CONDITIONS OF SALE.

1. The highest Bidder to be the Buyer, and if any dispute arise between two or more Bidders, the Lot so in dispute shall be immediately put up again and re-sold.

INTRODUCTION.

Although, strictly speaking, this is a catalogue of a *medley* of pamphlets and books, yet it is far from being a mass of literary matter collected without method or design. It discloses three distinctly marked channels through which the streams of the collection have flowed, and the proportion of miscellaneous to special titles is so small that this might, without impropriety, be called a catalogue of almanacks, and books relating to music and American history.

We hazard nothing in saying that in the department of almanacks the collection, as compared with any heretofore offered for sale, is unique in extent, variety, and value. Witness the rare examples of "Poor Richard," "Titan Leeds," "Isaiah Thomas," etc., etc.

There are singing-books used in New England long before the Revolution, and, although belonging to a neglected class of books, these unpretending mementoes of the past are full of interest, not only to the antiquarian, but to all who remember and love that

" Land of the forest and the rock,
Of dark blue lake and mighty river "

Of books, pamphlets, and newspapers relating to early American history, the number is considerable, with several that are rare.

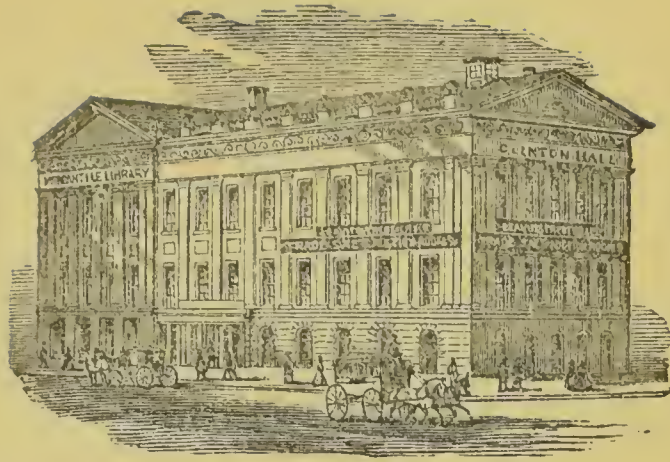
There are besides the classes enumerated many valuable books of a miscellaneous character; prominent among these is an early black-letter-illuminated folio bearing the date 1477. A copy of Boydell's Thames, in russia leather, is worthy of notice, a similar one in the Roxburg sale having brought £17.

The catalogue itself is a poor one, and that it is not much worse is due to the good offices of my friend Mr. Wright, who was kind enough to rescue a part of the manuscript from the wretched condition in which he found it, and, besides, himself catalogue that part of the collection where the descriptions require no apology.

Notwithstanding all drawbacks, the public will see the merit of this curious collection; and that the industry of the collector may be suitably rewarded is the sincere wish of his friend,
