## LIQUOR CONTROL BILL IN HOUSE TO-DAY

## B.C. Teachers Now Best Qualified In Canada; School Population Grows Victims Include Seven Policemen and Soldiers

Each Pupil Costs People of Province \$70 a Year to Educate; High School Attendance Increases Rapidly; Women Still Predominate In Number of Instructors

It cost about \$70 to educate each pupil in the public schools of British Columbia last year. Of the total cost of education in the Province the Government contributed approximately forty

The teachers of British Columbia have probably the high-est educational standing of teachers in any Province of Canada, as nearly all have had professional training. Nearly three-quarters of the teachers in the Province are women.

Attendance in the public schools increased more than nine per cent, but attendance at the high schools increased nearly

Teachers and Pupils Increase

Teachers and Pupils Increase

The report is largely statistical and shows that the school population and number of teachers employed are increasing and that the school expenditure is consequently growing rapidly.

Number of teachers employed during the year was 2557, an increase of 225 over the preceding year. Of these 22 per cent. were males and 78 per cent. females, 16 per cent. of these had academic certificates (college graduates) 20 per cent had First Class Certificates (non year's university work).

This probably constitutes the highest educational standing of teachers in any Province of Canada. Practically all the teachers have had professional training.

Government Pays Large Share These teachers were employed as follows:

City graded schools, 1032; rural municipal schools 73.

The number of pupils in attendance at the Public Schools was 79,243, an increase of 7,237 over the previous year.

The grand total cost of education in the Province was \$5,470,000 of which the Provincial Government contributed \$2,156,000 or approximately 40 per cent. Of this sum the Government contributed to the municipalities and cities \$936,000 if cost the Provincial Government \$27,20 to educate each pupil while the total cost was about \$70 per pupil.

## AMERICAN ARMY

That Is Size Contemplated by Washington Legislators

Washington, Feb. 23.—The Army Appropriation Bill as amended by a Senate military sub-committee to provide for an average regular army of 175,000 men next year, was approved to-day by the full committee, and ordered reported to the Senate. The measures carries \$362,314,800, an increase of more than \$31,000,000 over the House total. Increases include \$4,765,000 for the National Guard, \$3,800,000 for the air service and \$1,500,000 for vocational training.

## Ontario Asylum Building Burned But No Deaths

Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 23.—The Orchard House wing of the Ontario Hospital for the Insane, one of the principal buildings on the grounds, was swept by fire this morning and at noon the asylum fire brigade and the city firemen were still battling fiercely with the flames. It is believed there was no loss of life.

Five hundred patients were confined in the building, a four story brick structure. The origin of the fire is a mystery.

The entire staff of the institution was pressed into service to rescue the patients, who were marched into the main building and accommodated there temporarily.

At 1.30 p.m. the fire was under control with the one building practically gutted.

Several patients who escaped from the asylum in the excitement of rescue were recapture.

Committee Will Aid Indigent Britishers There

New York, Feb. 23.—(Canadian Press).—As a result of a meeting called by Capt. Gloster Armstrong. British Consul-General in this city, a committee has been formed for the relief of indigent British subjects in New York, in co-operation with St. George's Society, St. Andrew's Society and St. David's Society.

That there is urgent need for the relief of some British subjects here-ex-service men, soldiers, sailors and civilians—has been brought home during the past few months, and the outlook is that in the near future this will be very greatly increased. While the societies above mentioned will continue, as they have done for years, to carry on their charitable work, it is felt that the situation demands the aid of a united committee to enlarge and make still more effective the splendid work they have been doing. Arrangements have been made for the immediate relief of pressing necessities for food and lodging and for the success with the Buitsh Great the immediate relief of pressing nec-cessities for food and lodging and for urgent cases with the Egitish Great War Veterans, who will act as the almonor of the committee through their societies represented on the committee will provide the necessary means. There is an average of twenty-five applicants a day for relief, and the committee is able to get em-ployment, so far, for a verage of but four or five men a week.

New York, Feb. 23 .- (Canadian Press)—A hundred or more Canadian children picked from the class leaders in schools in every part of the Dominion each year will have an opportunity of spending a vacation in the United States if a project which has been launched by the Sulgrave Institute here goes through.

More Speeches in Debate on Address at Ottawa

Ottawa, Feb. 23.—Dr. J. E. Fontaine, Liberal member for Hull, Quebec, speaking in the Commons yesterday afternoon, said Mr. Meighen had changed the name of the old Unionist Party merely to hide its misdeeds. The present Government

Conservative-Unionist member for Centre Vancouver, whose name has frequently been mentioned in recent months as that of a likely appointee to the Cabinet, said the Government was faced with two oppositions united on the question raised in the amendment to the Address. As far as the Government followers could make out, said Mr. Stevens, the attitude of the agrarian party members was that they did not want an election but proposed to vote for the amendment because they had supported a no-confidence motion last year and felt that they should do so again. The party headed by Mr. Crerar thought there was no danger of the Government being defeated and wanted to be in the happy position of placing itself on record as requesting a general election.

Mr. Stevens declared that the Leader of the Liberal Opposition had revealed his real object in putting the amendment in an address some time before the House met. He had stated in that address that there were only two courses which could be followed during the present session. Either the Meighen administration would carry on, or it would be defeated on a no-confidence motion, in which case it would become the duty of the Governor-General to call upon Mr. King to form a new Government. There was no word of an election in this, said Mr. Stevens. All that the Leader of the Opposition desired was accession to power.

## C.N.R. Departments Will Be Housed in Palatial Offices

Fitting Out of New Transportation Quarters on Government Street to Cost \$16,000; All Work Being TO REDUCE SERVICE Done Locally: Staffs to Take Possession of New Building Early In March.

When the staffs of the Canadian National Railways take pos-session of the new offices at 911 Government Street early in March the various departments embraced in the Victoria branch of the Government transportation organization will be housed in quarters fovernment transportation organization will be noused in quarters that will compare with the finest equipped offices on the entire system. The building is being remodeled at an estimated cost of \$16,000 and when the contractors are through it will be the most elaborately fitted transportation office on Vancouver Island.

Following out its customary policy the Canadian National Railways has placed the entire work with local contracting firms.







to the Victoria Police Commission, to-day issued a vigorous manifesto in which he flatly denied that he had Mayoralty ambitions; declared that he stood for "Chinatown for the Chinese;" asserted that gambling in Chinatown had been stopped suddenly and temporarily simply to destroy his campaign material; challenged Alexander Peden, candidate for the Commission, to answer pointed questions he had asked him at his famous campaign meeting some weeks ago; promised that he would stop gambling among white men in Chinatown or see that some people "lost their official heads;" and affirmed that he would take measures to curb the drug traffic which, he says, is rife here.

Mr. North's statement follows:

Denies Mayoralty Talk.

"The interview obtained from me by the morning paper was a telephonic conversation and that portion of it referring to my mayoralty aspirations was made in a jocular way and not intended for publication. It came at the end of the questions asked me by the reporter and he evidently misinterpreted my statements as being made serlously. My only ambition is to see a more efficient administration of the police force, especially as regards Chinatown. My slogan in this contest is "Chinatown for the Chinese." By that I do not mean to build an imaginary Chinese Wall around the district, but, agreeing with Mr. Linklater that total prohibition of gambling in Chinatown is almost impossible, I still maintain that what gambling may exist can and will (should I be elected) be confined wholly to Chinese. I know of places in Chinatown that boast of a long counter for the marking of lottery tickets. Anvone who has been there can tell you that you will seldom see a Chinaman marking the tickets. They would not have room to get to the counters on account of the white men there. That is what I wish to stop. Marking lottery tickets is only the forerunner of the drug habit. Keep the whites away from Chinatown and the danger of contamination is stopped.



liquor except in cases where high-grade, expensive brands are desired, and the importer cares little about A period of thirty days after the enforcement of the new Act will be allowed for the marking of stocks of liquor by the Government officials. After that time has expired any liquor found not bearing the official stamp will be subject to confisca-

Importers' Sales Hit. A further prohibitive restriction is placed upon importation through the imposition of a \$3,000 license for each warehouse belonging to an importing company. Which places liquor importers rather "up against it."

Their sales to Provincial custom

Their sales to Provincial customers must necessarily be reduced through the \$2.50 per quart tax, although they may still import, hold in their warehouses and export to customers outside the Province who are permitted by their Provincial statutes to purchase.

Beer Clause Absent.

The original draft bill, as introduced by the Attorney-General today, is necessarily marked by omissions. The failure of Premier Oliver to elicit a free expression of opinion from members of the House when he introduced his famous resolution last week has been responwhen he introduced his famous reso-lution last week has been respon-sible for no "beer clause" being in-cluded. Therefore, no reference is made in the act as to the sale of beer by licensed hotels. An intima-tion of the privileges to be granted hotels is contained, though, in the clause relating to "drinking in pub-lic places."

Can Drink in Hotels

The consumption of liquor in any public place is forbidden, and a public place is interpreted to mean "any place, building, passenger conveyance to which the public resort or to which the public are permitted to have access." Hotel rooms are not included, leaving the inference that it will be legal to consume liquor in hotel rooms.

Visitors' Permits.

lumbia and whether remaining for a day or a month, secure for five dollars a thirty-day permit entiting them to purchase spirituous or mail liquors at a Government store and consume the same in their registered hotel rooms. The powers granted them under the Act include the establishment and regulation of stores for the sale of liquor;—the prescribing of the duties of office, cierks and servants of the Board; the purchase of liquor and its distribution to Government stores; the prescribing of the hours during which Government stores shall remain open; the distribution of price lists; the payment of carrying charges on liquor shipped by freight or express; and a multitude of duties pertaining to the examination of

How Purchases Are Made.

According to the Act, all liquor purchased under permit from a Government liquor store must be in a sealed package which may not be opened on the premises. In buying, the purchaser must write out his order and sign it, stating on the order his permit number and the nature and quantity of the liquor purchased. Permits must be produced for inspection when

provided for. There shall be not transfer of permits, and in the case of non-residents it is necessary for the applicant to have a recommendation from a permit-holder, who is permanently resident in the Province.

No person may hold two permits of different classes at one time, and no permit shall be issued to any corporation, association, society, or partnership. Annual permits expire December 31 of each year.

The act provides that permits may be temporarily or permanently cancelled by the Board or by any justice before whom a permit-holder is convicted of a violation of the act. When a permit is suspended the holder thereof will have it returned to him upon the expiration of the term of suspension, and where a permit has been cancelled notification will be sent all vendors, so that the original holder may not procure liquor any place in the Province, according to law.

Limited sale of liquor by druggists is permitted, but only in cases where liquor is prescribed by physicians for medicinal purposes. Even then the druggist must sell the liquor in the original sealed package as obtained from the Government store and at the price marked thereupon. Special provision is also made for the use in practice of liquor by dentists, veterinaries and heads of institutions caring for the afflicted.

Provides For Interdicts.

Interdiction proceedings, leading to the cancellation of a permit, are provided for in cases where it is proven that a permit-holder by excessive drinking of liquor, misspends, wastes or lessens his estate, or injures his bealth, or endangers or interrupts the peace and happiness of his family. An order of interdiction may be revoked where it is proven that in justice to the original holder of the cancelled permit and without harm to his family he may have his rights under the Act restored.

Severe penalties are provided for infractions of the Act. A first offence with regard to the illegal sale of liquor will carry a six months term of imprisonment, with hard labor. A second offence may mean from twelve to twenty-one months imprisonment, with hard labor. No Drinking in Drug Stores.

It is against the law to consume liquor in a drug-store, or upon the premises of a brewery, store or warehouse. It is also unlawful to have liquor in one's possession unless it is contained in a vessel which carried the seal of the Government.

Severe on Drunks.

Drunkenness is under the ban, the Act providing that no intoxicated person shall remain or be permitted to remain in a public place, and no wendor shall sell any liquor to any person apparently under the influence of liquor.

No Drinks For Young Persons.

The only chance for the youth of the land to secure a "drink" is for those under twenty-one years of age to receive it at the hands of parents or guardian or physician in a private dwelling place or medical institution. "Siwashing" will still be in force, since no permit shall be issued to any person to whom the sale of intoxicants is prohibited under the provisions of the "Indian Act" of the Dominion.




#### BUSINESS TURNOVER TAX IS SUGGESTED


