

CONCLUSIONS	Administratively this institution is being well operated. Industrial program is functioning as well as can be expected with what facilities are available. The farm site is well managed. Rating, satisfactory.
REC CABIENDA TI CNS	(1) That National Headquarters release construction budget as soon as possible.  (2) New cloth for clothing and bedding should be allocated in early summer in order to permit sufficient time to complete tailoring before cold weather. (3) Obtain a director for academic and vocational training to absorb idle population. (4)  Allocate funds to construct adequate shop facilities and equipment in order to provide employment for idle inmates. (5) Form work crews
