The agreement as it relates to the Japanese Red Cross has been amended to meet the contemplated needs for A.R.C. assistance with the reorganization of the Korean Red Cross expires on 17 November, 1946. Since the reorganization of the Korean Red Cross is not completed, because no A.R.C. personnel were assigned until April 1946, and continued assistance in the reorganization of the Korean Red Cross is desired, it is requested that the present working agreement with A.R.C. be amended to meet the need (Tab E).
4. A letter has been drafted, requesting the present agreement between A.R.C. and SCAP be amended to provide for: the extension of the period of A.R.C. personnel attached to Department of Public Health and Welfare, Hq. USAMIGIK, to 1 July, 1947, this personnel to consist of: three (3) qualified workers on national level with prime mission of fostering and assisting the reorganization and development of the Korean Red Cross, five (5) qualified workers on the provincial level to foster organization and development of Korean Red Cross Chapters and additional A.R.C. specialists when needed and if available, and a change in the reporting procedure of A.R.C. personnel. (Tab F).

The Swedish Diplomatic Mission presents its compliments to the General Headquarters of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and, referring to the latter's circular No. 8, of 30th August, 1946, regarding the Control of Entry and Exit of Individuals, etc., into and from Japan, has the honour to indicate that the Swedish citizen Mr. N. Kallin has asked the intermediary of the Mission in order to obtain, if possible, permission to enter Japan.

The following particulars are furnished:

1. Full name: Mr. Nils Fredrik Anders Peder KALLIN.
2. Born: 17 June, 1906, at Gothenburg, Sweden.
3. Swedish citizen.
4. At present working as Manager of the Chinese SKF Company, Kiangse Road 170, Shanghai, China.
5. Purpose of the visit: Mr. KALLIN worked for the SKF Industries of Japan, Tokyo, from the autumn 1932 until the end of April 1945, when he returned to Sweden for hospital treatment. From the end of 1941 he has been the Managing Director of the said firm, and is still registered as such.

Mr. KALLIN now wishes to enter Japan in order to inspect the assets and auditing of the firm, and also to make arrangements for the home leave and substitution of the present Manager of the firm, Mr. Gunnar WESTER.

The applicant further desired to take care of his private belongings, which all remain in Japan, and which he had to leave here owing to lack of adequate transportation facilities at the time he left this country in 1945.

The Swedish Mission ventures to add that from 9th December, 1941, until

he left for Sweden in April, 1945, Mr KALLIN served as Honorary Swedish Vice-Consul at Yokohama. In the said capacity it was his duty to safeguard the interests in his Consular District of such Allied Powers as had entrusted the protection of their interests in Japan to the Swedish Government. The Mission allows itself to nourish the conviction that in the said capacity Mr KALLIN rendered valuable services. Unfortunately, he had to leave Japan hurriedly via the Soviet Union for Sweden, in April, 1945, in order to undergo adequate hospital treatment for injuries sustained at a motor accident, which occurred on his return from a visit to an Internment Camp.

6. Mr KALLIN expects to stay in Japan one month; actual duration of the stay would depend on the sailing dates of ships from Japan to Shanghai.
7. He desires to enter Japan in the first half of November, 1946.
8. The point of origin is Shanghai. The final destination in Japan is Tokyo and Yokohama. He would reside at 214, Yamatecho, Yokohama, and work at the office of the SKF Industries of Japan at 7, Shiba Park, Tokyo.
9. Mr KALLIN would travel by regular shipping from Shanghai to Yokohama, operated by the War Shipping Administration.
10. Mr KALLIN holds Swedish passport No. Q-5997, issued on 18th January, 1946, valid until 18th January 1951, and issued by the Governor of Gothenburg and Bohus Province, Sweden.

Referring to the above the Swedish Mission ventures to request that this application be granted, if possible. The Mission holds itself, of course, at the disposal of the General Headquarters should any further information on the subject be required or desired.

Tab A requests that three individuals be considered as members of the Soviet Reparations and Restitution Delegation, and that four additional individuals be considered for integration into the SCAP Staff. Tab A indicates that the latter four nominees were submitted to FEC in August. However, no information concerning them has been received from FEC, nor is any information available as to their qualifications.

3. Tab B outlines the policy for establishment and operation of Reparations and Restitution Delegations.

4. Tab C advises SCAP of nomination made by USSR member on FEC for three Soviets for integration into SCAP Staff. These nominations are referred to in Paragraph 2 of Tab A. Apparently the Soviet member of the Allied Council for Japan is under the impression that nominations contained in Tab C are for Reparations and Restitution Delegation. Since the policy for establishment of such delegations has now been formulated as indicated in Tab B, these three individuals may be considered to be three of the authorized five members from USSR. At the time of receipt Tab C was considered to be nominations for integration into the SCAP Staff.

5. Tab D advised Washington that no vacancies existed in the SCAP Staff, and further that it was not desirable in any event to integrate into SCAP Staff personnel of members of the Allied Council.

6. Tab E is a proposed reply to Tab A, accepting nominations of three Soviet personnel as members of the Soviet Reparations and Restitution Delegation. This tab further advises that there are no vacancies existing in the SCAP Staff for the four nominees contained in Tab A.

7. Recommend Tab E be approved and returned to G-1 for necessary action.

1. Occupation troops, part of Fifth Air Force, have marked for occupancy two of four dwellings in Nishinomiya which were the basis of assurances for missionaries to enter Japan. The problem of returning these two dwellings to the missionaries and assurance of occupancy of the other two dwellings has arisen. All four of the dwellings in question are owned by missionaries who are represented in Japan by Dr Paul Mayer, representative of the North American Conference of Foreign Missions.

2. The immediate problem consists in making available to Mr and Mrs John B. Cobb one of the four dwellings referred to above which is the only one suitable for immediate occupancy and which is one of the two which have been marked for occupancy. On 27 July 1946 clearance was given to Mrs Cobb, a Methodist missionary in her own right, to join her husband in Japan, based on the assurance that adequate food, clothing and shelter were available in Japan for her support.

3. Mrs Cobb arrived on 15 October 1946 and arrangements have been made with G-1, Eighth Army to permit immediate occupancy of the one house in question by Mr and Mrs Cobb.

4. Numerous telephone conversations with staff officers in Headquarters, PACUSA over a period of three days have resulted in a refusal to cooperate without written instructions.

5. It appears that definite action should be taken at this time to assure availability of the four dwellings in question.

1. Occupation troops, part of the 5th Air Force, have marked for occupancy dwellings in Nishinomiya which were the bases of assurances for missionaries to come to Japan. The problem of returning these dwellings to the missionaries has arisen.

2. a. On 27 July 46 clearance was given to Mrs. John B. Cobb, a Methodist missionary in her own right, to join her husband in Japan. Clearance was given based on the assurance that adequate food, clothing and shelter were available in Japan for her support.

b. On 14 October 46 Dr. Paul Mayer, representative of the North American Conference of Foreign Missions, informed this Section that during the first week in October officers from the Itami Air Base had placed signs on two houses which had been former missionary residences in Nishinomiya. One of these, the only one suitable for immediate occupancy, had been used as the basis for the assurances described in Paragraph 2a above.

c. Mrs. Cobb arrived on the Marine Falcon 15 October.

d. A telephone call to G-1 8th Army resulted in an immediate promise that any action taken by 8th Army Procurement Officers in this promise would be rescinded.

e. Numerous telephone conversations with staff officers in Headquarters PACUSA over a period of 3 days have resulted in a refusal to cooperate without written instructions.

3. In view of the fact that the Cobbs are present in Japan, have no place to stay and have been intending to occupy this residence since 27 July, and that 5th Air Force did not mark it for occupancy by military personnel until 1 October, it is believed serious repercussions in the public press in the U.S. could result if these missionaries are not allowed to occupy property which they rightfully own.

- d. Draft reply to Tab C (Tab D).

2. Tab A advises that there are approximately 100 German war criminals in Shanghai and requests SCAP's comments on possibilities of repatriating this group on ships scheduled to repatriate Germans from Japan.

3. Tab B advises WARCOS that there is no objection here to stated plan for repatriation of these war criminals from China, provided they are processed and outloaded from China and security guards from China are provided for trip from China to Germany.

4. Tab C indicates a misunderstanding of the comments of SCAP on this repatriation from China. This tab, which is from the Secretary of State to State Department representative in China, indicates that it is proposed to transfer subject war criminals from China to Japan and to outload these repatriates from Japan.

5. There are only 15 German Nationals confined in Japan, and no war criminals as such. It is considered highly undesirable to permit entry into Japan of subject war criminals and thereby presumably assume responsibility for their security, maintenance, processing and outloading. It is further considered that security guards for subject Nationals during repatriation is not a responsibility of U. S. Army Forces in Japan. There seems to be no reason why any ship which is sent to Japan to repatriate Germans cannot call at a China port to pick up these war criminals.

6. Tab D repeats the proposal referred to in Tab B and states the objections of SCAP to bringing subject war criminals into Japan.

7. Recommend Tab D be approved and returned to G-1 for necessary action.

1. Reference is made to War Department letter above subject dated 30 Sept 1946.

2. Following comments apply to indicated paragraphs of subject letter:

a. (4a) Instructions contained in JCS radio WX 87535, dated 8 December 1945, as changed, established the policy of repatriating from Japan all objectionable German nationals and all non-objectionable German nationals who desire repatriation. Recent instructions contained in Washington radio CRX 1334, dated 14 October 1946, indicate that only objectionable Germans will be repatriated in the near future and that non-objectionable Germans will not be repatriated until sometime in 1947. This procedure entails at least two shipments of repatriates from Japan and surveillance of a group of approximately 600 German nationals who desire repatriation but who must remain in Japan for an indefinite period. It would be much more desirable and economical to repatriate all German nationals subject to repatriation at one time. A radio request to effect such repatriation all at one time has been sent to the War Department.

d. (4d) Although a simplification of repatriation procedure is desirable for reasons indicated in sub-paragraph (a) above, the only economy that would be effected thereby would be an indeterminate saving in man hours worked in administrative processes applicable to these nationals and one less ship required for repatriation.
