Limightic God and tholt mercifull Father wee doe not prefent our felues here before thy Maieftie, trufting in our owne merits or worthines, but in thy manifold mercies, which halt promifed to heare our prayers, and graunt our requefts, which wee fhall make to thee in the name of thy beloued Sonine lefus Chrift our Lord, who hath alfo commanded vs to affemble our felues together in his name, with full afluranice that hee will not onely bee amongeft vs , but alfo bee our mediator and aduocate towards thy Muieftie, that wee may obtaine all things which thall feerne expedient to thy bleffed will. for our necefsities. Therefore wee befeech thee moft mercifull fachier, to turne thy louing countenance towards vs, and impute not vnto vs our manifold finnes and offences, whereby wee iufto ly deferue thy wrath and fharp punifhment, but rather receine vs to thy mercy, for Iefus Chrifts fake, accepting his death and pafsion, as a iuft recompence for all our offences, in whom onely. thou art pleafed, and through whom thou canft not be offended with vs. And feeing that of thy great mercies wee haue quietly paffed this night: graunt ( $O$ heatienly father) that wee may befow this day wholy in thy feruice, fo that all our thoughts, words and deeds may redound to the glorie of thy name, and good enfample to all men, who feeing our good works, may glorifie thee our heauenly father.

And forafmuch as of thy mecre fauour and loue thou haft not onely created vs to thine owne fimilitude and likeneffe, but alfo haft chofen vs to be heires with thy deere fonne Iefus Chrift, of that immortall kingdome which thou preparedff for vs before the beginning of the world we befeech thee to encreafe our faith and knowledge, and to lighten our hearts with thy holy fpis rit, that wee may in the meane time litie in godly. conuerfation and integritic of life, knowing that Idolaters, Adulterers, cotietous mien, contentious perforis, Drunkards, Glutfons, and fuch like, fhall not inherite the kingdome of God.

And becaule thou haft commaunded vs to pray one for another, wee doe not onely make requeft O Lord for our felues and for them that thou haft already called to the true vnderftanding of thy heauenly will, but for all people and
nations of the world, who as they know by thy wonderfull works that thou art God ouer allf, fo they may bee inftructed by thy holy Spiric to belecue in thee their onely Sauiour and Redeemer. But forafmuch as they cannot beleeue except they heare, nor cannot heare, but by preaching, and none can preach except they be fent: therefore $O$ Lord raife vp faichtull diftributers of thy Mifteries, who fetting apart all worldly refpeets, may both in their life and doctrine one: ly feeke thy glory:Contrarily confound Sathan and Antichrift, with all hirelings, whom thou haft already caft off into a reprobate fence, that they may not by Seets, Schifmes, Herefies and Errours, difquiet thy little flock. And becaufe O Lord, wee be fallen into the latter dayes and dangerous times, wherein ignorance hath gotten the vpper hand, and Sathan by his Minifters reekes by all meanes to quench the light of thy Gofpel, we befeech thee to maintaine thy caufé againft thefe rauening Wolues, and frengthen all thy feruants whom they keepe in prifon and bondage. Let not thy long fuffering be an occafion eyther to encreafe their tiranny, or to difcourage thy children? neither yet let our finnes and wickedneffe bee an hinderance to thy mercie, but with fpeed $O$ Lord confider thefe great miferies. For thy people Ifraell many times by their finnes prouoked thine anger, and thou punifhedf them by thy iuft iudgement, yet though their finnes were neuer fo gricuous, if they once returned from their iniquitie, thou receiuedft them to mercy. Wee therefore moft wretched finners bewaile our manifold finnies, and earneftly repent vs of our former wickedneffe and vngodly behauiour towards thee : and whereas we cannot of our felues purchafe thy pardon, yet we humbly befeech thee for Iefus Chrifts rake, to hew thy mercies ypon vs, and receiue vs againe to thy fauour. Grant vs deere Father thefe our requefts, and all other things neceflarie for vs and thy holy Church, according to thy promife in lefus Chrift our Lord, in whofe name we befeech thee as hee hath taught vs, faying:

For the flefh cuermore rebelleth againft the fpirit, whereby we continually tranfgreffe thy holy precepts and commandements, and fo purchafe to our fellues through thy iuft indgement, death and damnatio on, Notwithftanding ( O heauenly father) for. afmuch as wee are difpleafed with our felues for the finnes that we haue committed againft thee; and doe vrifainedly repent vs of the fame, wee moft humbly befeech thee for Iefus Chrifts fake to fhew thy mercy vpon vs, to forgive vs all our finnes, and increafe thy holy firit in vs, that we acknowledging from the bottom of our hearts our owne vnrighteoufnes, may from henceforth not onely mortifie our finfull lufts and affections, but alfo bring forth fuch fruits as may bee agreeable to thy mof bleffed will, not for the worthineffe heereof, but for the merits of thy deerely beloued Sonne Iefus Chrift our onely Sauiour, whom thou haft already given an oblation and offering for our finnies, and for whofe fake we are certaincly perfwaded that thou wills deny us nothing, that we fhall afke in his name, according to thy will, for thy fpirit doth affure our confciences that thou art our mercifull $\mathrm{Fa}_{\text {a- }}$ ther, and fo loueft vs thy children chrough him $_{s}$ that nothing is able to remoue thy heauenly grace and fauour from vs. To thee therefore O Father, with thy Sonne, and the holy Ghoft, be all honour and glory world without end. Amen.

n- nifold temptations, made by S. Auguftine.

THere wanted a Tempter, and thou waft the caufe that hee was wanting, there wanted time and place, and thou waft the caure that they wanted. The Tempter was prefent, and there wanted neither place nor time: but thou heldeft me back that 1 fhould not confent. The Temp:
ter came full of darkeneffe as hee is : and thou diddeft hiarden me that I might difpife him. The Tempter came armed and that ftronglie : but to the entent he fhould not ouercome me, thou didff reftraine him and ftrengthen mec. The Tempter came transformed into an Angell of light, and to the entent hee fhould not deceive me, thou didft rebuke him : and to the intent I fhould know him, thou didf lighten mee. For hee is the great red Dragon, the old Serpent, called the Diuell and Sathan, which hath feauen heads and ten hornes, whom thou haft created to take his pleafure in this huge and broad fea, wherein there creepe liuing wights innumerable, and beafts great and fmall, that is to fay, diuers forts of Fiends, which practife nothing elfe day or night, but to goe about leeking whom hee may deioure, except thou refcue him 0 Lord Iefus, For it is that old Dragon, which draweth downe the third part of the Starres of heayen with his taile and cafteth them to the ground, which with his venim poyfoneth the waters of the earth, that as many men as drink of them may dye, which trampleth vpon Gold, at ifit were mire, and is of opinion that Iorden fhall runne into his mouth, and which is made of fuch a mould that hee feareth no man. And who fhall faue vs from his chaps O Lord Iefus, who fhall pluck vs out of his mouth fauing thou O Lord, who haft broken the head of this great Dragon ? Helpe vs Lord,fpread out thy wings ouervs O Lord, that wee may flee vnder them from the face of this great Dragon that purfueth vs: and fence thou vs from his hornes, with thy fhield. For this is his continually endeuour, this is his onely defire to deuour the foules which thou haft created. And yet fuch is our great madnes O Lord, in that whereas wee fee the Dragon continually in a readineffe to deuoure vs with open mouth, wee neuertheleffe doe fleepe and reioyce in our owne Iouthfulneffe, as though wee were out of his danger, who defireth nothing elfe but to deftroy vs. Our mifchieuous enimie to the entent to kill vs, watcheth continually and neuer fleepech, and yet will not wee awake from fleepe to faue our foules. Behold he hath pitched infinite fnares before our feete, and filled all our waies with fundry traps to catch our foules And who can fcape O Lord lefus, fo many and great dangers ? Hee hath laid friares for vs in our riches, in our pouer, tie, in our meate, in our drinck, in our pleafires, in our fleepe, and in our waking: He hath finares for vs in our words, and our works, and in all

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our life. But thou O Lord, deliuer vs from the net of the foulers and from hard words, that. wiee may gitie praife to thee faying: Bleffed bee the Lord, who hath not giuen vs vp to be a pray for their teeth: our foule is deliuered as a fparrow out of the fowlers net, the net is broken and wee efcaped.
The confeffion of a Cbriftian Faitb.

IBelecue and confeffe my Lord God eternall, infinite, vnmeafurable, incomprehenfible and inuifible, one in fubftance and three in perfon, Father, Sonne and holy Ghoft, who by his AImightie power and wifedome, hath not onely of nothing created heauien and earth, and all things therein contained, and man after his owne image, that hee might in him bee glorifyed, butalfo by his fatherly prouidence gouerneth, maintaineth, and preferueth the fame according to the purpofe of his will.

## Ibeleeue alfo \& confeffe Iefus Chrift the öne-

 ly Sauiour and Mefsias, who beeing equall with God, made him felfe ofno reputation, but tooke on hin the Chape of a feruant, and became man in'all things, like vnto vs, except finne, to affure vs of mercy and forgiueneffe. For when through our father Adams tranfgrefsion, we were become children of perdition, there was no meanes to bring vs from the yoke of fintic and damnation, but onely Iefus Ehrift our Lord, who giuing vs that by grace, which was his by nature, made vs through faith the children of God, who when. the fulneffe of time was come, was conceined by the power of the holy Ghoft, borne of the Virgin (Mary (according to the flelh) and preached in earth the Gofpell of faluation, ill at length by tyranny of the Priefts, hee was guiltleffe condemined vider Pontious Pilate, then Prefident of Iurie, and moft flanderoully hanged on the Crofle betweene two theeries as a notorious trefpaffer, where taking vpon him the punifhment of our finnes, lie deliuered vs from the curffe of the law.And forafriuuch as he being onely God could not feele death, neither being onely man could ouercome death, hee ioyned both together, and fuffered his humanitie to be punifhed with moft cruell death, feeling in himfelfe the anger and feuere iudgement of God, euen as it had beene in extreame torments of hell, and therefore cried with a loud voice: ©My God, Ny God, why baft thou forfaken mee? Thus of his mercy with. out compulfion, hee offered ip himfelfe as the oncly facrifice to purge the finnes of all, the world, fo that all other facrifices for finne are blafphemous and derogate from the fufficiency thereof.
Which death albeit it did fufficiently reconcile vs to God, yet the Scriptures commonly do attribute our regeneration to his refurrection. For as by rifing againe from the graue the third
day he conquered death, euen fo the victorie of our fath ftandech in his refurrection, and therefore without that one wee cannot feele the benefits of the other. For as by his death finne was taken away, fo our righteoufneffe was reftored by his refurrection. And becaufe he would accomplifh all thing, and take poffersion for vs ins his kingdome, hice afcended into heauen to enlarge the fame king dome by the abundant power of his Spirit, by whom we are moft affured of his continuall intercefsion towards God the $F_{2}$ ther for vs. And although hee bee in heauen as touching his corporall prefence, where the father hath now fet him at his righe hand committing vnto him the adminiffration of all things; as well in heaven aboue, as in the earth beneath. yet is hee prefent with vs his members euen to the end of the world, in preferuing and gouerning vs with his effectuall power and grace, who when all things are fulfiled which God hath fpoken by the mouth of all his Prophets fince the world begany will come in the fame vifible forme in the which hee atcended, with an vnfpeakable maieftie, power, and company to fe perate the lambs from the Goats, the eleet from the reprobate. So that none whether he bealiue then, or dead before thall efcape his iudgement. 11:Moreoucr, 1 beleeue and confeffe the holy Gholt, God equall with the father, and the Son, who regeneraterh and fanctifieth vs, ruleth and guidethivs wnto all truth, perfwading moft affuredly in our confciences that wee bee the children of God, brethren to Iefus Chrift, and feld low heires with him of life cuerlafting: yet not:withftanding it is not fufficient to beleene that God is omnipotent, and inercifull, that Chrnf hath made fatisfaction, or that the holy Ghoft hath his power aid effeet, except wee doe apply the fame benefits to vs which are Gods elect. Tbelecue therfore \& confeffe one holy Church, which as members of yefus Chrift the onely head thereof conent in faith, hope and charitie, wfing the gifts of God, whether they be tempo. rallor firituall, to the profit and furtherance of the farie, which Church is not feene to mans eye, but onely kniowne to God, who of the loft fonnes of Adam, hath ordained fome as veffels of wrath to damnation, and hath chofen others as veffels of his mercy to bee faued. The which in due time hee calleth to integritic of life, and godly conuerfation to make them a glonious Church in himfelfe. But that Church which is vifible and feene to the eye, hath three tokens and marks, wherby it may be knowne. Firft the word of God contained in the old and new Teftament, which as it is aboue the authoritie of the fame Church, and onely fufficient to infruct vs of all things concerning faluation, fo is it left for all degrees of men; to read and vnderftand: For without this word, neither Chuich counfel or decree can eftablifh any point couch. ing faluation.

## Prayers,

The fecond is the holy Sacraments, to wit, of Baptifme, and the Lords fupper, which Sacraments Chrift hath. left vnto vs as holy fignes anid feales of his promifes. For as by Baptitme once fecelled, is fignified that wee (as well In: fants; äs others of age and difcreation) being ftrangers trom God by originall finne, are receiued intơ his family and congregation, with full affurance, that although this roote of finne lye hid in vs, yet to the clect it thall not bee imputed: fo the fupper declareth, that Godas a moft prouident father, doth not onely feede our bodies, but alfo fpiritually nourifheth our foules with the graces and bencfites of Iefus Chrift which the for ripture calleth eating of his flefh, and drinking of his blood, neither mult wee in the adminititration of thefe Sacraments follow mans fantafie; but as Chrift himfelfe hath ordayned, 10 mult they bee minittred, and by fuch as by ordinary vocation are therevnto called. Therefore whofocuer referueth and wormippeth thefe facraments; or contrariwife contemneth them in time and place, procureth himfelfe damnation.
The third marke of this Church is Ecclefiafticall difcipline, which ftandeth in admonition and correction of faults. The finall end whereof is excommunication by the confent of the church determined, if the offender bee obftinate. And befides this Ecclefiaftiall difcipline, 1 acknowledge to belong to this Church a politike magiftrate, who miniftreth to euery man iuftice, defending the good and punifhing the evill. To whom wee mult render honor and obedience in all things which are not contrary to the word of God. And as Mofes, Ezichias, Iofias, and other good rules purged the Church of God from Superftition and Idolatrie, fo the defence of

Chrifts Church appertaineth to Chriftian Magiftrates againft all Idolaters and heretikes, as Papifts, A nabaptifts, with fuch like limmes of Antichrift, to root out all doatrine of Diuels, and men : as the Maffe,Purgatorie, Limbus Patrum, Prayers to Saints, and for the dead, Free Will, diftinction of meats, apparell and dayes, vowes of fingle life, prefence at Idoll fermons, mans merits, with fuch like, which draw vs from the focietie of Chrifts Church whercin ftandeth onely remifsion of fins, purchafed by Chrifts bloud to all them that beleeue, whether they be Iewes or Gentiles, and lead vs to a vaine confidence in creatures, and truft in our owne imaginations. The punifhment whereof althongh God oftentimes deferreth in this life, yet after the generall refurrection when our foules and bodies fhall rife againe to immortalitie, they thall bee damned to vnquenchable fire, and then we which haueforfaken all mens wifedome to cleaue vnito Chrift, Thall heare the ioyfull voyce: Come yee blefed of $m y$ Father inherite the King dome prepared for yoes from the begiming of the zoorld: and fo thall goe triumphing with him in body and foule to remaine euerlaftingly in glory, where we fhall fee God face to face, and fhall no more neede to inftruct one another, wee fhall all know him from the higheft to the loweft. To whom with -...the Sonne and the holy Ghoft bee
