from the reply:

[Proposed to him.]

1. To obtain subscribers to the  
Anti-Sl. Standard, and other A. S. news-

Publication Fund.

2. To circulate the Petitions issued  
by the Society.

3. As opportunity might offer, while  
attending to the above, give an occasional  
lecture. "

Offered 50 per cent. <sup>commission</sup> on all receipts

from new subscribers obtained to  
Standard, for ~~the~~ year, or any  
part of it. \$2. per annum being  
the price, \$1. to be retained,

For Liberator, offered <sup>Seventy Five</sup> ~~Twenty~~ cts.  
for every new subscriber, paid in  
advance one year. ( \$2.50 per annum )

"The Board would wish you to  
make lecturing, for the present, entirely  
secondary to the other two objects. x x x  
One lecture a week x x x would be  
quite as much as you would probably  
feel inclined for, after closely following  
up the other business. "

"We hope your communications would  
afford you a moderate remuneration

for your services. But if otherwise,  
we should feel bound to save you  
from loss, and afford you some  
little compensation, such as our  
treasury allows."
