Says Execution of Versailles Treaty Most Important Task

Modification of Constitutional Laws Will Be Considered at Opportune Time Declares President Millerand in First Message to Parliament.

Paris, Sept. 25.—President Millerand delivered his first message to Parliament to-day. He declared the present foreign and internal policies of the Government approved by the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate during the past eight months would be continued.

"The nation is forever attached to a Republican administration," he asserted. "Parliament will choose the most opportune moment for modification of the present constitutional laws. Before starting these modifications, however," he said, "we must carry out a more important task—that is, total execution of the agreement entered into at Versailles. The Treaty is a new charge upon Europe and the world.

"French diplomacy, invariably loyal to alliances cemented forever by bloodshed in common, will take care that the interests and rights of the nations resuscitated by the Allied victory shall be respected."

Vote of Confidence. Paris, Sept. 25.—(Associated Press)—The Chamber of Deputies, after a debate on interpellations concerning the foreign and domestic policies of the Government, voted confidence in the Government this afternoon 567 to eighty.

Speedy Settlement of Sino-Japanese Questions Urged. Tokyo, Sept. 24.—Speedy settlement of questions pending between Japan and China including early withdrawal of Japanese troops from Shantung and a solution of the Tsinan question has been advised by the China-Japan Business Association, headed by Viscount Etschi Shibusawa, a Conservative, in communications to Premier Hara.

Prince Koudacheff Is Leaving Peking. Peking, Sept. 24.—(Associated Press)—Prince Koudacheff, Russian Minister here, announced to-day he was leaving China, this coming as a sequel to the decision of the Foreign Office to terminate official relations with the Russian Legation.

Sequel to Termination of Official Relations With Russian Legation. Peking, Sept. 24.—(Associated Press)—The Foreign Office says that termination of relations with the Legation does not impair treaties between China and Russia.

Crew Struck When Troops Embarked on Ship at Venice. Trieste, Sept. 25.—(Associated Press)—The crew of the steamship Gabions, from Bombay to Trieste, refused to operate the ship yesterday at Venice, where the ship called, because 500 troops were embarked. The men declared the soldiers were "to be used against the working class."

Japanese Diplomatic Council Objects to Armament Reduction. Honolulu, Sept. 25.—The Japanese Diplomatic Council has expressed objection to a reduction of armament based on the present military and naval strength of each nation as proposed by the League of Nations Council, according to Tokio cable advices to Nippon Jih, Japanese language newspaper here.

Hon. J. A. Calder at New York to-day. Ottawa, Sept. 25.—Hon. J. A. Calder, President of the Privy Council, arrived at New York from Southampton on board the Mauretania to-day. Mr. Calder is expected in Ottawa during the week-end, but intends to remain here long enough to dispose of pressing business before leaving for the West to join the Tariff Commission of which he is a member.

DOWNWARD TENDENCY IN COST OF LIVING

Relief to Consumer Indicated By Steady Drop in Prices

Ottawa, Sept. 25.—While not definitely inclined to commit themselves, officials of the Dominion Government in touching on matters affecting the cost of living, are impressed with the opinion that the tendency from now on will be downward. They point to the steady decrease in the past few months in wholesale sugar quotations, the prospect of a lower price level for such commodities as flour and milk, and the announcement that the peak of the cost of clothing has been reached, as sure indicators that the five per cent. decrease in the family budget, indicated in the September report of the Department of Labor on prices, is likely to be followed by further decreases.

Break in Cotton. New York, Sept. 25.—There was a break of more than \$5 a bale in the price of cotton for November delivery which sold at \$23.50 in the market here this morning, while other months showed losses of between 5 and 45 points as compared with yesterday's closing prices.

Flour Down. Minneapolis, Minn., Sept. 25.—Flour broke 25 to 40 cents a barrel at the principal mills here to-day, due to the weak market. Wheat. Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 25.—Wheat futures dropped here again to-day. December fell 2 1/4 cents, while March delivery was off four cents. September delivery of corn dropped to 37 cents, 13 cents under the previous close Thursday.

Five Killed in Aeroplane Smash Near London, Eng. London, Sept. 25.—An inland passenger aeroplane crashed in the outskirts of London this afternoon. The pilot and four passengers were killed and another passenger seriously injured.

Cheaper Flour Shortly For Canadian Consumers. Ottawa, Sept. 25.—(Canadian Press)—Abolition of wheat control and getting back to pre-war conditions in milling of flour will mean a reduction in the price of Canadian flour to consumers, according to an Eastern Township miller, who is spending a few days in the city. He stated that a number of the large mills had sent out their price lists in preparation for putting the former grades of flour on the market—and that in all, or nearly all cases, there was a reduction of 25 cents a bag in the cost of flour of the grade approximating the Government standard grade. Very little, if any of the new grades of flour are yet on sale, this miller stated, because the mills are seeking to clear out their war stocks before bringing the patents on the market again. However, with the opening of the mills for grinding the 1920 wheat crop, all grades of flour will be turned out as previous to wheat and flour control being established. When this is done some of the higher patents will be more costly than the

BISHOP FARTHING ON MARRIAGE QUESTION

Declares Annulments Constitute Menace to Moral Life of Nation

Montreal, Sept. 25.—(Canadian Press)—The Right Rev. John Farthing, Anglican Bishop of Montreal, presiding last night at a meeting of the executive of the diocese of Montreal, issued, with the unanimous endorsement of the executive, a pronouncement on the mixed marriage question in this Province with special reference to the annulment of such marriages by the Roman Catholic authorities. The pronouncement states that such annulments are a violation of the rights of the Anglican Church; that they constitute a menace to the moral life of the nation, and that these annulments are illegal. The pronouncement concludes: "I do not permit our lawful marriages to be annulled, as this is a direct attack upon our civil and religious liberties. I therefore appeal to all who wish to preserve the sanctity of marriage, the sacredness of human body, the equal religious privileges and rights to unite with us in preserving the civil status of those who are married according to law."

PROVINCE TO BORROW ONE MILLION DOLLARS

Completes Four Million P.G.E. Vote to Take Line to Fort George

According to an announcement made by the Hon. John Hart, Minister of Finance, the Provincial Government is calling for bids on a loan of one million dollars. The proceeds of the issue are to be applied to the construction of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, and it is expected that this amount, together with the three million dollars already borrowed, will complete the line to Fort George. All bids must be in the hands of the Minister of Finance on Friday morning next for opening on that day at noon. With the disposal of this new loan the four million dollars voted by the Legislature at its last session for P. G. E. construction will have been absorbed.

Referendum Shows Agreement Approved By Large Majority

Vote Taken in Italy to Determine Sentiment of Workmen Appears to Be Overwhelmingly in Favor of Government Settlement Plan.

Milan, Sept. 25.—Incomplete returns from the referendum held yesterday to determine the sentiment of workmen toward the agreement reached at the instance of the Government by employers and workers regarding a solution of the present industrial situation appear to show the agreement has been approved by a large majority. It is said syndicalists and anarchists urged their followers not to vote, believing it was impossible for them to defeat the agreement.

In spite of the efforts of the President of the Chamber of Labor at Genoa, the agreement was approved by a large majority in a referendum held in that city. At Voltri, the agreement was approved by a vote of 2,400 to 23.

BRITISH CAPITAL READY TO INVEST

Investors Look to Canada When Exchange Situation Rights Itself

Ottawa, Sept. 25.—(Canadian Press) There are hundreds of thousands of pounds of British capital being awaiting favorable opportunities for investment in Canada, and these funds will be sent across the Atlantic as soon as the exchange problem has righted itself sufficiently to appeal to British investors, according to J. A. Robb, M.P. for Huntington, Que., who has recently returned from a trip to Britain. The high taxes being placed on idle capital in Britain are responsible for the desire to invest in Canada, Mr. Robb stated, adding that it would be necessary for Canada to exercise caution and refrain from penalizing investors too heavily by way of taxes which could be avoided elsewhere. He thought investors would be driven to seek other investment fields.

KOREANS KILLED IN CLASH WITH POLICE

Tokyo, Sept. 25.—(Associated Press)—Advices from Seoul report that 600 Korean students destroyed seven buildings, including a bank and a police station in Genzan. Several Koreans were killed in the clash with the police and forty arrests were made.

RE-OPEN STREET CAR NEGOTIATIONS

City Breaks Deadlock in Eleventh-Hour Effort to Reach Settlement

After a deadlock which has continued for many weeks, official negotiations between the civic authorities and the B. C. Electric Railway Company regarding the street transportation problem were resumed this morning when the Legislative Committee on the City Council conferred with A. T. Goward, local manager of the company. Nothing definite was accomplished at this morning's preliminary conference, but it is hoped that at a second meeting to be held next Wednesday action will be taken. The object of the new negotiations is an agreement between the city and the company, which will make it possible for the city to support, before the Board of Railway Commissioners, the company's application for a seven-cent fare. The Legislative Committee is not opposed to the seven-cent fare, in itself, but thinks that if such a fare is allowed the company should offer certain concessions in return. Chief among these concessions is a six-cent lighting rate. The company will be recalled, brought the previous negotiations to an end when it refused to grant the concessions desired by the city. On this account the Legislative Committee has recommended to the Council that it oppose the company's application to the Railway Commission for a seven-cent fare. Pending action by the Council upon his committee's recommendation, Alderman Patrick, chairman of the Legislative Committee, met Mr. Goward yesterday and talked the whole matter over with him. This morning the conference between the city and the company was resumed. Mr. Goward stated that the city representatives, of course, hope that the company will decide to grant concessions in return for a seven-cent fare. If the company would agree to do this, then the city would approve its application to the Railway Board for a seven-cent fare. In this way a serious controversy would be avoided and the matter would be settled to the satisfaction of both parties. The meeting with Mr. Goward this morning, however, was simply another eleventh-hour effort to reach an amicable agreement. Whether such an agreement will be possible, of course, depends upon what attitude the company adopts toward the concessions for which the city is pressing. Pending the conference between the Legislative Committee and Mr. Goward next Wednesday, the Council, it is expected, will decide to postpone its action on the matter when it meets Monday afternoon.

Substantial Drop in Canadian Sugar Predicted Monday

Montreal, Sept. 25.—It was learned in wholesale sugar circles here that all Canadian sugar refineries will on Monday announce substantial reductions in all grades of refined sugar.

JEWELRY STORE IN DETROIT ROBBED; TWO YOUTHS HURT

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 25.—Two bandits entered the jewelry store of Nathan Rose on Hastings Street to-day, beat the proprietor's two sons, Emil, twenty years, and Fred, ten years, and escaped with money and jewelry valued at \$12,000. The two Rose youths were seriously injured and removed to a hospital.

MANUAL TRAINING EXHIBIT IS MAGNET

Fine Display at Agricultural Fair - Attracts Large Audience

A remarkable display of the value of manual training instruction in the public schools is on view on the upper floor of the Women's Building, where a collection of woodwork, made by the lads under Manual Training Instructor L. E. Campbell, had been attracting much attention.

The display includes furniture of every variety, well finished to the last detail, some of the exhibits being of a class worthy of experienced cabinet makers. Bedroom equipment, morris chairs, kitchen aids, and many other articles are included, and a number of the work benches, with a complete set of the tools which the youths are trained to use so well, complete a display designed to instruct the pupils as to the scope of the work, its time and the value of teaching boys in their formative years an art which will be of value to them throughout their lives, even though they never adopt the mechanical arts as a means of livelihood.

On the same floor is a working kitchen where the girls of the household science classes of the schools are at work making cakes, preserves and similar dainties. Every day six girls from one of the schools are attended under their household science teacher, and in the afternoons they have dispensed tea and cakes to the interested spectators, the methods of handling being practiced by G. THE COMING TAX SALE.

Again we desire to remind taxpayers that the city tax sale will take place on October 5 and to impress upon those who are in arrears that they can prevent their property from going under the hammer by accepting one of the following conditions:

- 1. All arrears to the end of 1916 and interest at 8 per cent.
2. Or all arrears to December 31, 1919, in full, in which case 10 per cent. of all general taxes will be deducted; and the interest on same will be cut in half.
3. Or ten per cent. will be deducted from the general taxes and accrued interest thereon if one-tenth of the remainder, together with interest at 6 per cent. from January 1 last is paid.

PLANS FOR NEW SCHOOL HIT SNAG

School Board Returns Tenders Which Exceed Available Money

As was feared by some of the Trustees, tenders for the construction of the new King's-Road School, opened by the City School Board last night, are far above the Board's estimate of cost, and largely in excess of the amount of money available for the work. For this reason the Board last night ordered the tenders returned to the contracting firms which had filled them, and instructed the Building and Grounds Committee and School Board officials to make plans for a school, the price of which would be within the reach of the Board.

The lowest tender received last night for the four-room wooden building contemplated was \$18,916, whereas the Board has only \$15,500 available for the construction of the school.

"Well I must say I would not be in favor of building a school like the annex to the Sir James Douglas School," remarked Trustee Mrs. Coady-Johnson, when the unsatisfactory result of the first effort to get the school under way became known.

"Yes, but if you have only a limited amount of money, you must govern yourself accordingly," objected Trustee Mrs. Andrews.

"Well, anyway, we must call for tenders again, as it will have to be a different class of building to the one specified in our present plans," advised Trustee Beckwith.

Finally Chairman Major Riddell, Major Spurgin, the architect who drew the plans, Building Superintendent Fairley and the Building and Grounds Committee were requested to lay new plans before the Board. On account of the difficulty encountered in connection with the first tenders, work on the new school, of course, will be delayed.

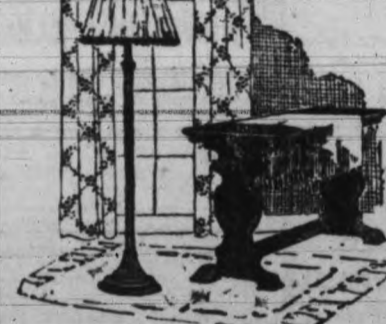

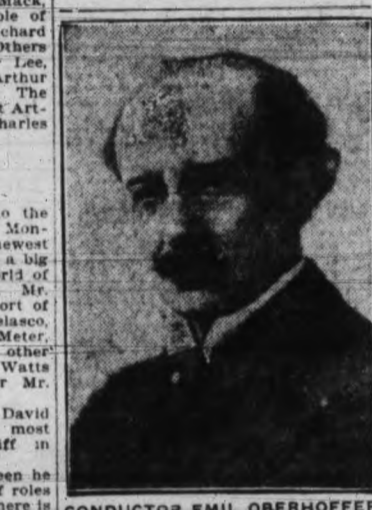

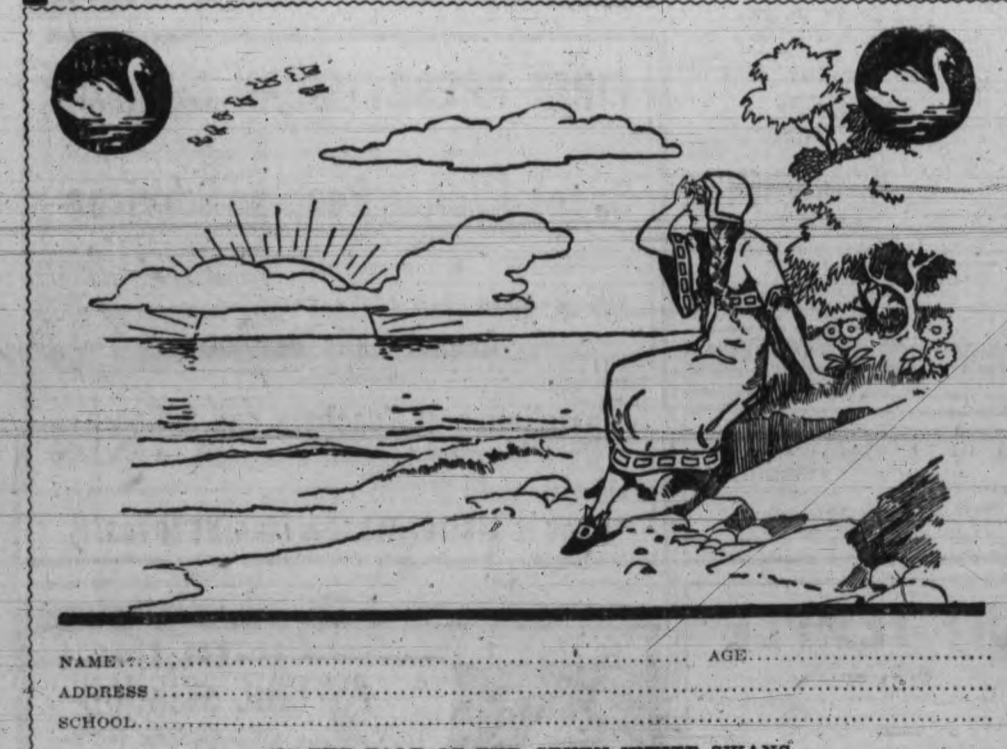

The spirit of Liberalism will receive re-awakened life from the visit of the delegation of Liberal Members of Parliament, headed by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, to this city to-morrow and Monday. Many will rejoice to have an opportunity to hear from men well qualified to voice the rejuvenated Liberalism, the gospel of modern progress...



HON. W. L. MACKENZIE KING

Mr. King was born December 17, 1874, at Kitchener, Ontario, and he was educated at the public and high schools there before proceeding to the University of Toronto, where he obtained his B. A. degree in 1897, and I.L.B. next year. In 1897 he secured the M.A. degree from his Alma Mater...

During the years when he was completing his educational career Mr. King was for a brief period attached to the editorial staff of the Toronto Globe. Commenced Public Career. Mr. King began his public career at the early age of twenty-four...

The celebrated measure of the Industrial Disputes Investigation Act, which was largely the work of Mr. King, was piloted through the House of Commons by Mr. Lemieux, as one of the first important bills introduced in 1907...

Other Commissions. Mr. Lemieux and Mr. King were benighted at Kitchener, in June, as a result of the success of the legislation. Mr. King had a delicate task to discharge about this time in the post of Chairman of the Royal Commission...

Anti-Asiatic Riots. In the Fall of 1907 the country was agitated by the Anti-Asiatic riots at Vancouver, which brought the Asiatic immigration question to an issue in this Province, and threw all other issues into the background...

Anti-Opium Commission. Another occasion in which his experience of Oriental affairs was of special merit was the meeting of the Anti-Opium Commission, which he attended as one of the British delegates representing the Canadian Government...

New Parliament Buildings at Ottawa

Canadian Conservation Commission, which was established by Act of Parliament in the Fall of 1909. Dr. Beland was one of the original thirty-five members of the Commission...

DR. BELAND HAS ATTRIBUTES WHICH MAKE HIM LEADERS. Capable Ex-Minister Has Achieved Fame as Patriot and Statesman.

Dr. Beland's tragic experiences in Belgium at the outbreak of the war, and subsequently for years a prisoner in Germany, made him one of the notable figures in the great drama, which opened in 1914...

Back in Commons. He took his seat in the House of Commons in 1919 when the House sat under the shadow of the death of its senior member, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and he was not for some time that he answered the appreciative remarks with which his return was heralded...

Ernest Lapointe is a prominent representative of the senior race in making of Canada. He is the son of French-Canadian parents, and was educated for the law at Rimouski College and Laval...

His Maiden Speech. As an earnest of what his policy would be in the early years of his parliamentary career, he laid great emphasis in his maiden speech on the agricultural and lumber policies of the Province, declaring that Quebec could not afford to neglect either...

Return to Politics. Little was heard of Mr. King in political circles until the dissolution of 1917, consequent on the formation of a Union Government for war purposes. He accompanied his leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier on a tour of Ontario, and like many other opponents of the Government...

Public Health. As a medical man, and a past president of the Canadian Medical Association, Dr. Beland took an active share in the public health questions of Canada, and strongly urged a considerable attention to the loss of human lives from tuberculosis each year...

Naval Policy. In the debates on the naval policy of the Laurier administration he followed the Liberal French-Canadian ministers, and gave full support to a Canadian navy. He took an active share in dealing with the bi-lingual question in 1915, and made an eloquent and comprehensive speech with regard to the rights of the French-speaking inhabitants of Ontario...

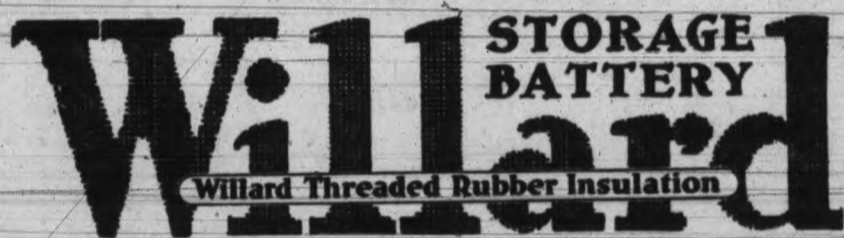

INSURANCE FOR MOTOR CARS DATES BACK TO 1898

There seems to be some question whether public liability automobile insurance was first written in England or the United States. It was probably the former. This form of insurance was started in 1898. The English underwriters began with the form which they called "third party indemnity." This was applicable only to cars of the private passenger type. There was one English experiment about 1894 covering public liability on some electric cabs, but the loss ratio was so disastrous that the policies were cancelled in a few months and there after no serious attempt appears to have been directed to automobile insurance until the year 1898.

Fire insurance coverage, of course, could be had at that time, but not under the form which subsequently became the basis for the modern fire form. In those days the fire insurance coverage applied to automobiles was the same as would apply to any stock of goods. It did not cover the most vital part of the present-day form, namely, fire caused within the machine itself by pre-ignition, back firing or explosion.

The original public liability form was rather limited. This policy covered public liability only, with a maximum limit of \$2,500. There were no individual accident limits under this policy, the company's liability during the entire policy year being limited in any event to a sum not exceeding \$2,500. The premium was \$50 and covered care of all horse powers.

Better Limits Allowed.
In the following year the public liability policy was broadened to the extent of providing higher limits, \$2,000 limit under the policy for the year. The premium charge for this coverage was \$37.50 for passenger cars of all horse powers, excluding the passenger car. As in the previous year, the company limited the amount it could possibly lose, irrespective of the number of accidents the car might cause. That year incidentally marks the issuance, beyond the experimental stage, of the public liability form on motor cars and passenger-carrying vehicles; the rates for the limits just mentioned varying from \$50 for a vehicle holding two passengers to \$100 for a vehicle holding eight passengers. This year also marked with them the beginning of the collision form, or as they call it, "accidental damage." For a premium charge of approximately \$37.50, collision insurance of \$200 was granted with \$25 deductible on every claim, which by the way, marked the beginning of the \$25 deductible clause. The collision coverage was restricted to collision with another vehicle and the amount of insurance was limited to the policy year.

In 1900 the contract remained practically the same, but an option of different limits was provided; a premium of \$20 purchasing limits of \$500 for a single accident and \$2,500 limit for the year. For passenger hazard \$7.50 extra was charged for each two passengers for the lower limits and \$10 extra for each two passengers for the higher limits.

A very important change, however, was made in the collision form. Up to this time the collision coverage was limited to collision with a moving vehicle, and at this time the collision form broadened, so that it covered impact with any object. The premium was increased to \$50 for \$500 insurance, with \$25 deductible for each claim.

Modern Form Begins.
The year following, or 1901, records some progress, for it marks the beginning of our modern fire and theft forms, and also for them the first issuance of the property damage coverage. In that year the British also wrote for the first time public

liability insurance on commercial vehicles. That year also shows a change in the collision coverage by the exclusion of fire and damage to rubber tires, and also reduction in the deductible clause to \$12.50. At that time for a premium of approximately \$42 a policy could be obtained providing public liability, collision and theft with a limit of \$500 for the year for each of these forms, this applying to private cars of not exceeding twelve horse-power, and excluding the passenger hazard. Up to this time the premiums were not regulated in any way by the horse-power. That was undoubtedly due to the fact that up to that year cars of more than twelve horse-power were very rare.

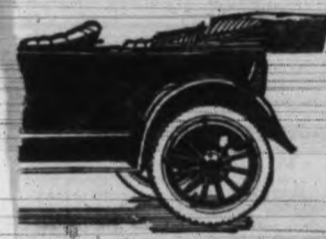

STRENGTH DISPLAYED IN SPECIALTIES

TO SELL BONDS ON EASY TERMS

Brokers and lawyers have worked out a plan whereby Victory Bonds of any issue will be sold on terms of 20 per cent. cash and 10 per cent. a month. There will be no interest to pay on the 20 per cent. of the value of the bond which is not paid in cash. The brokers, however, will pay the investor the regular dividends paid by the Government half-yearly on what is paid in on the bond by the investor.

All the Victory Loan issues are now down to a price where they yield the investor 6 per cent. In some of the issues the yield is now considerably more than this, and in other issues it is less.

Gen. R. P. Clark, head of the firm, has worked out this new system of bond investment with the idea of stimulating saving here during the period of high prices and luxury taxes.

"Saving money through the plan of bond buying is going to be more popular than depositing savings in a savings bank," said the General today. "The bonds can be converted into cash just as quickly as money can be drawn from a savings bank. But the big fact is that money invested in bonds brings 6 per cent. interest instead of the 3 per cent. from the savings bank."

NUMEROUS UNEMPLOYED VETERANS IN TORONTO

Toronto, Sept. 25.—A soldier's employment bureau, manned by ex-service men, is wanted by the G.W.V.A. in this city, and approaches were made to Premier Drury and Hon. Walter Rolfe, Minister of Labor here yesterday afternoon by representatives of the district command, G. W. V. A. The Ministers were informed by the delegation that there were five thousand returned men out of work here.

MOVING BOOT STOCKS REGARDLESS OF COSTS

Toronto, Sept. 25.—A prominent wholesale jobber in this city is quoted as saying that boots are being sold generally in Toronto at prices at least 25 per cent. below those prevailing six or seven months ago. He attributes this to a concerted effort from manufacturers to move stocks at prices based on replacement figures and regardless of actual costs. "We are taking our medicine," he said, "in an endeavor to reduce prices to a point where they will make stable business."

HEAVY LIQUIDATION IN CHICAGO GRAINS

Chicago, Sept. 25.—Wheat—The volume of trade was enormous with heavy liquidating sales in evidence from the opening of the market. The buying in part was by houses with connections in the west and apparently reflected export business, although little attention was given to this fact because of the drastic declining tendency in all directions. Cash prices declined with the futures, but premiums were well maintained. There is as yet no indication of increased selling by the country but whether the attitude of the producer will meet with ultimate success is extremely doubtful, in view of the process of deflation, which now seems to be underway.

Corn—The bulk of the buying was in the nature of short covering over the week-end, but the selling pressure was by far in excess of the demand and the market continued to sag to the lowest levels on the crop for the deferred deliveries and the lowest price on the recent movement for the September, which was subjected to liquidating pressure throughout the session. The phenomenal influence was the indication of large accounts for Monday which might prove to be quite a burden because of the inadequate demand. A sale of 80,000 bushels was reported at the seaboard for export, but this was of no consequence as the country is selling freely regardless of price. As far as the new crop is concerned, the past week of extreme favorable weather has dissipated all fears of important damage by the frost. There is a turning point in every road, but no sign of it, as yet, in the corn market.

Oats—The commodity was again under pressure and the lowest levels on the crop were reached, finishing near the bottom. Buying by shorts and elevator interests had no material influence. Cash prices were 1 1/2% lower and the trading basis spot market reduced to one cent under December for No. 2 white and 2 cents under for No. 3 white. Export bids were reported close to a working basis but no actual business reported.

How to Beat the Chimney
and Save Coal

- The secret of Coal saving is just enough draft, and no more.
- Keep the cross damper in the chimney pipe as nearly closed as possible.
- One Nanaimo-Wellington Coal needs some draft through the fire door, but not much.
- When you wish to reduce the heat, do not use the damper in the fire door. It wastes heat and fuel. Use the chimney damper.
- A freshly-made fire requires an open chimney damper, but this damper should be closed almost entirely as soon as the fire has gained headway. There is danger of explosion of the gases, however, if the damper is closed before flame appears over the fire.
- Stop up all cracks in the stove or furnace. They cause waste or heat.
- Keep your flues and your heating surfaces clean. This is important.
- Some persons clean their boiler flues and furnace-heating surfaces once a year, "whether they need it or not." Such people may waste from 50 per cent. to 75 per cent. of their heat. A quarter-inch layer of soot wastes from 10 per cent. to 20 per cent. of your fuel.
- In coal stoves and furnaces the flues should be cleaned once a week.
- Avoid poking and slicing the fire bed. It causes draft holes and clinkers.
- Never shake a fire that is low until you have put on a little fresh coal and have let it start to burn.
- Feed regularly, whether in warm or cold weather. Fill the fire pot. A thin fire wastes coal. Disturb the fire as little as possible.
- Regulate the fire by the cross damper in the chimney pipe.
- Put the furnace in repair. Every broken part means a loss of heat.
- You can lose heat in the basement; you can lose heat throughout the whole house; you can lose heat by the window and the door, but the chief waste is by the chimney.
- Study how to regulate your stove and your furnace, but with all your regulating, regulate the chimney damper.
