4. The main budget for the fiscal year 1946 shall be submitted to this Headquarters for approval not later than 15 December 1945. Additional Budgets shall be submitted to this Headquarters for approval each time as they may arise. No expenditure may be effected subsequent to the fiscal year, 1945, unless the budget covering such expenditure has been approved by this Headquarters.

5. Prior to the issuance of this memorandum, the Department of the Imperial Household informally furnished to this Headquarters statements of the property holdings of the Imperial Household. You will promptly examine the statements furnished and with fifteen days you will certify to the accuracy of such statements. If such statements are certified to be incomplete or inaccurate in any respect, you will furnish within such period such corrections or additions as are required.

6. You will report promptly to this Headquarters the action taken to comply with these requirements.

7. An acknowledgment of the receipt of this memorandum is directed.

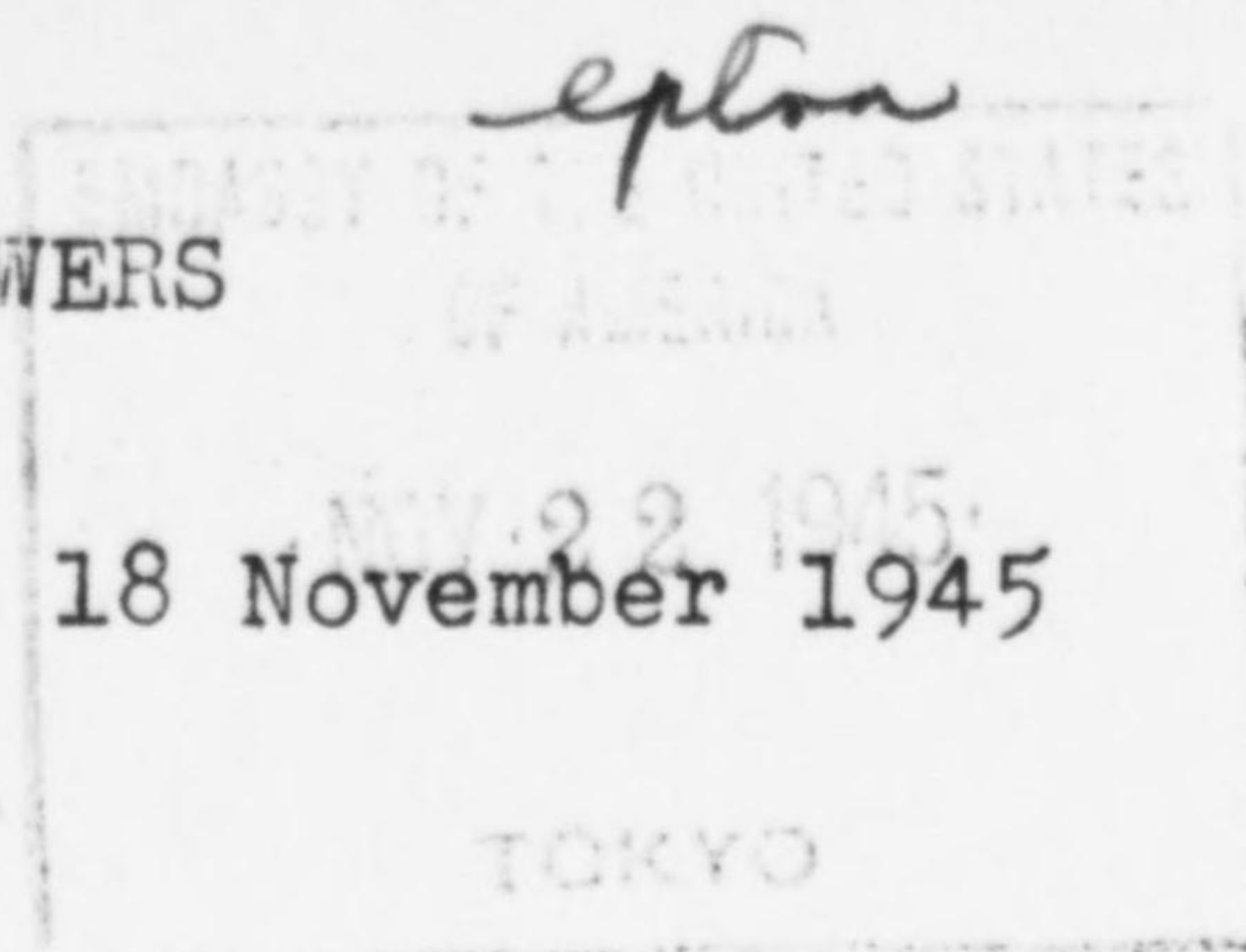

SUBJECT : Official Relations Between Japanese Government and
Representatives of Neutral Nations (C.L.O.498(1)).

1. Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of 8 November 1945, transmitting a Pro Memoria on the above subject.

2. The memoranda of this headquarters of 25 October 1945 and 4 November 1945, directed the Japanese Government to discontinue foreign relations both in Japan and abroad as inconsistent with the present military occupation of Japan and the supreme authority of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. Consent on the part of neutral governments is, therefore, not required or involved.

3. It is understood that Switzerland and Sweden will continue, as desired by the Japanese Government, routine functions in the protection of Japanese nationals in neutral countries. For this reason and for the reasons referred to in the preceding paragraph, the request for the authorization of Japanese liaison officers to supervise these functions is not approved.

4. As regards the maintenance of neutral liaison officers in Japan, the Supreme Commander is taking steps to inform the neutral governments concerned that they may appoint diplomatic agents or representatives of that character to maintain contact with the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

5. You will report immediately the steps taken in compliance with the memorandum of 25 October 1945.

SUBJECT : Location of Remains of Allied Personnel

1. Remains of many Allied personnel have been cremated or buried within Japan during the war; Allied or U.S. Army personnel recovery parties have been unable to recover a large number of such remains. It is understood that in many cases information concerning the location of remains is not available in records of the Imperial Japanese Government, but is known to police officials or local individuals.

2. The Imperial Japanese Government is directed to take such steps as is necessary to furnish this Headquarters complete information regarding the location of the remains of such deceased Allied Personnel throughout Japan. Reports will be submitted prior to 15 December 1945 and will include the following information:

- a. Name, rank, serial number of deceased
 - b. Date, place and cause of death
 - c. Exact present location of remains
 - d. Names and addresses of persons cognizant of the location of such remains
 - e. Any other pertinent data.

SUBJECT: : Organization and Operation of Reception Centers for Processing Repatriates.

1. The plan for the organization and operation of reception centers for processing repatriates contained in your C.L.O. No 476 (5), dated 6 November 1945, has been carefully studied and appears to be inadequate in the following respects.

a. There is no mention of a central agency in the Welfare Ministry which should receive the directives of SCAP and the shipping schedules of SCAJAP, issue instructions to implement those directives to other ministries and to the reception centers, and coordinate the transportation and supply requirements from each center.

b. The use of the Governor of the Prefecture as Director of the Reception Centers located within the prefectures and his administrative organization to be established at each center which will actively organize and operate them and make known the requirements of each center to higher authority. This is necessary to efficient operation of the centers.

c. There is no mention of the liaison system to be employed by the Welfare Ministry in dealing with the military authorities at Headquarters of the Sixth and Eighth US Armies and with those at the port near each reception center. In order to avoid confusion it is believed such liaison is an absolute necessity.

2. In view of the above, the following will be incorporated in the plan:

a. The agency described in paragraph 1a above will be organized to perform functions indicated.

b. There will be a resident director at each reception center responsible to the Prefecture Governor for its operation. He will be subject to the direction of the Welfare Minister and will be subject to

the supervision of the local US military commander maintaining liaison with him. He will be provided with an organization for the performance of all repatriation functions at his reception center to include the operation of housing for repatriates being processed. His office and organization will be located at the center.

c. A representative of the Ministry of Welfare will be established at the headquarters of the Sixth US Army and of the Eighth US Army. He will be responsible to the army commander for all information on repatriation matters concerning the army area. He will be authorized by the Welfare Ministry to issue instructions in the name of the Welfare Minister when so directed by a representative of the army commander. The Welfare Minister and the directors of the reception centers will keep him informed of all communications sent from one to the other.

3. The revised plan prepared in accordance with the above will be placed in effect immediately. A copy of the plan will be furnished to this headquarters.

4. Because of conditions which have arisen since 15 October it has been necessary to change the location and capacity requirements of some of the reception centers. These changes are being furnished the Imperial Japanese Government by separate memorandum.

SUBJECT : Control of Radio Communications.

1. Certain radio circuit and broadcasting stations now are being operated by the Japanese Government or by Japanese private agencies.

2. No additions to any radio circuits or to the number of broadcasting stations will be made, and no changes in points of communication, in location of transmitting stations or associated central offices, or in call signs, frequencies, power output methods of communication, or in ownership of transmitting or receiving facilities will be made without registering such changes with the Civil Communications Section of this Headquarters, through the Japanese Imperial Government, at least ten (10) days in advance of the proposed date of institution of the additional operation or change. The document of registration shall be in English on 8" by 10½" paper typed or printed on one side only and authenticated by a competent official of the Japanese Imperial Government. It shall contain full details of the projected operation, and explanation of the need or reason for the change or additional service, and a bill of major materials if new construction is contemplated. The ten (10) day period of notice shall not commence to run until the document of registration has been delivered to this Headquarters and receipted for by an Officer signing for the Chief, Civil Communications Section. In the absence of disapproval by this Headquarters, the proposed addition or change may be instituted at the end of the ten (10) day period. However, the filing of the document of registration and the expiration of the ten (10) day period of notice without disapproval this Headquarters, will not be construed as approval by the Supreme Commander of the change or addition, and will not prejudice his right to

1. Reference is made to letter this Headquarters dated 25 September 1945 directing the monthly delivery to Fusan, Korea, of 70,000 to 75,000 tons of coal for use in operating the Korean Railways. Further reference is made to letter, Central Liaison Office, Tokyo, dated 10 November 1945, file CLO No. 524 (2-3), subject: "Weekly report on the Movement of Colliers for Fusan", setting forth the inability of Fusan to discharge more than 500 tons of coal daily because of labor conditions at that port.

2. Recent advice from United States Military authorities in Korea states that the labor situation and lack of equipment hampering the unloading of coal at Fusan have been remedied and that port is in a position to handle the full monthly quota.

3. You are directed to load and dispatch vessels at a rate necessary to insure the above quantities but unless further advised it will not be necessary that the undelivered backlog existing on 1 November 1945 be shipped.

THROUGH : Central Liaison Office, Tokyo.

SUBJECT : Elimination of Newspaper and Publishers' Associations Control over Distribution of Paper.

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1. The Japanese Government will assume the responsibility of distributing newsprint and foreign-type papers to publishers as of 1 November 1945 or as soon thereafter as practicable.

2. The Japan Newspaper League (Nippon Shimbun Renmei) and Japan Publishers' Association (Nippon Shuppon Koykai) now controlling the distribution of newsprint and foreign-type papers will no longer perform this function.

3. The Japanese government will create a paper rationing organization consisting of two sections, one section to be responsible for distributing foreign paper for books and magazines, the other section to be responsible for distributing newsprint. Each section will be composed of (a) government officials (b) representatives of large and small publishers (c) at least three well-known disinterested individuals.

4. The Japanese Government will submit to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Forces within ten days after receipt of this directive the following information:

a. A statement of the principles and policies which will govern paper distribution.


b. The names of the individuals making up the rationing organization and whom they represent.

5. The Japanese Government will submit to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at the end of each month a complete and detailed report of the paper distribution activities during that month. The report will include the following information relevant to (a) newsprint (b) foreign type paper:

Memo to Imperial Japanese Govt., subject: Elimination of Newspaper and Publishers' Associations control over distribution of paper.

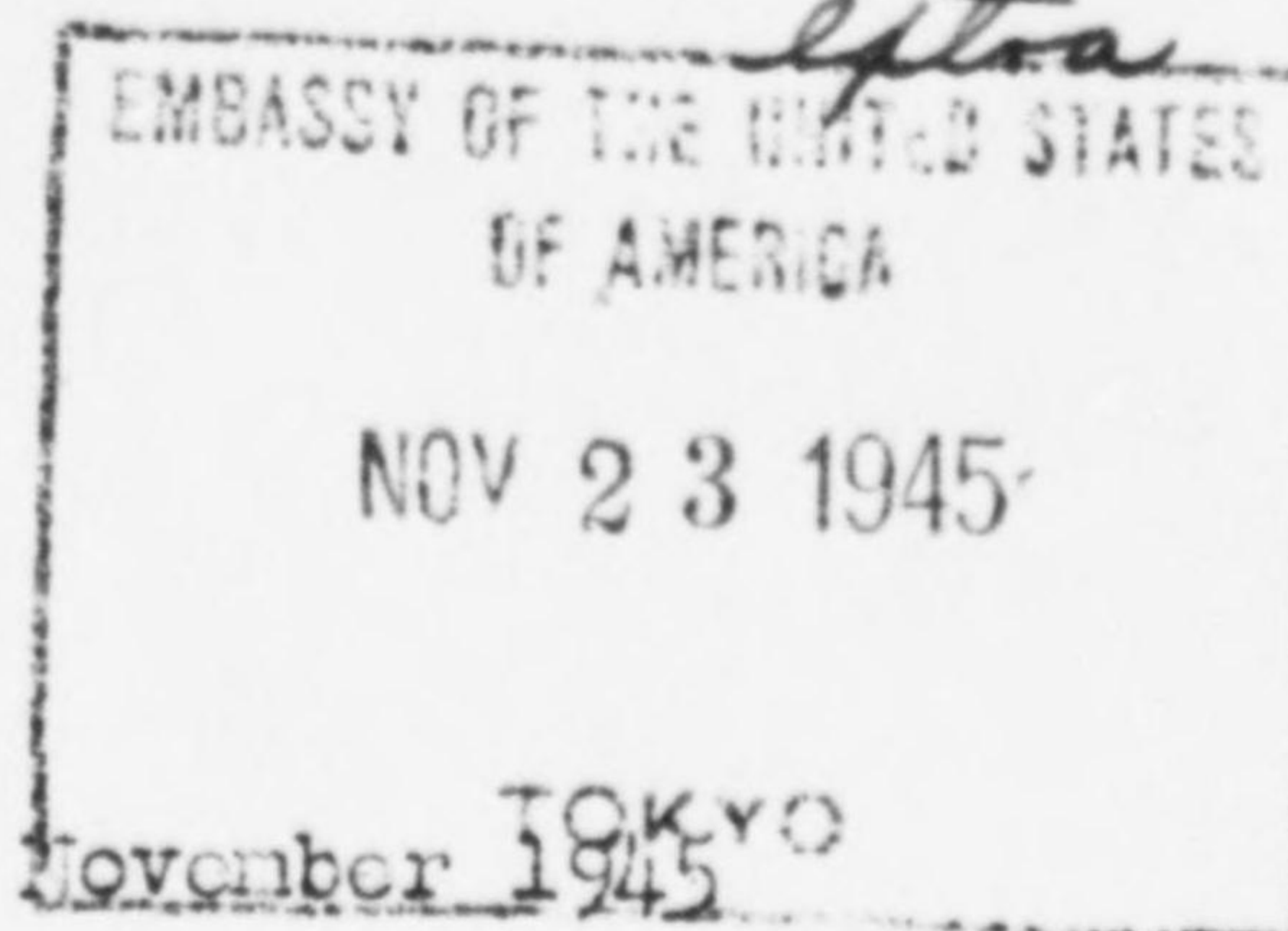
- a. Total quantity of newsprint and foreign-type paper available for distribution during the given month.
 - b. A description of the basis on which the publishers were allocated paper.
 - c. The following facts about each publisher receiving allocation:
 - (1) Name and location of company.
 - (2) Amount of paper allocated.
 - (3) Name of each publication and its circulation.
 - (4) Present allocation expressed as percentage of average monthly amount received during period January 1944 through August 1945.
 - d. A complete statement concerning rejected applicants for paper, including name, location, name and nature of proposed publication, amount requested and reason for rejection.

THROUGH : Central Liaison Office, Tokyo.

SUBJECT : Receipt of Payments on Obligations Due Closed Financial Institutions.

1. Since the closing of certain financial and other institutions pursuant to Memorandum AG 091.3 (30 Sep 45) ESS, some debtors of the institutions have expressed a desire to pay their maturing obligations in whole or in part. It is to the interest of all parties concerned that an agency be provided to accept any proffered payments.

2. Accordingly, the Imperial Japanese Government is hereby directed to instruct the Bank of Japan, and its agents in its behalf, to receive any sums offered by debtors of the closed institutions. A temporary receipt will be given indicating acceptance of the sum "on account, subject to adjustment." Final discharge of the debtor and release of collateral, if any, will be at the later convenience of the liquidator at present appointed or to be appointed.

3. The Imperial Japanese Government will instruct the Bank of Japan that it is authorized to endorse and present for, and receive payment of, all checks, drafts or other similar instruments on behalf of the creditor institution. In doing so, it will act as agent of the closed institution in this limited capacity only.

4. Sums received by the Bank of Japan will be deposited to a special account in the Bank of Japan in the name of the creditor institution. No disbursements from these accounts will be made except on prior written approval of this Headquarters.

5. Direct communication between the Ministry of Finance, the Bank of Japan and interested staff sections of this Headquarters is authorized to implement the action directed.

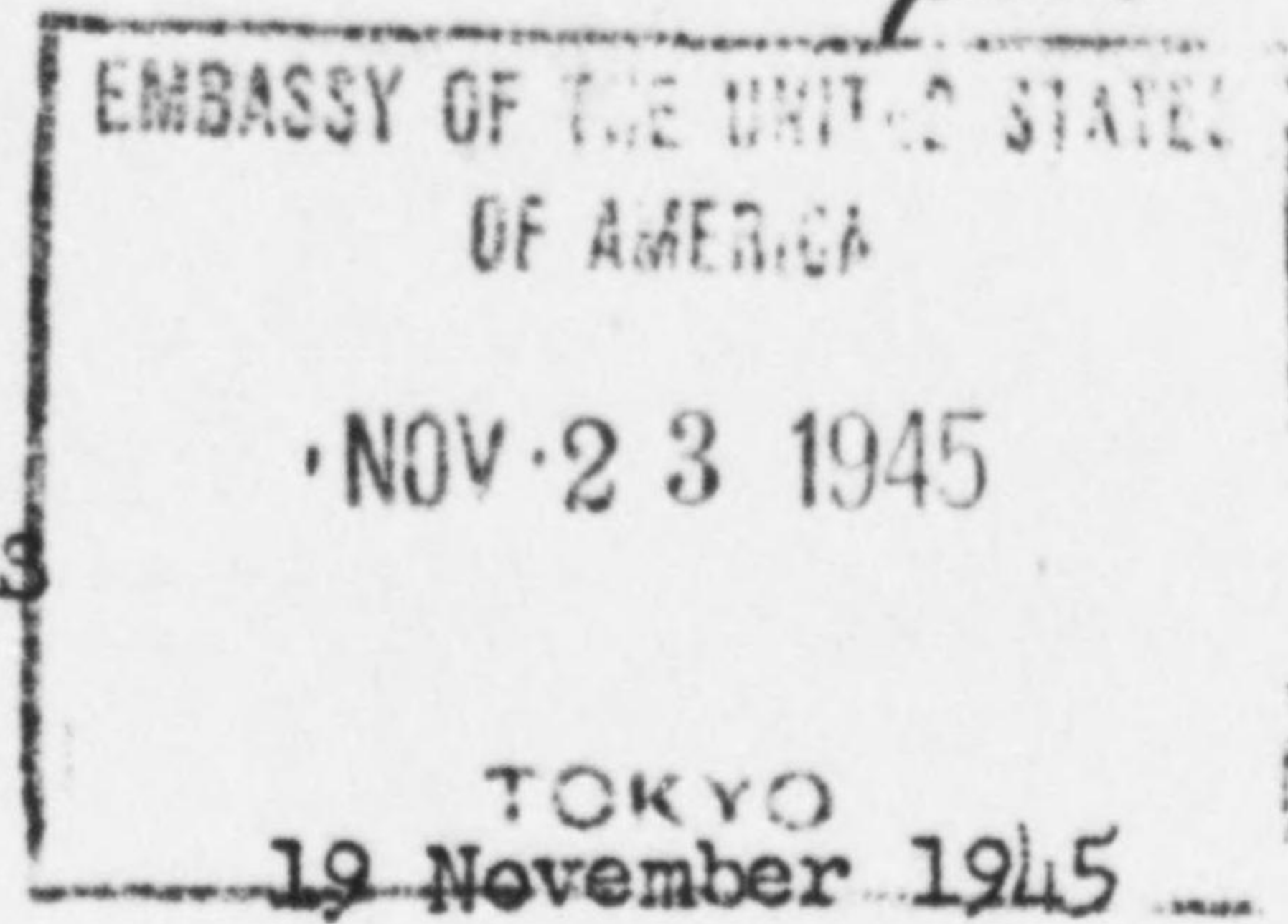



- (5) The following practices and conventions in the use of the above code will be followed:
- (a) The temperature and moisture group (and wind group) for any pressure level will be omitted when the level is below the surface of the station. Omission of these groups will be clearly indicated by the negative value for height when the surface is below sea level (see paragraph 5b), by the value for surface pressure, and by the first two figures of the next group.
 - (b) To report heights below sea level, the convention of adding 500 to the code figures (5000 to the actual value in feet) will be used. Example: If the height of the 1000 mb. surface is 1280 feet below sea level, 5000 is added and the figures 628 (128 plus 500) are coded for hhh.
 - (c) Temperature will be reported in whole degrees Centigrade with code 0 being used for x_1 (paragraph 5b(4)(a) above). The convention of adding 50 for negative values will apply. (For example: -2° coded as 52; -13° coded as 63; -55° coded as 05, etc.).
 - (d) Moisture content (u'u') will be reported as indicated by code 0 for x_3 (paragraph 5b(4)(c) above).
 - (e) The levels selected for the basic section will be the mandatory constant pressure levels, 1000, 850, 700, 500, 300, 200, and 100 millibars.
 - (f) The figures 9, 99, and 999 will be used for missing data in all positions except surface pressure. It is assumed that surface pressure will always be available.
 - (g) Wind data taken by means other than radio or radar direction means will not be included in the radiosonde report and the groups (Oddvv) will be omitted. When combined radio or radar wind and radiosonde ascents are made, code number 4 will be used for x_2 (paragraph 5b(4)(b) above) and wind data will be included for the mandatory constant pressure levels in the basic or standard section of the report.
 - (h) When winds are reported the following convention will be used for reporting wind speeds in excess of 99 knots:
 - 1. In the range 100 to 199, 50 is added to dd, and vv gives the actual speed minus 100. Example: A speed of 117 from the north (360 degrees) is coded 08617.

2. In the range 200 to 299, the group 00200 is inserted immediately following the Oddvv group, dd gives actual 10's of degrees and vv gives the actual speed minus 200. Example: A speed of 217 from the north (360 degrees) is coded 03617 00200.
 3. In the range 300 to 399, the group 00200 is inserted immediately following the Oddvv group, 50 is added to dd, and vv gives the actual speed minus 300. Example: A speed of 317 from the north (360 degrees) is coded 08617 00200.
- (6) x_3 will be coded as 0 indicating that u'u' is reported in grams and tenths of water, tens being omitted.
- (7) Ascents will be commenced daily at 0400Z and 1600Z.
6. The above reporting procedures will be adopted on 15 December 1945.
7. Weather reports received at the Central Meteorological Observatory, Tokyo, in accordance with the above directive will be broadcast at the times and on the frequencies currently authorized for weather broadcasts.
8. Index numbers other than the primary international index numbers for Asia applying to the Japan Area are from supplementary list number three, Japan Area, to Asia list. Index numbers required for stations not assigned a primary number from the Asia list and not assigned a supplementary number above, will be requested from this Headquarters.

(c) Estimated date of completion for each vessel.

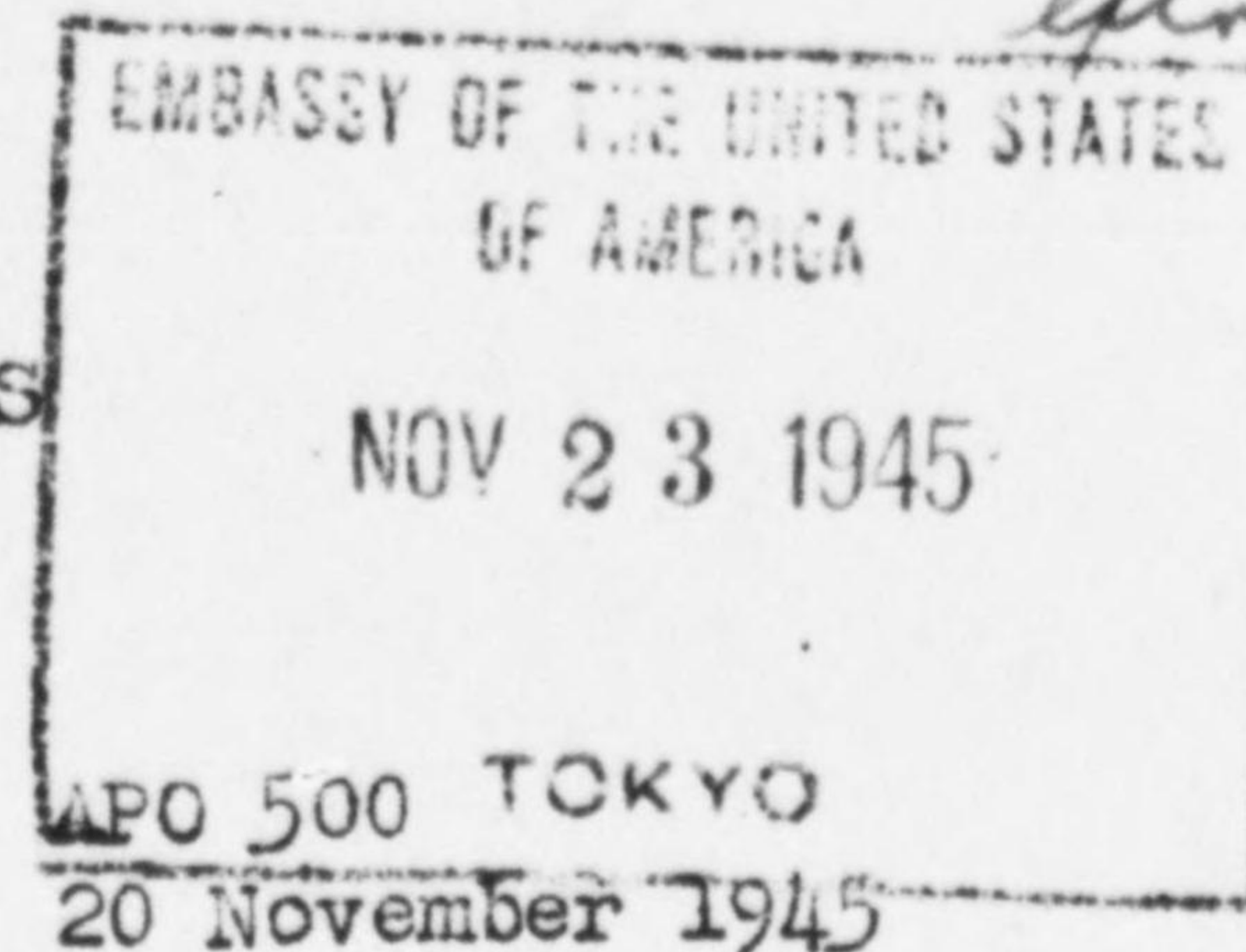

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1. It is the primary responsibility of the Japanese Government Communications Agency to see that all censorable messages are submitted to censorship for action either before being sent out of the country on any circuit, or before being delivered or further transmitted for delivery to the addressee after receipt in Japan. Censorable messages are (a) all communications transmitted by electrical means, entering or leaving the four main islands of Japan or the approximately 1,000 islands immediately contiguous thereto, and (b) domestic communications transmitted by electrical means which may disturb the public tranquillity, or are inimical to the interests of the Allied Powers and (c) any other messages which censorship may later require.

872

2. The following regulations will apply:

a. WIRELESS-TELEGRAPH AND CABLE MESSAGES

- (1) No message will be accepted for transmission or delivery which is in any other language than English, Russian or Japanese.
- (2) The full name and address of the addressee must appear on all incoming messages.
- (3) The full name and address of both the sender and addressee must appear on all outgoing messages.
- (4) Private, government or commercial codes may be used only upon approval of the Civil Censorship Officer, SCAP. This shall include use of abbreviated or code names and/or addresses.
- (5) The Communications Agency or its employees will not reveal to any person (except those connected with Censorship) the action taken by Civil Censorship Detachment, SCAP, on any message unless directed to do so by the censor. When a censor "cancels" a message, the Communication Agency's

office of origin or receipt will return the message to the sender, advising that the message has been cancelled, and will refund any amount collected to the sender.

b. WIRELESS-TELEPHONE AND CABLE-TELEPHONE COMMUNICATIONS

(1) All international, external or foreign telephone calls must be approved by Civil Censorship Officer, SCAP before the parties to the call may be connected.

(2) Required Information.

Before establishing connection, the telephone agency shall furnish the following information to the censor, and obtain approval of the proposed call:

(a) The name and address of the person placing the call.

(b) The name and address of the person receiving the call.

(c) The subjects to be discussed during the call.

(d) The names of any other persons expected to join in the conversation.

(3) No conversation will be permitted in any language other than English or Japanese.

(4) Use of code on telephone calls is prohibited.

c. GENERAL REGULATIONS

(1) The Civil Censorship Detachment, SCAP, may maintain censors in the operating rooms of the Communications Agency's offices and may inspect these operating rooms, files and records at any time. The Communication Agency's offices will submit any or all files and records for inspection at any time Censorship so requests. No records, files, no copies of messages will be destroyed without prior written approval.


(2) The board of Communication, through its liaison representative, will furnish to the Civil Censorship Officer,



a. Control program in Hokkaido.

(1) Intensive immunization program with typhus vaccine in coal mine and labor camps and such areas of the following cities and villages in the vicinity of troops as may be considered endemic for louse-borne typhus:

- (a) Yubari
- (b) Hakodate
- (c) Asakigawa
- (d) Kushiro
- (e) Otaru
- (f) Sagoro
- (g) Muroran
- (h) Obihiro

(2) Routine monthly disinfestation of all occupants of the above coal mine and labor camps up to and thru April, 1946.

(3) Routine disinfestation of all civilians crossing the straits of Tsugaru from Hokkaido to Honshu.


b. Adequate control measures against typhus fever in other cities, villages and areas where the disease constitutes a threat to U. S. military forces.

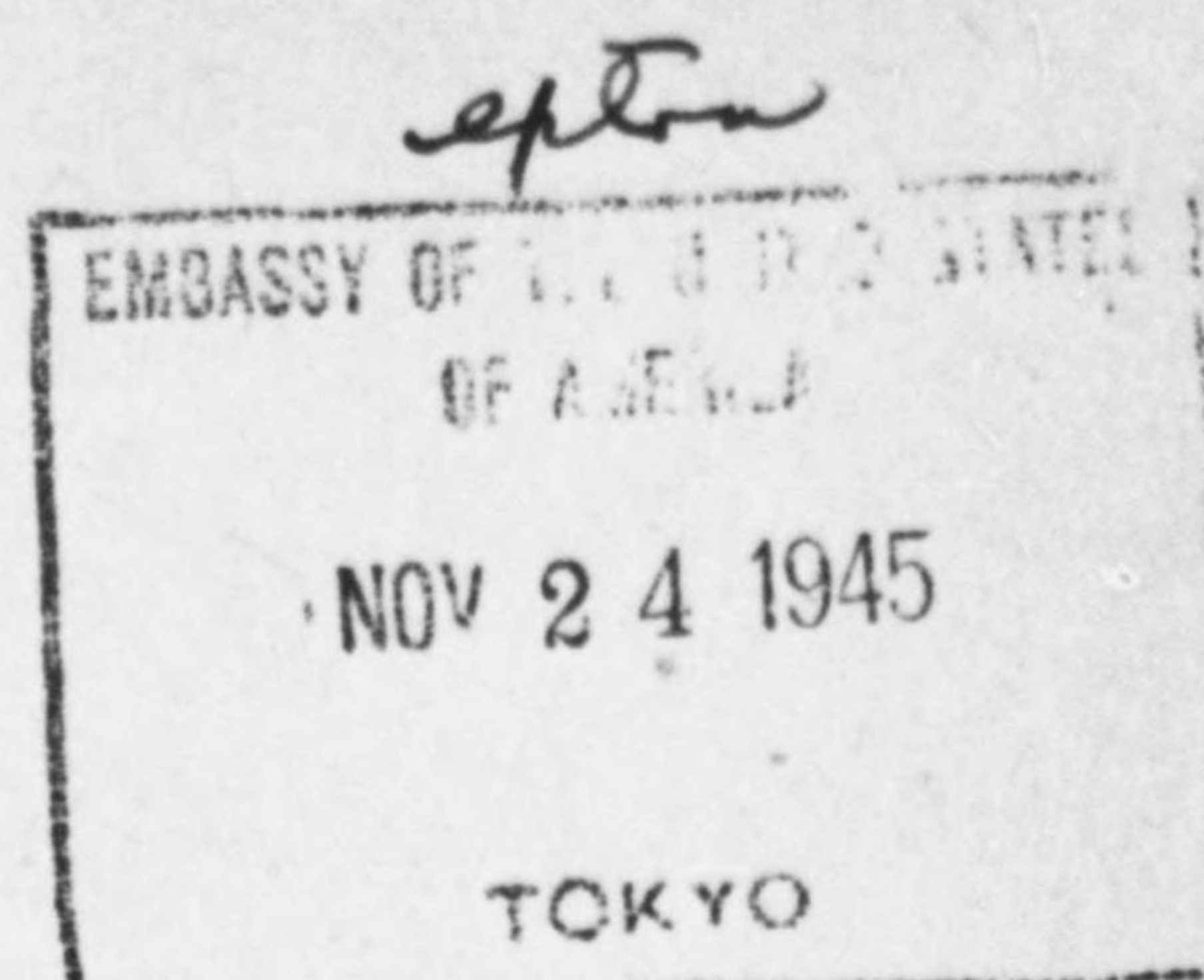

SUBJECT : Clarification of Directive 3 as Regards Conversion

1. Memorandum, Imperial Japanese Government, CLO No. 626(2), dated 18 November 1945, requested this headquarters to clarify the term "conversion" as applied to industrial installations in paragraph 3b of Directive No. 3, dated 22 September 1945.

2. "Conversion" as used in paragraph 3b of the above directive is intended to apply to cases where the physical modification or conversion of the equipment or facilities of a plant is required before such plants, which were engaged in production of war materials, can begin production of consumer commodities. For example, a plant containing machines designed for the production of aircraft cannot be used for the production of consumer goods until the machinery itself is converted. In this case application for conversion shall be made as specified in paragraph 3b of Directive 3. A textile establishment formerly manufacturing military uniforms or blankets for military use can produce clothing and blankets for civilian use without conversion, and may immediately proceed to do so as directed in paragraph 3a of Directive 3.

SUBJECT : Pensions and Benefits.

1. The Imperial Japanese Government is directed to take the necessary steps as rapidly as practicable and in no event later than 1 February 1946 to terminate all payments except as authorized by this Headquarters, of any public or private pensions or other emoluments or benefits of any kind granted or conferred to any person:

- a. By reason of military service, including severance or retirement pay or similar bonus or allowance, except compensation for physical disability, limiting the recipients ability to work, at rates which are no higher than the lowest of those for comparable physical disability arising from non-military causes;
- b. By reason of membership in or services to any association, society, or other organization dissolved or suspended as a result of any order of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers;
- c. Who has been removed from any office or position as a result of any order of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers;
- d. Who has been interned or arrested as a result of any order of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, during the term of internment or arrest, or permanently, in case of subsequent conviction.

2. The restriction in 1-a above shall not apply to current pay, subsistence, travel or other normal allowances accruing prior to discharge from the military service.

3. As rapidly as practicalbe and in any event by 1 February 1946, all certificates or other documents evidencing any right to, or deferred payment of, any pension or other emolument or benefit prohibited by this memorandum shall be

declared void and any sums set aside or deposited for such payment shall be recovered forthwith by the government.

4. Within 10 days after receipt of this memorandum there shall be submitted to this Headquarters a full report with reference to:

a. Military pensions or other emoluments:

(1) Pensions

(a) Total amount due and payable during the period from August 15, 1945, to November 15, 1945;

(b) Total amount paid in cash during the period from August 15, 1945 to November 15, 1945;

(c) Total amounts represented by certificates or other documents evidencing rights to such payments and the total amounts of any sums set aside or deposited for such payments;

(2) Severance pay and retirement allowances, divided into the same categories as subdivision (1) above;

(3) Allowances, bonuses or benefits of any other nature, divided into the same categories as division a-(1) above;

b. Non-military public or private pensions and other emoluments or benefits prohibited by this memorandum, divided into the same categories as division a-(1) above;

c. Action taken to comply with this memorandum.

5. Six copies of the above report will be furnished to this Headquarters.

SUBJECT : Elimination of War Profits and Reorganization of
National Finances.

1. Reference is made to the memorandum of the Minister of Finance, dated 16 November 1945, (LOF 4), outlining a program for the elimination of war profits and the reorganization of national finances.

2. This program is approved in principle as only one of the steps leading to the development within Japan of ways and institutions which will contribute to the growth of peaceful and democratic forces. Certain Japanese interests have used unjustified and aggressive war to illegally enrich themselves for many years. You will demonstrate to all Japanese that war is financially unprofitable by insuring that the tax described in para. 1 a of your proposal includes the period not only dating from the perfidious attack on Pearl Harbor but includes the period prior to that date to the maximum extent possible.

3. The complete legislative proposal covering the program will be presented in the Diet for enactment during the first session to be held in 1946. A draft of the proposal will be submitted to this Headquarters for approval not later than 31 December 1945. The Imperial Household will not be exempt from such program.

4. Pending the enactment of the necessary legislation, no payments will be made by the Imperial Japanese Government, its sub-divisions, agencies or instrumentalities or any other person upon any claim arising from the production or supply of war materials, from war damage or from the construction or conversion of war plants, except upon the following conditions:

a. The amount of such payments shall be deposited in blocked accounts with the Bank of Japan in the name of the beneficiary.

b. No payment, transfer or withdrawal from such accounts may be effected without the approval of this Headquarters.

5. No credit will be extended by the Imperial Japanese Government, its sub-divisions, agencies or instrumentalities, or by any other person against:

a. Claims arising from the production or supply of war materials, from war damage, or from the construction or conversion of war plants.

b. Blocked accounts resulting from the payment of such claims.

6. Any accounts heretofore blocked in connection with the payment of claims arising from the production or supply of war materials, from war damage, or from the construction or conversion of war plants will remain blocked, except as authorized by this Headquarters. The provisions of Pars. 3 and 4 hereof shall apply to such accounts.

7. Any payments in excess of ¥5,000.00 to any one claimant, made by the Imperial Japanese Government, its sub-divisions, agencies or instrumentalities or any other person, on or since 15 August 1945 for any of the purposes stated in Par. 3 hereof, which have not been blocked or which have been released from a blocked account, in whole or in part, will be redeposited by the beneficiary in a blocked account with the Bank of Japan within 30 days from this date. If any of such funds have been invested in fixed assets or are otherwise not recoverable without undue hardship to the beneficiary, a report giving full details of the circumstances will be submitted to the Ministry of Finance for consideration by this Headquarters.

8. Except as authorized by this Headquarters, the Imperial Japanese Government, its sub-divisions, agencies or instrumentalities will not hereafter:

a. Issue bonds or any other instruments of indebtedness.

b. Obtain or extend credit in any form.

c. Assume further guarantees of, or make any further commitment to pay, any obligation of any bank, insurance company, trust company, securities company, investment company, industrial or commercial concern, or other enterprise, whether publicly or privately owned.

d. Grant any subsidies, tax exemptions, tax allotments, rebates, or any similar benefits, except that national revenues may be reallocated to political sub-divisions for purposes otherwise not prohibited by this directive.



1. Memorandum for Imperial Japanese Government, Subject: Reserve Supplies Held for Relief Distribution, AG 400 (22 Nov 45)PH, dated 22 Nov 1945, is hereby rescinded .

2. Receipt is acknowledged of your memorandum, file number 372, dated 26 October 1945, on the subject of materials, supplies and equipment to be turned over to the Imperial Japanese Government by the Allied Forces.

3. The Imperial Japanese Government will furnish this headquarters without delay a detailed inventory of all stocks of staple foodstuffs and clothing listed in paragraph 3 (1) and 3 (2) of memorandum number 372, showing their exact location within each prefecture.

4. Prior to the distribution of any of the listed foodstuffs and clothing, and before 15 December 1945, a distribution plan will be submitted by the Imperial Japanese Government to this headquarters for approval. This plan will make provision for:

a. Control of relief distribution to be exercised by a central agency operating through prefectural governments;

b. A social welfare agency in each prefecture staffed by personnel selected for their training and skill in the handling of welfare problems, and specifically not for their present or former military or naval status;

c. Eligibility for receipt of relief supplies based only upon individual need determined by family budgetary deficiency;

d. Prevention of the use of supplies in mass feeding or distribution schemes without specific authority from this headquarters;

e. Issuance of relief supplies without cost to the recipient;

f. The maintenance of a record for each family to whom supplies are issued containing necessary identifying data;

No planning for or designing of new types or series of bank notes, state notes or other currency shall be initiated without first submitting a complete report to this Headquarters, stating the reasons for, and the types and quantities of new notes and currencies desired.

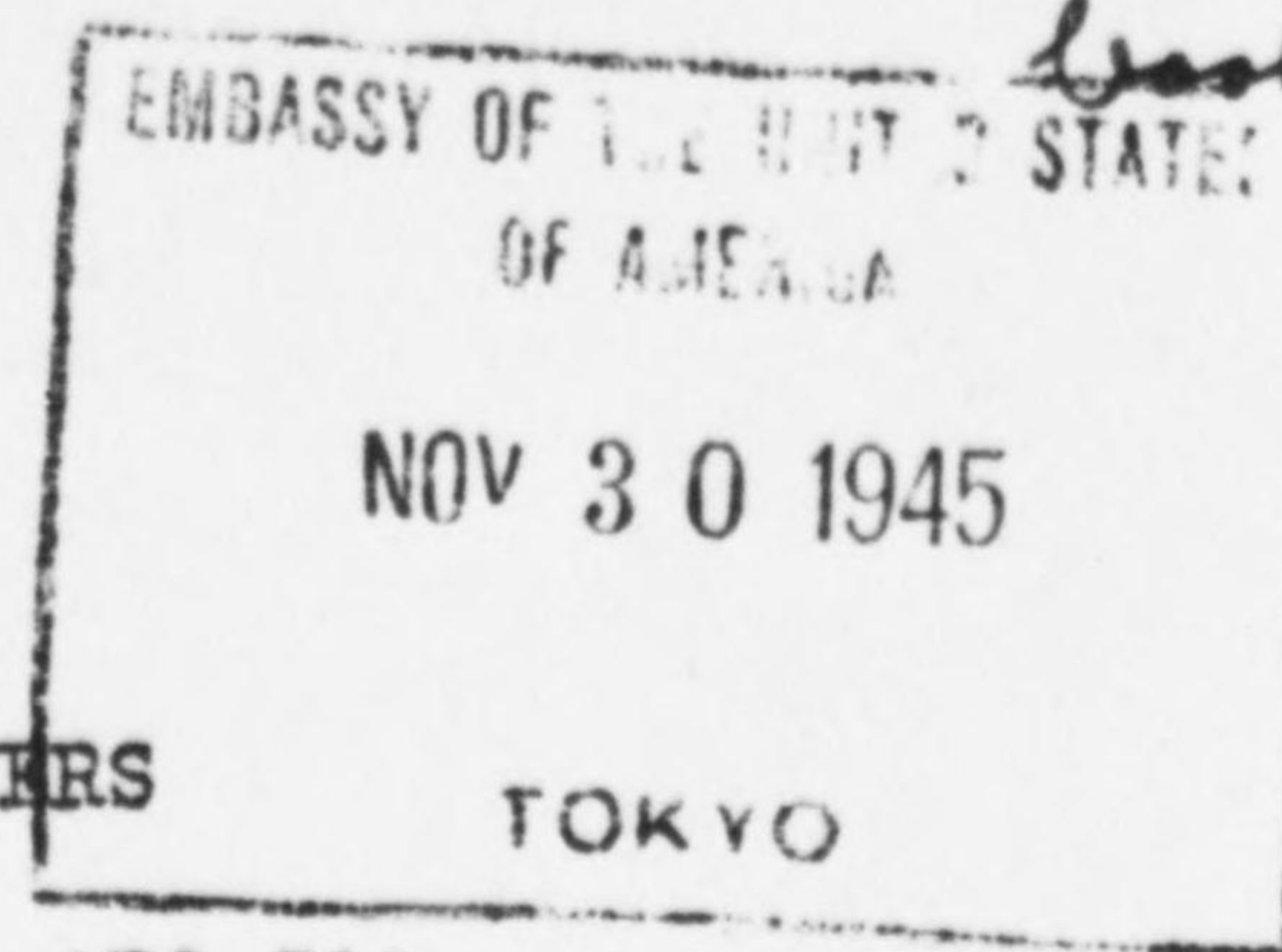
2. On or before the tenth day of each month, the Ministry of Finance will submit a report to this Headquarters on the present note issue of the Bank of Japan as of the end of the previous month, showing for each denomination: Amount in Circulation, Amount Unissued, Amount Withdrawn and Cancelled, Total Amount Printed. The first report will be submitted on or before 10 December 1945. A sample of the report form will be submitted to this Headquarters for approval within five days from receipt of this memorandum.

3. The Ministry of Finance will submit one report on state notes and currency in circulation as of 30 September 1945 and containing the same type of information as required in paragraph 2 above. Subsequent reports will be delivered quarterly.

1. Reference is made to C.L.O. No. 613(5) from the Imperial Japanese Government, dated 17 November 1945, subject: "Carrying of American equipment by Japanese evacuees."

2. In order that maximum utility may be gained from American military clothing and equipment issued by competent authority to Japanese evacuees, the Imperial Japanese Government is directed to take the following actions:

a. Collect all American clothing and equipment in the possession of repatriates as they are processed through reception centers.

b. Re-outfit such personnel when necessary with Japanese clothing and equipment.

c. American clothing and equipment, collected as directed in Par a above, may be used by the Japanese Government for relief purposes subject to the following:

(1) All clothing or equipment of textile or fabric material will be dyed a distinctive color prior to issue.

(2) All equipment such as shoes, canteens etc. which cannot be dyed, will be marked or branded in some easily identifiable manner.

(3) Unless so dyed or marked items will be confiscated by Allied authorities.

3. The Japanese Imperial Government will:

a. Report to this headquarters at the earliest practicable date the color of dye and the type marking to be used for the above purpose.

b. Report to this headquarters as of the last day of each month, commencing 31 December 1945, the quantities of each item of American clothing and equipment dyed and marked and re-issued to needy individuals during the past month.
