-Dorion Administration) from 2 to 6 Aug., 1858; Postmaster-Genl. (in the Sandfield Macdonald-Dorion Administration) from May 1863 until March 1864; held the same office (in the Coalition Govt.) from June 1864 until 14 Nov., same year, when apptd. Vice-Chancellor of U.C., an office he resigned 25 Oct., 1872, on being called upon to form a new administration in Ont. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council and Attorney-Genl., 31 Oct., 1872. (Salary, \$5,000.) As Vice-Chancellor was one of the Judicial Officers apptd. under 34 Vic. chap. 7 (Ont.) to inquire into and report upon Estate Bills in the Ont. Assem. Returned for present seat, by acclamation, Nov. 1872, and again at g.e. 1875; re-elected at g.e. 1879, 1883, and 1886. A Reformer.—183 Simcoe Street, Toronto; Toronto Club; Reform Club, Toronto.

Murray, Thomas. (North Renfrew.)

Has been Deputy Reeve and Reeve of the Tp. of Gloucester. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Liberal.—Cumming's Bridge, P.O.

RORKE, Captain Joseph, J.P. (East Grey.)

Eldest s. of Richard Rorke, a native of the City of Waterford, Irel., and of Mary, eldest dau. of Thomas Hurst, a native of Roscommon, both of whom came to Can. in 1820, settled in the Tp. of Tecumseth, Co. Simcoe, Ont., and removed thence to the Tp. of Collingwood, Co. of Grey. B. in the Tp. of Tecumseth, 26 April, 1832. Ed. in the Common Schs. M., 1867, Susan, dau. of the late John Donaldson, of Mount Norris, Co. of Armagh, Irel. (she d). Is a Notary Public, Conveyancer and Loan Agent. Has been a Tp. Councillor, Deputy Reeve, Reeve and Warden of the County of Grey. Was a dir. of the North Grey and

Northern Extension Railway Coy. Gazetted a Capt. in Militia in 1858, and is now a Capt. in the 31 (Grey) Batt. V.M. Was Presdt. of the Liberal Conservative Asso. of East Grey from 1875 to 1878, and was Returning Officer for East Grey at g.e. 1882 for the Commons. Elected County Master of the Co. Dorion, Hon, Joseph Adolphe. (Sorel.)

S. of Dr. Dorion, of St. Ours, who sat in the Leg-Assem. and took part in the constitutional struggles which culminated in the events of 1836-37, and were finally settled by the Union of 1841. mission, 1870. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex-Council and Commr. of Agriculture and Public Works for Quebec, 22 Sept., 1874, when he became Commr. of Crown Lands. Ed. at St. Francis Coll., Richmond. Graduated in Arts and Law at McGill Univ. M., May, 1866, Amelia M., dau. of the late Geo. W. Weaver. Called to the Bar of L. C. Is a life Governor of various institutions in Montreal, and represented for a number of years St. Antoine Ward in the City Council of Montreal. An unsuccessful candidate for Argenteuil in Leg. Assembly at g.e., 1882. Apptd. to Leg. Council, March, 1887. A Liberal.—Montreal.

GÉRIN, Hon. ELZÉAR, Q.C. (Kennebec.)

Descended form Jean Gérin, a native of the Parish of Les Echelles, near Grenoble, France, who came to Can. with one of the last French regiments, and married in 1763, at Yamachiche, Madeline Grenier, sixteenth child of Major Antoine Gerin-Lajoire, by Amable Gélinas. B. at Yamachiche, 14 Nov., 1843, and ed. at the Christian Brothers School there, and at the Nicolet Seminary. M. 14 Oct., 1872, Marie Agathe, dau. of D. Dufresne, Esq., Three Rivers. Called to the Bar of P.Q., July 1873. Apptd. a Q.C. 1887. Began to write for the press as early as 1862, and published 1864 an historical pamphlet L'Histoire de la Gazette de Quebec. Was associate editor of Le Journal de Quebec in 1865; chief editor of Le Canada in 1866; and later, for a few months, associate editor of La Minerve. Was for two years in London and Paris studying the political institutions of Britain and France, and while in

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the latter country was a writer on the staff of the Journal de Paris. In 1866, was put in charge of the Sergeant-at-Arms by order of the House of Assem., Can., for assaulting one of its members, Mr. J. B. Eric Dorion. Was an unsuccessful candidate for St. Maurice, in the Commons, in 1868. Elected for that constituency in Leg. Assem., P.Q., at g.e. 1871, and sat for one Parlt. Apptd. to the Leg. Co., 21 Aug., 1882. HEARN, Hon. John. (Stadacona.)

S. of Thos. Hearn, by his wife, Catherine, dau. of Pierse Power, and first cousin of the Right Rev. Dr. Power, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. B. at Arundel Square, Waterford, Irel., Jan., 1827. Ed. at Meagher's Academy and by private tuition at Quebec. Came to Can. and settled in Quebec in 1842. M., 1849, Mary, dau. of John Doran, J.P., Quebec. Is an extensive real estate dealer. Was Presdt. of the Emmett Rifle Club (an 1rish patriot organization), 1848; of the St. Patrick's C. & L. Institute in 1870; of the Hibernian Benevolent Soc. in 1875; Dir. of the St. Lawrence & Temiscouata Railway Co., 1884; a Trustee of St. Bridget's Asylum; City Alderman, and for more than thirty years mem. of the Corporation of Quebec, having filled the office of Chairman of nearly all its standing and special committees. First returned to Leg. Assem. for Quebec West at g. e. 1867, until 31 Oct., 1877, when apptd. to L. C. An Independent Liberal.—46½ Grande Allée, St. Louis Road, Quebec.

LABRUÈRE, Hon. PIERRE BOUCHER DE. (Rougemont.)

Descended from Pierre Boucher de Boucherville, at one time Governor of Three Rivers. S. of Pierre Boucher LaBruère, physician, and Dlle M. H. Boucher de LaBroquerie, and grands. of René B. de LaBruère, who fought in the war of 1812–13, and was at the battle of Chateauguay. B. at St. Hyacinthe, 5 July, 1837, and ed. there. M., Jan. 1861, Dlle. Marie Victorine Alice Leclère. Formerly Prothonotary of the Superior Court for the District of St.

Hyacinthe. Resigned in 1875 to become the editor of the Courier de St Hyacinthe. Author of pamphlets entitled Le Canada sous la domination Anglaise, and History of St. Hyacinthe. Sworn of the Ex. M. 1st, Celauvie, dau. of the late Lieut.-Col. Portelance, M.P.P., and 2nd, Corinne, dau. of Andrew Bedard, Notary, brother to Judge Bedard. Is Seignior of the Seignior of Sherrington, Co. of Napierville. Was Census Commr. in 1860 and 1870; Warden of the Co. of Napierville; Mayor, Justice of the Peace, and a Commr. for the summary trial of small causes; a dir. of the Montreal & Champlain Railway, and a Lieut.-Col. in the Militia for over twenty years. RIVARD, Hon. SÉVÈRE. (Alma.)

M., at Montreal, 1863, Delphine Choquette. Called to the Bar, L. C., 1859. Was an Alderman for nine years, and Mayor of the city of Montreal from March, 1879, to March, 1881. Has been a School Commr. Apptd. to L. C., 15 Oct.. 1886. A Conservative.—337 Sherbrooke Street, Montreal.

Ross, Hon. David Alexander, Q.C. (Golfe.)

Maternal grandfather, the late David Ross, merchant, of Quebec; paternal grandfather, John Ross, born at Tain, in Scot. He joined the expedition for the conquest of Canada under Gen. Wolfe, as a member of a Volunteer Co. to the 78th Highlanders, and was wounded at the battle of the Plains of Abraham in Sept., 1759. S. of John Ross, of Quebec, at the time of his death Joint Prothonotary of the Court of King's Bench. B. 12 March, 1819.

Sworn a member of the Executive Council, and was Attorney-Gen. in the Joly Administration from 8 March, 1878, to 30 Oct., 1879, when he resigned with his colleagues. Sat in the Leg. Assem. for Quebec Co. from g. e. 1878 to g. e. 1881, when he withdrew from politics. Apptd. to Leg. Council, Jan. 1887, and apptd. a mem. of the Executive Council without portfolio. STARNES, Lieut.-Col., Hon. Henry, J.P. (DeSalaberry.)

Grands. of a U. E. Loyalist, of English descent, who settled in Can. at the close of the American revolution. Father married a French-Canadian lady. B. at Kingston, Ont., 13 Oct., 1816. Ed. at the Montreal Coll. and the Rev. Mr. Esson's Academy. Was for some years a mem. of the firm of Leslie, Starnes & Co., wholesale merchants, Montreal. Has been a dir. of La Banque du Peuple; a Warden of Trinity House; Vice-Presdt. of the Board of Trade, and for many years Manager in Montreal of the Ontario Bank. Is Chairman of the Can. Board of Dir. of the Liverpool and London and Globe Insu. Co., Presdt. of the Shedden Co., and a Dir. of the Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Co. Was Mayor of Montreal in 1856 and 1866, and is Lieut.-Col. 1st Montreal Centre Reserve Militia. Sat for Chateauguay in Can. Assem. from g. e. 1857 to g. e. 1863, when he retired. Is Presdt. of the Artizans' Permanent Building Soc, and Presdt of the Asbestos Mining and Manufacturing Co. of Can. Sworn of the Executive Council and apptd. Provl. Secretary in the Ross Administration, 31 July, 1882. Resigned 20 Jan., 1887, and was apptd. to same office in the Taillon Administration, 25 Jan., 1887. Resigned 27 Jan., 1887. Was an unsuccessful candidate at g. e. 1872. First returned by acclamation on accepting office, and again at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.-Quebec.

BOURBONNAIS, AVILA G. (Soulanges.)

Boyer, Arthur. (Jacques Cartier.)

S. of Louis Boyer, a merchant in Montreal, by his wife, Amelie Mignault. B. in Montreal, 9 Feb., 1851. Ed. there and in London, Eng. M., in 1875, Miss Ernestine Galarneau. First returned to Leg. Assem. for present seat at a bye election held 27 March, 1884, on the resignation of the sitting member, Hon. Mr. Mousseau. Reelected at last g.e. A Liberal.—Montreal.

Brassard, Thomas. (Shefford.)

Ancestors came from France, and were among first settlers at Murray Bay. S. of the late Joseph Brassard, farmer. B. at Murray Bay 16 Jan., 1827. Ed. at the Seminary at Quebec. M., 14 Oct., 1857, at Lacadie, Marie Aurelie A. Senecal. Admitted to practice as a Notary, June, 1855. Was Registrar of Co. of Brome from April, 1879, to 1884. Was Secy.-Treas., School Commr. and Commr. of Small Causes at Henryville for some years; Secy.-Treas. from 1866 to 1879, and Official Assignee in Insolvency for the County of Brome. CARON, EDOUARD. (Maskinongé.)

Casgrain, Thomas Chase, Q.C. (Quebec County.)

A mem. of one of the oldest French families in Can. S. of Senator Charles E. Casgrain, M.D., and of Charlotte M. Chase, of Windsor, Ont. B. in Detroit, U.S., 28 July, 1852. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec and at Laval Univ., where he graduated in 1877 as Master in Laws, summa cum laude, and took the Dufferin Medal. M. in Quebec, 15 May, 1878, Marie Louise, dau. of Alex. Le Moine, Esq. Apptd. Q.C. April, 1887. Is Professor of Criminal Law at Laval Univ., and was granted the degree of Doctor of Law by that Institution on 13 Oct., 1883. B. at Somerset, Co. of Megantic, 28 May, 1847. M., 1869, dau. of late Alex. Bourgeau, of Aylmer, Q. Resided in Great Falls and Manchester, New Hampshire, from 1861 to 1867, when he settled at Aylmer. Is a lumber merchant. Has been a Councillor, Mayor of Aylmer for three years, and Warden of the Co. of Ottawa. Is Presdt. of the School Board, and of the St. Jean Baptiste Soc. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g. e. A Conservative. —Aylmer, Q.

DAVID, LAURENT OLIVIER. (Montreal East.)

A native of Sault au Recollet, near Montreal. Ed. at

St. Therese Coll. M., 1868, Miss Albina Chenet. Is an Advocate and a Journalist. Has established and edited several newspapers, and is author of "Biographies and Portraits of our Principal French-Canadians" and "Patriotes de 1837-1838." First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g. e. A moderate Liberal.—Montreal.

DÉCHÉNE, FRANCOIS GILBERT MINVILLE. (L'Islet.)

S. ôf the late Alfred M. Dèchène, merchant, St. Roch. B. there, 18 Aug., 1859. Ed. at the Coll. of Ste. Anne Lapocatiere, and in Law at Laval Univ. Unmarried. Called to the Bar in 1883. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g. e. A Liberal.—Quebec.

Déschenes, George Honoré. (Témiscouata.)

B. 16 Aug. 1841, and ed. at the school in Cacouna. M. 26 Jan. 1864, Susan Michand. Is a farmer. Has been twelve years Secy.-Treas. of his Municipality and of the School Board of the Parish, and Vice-Presdt. of the Agricultural Soc. of the Co. of Temiscouata. Is a dir. of the St. Lawrence and Temiscouata Railway Co. First returned to Leg. Assem. 1875, re-elected at g. e. 1882 by acclamation; re-elected at last g. e. Dorais, Louis Trefflé. (Nicolet.)

FAUCHER DE SAINT MAURICE, NARCISSE HENRI EDOUARD. (Bellechasse.)

S. of N. C. Faucher de St. Maurice, Advocate, Seigneur of Beaumont, Vincennes and Mont-à-Peine, Prêfet of the Co. of Bellechasse, and of Catherine H. Mercier, both belonging to old French families. B. at Quebec 18 April. 1844. Ed. at the Seminary there and at the Coll. of Ste. Anne de la Pocatiere. M., in 1868, Miss Josephine Berthelot D'Artigny, niece of the late Sir Louis H. Lafontaine, Bart. Went to Mexico in 1864, and became a Capt. in the 4th Mexican Sharpshooters, and subsequently A.D.C. to Gen. Viscount Courtois Roussel d'Hurbal. Served through the war, and was in eleven battles, thirty-two engager ments, was twice wounded and had one horse killed under him. Returned to Can. in 1866, and was for fourteen years Clerk of Private Bills, L. C., P. Q. Has contributed largely to the newspaper press in France, Canada and the States, and is the author of several military and historical works in the French language. Became editor-in-chief of Journal de Quebec, 1883. Is now editor of Le Canadien. Was for some time Librarian and a mem. of the Council of the Literary and Historical Soc. of Quebec. Is a mem. of La Societé des gens des lettres de France, and Hon. Presdt. of the Press Asso. of the Prov. of Quebec. Was Commr. from the P. Q. at the International Exposition of Geography at Venice in 1881. Was Vice-Presdt. of the French Literary Section of the Royal Soc. of Can. Created a

Knight of the Imperial Order of Guadaloupe by the Mexican Emperor, and received the medal of the Mexican campaign from Napoleon III., and the military medal for valor and integrity given by the late Emperor Maximillian. Created a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor, France, 26 July, 1881, for exceptional services rendered to France in the army and in the Canadian press. Is an hon. mem. of L'Academie des Muses Santones, and a corresponding mem. of the Commercial Geographical Soc. of Paris. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e. 1881, and re-elected at last g. e. FLYNN, EDMUND JAMES, Q.C., LL.D. (Gaspé.)

M., 11 May, 1875, Mathilde Augustine Coté, dau. of Augustin Coté, Esq., editor of Le Journal de Quebec. Graduated with distinction at Laval Univ., 30. June, 1873. Called to the Bar, 15 Sept., 1873. Apptd. Q.C. 1887. Received degree of LL.D. from Laval Univ., 15 May, 1878. Has been Professor of Roman Law in the Laval Univ. since 1874. Returned to Leg. Assem. by acclam., 29 April, 1878. Had been a candidate in 1874 for the Commons. and in 1875 and 1877 for the Leg. Assem. Supported the policy of the late Joly Government up to 28 Oct., 1879, when he seconded a motion for conciliation and coalition, by which the Joly Govt. was overthrown. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Commissioner of Crown Lands in the Chapleau Government from the 31 Oct., 1879, to 31 July, 1882. Apptd. Commr. of Railroads, 9 Feb, 1884. GAGNON, Hon. CHARLES ANTOINE ERNEST. (Kamouraska.)

S. of Antoine Gagnon, merchant, Riviere Ouelle, and of the late Julie Adele Pelletier, sister of Senator Pelletier, C.M.G. The family originally came from Vendée, France, and is one of the oldest French Canadian families, having settled in Can. in 1633. B. at Riviere Ouelle, 4 Dec., 1846. Ed. at St. Anne's Coll. M. at Riviere Ouelle, 14 June, 1870, Marie Malvina, third dau. of François Gagnon, farmer. Was valuator on the Intercolonial Railway (St. Lawrence District) from Dec., 1873, to March, 1878. Receiver of Wreck for District of Kamouraska from June, 1874, to March, 1878. Apptd. Notary Public, 2 March, 1869. Has been Secy. of the Municipality; Secy. of the School Com. missioners, and Treasurer of the Fabrique. Sworn a mem. of the Executive Council, and apptd. Provincial Secretary in the Mercier Administration, 29 Jan., 1887. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g.e. 1878 and 1881. The last election being contested, he was unseated, and reelected Jan., 1883; re-elected at the last g.e.—Rivière Ouelle P.Q.

GIROUARD, JOSEPH ENA. (Drummond and Arthabaska.)

S. of Urbain Girouard, farmer, a native of Gentilly, P.Q., by his wife, Rosalie Brunelle. B. 17 Aug., 1855, at Stanfold, Co. of Arthabaska. Ed. at Nicolet Coll. M. at Drummondville 6 Sept. 1882, Emma Watkins. Admitted to practice as a Notary. Is Secy.-Treas. of Grantham, municipality and School, Drummondville. First returned to Leg. Assem. 24 March, 1886, on the resignation of the sitting mem.; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—Drummondville, Q.

GLADU, VICTOR. (Yamaska.)

Son of the late Victor Gladu, Notary, by his wife, Adée Perrin. B. at St. Antoine, River Chambly, 15 April, 1844. Ed. at Jesuits, Ste. Mary's Coll., Montreal. Admitted to practice as a Notary, 15 June, 1866. M. 25 Aug., 1868, Mary, only dau. of David Gill, Esq. Was an Official Assignee under the Insolvent Act of 1875. Has been Warden of the Co. of Yamaska and Mayor of St. Francois du Lac. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A National Liberal.—St. Francois du Laç, P.Q.

HALL, JOHN SMYTHE, Junr., Q.C. (Montreal West.)

S. of John S. Hall, a mem. of the late firm of Grant, Hall & Co., at one time extensively engaged in the lumber and saw mill business. B. in Montreal 7 Aug., 1853. Ed. at Bishop's Coll. Sch., Lennoxville, and at McGill Univ., where he graduated B.A. in 1874, and B.C.L. in 1875. M., 3 Jan., 1883, Miss Brigham, of Ottawa. Called to the Bar P. Q., Jan., 1876. Apptd. Q.C. 1887. Is a member of the law firm of Chapleau, Hall & Nicolls. Was Presdt. of the Univ. Literary Soc. in 1880, and Presdt. of the McGill Graduate Soc. in 1884. Elected a mem. of the Corporation of McGill Univ. in 1883, and re-elected in 1886. Has been Presdt. of the Junior Conservative Club, Montreal. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Conservative.— Montreal.

Johnson, Andrew Stuart, J.P. (Megantic.)

B. at Inverness, Megantic, 15 Dec., 1848. Ed. in the Elementary Schools there. Is a farmer and a merchant. Has been Mayor of Thetford Mines and Postmaster for Clapham. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g. e.—
Thetford.

LAFONTAINE, EUGÊNE, D.C.L. (Napierville.)

S. of Dr. L. D. Lafontaine, of St. Edward, who represented Napierville from 1871 to 1881 in Leg. Assem. Grandf, took an prominent part in the political troubles of 1838, and was sentenced to death, but subsequently pardoned. B. at St. Edward, 27 Nov., 1857. Ed. at Montreal Coll., and at Laval Univ., where he was prize medallist. M. Elmire, dau. of L. J. Moll, of Berthier. Called to Bar, P.Q., 1879. D.C.L. of Laval in 1881. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Liberal and a Prohibitionist.—Montreal.

Laliberte, Edouard Hypolite. (Lotbinière.)

Descended from an old French family settled in Lotbinère for more than 150 years. B. at Lotbinère, 13 Oct., 1845. M., 14 Jan., 1873, Delle. Julia Durand. Admitted to practice as a Notary 1873, and represents the Dist. of Arthabaska on the Board of Notaries. First returned to Leg. Assem., 30 Jan., 1886, on the resignation of the sitting mem., Hon. Mr. Joly. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—Warwick, P.Q.

LAPOINTE, ALFRED. (Vaudreuil.)

B. in 1835 at Sainte Thérèse de Terrebonne, and ed. at the Coll. there. M., 1st, 7 Oct., 1869, Léontine Tessier; 2nd, 9 Mar., 1877, Susanna Towner. Is a farmer and a saw and flour miller. Has been Mayor of his Parish, a J.P. and a Commr. of Small Causes. First returned to Leg. Assem. by acclamation, 19 June, 1884, on the retirement of Mr. Archambault, the sitting mem., and re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative (Castor).—Ste. Justice de Newton, Q.

LAREAU, EDMOND. (Rouville.)

Ancestors came from France in 1750, and after the cession of Can. to Eng in 1760, settled on the Richelieu at Chambly. B. at St. Gregoire, Iberville, 12 Mar., 1848. Ed. at the Coll. of Ste. Marie de Mannoir, and graduated LL.B. at Victoria Coll. and B.C.L. at McGill Univ. M., at Montreal, 1880, Marguerite Robillard. Called to the Bar 1870. Has been Professor of Law in McGill Univ. since 1876. Was at one time editor of Le Pays and of Le Nationale. Has contributed largely to the reviews, and is author of several works on law and literature, amongst which are Histoire du droit Canadien. (1872); Histoire de la Litterature Canadienne, (1874); Mélanges historiques et litteraires, (1877); Histoire abrégée de la litterature, (1884); and La Code Civil annoté (1885). Leblanc, Pierre Evariste. (Laval.)

Family came to L'Isle Jesus, Co. of Laval, from Acadia (now Nova Scotia) in 1757, after the conquest and dispersion of its inhabitants by the British Army. S. of Joseph Leblanc, by his wife Adéle Belanger. B. at St. Martin, Co. of Laval, 10 Augt., 1853. Ed. at the Academy there, at Jacques Cartier Normal School, and at McGill Univ. M. 12 Jan., 1886, Hermine, dau. of the late Theodore Beaudry, Esq., of Montreal, by Madame Catherine Valleé. Called to the Bar, P.Q., 11 July, 1879. First returned to Leg. Assem. 30 Oct., 1882, in the room of Hon. L. O. Loranger, elevated to the Bench. Unseated on petition and re-elected. Re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—208 St. Denis Street, Montreal.

LEMIEUX, FRANCOIS XAVIER. (Levis.)

Nephew of the late Hon. F. Lemieux, who represented Levis in Leg. Assem., Can., and was Commr. of Crown Lands and Public Works. B. at Levis 9 April, 1831. Ed. at the College there, and at the Seminary of Quebec. M. Diana, dau. of Hon. M. A. Plamondon, Judge of Superior Court for Arthabaska. Called to the Bar, Quebec, 1872, Has been Crown Prosecutor at Beauce, and has an extensive criminal practice. Defended Riel at his trial at Regina, July, 1885. An unsuccessful candidate for Bonaventure in the Commons at g.e. 1878, and again for Beauce at g.e, 1882. First returned to Leg. Assem. for present seat on the resignation of Hon. Mr. Paquet, at election held Nov., 1883, and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.— Quebec; Garrison Club.

Lussier, Albert Alexander Edouard Eustachie. (Ver-cheres.)

Is a D.C.L. of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, 1883. Has been Mayor of the Tp. of Brome, and Warden of the County of Brome. Was editor of the Observer (Cowansville) for a short period, and has twice held the Presidency of the Provincial Asso. of Protestant Teachers of Quebec. Sworn of the Ex Council and apptd. Solicitor-General 30 Oct., 1879. On the abolition of that office, 31 July, 1882, apptd. Commr. of Crown Lands. Resigned 20 Jan., 1887. Was Commr. Graduated M.D. at the Laval Univ., Quebec. Was a mem. of the Board of Examiners and Registrar of the Second Division of the Co. of Bonaventure. First returned to Leg. Asem. for present seat by acclamation 31 Oct., 1882, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of the sitting mem. who ran for the Commons. Re-elected at last g.e. MERCIER, Hon. Honore. (St. Hyacinthe.)

Family came from France to Dist. of Montmagny: thence removed to Dist. of Iberville. S. of M. J. B. Mercier, of St. Athanase, P.Q., by Marie Catherine Laflamme. B. at St. Athanase, 15 Oct., 1840. Ed. at St. Mary's (Jesuit) Coll., Montreal. M., 1st, 29 May, 1866, Dlle. Leopoldine Boivin, of St. Hyacinthe; 2nd, 9 May, 1871, Dlle. Virginie St. Denis, of same city. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1867. One of the directors of the Parti National, Jan., 1872. Author of L'Héroisme and La Patrie, two lectures (St. Hyacinthe, 1865). Was editor of Le Courrier de St. Hyacinthe from 1862 to 1864, and for a few months in 1866. Sat in the Commons for Rouville from g. e. 1872 until g. e. 1874. Returned to Leg. Assem., Quebec, as Solicitor-General in the Joly Govt., to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. P. Of Scotch parentage. B. in the Co. of Laprairie in 1842. Was engaged in farming until 1868, when he went into stock-raising. Was for some years Manager of the Canadian Meat and Produce Co., and has latterly been largely engaged in the export of produce and cattle to England. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Waterville, P.Q.

McShane, Hon. James, J.P. (Montreal West.)

S. of the late James McShane and Ellen Quinn, who came from the Co. Armagh, Irel., but who lived in Montreal for nearly fifty years. Father carried on the business as cattle dealer, packer and exporter of meats to England and the U. S. B. in St. Joseph street, Montreal, in 1834. Ed. there by the late Daniel Mahoney, school teacher, and at St. Sulpician Coll. M., 1863, Elizabeth Jane Darragh, of Montreal, who died 26 June, 1867; again in Plattsburgh, N.Y., to Josephine Katheline Miron, 8 Jan., 1868. Is a merchant and exporter of live cattle. Was the first to buy and ship cattle from Canada to England in 1874—a branch of trade which has grown to large proportions. Was made a J.P. in 1864. Has been a

Councillor and Alderman for St. Ann's Ward for twenty years. Has been several times Vice-Presdt. of the St. Patrick's Soc., and is a dir. of the St. Bridget's Asylum, Montreal. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e. 1878, and re-elected at g. e. 1881, and again at last g. e. Sworn of the Executive Council and apptd. Commr. Public Works, 29 Jan., 1887. A Liberal. Is determined to vote for legislation tending to retrenchment and economy. Will encourage immigration, and do all he can for bettering the condition of the poor and working classes.—112 University Street, Montreal.

NANTEL, GUILLAUME ALPHONSE. (Terrebonne.)

OWENS, WILLIAM, J.P. (Argenteuil.)

S. of Owen Owens, of Denbigh, Wales, and Charlotte Lindley, of Brantford, Eng. B. at Stonefield, Co. of Argenteuil, in 1840. Is a widower. Is a Lieut. in the Active Militia. Has been Postmaster, Councillor, and Mayor of the Township of Chatham. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e. 1881, and re-elected by acclamation at last g. e. A Conservative.—Stonefield, P.Q.

PICARD, Lieut.-Col. JACQUES, J.P. (Richmond and Wolfe.)

S. of M. Jacques Picard, by Thérèse LeBeau, both of St. Thomas, Dist. of Joliette, P.Q. B. there 2 July, 1828. Ed. at Colleges of L'Assomption and Joliette. M., Jan., 1873, Orpha, dau. of the late E. A. Generaux, Esq., for

some years in the Crown Lands Dept., Can. A Notary. Apptd. Registrar of Wolfe, Dec., 1861. Elected Presdt. of Wolfe Agricultural Soc., 1861. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e. 1867. Is of Norman-French descent. B. on Allumette Island, P.Q., in 1847. Ed. there and in Ottawa Coll. M., in 1870, Eleanore, second dau. of John Poupore, Esq., formerly M.P. for Pontiac. Is a mill owner, contractor and farmer. Was Mayor of Chichester from 1872 to 1882; Warden of the Co. of Pontiac from 1881 to 1882, and Chairman of the School Commissioners of Chichester from 1873 to 1881. First returned to Leg. Assem. for present seat in March, 1882, on the death of Mr. T. M. Bryson, the sitting member, and re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative.—Chichester, P.Q.

RINFRET dit MALOUIN, REMI FERDINAND, M.D. (Quebec Centre.)

B. at Quebec, 5 June 1818. Ed. at the Seminary of that city; pursued his medical studies at Quebec and at Harvard Univ., where he graduated M.D. in 1845. Has been an Alderman of Quebec since 1862. ROBERTSON, JOSEPH GIBB. (Sherbrooke.)

S. of the late Rev. James Robertson, for 30 years pastor of the Congregational Church at Stuartfield, Aberdeenshire, Scot., and subsequently of Sherbrooke, P.Q. B. at Stuartfield, 1 Jan. 1820, and ed. in Can. M., 1870, Mary J., eldest dau. of A. G. Woodward, Esq., of Sherbrooke. Was formerly in business as a merchant. Is Presdt. of the

Quebec Central Railway Co. and of the Sherbrooke Agricultural Soc. Was Secy.-Treas. of the Co. of Sherbrooke from the establishment of County Councils till the present system of Township Councils came into operation. Was Mayor of Sherbrooke for nearly 20 years, and Presdt. of the Temperance League in 1870-71. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council 25 Oct. 1869, and was Provl. Treasurer of Quebee from that time until Sept. 1874, when he retired from the Govt. Re-apptd. Treas. in Mr. DeBoucherville's administration, 22 Sept. 1874, and continued as such until 14 Jan. 1876, when he resigned. Was a delegate to Eng. on public business in 1874. First returned to Leg. Robidoux, Joseph Emery, Q.C. (Chateauguay.)

B. in St. Philippe, Co. of Laprairie, Q., 10 March 1844. Ed. at the Montreal Coll. and Jesuits' Coll Graduated ir law at McGill Univ. Called to the Bar 1866; apptd. Q.C. Has been Professor of Civil Law at McGill Univ. for ten years. Presdt. in 1884 of the McGill Graduate Society; Syndic of the Bar of the Dist. of Montreal, 1884. Commr. in 1879 to report on the administration of justice in Montreal, and a mem. of the Commission appointed to enquire into the matters connected with the building of the Parliament House, Quebec. First returned to Leg. Assem. 26 March, 1884, on death of the sitting mem., Dr. Laberge. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—Montreal.

ROCHELEAU, ANTOINE. (Chambly.)

B. at St. Bazile le Grand, Chambly, 1837. Ed. at Chambly Coll. Is a farmer. Has acted as an arbitrator in expropriations for railway purposes, and is now valuator for the Compagnie de Prêt Franco-Canadien. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A National Liberal.—St. Hubert, P.Q.

Saint Hilaire, Elie, J.P. (Chicoutimi and Saguenay.)

Great grandfather emigrated from Brittany, in France, to St. Joachim, Co. of Montmorency, and removed thence to St. Joseph, Co. of Beauce, P.Q. B. at Quebec, 30 Jan., 1839, and ed. at the Seminary there. Married 21 July 1862. Studied law for two years, and was subsequently a school teacher at Beauport, P.Q. Has been Sec. Treas. of the Co. of Chicoutimi and of the Agricultural Soc. there. First returned to Leg, Assem in 1881, and re-elected at last g.e. Ambrose Verret, of Quebec. A member of the firm of McCall, Shehyn & Co., wholesale dry goods merchants. Has been a J.P. since 1874. Is Presdt. of the Quebec Board of Trade, and for several years a mem. of the Quebec Harbour Commission. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g.e. 1875, and re-elected at g.e. 1878. Re-elected at g.e. 1881 and at last g.e. by acclamation. Sworn of the Executive Council and apptd. Prov. Treasurer 29 Jan. 1887. A Liberal.—Grand Allée, Quebec.

SPENCER, ELIJAH EDMUND. (Missisquoi.)

Of English and Welsh descent, but his immediate ancestors were U.E. Loyalists. S. of the late Ambrose S. Spencer, Esq., by Mary, dau. of the late Major P. Thomas. B. at St. Armand East, 19 April 1846. Ed. at the Grammar Sch., Frelighsburg, and at Poughkeepsie, N. Y. M., June 1873, Frances S., dau. of the late R. L. Galer, Esq., Dunham. A farmer. Has been a Councillor; a School Commr.; Presdt. of the Missisquoi Co. Agricultural Soc., and Sec.-Treas. of the Municipal Council and of the School Commrs. of St. Armand East. Is Presdt. of the Missisquoi and Rouville Mutual Fire Insu. Co. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e. 1881 and re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—Frelighsburg, P.Q.

Sylvestre, Louis. (Berthier.)

B. at Berthier in 1831. Ed. at L'Assomption Coll. Is a farmer. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g.e. 1871; reelected at g.e. 1875, an unsuccessful candidate at g.e. 1878 and at the bye election in Dec., 1880. Re-elected at g.e. 1886. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat in the Commons at g.e. 1882. A National Liberal.—Berthier en haut, Q.

Taillon, Louis Olivier, Q.C. (Montcalm) 2nd Mem.

B. at Terrebonne, P.Q., 26 Sept., 1840. Ed. at Masson Coll. M., July, 1875, Marie Louise Georgina, dau. of the late Hon. P. U. Archambault, for several years a M.L.C. of Canada (she d. 24 Jan., 1876.) Called to the Bar, L. C., 1865. Apptd. Q.C. 20 Jan., 1882. Was one of the originators of the great French-Canadian national demonstration which took place in Montreal on the festival of St. Jean Baptiste, 1874. Was Speaker of the Leg. Assembly from 1882 to 1883. Sworn of the Ex, Council and apptd Attorney-General, 23 Jan., 1884. Resigned 20 Jan., 1887. Formed an Administration 25 Jan., but resigned with his colleagues 27 Jan., 1887. First returned to Leg. Assem. for Montreal East at g.e. 1875. Re-elected at g.e. 1878 and 1881, and by acclamation 9 Feb., 1884, on acceptance of office. An unsuccessful candidate at last g.e. Elected for present seat 11 Dec., 1886, on resignation of mem. elect, Mr. Richard. A Conservative.—Montreal.

TESSIER, JULES. (Portneuf.)

S. of Hon. Mr. Justice Tessier, a Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, Quebec, who at one time represented Portneuf in the Assembly of the late Province of Canada. B. in Quebec in 1852. S. of the late Hon. J. E. Turcotte, in his lifetime Spkr. of the Leg. Assem. of Can. B. 19 Jan., 1845. M. 16 Jan., 1873, Marie Eleanor Isabella, only dau. of Angus Macdonald, Esq., of Becancour. Ed. at the Jesuits' College, Montreal, and at Stonyburst College, Lancashire, Eng. Called to the Bar, P. Q., June, 1867. Apptd. a Q.C. 1879. Is hon. dir. of the British Empire Mutual Life Assur. Co. Has been Councillor, Alderman and Mayor of Three Rivers. Was Speaker of the Leg. Assem., P.Q., from 4 June, 1878, until the dissolution of the House, Dec., 1881. First returned to Leg. Assem. 18 March, 1876, and re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1878, Was an unsuccessful candidate at g.e. 1881, but the sitting mem., Mr. Dumoulin, being unseated, he was elected 27 March, 1884. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Conservative.— Winnipeg.

GELLEY, THOMAS. (Cartier.)

S. of J. E. Gelley, contractor. B. at Levis, Quebec, 29 Dec., 1860. Ed. at Levis Commercial Coll, M., 1883, Miss Gallie. Settled in Man. in 1882, and has since been en-

gaged in farming at St. Norbert. Is a J.P. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Royal P.O., Man.

GILLIES, JAMES DANIEL. (Minnedosa East.)

Eldest s. of Mr. Angus Gillies, shipbuilder in P.E.I. B. in Charlottetown, P.E.I., 10 Dec., 1856. Ed. at Summerside Grammar Sch. M., 29 June, 1881, Jean, third dau. of Kenneth McKenzie, Esq., M.P.P., Burnside. Settled in Man. in 1876. Is a merchant. Was Chairman of the Board of School Trustees in 1883 and 1884, and Mayor of the town of Minnedosa and Warden of the Co. of Minnedosa in 1885. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Minnedosa*, *Man*.

GLASS, Hon. DAVID, Q.C. (St. Clements.)

S. of Mr. Samuel Glass, who came to Can. from the north of Irel. in 1818 and settled in the Co. of Middlesex, Ont. B. in Middlesex 20 July, 1829. Ed. at the London Grammar Sch. M., 22 Dec., 1856, Sarah, second dau. of the late Henry Dalton, Esq. Called to the Bar of U.C., Easter Term, 1864. Apptd. a Q.C. for Ont., 1876. Was a mem. of the City Council of London from 1855 to 1858, and subsequently three times Mayor of that city. Has also been Police Magistrate and Recorder of London, Deputy Judge of the Co. of Middlesex and a Bencher of the Law Society of Ont. Removed to Winnipeg in 1882, and was called to the Bar of Man. in May 1882. Is Solicitor for the city of Winnipeg. Is also a prominent mem. of the Masonic Order, and has been a mem. of the Grand Lodge of Can. Sat in the Commons for Middlesex from g.e. 1872 to g.e. 1874, when he was defeated. First returned to Leg. Assem., Man., at last g.e. An unsuccessful candidate for Minnedosa at g.e. 1883. Apptd. Speaker of the Assem., March 1887. An Independent. Is a prominent advocate for the construction of the Hudson Bay Railway.—Winnipeg.

GREENWAY, THOMAS. (Mountain.)

Eldest s. of the late Thos. Greenway, Esq., formerly of Cornwall, Eng., and latterly of Stephen, Co. Huron. B. in Cornwall, Eng., 1838. Came to Can. 1844, where he was ed. M., 1st, 25 Jan., 1860, Miss Annie Hicks, (she d. May, 1875.) 2nd, in 1877, Miss Emma Essery. Settled in Manitoba in 1878. Was Reeve of the Tp. of Stephen, Ont.,

for ten years. An unsuccessful candidate for South Huron, in the Commons, at g. e. 1872, and at g. e. 1874. Returned to Commons for that constituency by acclamation on sitting mem. being unseated, 11 Feb., 1875, and held the seat for the rest of the term. Returned for present seat at g. e. 1870 by acclamation. Re-elected at g. e. 1883, and again at last g. e. Is leader of the Opposition, and a Liberal.—Crystal City, Man.

Hamilton, Hon., Charles Edward, Q.C. (Shoal Lake.)

S. of Capt. Geo. Vallancey Hamilton, formerly of H. M. 41st Regt., and latterly of the Royal Canadian Rifles. B. in Rochester, Eng. Ed. at Grantham Academy, St. Catharines, Ont. M. at Hull, 10 Jan., 1834, Alexa, third dau. of John Ashworth, Esq., Cashier, P. O. Dept., Ottawa. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1865, and subsequently to the Bar of Manitoba. Apptd. a Q.C. in 1886. Settled in Winnipeg in 1881, and was Mayor of that city in 1885. Is a dir. of the Commercial Bank of Man. and of the Manitoba Mortgage and Investment Co. Sworn a mem. of the Executive Council, and apptd. Attorney-Gen. 4 Feb., 1885. First returned to Leg. Assem. for South Winnipeg, 3 March, 1885, on the appointment to the bench of the sitting mem., Mr. Killam. Elected for present seat at last g. e. Introduced the Torrens system of land transfer into Manitoba, and was prominent in passing the Railway Aid Act and other prominent measures. A Liberal-Conservative. - Winnipeg.

HARRISON, Hon. DAVID HOWARD, M.D. (Minnedosa West.)

S. of Milner Harrison, a native of Yorkshire, Eng., who came to Can. in 1816. B. in the Tp. of London, Ont., 1 June, 1843. Ed. at the Univ. of Toronto and McGill Coll., Montreal, and graduated M.D., 1864. M., April, 1866, Kate, dau. of the late George Stevenson, of Sarnia. Practised his profession in St. Mary's, Ont., until 1882, when he retired and settled in Man. Is a large land owner and carries on extensive farming operations. Was a mem. of the St. Mary's Town Council and a Coroner of the Co. of Perth. Sworn a mem. of the Executive Council, and apptd. Minister of Agriculture, Statistics and Health, 27 Aug., 1886. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e. 1883, and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal-Conservative and a Ministeralist.—Newdale, Man.

JACKSON, SAMUEL JACOB. (Rockwood.)

S. of Samuel Jackson, who came from Hacketstown, Co. of Carlow, Irel., and settled in Brampton, Ont., in 1850, by his wife Elizabeth Sutcliffe, a native of the Co. Wicklow, Irel. B. in Stradhally, Queen's Co., Irel., 18 Feb., 1848. Ed. at the Common and Grammar Schls. in Brantford, Ont. M., in Winnipeg, 27 Feb., 1878, Ida Isabella, dau. of A. H. Clark, Esq., of Stonewall, and formerly of London, Ont. Settled in Manitoba in 1871. Is a capitalist, and largely interested in various milling and mercan-Was an alderman of Winnipeg in 1877-78 tile concerns. and 1880, and Chairman of the Board of Works in 1882, dir. from Winnipeg on the Provl. Agricultural Board for four years: dir. of the Dufferin Park Asso.; dir. of the Manitoba Turf Club and Presdt. of the Rockwood Agricultural Soc. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e. 1883 and re-elected at last g.e. An Independent, and opposed to the Norquay Govt.—Stonewall.

KIRCHHOFFER, JOHN NESBITT. (West Brandon.)

S. of Revd. Richard B. Kirchhoffer, Rector of Ballyvourney, Co. Cork, Ireland. B. there 5 May, 1848. M. at at Guelph, Ont., 1875, Clara, dau. of Rev. J. B. Howard. Ed. at Marlborough College, Wiltshire, Eng. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1871, and subsequently to that of Man. Is Manager for Man. of the Imperial Loan & Investment Co. of Can., Limited. Was Reeve of Glenwood, Co. of Brandon, 1885–6; mem. of the Western Judicial Board, 1885; Presdt. of Glenwood Agri. Soc. 1884–5–6, and Presdt. of the West Brandon Agri. Soc. 1887. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Souris, P.O., Man.

LARIVIERE, Hon. ALPHONSE AIFRED CLEMONT. (St. Boniface)

Third s. of the late Abraham C. LaRiviére, of Montreal, P.Q., by the late Adelaide Marcil, of Longueuil, P.Q. B. in Montreal, P.Q., 24 July, 1842. Ed. at Jacques Cartier Normal Sch. and at St. Mary's Coll., Montreal. M., 4 Feb., 1867, to Marie Melvina Bourdeau, dau. of the late Gédeon Bourdeau, of Laprairie, P.Q. She died 7 June, 1885. Graduated at the Montreal School of Military Instruction, 2nd class, 1865, and 1st class, 1866; apptd. Ensign in the Reserve Militia, Military District of Hochelaga, P.Q., 1869, and Capt. for the Military District of Man., 1871. Was Presdt. of the Board of Arts and Manufactures for Prov. of Quebec, of the Institut des Artisans Canadiens and of the

Cercle St. Pierre of Montreal. Received an appointment in the Dominion Lands Office, Winnipeg, when coming to Man., Oct. 1871, which he held till 1875. Acted as special correspondent of La Minerve (Montreal) for several years and is now chief editor of Le Manitoba. Founded the Association St. Jean Baptiste de Manitoba (national) 1872 elected Presdt. 1875; founded La Société de Colonization de Manitoba (philanthropic) 1874, and elected first Presdt. Apptd. a J.P. for Co. of Selkirk, 1874. Was Presdt. of the Selkirk Co. Agricultural Soc. in 1878, and Superintendent of Catholic Schools and Joint Secretary of Board of Education. Is a mem. of the Council of the Univ. of Manitoba. Contested Ste. Anne for Leg. Assem. unsuccessfully at g.e. 1874. Elected by acclamation for St. Boniface at g.e. 1878, and re-elected at g.e, 1879. Apptd. Prov. Secy., 1881, on which occasion was elected by acclamation. Re-elected at g.e. 1882 and by acclamation at last g.e. Apptd. Minister of Agriculture, Statistics and Health, Sept. 6, 1883. Resigned 27 August, 1886, and apptd. Provincial Treasurer. Has introduced and carried through the Legislature several important Bills, including the Civil Service Act, the Act respecting the Internal Economy of the Legislative Assem., a Consolidation of the Acts respecting the Department of Agriculture, Statistics and Health, and the present election laws, comprising the system of voting by ballot. Is the leader in the House of the party representing constituencies where a large population of French origin is settled. A Liberal Conservative.—Corner of Provencher and Taché Avenues, St. Boniface, Man.

LEACOCK, FIDWARD PHILIP, B.A., J.P. (Birtle.)

Descended from Ella Leacock, Countess of Salisbury, who married William Longswood, temp. Crusades, whose second s. Hugh, to whom descended Lacock Abbey and estate, was the founder of the family Lacock—and subsequently Leacock—of whom were two branches: Lacock Wiston, Co. Notts, and Leacock, St. Helen's, Isle of Wight. Youngest s. of Thomas Murdock Leacock, Esq., of St. Helen's, Isle of Wight, and a J.P. for the Co. of Hants, Eng. B. at St. Helen's, 28 Dec. 1853. Ed. at Old Hall, Herts, and at the Univ. of Geneva, Switzerland, where he graduated B A. in 1873. Came to Can. in 1878, and settled in Manitoba in June, 1879. M., 5 Aug. 1881, Georgina Eliza, eldest dau. of John J. Vickers, Esq., Toronto, and grand-dau. of the late Sheriff Moodie, of Belleville, Ont. Is a lumber merchant; was Reeve and for three years Warden of Kildonan; Vice-Presdt. of the Birtle Farming

Co.; was also a dir. and Sec. of the Portage, Westbourne and Nortwestern Railway Co.; a J.P. for Man.; a Commr. per ded. pot. and a Commr. for taking Affidavits in the Queen's Bench. Was an unsuccessful candidate for present seat in Leg. Assem., Man., at g.e. 1879. Elected 1 Sept. 1882, on the resignation of the sitting mem. Reelected at g.e. 1883 and again at last g.e. A Conservative and a supporter of the Govt. of Hon. Mr. Norquay.—St. Boniface; Winnipeg; Russell Village, Man.; Manitoba, Club.

LUXTON, WILLIAM FISHER. (South Winnipeg.)

Norman origin. B. in Devonshire, Eng., 12 Dec., 1844. Came to Can. in 1855. Ed. at the Comm. and Grammar Schools, St. Thomas, Ont. M., 4 April, 1866, Sarah Jane, dau. of Jeremiah Edwards, Esq., Lobo, Ont. Was a Public School Teacher, Co. of Middlesex, for some years. Founded, associated with Hon. G. W. Ross, the Strathroy (Ont.) Age. Subsequently edited the Seaforth Expositor. Settled in Man in 1871, and in 1872 founded the Manitoba Free Press, of which he is still editor in chief and managing dir. Has been a member of the Provincial Board of Education and Winnipeg School Board and dir. of the Winnipeg General Hospital and Winnipeg Board of Trade for several years. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Winnipeg Mayoralty, 1874. Sat for Rockwood in the Man. Assem. from g.e. 1874 until g.e. 1878. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Marquette in the Commons, at g.e. 1878; also for present seat at bye-election held 1885. Returned for present seat at last g.e. A Liberal.—Manitoba Club, Winnipeg.

Macbeth, John. (Kildonan and St. Paul's.)

Fifth s. of Robert Macbeth, who came to Red River Settlement with Lord Selkirk in 1815. B. at Kildonan, Man., 27 March, 1854. Ed. at Kildonan Common Sch., St. John's Coll., and Manitoba Coll. Unmarried. Called to the Bar 4 Nov., 1882, and is a mem. of the law firm of Macbeth, Macbeth, & Sutherland. Was Clerk of the Ex. Council, Man., from May 1883, to April 1884, when he resigned to become a candidate for present seat. First returned to Leg. Assem., 8 April, 1884, on death of Hon. A. M. Sutherland, and re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—Winnipeg; Manitoba Club.

MACDONELL, JOHN A. (Lorne.)

Father a native of the Co. of Glengarry, Ont. B. at Dundas, Co. of Wentworth, Ont., 22 Nov., 1854. Ed. in Hamilton, and at the Model Sch., and School of Technology and Practical Science, Toronto. Was for a short time in the Civil Service in Toronto, and was subsequently employed in the survey and construction of a portion of the C. P. Railway and several other railway enterprises in Can. Is editor and proprietor of the Manitou Mercury newspaper. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Liberal.—Manitou, Man.

McLean, Daniel. (Dennis.)

B. in the Co. of Elgin, Ont., in 1854. Was for some years engaged as school teacher. Settled in Man. in 1882, and is now engaged in farming. Elected Reeve of Pipestone in 1884. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g. e. A Liberal.—Pipestone, Man.

MARION, ROGER, J.P. (Carillon.)

S. of Narcisse Marion, a blacksmith and trader from L'Assomption, P.Q., who settled in Man. in 1834, and married Marie Bouchard, a half-breed. B. in St. Boniface, 5 Aug., 1846, and ed. at the Coll. there. M.. 1873, Julienne, dau. of François Carriere. Is a land owner. Was senior Landing waiter in H. M. Customs at Winnipeg from 1872 to 1876. License Commr. for Man. from 1879 to 1885, and an Alderman of St. Boniface in 1883. Has been a J.P. since 1877. Re-elected Alderman by acclamation, Dec., 1886. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g. e. A Conservative.—Saint Boniface.

MARTIN, ALPHONSE FORTUNAT, D.L.S., C.E. (Morris.)

S. of the late Henri Martin, Esq., of Rimouski, P.Q., by Marie Dessein, his wife. B. at Rimouski, 14 May, 1849, and ed. at the Coll. there. Completed his mathematical studies under Chas. Baillargè, of Quebec. M., 26 May, 1874, Louisa, dau. of the late John Radiger, Esq., formerly of Montreal. Admitted as P.L.S. at Quebec in 1871, and removed to Man. in 1872. Was employed at Dominion lands surveys in 1872-73. Served in the Pontifical Zouaves from June 1868 to Nov. 1870, and was present at the siege of Rome in the latter year. Was Paymaster of the Rimouski Batt. V.M. in 1871. Is author

of Martin on Practical Surveys, 1883. First returned to Leg. Assem. for Ste. Agathe at g.e. 1874. An unsuccessful candidate for that seat at g.e. 1879, and for present seat at g.e. 1883. Re-elected at last g.e. Is a Manitoba first man, opposed to railway monopoly, but favors the construction of the Hudson's Bay Railway. Favors a modification of the tariff for Manitoba; the transfer of the control, by the Dominion Govt., of the lands in Man. to the Local Govt., and the maintenance of the dual languages and separate schools.—Emerson.

Martin, Joseph. (Portage la Prairie.)

Grandfather came to Can. in 1820, and settled at Milton, Co. of Halton, Ont. Father, Edward Martin, carried on business there with John White, M.P., for some years. B. in Milton, Ont., 24 Sept., 1852, and ed. at the Normal Sch. and Univ., Toronto. Was a teacher in the Common Sch., New Edinburgh, Ont., for three years, and holds a first class certificate as a public school teacher. M., at Ottawa, Sept. 2, 1881, Mrs. G. W. Eaton. Settled in Man., Feb. 1882, and was called to the Bar, Aug. 1882. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g.e. 1883. The election being declared void, he was again elected, May 1883. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal, and opposed to the Norquay Govt.—
Portage la Prairie.

McKenzie, Kenneth. (Lakeside.)

S. of John McKenzie, of Essick, Parish of Strathdoors, Inverness-shire, Scot. B. there 5 Jan, 1822. Ed. at Conon-bridge, Ross-shire, and at Dumfermline Academy. M., 12 Dec., 1844, Jane, eldest dau. of Adam Condy, Esq., Bartonville, Ont. Is a farmer and a J.P., and resident Dir. of Portage la Prairie Farmers' Mutual Ins. Co. Has been Presdt. of the Provincial Agricultural and Arts Soc. of Man.; of the Marquette St. Andrew's Soc., and of the Marquette Agricultural Soc. Has been Presdt. of the Wellington (Ont.) Agricultural Soc., and was for 11 years Presdt. of the Puslinch (Ont.) Reform Assoc. Was first Postmaster at Burnside. First returned to Leg. Assem. for Portage la Prairie at g.e. 1874. Elected for Burnside at g.e. 1879. Was not a candidate at g.e. 1883. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—Burnside.

MURRAY, ALEXANDER. (Assiniboia.)

Only s. of the late Mr. James Murray, who came to

Red River from Sutherlandshire, Scot., with Lord Selkirk, and m. Elizabeth, dau. of Dr. J. P. Holmes, an eminent physician of London, Eng. B. in Kildonan, Red River, April 18, 1829. Ed. at St. John's Coll. (under Bishop Anderson), where he took a scholarship, 1857. M., 1861, Letitia, dau. of Rev. Geo. Flett, of Okanese Mission, Man. Has been a J.P. and a Municipal Councillor. First returned to Leg. Assem. for St. Charles at g.e. 1874, and re-elected at g.e. 1878. Vacated seat on appt. as Police Magistrate for the Co. of East Marquette. Resigning shortly afterwards, was again re-elected. Elected for present seat at g.e. 1879-1883, and again at last g.e. Apptd. Speaker of the Assem., April 1883. Has been a delegate twice to the Dominion Govt. on the subject of "Better Terms." A Liberal Conservative.—St. Charles P.O., Man.

NORQUAY, Hon JOHN. (St. Andrews.)

Second s. of the late Mr. John Norquay, a native of Man. B. 8 May, 1841. Ed. at St. John's Academy (under Bishop Anderson), where he took a scholarship, 1854. M., June 1862, Elizabeth, second dau. of George Setter, Esq., Poplar Point. Is a mem. of the Council of the Univ. of Manitoba. Took a prominent part in all the discussion relating to the Red River Rebellion in 1870, and by the moderation of his views secured the confidence of all parties. Was a mem, of the Ex. Council and Minister of Public Works and Agriculture for Man. from 14 Dec., 1871, until 8 July, 1874, when he resigned with his colleagues. Re-apptd. in the Davis Administration, March 1875, and sworn in as Provl. Secty. This office he resigned, and was apptd. Minister of Public Works, May 1876. In Oct. 1878 formed a new Govt. in conjunction with Hon. Mr. Royal, in which he held the office of Premier and Provl. Treasurer. In May 1879, a difference of opinion having arisen between Messrs. Norquay and Royal, the latter resigned, with Mr. Delorme, Minister of Agriculture. Norquay subsequently called Messrs. Biggs and Taylor into the Govt., and having carried a bill for redistribution of seats, dissolved the House in Oct. 1879. Mr. Biggs having resigned and Mr. Taylor being defeated at the g.e. which followed, Senator Girard and Mr. Goulet were taken into the Govt. Resigned the Treasurership 27 Aug., 1886. Apptd. Railway Commr. 10 Sept., 1886. An unsuccessful candidate for Marquette in House of Commons at g.e. Sat for High Bluff in Leg. Assem. from g.e. 1870 until g.e. 1874, when returned for present seat. Re-elected at g.e. 1878, and again by acclamation at g.e. 1879 and

1883. Re-elected at last g.e. Is the only member who has continuously held a seat in the Leg. Assem. since its inception. Has represented the Province on several delegations to the Federal Govt. at Ottawa, and has succeeded in securing material concessions for Manitoba in enlargement of the Province and increase to the subsidy. The Acts relating to Municipalities, Drainage and County Courts are among the principal measures carried through the House by him. His vigorous railway extension policy has been of material benefit to the Province. A Conservative.—Winnipeg; Manitoba Club, Winnipeg.

PRENDERGAST, JAMES EMILE PIERRE. (La Vérandrye.)

Eldest s. of the late James Prendergast, Advocate and Coroner for the dist. of Quebec, and of Emile Gauvreau. B. in the city of Quebec 22 March, 1858. Is a Barrister of the Prov. of Que. and an Attorney-at-Law of Man.; Presdt. of La Société St. Jean Baptiste de Manitoba; a dir. of the St. Boniface Building Soc. and of the Winnipeg, St. Boniface and Carillon Railway Co., and a member of the Board of Education of Man. Has been for three years a mem. of the Council of Manitoba Univ. and Auditor of the same. Is an ex-editor of Le Manitoba, and has published poems and essays on Art. Has a seat in the "Académie des Muses Sautones," France First returned to Leg. Assem. for present seat, July 1885, by acciamation on the appt. of the sitting mem., Mr. Prud'homme, to the Bench. Re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative Liberal.— St. Boniface, Man.

ROBINSON, JOHN MOORE. (Woodlands.)

S. of Capt. Wm. Robinson, J.P. of Hustonville, Co. of Wellington, Ont., who came to Can. from the Co. of Armagh, Irel., and M., in 1854, Maria Moore, of Maryborough, Co. of Wellington. B. there Dec. 1855. M. June 1882, Eliza, third dau. of Robert Lipsett, of Meadow Lea. Ed. at Huston Common Sch., Lockport, N.Y., High Sch. and St. Catherine's Coll. Institute. Settled in Man. 1879. Is editor and publisher of the Brandon Times and the Portage La Prairie Tribune and Review newspapers. Has been Clerk of Woodlands municipality; taught school for four years in Ontario and subsequently for over two years in Woodlands; then engaged in real estate business in

Portage La Prairie. Is Secy of the Portage town and county Liberal Conservative Asso., and Provl. Grand Master for Man. of the Orange Asso. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Brandon, Man.

SMART, JAMES ALLAN. (East Brandon.)

Of Scotch descent. Eldest s. of James Smart of Brockville, Ont., formerly an extensive manufacturer, now Sheriff of Leeds and Grenville. B. at Brockville, 6 June, 1858. Is a farmer, stock-raiser, general merchant and steamboat owner. Was Asst. and Chief Engineer of New Westminster Fire Dept. in 1862, and is now Postmaster of Soda Creek. First returned to Leg. ORR, JAMES. (New Westminster.)

Prior, Edward Gawler. (Victoria City.)

Second s. of the Rev. Henry Prior, late of Dallowgill, Yorkshire, Eng. B. there 21 May, 1853. Ed. at Leeds Grammar Sch. and afterwards at Wakefield in Mining Engineering. M. at Victoria, 30 Jan., 1878, Suzette, youngest dau. of the late John Work, Esq., of Hillside, Victoria. Is an Iron and Hardware Merchant. Was Mining Engineer and Surveyor for the Vancouver Coal Mining and Land Co. from 1873 to 1878. Was Govt. Inspector of Mines for two years. Elected a life mem. of the North of Eng. Institute of Mining and Civil Engineers in 1875. Is Major in the B.C. Brigade Garrison Artillery, V.M., and holds certificate of qualification from the Royal Sch. of Artillery. First returned to Leg. Assem. at last g.e. A Conservative.—Victoria, B.C.

Robson, Hon. John, J.P. (New Westminster Dist.)

S. of the late Mr. John Robson, of Sarnia, Ont., a native of Scot., who emigrated to Can., 1820, and settled in Lanark, Ont., by Euphemia Richardson. B. at Perth, Ont., 14 March, 1824. Ed. at the Grammar Sch. there. M., April, 1854, Susan, fourth dau. of Capt. John Longworth, of Goderich, Ont. Emigrated to B.C. early in 1859.

Established and edited the *British Columbian* newspaper. A Lieut. in the Home Guards, Rifle Vol., and a J.P. for B.C. Was Major of New Westminster in 1866. Was Govt. Paymaster of the Canadian Pacific Railway in B. C. from 1875 to 1879, when the position was abolished. Sat for New Westminster Dist. in L.C. of B.C. from 1866 to 1870, and for Namaimo from 1871 to 1875. Being a Legislative Councillor at the time of the Union the title of *Hon.* was confirmed to him for life. Became Provl. His Radical creed, on the other hand, embraces such principles as Annual Parliaments, the Nationalisation of Land, and Emancipation of Labour and of Trade. In such doctrines he recognizes the forces of a normal process of evolution which he calls Higher Naturism.—Comox, B.C.;

SINCLAIR, PETER. (Queens, 1st District.)

S. of the late Peter Sinclair, Esq., by Mary Crawford, both of Argyleshire, Scot. B. and ed. there. M., Feb. 1879, Margaret, dau. of A. McMurdo, of New Annan. A farmer. First returned to Ho. of Assem. 1867. Was apptd. a mem. of the Board of Education, 1868. Was a mem. of Ex. Co. from 1869 to 1871, when the Govt. resigned; and again in 1872, in the Haythorne Liberal Administration, when he acted as Govt. leader in the

Assem. and was a mem. of the Board of Works. On the admission of P.E.I. into the Dominion, returned to Commons for Queens, Sept. 1873; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1874, and defeated at g.e. 1878. Elected to Ho. of Assem. at g.e. 1882, and again at last g.e. A Liberal, and in favor of reciprocal trade with the U.S.—Summerfield, P.E.I.

Sullivan, Hon. William Wilfred, Q.C. (King's, 2nd Dist.)

M., at Charlottetown, 13 Aug., 1872, Alice Maud Mary, third dau. of John Fenton Newbery, Esq., (B.A., of Oxford Univ.,) formerly of London, Eng., and of Siena, Italy. Called to the Bar of P.E.I., Trinity Term, 1867. Created a Q.C. by the Govt. of P.E.I. June 1876, and by the Domin. Govt. 19 May, 1879. Was one of the counsel for the Povincial Govt., in the interest of the tenants, before the Land Commissioners' Court, under "The Land Purchase Act, 1875." Is a Surrogate in the Admiralty Court; Presdt. of the Board of Education, and Presdt. of the Board of Trustees of the P.E.I. Hospital for the Insane. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council from 22 April to June 1872, when he resigned. Be-appointed to the Ex. Council, with the office of Solicitor-General, on the formation of the Pope Administration, 18 April, 1873. Resigned his seat in the Ex. Council upon the resignation of the Conservative Govt., 4 Sept., 1876. Was unanimously elected leader of the Opposition at the meeting of the Assem., 14 March, 1877. On 1 March, 1879, moved, in the House, a resolution of non-confidence in the Government, which, after a long debate, was carried on 6 March, and the Administration resigned on the following day. Was immediately invited by the Lieut.-Gov. Sir Robert Hodgson, to form a new Government. Succeeded in forming an Administration, which was sworn in on 11 March, 1879. Sterry Hunt, Sir Lyon Playfair. Dr. Crum Brown, and Professors Dittmar and Fairley in Scotland. Was appointed Professor of Chemistry and Natural Sciences in Queen's Univ., Kingston, in 1863, and lectured there during five sessions, or to 1868, continuing the work of the Geological Survey in summer as usual. Was Representative Fellow in the Corporation of McGill University for six successive years, or from 1880 to 1886. Elected F.G.S. in 1862, and F.C.S. in 1866. Is one of the original Fellows of the Royal Society of Canada. Studied medicine and surgery in McGill University from 1869 to 1878, when he graduated as M.D., C.M., and the same year became a member of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Lower Canada. Elected an honorary member of the Medico-Chirurgical Society of Montreal in 1885, and of Ottawa in 1887. The honorary degree of LL.D. was conferred on him by Queen's University in 1883. Elected a member of the American Institute of Mining Engineers in 1884, and the same year received the degree of B.A.Sc. from McGill University. TABLE OF TITLES AS AUTHORIZED TO BE USED IN CANADA.

DOWNING STREET,

24th July, 1868.

My Lord,-

In consequence of the Confederation of the British Provinces, some revision of the former usage there, about titles, has become necessary, and I have the honor to inform you that Her Majesty has been pleased to approve of the adoption of the following regulations:—

- 1. The Governor General of Canada to be styled "His Excellency."
- 2. The Lieutenant Governor of the Provinces to be styled "His Honour."
- 3. The Privy Councillors of Canada to be styled "Honourable," and for life.
- 4. Senators of Canada are to be styled "Honourable," but only during office, and the title not to be continued afterwards.
- 5. Executive Councillors of the Provinces to be styled "Honourable," but only while in office, and the title not to be continued afterwards.
- 6. Legislative Councillors in the Provinces not in future to have that title; but gentlemen who were Legislative Councillors at the time of the Union (1st July, 1867) to retain their title of "Honourable" for life.
- 7. The President of the Legislative Council in the Provinces to be styled "Honourable" during office.
- 8. The Speaker of the House of Assembly in the Provinces to be styled "Honourable" during office.*

CANADIAN PEER.

The undermentioned Feudal Barony is the only Canadian Hereditary Title existing. The Patent of nobility signed by Louis XIV., granting this title to Charles le Moyne for distinguished services is remarkable as creating not only a Territorial Barony, but also conferring a title of honor upon himself and his descendants, whether male or female. The cession of Canada to England by the Treaty of Paris in 1763, made no change in the legal right to hold honors; since this period each successive head of the family has, by assumption of right, used the title; but it was not officially recognized by the British Govtrnment until Dec. 4, 1880.

Richard Bradford, first Rector of Chatham, same county. B. at St. Andrew's, 12 March, 1821. M., 1849, Mary, dau. of the late Very Rev. J. Bethune, D.D., Dean of Montreal. Ed. at St. Andrew's and at the Univ. of McGill Coll., Montreal. Called to the Bar, L.C., Oct. 1847. Apptd. Q.C. 1862, and a D. C. L. 1867. Is Dean of the Faculty of Law in Univ. of McGill Coll.; a dir. of the Merchants Bank of Canada; Lieut.-Col. of the 11th Batt. or "Argenteuil Rangers." raised by him during the "Trent" difficulty; Presdt. of the Fraser Institute, or Free Public Library of Montreal; author of The Insolvent Act of 1864, with notes, etc., (Que. 1864,) a measure which he introduced and carried through the Can. Parlt. Was for some years solicitor for the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. Was a member of the Ex. Council and Solicitor General L.C., from 24 May 1862, to 14 May 1863. Was elected for present seat in Can. Assem. at g. e. 1857, but not returned, and only seated after an arduous contest; continued to represent the Co, in that House until the Union. Returned to Commons at g. e. 1867, and re-elected at g. e. 1872 and 1874. Unseated Oct. 1874. Was a candidate at g. e. 1878, and was defeated, but re-elected Feb. 1880 on sitting mem., Dr. Christie, being unseated. Unseated on petition 1881, but re-elected by an increased majority. Re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1882. Was associated with Hon. Sir H. Langevin on the Letellier mission to England, in April, 1879. His legislation includes, in addition to the Insolvent Act, the Jury Law Consolidation Act for Lower Can.

Was for several years, Chairman of the Committee of the House of Chmmons on Banking and Commerce. Called to the Senate May 1887. Apptd. a mem. of the Queen's Privy Council without office, 13 May 1887. Is leader of the Govt. in the Senate. A Liberal-Conservative;—Sherbrooke Street; St. James Club, Montreal; "Boisbriant," St. Anne's, Que; Rideau Club.

FORTIN, Han. PIERRE, M.D. (Kennebec.)

S. of the late Dr. Fortin, of Laprairie, by Julie Duvernay. Descended from a family of Normandy, on father's side, and from a family of Brittany, France, on mother's side. B. at Verchères, P.Q., Dec. 1823. Received his classical education at Montreal Seminary, and graduated M.D. at McGill Coll., 1845. Unmarried. Served as a Surgeon at Quarantine, Grosse Isle, during 1847 (fever year) and 1848. Aided in 1849 in forming a special mounted constabulary force for quelling disturbances of the peace in Montreal and adjoining districts, a troop of which was placed under his command. In 1852 he was appointed Stipendiary Magistrate for the lower River and Gulf of St. Lawrence, and organized the service for the protection of the sea and river fisheries in those ports. Served from 1852 until the Union, when he resigned, having had under his command the armed steamer Doris, and the armed schooner La Canadienne, in which latter vessel he was wrecked in Nov. 1861. In 1859 he established on all the coasts and in the rivers of the Province of Quebec the system of licenses for the salmon fishing. In 1862, began a series of descriptions from nature of over eighty of the marine animals, fishes, mollusca, crustacea of the Lower River and Gulf of St. Lawrence, which were printed in some of his annual reports to the Govt. His reports describe the fishing coasts of the Prov. of Quebec, 1,200 miles in extent, and the different fisheries that are there carried on. In 1858 was instructed by the Govt. of Canada to visit officially the French Colonies of St. Pierre, Miquelon, and Longlake, to study the conditions under which the French fisheries and fish trade are carried on, both around St. Pierre and on the west, north-west and north coast of Newfoundland, commonly called the French Coasts. Reported to the Govt. on his mission and gave interesting

accounts of the French fisheries of St. Pierre and neighbouring coasts. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Commr. of Crown Lands for the Prov. of Quebec from Feb. 1873 until 7 Sept., 1874, when he resigned. Elected Speaker 4 Nov., 1875, but resigned in 1876, in consequence of his election being protested. While Speaker of the Leg. Assem, of Quebec he founded the Marine Library of P.Q. Was one of the founders of the Geographical Soc. of Quebec, and was its first Presdt. Was from 1867 to 1874 Chairman of the Special Committee of the Commons on Navigation and Fisheries. Sat for Gaspé in the Commons from g.e. 1867 until g.e. 1874, when he retired in order to confine himself to Leg. Assem., in which he sat from g.e. 1867 until the dissolution in 1881. Re-elected to the Commons at g.e. 1878, and again by acclamation at g.e. 1882. Called to the Senate, May 1887. A Conservative. "In favour of a system of nautical education with a view to perfecting the scientific instruction of our marines: also the completion of the improvements of the St. Lawrence water-course, comprehending the lakes, canals, river and Gulf of St. Lawrence, so as to make it the chief commercial artery of this continent, and firmly believes that improvements in the postal and telegraphic communications in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the sea-coasts of the Maritime Provinces are essential to completely attain that object."—Quebec; Gaspé Basin, P.Q.


