Beautiful New Building to be Opened Next Week.

The Public Will Have an Opportunity to Inspect the Results of the Past Year's Work at Weymouth Center.

Something over a year ago some of the prominent men here began to seriously consider the advisability of forming a branch of the Young Men's Christian Association in Weymouth. After a series of consultations, public meetings were held at which the matter was freely discussed and at last it was decided to proceed to form an organization. Conditional membership blanks were distributed and contributions solicited. A sufficient number of pledges were now received to warrant starting the association on a permanent basis, and this was accordingly done.

Not far from Central square, Weymouth Center, stands the Davis B. Clapp Memorial building ready for occupancy. A more detailed description and a little of the history of which will appear in next week's issue of the Gazette.

This building, which is one of the finest and best equipped of its kind in the city, will be hereafter the quarters of the Weymouth Young Men's Christian Association. The present officers and directors of the Weymouth branch of the association are: President, H. H. Reed; Vice-president, Rufus L. Bates; Secretary, Owen S. Chandler; Treasurer, W. A. Dunham; Trustees, C. B. Cushing, W. H. Pratt, and C. L. Seabury; auditors, Charles A. Bartlett and Arthur E. Pratt; directors, H. B. Reed, Elmer E. Sherman, Charles B. Cushing, Owen S. Chandler, E. M. Carter, Frank E. Lord, W. H. Pratt, Rufus L. Bates, A. H. Bryant, A. E. Pratt, W. A. Dunham, C. A. Randall, C. L. Seabury.

At the meeting of the board of directors held last Friday evening, chairman of the various committees were elected as follows: Finance, Wallace Whitton; Membership, E. M. Carter; Religious, Charles B. Cushing, physical department, W. S. Chandler; educational department, F. E. Lord; Junior department, E. E. Sherman; boarding house, Rufus L. Bates.

An all-journal meeting of the Board of directors to be held this evening, more members will be added to the committee and later others will be added as the occasion requires.

DIRECT MANAGEMENT.
The building itself will be in charge of Wallace Whitton, who has been appointed as the general manager of the association will be under the direct supervision of Horace E. Coleman, the general secretary of the association.

Horace E. Coleman was born in Bloomington, Indiana, in 1872. He graduated from the academy there in 1892, and from Earlham College at Richmond, Indiana, three years later. He was state secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in Indiana for a year and a half and then went to Honolulu, Hawaii, where he remained two years previous to his advent in Weymouth, where he was engaged in a post-graduate course in the University of Chicago on Theoretical and Practical Sociology and the history and interpretation of the New Testament. His evenings during this period were spent in charge of the Rosewood department of the Y. M. C. A. in Chicago.

As an assistant in his work, Mr. Coleman will have Mr. George E. DeKraff who was born in 1884 in Grand Rapids, Michigan, where he was educated. Mr. DeKraff has taken special courses in local and medical gymnastics and spent the last two years in the Rowland department of the Chicago Y. M. C. A.

PHYSICAL DEPARTMENT.
Under the guidance and leadership of these two well-trained men, the following classes have been arranged for the gymnasium:

Senior classes, Monday and Thursday evenings at 8 o'clock; classes in callisthenics, graded heavy apparatus, work and games of various nature, including handball and basketball.
Juniors, Saturday night, special attention will be given to small groups of men on special apparatus. Practice for athletics and all in-door contests will also occur on this night.
The intermediate classes for members whose ages range from 15 to 18 years, will meet at 7:30 on Wednesday and Friday evenings.
The business men's classes will meet at 8:30 on Wednesday evening.
The juniors, boys of 12 to 15 years of age, will meet Tuesday and Thursday afternoons and Saturday morning.
There will be a workers' Bible class meeting on Friday nights at 7:30.
