LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL.

OFFICE OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CORPORATION COMMISSION.

RALEIGH, December 31, 1905.

His Excellency, R. B. Glenn,

Sir:—As required by law, we hand you herewith our annual report for the year 1905, being the seventh annual report of the North Carolina Corporation Commission. This report contains the law estab-. lishing the Corporation Commission, as revised and brought forward in the Revisal of 1905, and the laws pertaining to the Department enacted by the General Assembly of 1905; the tariffs and classifications of railroad and express companies in North Carolina, together with the rules and regulations of the Corporation Commission; cases disposed of by the Corporation Commission; the annual reports of fifty railroad companies, nine street railway companies, two telegraph companies, and the Southern Express Company, as of June 30, 1905; also reports of 236 State, private and savings banks of condition of business on the 9th day of November, 1905. This report also contains the assessment of all properties required to be assessed by the Corporation Commission and the distribution thereof to counties and municipalities, and the amount of incomes returned for taxation, with the amount of taxes computed thereon, and the distribution of same by counties.

RAILROADS.

There are within this State 3,859.09 miles of railroad, not including double and side-tracks—an increase over last year of 59 miles. Of our railroads, 2,839.51 miles are operated by the Southern Railway Company, Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company, and Seaboard Air Line Railway, divided as follows: Southern Railway Company, 1,279.56 miles; Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company, 947.83 miles; Seaboard Air Line Railway, 612.12 miles. Gross earnings

of railroads within the State were \$22,441,705; net earnings were \$8,470,483—an increase in gross earnings of \$2,053,765 and in net earnings of \$931,472 over last year. In the operation of railroads 15,877 persons were employed within the State. During the year 5,589,500 persons were transported within the State.

ACCIDENTS.

In the operation of trains 35 employees were killed and 492 injured; 5 passengers were killed and 143 injured; 74 other persons were killed and 152 injured.

Three hundred and eighty-seven complaints were made to the Commission during the year, the most of which have been disposed of. Some in which it was necessary to make further investigation are still pending. As the records of our office will show, these complaints were of great variety. A great many of them were for alleged failure of railroad companies to render proper service. For example: complaints were made for failure to keep passenger schedules; to bulletin arrival of trains; to furnish cars for shipment of freight; to transport freight, carload and less than carload, within a reasonable time after same was received; to deliver freight after its arrival at destination. In many cases these complaints were sustained by proof or admission of the carriers.

It was found that the cause of failure to keep passenger schedules as to through trains was, in many instances, that their connections had not been kept; and as to other trains, that they were delayed on account of failure of through trains to keep their schedules. Passenger service that is rendered by local trains which run upon their own schedule, or such trains as connect with but do not wait an unreasonable time on through trains, is more satisfactory. It may be that upon this idea the passenger service will be improved; if not, there will be a demand for more local trains to be run independent of connections.

The Atlantic Coast Line Company had passenger earnings of \$1,432,794; Seaboard Air Line Railway, \$879,667; Southern Railway Company, \$3,072,442 for the year ending June 30, 1905. It would seem that the traveling public ought to have better passenger service. We believe that our State is one of the exceptions in which railroads are required to furnish first and second class fares. This requirement, coupled with the further one that railroads shall furnish

separate accommodations for the races, requires so many cars as to make an unwieldy as well as more expensive train. We believe that if railroads were required to furnish one fare they could give better service and at less cost, and that the passenger fare should be reduced. The average amount received per passenger per mile of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company was 2.465 cents; Seaboard Air Line Railway, 2.327 cents; Southern Railway Company, 2.386 cents, for the year ending June 30, 1905. The average passenger earnings per mile of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company was \$1,426; Seaboard Air Line Railway, \$1,406; Southern Railway, owned lines, \$1,707; Southern Railway Company, leased lines, \$2,682; North Carolina Railroad, \$5,459; Atlanta and Charlotte Air Line Railway, \$5,514.

Complaints in regard to freight service will appear in detail in another part of this report. We will therefore only call attention to the following:

The furniture manufacturers at High Point complained that, although often requested to furnish cars for shipment of furniture, the Southern Railway had failed to do so; that there was at that time a demand of upwards of three hundred furniture cars; that goods had been sold, and unless cars could be had the contracts would be broken and might be cancelled, and that no penalty provided by law or damages which they could recover from the company would be an adequate remedy; that their damage in loss of trade could not enter into damages which they might recover, and yet this would be a great part of the threatened loss. This complaint was filed on the 29th day of July, 1905, and the Commission took the matter up with the Southern Railway Company and held a session at High Point on the first day of August, 1905, which session was attended by the manufacturers and shippers interested and by the traffic manager and other agents for the Southern Railway Company. At this session complainants succeeded in convincing the railroad officials of their urgent need of cars, and the railroad officials undertook very energetically to procure for complainants necessary cars, and what promised to be a serious car famine was averted.

Upon complaint of the truck growers at Faison and Mount Olive of inadequate shipping facilities, after notice to the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company, the Commission held a session at Faison on the 22d day of June, 1905. Complainants were present, but no rep-

resentative of the railroad company. It appeared that facilities for shipping truck were inadequate; that there was a great delay in placing same on the markets, and that complainants had been and still were suffering loss on account thereof. The Commission took the matter up with the officials of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company and secured a change of schedule, which, we have since been informed by some of the complainants, was of considerable advantage to them.

Complaint was made to the Commission by the Winston Tobacco Board of Trade and other citizens that the Southern Railway Company was not delivering their freight after arrival at Winston; that cars were not furnished for loading freight, and that there was unreasonable delay in transportation of both incoming and outgoing freights. After notice to the Southern Railway Company, the Commission held a session at Winston. Complainants were present; also the division superintendent and others representing the Southern Railway Company. It was admitted that most serious congestions had existed at Winston, but it was claimed, and correctly so, that this congestion in delivering freight had been, by unusual activity and energy, relieved after complaint was filed and before the hearing. It was stated that the principal cause of the congestion was the lack of yard facilities. The business had outgrown the facilities, and the Commission was assured that the Southern Railway intended to provide adequate yard facilities as soon as practicable. Until this is done, congestions will occur periodically, which will require additional shifting engines and force to relieve.

The other part of the complaint, as to failure to transport freight within a reasonable time, is, we regret to say, not confined to any part of the State, but is frequent on railroads and at many places. The enforcement of the penalty for this negligence, which would seem to be severe enough, has, we regret to say, not yet had the effect to arouse the railroads to proper diligence, nor does the penalty compensate for the loss sustained in many cases. If the seller cannot have his goods delivered with any regularity or certainty he will lose his customer, and it is in holding the trade rather than the delivery of a particular shipment that the shipper is especially interested. We have taken up each case called to our attention with the railroads and had same investigated, with the hope of placing the blame properly and thereby correcting the evil.

Feeling that several places in our State were discriminated against in interstate freights from Western and Northwestern points, we took the matter up with the Southern Railway and Norfolk and Western Railway, with the result that the Southern Railway agreed to reduce and did reduce materially certain rates to Asheville. The question of reduction to other points is still under consideration.

CASES IN COURT.

Only one appeal was taken from order of the Corporation Commission during this year, and that in case of Round Pine Lumber Company against the Seaboard Air Line Railway. This was a petition for a siding. The proceedings in the case are given elsewhere in this report. On appeal the order of the Commission was affirmed in the Superior and Supreme Courts of the State.

The case of Dennis-Simmons Lumber Company against the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company, to which we referred in our last report as pending in the Supreme Court, was tried at the February Term and the judgment of the Superior Court of Wilson County was reversed and the case was remanded. The Superior Court had held that the Corporation Commission did not have the power to make the order; so this case is now pending in the Wilson Superior Court.

The case of Southern Railway Company against Corporation Commissioners and the Greensboro Ice and Coal Company, referred to in our last report as pending in the United States Court, was in April decided in favor of the plaintiff, and as the matter was one of great importance to the State the case was carried by the Corporation Commission to the Supreme Court of the United States in order to have the decision reviewed. On motion, the case was advanced on the Supreme Court docket and set for hearing April 1, 1906. In our last report we endeavored to show the importance of this case in railroad regulation in North Carolina, and will not repeat what was there said. There is no provision in the Interstate Commerce Commission Act which authorizes the Interstate Commerce Commission to require railroads to construct side-tracks or to order cars placed on them for loading or unloading. So far, these matters have been left to the General Assembly of the State or such departments as the power was conferred on.

There is no necessity for Federal intervention in these matters as to interstate commerce. In many of the States, and even to some shippers and consignees in our own State, the Interstate Commerce Commission is too inaccessible for relief in such cases, and these are cases in which the State's action would in nowise encumber or hinder the Interstate Commerce Commission, but, on the contrary, would facilitate it.

Reference was made in our last annual report to the case just then heard in our Supreme Court—State upon the relation of the North Carolina Corporation Commission against the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company—in which the order of our Commission requiring the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company and Southern Railway Company to make connection at Selma in the afternoon of each day was affirmed. The Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company carried the case to the Supreme Court of the United States by writ of error, where the case is now pending. It is hoped that it will be reached and determined during the month of February. No supersedeas was issued, however, and the connection ordered was made on and since the 9th day of February, 1905. The method adopted by the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company of making this connection was by putting on a special train. Inasmuch as the jury found, on testimony offered in the trial in the Superior Court, that the operation of a special train from Rocky Mount to Selma would involve a loss, the Commission has required the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company to furnish statements from time to time showing revenue derived from this train and cost of operating same. It appears from this statement that during the ten months and nineteen days which this train was operated, up to and including December 31, 1905, 19,203 p'assengers were accommodated by it, and that the revenue derived therefrom was \$10,541.50, and that the visible cost of operation was \$8,848.16, showing, instead of a loss, a net profit of \$1,693.34. this train had been operated on return trip as passenger train, the revenue therefrom would have been greater, or if it had been credited with the amount earned on return trip in freight service the revenue would have been greater. As the Commission understands it, the whole expense of this train is charged to the passenger service from Rocky Mount to Smithfield, while the revenue derived by it from doing freight work is not credited to the earnings.

TELEPHONES.

The constant tendency is for the largest telephone company to absorb the smaller ones in our State, and this makes it important that the power to regulate the rates and supervise the service of this important class of *quasi* public corporations be made full and clear. Our statute is now very meagre. We respectfully recommend that the attention of the General Assembly be called to this matter.

BANKS.

The great progress going on in the industrial development in our State is reflected in the increase in number and resources in our banks. The number of State, private and savings banks in our State on the date of our last annual report was 192; now we have 236. The total resources of these banks, according to report of November 10, 1904, was \$31,604,183; the total resources of these banks, according to report of November 9, 1905, was \$41,095,539—an increase of \$9,491,356. The capital stock November 10, 1904, was \$4,935,504; November 9, 1905, \$5,656,815—an increase of \$721,311. Loans and discounts, November 10, 1904, \$20,759,830; November 9, 1905, \$25,278,000—an increase of \$4,518,696.

There were 50 National banks in North Carolina on October 30, 1905, with a capital stock of \$3,975,000. Five of these banks were organized during the year October 31, 1905, with a combined capital stock of \$475,000. On November 10, 1904, the total resources of these banks was \$25,389,809, while on November 9, 1905, it amounted to \$30,401,436.

In view of the large amounts of funds entrusted to them, and the further fact that a number of them have small capital stock, the Commissioners appreciate the great responsibility resting upon them in the supervision of State banks. By careful examination and report upon the condition of each bank, and criticism thereupon directed to the board of directors or other officers of the bank, we believe that much has been done to promote good banking in the State. We are pleased to say that in most instances the criticisms of the Commission were accepted and acted upon in good spirit.

Upon examination it was found that the business of the Bank of Benson had not been properly conducted, and time was given the bank to correct the irregularities; but, failing to put the bank in proper condition, the Commission ordered it closed, and Mr. J. F.

Lee, Benson, N. C., was appointed receiver by order of the Superior Court of Johnston County, and the same is now in process of liquidation.

The Bank Examiner discovered irregularities in the business of the Bank of Fayetteville in shortages which involved the cashier and teller, which were called to the attention of the board of directors, and time was allowed them to put the bank in proper condition. The board of directors, fearing a run on the bank, declined to avail themselves of the time allowed, and requested the Commission to have the examiner take charge of its assets and apply for a receiver, and this was done. Mr. R. T. Gray was appointed temporary receiver by order of the Superior Court of Cumberland County, but during the temporary receivership the affairs of the bank were thoroughly examined and arrangements were made to pay all the creditors, and the case was thus adjusted and settled. The bank was reorganized and resumed business.

John O. Ellington, Bank Examiner, resigned April 1, 1905, and John W. Aycock was elected to succeed him. He resigned on the 18th day of September, 1905, and F. J. Haywood, Jr., was elected to the position.

TAXES.

The total assessed value of all property assessed by the Corporation Commission for 1905 was \$75,373,333.

INCOME TAX.

By the last Revenue and Machinery Act, incomes subject to taxation were required to be listed with the Corporation Commission. Notwithstanding the rather complicated machinery provided for it, the amount of incomes returned in 1905 was \$2,798,895, against \$2,454,504 for the year 1904—an increase of \$344,391. Two thousand eight hundred and twenty-five persons listed incomes for taxation. No incomes were returned from the following twelve counties: Alexander, Ashe, Camden, Clay, Currituck, Dare, Graham, Haywood, Mitchell, Polk, Watauga and Yancey.

CORPORATION COMMISSION LAW.

BEING CHAPTER 20, REVISAL OF 1905, INCLUDING AMENDMENTS OF THE LEGISLATURE OF

I. COURT.

1054. COURT OF RECORD. There shall be a court of record, known as the "corporation commission." Such court shall adopt a seal, and shall have all of the powers and jurisdiction of a court of general jurisdiction as to all subjects embraced in this chapter. The members and clerk thereof may administer oaths. 1899, c. 164, ss. 1, 31.

1055. Number of commissioners. The court shall consist of three commissioners, who shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state, in the same manner as other state officers are elected. The court shall organize by the election of one of the commissioners as chairman. 1899, c. 164, s. 1.

1056. Term of office. The term of office of the commissioners shall begin on the first day of January next after their election, and shall continue for six years and until their successors are elected and qualified. One member of the court shall be elected at each general election. 1899, c. 164.

1057. VACANCY. If for any cause there shall be a vacancy in the commission, the governor shall appoint to such vacancy. Such appointee shall hold until the election and qualification of his successor, who shall be elected at the next general election, after the vacancy occurred. The person so elected shall hold office for the unexpired term. 1899, c. 164; 1901, c. 194.

1058. QUALIFICATION OF COMMISSIONERS. It shall be unlawful for any member or official of said court to jointly, severally, or in any other way, either directly or indirectly, hold any stock or bond, or be the agent, attorney or employee, or have any interest in any way, in any steamboat, railroad, canal, navigation, express, telegraph, telephone, bank or building and loan company, or association. If any member or official of said court shall, during the term of his office as distributee or legatee, or in any other way, have or become entitled to any stock or bonds or interest therein of any such company he shall

at once dispose of the same, and upon failure to do so shall forfeit his office, and may be suspended by the governor. 1899, c. 164.

1059. Oath of office. The members of the court, in addition to the oath to support the constitution and laws of the United States and the constitution and laws of the state of North Carolina, shall take, to be administered by one of the judges of the supreme court, the following oath of office, which oath shall be signed by such commissioners and attested by said judge and recorded in the office of the secretary of state: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I am not the owner of any steamboat or of any stock or bond of any railroad, navigation or canal company, express, telegraph or telephone company, or of any bank or building and loan association, or the agent or attorney or employee of any such company or association; that I have no interest in any way in any such company or association, and that I will well and faithfully execute the duties of my office as a member of the corporation commission and as state tax commissioner to the best of my knowledge and ability, without fear, favor, malice, reward or the hope of reward. So help me, God." 1899, c. 164, s. 1; 1903, c. 251, s. 3.

1060. Place of Meeting. The court shall be held in the city of Raleigh. Special sessions may be held at any place, in the state, when in the judgment of the court the convenience of all parties is best subserved and expense is thereby saved. 1899, c. 164, ss. 30, 31; 1901, c. 679, s. 4.

1061. OPEN AT ALL TIMES. The court shall be open at all times for the transaction of business, and each member shall devote his whole time to the discharge of the duties of his office, and it shall be his duty to remain in the office of the commission at least fifteen days in each month, unless detained therefrom on official business. 1899, c. 164, s. 30; 1903, c. 251, s. 3.

1062. Quorum. Any two members of the court shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The chairman is hereby authorized and empowered to perform the duties and exercise the powers conferred by law upon the corporation commission as to or over banks and building and loan associations, but this shall not prevent, as to banking and building and loan associations, the other members of the court from acting with the chairman in all of such matters. 1899, c. 164, s. 29.

1063. CLERK. The court shall appoint a clerk, who shall be an expert accountant, experienced in railroad statistics and transportation rates. His term of office shall be for two years. He shall take and subscribe to oaths of office similar to those prescribed for the commissioners. 1899, c. 164, ss. 9, 31.

II. INVESTIGATIONS.

1064. Examinations. The commissioners shall from time to time visit the places of business, and investigate the books and papers of all corporations, firms or individuals engaged in the transportation of freight or passengers, the transmission of messages either by telegraph or telephone, all public or private banks, loan and trust companies, and all building and loan associations, to ascertain if all the orders, rules and regulations of the corporation commission have been complied with, and shall have full power and authority to examine all officers, agents and employees of such companies, individuals, firms or corporations, and all other persons under oath or otherwise, and to compel the production of papers and the attendance of witnesses to obtain the information necessary for carrying into effect and otherwise enforcing the provisions

of this chapter, and the chapter entitled "Banks" and "Building and Loan Associations." 1899, c. 164, s. 1.

1065. RAILROAD ACCIDENTS. The commission may investigate the causes of any accident on a railroad or steamboat which it may deem to require investigation, and any evidence taken upon such investigation shall be reduced to writing, filed in the office of the commission, and be subject to public inspection. 1899, c. 164, s. 24.

III. Powers.

1066. General powers. The corporation commission shall have such general control and supervision of all railroad, street railway, steamboat, canal, express and sleeping car companies or corporations and of all other companies or corporations engaged in the carrying of freight or passengers, of all telegraph and telephone companies, of all public and private banks and all loan and trust companies or corporations, and of all building and loan associations or companies, necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this chapter, and the laws regulating such companies. 1899, c. 164; 1901, c. 679.

1067. WITNESSES; PRODUCTION OF PAPERS; CONTEMPT. The corporation commission shall have the same power to compel the attendance of witnesses, require the examination of persons and parties, and compel the production of books and papers, and punish for contempt, as by law is conferred upon the superior courts. 1899, c. 164, ss. 1, 9, 10.

1068. Rules of practice. The corporation commission shall prescribe rules of practice and procedure in all matters before it and in all examinations necessary to be made under this chapter. 1899, c. 164, s. 2, subsec. 24.

1069. Rules of evidence. In all cases under the provisions of this chapter the rules of evidence shall be the same as in civil actions, except as provided by this chapter. 1899, c. 164, s. 26.

1070. Subpænas, how issued; served. All subpænas for witnesses to appear before the commission or before any one or more of the commissioners, and notice to persons or corporations, shall be issued by one of the commissioners or its clerk and be directed to any sheriff, constable or to the marshal of any city or town who shall execute the same and make due return thereof as directed therein under the penalties prescribed by law for a failure to execute and return the process of any court. 1899, c. 164, s. 10.

1071. Service of orders. The clerk of the commission may serve any notice issued by it and his return thereof shall be evidence of said service; and it shall be the duty of the sheriffs and other officers to serve any process, subpænas and notices issued by the commissioners, and they shall be entitled therefor to the same fees as are prescribed by law for serving similar papers issuing from the superior court. 1899, c. 164, s. 9.

1072. Undertakings. All bonds or undertakings required to be given by any of the provisions of this chapter shall be payable to the state of North Carolina, and may be sued on as are other undertakings which are payable to the state. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

1073. Controversies may be submitted to commission. Whenever any company or corporation embraced in this chapter has a controversy with another corporation or person and all the parties to such controversy agree in writing to submit such controversy to the commission as arbitrators, the commission shall act as such, and after due notice to all parties interested shall proceed to hear the same, and their award shall be final. Such award in

cases where land or an interest in land is concerned shall immediately be certified to the clerk of the superior court of the county in which said land is situated and shall by such clerk be docketed in the judgment docket for such county, and from such docketing shall be a judgment of the superior court for such county. Parties may appear in person or by attorney before such arbitrators. 1899, c. 164, s. 25.

IV. APPEALS.

1074. RIGHT OF; HOW TAKEN. From all decisions or determinations made by the corporation commission any party affected thereby shall be entitled to an appeal. Before such party shall be allowed to appeal, he shall, within ten days after notice of such decision or determination, file with the commission exceptions to the decision or determination of the commission, which exceptions shall state the grounds of objection to such decision or determination. If any one of such exceptions shall be overruled, then such party may appeal from the order overruling the exception, and shall, within ten days after the decision overruling the exception, give notice of his appeal. When an exception is made to the facts as found by the commission, the appeal shall be to the superior court in term time; otherwise to the judge of the superior court at chambers. The party appealing shall, within ten days after the notice of appeal has been served, file with the commission exceptions to the decision or determination overruling the exception, which statement shall assign the errors complained of and the grounds of the appeal. Upon the filing of such statement the commission shall, within ten days, transmit all the papers and evidence considered by it, together with the assignment of errors filed by the appellant, to a judge of the superior court holding court or residing in some district in which such company operates or the party resides. If there be no exceptions to any facts as found by the commission, it shall be heard by the judge at chambers at some place in the district, of which all parties shall have ten days' notice. 1899, c. 164, ss. 7, 28; 1903, c. 126.

1075. APPEAL DOCKETED; PRIORITY OF TRIAL; BURDEN. The cause shall be entitled "State of North Carolina on relation of the Corporation Commission against (here insert name of appellant)," and if there are exceptions to any facts found by the commission, it shall be placed on the civil issue docket of such court and shall have precedence of other civil actions, and shall be tried under the same rules and regulations as are prescribed for the trial of other civil causes, except that the rates fixed or the decision or determination made by the commission shall be prima facie just and reasonable. 1899, c. 164, s. 7. Note. See s. 1112.

1076. Heard at chambers by consent of all parties the appeal may be heard and determined at chambers before any judge of a district through or into which the railroad may extend, or any judge holding court therein, or in which the person or company does business. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

1077. To supreme court. Either party may appeal to the supreme court from the judgment of the superior court under the same rules and regulations as are prescribed by law for appeals, except that the state of North Carolina if it shall appeal shall not be required to give any undertaking or make any deposit to secure the cost of such appeal, and such court may advance the cause on its docket so as to give the same a speedy hearing. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

1078. RATES VACATED PENDING APPEAL, How. The rates of freight and fare fixed by the commission shall be and remain the established rates and shall

be so observed and regarded by corporations appealing until the same shall be changed, reversed or modified by the judgment of the superior court, unless the railroad company shall within fifteen days file with said commission a justified undertaking, in a sum to be fixed by the commission, conditioned to pay the state of North Carolina the difference between the aggregate freights charged or received and those fixed by said commission, and to make a report of freights charged or received every three months during the pendency of such appeal; and whenever such difference in freights equals or exceeds the penalty of such undertaking the commission may require another to be executed and filed with them. From the time the undertaking first mentioned is filed the judgment appealed from shall be vacated; but a failure for ten days to file any additional undertaking required by the commission shall eo instanti revive such judgment. Out of the funds paid into the state treasury under this section there shall be refunded to shippers the overpaid freight ascertained by the final determination of the appeal on the recommendation of the commission, if application therefor is made within one year from such final determination. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

1079. Judgment superior court not vacated by appeals. Any freight or passenger rates fixed by the commission, when approved or confirmed by the judgment of the superior court, shall be and remain the established rates and shall be so observed and regarded by an appealing corporation until the same shall be changed, revised or modified by the final judgment of the supreme court, if there shall be an appeal thereto, and until changed by the corporation commission. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

1080. Judgment on appeal enforced by mandamus. In all cases in which, upon appeal, a judgment of the corporation commission is affirmed, in whole or in part, the appellate court shall embrace in its decree a mandamus to the appellant to put said order in force, or so much thereof as shall be affirmed. 1905, c. 107, s. 2.

1081. Peremptory mandamus to enforce order, when no appeal. If no appeal is taken from an order or judgment of the corporation commission within the time prescribed by law, but the corporation affected thereby fails to put said order in operation, the corporation commission may apply to the judge riding the superior court district which embraces Wake county, or to the resident judge of said district at chambers, upon ten days' notice, for a peremptory mandamus upon said corporation for the putting in force of said judgment or order; and if said judge shall find that the order of said commission was valid and within the scope of its powers, he shall issue such peremptory mandamus. An appeal shall lie to the supreme court in behalf of the corporation commission, or the defendant corporation, from the refusal or the granting of such peremptory mandamus. 1905, c. 107.

V. INJUNCTION.

1082. When granted; bond. No judge shall grant an injuction, restraining order or other process staying or affecting, during the pending of any appeal, the enforcement of any determination of the corporation commission fixing rates or fares, without requiring as a condition precedent the executing and filing with the corporation commission of a justified undertaking in the sum of not less than twenty-five thousand dollars for any company whose road is of less length than fifty miles, and fifty thousand dollars for any company

whose road is over fifty miles in length, conditioned that the company will make and file with the corporation commission a sworn statement every three months during the pending of the appeal of the items of freight, with names of shippers, carried over such company's road within the preceding ninety days, showing the freight charged and those fixed by the corporation commission; and in the event the determination of the corporation commission appealed from is affirmed in part or in whole such company shall within thirty days pay into the treasury of North Carolina the aggregate difference between the freights collected and those fixed by the final determination of the matter appealed. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

1083. Restraining order vacated, when. Whenever the aggregate difference between the freights collected and those fixed by the corporation commission shall equal or exceed the sum specified in the undertaking, the corporation commission shall notify the appellant that another justified undertaking in like sum and with the same conditions as the original undertaking is required to be executed and filed with the corporation commission. A failure to file with the corporation commission the sworn statement provided for in the preceding section, or any one of them when more than one is required or asked for, or a failure to give an additional undertaking when required within fifteen days from notice so to do, shall vacate and render null and void any restraining order, injunction or other process to stay the enforcement of any determination of the corporation commission as to schedules of rates. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

1084. Suits on injunction bond. When any of the conditions of such undertaking are broken it may be sued on and enforced in the name of the state of North Carolina on the relation of the corporation commission by summons returnable to the superior court of any county in the state at a regular term thereof. The solicitor of the district shall prosecute the action in his court on behalf of the state, and shall be allowed such fees, to be taxed in the bill of costs, as the court may order; and the attorney-general shall prosecute on appeal to the supreme court on behalf of the state and shall be allowed such fees, to be taxed in the bill of costs, as the court shall allow. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

1085. What recovered; application of recovery. In cases where the sworn statements herein required to be made are not made the whole penalty of the undertaking shall be enforced and paid into the state treasury. The sums paid into the treasury under the provisions of this section shall be used to reimburse the shippers of freights for the excess of freights paid over what should have been paid, such reimbursements to be made on recommendation of the corporation commission: Provided, application therefor is made within one year after the determination of the appeal in which the undertaking was given. The recovery in each undertaking shall be applied to such excess of freights as has been paid during the period covered by such undertaking. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

VI. PENALTIES.

1086. For violating rules. If any railroad company doing business in this state by its agents or employees shall be guilty of a violation of the rules and regulations provided and prescribed by the commission, and if after due notice of such violation given to the principal officers thereof, if residing in the state, or, if not, to the manager or superintendent or secretary or treasurer if residing in the state, or if not then to any local agent thereof, ample and full

recompense for the wrong or injury done thereby to any person or corporation as may be directed by the commission shall not be made within thirty days from the time of such notice, such company shall incur a penalty for each offense of five hundred dollars. 1899, c. 164, s. 15.

1087. Refusing to obey orders of commission. Any railroad or other corporation which violates any of the provisions of this chapter or refuses to conform to or obey any rule, order or regulation of the corporation commission shall, in addition to the other penalties prescribed in this chapter, forfeit and pay the sum of five hundred dollars for each offense, to be recovered in an action to be instituted in the superior court of Wake county, in the name of the state of North Carolina on the relation of the corporation commission; and each day such company continues to violate any provision of this chapter or continues to refuse to obey or perform any rule, order or regulation prescribed by the corporation commission shall be a separate offense. 1899, c. 164, s. 23.

1088. Discrimination between connecting lines. All common carriers subject to the provisions of this chapter shall according to their powers afford all reasonable, proper and equal facilities for the interchange of traffic between their respective lines and for the forwarding and delivering of passengers and freights to and from their several lines and those connecting therewith, and shall not discriminate in their rates and charges against such connecting lines, and connecting lines shall be required to make as close connection as practicable for the convenience of the traveling public. And common carriers shall obey all rules and regulations made by the commission relating to trackage. 1899, c. 164, s. 21.

1089. Failure to make reports. Every officer, agent or employee of any railroad company, express or telegraph company who shall wilfully neglect or refuse to make and furnish any report required by the commission for the purposes of this chapter, or who shall wilfully or unlawfully hinder, delay or obstruct the commission in the discharge of the duties hereby imposed upon it, shall forfeit and pay five hundred dollars for each offense, to be recovered in an action in the name of the state. A delay of ten days to make and furnish such report shall raise the presumption that the same was wilful. 1899, c. 164, s. 18.

1090. General offenses. If any railroad company shall violate the provisions of this chapter not otherwise provided for, such railroad company shall incur a penalty of one hundred dollars for each violation, to be recovered by the party injured. 1899, c. 164, s. 17.

1091. VIOLATION OF RULES, CAUSING INJURY; DAMAGES; LIMITATION. If any railroad company doing business in this state shall, in violation of any rule or regulation provided by the commission, inflict any wrong or injury on any person, such person shall have a right of action and recovery for such wrong or injury, in any court having jurisdiction thereof, and the damages to be recovered shall be the same as in an action between individuals, except that in case of wilful violation of law such railroad company shall be liable to exemplary damages: Provided, that all suits under this chapter shall be brought within one year after the commission of the alleged wrong or injury. 1899, c. 164, s. 16.

1092. ACTION FOR, WHEN AND HOW BROUGHT. An action for the recovery of any penalty under this chapter shall be instituted in the county in which the penalty has been incurred, and shall be instituted in the name of the state of North Carolina on the relation of the corporation commission against the com-

pany incurring such penalty; or whenever such action is upon the complaint of any injured person or corporation, it shall be instituted in the name of the state of North Carolina on the relation of the corporation commission upon the complaint of such injured person or corporation against the company incurring such penalty. Such action shall be instituted and prosecuted by the attorney general or the solicitor of the judicial district in which such penalty has been incurred, and the judge before whom the same is tried shall determine the amount of compensation to be allowed the attorney general or such solicitor prosecuting said action for his services, and such compensation so determined shall be taxed as part of the cost. The procedure in such actions, the right of appeal and the rules regulating appeals shall be the same as are now provided by law in other civil actions. 1899, c. 164, s. 15.

1093. Remedies cumulative. The remedies given by this chapter to persons injured shall be regarded as cumulative to the remedies now given or which may be given by law against railroad corporations, and this chapter shall not be construed as repealing any statute giving such remedies. 1899, c. 164, s. 26.

VII. JURISDICTION.

1094. Delivering freight, express and baggage. The corporation commission shall make reasonable and just rules—

- 1. For the handling of freight and baggage at stations.
- 2. As to charges by any company or corporation engaged in the carriage of freight or express for the necessary handling and delivery of the same at all stations. 1899, c. 164, s. 2, subsecs. 2, 7.

1095. Prevent discriminations. The corporation commission shall make reasonable and just rules and regulations—

- 1. To prevent discrimination in the transportation of freight or passengers.
- 2. To prevent the giving, paying or receiving of any rebate or bonus, directly or indirectly, or the misleading or deceiving the public in any manner as to real rates charged for freight, express or passengers. 1899, c. 164, s. 2, subsecs. 3, 5.

1096. TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE RATES. The commission shall have power and are directed to make just and reasonable rates of charges for the transmission of messages by any telegraph or telephone company or corporation doing business in this state, and for the rental of telephones. 1899, c. 164, s. 2, subsecs. 10, 11.

1097. Stations and depots. The commission is empowered and directed—

- 1. To require, where the public necessity demands and it is demonstrated that the revenue received will be sufficient to justify it, the establishment of stations by any company or corporation engaged in the transportation of freight and passengers in this state, and to require the erection of depot accommodations commensurate with such business and revenue: Provided, the commissioners shall not require any company or corporation to establish any station nearer to another station than five miles. 1899, c. 164, s. 2, subsec. 12.
- 2. To require a change of any station or the repairing, addition to, or change of any station house by any railroad or other transportation company in order to promote the security, convenience and accommodation of the public and to require the raising or lowering of the track at any crossing when deemed necessary. 1899, c. 164, s. 2, subsec. 13.

- 3. To require when practicable, and when the necessities of the case, in the judgment of the corporation commission, require, any two or more railroads which now or hereafter may enter any city or town to have one common or union passenger depot for the security, accommodation and convenience of traveling public, and to unite in the joint undertaking and expense of erecting, constructing and maintaining such union passenger depot, commensurate with the business and revenues of such railroad companies or corporation, on such terms, regulations, provisions and conditions as the commission shall prescribe. The railroads so ordered to construct a union depot shall have power to condemn land for such purpose, as in case of locating and constructing a line of cailroad: Provided, that nothing in this section shall be construed to authorize the commission to require the construction of such union depot should the railroad companies at the time of application for said order have separate depots, which, in the opinion of the corporation commission, are adequate and convenient and offer suitable accommodations for the traveling public. 1903, c. 126.
- 4. To require the establishment of separate waiting rooms at all stations for the white and colored races. 1899, c. 164, s. 2, subsec. 14.
- 5. To require the construction of side tracks by any railroad company to industries already established or to be established: Provided, it is shown that the proportion of such revenue accruing to such side track is sufficient within five years to pay the expenses of its construction. This shall not be construed to give the commission authority to require railroad companies to construct side tracks more than five hundred feet in length. 1899, c. 164, s. 2, subsec. 15.

1098. Depots not abandoned. A railroad corporation which has established and maintained for a year a passenger station or freight depot at a point upon its road shall not abandon such station or depot, nor substantially diminish the accommodation furnished by the stopping of trains except by consent of the commission. Freight or passenger depots may be relocated upon the written approval of the commission. 1899, c. 164, ss. 19, 20.

1099. Freight and passenger rates. The commission shall make reasonable and just rates—

- 1. Of freight, passenger and express tariffs for railroads, street railways, steamboats, canal and express companies or corporations, and all other transportation companies or corporations engaged in the carriage of freight, express or passengers:
 - 2. For the through transportation of freight, express or passengers.
- 3. Of charges for the transportation of packages by any express company or corporation.
 - 4. Of charges for the use of railroad cars carrying freight or passengers.
- 5. And rules and regulations as to contracts entered into by any railroad company or corporation to carry over its line or any part thereof the car or cars of any other company or corporation.
- 6. And shall make, require or approve what is known as "milling-in-transit" rates on grain; or lumber to be dressed and shipped over the line of the rail-road company on which such freight originated.
- 7. And, conjointly with such railroad companies, shall have authority to make special rates for the purpose of developing all manufacturing, mining, milling and internal improvements in the state.

Nothing in this chapter shall prohibit railroad or steamboat companies from making special passenger rates with excursion or other parties, also rates on

such freights as are necessary for the comfort of such parties, subject to the approval of the commission. 1899, c. 164, ss. 2, 14; 1903, c. 683.

1100. Demurrage; storage; placing and loading of cars. The commission shall make rules, regulations and rates governing demurrage and storage charges by railroad companies and other transportation companies; and shall make rules governing railroad companies in the placing of cars for loading and unloading and in fixing time limit for delivery of freights after the same have been received by the transportation companies for shipment. 1903, c. 342.

MAY FIX RATE OF SPEED TRAINS MAY RUN THROUGH A TOWN; PETITION TO BE FILED; PROCEDURE. If any railroad company shall be of the opinion that an ordinance of a city or town through which a line of its railroad passes, except in the counties of Cumberland, Rockingham, Union and Wayne, regulating the speed at which trains may run while passing through said city or town, is unreasonable or oppressive, such railroad company may file its petition before the corporation commission, setting forth all the facts, and asking relief against such ordinance, and that the corporation commission prescribe the rate of speed at which trains may run through said municipality. Upon the filing of the petition a copy thereof shall be mailed, in a registered letter, to the mayor or chief officer of the town or municipality, together with a notice from the corporation commission, setting forth that on a day named in the notice the petition of the railroad company will be heard, and that the city or town named in the petition will be heard at that time in opposition to the prayer of the petition. And upon the return day of the notice the corporation commission shall hear the petition: Provided, that any hearing granted by the corporation commission, as authorized by this section, shall be had at the town, city or locality where the conditions complained of are alleged to exist, or some member of the said commission shall take evidence both for the petition and against it, at such city, town or locality, and report to the full commission before any decision is made by the commission. 1903, c. 552.

1102. To pass on ordinance, and fix rate of speed. Either party, petitioner or respondent, shall have the right to introduce testimony and to be heard by counsel, and the corporation commission, after hearing the petition, answer, evidence and argument, shall render judgment thereon. If the commission shall find that such ordinance is reasonable and just the petition shall be dismissed, and the petitioner shall pay all the costs to be taxed by the clerk to the corporation commission. If the corporation commission shall be of the opinion that the ordinance is unreasonable, it shall so adjudge; and in addition thereto it shall prescribe the maximum rates of speed for passing through such town. And thereafter the railroad company may run its trains through such town or city at speeds not greater than those prescribed by the corporation commission, and the ordinance adjudged to be unreasonable shall not be enforced against such railroad company. 1903, c. 552, s. 2.

1103. When costs on hearing to fix rate of speed in discretion of commission. If the judgment of the corporation commission shall be in favor of the petitioner, it shall be lawful for the corporation commission to make such order as to the payment of the costs as shall seem just. It may require either party to pay the same or it may divide the same. The costs in such proceeding shall be the same as are fixed by law for similar services in the superior court. 1903, c. 552, s. 3.

VIII. RATES.

1104. How fixed. In fixing any maximum rate or charge, or tariff of rates or charges for any common carrier, person or corporation subject to the provisions of this chapter the commission shall take into consideration if proved, or may require proof of, the value of the property of such carrier, person or corporation used for the public in the consideration of such rate or charge or the fair value of the service rendered in determining the value of the property so being used for the convenience of the public. It shall furthermore consider the original cost of the construction thereof and the amount expended in permanent improvements thereon and the present compared with the original cost of construction of all its property within the state; the probable earning capacity of such property under the particular rates proposed and the sum required to meet the operating expenses of such carrier, person or corporation and all other facts that will enable them to determine what are reasonable and just rates, charges and tariffs. 1899, c. 164, s. 2, subsec. 1.

1105. What may be carried free. Nothing in this chapter shall prevent the carriage, storage or handling of property free or at reduced rates for the United States, states or municipal governments or for charitable or educational purposes; or for any corporation or association incorporated for the preservation and adornment of any historic spot, or to the employees or officers of such company or association while traveling in the performance of their duties, provided they shall not travel further than ten miles one way on any one trip free of charge, or to or from fairs or exhibitions for exhibition thereat; or the free carriage of destitute and homeless persons transported by charitable societies, and the necessary agents employed in such transportation, or the free transportation of persons traveling in the interest of orphan asylums or homes for the aged and infirm, or any department thereof, or ex-Confederate soldiers attending annual reunions, or the issuance of mileage, excursion or commutation passenger tickets; or to prohibit any common carrier from giving reduced rates to ministers of religion, or to municipal governments for the transportation of indigent persons, or to inmates of national homes or state homes for disabled volunteer soldiers, and of soldiers' and sailors' orphan homes, including those about to enter and those returning home after discharge under arrangements with the boards of managers of said homes; or to prevent railroads from giving free carriage to their own officers and employees and members of their families, or to prevent the principal officers of any railroad company from exchanging passes or tickets with other railroad companies for their officers or employees. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent or restrict transportation companies from contracting with newspapers for advertising space in exchange for transportation over their lines to such an extent as may be agreed upon between the two parties for said consideration. The commissioners and their clerks shall be transported free of charge over all railroads and other transportation lines which are under the supervision of the commission; and when traveling on official business they may take with them experts or other agents whose service they may deem temporarily of public importance. 1899, c. 164, s. 22; 1899, c. 642; 1901, c. 679; s. 2; 1901, c. 652; 1905, c. 312.

1106. Revision of rates. The commission shall from time to time, and as often as circumstances may require, change and revise or cause to be changed and revised any schedules of rates fixed by the commission, or allowed to be

charged by any carrier of freight, passengers, or express, or by any telegraph or telephone company. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

1107. Long and short hauls. It shall be unlawful for any common carrier to charge or receive any greater compensation in the aggregate for the transportation of passengers or of like kind of property under substantially similar circumstances and conditions for a shorter than for a longer distance over the same line in the same direction, the shorter being included within the longer distance; but this shall not be construed as authorizing any common carrier within the terms of this chapter to charge and receive as great compensation for a shorter as for a longer distance: Provided, however, that upon application to the commission, such common carrier may in special cases be authorized to charge less for longer than for shorter distances for the transportation of passengers or property; and the commission may from time to time prescribe the extent to which such designated common carrier may be relieved from the operation of this section: Provided, that nothing in this chapter contained shall be taken as in any manner abridging or controlling the rates of freight charged by any railroad in this state for conveying freight which comes from or goes beyond the boundaries of the state and on which freight less than local rates on any railroad carrying the same are charged by such railroads. 1899, c. 164, s. 14.

1108. Contracts as to rates of freight and passenger tariffs shall be submitted to the commission for inspection and correction, that it may be seen whether or not they are a violation of law or of the rules and regulations of said commission, and all arrangements and agreements whatever as to the division of earnings of any kind by competing railroad companies shall be submitted to the commission for inspection and approval in so far as they affect the rules and regulations made by the commission to secure to all persons doing business with such companies just and reasonable rates of freight and passenger tariffs, and the commission may make such rules and regulations as to such contracts and agreements as may then be deemed necessary and proper, and any such agreements not approved by the commission, or by virtue of which rates shall be charged exceeding the rates fixed for freight and passengers, shall be deemed, held and taken to be violations of this chapter and shall be illegal and void. 1899, c. 164, s. 6.

1109. Published. All carriers shall, whenever required by the commission, file with it a schedule of the rates of charges for freight and passengers, and the commission is authorized and required to publish the rates, or a summary thereof, in some convenient form for the information of the public, and quarterly thereafter the changes made in such schedules if they deem it advisable. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

1110. Interstate commerce. Upon the complaint of any person to the commission of any unjust discrimination in carrying freight which comes from or goes beyond the boundaries of the state by any railroad company, whether organized under the laws of this state or of another state and doing business in this state, the commission shall investigate such complaint, and if the same be sustained it shall be the duty of the commission to bring such complaint before the interstate commerce commission for redress in accordance with the provisions of the act of Congress establishing the interstate commerce commission. They shall receive upon application the services of the attorney gen-

eral of the state and he shall represent them before the interstate commerce commission. 1899, c. 164, s. 14.

1111. Duplicate freight receipts; charges stated; freight delivered on payment of charges. All railroad companies shall on demand issue duplicate freight receipts to shippers in which shall be stated the class or classes of freight shipped, the freight charges over the road giving the receipt, and so far as practicable shall state the freight charges over the roads that carry such freight. When the consignee presents the railroad receipt to the agent of the railroad that delivers such freight such agent shall deliver the articles shipped upon payment of the rate charged for the class of freight mentioned in the receipt. 1899, c. 164, s. 17.

1112. Schedule of rates, evidence. The schedule containing rates fixed by the commission shall, in suits brought against any company wherein is involved the charges of any company for the transportation of any passenger or freight or cars or unjust discrimination in relation thereto, be taken in all courts as prima facie evidence that the rates therein fixed are just and reasonable rates of charges for the transportation of passengers and freights and cars upon the railroads. All such schedules shall be received and held in all suits as prima facie evidence, the schedules of the commission without further proof than the production of the schedules desired to be used as evidence, with a certificate of the clerk of the commission that the same is a true copy of the schedule prepared or approved by it for the railroad company or corporation therein named. 1899, c. 164, s. 7.

IX. Duties.

1113. Notice given of violations; suits instituted. The commission, whenever in its judgment any corporation has violated any law, shall give notice thereof in writing to such corporation, and, if the violation or neglect is continued after such notice shall forthwith present the facts to the attorney general, who shall take such proceedings thereon as he may deem expedient. 1899, c. 164, s. 8.

1114. FEES PAID TO TREASURER. All license fees and seal tax and all other fees paid into the office of the corporation commission shall be turned into the state treasury; also all moneys received from fines and penalties. 1899, c. 164, ss. 33, 26.

1115. RECORD OF RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS. The commission shall keep a record showing in detail all receipts and disbursements. 1899, c. 164, s. 34.

1116. FISCAL YEAR. The fiscal year for which all reports shall be made which may be required of any railroad or transportation company by the commission under this chapter shall end on the thirtieth of June. 1899, c. 164, s. 28.

1117. Report of commission. It shall be the duty of the commission to make to the governor annual reports of its transactions, and recommend from time to time such legislation as it may deem advisable under the provisions of this chapter, and the governor shall have one thousand copies of such report printed for distribution. 1899, c. 164, s. 27.

1118. Expenses. All the expenses of the commission, except as otherwise provided by law, including all necessary expenses for transportation incurred by the commissioners or by their employees under their orders in making any investigation, or upon official business, or for any other purposes necessary

for carrying out the provisions of this chapter, and necessary furniture, stationery, postage, lights and heat, shall be allowed, and the auditor shall issue his warrant upon presentation of itemized vouchers therefor approved by the chairman of the commission: Provided, that the expenses allowed under this section shall not exceed three thousand six hundred dollars annually. 1899, c. 164, s. 32; 1899, c. 688.

2600. MAP OF RAILROAD MADE AND FILED. Every railroad corporation shall, within a reasonable time after their road shall be constructed, cause to be made a map and profile thereof, and of the land taken or obtained for the use thereof, and file the same in the office of the corporation commission. Every such map shall be drawn on a scale and on paper to be designated by the corporation commission, and certified and signed by the president or engineer of such corporation. Code, s. 1977; 1871-2, c. 138, s. 41.

2614. Fast mail trains authorized; one train a day in each direction required. The corporation commission is hereby empowered, whenever it shall appear wise and proper to do so, to authorize any railroad company to run one or more fast mail trains over its road, which shall only stop at such stations on the line of the road as may be designated by the company: Provided, that in addition to such fast mail train said railroad shall run at least one passenger train in each direction over its road on every day except Sunday, which shall stop at every station on the road at which passengers may wish to be taken up or put off: Provided further, that nothing in this section shall be construed as preventing the running of local passenger trains on Sunday. 1893, c. 97.

2615. Vestibule fronts on street rallway cars. All street passenger railway companies shall use vestibule fronts, of frontage not less than four feet, on all passenger cars run by them on their lines during the latter half of the month of November and during the months of December, January, February and March of each year: Provided, that such companies shall not be required to close the sides of the vestibules: Provided further, such companies may use cars without vestibule fronts in cases of temporary emergency in suitable weather, not to exceed four days in any one month within the period herein prescribed for use of vestibule fronts. The corporation commission is hereby authorized to make exemptions from the provisions of this section in such cases as in their judgment the enforcement of this section is unnecessary. 1901, c. 743.

2616. Street railways to have fenders in front of passenger cars. All street passenger railway companies shall use practical fenders in front of all passenger cars run by them. The corporation commission is hereby authorized to make exemptions from the provision of this section in such cases as in their judgment the enforcement of this section is unnecessary. 1901, c. 743, s. 2.

2618. First and second class accommodations. All railroad companies shall furnish first and second class passenger accommodations. 1899, c. 384, s. 4.

2619. Separate accommodations for different races. All railroad and steamboat companies engaged as common carriers in the transportation of passengers for hire, other than street railways, shall provide separate but equal

accommodations for the white and colored races at passenger stations or waiting rooms, and also on all trains and steamboats carrying passengers. Such accommodations may be furnished by railroad companies either by separate passenger cars or by compartments in passenger cars, which shall be provided by the railroads under the supervision and direction of the corporation commission: Provided, that this shall not apply to relief trains in cases of accident, to Pullman or sleeping cars, or through express trains that do not stop at all stations and are not used ordinarily for traveling from station to station, to negro servants in attendance on their employers, to officers or guards, transporting prisoners, nor to prisoners so transported. 1899, c. 384; 1901, c. 213.

2620. Corporation commission may exempt certain roads and trains. The corporation commission is hereby authorized to exempt from the provisions of the preceding section steamboats, branch lines and narrow-gauged railroads and mixed trains carrying both freight and passengers, if in its judgment the enforcement of the same be unnecessary to secure the comfort of passengers by reason of the light volume of passenger traffic, or the small number of colored passenger travelers on such steamboats, narrow-gauge, branch lines or mixed trains. 1899, c. 384, s. 2; 1901, c. 213.

2621. When two races put in same coach. When any coach or compartment car for either race shall be completely filled at a station where no extra coach or car can be had, and the increased number of passengers could not be foreseen, the conductor in charge of such train may assign and set apart a portion of a car or compartment assigned for passengers of one race to passengers of the other race. 1899, c. 384, s. 3.

2622. Penalty for failing to provide separate cars. Any railroad company failing to comply in good faith with the provisions of the three preceding sections shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars per day, to be recovered in an action brought against such company by any passenger on any train or boat of any railroad or steamboat company which is required by this chapter to furnish separate accommodations to the races, who has been furnished accommodations on such railroad train or steamboat in only a car or compartment with a person of a different race in violation of law. 1899, c. 384, s. 5.

2630. Freight rates posted. It shall be the duty of all railroad and other transportation companies to keep posted in a conspicuous place in their depots or places where freight is received for shipment a list of its charges for carrying freight, specifying name of place, class of freight and charge for carrying the same. Such charges shall not be increased without giving fifteen days' notice, and the company represented by any agent refusing to comply with this section shall be liable to a penalty of not less than fifty nor more than one hundred dollars. Code, s. 1965; 1879, c. 182, s. 2.

2631. Penalty for failure to receive. Agents or other officers of railroads and other transportation companies whose duty it is to receive freights shall receive all articles of the nature and kind received by such company for transportation whenever tendered at a regular depot, station, wharf or boat landing, and every loaded car tendered at a sidetrack, or any warehouse connected with the railroad by a siding, and shall forward the same by the route selected by the person tendering the freight under existing laws; and the transportation company represented by any person refusing to receive such freight shall forfeit and pay to the party aggrieved the sum of fifty dollars for each day said company refuses to receive said shipment of freight, and all

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damages actually sustained by reason of the refusal to receive freight. If such loaded car be tendered at any siding or workhouse at which there is no agent, notice shall be given to an agent at the nearest regular station at which there is an agent that such car is loaded and ready for shipment. Code, s. 1964; 1903, cc. 444, 693.

2632. FAILURE TO TRANSPORT IN REASONABLE TIME; REASONABLE TIME DEFINED; FORFEITURE. It shall be unlawful for any railroad company, steamboat company, express company or other transportation company doing business in this state to omit or neglect to transport within a reasonable time any goods, merchandise or articles of value received by it for shipment and billed to or from any place in the state of North Carolina, unless otherwise agreed upon between the company and the shipper or unless same be burned, stolen or otherwise destroyed, or unless otherwise provided by the North Carolina corporation commission. Each and every company violating any of the provisions of this section shall forfeit to the party aggrieved the sum of twenty-five dollars for the first day and five dollars for each succeeding day of such unlawful detention or neglect where such shipment is made in carload lots, and in less quantities there shall be a forfeiture in like manner of twelve and fifty one-hundredth dollars for the first day and two and fifty one-hundredth dollars for each succeeding day: Provided, the forfeiture shall not be collected for a period exceeding thirty days. In reckoning what is reasonable time for such transportation it shall be considered that such transportation company has transported freight within a reasonable time if it has done so in the ordinary time required for transporting such articles of freight between the receiving and shipping stations; and a delay of two days at the initial point and fortyeight hours at one intermediate point for each hundred miles of distance or fractions thereof over which said freight is to be transported shall not be charged against such transportation company as unreasonable and shall be held to be prima facie reasonable, and a failure to transport within such time shall be held prima facie unreasonable. 1903, c. 590, s. 3; 1905, c. 545.

2633. Paid at classified rates; penalty for overcharge. All common carriers doing business in this state shall settle their freight charges according to the rate stipulated in the bill of lading, provided the rate therein stipulated be in conformity with the classifications and rates made and filed with the interstate commerce commission in case of shipments from without the state and with those of the corporation commission of this state in case of shipments wholly within this state, by which classifications and rates all consignees shall in all cases be entitled to settle freight charges with such carriers; and it shall be the duty of such common carriers to inform any consignee or consignees of the correct amount due for freight according to such classification and rates, and upon payment or tender of the amount due on any shipment which has arrived at its destination according to such classification and rates such common carrier shall deliver the freight in question to consignee or consignees, and any failure or refusal to comply with the provisions hereof shall subject such carrier so failing or refusing to a penalty of fifty dollars for each such failure or refusal, to be recovered by any consignee or consignees aggrieved by any suit in any court of competent jurisdiction. 1905, c. 330.

2634. Time within which loss or damage must be paid; penalty; amount of recovery; actions united; remedy cumulative. Every claim for loss of or damage to property while in possession of a common carrier shall be adjusted and paid within sixty days in case of shipments wholly within this state, and

within ninety days in case of shipments from without the state, after the filing of such claim with the agent of such carrier at the point of destination of such shipment or point of delivery to another common carrier: Provided, that no such claim shall be filed until after the arrival of the shipment, or of some part thereof, at the point of destination, or until after the lapse of a reasonable time for the arrival thereof. In every case such common carrier shall be liable for the amount of such loss or damage, together with interest thereon from the date of the filing of the claim therefor until the payment thereof. Failure to adjust and pay such claim within the periods respectively herein prescribed shall subject each common carrier so failing to a penalty of fifty dollars for each and every such failure, to be recovered by any consignee aggrieved in any court of competent jurisdiction: Provided, that unless such consignee recover in such action the full amount claimed, no penalty shall be recovered, but only the actual amount of the loss or damage, with interest as aforesaid. Causes of action for the recovery of the possession of the property shipped, for loss or damage thereto and for the penalties herein provided for may be united in the same complaint. 1905, c. 330, ss. 2, 4, 5.

2635. Existing remedies continue. The preceding section shall not deprive any consignee of any rights or remedies now existing against common carriers in regard to freight charges or claims for loss or damage to freight, but shall be deemed and held as creating an additional liability upon said common carrier. 1905, c, 330, s, 5.

2636. Carrier's right against other carrier. Any common carrier, upon complying with the provisions of the two preceding sections, shall have all the rights and remedies herein provided for against a common carrier from which it receives the freight in question. 1905, c. 330, s. 3.

2641. Charges on partial freight deliveries. Whenever any freight of any kind shall be received by any common carrier in this state to be delivered to any consignee in this state, and a portion of the same shall not have been received at the place of destination, it shall not be lawful for the carrier to demand any part of the charges for freight or transportation due for such portion of the shipment as shall not have reached the place of destination. The carrier shall be required to deliver to the consignee such portion of the consignment as shall have been received upon the payment or tender of the freight charges due upon such portion. But nothing in this section shall be construed as interfering with, or depriving a consignor, or other person having authority, of his rights of stoppage in transitu. 1893, c. 495.

2642. Not to receive more than tariff rate. No railroad, steamboat, express or other transportation company engaged in the carriage of freight, and no telegraph company or telephone company shall demand, collect or receive for any service rendered or to be rendered in the transportation of property or transmission of messages, more than the rates appearing in the printed tariff of such company in force at the time such service is rendered, or more than is allowed by law. 1903, c. 590.

2643. Overcharge on tariff rates refunded. In case of any overcharge, contrary to the preceding section, the person aggrieved may file with any agent of the company collecting or receiving greater compensation than the amount allowed in the preceding section a written demand, supported by a paid freight bill and an original bill of lading or duplicate thereof for refund of overcharge, and a maximum period of sixty days shall be allowed such company to pay claims filed under this section. 1903, c. 590, s. 2.

2644. Penalty for failure to refund overcharge. Any company failing to refund such overcharge, within the time allowed, shall forfeit to the party aggrieved the sum of twenty-five dollars for the first day and five dollars per day for each day's delay thereafter until said overcharge is paid, together with all costs incurred by the party aggrieved: Provided, the total forfeiture shall not exceed one hundred dollars. 1963, c. 590, s. 2.

DISCRIMINATION IN CHARGES. If any common carrier shall directly or indirectly by any special rate, rebate, drawback or other device, charge, demand, collect or receive from any person a greater or less compensation for any service rendered or to be rendered in the transportation of passengers or property subject to the provisions of law than it charges, demands or collects or receives from any other person or persons for doing for him or them a like and contemporaneous service in the transportation of a like kind of traffic under substantially similar circumstances and conditions; or shall make or give any undue or unreasonable preference or advantage to any particular person, company, firm, corporation or locality, or any particular description of traffic in any respect whatsoever, or shall subject any particular person, company, firm, corporation or locality or any particular description of traffic to any undue or unreasonable prejudice or disadvantage in any respect whatsoever, such person or corporation shall be upon conviction thereof fined not less than one thousand nor more than five thousand dollars for each and every offense. 1899, c. 164, s. 13.

3751. DISCRIMINATION AGAINST CONNECTING LINES. If any common carrier shall not afford all reasonable, proper and equal facilities for the interchange of traffic between their respective lines and for the forwarding and delivering of passengers and freights to and from their several lines and those connecting therewith, or shall discriminate in their rates and charges against such connecting lines, or if any connecting lines shall not make as close connection as practicable for the convenience of the traveling public, or shall not obey all rules and regulations made by the corporation commission relating to trackage, it shall be punished by a fine of not less than five hundred dollars nor exceeding five thousand dollars for each and every offense. 1899, c. 164, s. 21.

3762. Pooling freights. If any person shall be concerned in pooling freights or shall directly or indirectly allow or accept rebates on freights he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than one thousand dollars or imprisoned not less than twelve months. Code, s. 1968; 1879, c. 237, s. 2.

3768. Unreasonable rates. If any railroad doing business in this state shall charge, collect, demand or receive more than a fair and reasonable rate of toll or compensation for the transportation of passengers or freight of any description, or for the use and transportation of any railroad car upon its track or any of the branches thereof or upon any railroad in this state which has the right, license or permission to use, operate or control the same, it shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five hundred nor more than five thousand dollars. 1899, c. 164, s. 12.

3800. Street cars to have vestibule fronts. If any city and street passenger railway company shall refuse or fail to use vestibule fronts, or frontage not less than four feet, on all passenger cars run, manipulated or transported by them on their lines during the latter half of the month of November and during the months of December, January, February and March of each year,

except in cases of temporary emergency in suitable weather, not to exceed four days in any one month within the period herein prescribed for use of vestibule fronts, such company shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine of not less than ten dollars or more than one hundred dollars for each day: Provided, that said companies shall not be required to close the sides of said vestibules. The North Carolina corporation commission is hereby authorized to make exemptions from the provisions of this section in such cases as in their judgment the enforcement of this section is unnecessary. 1901, c. 743, s. 1.

3801. Street cars to have fenders. If any city and street passenger railway company shall refuse or fail to use practical fenders in front of all passenger cars run, manipulated or transported by them, such company shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each day. The North Carolina corporation commission is hereby authorized to make exemptions from the provisions of this section in such cases as in their judgment the enforcement of this section is unnecessary. 1901, c. 743, s. 2.

1119. Tax commissioners. The members of the corporation commission shall constitute a board of "State Tax Commissioners," with the powers and duties prescribed by law. 1901, c. 7, ss. 1, 3; 1903, c. 251, ss. 1, 3.

1120. Oath of office. The members of said board shall take and subscribe the constitutional oath of office, to be filed with the secretary of state. 1905, c. 590, s. 3.

1121. CLERKS TO; AND COMPENSATION. Said board may employ such clerks as in their judgment they may deem necessary to put into proper execution the provisions of this subchapter. The persons so elected shall hold office during the pleasure of said board, and a record of all the proceedings of said board shall be kept, which record, with all other papers or proceedings of said board, shall be a part of the record of the board of corporation commissioners, and of which the clerk of said board of corporation commissioners shall be the lawful custodian, and who, when the board is not in session, shall also have oversight of the clerical force and have performed such duties as are directed by the board. 1905, c. 590, s. 2.

1122. When to meet; special meetings. Said board shall hold regular meetings on the first Tuesday of March, June, July, August, September and October of each year, unless said dates are changed by order of the board, of which changes due notice shall be given, and may hold adjourned sessions as may be deemed necessary by it for the proper performance of the duties devolving upon said board. The chairman may call special sessions of the board whenever and wherever in the state he may deem it advisable so to do, and shall call such special sessions upon the written request of two members. 1905, c. 590, s. 5.

1123. Examination of records, etc. The said board, and the members thereof, shall have access to all books, papers, documents, statements and accounts on file or of record in any of the departments of state, subject to the rules and regulations of the respective departments relative to the care of the public records. It shall have like access to all books, papers, documents, statements and accounts on file or of record in counties, townships and municipalities. Said board shall have the right to subpena witnesses, upon a subpena signed by the chairman of said board, directed to such witnesses, which

subpœna may be served by any person authorized to serve subpœnas from courts of record in this state, and the attendance of witnesses may be compelled by attachment to be issued by any superior court upon proper showing that such witness has been properly subpœnaed and has refused to obey such subpœna. The person serving such subpœna shall receive the same compensation now allowed to sheriffs and other officers for serving subpœnas. Said board shall have power to examine witnesses under oath, said oath to be administered by any member of said board or by the secretary thereof. 1905, c. 590, s. 4.

- 1124. Duties of. 1. To have and exercise general supervision over the taxlisters and assessing officers of this state, and to take such measures as will secure the enforcement of the provisions of this subchapter, to the end that all the properties of this state liable to assessment for taxation shall be placed upon the assessment rolls and assessed at their true value in money.
- 2. To confer with and advise assessing officers as to their duties under this subchapter, and to institute proper proceedings to enforce the penalties and liabilities provided by law for public officers, officers of corporations and individuals failing to comply with this subchapter; to prefer charges to the governor against assessing and taxation officers who violate the law or fail in the performance of their duties in reference to assessments and taxation; and in the execution of these powers the said board may call upon the attorney general or any prosecuting attorney in the state to assist said board.
- 3. To receive complaints as to property liable to taxation that has not been assessed or has been fraudulently or improperly assessed, and to investigate the same, and to take such proceedings as will correct the ifregularity complained of, if found to exist.
- 4. To see that each county in the state be visited by at least one member of the board as often as is necessary, to the end that all complaints concerning the law of assessment and taxation may be heard; that information concerning its workings may be collected; that all assessing and taxation officers comply with the law, and all violations thereof be punished, and that all proper suggestions as to amendments and change may be made.
- 5. To require from any register of deeds, clerk of court, mayor and clerk of towns, or any other officer in this state, on forms prescribed by said board of state tax commissioners, such annual or other reports as shall enable said board to ascertain the assessed valuations of all property listed for taxation throughout the state under this subchapter; the amount of taxes assessed, collected and returned delinquent, and such other matter as the board may require, to the end that it may have complete and statistical information as to the practical operation of this subchapter. That every such officer mentioned in this section who shall wilfully neglect or refuse to furnish any report required by the commission, for the purposes of this subchapter, or who shall wilfully and unlawfully hinder, delay or obstruct said commission in the discharge of its duties, shall forfeit and pay one hundred dollars for each offense, to be recovered in an action in the name of the state. A delay of ten days to make and furnish such report shall raise the presumption that the same was wilful.
- 6. To make diligent investigation and inquiry concerning the revenue laws and systems of other states and countries, so far as the same is made known by published reports and statistics, and can be ascertained by correspondence with officers thereof, and, with the aid of information thus obtained, together

with experience and observation of our own laws, to recommend to the general assembly at each regular session thereof such amendments, changes or modifications of our revenue laws as seem proper and necessary to remedy injustice and irregularities in taxation, and to facilitate the assessment and collection of public revenues.

7. To further report to the general assembly at each regular session thereof, or at such other times as the general assembly may direct, the whole amount of taxes collected in the state for all purposes, classified as to state, county, township and municipal purposes, with the sources thereof, the amount lost, the cause of the loss, the proceedings of said board, and such other matters of information concerning the public revenues as it may deem of public interest. 1905, c. 590, s. 6.

1125. List of taxables, how revised by. After the various tax lists required to be made under this chapter shall have been passed upon by the county board of equalization, the said several tax lists shall be subject to inspection by the said board of state tax commissioners or by any member thereof; and in case it shall appear or be made to appear to said board that property subject to taxation has been omitted from said list, the board may issue an order directing the assessor or lister, whose assessments or failure to assess are complained against, to appear with his tax list at a time and place to be stated in said order, and the place to be at the office of the board of county commissioners at the county-seat or such other place in said county in which said roll was made, as said board shall deem most convenient for the hearing herein provided for. A notice of the time and place that said assessor or lister is ordered to appear with said list shall be published in a newspaper published at the county-seat in said county, if there be one; if not, in some paper printed in said county, if there be any, at least five days before the time at which said assessor or lister is required to appear, and personal notice shall be given by mail to said persons whose property or whose assessments are to be considered, at least five days prior to said hearing. A copy of said order shall be served upon the tax officer in whose possession said list shall be, at least three days before he is required to appear with said list. The said board, or any member thereof, shall appear at the time and place mentioned in said order, and the assessing or listing officer upon whom said notice shall have been served shall appear also with said tax list. The said board or any member thereof, as the case may be, shall then and there hear and determine as to the proper assessments of all property and persons mentioned in said notice, and persons affected or liable to be affected by the review of said assessments thus provided for may appear and be heard at said hearing. In case said board, or the member thereof who shall act in said review, shall determine that the assessments so reviewed are not assessed according to law, he or they shall, in a column provided for that purpose, place opposite said property the true and lawful assessment of the same. As to the property not on the tax list, the said board or members thereof acting in said review shall place the same upon said tax list by proper description, and shall place thereafter in the proper column the true cash value of the same. In case of review under this section, the said board or the member thereof acting in said review shall certify under his hand officially and spread upon said list a certificate of the day and date at which said tax list was reviewed by him, and the changes made by him therein. For appearing with said list as required herein, the tax officer shall receive the same pay per diem as is received by him in the preparation of the tax list, to

be presented to and paid by the proper officers of the county or municipality of which he is the assessing officer, in the manner as his other compensation is paid. The action of said board or member taken as provided in this subchapter shall be final. 1905, c. 590, s. 8.

1125a. GENERAL REVIEW OF TAX LIST; HOW AND WHEN ORDERED. In case it shall appear or be made to appear to said board that any tax list in the state is so grossly irregular and unlawfully assessed that adequate compliance with the law can not be secured except by a general review of said tax list, said board may make and issue an order that said tax list shall be subject to general review, and the time and place shall be stated in said order at which said list shall be reviewed, and under said order the assessor whose assessment or failure to assess is complained against shall be required to appear with his tax list at the time and place thus determined, said time to be not less than fourteen days from the issuance of the order, and the place to be at the office of the board of county commissioners at the county-seat, or such other place in said county in which said list was made, as said board shall deem most convenient for the hearing herein provided for. A notice of the time and place that said assessor is required to appear with said list, together with a statement that said list will be subjected to general review, and that all persons interested therein may be heard at said time, shall be published in a newspaper published at the county-seat of said county, if there be one; if not, in some newspaper printed in said county, if there be any, at least seven days before the time at which said assessor is required to appear. A copy of the order made as aforesaid shall be served upon the tax officer in whose possession said list shall be, at least three days before he is required to appear with said list. The said board or any member thereof shall appear at the time and place mentioned in said order, and the tax officer upon whom said notice shall have been served shall appear also with said tax list. The said board or any member thereof, as the case may be, together with the chairman of the board of county commissioners, shall then and there review said tax list and the assessment of property therein, and he or they shall have power to determine in accordance with law the amount at which said assessment shall be placed, and to change the same so that said assessments may comply with the law. Also to place upon said list property omitted therefrom in the same manner as provided in the last preceding section. The determination of said board or members thereof, acting in said review, shall be placed in a column provided for that purpose, and they or he shall proceed in all respects as provided in the last preceding section, and the tax officer shall receive the same compensation as provided in said section. 1905, c. 590, s. 9.

at any time that any property liable to taxation has not been assessed for any previous year as hereinbefore provided, the said board shall report the same to the proper assessing officer, and the same shall be listed for taxation upon the next tax list that shall be made, and shall be valued as all other property. The said board shall further certify to the board of county commissioners of the several counties at the October session thereof next after said property shall be then listed for taxation, and said board of county commissioners shall ascertain the rate of taxation for said several years, and shall order the taxes for said several years to be entered against said property upon the valuation for the then current year, and the same shall be so entered in a column provided for that purpose, and it shall constitute a charge against the person or

property and be collected as other taxes: Provided, however, that this provision shall not be deemed to relate back prior to the first day of March, one thousand nine hundred and five: Provided further, that in case of change of ownership of the property omitted, said taxes shall not be entered against said property prior to the last change of ownership. 1905, c. 590, s. 10.

1127. Report to the governor, when; how distributed. The board of state tax commissioners shall, on or before the first day of November of each year, make an annual report to the governor of the state, setting forth the workings of said commission during the preceding year, and containing the findings and recommendations of said commission in relation to all matters of taxation. The state auditor shall cause two thousand copies of said report to be printed on or before the first day of December succeeding the making of said report. Five hundred copies of said report shall be placed at the disposal of the state librarian for distribution and exchange, and a copy of said report shall be forwarded by said tax commission to each member of the general assembly as soon as printed. 1905, c. 590, s. 7.

3792. Tax commissioners may examine books. If any corporation, firm or individual shall, upon demand, refuse to permit the state tax commissioners, or any one of them, to examine the books, papers and accounts of such corporation, firm or individual, for the purpose of obtaining information as to property liable to be assessed for taxation, under any of the laws of this state; or if any person shall refuse to appear before the state tax commissioners, or any member thereof, when subpænaed so to do, or shall upon such appearance fail or refuse to testify, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and fined not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisoned in the state's prison not exceeding two years, or both, in the discretion of the court. 1901, c. 7, s. 4; 1903, c. 251, s. 4.

I. CREATION.

- 222. How incorporated. Any number of persons, not less than three, who may be desirous of forming a company, and engaging in the business of establishing, maintaining and operating banks of discount and deposit to be known as commercial banks, or of engaging in the business of establishing, maintaining and operating offices of loan and deposit to be known as savings banks, or of establishing, maintaining and operating banks having departments for both classes of business, shall be incorporated in the manner following, and in no other way; that is to say, such persons shall, by a certificate of incorporation, under their hands and seals, set forth:
- 1. The name of the corporation; no name shall be assumed already in use by another existing corporation organized under the laws of this state or of the Congress, or so nearly similar thereto as to lead to uncertainty or confusion.
 - 2. The location of its principal office in the state.
- 3. The nature of its business, whether that of commercial bank, or savings bank, or both.
- 4. The amount of the total authorized capital stock, the number of shares into which it is divided, and the par value of each share, which shall be either fifty dollars or one hundred dollars; the amount of capital stock with which it will commence business, which shall not be less than five thousand dollars in cities and towns of fifteen hundred population or less; nor less than ten thousand dollars in cities and towns whose population exceeds fifteen hundred but does not exceed five thousand; nor less than twenty-five thousand dollars in all other places; the population to be ascertained by the last preceding national census; and if there be more than one class of stock, a description of the different classes, with the terms on which the respective classes of stock are created.
- 5. The names and postoffice addresses of the subscribers for stock and the number of shares subscribed by each; the aggregate of such subscriptions shall be the amount of the capital stock with which the company will commence business.
 - 6. The period, if any, limited for the duration of the company. 1903, c. 275, ss. 1, 2; 1901, c. 769.

CERTIFICATES OF INCORPORATION; HOW SIGNED, PROVED AND FILED. The certificate of incorporation shall be signed by the original incorporators, or a majority of them, and shall be proved, or acknowledged, before an officer duly authorized under the laws of this state to take the proof or acknowledgment of deeds. Such certificate of incorporation, when so proved, shall be filed in the office of the secretary of state, who shall, if the same shall be in accordance with law, thereupon cause the same to be recorded in his office in a book to be kept for that purpose, and known as the Corporation Book, and he shall, upon the payment of the organization tax and fees, certify under his official seal two copies of the said certificate of incorporation and probates, one of which shall be forthwith recorded in the office of the clerk of the superior court of the county where the principal office of said corporation in this state shall, or is to be, established, in a book to be known as the Record of Incorporations, and the other certified copy shall be filed in the office of the corporation commission, and thereupon the said persons shall become a body politic and corporate under the name stated in such certificate. The said certificate of incorporation, or a copy thereof duly certified by the secretary of state or by the clerk of the superior court of the county in which the same is recorded, or by the clerk of the corporation commission, under their respective seals, shall be evidence in all courts and places, and shall, in all judicial proceedings, be deemed prima facie evidence of the complete organization and incorporation of the company purporting thereby to have been established. 1903, c. 275, s. 3; 1901, c. 2, s. 9; 1903, c. 343.

224. Payment of capital stock. At least fifty per cent. of the capital stock of every bank shall be paid in in cash before it shall be authorized to commence business and the remainder of the capital stock of such bank shall be paid in monthly instalments of at least ten per cent. in cash of the whole of the capital, payable at the end of each succeeding month from the time it shall be authorized by the corporation commission to commence business, and the payment of each instalment shall be certified to the corporation commission, under oath, by the cashier or president of the bank. 1903, c. 275, s. 10.

225. Statement filed before beginning business. Before such company shall begin the business of banking there shall be filed with the corporation commission a statement, under oath, by the cashier or president, containing the names of all of the directors and officers, with the date of the election or appointment, term of office, residence and postoffice address of each, the amount of capital stock of which each is the owner in good faith, and the amount of money paid in on account of the capital stock. Nothing shall be received in payment of capital stock but money. 1903, c. 275, ss. 5, 10.

226. Authorized to begin business, when and how. If from such statement, or upon an examination, if such examination appears necessary, it appears to the corporation commission that such corporation is lawfully entitled to commence the business of banking, it shall, within thirty days after the filing of the certificate required by law, give to such corporation a certificate signed by the chairman of the corporation commission, attested by the secretary of the commission, that such corporation has complied with all the provisions required to be complied with before commencing the business of banking and that such corporation is authorized to commence such business. 1903, c. 275, s. 7.

227. AUTHORITY TO BEGIN BUSINESS WITHHELD, WHEN. The corporation commission may withhold from any bank its certificate authorizing the commencement of business whenever it has reason to believe that the stockholders have formed the same for any other purpose than the legitimate objects contemplated by this chapter. 1903, c. 275, s. 6.

II. POWERS AND DUTIES.

228. Powers. In addition to the powers conferred by law upon private corporations, banking corporations shall have power—

1. To exercise by its board of directors or duly authorized officers or agents, subject to law, all such powers as shall be necessary to carry on the business of banking, by discounting and negotiating promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange and other evidences of debts, by receiving deposits, by buying and selling exchange, coin and bullion, by loaning money on personal security or real or personal property. Such corporation at the time of making loans or discounts may take and receive in advance such interest as may be agreed upon not exceeding the legal rate.

2. To purchase, hold and convey real estate for the following purposes:

1st. Such as shall be necessary for the convenient transaction of its business, including with its banking offices other apartments to rent as a source of income, which investment shall not exceed twenty-five per cent. of its paid-in capital stock and permanent surplus: Provided, that this provision shall not apply to any such investment made before the ninth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and three.

2d. Such as is mortgaged to it in good faith by way of security for loans made or money due to such bank.

3d. Such as is conveyed to it in satisfaction of debts previously contracted in the course of its dealings.

4th. Such as it acquires by sale under execution or judgment of any court in its favor.

1903, c. 275, ss. 8, 9.

229. When bank may purchase its stock. No bank shall be the holder as pledgee or as purchaser of any portion of its capital stock, unless such purchase shall be necessary to prevent loss upon a debt previously contracted in good faith. 1903, c. 275, s. 1.

230. Reorganization. Whenever any bank, under the laws of this state or of the United States, is authorized to dissolve and shall have taken the necessary steps to effect dissolution, it shall be lawful for a majority of the directors of such bank, upon the authority in writing of the owners of two-thirds of its capital stock, with the approval of the corporation commission, to execute articles of incorporation as provided in this chapter, which articles, in addition to the requirements of law, shall further set forth the authority derived from the stockholders of such dissolved national bank or state bank, and upon filing the same as hereinbefore provided for the organization of banks, the same shall become a bank under the laws of this state, and thereupon all assets, real and personal, of the dissolved national bank shall by operation of law be vested in and become the property of such state bank, subject to all liabilities of such national bank not liquidated under the laws of the United States before such reorganization. 1903, c. 275, s. 17.

231. Reserve fund. Every bank shall at all times have on hand as a reserve in available funds an amount equal to at least fifteen per cent. of the aggregate amount of its deposits. Two-fifths of such fifteen per cent. shall be cash in the vaults of the bank. Savings banks shall have on hand at all times, as a reserve in available funds, an amount equal to at least five per cent. of their aggregate deposits. 1903, c. 275, s. 28.

232. Available funds; when below reserve; no new loans or dividends. The available funds shall consist of cash on hand and balances due from other solvent banks. Cash shall include lawful money of the United States, and exchange for any clearing-house association. Whenever the available funds of any bank shall fall below the reserve herein required, such bank shall not make any new loans or discounts otherwise than by discounting or purchasing bills of exchange payable at sight; nor shall such bank make any dividends of its profits until it has on hand the available funds required by this chapter. 1903, c. 275, s. 29.

233. Loans to one person not to exceed ten per cent. Of capital. The total liabilities to any bank or banking institution, of any person, or of any company, corporation or firm, for money borrowed, including in the liabilities of a company or firm the liabilities of the several members thereof, shall at no time exceed one-tenth part of the amount of the capital stock of such bank or banking institution actually paid in. But the discount of bills of exchange drawn in good faith against actually existing values and the discount of commercial or business paper actually owned by the person negotiating the same shall not be considered as money borrowed. This section shall not apply to banks with a paid-up capital of one hundred thousand dollars or less. 1897, c. 298, s. 3; 1897, c. 432.

234. Chapter on corporations applicable. All of the provisions of law relating to private corporations, and particularly those enumerated in the chapter entitled Corporations, not inconsistent with this chapter, or with the business of banking, shall be applicable to banks. 1903, c. 275, s. 4.

III. STOCKHOLDERS.

235. Individual liability of. The stockholders of every bank organized under the laws of North Carolina, whether under the general law or by special act, shall be individually responsible, equally and ratably, and not one for another, for all contracts, debts and engagements of such corporation, to the extent of the amount of their stock therein at par value thereof, in addition to the amount invested in such shares. The term "stockholder," when used in this chapter, shall apply not only to such persons as appear by the books of the corporation to be stockholders, but also to every owner of stock, legal or equitable, although the same may be on such books in the name of another person; but shall not apply to a person who may hold the stock as collateral security for the payment of a debt. 1903, c. 275, s. 13; 1897, c. 298.

236. Exemptions in special charters repealed. Any exemption from the individual liability imposed upon stockholders by the preceding section contained in the charter of any bank incorporated prior to the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and five, is repealed. 1897, c. 298, s. 2.

237. EXECUTORS, TRUSTEES, ETC., NOT PERSONALLY LIABLE. Persons holding stock as executors, administrators, guardians, or trustees shall not be personally subject to any liabilities as stockholders, but the estates and funds in their

hands shall be liable in like manner and to the same extent as the testator, intestate, ward, or person interested in such trust funds would be if living and competent to act and hold the stock in his own name. U. S. Rev. Stat., s. 5152.

238. Transferer not liable, when. No person who has in good faith and without any intent to evade his liability as a stockholder, transferred his stock on the books of the corporation to any person of full age, previous to any default in the payment of any debt or liability of the corporation, shall be subject to any personal liability on account of the nonpayment of such debt or liability of the corporation, but the transferred of any stock so transferred previous to any default shall be liable for any such debt or liability of the corporation to the extent of such stock, in the same manner as if he had been the owner at the time the corporation contracted such debt or liability. 1903, c. 275, s. 14.

239. Stock sold if subscription unpaid. Whenever any stockholder or his assignee fails to pay any instalment on the stock, when the same is required by law to be paid, the directors of the bank may sell the stock of such delinquent stockholder at public sale, as they shall deem best, having first given the delinquent stockholder twenty days' notice, personally or by mail, at his latest known address. If no party can be found who will pay for such stock the amount due thereon to the bank, with any additional indebtedness of such stockholder to the bank, the amount previously paid shall be forfeited to the bank and such stock shall be sold as the directors may order within six months of the time of such forfeiture, and if not sold, it shall be cancelled and deducted from the capital of the bank. 1903, c. 275, s. 11.

IV. CORPORATION COMMISSION.

240. May make rules. The corporation commission shall have power to make such rules for the government of the banks and banking institutions of this state, not inconsistent with law, as may in its judgment seem wise and expedient. 1903, c. 275, s. 20.

241. ALL BANKING INSTITUTIONS UNDER SUPERVISION OF. Every bank, corporation, partnership, firm or individual, now or hereafter transacting a banking business under the laws of, and within, this state, shall be subject to the provisions of this chapter and regulated by and be under the supervision of the corporation commission. 1903, c. 275, s. 19.

242. Quarterly reports to; publication in county. Every bank and every corporation, partnership, firm or individual transacting a banking business shall make to the corporation commission not less than four reports during each year, according to the form which may be prescribed by said commission; which reports shall be verified in the case of incorporated banking companies by the oath or affirmation of the president, vice-president or cashier, and, in addition, two of the board of directors, and in other cases by the oath or affirmation of the partners, members of the firm or individual owner. The bank, corporation or individual making such report shall publish same in some newspaper in the county in which such bank, corporation or individual is located. 1903, c. 275, s. 21.

243. Special reports. The corporation commission shall have power to call for special reports from any bank, corporation, firm or individual transacting a banking business, whenever necessary, in order to obtain a full and complete knowledge of such bank. 1903, c. 275, s. 22.

244. Annual report of stockholders. Every bank shall at all times keep a correct record of the names of all its stockholders, and once in each year, or whenever called upon, file in the office of the corporation commission a correct list of all of its stockholders, with the number of shares held by each. 1903, c. 275, s. 16.

245. Penalty for failure to report, etc. Every bank, corporation, partnership, firm or individual that shall refuse, fail or neglect to make any report, or any published statement required by the provisions of this chapter shall be subject to a penalty of two hundred dollars. The penalty herein provided for shall be recovered by the state in a civil action in any court of competent jurisdiction, and it shall be the duty of the attorney general to prosecute all such actions. 1903, c. 275, s. 26.

V. BANK EXAMINERS.

246. Appointed by corporation commission. The corporation commission shall appoint a suitable person or persons to make an examination of and into the affairs of every bank, corporation or individual doing a banking business, as often as shall be deemed necessary and proper, and at least once every year. And it shall also be the duty of the said bank examiner to verify the report made by the directors or members or individual conducting any banking institution as required by section two hundred and twenty-six. The corporation commission may at any time remove any person appointed by it. 1903, c. 275, s. 23; 1905, c. 539.

247. Powers. Such examiners shall have power to make a thorough examination into all the books, papers and affairs of the bank or corporation, firm or individual transacting a banking business, and, in so doing, to administer oaths and affirmations and to examine on oath or affirmation any individual banker and the officers, agents, partners and clerks of such bank, corporation, firm or individual touching the matters he or they shall be authorized and directed to inquire into, and examine, and to summon, and by attachment compel the attendance of any person or persons in this state to testify under oath before him or them in relation to the affairs of such corporation, partnership, firm or individual. 1903, c. 275, s. 24.

248. Reports by, to corporation commission. Bank examiners shall make a full and detailed report in writing to the corporation commission, of the condition of each corporation, partnership, firm or individual doing a banking business, within ten days after each and every examination made by them. 1903, c. 275, s. 24.

249. Annual examinations; expenses paid by bank. One examination each year shall be designated as the annual examination, and for such examination the bank, corporation, or individual so examined shall pay into the office of the corporation commission, to be paid to the examiners, an examination fee, as follows: Banks, banking institutions or individuals doing a banking business, having a capital of twenty-five thousand dollars or less, shall pay a fee of fifteen dollars; those having a capital stock of more than twenty-five thousand dollars and not over fifty thousand dollars, twenty-five dollars; those having a capital stock of over fifty thousand dollars, thirty dollars. The expenses incurred and services, other than examinations performed specially for any bank, shall be paid by such bank or banking institution. No bank shall be compelled to pay for more than one examination in each year, unless

it shall appear that the condition of such bank, banking institution or banker is precarious, or in any way unsatisfactory, then it shall be the duty of the commission to order a special examination, which shall be paid for by such bank at the same rates as the annual examinations. 1903, c. 275, s. 25.

250. Take possession of bank, when; receiver appointed, how. Any bank examiner who has filed such bond as may be required by the commission, when ordered by the commission, shall have authority to take possession of any bank doing business under the laws of this state and retain possession thereof for a time sufficient to make a thorough examination into its affairs and financial condition; and in case it is found by the examiner, upon such examination, that such bank is insolvent or is conducting its business in an unsafe and unauthorized manner, or is jeopardizing the interests of its depositors, then such examiner, when authorized by the corporation commission, shall have full power and authority to take, hold and retain possession of all the money, rights, credits, assets and property of every description belonging to such bank, corporation, partnership, firm or individual, until the corporation commission can receive and act on the report made by the examiner of such bank, and have a receiver appointed, for the purpose of winding up and settling the affairs of such bank, banking institution or banker, according to law; and the corporation commission is hereby empowered, in its own name, to institute and maintain civil actions for the appointment of receivers in such cases, and for such other relief as may be necessary or proper to protect the creditors of such bank. The commissioners in their judgment may grant such bank, corporation or individual sixty days in which to correct any errors or irregularities, and make good any deficiencies or losses shown in any reports or otherwise. 1903, c. 275, s. 30.

251. May make arrests, when. When it shall appear to any bank examiner, by examination or otherwise, that any officer, agent, employee, director, stockholder or owner of a bank or banking institution has been guilty of a violation of the criminal laws of the state relating to banks and banking institutions, it shall be his duty to hold and detain such person until a warrant can be procured for his arrest; and for such purpose such examiner shall have and possess all the powers of a peace officer of such county, and may arrest without warrant for past offenses. Upon report of his action to the corporation commission, it may direct the release of the person so held, or, if in its judgment such person should be prosecuted, the commission shall cause the solicitor of the judicial district in which such detention is had to be promptly notified, and the action against such person shall be continued a reasonable time to enable such solicitor to be present at the trial.

3324. Examiner making false report. If any bank examiner shall knowingly and willingly make any false or fraudulent report of the condition of any bank which shall have been examined by him, with the intent to aid or abet the officers, owners or agents of such bank in continuing to operate an insolvent bank; or if any such examiner shall receive or accept any bribe or gratuity, given for the purpose of inducing him not to file any report of an examination of any bank made by him, or shall neglect to make an examination of any bank by reason of having received or accepted any bribe or gratuity, he shall be guilty of a felony, and on conviction thereof shall be

imprisoned in the state's prison for not less than four months nor more than ten years. 1903, c. 275, s. 24.

3325. Officers and agents, malfeasance of. If any president, director, cashier, teller, clerk or agent of any bank or other corporation shall embezzle, abstract or wilfully misapply any of the moneys, funds or credits of the bank, or shall, without authority from the directors, issue or put forth any certificate of deposit, draw any order or bill of exchange, make any acceptance, assign any note, bond, draft, bill of exchange, mortgage, judgment or decree, or make any false entry in any book, report or statement of the bank with the intent in either case to injure or defraud or to deceive any officer of the bank, or if any person shall aid and abet in the doing of any of these things, he shall be guilty of a felony, and upon conviction shall be imprisoned in the state's prison for not less than four months nor more than fifteen years, and likewise fined, at the discretion of the court. 1903, c. 275, s. 15.

3326. Statements, making false. If any person shall wilfully and knowingly subscribe to, or make, or cause to be made, any false statement or false entry in the books of any bank, corporation, partnership, firm or individual transacting a banking business, or shall knowingly subscribe to or exhibit false papers, with the intent to deceive any person authorized to examine into the affairs of said bank, corporation, partnership, firm or individual, or shall wilfully and knowingly make, state or publish any false statement of the amount of the assets or liabilities of any such corporation, partnership, firm or individual, he shall be guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be imprisoned in the state's prison not less than four months nor more than ten years. 1903, c. 275, s. 27.

5371. (4.) The corporation commission and the bank examiners when so required by the state treasurer shall keep the state treasurer fully informed at all times as to the condition of all such depository banks, so as to fully protect the state from loss. 1905, c. 520.

RULES OF PRACTICE

IN

CASES AND PROCEEDINGS

BEFORE THE COURT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CORPORATION COMMISSION.

PUBLIC SESSIONS.

1. The general sessions of the court for the hearing of contested cases will be held at its office in the agricultural building, Raleigh, N. C., on the first Wednesday of each month at 11 o'clock a. m. When special sessions are held at other places such regulations as may be necessary will be made by the court.

PARTIES.

2. Where a complaint concerns anything done or omitted to be done by only a single carrier no other need be made a party, but if it relates to joint tariffs, or matters in which two or more carriers doing business under a common control, management or arrangement for a continuous carriage or shipment, are interested, all the carriers constituting such line must be made parties. A complaint may embrace several carriers, or lines of carriers, operated separately, in the same proceeding, when the subject-matter of the complaint involves substantially the same alleged violation of the law by the several carriers or lines. Persons or carriers not parties may apply, in any pending case or proceeding, for leave to intervene and to be heard upon the questions involved.

GENERAL RULES.

PROCEEDINGS BEFORE THE COURT.

- 3. All petitions and complaints made before the court for redress of alleged grievances, must plainly and distinctly set forth the grounds of complaint; the items being numbered and objections all set forth in writing. In like manner all defenses must be distinctly set forth in writing, and the items numbered as above stated. These specifications, whether of complaint or defense, may be accompanied, if the parties desire, by an explanation or argument, or by any suggestion as to the proper remedy or policy, and may be verified by the affidavit of the party complaining or petitioning, taken before any person authorized to administer oaths in North Carolina, and when the complaint or petition is verified, then the answer thereto shall be verified, and the verification shall conform to the rules prescribed in The Code of North Carolina for the verification of pleadings. The parties may also be heard in person or by attorney, or by written argument, upon such written statement being first filed.
- 4. If a carrier complained against shall deem the complaint insufficient to show a breach of legal duty, it may, instead of filing an answer, serve on the

complainant notice for a hearing of the case on the complaint; and in case of the service of such notice, the facts stated in the complaint will be taken as admitted. A copy of the notice must at the same time be filed with the court. The filing of an answer will not be deemed an admission of the sufficiency of the complaint, but a motion to dismiss for insufficiency may be made at the hearing.

SERVICE OF PAPERS.

5. Copies of notices or other papers must be served upon the opposite parties to the proceeding, personally or by mail, and when any party shall have appeared by attorney, the service upon the attorney shall be deemed proper service upon the party. If party so notified shall fail to answer within ten days after such notice, then the court in its discretion may grant the relief demanded.

AMENDMENTS.

6. Upon application by any petitioner or party, amendments may be allowed by the court, in its discretion, to any petition, answer, or other pleading in any proceeding before the Commission.

ADJOURNMENT AND EXTENSION OF TIME.

7. Adjournment and extension of time may be granted upon the application of parties in the discretion of the court.

STIPULATIONS.

8. Parties to cases and proceedings before the court may, by stipulation, duly signed by them and filed with the secretary, agree upon the facts, or any portion of the facts, they deem to be involved in the controversy, which agreed statement shall be regarded and used as evidence. It is desirable that the facts be thus agreed upon whenever practicable.

HEARINGS.

9. Upon issue being joined by the service of answer, the court will assign a time and place for hearing the same, which will be at its office in Raleigh, N. C., at its regular session, unless otherwise ordered. Witnesses will be examined orally before the court, unless testimony be taken or facts agreed upon as otherwise provided in these rules. The petitioner or complainant must in all cases prove the existence of the facts alleged to constitute a violation of the act, unless the carrier complained of shall admit the same, or shall fail to answer the complaint. Facts alleged in the answer must also be proved by the carrier, unless admitted by the petitioner. In cases of failure to answer, the court will take such proof of the charge as may be deemed reasonable and proper, and make such order thereon as the circumstances of the case appear to require.

WITNESSES AND DEPOSITIONS.

10. Subpœnas requiring the attendance of witnesses will be issued by any member of the court in all cases and proceedings before it, and witnesses will be required to obey the subpœnas served upon them requiring their attendance or the production of any books, papers, tariffs, contracts, agreements or documents relating to any matter under investigation or pending before the court.

When a subpœna is desired for the production of books, papers or other documentary evidence, special application must be made to the court therefor, specifying the documentary evidence desired. When a cause is at issue on petition and answer, each party may proceed at once to take depositions of witnesses in the manner provided by section 1357 of The Code of North Carolina, and transmit them to the secretary of the commission without making any application to or obtaining any authority from the court for that purpose.

PROPOSED FINDINGS OF FACT.

11. Upon the final submission of a case to the court either party may submit proposed findings of fact for the consideration of the court, which findings must embrace only the material facts of the case supposed to be established by the testimony.

REPORTS.

12. Each railroad company doing business within the State of North Carolina shall file in the office of the court quarterly reports showing in detail statement of freight and passenger earnings, operating expenses, etc., on such forms as may be prescribed from time to time by the court.

RULES GOVERNING TRANSPORTATION OF PASSENGERS,

- Each passenger shall be entitled to baggage not exceeding one hundred and fifty pounds.
- 2. No more than the schedule of passenger rates shall be charged where the ticket office at any station shall not have been open for a reasonable time before the departure from a station of the train upon which the passenger intends to be transported.
- 3. At junction points, where the incoming trains arrive so near the leaving time of the out-going train that it is not practicable for a passenger to procure a ticket, no more than the schedule of passenger rates shall be charged.
- 4. Railroad companies are authorized to collect the exact mileage for passenger fares if they shall make the necessary change to enable them to do so; but if not, no more than the nearest amount ending in 5 or 0 shall be charged.
- 5. No railroad company shall be allowed to charge more than ten cents for full or half-rate between regular stations when the fare would be less than that amount: *Provided*, where the distance is not greater than two miles or under the maximum charge for first-class tickets shall be ten cents, and five cents for second-class tickets.
- 6. No more than the standard passenger tariff shall be charged passengers from flag stations or other stations where tickets are not kept on sale.
- 7. When, in consequence of the uncertain time of arrival or departure of a delayed train, it is impracticable for tickets to be purchased, no more than the regular standard passenger rate shall be charged.

- 8. Passengers unprovided with tickets, when opportunity has been afforded them by the railroad companies to procure the same, may be required by the railroads to pay to the conductor twenty-five cents excess of the fare upon receiving from the conductor a drawback ticket for twenty-five cents, which shall be cashed upon presentation at any ticket office of the company within twenty days after date.
- 9. The Commission will consider applications for an advance or reduction in the standard tariff for the transportation of passengers, but no change of rates shall be of effect or put into force until ratified by the Commission: *Provided*, that this rule shall not be construed as placing any restriction on the privilege of railroad companies to make special rates on excursion trains, or to issue what are called "commutation or mileage tickets": *Provided*, no unjust discrimination is practiced.
- 10. Tickets on sale at any office in a city must be kept on sale at the depot ticket-office of the same railroad at the same prices.
- 11. That all connecting railroads which are under the management and control by lease, ownership or otherwise, of one and the same company, or at connection with a different company, shall be required to make close connection whenever practicable.
- 12. Railroad companies in computing passenger rates between stations where fractions of a mile are to be considered, will calculate for the nearest even number of miles. Example: For a distance of 10.49 miles or under, charge for ten miles; for 10.50 miles or over, charge for eleven miles, and so on.
- 13. It shall be the duty of each railroad company to bulletin at every telegraph station along its line, and other stations if possible, ten minutes in advance of the schedule time of arrival of its trains, whether such train is on time and if behind its schedule time to state, as near as can be approximated, the time of its arrival. The bulletin board shall be placed in a conspicuous place at the ticket office, and all notices thereon of arrival and departure of trains shall be erased immediately after the departure of trains.
- 14. On all mixed trains, carrying passengers, where two coaches are attached, first and second-class tickets must be sold.

Where only one coach is attached, only second-class rates shall be charged, unless the coach has separate apartments, then first and second-class rates may be charged.

15. That all common carriers subject to the supervision of the Corporation Commission shall provide such means or appliances as may be necessary to secure the careful handling of and to prevent injury to any parcel of baggage to which a check may be affixed, as provided by law.

That at all minor stations, where no proper appliances are supplied, and no regular depot hand is employed, the train hands shall be required to assist the baggage-master, and lift with care all baggage from the car-doors.

- 16. All railroad companies, in addition to the usual bell-cord, shall place a safety-cord in each coach of the regular passenger trains, running through the entire length of the same.
- 17. It shall be the duty of the Pullman Car Company, at all stations, on the stopping of trains, to have the doors of their cars open for the reception of passengers and require the porter to have a step ready for the convenience of passengers desiring to enter.

RULES GOVERNING THE TRANSPORTATION OF FREIGHT.

1. All connecting railroads, which are under the management and control, by lease, ownership or otherwise, of one and the same company, shall, for purposes of transportation, in applying this tariff, be considered as constituting but one and the same road, and the rates shall be computed as upon parts of one and the same road, unless otherwise specified.

DISTANCES.

- 2. Since a separate rate cannot be conveniently given for every possible distance, the law authorizes the Commission "to ascertain what shall be the limits of longer and shorter distances." Five (5) miles has, accordingly, been fixed as the limit for a change of freight rates for all distances less than one hundred miles; and ten (10) miles for all distances over one hundred miles. The commissioners reserve the right, however, to correct the charge in extreme cases which work hardship, although the same may not violate the letter of our rules.
- 3. For all distances over five (5) miles and under one hundred (100) miles, the following rule will apply: When the mileage does not end in 0 or 5 the nearest mileage so ending shall govern the rate. Illustration: For a distance of twenty-seven miles charge for twenty-five miles, for a distance of twenty-eight miles charge for thirty miles.
- 4. When freight is transported any distance greater than one hundred miles, if the mileage does not end in 0, then next ten (10) miles group above shall govern the rate. Illustration: For one hundred and twenty-one miles charge for one hundred and thirty.
- 5. For distance under twenty miles or over two hundred and fifty miles, a reduction of rates may be made without making a change at all stations short of two hundred and fifty miles: *Provided, however*, that when any railroad shall make a reduction of rates for distances over two hundred and fifty miles, the same shall apply to similar distances on all the roads controlled by the same company, and in no case shall more be charged for a less than a greater distance.

REGULATIONS CONCERNING FREIGHT RATES.

6. The freight rates prescribed by the Commission are maximum rates, which shall not be transcended by the railroads. They may carry, however, at less than the prescribed rates: Provided, that if they carry for less for one person, they shall for the like service carry for the same lessened rate for all persons except as mentioned hereafter; and if they adopt less freight rates from one station, they shall make a reduction of the same per cent, at all stations along the line of the road so as to make no unjust discrimination as against any person or locality. But when there are between any two points in this State two or more competing roads not under the same management or in the same system, then the longer line or lines, in order to give said points the benefit of competition, may reduce the rates between said two points below the standard tariff, without making a corresponding reduction at all stations along the lines of said roads: Provided, said reduction shall not make the rates less than the standard tariff rates for the shortest line between said points: Provided further, that before taking effect, the proposed change of rates shall be submitted to and approved by the Commission. When any special rate is made

it shall be submitted to the Commission for approval, and such special rates shall not be withdrawn without thirty days' notice to the Commission.

- 7. The rates charged for freight service by regular passenger trains may be one and a half times that for first-class freight by ordinary freight trains.
- 8. No railroad company shall, by reason of any contract with any express, or other company, decline or refuse to act as a common carrier, to transport any article proper for transportation by the train for which it is offered.
 - 9. Minimum charge for single shipments. See Circular No. 30.
- 10. No railroad company doing business in this State shall permit a blockade of any class of freights on account of any arrangement existing between it and other railroad companies as to the transportation of freight according to percentage or otherwise.
- 11. There shall be no secret reduction of rates, nor shall any bonus be given, or any rebate paid to any person, but the rates shall be uniform to all, and public.
- 12. The rates specified for ores, sand, clay, rough stone, common brick, bone, lumber, shingles, laths, staves, empty barrels, wood, straw, shucks, hay, fodder, corn in ear, tan-bark, turpentine, rosin, tar, household goods, are maximum rates, but the roads are left free to reduce them at discretion, and all such rates are exempt from the operation of Rule 6. All complaints as to such rates will, on presentation, be duly considered.
- 13. When railroad companies are required to load or unload car-load shipments of classes L, M, N, O and P, or to load car-load shipments of naval stores, the actual cost of such service shall be paid by shippers.
- 14. Extra Handling.—The charge for handling extra heavy articles, may be as follows, viz.:

Under 2,000 pounds, no charge for extra handling.

For 2,000 lbs. and under 3,000 lbs. \$ 3 for extra handling. For 3,000 lbs. and under 4,000 lbs. . . . 5 for extra handling. For 4,000 lbs. and under 5,000 lbs. . . . 7 for extra handling. For 5,000 lbs. and under 6,000 lbs. . . . 8 for extra handling. For 6,000 lbs. and under 7,000 lbs. . . . 10 for extra handling. For 7,000 and over in proportion.

15. Ferthizers.—This term embraces the following and like articles, when intended to be used as fertilizers: Ammonia sulphate, bone black, bones ground or dissolved, castor pomace, or fish scrap, guanos, alto vella, fish, Navassa, Navassa lump, Peruvian soluble Pacific, nitrate cake, plaster of paris, potash—German salts of, muriate of, sulphate of—salt cake, lump and ground phosphate, soda—nitrate of and sulphate of—tank stuff, etc.

For 5,000 lbs. and under 6,000 lbs...... 8 for extra handling.

- 16. Vehicles designed for transportation at carrier's risk must be properly protected by the shipper with sufficient covering or packing from all liabilities to injury from fire, weather, chafing, or other injury.
- 17. In no case shall the amount collected on L. C. L. shipments exceed the charge per car-load for the same class of goods.
- 18. Railroad companies are not required to receive cotton or other merchandise and warehouse the same unless the articles offered are in good shipping condition, well prepared by the shipper with proper packing and intelligent, plain marking, and accompanied with orders for immediate shipping.

19. Car-load Rates apply to a shipment of a car-load or more made by one shipper, at one time, to one and the same point of delivery, to the same consignee.

ESTIMATED WEIGHTS.

20. Lumber, coal, lime, brick, stone and all articles for which estimated weights are given in classification (except live stock, ale and beer, and empty ale and beer packages, L. C. L.), will be taken at actual weight when the weight can be ascertained, but when the weight cannot be ascertained, will be charged at the following estimated weights. This is not to interfere, however, with the duty of receiving agent to weigh, if possible, and correct to actual weight:

- 21. In cases in which the classification of any article is lowered by a percentage, railroad companies which are allowed an increase on the standard tariff shall apply the increase allowed to the reduced classification; but in cases in which the classification of any article is raised by percentage, railroad companies which are allowed an increase on the standard tariff shall not apply said increase to the already increased classification, but only to the standard tariff.
- 22. When any article is too bulky to put in a box-car, it shall be subject to special contract.
- 23. A ton of all articles is 2,000 pounds. A car-load is 20,000 pounds unless otherwise specified. For loads above 20,000 pounds, *pro rate* at car-load rates charged. A car-load of green wood is eight cords. A car-load of dry wood is nine cords. A car-load of lumber (and all articles embraced in lumber) is 24,000 pounds. A car-load of any article enumerated in Class P, except wood and lumber and articles included in lumber, is 25,000 pounds, shippers to load and unload.

- 24. All depots situated in incorporated towns and cities in this State must be kept open each day (Sundays excepted) for the receiving and delivery of freight, as follows: From April 1 to September 30, between the hours of 7 A. M. and 6 P. M. From October 1 to March 31, 7.30 A. M. and 5 o'clock P. M., with an intermission in each case of one hour, from 12 o'clock M. to 1 o'clock P. M.
- 25. Railroad companies whose lines do not exceed ten miles in length may charge from any point on their road the rates prescribed for ten miles.
- 26. On all shipments of freights not governed by Rule 1, originating and terminating in this State, which shall pass over the whole or portions of two or more roads not under the same control, the maximum rates charged on such shipments shall not be greater than the sum of the local rates on such freights less ten (10) per cent., for the distance hauled over each road. The total rate thus ascertained on such freights, from the point of shipment to the point of destination, shall be divided in such proportions between the roads over which such freights pass, so as to give to each road interested in the shipment its local rate, less ten (10) per cent., for the distance such shipment is hauled. Nothing in this rule shall be construed to prevent the total of any joint rate made under this rule from being divided in such proportions between the roads interested in the same as they may agree upon, but a failure to so agree between the roads interested shall in no way affect the total joint rate to be charged and collected on, or work delay in the transportation of such freights, or be a subject of appeal to the Commission by the roads at interest.
- 27. When railroad rates are affected by water competition the railroads may reduce their rates between points so affected without being required to reduce intermediate rates: *Provided*, *however*, that if complaint is made that such competition rates unjustly discriminate against other places or persons the commissioners will investigate and rule in each case.
- 28. No common carrier shall, for any cause, subject any article of freight to unreasonable delay in receiving, delivering or forwarding the same to its destination.
- 29. When a shipment is offered at a point where there are two routes over connecting lines to destination it shall be the duty of the railroad company making shipment to forward same by the shortest route, unless the rate charged over the longer route does not exceed that of the shorter, or unless otherwise ordered by the shipper.
- 30. A charge of no more than two dollars per car will be allowed for switching or transferring a car from any point on any road to any connecting road or warehouse within a space of one mile from starting point; over one and not more than two miles, three dollars; over two miles and not over three miles, four dollars, without regard to weight or contents.
- 31. When in the transfer of a car between said points it is necessary to pass over the line of any intermediate road or roads, the maximum charge of two, three or four dollars, as the case may be, shall be equitably divided between the roads at interest.
- 32. When a charge is made for the transfer of loaded cars between said points no additional charge shall be made for the delivery or return of the empty cars.
- 33. All specials less than our standard rates heretofore granted by carriers within the jurisdiction of the Commission, and which do not conflict with the law preventing unjust discrimination, until further orders, will be enforced.

POSTING TARIFFS.

34. Each railroad company doing business within the State of North Carolina shall post, and keep posted, at each of its respective stations in a conspicuous place a copy of the schedules of freight and passenger rates prescribed for said road by the Commission, together with a copy of the commissioners' classification, and a table of distances between stations, giving name of each station. And when any change in said schedule of rates or classification is made, either by the Commission or by any railroad company, a copy of said change shall be immediately furnished the office of the commissioners and shall also be posted in the same manner as the above.

35. The rates prescribed by the Commission shall (except in cases specified) apply in either direction.

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

In the "Commissioners' Standard Freight Tariff," under the class opposite to the distance, if it ends in 0 (and if not, then opposite the next greater distance), will be found the rate required.

Example: To find the rate for 247 miles on a box of clothing weighing 100 pounds, opposite the word "clothing" in the classification is seen its class, 1; in the freight tariff, under Class 1, opposite the next greater distance, 250 miles, is seen the rate, 65 cents; in the column "miles," 5 signifies five miles or under; 20, twenty miles or over fifteen, and so on.

EXPLANATION OF CHARACTERS.

1 stands for first-class. 2 stands for second-class. 3 stands for third-class. 4 stands for fourth-class. 5 stands for fifth-class, 6 stands for sixth-class. 11/2 stands for 11/2 times first-class. D1 stands for double first-class.

3T1 stands for three times first-class.

4T1 stands for four times first-class. A, B, C, D, E, F, H, and K stand for classes A, B, C, D, E, F, H, and K, respectively.

S stands for special.

L. C. L. stands for less than car-load.

C. L. stands for car-load.

N. O. S. stands for not otherwise specified.

Articles not enumerated will be classed with similar or analogous articles.

RULES FOR COMPUTING FRACTIONS.

When any rate in any class in the Standard Tariff is raised or lowered by a per cent., the following rules must be observed:

FIRST.—If the rate thus raised or lowered is in either of classes C, D, F, J, or K, the fraction of a half cent must be retained, as the following examples will indicate:

SECOND.—If the rate thus raised or lowered be in any other class than those already mentioned, omit fraction of less than half a cent and estimate half a cent or more as one cent, thus:

THIRD.—In making reductions, observe the same manner of placing figures before deducting the percentage.

Narrow-gauge railroads, in fixing rates on all freights where a rate per carload is given, will count 15,000 pounds for a car-load, and estimate their charge *pro rata* with rate allowed on standard gauge.

RULES GOVERNING ERECTION AND LOCATION OF DEPOTS.

FIRST.—From and after Wednesday, the 26th day of April, 1899, no change of freight or passenger depots or flag stations from their present location, nor the suspension of the sale of tickets, or the receiving or forwarding of freights from stations now in use for such purposes, will be permitted without the consent of this Commission published in accordance with law.

SECOND.—Application for the location of depots and the construction of depot buildings must be filed in the North Carolina Corporation Commission office, with all information needed for a full and proper understanding of all interests to be affected thereby.

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE TRANSPORTATION OF LIVE STOCK.

The weights given below are *estimated* and not actual, and are used simply to get the rating on live stock. To illustrate: One horse, mule or horned animal is estimated at the same rate as 2,000 pounds of any kind of second-class freight at carrier's risk and fourth-class at owner's risk. Therefore, the freight charges for fifty miles on one horse, mule or horned animal is the same as on 2,000 pounds of second-class freight, and would be, according to the

standard tariff, carrier's risk, 28 cents per 100 pounds, or \$5.60, and at owner's risk, 20 cents per 100 pounds, or \$4.00.

The rates on live stock as given in this tariff are based on the following maximum valuations:

Horses and mules not over\$120	.00	each.
Horned cattle not over 50	.00	each.
Stallions, jacks and bulls not over	.00	each.
Fat hogs and fat calves not over 15	.00	each.
Lambs, stock hogs, stock calves, not over 5	.00	each.

Race horses, stallions, jacks, bulls and other high-priced animals, when shippers are not willing to have the same transported at above valuations, will be taken only at the following rates on valuation given:

Value from \$150.00 to \$400.00 add to regular rate 30 per cent. Value from \$400.00 to \$600.00 add to regular rate 40 per cent. Value from \$600.00 to \$800.00 add to regular rate 60 per cent. Value from \$800.00 to \$1,000.00 add to regular rate 100 per cent. Over \$1,000 subject to special rate by contract.

Live stock will be taken at the released or owner's risk rate only when contract is executed by shipper and station agent.

Mixed shipment of cattle, hogs, lambs, etc., will be taken in car-loads at carload rates for cattle, but carrier will be released from damage to animals caused by their own acts, or to each other, and from escape, if not haltered, suffocation, exhaustion from heat or cold.

Sucking calves accompanying cows will be charged for at rate for single calves.

Sucking colts accompanying mares will be charged for at double the rate of single calves.

The word "calves" used in these rules and regulations applies only to calves under nine months old; and the words "yearling cattle" to cattle over nine months and under eighteen months old.

Pigs, hogs, calves, etc., boxed, crated, or in portable pens, taken at actual weight, carrier's risk, first-class; owner's risk, second-class.

In no case shall the charge for less than a car-load of live stock exceed the charge for a car-load.

Shippers will be expected to feed, water and care for their stock at their own expense. When food is furnished by carrier, a charge will be made for the same and collected from consignee.

One, two or three cars of live stock will entitle the owner or his agent to be carried free to point of destination of consignment, on the train with the stock, to care for the same. Four to seven cars inclusive, belonging to one owner, two men in charge, and eight cars or more belonging to one owner, three men in charge, which number is the maximum number of attendants that will be carried free for one shipment.

Return transportation not given to owners, agents or attendants.

CIRCULAR No. 36.

(AS AMENDED.)

STORAGE AND DEMURRAGE RULES—TIME LIMIT FOR PLACING OF CARS AND DELIVERY OF FREIGHT—LOCAL TRANSFER AND SWITCHING CHARGES.

Storage and demurrage may be assessed by railroad companies on all freight received for delivery in car-load lots or in less than car-load lots if not removed in conformity with the following rules and regulations:

RULE I.

No storage or demurrage charges, however, shall in any case be allowed unless notice of the arrival of goods has been given to the owner or consignee thereof by the railroad company, and it shall be the duty of such railroad company to give prompt notice to consignee of the arrival of goods, together with the contents, weight and amount of freight charges due thereon as shown by way-bill, and when goods or freight of any kind, in car-load consignments, said notice must contain letters or initials and number of the car. Notice shall be given by delivering same in writing in person, or by leaving same at consignee's place of business or by depositing it in the post-office.

RULE II.

For storage of package freights and all freight less than car-load, unloaded in depot or warehouse, which is not removed by the owner thereof from the custody of the railroad company within forty-eight hours (not including Sundays and legal holidays), a charge of storage for each day or fraction of a day that such consignment may remain in the custody of the carrier of one-cent per hundred pounds per day, with minimum charge of five cents for any one package or lot for any one consignee, may be made; but not more than one dollar per day for any one consignment not in excess of a car-load.

RULE III.

All car-load freight taking track delivery and such as is to be unloaded by consignee, which is not unloaded from cars containing same within forty-eight hours (not including Sundays and legal holidays) after the car or cars are placed accessible for unloading, may be subject to a charge of one dollar per car for each day or fraction of a day that said car or cars remain loaded: *Provided, however*, that seventy-two hours shall be allowed for the unloading of fertilizers, brick and the following commodities, when in bulk only: Cotton seed, cotton-seed hulls, coal, coke, fertilizing material, grain, lime, tan-bark and dressed lumber in box cars: *Provided further*, whenever by reason of delays in transit cars are bunched and more cars than one are received at same time, no demurrage shall be made for excess over one car: *Provided*, at least one car shall be unloaded daily.

BULE IV.

When consignors ship goods consigned to themselves or order, it shall be the duty of the railroad company to give legal notice to such consignees or persons to whom shipping directions order delivery. This notice may be addressed by mail to the consignee at point of delivery, and demurrage will begin as in other cases of notice by mail; and the mailing of such notice shall be sufficient notice in such cases, whether the consignee actually received the same or not.

RULE V.

The time allowed for removing freight before storage or demurrage charges apply will be computed from 7 o'clock A. M. of the day following date of notice (Sundays and legal holidays excepted).

RULE VI.

A consignee living more than five (5) miles from the depot, and whose freight is destined to his residence or place of business so located, shall not be subject to storage or demurrage charges allowed in the above rules until a sufficient time has elapsed after notice for said consignee to remove said goods by the exercise of due diligence: *Provided*, that in the delivery of car-load freight railroads will not be required in any case to hold freight free of demurrage for a longer period than five (5) days after notice, except as otherwise provided in Rule II.

RULE VII.

Where, upon the request of an intending shipper, the railroad company places a car or cars at a reasonably accessible point on its team tracks or on a private track designated by the shipper, free loading time shall expire forty-eight hours (not including Sundays or legal holidays) from the time such car or cars are so placed; and thereafter a demurrage charge of not more than one dollar per car per day or fraction of a day may be assessed and collected on all such cars as have not been tendered to the railroad company with shipping instructions.

RULE VIII.

When any railroad company fails to deliver freights at the depot or to place loaded cars at an accessible place for unloading within forty-eight hours (not including Sundays and legal holidays), computed from 7 o'clock A. M. the day after the arrival of same, the shipper or consignee shall be paid one dollar per day for each day or fraction of a day said delivery is so delayed: *Provided*, the railroad company may require the payment of freight before delivery.

RULE IX.

Where a shipper makes application in writing for a car or cars to be loaded with any kind of freight, and the railroad company fails to furnish same within four days from 7 o'clock A. M. next day after such application, such railroad company so offending shall forfeit and pay to the shipper applying the sum of one dollar per car per day for each day or fraction of a day's delay after the expiration of free time: *Provided*, the shipper makes demand therefor in writing within thirty days thereafter. The railroad companies may

require applicant to deposit two dollars for each car so demanded. This money may be retained as a forfeit to the railroad company in case the car is not loaded, to pay trackage; if the car is loaded, then the said two dollars shall be refunded to the shipper with the bill of lading.

RULE X.

(REPEALED.)

RULE XI.

Whenever the weather during the period of free time is so severe, inclement or rainy that it is impracticable to secure means of removal or loading of freight, or where from the nature of the goods removal or loading would cause injury or damage, such time shall be added to the free period, and no demurrage charges shall be allowed for such additional time. This rule applies to the state of the weather during business hours.

RULE XII.

The Commission reserves the right to hear and grant application to suspend the operation of these rules upon complaint of abuse, or whenever justice shall demand this course.

RULE XIII.

LOCAL TRANSFER AND SWITCHING CHARGES.

Railroad companies shall furnish shippers cars for loading, and shall also accept from each other cars loaded at warehouses or side-tracks of one road for delivery at side-tracks or warehouses on the other road within the space of two miles beyond the starting point. The railroad company furnishing the car and performing the initial movement may charge two and one-half dollars per car.

RULE XIV.

When car is destined to a warehouse on a connecting line which requires switching, the company so receiving and delivering may charge \$1.50 additional.

After car is placed for loading, the shipper shall load same within twenty-four hours therefrom, and consignee shall, when car is placed for unloading, unload same within twenty-four hours; otherwise the usual demurrage charges may be made.



Rules governing transportation of high explosives:

High explosives, such as atlas, hercules, giant, dittmar, commercial ætna, hecla and other nitroglycerine powders; dynamite, nitro-glycerine, glynoin oil, nitroleum, blasting oil, nitrated oil or powder, mixed with any such oil or fibre, saturated with any such articles or substances, will be received for transportation only at steamship or railroad companies option only under the following conditions:

FIRST.—Shipments to be packed in strong boxes, not too large to be readily handled by one person, and each package to be plainly marked "Explosive," "Dangerous" on too and on one side or on one and one

"Dangerous," on top and on one side or on one end. SECOND.—It is understood that in these articles the nitro-glycerine is thoroughly absorbed in charcoal, sawdust, infusorial earth, wood fibre, carbonate of magnesia, or other similar substances, and that the amount of the nitro-glycerine is such that the temperature on the hottest summer day will not occasion any leakage; also that the powder formed by that absorbent material and the nitro-glycerine is always made up into cartridges and never put into the boxes in bulk. Should any package show outward signs of any oily stain, or other indication that absorption is not perfect, or that the amount of nitro-glycerine is greater than the absorbent can carry, the packages must be refused in every instance and must not be allowed to remain on the property of the carrier.

THIRD.—Nitrate or other explosive preparations not in accordance with above specifications (except

ordinary black powder) will in no case be received

for shipment.

FOURTH.—Shipments must be so loaded that boxes will lie bottom side down, it being understood that the cartridges are so placed in the boxes that they will lie on their sides and never on their ends when so loaded. The boxes must be so placed in car that they can not fall to the floor under any circumstances.

FIFTH.—Shipments of common black powder may be received if packed in good, substantial iron or wooden kegs, packages not to exceed one hundred and fifty pounds in weight, unless for export, when larger packages will be received.

SIXTH.—In no case will percussion caps, exploders, safety squibs, fulminators, friction matches or any other article of like nature be loaded in same car with any of the above explosives. There can not be too great care exercised in this matter.

SEVENTH.—Safety-fuse will be received for shipment at any time it is offered and the restrictions in regard to shipping powder do not apply to it.

Eighth.—As special powder cars are not in general service among roads, agents must know that none of the above explosive substances are loaded at their stations in old cars, having loose boards or cracks in the roof or sides. Cars for carrying these explosives must be first-class in every respect; must be tight everywhere, and must have doors that can be closely shut, leaving no cracks for Rules governing transportation of high explosives-Continued.

sparks to get in. When explosives are carried in full car-loads, the doors must be stripped, except when the cars are equipped with the new Wagner car doors, which must never be stripped. Agents must refuse to receive from connecting lines cars loaded with explosives, unless the requirements of this section have been compiled with.

NINTH.—Every car containing any of the above

explosive substances, either full car-load or small

explosive substances, either full car-load or small package, must be plainly marked on both sides "Powder—Handle Carefully," so that those having charge of it will not do anything ignorantly to incur danger. This should be done by the shipper of full car-loads, and by the agent when packages are loaded in car at his station. Cars containing explosives received from connecting lines, if not marked when received, must be marked by the agent at the connecting point. Agents will be held strictly reconnecting point. Agents will be held strictly responsible that no car containing explosives leaves their stations until it is properly marked.

TENTH.—Agents must notify conductors when-ever a car containing explosives is to be taken from their stations; and conductors must not take from any station or siding any car known to contain ex-plosive substances unless Rules Eight and Nine have been complied with, and such cars must be placed in their train as near the middle as possible.

ELEVENTH.—Agents should notify all the shippers in their neighborhood of these requirements.
TWELFTH.—The law provides heavy penalties, both to shippers and common carriers, for a violation of these rules, and agents and shippers should be careful to see that such shipments are put up, marked and forwarded only under their proper names and in accordance with these provisions.

2-Bundles of bedding, trunks of clothing, house-hold goods or similar articles (not furniture) will not be received for transportation unless packed. Chests of similar articles must be strapped or securely nailed. This does not apply to household goods, C. L.

3-Any agent receiving this class of freight contrary to the foregoing rules will be charged with such expense (for boxing or transportation) as may be necessary to forward goods to destina-

tion without delay.

4-Bills of lading and way-bills must designate

character and number of packages.

These instructions apply to old and second-hand furniture, clothing, bedding, etc.; not to new articles.

6-Shipments designated to points beyond the Southeastern Freight Association territory must be released and prepaid, and the original release attached to way-bill accompanying the ship-

7-In all cases where limitation of value is expressed in the classification, it must be written out or stamped in full upon bills of lading, and shippers must be required to accept in writing the limitations expressed. Agents must respect this rule and require acceptance by the shipper.

Shippers will not be permitted to unload and dispose of any portion of car-load shipments of live stock en route, except upon payment of the less than car-load rate upon the portion so unloaded. In order to be entitled to the car-load rate, the number and kind as way-billed must go through to destination.

FREE TRANSPORTATION OF ATTENDANTS IN CHARGE OF LIVE STOCK.

(The following rules are applicable as well to local live stock traffic as to competitive traffic).

Persons in charge of live stock may be carried free at the option of the railroad company on passenger trains immediately preceding or following the shipment of stock or on the same train with the stock as follows:

One man to pass free with one or two cars; two men to pass free with three or four cars; three men to pass free with five to seven cars; four men to pass free with eight or more cars; which last is the maximum number of persons that will be passed free on any train with live stock from one shipper to one consignee and destination. All persons thus passed are at their own risks of personal injury from any cause whatever, and the railroad company will not be responsible for any loss of their personal effects.

Full rates will be charged for one or more attendants with live stock shipments in L. C. L. quantities and for extra attendants with car-load shipments.

and for extra attendants with car-load snipments.

No free or reduced transportation will be given either to attendants or shippers of live stock except as above provided.

Agents must not issue more than one live stock contract on any consignment of live stock from one shipper to one consignee and destination, but must enter the description of the entire shipment with car numbers on one contract.

Full fare returning will be charged all attendants who have accompanied live stock shipments.

Oil, crude and fuel, crude naphtha, crude and refined petroleum, products of petroleum, such as lubricating oils, benzine, naphtha, gasoline and paraffine, when in barrels or cases, minimum C. L. weight 24,000 pounds. When in tank cars, minimum C. L. weight will be the full capacity of the tank, the contents of the tank to be computed at six and the contents of the tank to be computed at six and four-tenths pounds per gallon, subject to a minimum weight of 20,000 pounds. When in barrels or half-barrels, C. L. or L. C. L., weight will be computed at 400 pounds per barrel, and 235 pounds per half-barrel. When in square cans, completely cased, each can containing ten gallons, C. L. or L. C. L., at 80 pounds per case.

Mixed car-loads of oil in barrels or cases will be taken authorized C. L. rates based on the foregoing weights. When less than aforesaid minimum carloads are shipped, L. C. L. rates will be charged. In

no case, however, will less than a car-load from one consignor to one consignee and destination on same day be charged more than for a full car-load.

Transportation companies do not furnish tank ars. When they are furnished by shippers, transcars. When they are turnished by snippers, trans-portation companies will pay three-fourths cent per mile rnn each way, and will return the empty tank to point of shipment without charge. Shipments of above articles at rates authorized are entirely at owner's risk of leakage and loss or

damage by fire.

Petroleum and its products in tank cars will be delivered only when consigned to parties at points at which they have proper unloading and storage facilities; and when shipments in tank cars are consigned to parties who have not such facilities the shipments will be returned to the shippers at their risk and expense.

FIRST.-Inasmuch as the gross tare and net weight FIRST.—Inasmuch as the gross tare and net weight of each barrel is plainly marked on the head of the barrel, when shipments are loaded at the mills agents at shipping points will require shippers to load marked-head up, ascertaining the gross weight from each barrel and billing accordingly.

SECOND.—In cases where shippers fail to so load, agents will carefully weigh on track scales and bill at weight so ascertained.

THIRD.—When shipments are hauled to depots, the gross weight must be ascertained from each barrel.

FOURTH.—In cases where billing fails to show shipments to have been weighed at point of origin or in transit, receiving lines must in all cases bill at weights ascertained in accordance with Rules 1 and 2.

If there are no track scales at the junction points, weights must be ascertained at destination. By destination is meant the point where final delivery is effected or delivery is made to connecting lines at the gateways of this Association.

EXPRESS FREIGHT CLASSIFICATION.

RULES.

1. Graduated rates apply to matter weighing less than 100 pounds when the rate is under \$2.00 (I) per 100 pounds and to matter weighing less than 50 pounds when the rate is \$2.00 (I) or more per 100 pounds. EXAMPLE:—Between points where the rate per 100 pounds is \$1.75 (H) a box weighing 73 pounds must be charged for at the graduated rate under \$1.75 (H), which makes the proper charges on "over 70 to 75 pounds" \$1.50.

Packages exceeding 7 pounds carried by more than one company, graduated for each company

unless otherwise instructed.

2. When the rate between any two points is not given in the graduated rates, use the next higher rate for making price, but do not charge more than for 100 pounds at the actual rate. EXAMPLE:—The correct charge for 75 pounds at 80 cents per 100 pounds would be 80 cents, and not \$1.00, according to the graduate on 75 pounds at \$1.00. If the rate exceeds \$20.00 (CC) per 100 pounds, charge pound rates, but never less than \$20.00 (CC) graduated rate for same weight.

3. When the rate per 100 pounds is \$2.00 (I) or more, charge pound rates for 50 pounds or over; but the charge for less than 50 pounds in weight must not be greater than the charge for 50 pounds. If less than \$2.00 (I) per 100 pounds, charge

graduated rates.

Two or more packages weighing each 20 pounds or over forwarded by one shipper at the same time to one consignee may be charged for on the aggre-

gate weight as above.

Packages weighing less than 20 pounds each, shipped as in the foregoing section, may be aggregated, provided they are estimated and charged for as weighing 20 pounds each. Actual weight only must be entered on the way-bill.

If articles of different classes are aggregated, the charge must be made at the rate applying to

the highest class.

To properly carry out the above provisions in regard to aggregating the weights and charges on two or more packages sent by one shipper to one consignee, receiving clerks and wagon men are hereby instructed that in all cases when two or more articles are shipped at the same time to one address, to mark distinctly on each and every article the number receipted for and the hour of the day, thus: 3 packages 11 a.m.; 2 packages 4 p. m.

All matter must be charged for at actual gross weight at the time of shipment, unless otherwise specially provided for. Estimated weights on shipments usually made with ice are only to be applied when ice is used. When no ice is used

gross weights must be charged.

4. EXTRA RATE CHARGES.—On matter subject to extra rate, as one and one-half or double rate, and graduated rate according to tariff, and then add one-half, or double it, as required. EXAMPLE: find graduated rate according to tariff, and then add one-half, or double it, as required. EXAMPLE:—
If a package weighs 25 pounds rated at double rate, and the rate to destination is \$1.00 (E) per 100 pounds, the charge for 20 to 25 pounds is 50 cents; double this, \$1.00 is the proper amount.

5. VALUATION CHARGES.—When the value of any merchandise shipment (C. O. D. or otherwise) exceeds \$5.00, the following additional charge must be made on value: (Charge for value whether insured or not)

insured or not).

When merchandise rate is \$1.00 or less per 100 pounds, 5 cents for each \$100 value or fraction thereof.

When merchandise rate exceeds \$1.00 and not more than \$3.00 per 100 pounds, 10 cents for each \$100 value or fraction thereof.

When merchandise rate exceeds \$3.00 and not more than \$8.00 per 100 pounds, 15 cents for each

\$100 value or fraction thereof.

When merchandise rate exceeds \$8 00 per 100 pounds, 20 cents for each \$100 value or fraction

thereof.

These rates must not be applied to shipments of money or bonds, being intended to apply only to packages or shipments of merchandise, jewelry and valuable papers.

The charges for valuation above given are to be made on the through rate whether carried by one or more companies, and in the latter case are to be divided between the companies carrying on the same basis as said companies divide the trans-

portation charges, except as noted below.
7. C. O. D. MATTER.—The letters "C. O. D." and amount to be collected must be plainly marked upon each article with which a bill is sent to be collected on delivery, and a similar entry made upon the way-bill. If shipper requires collection of charges for return of money, the C. O. D. envelope and package must be plainly marked "C. O.

. \$----- and return charges" and so way-billed. Allow examination of C. O. D. matter only upon written authority of shipper endorsed by agent at shipping point. When such authority is endorsed on the transfer envelope, it shall also be accepted. Such endorsement not to be made until shippers sign an agreement releasing the company from all loss incident to such examination.

All orders to deliver C. O. D. goods without collecting C. O. D. must have the approval of the agent of the company at the shipping point.

When C. O. D. matter is, by order of shipper, through the agent at point of shipment, delivered without collecting return the C. O. D. bill and

without collecting, return the C. O. D. bill and envelope way-bill free.

If C. O. D. matter is refused, or can not be de-

livered, the shipper must be immediately notified, and if not disposed of within thirty days after such notice, it may be returned subject to charges both ways.

C. O. D. matter, and paid C. O. D.'s returned to shipper, must take same route and pass through the hands of same company or companies as when

originally forwarded.

C. O. D.'S AND COLLECTIONS BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND OTHER COUNTRIES. - Shippers desiring currency or coin different from that current where collection is to be made must write their instructions plainly on the C. O. D. bill or collection.

8. Give a receipt of the prescribed form for all matter received without regard to the distance to be carried. Always ask shippers to declare the value, and when given insert it in the receipt, mark it on the package and enter amount on the mark it on the package and enter amount on the way-bill. If shippers refuse to state value, write or stamp on the receipt "value asked and not given." When received at owner's risk, write or stamp on face of receipt "at owner's risk," Receive stove and other fragile castings, firebrick and emery wheels at owner's risk only.

9. Require prepayment or guarantee of charges for, and so way-bill, old valises, hand-bags, bundles of blankets, seeds, cuttings, shrubbery, plants, samples, medicines, and for all matter evidently not worth charges.

When matter is way-billed or transferred guaranteed, the guarantee covers the charges of all companies carrying to original point of destination, and is limited to 60 days. Therefore, agents receiving matter way-billed "guaranteed" must report to billing office within 60 days of date

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of way-bill any failure to collect charges on same.

10. Gunpowder, dynamite, kerosene, benzine, naphtha, gasoline, matches and all other explosive

or dangerous inflammable oils, acids or materials must not be received for transportation.

Men, women or children must not be received

for transportation.

11. Fancy poultry, pet stock or dogs that have paid double merchandise rates to fairs and exhibitions, may be returned free if accompanied by a certificate from the secretary that they are being returned to the original owner.

AND

ADJUSTMENT OF COMPLAINTS.

OPINION OF SUPREME COURT IN CASE OF DENNIS SIMMONS LUMBER COMPANY V. A'TLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY ON APPEAL FROM THE NORTH CAROLINA CORPORATION COMMISSION.

CLARK, C. J. A petition was filed before the Corporation Commission by The Dennis Simmons Lumber Company, whose plant is located at Elm City, asking that the defendant be required to put in track scales for weighing lumber shipped in car-load lots from that point. It was in evidence that the defendant had such scales at twenty-one other points on its North Carolina and Virginia division, at which there were saw-mills, among them Weldon, Tillery, Parmele, Washington, and Rocky Mount; that on the lumber shipped by the plaintiff at Elm City it paid \$30,385 freight in 1903, being more freight than was paid on car-load shipments at several points where the defendant had put in such scales; that the scales, if put in, would cost the defendant about \$1,000; that the defendant offered to put in such scales if the plaintiff would add onefourth of a cent per 1,000 pounds to its present rate of eight cents, which would cost the plaintiff very nearly \$950 additional per annum; that there was very little car-load freight requiring the use of such scales shipped from Elm City except that shipped by the petitioner, and that the plaintiff had now to ship its lumber unweighed and would pay freight upon its estimated weight, which would be corrected when the lumber was later weighed at Rocky Mount or Pinner's Point, at which places en route the defendant had track scales; the plaintiff objected to this latter arrangement because it gave it no opportunity to see to the correctness of the weighing, and gave in evidence of serious inaccuracies in the weights as thus made elsewhere and reported to them.

Upon the above evidence the Corporation Commission found the facts in accordance therewith and ordered that "the defendant furnish track scales at Elm City for the purpose of weighing all car-load shipments from that point." Upon appeal by the defendant to the Superior Court the evidence was substantially the same, except the additional fact that the petitioner expected to get through cutting timber at Elm City in two years, when its plant would be removed to Kenly, another point on the defendant's road, where it would have ten years' cutting, and the scales could be removed to that point for the same use. The plaintiff tendered the following issues:

1. Is it reasonable that the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company be required for the convenience of shippers of freight to put in track scales at Elm City?

2. Are track scales a necessary convenience for the use of shippers of freight at Elm City?

At the close of the plaintiff's evidence the defendant offered no evidence, but demurred to the plaintiff's evidence. The plaintiff asked the Court to instruct the jury to answer both issues "Yes." To the refusal of the Court to submit the issues tendered, and also to the refusal to instruct the jury as prayed, the plaintiff excepted. The Court held with the defendant on the ground as stated in the judgment that the Corporation Commission "had no power under the law to make the order appealed from, sustained the demurrer on that ground, and reversed the judgment" of the Corporation Commission.

There was error in the judgment that the Corporation Commission "had no power under the law to make the order appealed from." The power of the Legislature to supervise, regulate and control the rates and conduct of common carriers has come down to us from the remotest times of the common law, and that this regulation may be exercised either directly or through a commission has been repeatedly held by this Court and by the Supreme Court of the United States. Railroad Connection Case, 137 N. C., at p. 15, and cases there cited. The contest here is simply and substantially a reiteration of the issue in that case, which is whether the State, through its Corporation Commission, has power to exercise a "general control and supervision of railroads" within this State in their dealings with the public.

Section 1 of the act creating the Commission provides that it "shall have such general control and supervision of all railroads, * * companies, or corporations engaged in the carrying of freight or passengers * * necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this act." Section 2 empowers and directs the Commission "to make just and reasonable rules and regulations for the handling of freight and baggage at stations." Section 17 provides that "all railroad companies in this State shall on demand issue duplicate freight receipts to shippers, in which shall be stated the class or classes of freight shipped and the freight charges over the road giving the receipt."

A literal compliance with the last clause would require on demand of the shipper that the articles shipped be weighed in every instance, that the shipper may see for himself what he must pay. But inasmuch as at many stations the quantity of freight shipped in car-load lots would make it an unnecessary burden to require at such points means of weighing car-loads to ascertain the freight to be charged, the Corporation Commission, under the further clause, Section 2 (12), to "require depot accommodations commensurate with the business and revenue," has not required track scales at all points, but has made reasonable rules for regulating, by a standing estimate, the weight in car-load lots of different articles shipped from such stations. But this is not in derogation of the right and duty of the Commission to require track scales or other proper facilities for weighing car-load freight to be put in at such points as the quantity of business may justify it. The Commission can order new depots (Laws 1899, ch. 164, sec. 2, (12)) established wherever they are needed (R. R. Co. v. Minn., 193 U. S., 63), and of course has the lesser power to require proper facilities at those already established. This sub-section provides that the Commission may require "the erection of depot accommodations commensurate with such business and revenue."

The traffic manager of the defendant, on the trial before the Corporation Commission, in his evidence, rested his opposition largely upon the ground that he "did not wish a precedent set that the Corporation Commission could order track scales put in anywhere, because they might order them at points where the business would not justify it." His defense and the judgment below are to the same effect, *i. e.*, a denial of the power of the Corporation Commission to require such accommodations to be rendered the public. But this is error. The power does exist. It cannot be unreasonably exercised, and such orders are subject to review by the Superior Court and by this Court. The Court should have left the reasonableness of the order to the jury upon proper instructions as to the law. The ruling that the Commission "had no power" to make such orders deprived the complainant of any opportunity of presenting his contentions as to the reasonableness of the order for review. The traffic manager's view (which was sustained by the Court below) leaves such orders absolutely to the railroad's own will and pleasure, and if its refusal is unreasonable and unjust, there would be no correction.

It was precisely for this reason that the Corporation Commission was created—an impartial body representing neither the shipper nor the railroad to supervise and control the operations of these great corporations, that justice may be done shippers and the public by reasonable orders and requirements, such orders being subject, if unreasonable, to review by the same tribunals which protect and safeguard the lives, the liberty, and the property of every citizen in the land—the courts with their juries and judges. It is in this way that a demand like that made by the petitioner in this case shall be held reasonable or unreasonable, and not by the arbitrary and irreviewable decision of the defendant. It would be as just to place the granting of the demand in the irreviewable power of the shipper as to give the refusal of the request to the other party. The Corporation Commission was created as an impartial tribunal to decide such matters, "to have general control and supervision of all railroad * * companies or corporations, and of all other corporations engaged in carrying freight or passengers." "Track scales" are not specifically mentioned in the act, but there is the power to "require depot accommodations commensurate with the business and revenue" at the respective stations, and to require "repairs or additions" to any station, "the removal or establishment of a station," the raising or lowering the tracks, etc., to promote the "convenience or accommodation of the public." There was no intention to give a schedule of the thousands of appliances used in handling the business of common carriers, nor to enumerate the countless dealings between them and their patrons, which such Commission should supervise. The clearly declared purpose was to put the control and supervision of the whole matter in the hands of an impartial commission with power to make reasonable rules and orders, subject to the right of appeal by either party—the shipper or the carrier—to the courts, instead of leaving such dealings to the unrestricted will of one party, the carrier.

This appeal rests solely upon the denial of power to make any order in the premises. It cannot be said that there was no evidence tending to show that the order was reasonable. The defendant had put in track scales at other points where fewer car-loads were shipped. It offered to put in the scales if the petitioner would pay higher rates (amounting annually to nearly the full cost of scales and of putting them in) than was paid by shippers at points where such scales had been put in. Indeed, this was a discrimination against the petitioner. The petitioner had for five years been denied its request for like facilities with the stations shipping less lumber, and it should not be

deemed unreasonable, per se, to order such facilities because only two years remained. Besides, the defendant could remove the scales when no longer needed. At least, there was evidence to submit the reasonableness of the order to the jury. Under the statute, "depot accommodations should be commensurate with the business and revenue." Certainly it would have been a discrimination to have required, as the defendant proposed, that the defendant would put in the scales in consideration of adding one-fourth cent to the rate of eight cents now charged the petitioner, being about \$950 per year for weighing (as was the defendant's duty) the petitioner's lumber. The petitioner was not unreasonable in asking that the lumber be weighed there instead of at Pinner's Point, especially in view of the admission that the weights at the latter point, as reported thence, had varied near 25 per cent, per car-load on the same class of lumber.

The defendant pressed the point that this petition "affected only one point and one shipper" and was therefore a discrimination. All such petitions and orders must necessarily apply to the one station where the additional facility is demanded. If the defendant itself was passing upon the application it would only consider the necessity for it at that point. It would be unreasonable to the defendant to apply such order to all stations. Nor is it material to the defendant that the \$30,385 freight was paid on car-load lots shipped by one shipper, there being only 42 car-loads shipped by others. It is not the number of shippers, but the number of car-loads to be weighed, which is the test whether it is reasonable to have facilities for weighing car-loads upon track scales at that point. The petitioner itself consists of several persons. It is not to be discriminated against because it is a corporation.

We were more inclined to be impressed with the argument that the petitioner would only cut lumber two years longer at that point; but on the other hand, the petitioner had already shipped lumber from that point for five years, during much of which time they had been in vain asking this facility that they might see their lumber weighed, and the freight for the two years to come to be paid by the petitioner would be over \$60,000, which would well seem to justify the furnishing track scales at a cost of \$1,000 (which the defendant had put in at several points making smaller shipments), especially taken in connection with the further evidence that the petitioner has ten years' cutting at Kenly, another station on the defendant's road, to which the track scales can then be moved, if the car-load shipments at Elm City will not justify keeping them there.

It was error to hold that the Corporation Commission "had no power" to make the order, and it was also error to refuse to submit to the jury the issues tendered by the plaintiff as to the reasonableness of the order and the necessity for such appliances for shippers of freight at Elm City.

Not only was the plaintiff's request to submit issues as to the reasonableness and necessity for the order refused by the Court, but the Court did not pass upon them itself, for, instead of ruling upon the defendant's demurrer to the evidence upon its merits, the Court held, ex mero motu, that the Commission had no jurisdiction of such cause of action, and no cause of action was stated, for it reversed the order on the ground, as stated in the judgment, because "the Corporation Commission had no power to make the order applied for." If such ruling was error, we must so hold, for it is the only question presented by the appeal, and the case must go back that the Court or the jury, upon proper instructions, as the case may be, may pass upon the reasonableness and necessity

of the order in controversy. This is not the case where a demurrer to the evidence is sustained on the merits, but here, the ruling that the Corporation Commission had no jurisdiction because of want of power, in fact cut the Court off from any ruling upon the demurrer to the evidence.

It may be that upon the reinstatement of the case and trial, the defendant may be able to put in evidence presenting sufficient reasons why the order sought is not reasonable and just, or in the lapse of time since, the timber may have been cut off so that the scales are not needed (if so, of course a nonsuit will be taken); or it may be that the petitioner or others at that station may have acquired timber making the scales necessary. These will be appropriate matters to put in evidence at such trial (if the application for the order is not withdrawn), but do not effect the sole point before us, which is as to the power of the Corporation Commission to make the order. The ruling in effect was that there was a defect of jurisdiction in that the Corporation Commission had no power to make such order, and was error.

Petition for depot facilities at Nebo, a station on line of defendant's road. It appearing, upon answer, that defendant was willing to construct a combination depot at this place, and this was satisfactory to complainant, case was closed.

McEWEN LUMBER COMPANY v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint of discrimination in freight rate on lumber from points contiguous to Asheville to Southern points in favor of shipments from Chattanooga to same points. It appearing that rates complained of were interstate, and without the jurisdiction of the Commission, case was dismissed.

McCORMICK v. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY and SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY.

Complaint of failure of defendant roads to make connection with their passenger trains at Pembroke, a station at the crossing of defendants' roads for

the interchange of passengers. This complaint was served and, it appearing from answer of defendants that the connection asked for would be made, and no further relief being asked, case was closed.

CONSUMERS COTTON OIL COMPANY V. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complaint of failure of defendant to transfer car-loads of freight at Kelford for connecting railroad, and claim for \$2 transfer charge. Defendant refunded the transfer charge claimed and made arrangements for the transfer of carload freights in the future. No further relief being asked, case was closed.

TERRELL V. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY.

Claim for \$2.50 on account of lost shipment of pipe. Claim paid and case closed.

BELL v. ATLANTIC AND NORTH CAROLINA RAILROAD COMPANY. Claim for lost shipment of freight. Claim paid.

PEARL ROLLER MILLS v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Claim for \$92.61 on account of shortage in shipment of freight. Claim paid and case closed.

CUMBERLAND TRUCKERS' ASSOCIATION V. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complaint of depot facilities for the protection of shipments of truck. It appearing that defendant had granted the request of petitioners by providing a covered platform for the protection of shipments of truck, and no further relief being asked, case was closed.

This was a petition asking to be allowed to put in effect a special rate on ice from Raleigh to Hamlet for re-icing purposes. It appearing that the Commission was not authorized to grant the reduced rate proposed unless the rate should be made applicable to and from all points, application was denied.

CITIZENS OF ADDIE v. SOUTHERN EXPRESS COMPANY.

Petition for express office at Addie. Granted.

ISENHOWER & SON v. SOUTHERN EXPRESS COMPANY.

Application for establishment of express facilities at Conover. Granted.

DORSETT V. SOUTHERN BELL TELEPHONE COMPANY.

Complaint of telephone service at Spencer. It appearing that the service had been improved to the satisfaction of complainant, and no further relief being asked, case was closed.

SUMRELL & McCOY to THE COMMISSION.

Complaint and claim for delay in transportation of an interstate shipment of freight. Dismissed for want of jurisdiction.

TOMPKINS COMPANY to THE COMMISSION.

Application for reduction in classification of cotton and woolen machinery. See Circular No. 50.

CAROLINA MACHINERY COMPANY V. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY.

Complaint of delay in transportation of boiler. Adjusted by correspondence.

STOKES & SHANNONHOUSE V. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint of discrimination by granting free transportation to competitor in business. It appearing that the free transportation had been withdrawn, and complainant asking no further relief, case was dismissed.

HOPKINS V. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY.

Complaint and claim for lost shipment of freight. Adjusted by correspondence.

MORRIS v. SOUTHERN EXPRESS COMPANY.

Petition asking that defendant be required to give free delivery of express in Gastonia. Petition granted.

ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY to THE COMMISSION.

Petition asking to be allowed to close Wilmington agencies on Saturday at 1 o'clock P. M. during the months of June, July, August, and September. Granted.

BROUGHTON V. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY and SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint of discrimination in passenger rates from North Carolina points to Toronto on account of International Sunday-school Association in favor of South Carolina and Georgia points. This complaint was served on defendants and answer was received, stating that a readjustment of the rates would be made. BRACKETT V. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

. Claim for \$10 on account of demurrage. Adjusted and claim withdrawn.

ELLIOTT V. NORFOLK AND SOUTHERN RAILROAD COMPANY.

Claim for lost shipment of eggs. Adjusted.

CITIZENS OF BEAUFORT v. SOUTHERN EXPRESS COMPANY.

Petition asking that defendant be required to establish an express office at Beaufort. It appearing that the Commission was without authority, case was dismissed.

CITIZENS OF RED SPRINGS, FLORAL COLLEGE, and LUMBER BRIDGE v. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

This was a petition asking that defendant be required to provide a new passenger train or change the schedule of their existing trains to the end that connection would be made at Maxton with the trains of the Seaboard Air Line Railway. CITIZENS OF ATKINSON v. WESTERN UNION TELEGRAPH COMPANY.

Petitioners asking in this case that defendant be required to establish a telegraph office at Atkinson. It appearing, upon investigation, that the Commission was without jurisdiction in the matter, the case was dismissed.

PARKER V. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complaint of failure of defendant to furnish cars for the movement of lumber. It appearing that the relief asked had been granted, case was dismissed.

Petition for depot facilities at Tabor, a station on the line of defendant's road. It appearing that defendant was willing to add two waiting-rooms to the present depot building, and this being satisfactory to the petitioners, case was closed.

BURKE TANNING COMPANY v. CALDWELL AND NORTHERN RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complaint of freight rate on tan-bark. Adjusted.

PETERS GROCERY COMPANY v. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complaint of demurrage charges. Complainant failing to furnish information necessary for investigation, case was dismissed.

FOX & SMITH V. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint and claim for \$25 on account of demurrage. Claim paid and case closed.

COBB v. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Petition for depot facilities at Lumber Bridge, a station on line of defendant's road. Dismissed.

WILDER & GRIFFIN V. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY.

Complaint of delay in forwarding freight. Adjusted.

MAXWELL V. SOUTHERN BELL TELEPHONE COMPANY.

Petitioner in this case asks that defendant be required to connect its wires with those of other telephone companies in order to make through connection. It appearing that the Commission had no authority to require telephone companies to connect with each other, case was dismissed.

RAY v. SOUTH AND WESTERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint of failure of defendant to furnish cars for the movement of petitioner's lumber. Adjusted.

ALFRED V. ATLANTIC AND NORTH CAROLINA RAILROAD COMPANY and SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Claim for damage to car-load shipment of potatoes. It appearing that the matter was one in which the Commission could take no jurisdiction, case was dismissed.

WESTERN UNION TELEGRAPH COMPANY to THE COMMISSION.

Petitioner in this case asked to be allowed to discontinue telegraph office at Pine Level. There being no objection to this course on the part of the citizens of Pine Level, petition was allowed.

COOPER & COMPANY v. SOUTHERN EXPRESS COMPANY.

Complaint and claim for damage on account of failure of defendant to return empty chicken-crates. Claim paid and case closed.

WYSONG & MILES COMPANY V. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Petitioner filed petition as follows:

THE WYSONG & MILES COMPANY V.

SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

To the Honorable the North Carolina Corporation Commission:

Your petitioner, complaining of the defendant, alleges:

First. That it, said petitioner, is a manufacturing corporation duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of North Carolina, and having its principal office and place of business in the city of Greensboro, North Carolina.

Second. That the defendant, the Southern Railway Company, is a common carrier, organized under the laws of the State of Virginia, and is the lessee of

and controlling and operating a line of railway within the State of North Carolina under the corporate name of the North Carolina Railroad Company, which said line of railway runs from Goldsboro in said State via Greensboro to Charlotte in said State.

Third. That the petitioner has its manufacturing plant near to, that is to say, within a distance of less than one hundred and twenty-five (125) feet of the North Carolina Railroad Company, and in the course of the year it handles great volumes of freight, having during the year ending November 30, 1904, paid to the said Southern Railway Company the sum of \$1,630.16 on incoming freights, and its shipments of outgoing freights are estimated to amount to the sum of \$2,030.16.

Fourth. That it is of the utmost necessity to the petitioner that it be furnished with side-track facilities to the end that it may handle its business with promptness and dispatch. Said business being the manufacture of heavy machinery, the lack of said side-track facilities causes it great expense and inconvenience as well as delay to the Southern Railway Company in promptly releasing cars loaded with heavy machinery consigned to the petitioner.

Fifth. Your petitioner further showeth that the defendant, the Southern Railway Company, could construct a siding fully ample to accommodate this petitioner and give it the requisite facilities for handling its business by building a side-track, a distance of not more than two hundred and twenty-five feet, and that the cost of such side-track, as it is informed and believes, would not exceed the sum of \$450, and that the freights received by the Southern Railway Company from your petitioner are far in excess of this sum every year, as will be shown by reference to the figures above set out.

Sixth. Your petitioner further showeth unto the Court that it is now and always has been ready and willing to comply with any reasonable demands or regulations on the part of said Southern Railway Company, and hereby proffers to comply with all such reasonable demands and regulations, but it is informed and believes that the Southern Railway Company willfully, arbitrarily and obstinately refuses to put said siding in for the accommodation of this petitioner without any legal reason or sufficient excuse therefor.

Wherefore, this petitioner prays this honorable Court for an order issuing to the said defendant commanding it to furnish to this petitioner proper side-track facilities in accordance with law.

Scales, Taylor & Scales, Attorneys for Petitioner.

This petition was served on defendant company with request for answer. It appearing from answer of defendant that an agreement had been reached with petitioner for the construction of siding desired, and petitioner desiring to withdraw the petition, it was so allowed.

CITIZENS OF DRUM HILL V. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Petitioners in this case ask that defendant be required to build a depot at Drum Hill, a station on the line of defendant's road. It appearing from answer that defendant was willing to construct a depot satisfactory to the complainants, case was closed.

MERCHANTS GROCERY COMPANY v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint of refusal of defendant to place cars on siding. It appearing from answer of defendant that arrangements for placing cars on siding, satisfactory to complainant, had been agreed upon, case was dismissed.

TOWN OF LEXINGTON v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Petitioners in this case asked that defendant be required to stop certain of its fast trains at Lexington for the delivering and receiving of passengers. It appearing, upon investigation, that the statute allowed railroad companies to run through trains without stopping at all points, provided sufficient local service was given, and it appearing that there was sufficient local service at Lexington, case was dismissed.

ZACHARY & OSBORNE V. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint of discrimination in freight rates on cattle from points on the Murphy branch to points in Virginia in favor of shipments from East Tennessee points to same points in Virginia. It appearing that the shipments were interstate commerce, and the Commission had no jurisdiction in the matter, case was dismissed.

BRYSON CITY PUMP WORKS COMPANY v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint of freight rate on pumps to Eastern markets. Adjusted.

MOORE & CO. v. SOUTHEN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Claim for \$65 on account of lost freight. Claim paid.

McPhail & Blue Company v. Seaboard Air Line Railway and Aberdeen and Rockfish Railroad Company. Claim for \$1.48, overcharge on shipment of oats.

CITIZENS OF WYATT V. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY.

Petitioners in this case complained that defendant had discontinued the stopping of trains Nos. 38 and 41 at Wyatt, a station on line of defendant's road. It appearing, upon investigation, that accommodations were given by the stopping of an additional train at this point, case was dismissed.

CITIZENS OF POWHATAN v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Petition for extension of siding. Granted.

RICHARDSON v. ATLANTIC AND NORTH CAROLINA RAILROAD COMPANY.

Petition for depot facilities at Dover, a station along the line of defendant's road. Petition granted.

MEWBORN & CO. v. NORFOLK AND SOUTHERN RAILROAD COMPANY.

Claim for lost shipment of box of meat. Claim paid and case closed.

MEWBORN & CO. v. ATLANTIC AND NORTH CAROLINA RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complaint of wharfage charge. It appearing that the charge was in accord with the usual charges for this service, case was dismissed.

NORTH CAROLINA CASE-WORKERS' ASSOCIATION v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint of failure of defendant to furnish cars. Adjusted.

SMITH V. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Claim for overcharge on barrel of tar. It appearing, upon investigation, that there was no overcharge, case was dismissed.

BARWICK V. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Claim for lost shipment of freight. Complainant failing to furnish information asked for necessary for investigation, case was dismissed.

BALFOUR QUARRY COMPANY V. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Petitioner in this case asked that defendant be required to establish telephone service at depot. It appearing that the Commission was without authority to grant the relief asked for, case was dismissed.

CAROLINA COAL AND ICE COMPANY v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint of freight rate on coal. Adjusted by correspondence.

SEAWELL v. SOUTHERN EXPRESS COMPANY.

Claim for \$7 on account of lost freight. Claim paid.

LILES v. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY COMPANY.

Complaint of failure of defendant to furnish cars. Adjusted by correspondence.

ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY to THE COMMISSION.

Application for one-half rate on shipment of building material and lumber to be used in building a new church at Faison. Granted.

PEELE BROS. & McGILL v. ABERDEEN AND ROCKFISH RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complaint of freight rate on cotton. Adjusted.

NORTH CAROLINA CASE-WORKERS' ASSOCIATION to THE COMMISSION.

Construction of classification of tables. Adjusted by correspondence.

SCULL & CO. v. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complaint of overcharge on shipment of shrubbery. It appearing that the overcharge on shipments complained of were all interstate shipments, and the Commission being without authority to correct same, case was dismissed.

McKINNON V. ABERDEEN AND ROCKFISH RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complaint in reference to routing of freight. Adjusted.

BRYSON CITY PUMP WORKS COMPANY v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Petitioners in this case asked that defendant be required to put in effect milling-in-transit rates between Bryson City, N. C., and Louisville and Cincinnati. It appearing that the Commission was without authority to grant the relief asked for by petitioner, case was dismissed.

MOYER v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Petitioner in this case complained of the condition of the grounds at and around defendant's depot at Lexington, N. C. This complaint was served on defendant and answer received thereto, saying that instructions had been given to put grounds in proper condition for the convenience of the patrons of the depot in handling freights. It appearing that the work had been done and satisfactory to complainants, case was closed.

CITIZENS OF MONROE v. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY.

Petitioners in this case asked that defendant be required to establish a more commodious and convenient passenger station at Monroe, a station on line of defendant's road. It appearing, upon investigation, that defendant was willing to grant the relief asked for by petitioners, and no further relief being asked, case was closed.

CITIZENS OF TAYLORSVILLE V. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Petitioners in this case complained of the freight service between Statesville and Taylorsville. Complaint was served on defendant, and, after considerable correspondence, defendant agreed to extend trains Nos. 23 and 24 between Statesville and Taylorsville; and this being satisfactory to complainants, and no further relief being asked, case was closed.

HUSKE HARDWARE HOUSE v. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complaint of delay and claim for damage in transportation of car-load of freight. It appearing, upon investigation, that the case was one in which the Commission could take no jurisdiction, case was dismissed.

ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY to THE COMMISSION.

Application for reduced rate on lumber from Goldsboro to Pelham to be used in construction of church. Granted.

ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY to THE COMMISSION.

Application for reduced rate on stone from Sanford to Greenville for the construction of church at Greenville. Granted.

ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY to THE COMMISSION.

Application for reduced rate on lumber from Everett to Conway for construction of church at Conway. Granted.

ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY to THE COMMISSION.

Application for reduced rate on lumber and material for church at Greensboro. Granted.

SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY to THE COMMISSION.

Application for reduced rate on building material for erection of mill at Rockingham. Granted.

ATLANTIC AND NORTH CAROLINA RAILROAD COMPANY to THE COMMISSION.

Petitioner in this case asked to be allowed to apply a freight rate of \$1.30 per ton on fertilizers between New Bern and Kinston to meet water competition. Granted.

SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY to THE COMMISSION.

Special rates granted as follows:

STEVENSON COMPANY v. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

This is complaint for failure to pay \$6 demurrage on Seaboard Air Line Railway car No. 7018 and \$2 demurrage on car No. 10607 by defendant to complainant.

The facts appear to be as follows: Car No. 7018, consigned to complainant, was transported to Wilmington, N. C., on the 27th of February, 1905, by the Seaboard Air Line Company. There was a contract between the Seaboard Air Line Company and the consignee that this car would be delivered at consignee's place of business on defendant's dummy-line in the city of Wilmington, and, in pursuance of this agreement the Seaboard Air Line Company delivered this car to defendant and paid, or agreed to pay, \$1.50 for switching service, which is the price agreed upon by the railroad company for this switching service. This car was found by defendant not to be in proper repair and was promptly returned to the Seaboard Air Line Company to be put in proper repair. Car was repaired and returned to defendant on March 6th, and on March 7th was placed at complainant's place of business for unloading.

Car No. 10607 was consigned to complainant at Wilmington, and arrived there over the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad on January 18, 1905.

On same day freight was paid and car was ordered to be placed at complainant's place of business on the dummy-line in the city of Wilmington. There was an implied agreement between complainant and defendant that this car would be so placed. The car was not placed for unloading until January 23, 1905.

Upon the foregoing facts the Commission is of the opinion that the complainant is entitled to recover \$2 for failure to place Car No. 10607, from January 18 to January 23, and it is so ordered.

It does not appear that defendant had been guilty of such negligence as to Car No. 7018 as to violate any rule of the Commission, assuming it to be true that the delay to place this car was by reason of returning the same to the Seaboard Air Line Company for repairs, which is not disputed.

CAROLINA-PORTLAND CEMENT COMPANY v. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

This is a proceeding for the purpose of having defendant refund to complainants the sum of \$7, which it is alleged was wrongfully collected by defendant as demurrage.

The facts are as follows: Complainant shipped car-load of lime, consisting of 125 barrels, from Sherwood, Tennessee, to J. W. Ward, Jr., at Wilmington, N. C., on the 10th of August, 1904. The bill of lading was sent to E. B. Williamson, agent of the Seaboard Air Line Railway at Wilmington, with instructions as to disposition of the car. Bill of lading showed shipment made in N. C. & St. L. Car No. 6762. En route the car-load was transferred to Southern Car No. 24176, but neither the consignor nor consignee were advised of this fact. The bill of lading was forwarded to E. B. Williamson by letter from Charleston, S. C., under date of the 15th of August, 1904. Southern Car No. 24176 arrived in Wilmington on the 19th day of August, 1904, and on that date the Atlantic Coast Line Company's agent mailed notice by postal card to J. W. Ward, Jr., at Wilmington, stating that the Southern Car No. 34176, consigned to bim, had arrived. This notice was not received by J. W. Ward, Jr., as he lived at Benson, N. C. This notice did not give the car number called for in bill of lading nor the correct number of Southern car to which the load of car described in bill of lading had been transferred, nor the weight and amount of freight charges due thereon as shown by way-bill. Immediately upon receipt of bill of lading E. B. Williamson made inquiry of defendant for the car, and this was repeated from day to day until the freight was found. which was seven days after free time had expired, as claimed by defendant. The agent of complainant and J. W. Ward, Jr., were required to pay and did pay \$7 demurrage before the freight would be delivered.

Upon these facts the Commission is of opinion that defendant was not authorized to collect any demurrage, and that \$7 so collected should be returned to complainant, to whom it is now due.

Franklin McNeill, Chairman. First. The notice was insufficient. In this case the notice should have shown Southern Car No. 24176 and the N. C. & St. L. Car No. 6762, from which the car-load had been transferred, and also the weight and charges. It is no answer to this that J. W. Ward, Jr., did not receive the card, and was not, therefore, misled by it. The rule requires that railroad companies must serve notice in one of the ways provided for, and the right to enforce the penalty does not attach until this is done.

Second. If notice had been in proper form, no demurrage should be charged in this case, because it appears that agent for consignor and consignee had inquired for N. C. & St. L. Car No. 6762 from day to day during the days for which demurrage was claimed, and was informed by defendant's agent that such car had not arrived. The bill in possession of defendant's agent showed that this car had been unloaded into Southern Car No. 24176.

We do not agree to the position that making inquiry of defendant's yard-master was not sufficient diligence to relieve against the penalty. The yard-master should have inquired of such other agent or agents of defendant as could give information concerning the matter.

It is ordered that defendant refund to complainant \$7, charge as demurrage on this car.

ROUND PINE LUMBER COMPANY V. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY.

This is a petition for spur side-track of sufficient capacity to hold four cars on Seaboard Air Line Railway between Merry Oaks and New Hill, at 24th mile-post, for complainant's saw-mill, which is in operation about 800 yards from the proposed siding. The complainant proposes to construct a tramway from their mill to this siding.

The evidence shows that approximately 3,000,000 feet of lumber will be shipped by complainant from this siding within two years from the date of this construction and that the revenue derived therefrom by defendant will not be less than \$6,000.

The cost of constructing this side-track, the grading being done and cross-ties being furnished by the complainant, will be about \$200.

The Commission is of opinion that petitioners are entitled to the relief they ask, and it is, therefore, ordered, upon complainant doing the grading and furnishing the cross-ties, that defendant construct a spur siding of sufficient capacity to hold four cars, and that this be done on or before the 23d day of August, 1905.

EXCEPTIONS.

Exceptions by the defendant to the order of the Corporation Commission, dated July 6, 1905, and served upon defendant on July 14, 1905:

The Seaboard Air Line Railway Company, hereinafter called the company, excepts to the order and rule of the North Carolina Corporation Commission, hereinafter called the Commission, made in the above-entitled matter, dated July 6, 1905, and served July 14, 1905, upon the following grounds, to-wit:

First Exception.—The company excepts to said order upon the ground that it is unjust and unreasonable in the following respects:

- (a) Because the distance between Merry Oaks and New Hill is four miles, and there are the necessary and adequate side-tracks at both said places, and in addition thereto there are already existing between said places three more side-tracks. That there ought not to be any more side-tracks between said places, because the same are not necessary for the convenience of shippers, and add to the hazard of operating the railway.
- (b) Because complainant has no saw-mill located on the line of the company's road, but, as appears from the order of the Commission, complainant's saw-mill is located eight hundred yards from the proposed siding, and complainant proposes to construct a tramway from its mill to this siding, if established. Complainant could almost as easily construct this tramroad to some siding or station already established, or it could have located its mill at a point convenient to such station or siding. The company ought not to be compelled to increase the hazard of its operation by putting in an additional siding when complainant could have avoided such necessity so easily.
- (c) Because the siding or spur track requested is within one mile of a regular station, Merry Oaks.

Second Exception.—The company excepts to said order upon the ground that the enforcement of the same will entail considerable cost upon it, and will thereby work a deprivation of its property without compensation and without due process of law, in violation of the fourteenth amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Third Exception.—The company excepts to said order upon the ground that its enforcement will be the taking of its property for a private purpose, and without compensation and without due process of law, in violation of the fourteenth amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Fourth Exception.—The company excepts to said order upon the ground that the Commission is without power to make the same under the circumstances and evidence in this case.

Fifth Exception.—The company excepts to said order upon the ground that the evidence shows that complainant's mill is located half a mile from the proposed siding, and that the siding is not to be used in loading lumber from the mill, but from the complainant's tramroad, and that the Commission is without power to make such order.

Sixth Exception.—The company excepts to said order upon the ground that the enforcement of said order would increase the necessary hazard of operating its road, thereby adding to the dangers of travel and the carriage of freight over the same; and that the interest of the road and of the traveling public, and of those using the road as a common carrier of freights and passengers, is subordinated to the mere convenience of complainant, and that the said order ought not to be enforced.

All of the matters and things herein stated the company is ready and willing to establish by proof upon the hearing of these exceptions.

Wherefore, these exceptions considered, the Seaboard Air Line Railway Company respectfully asks that the order made on July 6, 1905, and served on July 14, 1905, by the North Carolina Corporation Commission, be revoked.

SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY COMPANY.

By Womack & Hayes, Pou & Fuller, Hearing on exceptions for Wednesday, July 26, 1905.

Mr. Pou, of counsel for defendant, in open court, asks leave to amend the exceptions heretofore filed, as follows:

In the first exception, sub-section A, in the fourth line of said sub-section, the word "three" to be stricken out and in place thereof the word "two" inserted. This amendment is asked because Mr. Pou states that he gathered from the correspondence and records that there were three side-tracks between said stations, and he learns to-day from Mr. Hudson that there are only two. This change is made to conform the exceptions to the facts.

And to add to said first exception, the following sub-section, to be known as sub-section D, and to read as follows:

(d) Because the location at which the said siding or spur track is requested is not a proper place at which to establish a side-track, the grade of the road being such that it is not proper or practicable to have the siding there.

This cause coming on to be heard upon exceptions by defendant, complainant being represented by H. E. Norris, Esq., and D. E. McIver, Esq., attorneys, and defendant being represented by James H. Pou, Esq., attorney, evidence was offered by both parties.

After full consideration, it is ordered that the exceptions be and they are hereby overruled, and that the order heretofore made is in all respects affirmed.

NOTICE OF APPEAL.

Whereas, the North Carolina Corporation Commission made an order in the above-entitled cause, to which exceptions were duly filed by the Seaboard Air Line Railway, which said exceptions were heard before the North Carolina Corporation Commission, after notice to the interested parties, and on July 28, 1905, the said Commission made an order overruling the exceptions of the Seaboard Air Line Railway to the said order theretofore made;

And whereas, the Seaboard Air Line Railway believes there is error in the action of the said the North Carolina Corporation Commission in making said order, and in overruling the said exceptions of the Seaboard Air Line Railway to the said order, which said errors are errors of fact as well as of law, and the said Seaboard Air Line Railway desires that all of the issues, both of law and of fact, shall be passed upon by a court of competent jurisdiction;

Now, therefore, the Seaboard Air Line Railway hereby prays an appeal, and gives notice thereof, from the said orders of the said the North Carolina Corporation Commission to the Superior Court, to the end that all of the issues, both of law and of fact, which arrive in the said orders and exceptions thereto may be tried and heard *de novo*, and said appellant is ready to give such bond as may be legally required of it, and to pay such costs and charges for making up transcript on appeal and the like as may be proper, and is ready and willing to do and perform all such other acts as may be necessary and proper to perfect the said appeal. This August 5, 1905.

Appeal granted.

Order of the Commission affirmed by both the Superior and Supreme Courts.

J. L. TOWNSEND AND OTHERS, H. A. TOWNSEND AND OTHERS V. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Petition was filed in this case by complainants, J. L. Townsend and others, praying for depot facilities at McDonalds, a place on branch road leading from Elrod to Conway.

Petition was also filed by complainants, H. A. Townsend and others, praying for depot facilities at Raynham, a place on same branch road.

The Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company answered, averring their readiness to erect a depot at either point, as the Corporation Commission might direct, but insisting that, because these places were within one and one-half miles of each other, they should only be required to erect a depot at one of the places.

The two petitions were heard together on January 5, 1905, J. L. Townsend and others being represented by their attorneys, McIntyre & Lawrence; H. A. Townsend and others being represented by their attorney, John D. Bellamy, Esq.; and the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company being represented by their attorney, N. A. McLean, Esq.

It appears from the evidence that Raynham is a place on the Elrod-Conway branch of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company, four miles from Elrod.

McDonalds is a place on the same branch road, five and one-half miles from Elrod. The nearest depot on said branch road south of Elrod is Ashpoie, eleven miles distant; so that McDonalds is midway between Ashpole and Elrod, being five and one-half miles from each. Raynham is about seven miles from Ashpole. The territory between Raynham and Elrod is within four miles of Elrod, a station on the main line of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad.

The Corporation Commission is of the opinion that depot facilities should be furnished by the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company at McDonalds, as prayed for, and it is so ordered; and that the depot be built adequate for the accommodation of passengers and freight at that point within sixty days from service of this order.

THE CITY OF DURHAM V. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY, NORTH CAROLINA RAILWAY COMPANY, SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY COMPANY, and NORFOLK AND WESTERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

Petition was filed in this case as follows:

To the Honorable the Corporation Commission of North Carolina:

The City of Durham petitioning, showeth:

- 1. That the City of Durham is a municipal corporation of North Carolina.
- 2. That the North Carolina Railroad Company is a corporation organized under the laws of North Carolina and owning a railroad extending from Goldsboro to Charlotte, through the City of Durham; that the Southern Railway Company is a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of North Carolina and is the lessee of the North Carolina Railroad Company and operates the same under and by virtue of a lease of August, 1895, running ninetynine years; that the Seaboard Air Line Railway Company is a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of North Carolina and owns a line extending parallel to the North Carolina Railroad Company from Duke's factory

in the City of Durham eastward to the corporate limits, said Seaboard Air Line Railway Company having succeeded to the title of the Durham and Northern Railway Company; that the Norfolk and Western Railway Company is a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of North Carolina and owns a line of railway extending from Lynchburg, Virginia, to the City of Durham, and as plaintiff is informed and believes, has leased from the Southern Railway a line of track from Chapel Hill Street east between the Seaboard Air Line Railway Company's track and the main line of the North Carolina Railway Company to the union depot.

- 3. That Carr Street is a regularly laid out street of the City of Durham, beginning at Morehead Avenue near the southern part of the town and extending to the main line of the North Carolina Railway Company and running under the same through a tunnel and ending at Peabody Street; that said Carr Street has a curb on either side, is macadamized most of the distance, has a brick sidewalk laid all the way on its western side and is greatly used by the people who live on Carr Street, Morehead Avenue, Duke Street, and other portions of the city adjacent thereto, and by 300 or 400 school children who attend Morehead Public School.
- 4. That the General Assembly of North Carolina at its session in the year 1905 passed an act entitled "An Act to Amend the Charter of the City of Durham," the same having been ratified the day of February, 1905, a copy of which said act is hereto attached, wherein the City of Durham is authorized and empowered to extend Carr Street under the railroad tracks crossing said street or the extension of said street and to cross the right-of-way of any railroad owning the same at said crossing or any extension of said street across said right-of-way; that by section 3 it was provided that the Corporation Commission of North Carolina is hereby authorized and empowered to ascertain upon notice and hearing the value of said right-of-way so taken by said street or any extension thereof across the same and to fix and determine the distance of the surface of said street or the extension of it to the railroad tracks overhead, and to require the raise when and to the extent necessary of the tracks of any railroad now crossing said street or any extension of said street, and fix and determine what part of the cost of making said crossing under said tracks on said street or any extension of same shall be paid by the City of Durham and any railroad company affected by said crossing.
- 5. The City of Durham, by its proper municipal authorities, has, under the power aforesaid, decided and determined to extend Carr Street, 48 feet wide, to Main Street, according to the plot hereto attached as a part of this petition, and that the said extension will cross under the main line of the North Carolina railroad and side-tracks built upon an embankment at the same grade of said main line, and also, under the track leased or to be leased by the Southern Railway Company to the Norfolk and Western Railway Company is an approach by it to the union station and under some of the yard-tracks of the Seaboard Air Line Railway Company; that the distances are marked upon the said map and that the said map shows the present location of the said tracks, except some moonlight tracks put down on Peabody Street and Pettigrew Street on Sunday night, March 19, 1905.
- 6. That there is now and has been since 1885 or 1886 a tunnel under the main line of the North Carolina Railroad Company and through its embankment at the mouth of Carr Street, and that the said tunnel was cut at the request of the City of Durham by the Richmond and Danville Railroad Com-

pany in 1885 or 1886 for the convenience of travel from Carr Street to the north side of said railroad embankment into what was then known as and called Peabody Street; that said cut under said track, through said embankment, is not wide enough to accommodate the increased travel of a growing city like Durham; that it is not of the width of Carr Street; that said under-track crossing has been of great service to the people of the City of Durham and vicinity until all travel through it was interrupted on Sunday night, March 19, 1905, by the hasty laying of some railroad tracks on the other side of same.

Wherefore, your petitioner prays that notice be issued to the North Carolina Railroad Company, Southern Railway Company, its lessee, Seaboard Air Line Railway Company, and the Norfolk and Western Railway Company to appear at such time, as early as possible, before your honorable Commission, and that you hear and ascertain the value of said right-of-way so taken by the extension of Carr Street, fix and determine the distance as surface of said street or the extension of it to the railroad tracks overhead, and to require the raising of the tracks of the said railroads now crossing said street or its extension to such an extent as your honorable Commission may deem wise and necessary, and to fix and determine what part of the cost of making said crossing under said tracks shall be paid by the City of Durham and the railroads affected by said crossing.

Before a day was fixed for hearing, petitioners asked leave to withdraw complaint. Granted.

IN RE COMPLAINT AS TO THE CONDITION OF THE YADKIN RAILROAD.

Complaint having been made to the Corporation Commission that the condition of above railroad was bad and dangerous, on the 10th of March, 1905, after notice to the Southern Railway, by whom said railroad is operated, in company with Superintendent Baker and Engineer Fry, the Corporation Commissioners visited and inspected said railroad. The places where accidents occurred September 15, 1904, November 30, 1904, and February 13, 1905, were pointed out to the Commissioners. These, we were informed, were the only accidents that occurred from July 1, 1904, to March 1, 1905.

The causes assigned for each accident would appear from the report of the Southern Railway, hereto attached, which report will also show the average number of men employed on track, number of cross-ties put in main track, and the number of passenger and freight trains handled for the period above named. Four of the forty-one miles of main line were laid with sixty-pound rail and the balance with fifty-pound rail.

There appeared to be too large a per cent. of bad ties and the road-bed was very much in need of draining, and we are of the opinion that the complaint that the condition of the railroad was unsafe was well-founded. The slow schedule and the care used in operating the trains on this road may explain why so few accidents have occurred within the period above named.

We were informed that the four miles of sixty-pound rail had recently been laid and that it was the purpose of the Southern Railway to replace several miles more of the fifty-pound rail with sixty-pound rail and that they intended renewing the cross-ties. A number of ties had at that time been distributed along the road.

In our judgment, on account of the grades and curves and heavy loads of freight, this road ought to be laid with at least sixty-pound rail and the defective ties renewed and the roadway drained in order to make this a safe road.

It is ordered that a copy of this finding be furnished the Southern Railway. Franklin McNeill,

NORTH CAROLINA CASE-WORKERS' ASSOCIATION v. SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

The North Carolina Case-Workers' Association is an organization composed of a majority of the furniture manufacturers in North Carolina, and this complaint was filed by the president and secretary of the transportation committee of this organization. The complaint alleged that various manufacturing concerns had made application to defendant company for cars for the transportation of the output of these factories, but that defendant had failed to furnish a sufficient number of cars for the transportation of same, and that they were suffering considerable loss and damage on account of the failure of defendant to provide cars. That they were needing over three hundred cars for immediate shipments. The Commission, upon receipt of complaint, took the matter up at once with A. B. Andrews, first vice-president of the Southern Railway Company, and a day was fixed for hearing the case at High Point. At the appointed time the Commission met at High Point with the members of the Chamber of Commerce representing complainants, the traffic manager and division freight agent of defendant company being present. After a conference, the traffic manager promised to make every effort to have cars furnished, if the complainant would give a list of cars desired, with destination, etc., which list was furnished by C. J. Fields, secretary, the number and size cars being as follows: 50 36-foot cars, 155 40-foot cars, 1 42-foot car, 15 45-foot cars, 117 50-foot cars.

The hearing was continued in order that defendant should have time to have cars forwarded, but, in the meantime, sufficient cars not being received to satisfy the demands of complainant, the matter was taken up vigorously by wire and letter with defendant, urging that everything possible be done towards granting the relief desired by complainant. The demand for cars by petitioner was urgent, as they were having orders countermanded for failure to furnish shipments according to contract.

At a subsequent session of the Commission, it appearing that a sufficient number of cars had been delivered to complainant for the transportation of their shipments, and no further relief being asked, case was closed.

SOUTHERLAND & CO. v. ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Complainants in this case, representing a large number of truckers in the vicinity of Faison, a station on the line of defendant's road, complained that they were suffering great loss, damage and inconvenience in that defendant had discontinued receiving beans, potatoes, huckleberries, etc., on their local trains leaving Faison at 11 and 12 o'clock A. M. each day, and which ordinarily

reached New York and Philadelphia on the second day and Boston and Providence on the third day after shipment; but now they were refusing to receive said shipments until an afternoon train several hours later, and thereby arriving in Eastern markets a day later and in a damaged condition. The Commission took this matter up with defendant company and the following answer was received:

Yours 7th, covering letter from Messrs. T. C. Southerland & Co., relative to the forwarding of truck shipments. At the beginning of the season the Executive Committee of the Eastern Carolina Fruit and Truck-growers' Association, representing seven hundred growers on the Atlantic Coast Line, visited Wilmington to confer with our transportation people relative to schedule for handling the season's business. The schedule of last year was fully discussed, and when it developed that shipments moving on train No. 2, which left Wilmington at 6 A. M. could hardly reach the New York markets the following evening, but would make the same market as shipments forwarded on No. 18, the committee did not hesitate to select the latter train to pick up less than car-load shipments: this arrangement giving more time for gathering, picking and loading the truck. We offered the committee for this service either train No. 2, due to leave Wilmington at 6 A. M., or train No. 18, and they were unanimous in their choice of train No. 18, which is due to leave Wilmington at 11 A. M. We also agreed to run train No. 80 to pick up solid cars. This train leaves Wilmington at 8 o'clock in the morning and reaches South Rocky Mount at 3:10 P. M., making close connection with No. 212, which is due to arrive at Jersey City 6 o'clock the following evening. If we should undertake to pick up less than car-load shipments with this train it would simply mean that we could not make connection with No. 212, and both solid cars and L. C. L. shipments would arrive in the market late.

You will readily understand that it is our desire to do everything we can consistently to further the prompt marketing of truck grown on the line of our road, and our schedules for this movement are only arranged after a full and free conference with the shippers.

This not being satisfactory, the Commission visited Faison and had a conference with the shippers, the result of which was a letter from the traffic manager of defendant company, reading as follows:

Referring further to conversation relative to truck schedules: On investigation we find that the traffic has fallen off to a point where we believe we can give better service by handling pick-up freight on No. 2 instead of No. 18. Therefore, we have arranged, commencing Tuesday, June 27, to discontinue No. 18 and run No. 2 in two sections; one section exclusively for perishables, and we will endeavor to get this train to South Rocky Mount at an hour which will enable us to leave that point with some chance of making New York markets by following P. M. As explained to you, however, this is a very uncertain schedule for the New York markets; but the change will improve the service to other markets, and I hope we can do fairly well in the way of making New York markets the second morning after freight is shipped.

This being satisfactory to the complainants, and no further relief being asked, case was closed.

ATLANTIC COAST LINE RAILROAD COMPANY to THE COMMISSION.

Petitioner in this case asked to be allowed to change the schedule of its No. 41 train so as to leave Rocky Mount at 6 o'clock A. M. instead of 5:17 A. M., and to arrive at Goldsboro 7:31 A. M. instead of 6:48 A. M. Inasmuch as the granting of this petition would break an important connection between the Southern Railway's train No. 112 at Goldsboro for passengers South and West, the matter was taken up with the Southern Railway; and it appearing that said company was willing to change its schedule so as to conform to the proposed change in part, the Commission granted the proposed change in so far as not to disturb the Goldsboro connection.

GREEN ET ALS., CONSTITUTING THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, v. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILWAY and the RALEIGH AND PAMLICO SOUND RAILROAD COMPANY.

This cause coming on to be heard, and it appearing to the Corporation Commission, from the evidence offered, as well as from personal inspection and examination by the Commissioners, that the crossing named in petition, to-wit, the crossing of Seaboard Air Line track on public road known as the Louisburg road, about one mile north of the city of Raleigh, is dangerous to the public; but on account of the topography it seems impracticable for defendants to either raise or lower their tracks, but is practicable by changing public road so as to run between the present public road and Pigeon House Branch, over the right-of-way of the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound Railroad and tunneling under the Seaboard Air Line, to make a safe crossing. The parties hereto having agreed to the latter course and to the terms and manner in which the work should be done, and having filed copy of the agreement with this Commission, judgment is therefore entered according to said agreement.

Goods Damaged by a Carrier Are to Re Valued at the Market Price at Destination.

WAYNESBURG, Pa., Sept. 19, 1906.—At a special sale I bought a line of silks much below regular prices. These goods were damaged by water in transit. How shall I present my claim to the railroad? They asked me for the original invoice. The prices paid were below regular prices, and attendance at the special sale at which I bought necessitated expenses of travel, time, etc. To repay only the invoice price would be a big loss to me. I prefer to keep the goods less damages. How should my claim be made?

Reply.-When goods have been damaged or destroyed while in the hands of a carrier the basis on which settlement is to be made is usually the market value of the goods at the time and place at which delivery of the merchandise in good condition ought to have been made. The shipper pays freight as if the goods had been delivered in good condition, or else the freight is deducted from the amount of his recovery. The object is to place the shipper in as good a position as he would have been in if the carrier's duty had been properly done; in that case the shipper would have paid freight to destination and he would have been in position to sell the goods there at the market price then prevailing. The only exception to the rule arises in a case in which the owner of the goods has sold them for future delivery at a price which turns out to be less than the market price on the day when delivery should have been made. If the shipper had had his goods in good condition at destination, in that case, he could not have sold them at the market price because he had already agreed to deliver them for less; this smaller amount is all he can claim in that case. The cost of the goods is not a proper matter for consideration in any case. may have been a present to the shipper; he is still entitled to collect the full value of them if they are lost or destroyed by a carrier; if they are only damaged he may collect the amount by which the damage decreases their market value at the time and place at which delivery in good condition should have been made by the carrier. This is the measure of damages unless the shipper's contract with the carrier stipulates for some other measure, in which case that stipulation will prevail, the shipper having agreed to it by becoming a party to the contract. If there was no such special contract in this case, our correspondent should insist upon a settlement based on the market price of sound goods at the place and time at which these goods should have been delivered to him in perfect condition.

Extra Charge for Less than Carload Lots-Several Bills of Lading for One Shipment.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19, 1906.—1. We had to make a shipment from our factory of material for which the minimum carload is 24,000 pounds. The total weight of the material shipped amounted to 30,000 pounds. Owing to the bulkiness of the material, however, it had to be loaded on two cars, and the railroad company insisted upon issuing a support of the car and the state of th railroad company insisted upon issuing a separate bill of lading for each car and charging the minimum freight rate on 24,000 pounds for each car. We insisted that only one bill of lading should be issued for the constitution of the actual weight only one bill of lading should be issued for one shipment and the actual weight only should be collected for on account of the total weight being more than a minimum carload. The railroad company thereupon reduced the charge for each car to 20,000 total weight being more than a minimum carload. The railroad company thereupon reduced the charge for each car to 20,000 pounds, so that we had to pay freight on 40,000 pounds. Please advise us whether our position, namely, that freight only for the actual weight, independent of the way the material was loaded, on one car or two, should be charged, and whether one or two bills of lading were issued is correct? Or if the railroad company's standpoint is correct, upon what authority they base their position, as we cannot find anything to uphold them in the tariff.

2. Also inform us if, when one shipment consists of several cars, it is necessary to make out a separate bill of lading for each car; whether we can insist upon having one bill of lading to cover the whole shipment, and if it makes any difference in the freight or whether we can insist that one bill of

and if it makes any difference in the trees, or whether we can insist that one bill of lading is made out for the whole shipment independent of the number of cars of which Y. W. Co.

Reply.-1. The Interstate Commerce Commission has held that, under the law, "carriers may properly make a difference in their rates between carload and less than carload shipments, but that such difference must be reasonable. The question to be determined with respect to these differentials is their reasonableness." The opinion continues: "We are inclined to think that a differential which is at once more than 50 cents per 100 pounds and more than 50 per cent of the carload rate is prima facie excessive. We do not mean that every differential may lawfully equal this, nor yet that every differential which exceeds this is unlawful, but that a differential exceeding this requires special justification." See 10 I. C. C. Rep., 318, and 3 I. C. C. Rep., 473.

2. So far as we can find, the courts have never been called upon to decide the right of a shipper to demand a single bill of lading to cover all the goods included in one of his shipments; we are of opinion, however, that he clearly has such a right. The contract is a single one, a contract to carry a certain quantity of merchandise. There is no reason known to us why either party to the contract should not be entitled to demand that all of it be included in a single document. If the shipper wished to have a number of different bills of lading, each covering only part of a single shipment, the carrier could not be compelled to issue them to him. A carrier who offers to issue one bill of lading (or one set of bills) for a single shipment has offered all the law requires of him. There seems to be no reason to allow a carrier to compel the shipper to accept several bills of lading in a case in which the shipper could not compel the carrier to issue several.







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
