The only person that finds South City a poor place in which to work is the criminal, for he does not work long here until he has a long vacation.

The police department is doing all in its power to uphold the good name of our community and we are ready to serve, day or night. If at any time you encounter anything suspicious, telephone the police department at once and we will be there without delay to take care of the situation."

## DESPONDENCY SAID CAUSE OF THE SUICIDE OF ANGIOLINI

### Local Man Kills Self After Brooding Over His Long Illness.

## INQUEST IS PLANNED

### Was Resident Of South City For Many Years, Host Of Friends.

Despondency over his long illness is thought to be the cause of the suicide of Frank Angiolini, merchant of South San Francisco who took his life Thursday morning.

Death occurred by the infliction of a gunshot wound and was practically instantaneous. A coroner's inquest will be held at once according to Neiri's funeral parlors where the body was taken.

The deceased has been a resident of South City for many years and was well known to nearly every member of the community. He has suffered from a severe illness for the past two years and of late has brooded over it considerably.

Arrangements for the funeral have not yet been made, according to those close to the bereaved family.

## PENNY CONTEST IS FEATURE OF CITIZENS BANK

A novel feature is being presented this year by the Citizens Bank of South San Francisco, in the form of a penny guessing contest.

Pennies have been dumped into a sealed glass container and this placed in the window of the bank. No one knows just how many pennies are in the jar. The bank has offered prizes for those guessing closest to the number of pennies.

The savings are in various clubs and extend over a period of fifty weeks, which makes it possible for every one to be supplied with money at Christmas.

## BUSINESS BASIS FOR ADS SUGGESTED Don't Waste Money in Hit and Miss Ads MAKE THE PAPER TAKE THE BURDENS

With the first of the year approaching, it would be well to think of advertising next year. Why not handle your publicity on a business basis instead of the hit and miss plan that so many merchants follow?

For example, just because your business is smaller than some of the great national concerns, it does not mean that you cannot get a good plan from the methods that they use.

With the peculiar conditions existing here, let us submit this plan for your approval. In the first place, it is not right for the paper to simply get your business, sell you white space at intervals and carry no part of the burden; under this plan it is just as much to the benefit of the paper to see that your advertising pays as it is to you.

The plan is:

1. Determine a definite proportion of your gross income that will carry each month for publicity. The proper amount is from 3 to 7 per cent. This per cent will remain the same at all times. If your gross business increases your amount for publicity will increase. If your business is less, the amount for publicity is automatically cut down. This makes it necessary for the paper to see that your advertising pays, if the paper wishes to maintain its business.
2. Use that money on a circulation basis. Choose the publications that cover the field you wish to reach. For example, if one publication has 1500 circulation and another 500, you will use two-thirds of the appropriation in the paper with 1500 and one-third in the paper with 500. This is the only way to buy advertising if you wish results—on a circulation basis for circulation is the thing that you get results from.
3. You tell each publication the amount that it is to handle for you for the particular month. It is then up to the paper to lay out the ads and plan the particular way in which the most results will come. This takes the burden of the business of advertising from your shoulders. Naturally some months the publication may not use the full amount that is allowed, for their judgment will show that it would be better to double up for the next month.

We trust that you will give this plan your earnest consideration, for it will be of great value in building up your business and seeing what results you get from your ads as well as relieving you of much of the burden of planning publicity.

## NIGHT SCHOOL OF SOUTH CITY ONE OF BEST IN S. M. COUNTY

### Rapid Increase In Number Of Students Shown In Last Report.

## HAS MANY SUBJECTS

### Seven Teachers Are On Force Of The Twice A Week Instruction.

The first night school in South San Francisco was organized in May, 1922, just a few weeks before school closed for the summer. At that time, it was opened to accommodate a number of foreign born factory workers who wanted to become citizens. Classes in English were formed and some dozen or fifteen pupils attended, being in charge of two teachers. During the summer, some of these pupils went to Redwood City and passed the examinations and thus received their first citizenship papers.

In September, 1922, night school again took up, this time with three teachers, one in charge of beginning English and citizenship, one for those who were more advanced, and the third teacher opened classes in commercial subjects. The average nightly attendance for the entire school was about 25 for that year.

September 1923, found a call for mechanical drawing. Citizenship students had advanced to the point of grade three. Classes were opened to accommodate all, and there were now five teachers. Attendance during the year ranged from 25 to 40.

The fruits of two years' labor began to appear in September, 1924, at which time the classes were quite large. A satisfied student brought others. Classes in commerce were up in the twenties, and a sixth teacher was added to the night school. The lowest attendance for the year 1924-25 was 35, and the highest 87—the average being about 55 or 60.

In the year that has just begun, 78 students enrolled in the night school on the first night in the following classes: Mathematics, 7; commercial, 32; mechanical drawing, 14; social science, 5; beginning English, 11. On the following night the attendance was 93. There are now seven teachers and the average attendance is between 90 and 95, the highest at any time having been 104.

The night school meets every Tuesday and Thursday from 7 to 9 o'clock. The tuition is free. The only expense is for books, a dollar or so for the entire year. The rooms are comfortable, well lighted and ventilated. There are no particular term beginners—one can begin most any time, as the instruction is particularly all individual.

One can hardly realize the results obtained from a small amount of effort and regularity in attendance. For instance, there are a number of students who have been coming for several years. They have learned to read, write, spell and are now taking up commercial work. Others have proven that it is possible to learn as much and cover as much ground in a given subject as the day school program calls for.

## PLANE CRASHES WHEN AVIATOR FAILS TO MAKE NIGHT LANDING

### Trolley Wires and Poles Torn Down As Plane Crashes To Ground.

Basil "Bake" Russell, well known aviator with headquarters at the South San Francisco Aviation Field, is at liberty today on \$50 bail and must appear on Saturday before Justice of the Peace Edward L. Farrell on a charge of "reckless driving" as the result of a "lucky" accident last night. The aviator spent all Wednesday in the jail at South San Francisco on a technical charge of intoxication.

Wednesday at 7 o'clock a prospective passenger called at the field where Russell makes his headquarters and asked to be taken on a night ride over San Francisco. The flier consented and the pair started off. In the meantime others at the flying field started a bon fire as a landing mark for the aviator seeking adventures in the nocturnal skies.

Then the fun began.

After having circled over San Francisco and having had the joy of looking down on pleasure seekers of the ordinary type, viz., theatergoers, dancers, boxing show attendants, window shoppers or what have you—Russell turned the nose of his airplane toward the old camp grounds, as they familiarly call it in the army.

Old Man Trouble

Over South San Francisco they soared and when they got to where Russell feared his air field ought to have been, he spotted what he thought was the bon fire. But it wasn't. It happened to be the lights so kindly provided by the Market Street Railway company for convenience, safety and protection of passengers using the Leipsic station.

At any rate, Russell "cut the gun," as the boys who wear helmets and goggles say, and started an easy glide for the aforementioned old camp grounds. Then he discovered that he had picked the wrong place to land. It happened in a most peculiar way, and a high tension power was all to blame.

That Darn Old Pole

When the big airplane, a Standard equipped with a Hispano Suiza motor, came near the earth the high tension power pole got in the way and the airplane tripped on it. Then it spun right around the pole, just as though it thought it was doing the customary May dance, and landed with sufficient force to let the pilot and passenger know that old mother earth was saying a hearty "Good Evening."

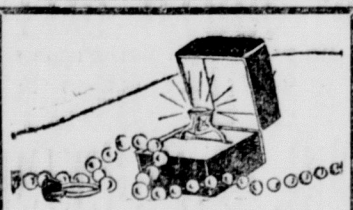

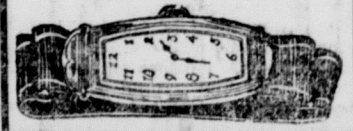

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**CRITICISM**

It was once very truthfully remarked that "Without criticism there can be no progress." And in fact if everyone is smugly complacent with the existing order of things there is no urge for progress and there will be none. So let's have criticism and lots of it.

But—unless we remember that there are two sorts of criticism a great amount of harm can be done. Criticism which simply says things are wrong and offers no sound way of aiding the situation is wrong. Criticism which points out a way in which a situation can be improved and which carries with it a co-operative help to improve that situation is beneficial.

The remark has been made, not once, but from a number of different sources that this community is progressing and, despite the fact that the people are doing everything they can to hold it back.

This statement made by those active in community affairs is wrong in that it means that they are going at the problem in the wrong spirit especially since it shows that they think that they are doing just right and fail to see that there may be something of reason in what the other fellow proposes.

But it is right from the standpoint that to a large part the civic leaders attack problems from the angle of destructive criticism, with a total lack of co-operation, and with the whole system of community affairs being handled by small combative groups. Three things which are holding back the town until progress is almost impossible.

A harsh criticism, yes, destructive criticism if it stopped there. How can it be made constructive? Simply this way. By realizing that in the viewpoint of each there is probably something worth while, no man is entirely debased. By being willing to sacrifice some of our petty jealousies and pride, dropping our fights, getting together and making our choice of what is the best line of procedure for the community, taking the will of the majority in that choice, and every one of us bending all our energies to the accomplishment of that end.

Right here this publication lays down a challenge in the interest of the progress and the betterment of this community. Instead of talking to one or two men sit down and write a letter to this paper saying what you think should be done here. That letter will be published. Let us put the discussion of our community problems on an open and above board basis. This paper will act as a clearing house for ideas about the community. One such communication appears in this issue, answer it. The only requirement is that you must sign your name and address to the letter also your name will not be published if you do not wish it. Let's have some action on this.

**"HELLO"**

How did you say "hello" this morning? Was it in sort of sharp bark, a rumbling growl, or merely a grunt or was it one of this big cheery hellos that make you feel fine and make the world a little brighter for the other fellow?

Suppose you try one of the cheerful ones tomorrow morning and see how much brighter the world would be. And why shouldn't you, we have a good town, yes, and with a good cheerful spirit we are going to make it better. Christmas is coming and you know there are lots of fine things in the world. Just try being cheerful and try to make the other fellow cheerful and see how much easier it is to bear the burdens of the day.

**A COMMUNITY SERVICE**

Of inestimable value to the community of South San Francisco is the Christmas Savings Club which is being put on by the Bank of South San Francisco.

Last Monday some \$16,000 was distributed from last year's Christmas club to the people of this city, according to bank officials. This means that a great service has been done to the community in not only improving its financial status at a time of the year when financial burdens are greatly increased but also from the phase that the centering of funds within the city, funds which if spent for Christmas gifts will be spent in local stores, makes it possible for a period of prosperity to be here that otherwise would to a large part be distributed to outside sources.

It is gratifying indeed to see a local institution provide such a workable means for improving the community's prosperity.

**"A Permanent Policy for Agriculture Must be Worked Out," Urges Senator Capper.**

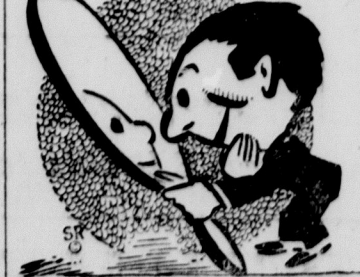
"The farmer needs a law which will actually aid him," Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas, head of the senate farm block believes. He claims that the tariff helps the manufacturer, immigration restriction helps labor, the Esch-Cummings act helps the railroads and the Federal Reserve act helps the banks, but that there is no comprehensive law upon the statute books that materially aids the farmer. "Despite marked improvements in the last year," he says, "we still have far to go before we can say agriculture is in a profitable condition. We have not reestablished the industry."

**Only Temporary Relief**  
 The farmer is encouraged by the temporary relief afforded by circumstances, and is paying off debts, but is not fooled by the future. Allowing for the recent change in price levels he can buy today with his dollar only about 80 per cent as much as he could get before the war, our best western economists say. And the most generous figures yet disclosed show he earns a net income of less than four per cent annually on his investment.

"Even in taxes farmers are not on an equality with other groups in our industrial life. The agricultural industry must be reconstructed and stabilized. A permanent policy for agriculture must be worked out, with the farmer himself a large factor in the program."

**WHO'S WHO IN THE DAYS NEWS**

**SIR AUSTEN CHAMBERLAIN**  
 The Most Noble Order of the Garter has been conferred upon Austen Chamberlain, Great Britain's secretary of state. King George conferred the honor upon him to mark the closing of the Locarno peace pact, which Chamberlain signed in behalf of Great Britain. He is the only knight of the order of the Garter who is not a peer or a king. The last person to be elevated to the order was the Earl of Balfour in 1922. Chamberlain arrived earlier than the rest of the guests at a tea which the English sovereigns gave after the signing ceremonies and the king formally invested him with the Order of the Garter and presented Mrs. Chamberlain with the insignia of Dame of the Grand Cross of the Order of the Empire.

Sir Austen is rated as one of England's greatest diplomats. Born in 1863, he was educated at Rugby, Trinity College and Cambridge. From 1895 to 1900 he was civil

lord of the admiralty. Later he held the post of financial secretary to the treasury, from which office he went to that of postmaster general. The duties of chamberlain of the exchequer and member of parliament were next to devolve upon him. Immediately prior to the World war he was chairman of the royal commission on Indian finance and currency and from 1919 to 1917 he was secretary of state for India, from which office he resigned to become a member of the war cabinet.

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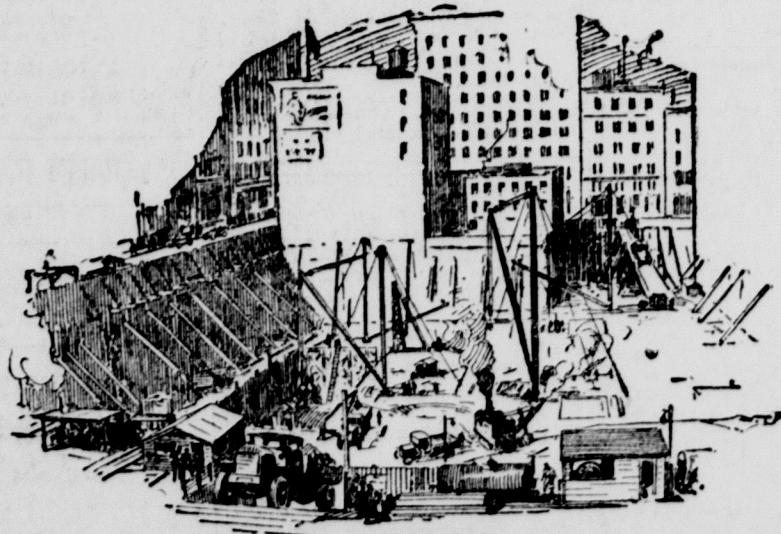
