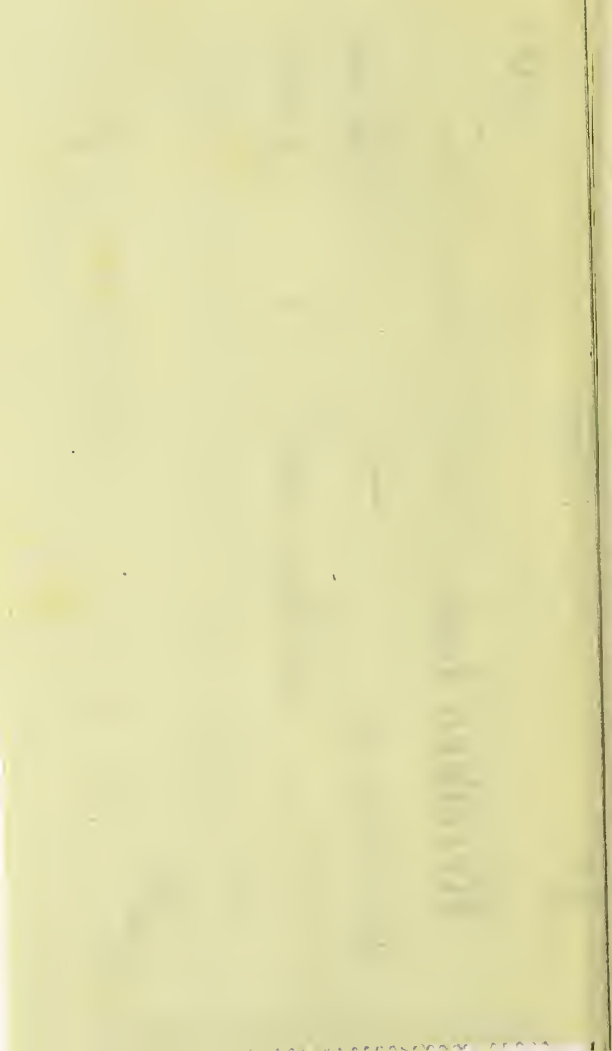

P R E F A C E .

HAD the Register of the First Thousand Boys been kept with the care and precision of more recent times my labour as Editor would have been lightened and this book would be less incomplete.

In the following pages the figure following a boy's name denotes the age on entry. The date of birth is not given in the original Register, in which it is the fashion to describe a boy as so many years and a quarter, so many years and a half, so many years and three quarters old. Not possessing the date of birth I have given the ages but omitted the fractions.

The date following the Parentage denotes the period at which the boy was in the school. The precise date of entry is given in the original Register; but no more than the year of leaving is constantly stated, and sometimes this is omitted. To preserve uniformity I have given the *years* only of entry and leaving, and have not attempted to discover or indicate the more exact date.

It is of common occurrence to find in the original Register part of a boy's Christian name. This has occasioned much trouble in the process of identification.

The heading Parentage included Parent or Guardian. In the case of a boy's father being dead or abroad, only the mother's name is given, or that of his uncle, aunt, or some other relative. I have not, therefore, been able to give in every case the father's name.

It would be uninteresting to relate the tedious process of collecting the numerous and minute details of which the notices are composed, and of discovering Old Boys' addresses so as to enter into communication with them; but, as the value of these notices depends entirely on their accuracy, it is necessary to state that I sent to every boy whose address I could obtain a circular containing not only the facts given in the Register (Number, Name, Father's Name, Age on Entry, and Period at the College), but also, in the cases of soldiers, sailors, clergymen, lawyers, medical men, &c., such facts and dates of their career as I could compile from the Lists and Directories of their professions, Calendars, and similar books, with the request that they would revise it and add such biographical facts as they might think appropriate. In the case of boys deceased I applied to some member of their family.

Notices not thus authenticated contain nothing but statements which require no personal confirmation. I have admitted no mere recollections of one boy by another, except in three or four instances where I had reason to believe I could rely on the correctness of the statement. In most cases where there is no notice I have not been able to trace the boy. In some cases I have made application but have received no reply. It has been my rule to apply only once.

A work of this kind must from its nature be always incomplete ; a first edition must be far from completeness. I look on the first edition of a school Register as a sort of rough proof, implying a revise or second edition. When several hundred notices, each written by a different author, are printed and put together, inequalities and defects appear, such as the Editor is unable and indeed not entitled to remedy.

I shall be much obliged for notices revised or rewritten, or for corrections or improvements of any kind, for insertion in a second edition, which will probably become, for a long time at least, the permanent form of the first part of the Register.

It remains for me to thank those Old Boys who kindly gave me what assistance they could, and many ladies and gentlemen unconnected with the College for information most courteously given in reply to letters of various enquiry. I have also to thank Mr. F. W. Madden, the College Secretary, for reading the proofs, and Mr. Henry Griffith, member of the Council, for the main material of the Introduction. It is also with much pleasure that I record my obligations to Mr. J. Farncombe for the care bestowed upon the printing of this volume.

INTRODUCTION.

WE may assume that there were many private conferences amongst those who conceived the idea of establishing Brighton College, before the first recorded proceedings at a provisional meeting held on October 27th, 1845, at the National Schools, Church Street, Brighton. This was followed by another on December 15th, at which a Council was appointed to carry out the design. The first step was to complete a list of College officers. It was hoped that the College might be favoured with Royal patronage, and the late Vicar of Brighton, the Rev. H. M. Wagner, made application to Her Majesty to accord this favour. The Queen, however, had two years before finally withdrawn from the town, and the Pavilion was on the point of being dismantled. The time for the Vicar's request was, therefore, inopportune, and he had the mortification of receiving through Sir H. Wheatley a letter expressing "regret that the Queen could not comply with the request to become Patron of Brighton College without subjecting herself to considerable embarrassment from applications of a similar nature which Her Majesty had been obliged to decline." The late Bishop of the Diocese, Dr. A. T. Gilbert, was next applied to and at once consented to become the Patron. The original Vice-Patrons were the Vicar of Brighton, Major-General Sir Adolphus Dalrymple, Bart., formerly M.P. for Brighton, Hon. C. Hanbury Tracy, and Colonel Wyndham (afterwards Lord Leconfield). The office of President was filled by the late Earl of Chichester, Lord Lieutenant of the County, till his death on March 15th, 1886. The original Vice-Presidents were Rev. J. S. M. Anderson, Sir Thomas W. Blomefield, Bart., Rev. H. V. Elliott, and Lord Alfred Hervey, M.P. for Brighton. The Council was constituted as follows:—J. R. Bovell, Esq., Edward Cornford, Esq., Rev. J. H. Jerrard, D.C.L., Rev. C. E. Kennaway, Rev. C. D. Maitland, Lieut. C. R. Malden, R.N., Edward Polhill, Esq., Rev. Frederick Reade, Rev. R. Snowdon Smith, S. K. Scott, Esq., W. A. Soames, Esq., and Rev. James Vaughan. The following

officers were also appointed:—Treasurer, W. A. Soames, Esq.; Hon. Secretaries, Edward Cornford, Esq., and W. A. Soames, Esq.*; Auditors, Richard Sylvester Cahill, Esq., and Charles Rogers, Esq.; Bankers, Messrs. Hall, West & Borrer; Hon. Physician, George Hall, Esq., M.D.; Hon. Surgeon, Robert Tayler, Esq. The Trustees were the Earl of Chichester, Sir T. W. Blomefield, Bart., and W. A. Soames, Esq. Messrs. Freeman and Cornford were appointed Law Agents.

Having completed the list of officers the Council on May 4th, 1846, resolved to hire of Mr. Fearon for the temporary purposes of the College the large house at the top of Portland Place known as Portland House,† for three years certain, at 120 guineas a year. Portland House was known as Major Russell's mansion in 1825, when it was the scene of a fire, the only one to which the firemen belonging to the Sussex County and General Fire and Life Assurance Company were called during the Company's brief career.‡ In 1846 the name of the building was Lion House, the premises being surmounted by the lion-statant crest of the Duke of Norfolk. The lion has long since gone, and the fluted Corinthian portico in front has been removed in the recent alterations.

At a meeting held on May 18th matters were sufficiently advanced to enable the Council to advertise for a Principal and Vice-Principal. On August 10th the Rev. Arthur John Maclean, B.A., of Trinity College, Cambridge, was chosen Principal, and the Rev. William Smith, M.A., Fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge, Vice-Principal. A week after the election the announcement was made to the Council that Mr. Smith did not intend to offer himself as candidate for the Vice-Principalship; the Rev. Henry Cotterill, M.A., late Fellow of St. John's College, Cambridge, was at once elected in his place, the Council in making the appointment resolving to give a higher salary than had been stated in the advertisement, "in consideration of his very high academical distinctions § and other qualifications."

It was now resolved that the Principal should make arrangements for the appointment of two or more Classical Masters, a Writing Master, and such assistance in French, German and Hebrew as he should deem expedient, at a cost not exceeding a very liberal sum specified; and to advertise that the College would open on January 26th, 1847.

It was arranged that the Principal and Vice-Principal should receive boarders, and, in addition, three boarding-houses (Mr. J. G. De Michele, Mrs. Vipond and Miss Lighton, and Miss Evans) were provided in the the immediate neighbourhood under the license of the Council and the control of the Principal.

On Tuesday, January 26th, 1847, Brighton College, Portland Place, was opened by the Bishop of Chichester in the presence of a large party of the parents and friends of the 47 pupils entered on the roll. Addresses were delivered by the Bishop, the Earl of Chichester, the Principal, and Archdeacon Hare.* Work began at 9 o'clock the following morning. A playground was hired from Mr. Ferrar. A room in Upper Rock Gardens, afterwards known as St. Mary's Lecture Room, was licensed by the Bishop for divine service; and the Council fitted up the premises as the College Chapel. It was now resolved to form a College Library, and the nucleus of the present excellent collection of books—a set of the Parker Society Publications—was presented by Francis Sherriff, Esq. During this same year three Scholarships were founded, value £30 per annum and tenable for three years at either Oxford or Cambridge. The holders of these Scholarships are called Council Scholars in the following Register.

On November 1st a Sub-Committee was appointed to enquire respecting a permanent site for the College now temporarily fixed in Portland Place; and on January 8th, 1848, the Hon. Secretary (Mr. Edward Cornford) was authorized to hire on lease for 99 years with purchasing clause, land in Eastern Road for this purpose, and to advertise for designs. Of nineteen designs received that by Mr. (afterwards Sir) George Gilbert Scott was chosen. It was decided to build a portion of the new College at a cost of £6,000.

On June 27th, 1848, the Foundation Stone of the new building was laid by the Bishop of Chichester. This followed a public distribu-

tion of the Midsummer Prizes by the Bishop at the Town Hall, when his Lordship solicited and obtained an extra week's holiday on the important occasion. The ceremony commenced with a religious service compiled by the Principal, by whom it was read, the boys chanting the 127th Psalm ; after which the Bishop, assisted by the architect and builder, laid the stone—the S.W. foundation of the porch—on which was inscribed “The first stone of this College was laid on the 27th day of June, A.D. MDCCCXLVIII., by the Right Reverend Father in God, Ashurst Turner Gilbert.” Then follow the names of the President, four Vice-Presidents, twelve Members of the Council, Treasurer, Hon. Secretary, Principal, Vice-Principal, and Architect. A bottle was deposited under the plate, containing various papers connected with the College, and a copy of the *Times* of the day. An anthem by Farrant, “Lord, for Thy tender mercies' sake,” was then sung by the pupils, and prayer and the Bishop's blessing brought the ceremony to a conclusion. A silver trowel with an inscription, the arms of the diocese, and the device and motto of the College, was presented to and used by the Bishop on the occasion.* At this date the number of students was 126.

On January 24th, 1849, possession was taken of the new building and Portland House was given up. The building at that time comprised no more than the principal front containing the class-rooms. The plan of the architect embraced the addition of a school-room, dining-hall, chapel, Principal's house and boarding-houses, the whole to form a quadrangle. The Principal's house was finished in 1854 ; the chapel in 1859 ; the dining-hall was added in 1863 ; the boarding-houses are quite recent erections ; the entrance tower is in progress ; the big school-room is in the immediate future.† The splendid playground with its surroundings, secured after long and troublesome negotiations, is very different to the ground on which E. B. Fawcett threw the Cricket Ball over 126 yards, and our four representatives in the Cambridge University Eleven of 1860 learned and taught us how to play Cricket.

This brief sketch of the early history of Brighton College seems a fitting introduction to the Register of the first thousand Boys.

Sir John Mc Neill's force into confusion, Huyshe saved his life by making his horse jump the thorn-hedge of the zariba, and during the fight which ensued he remained with the company of Royal Marines, who were engaged in repelling the frantic and gallant attempts of the enemy to penetrate between the zariba and the rallying square of the Berkshire Regiment outside. Huyshe wrote and sent off his first telegram to the *Times* immediately after the attack was checked and while our troops were suffering from the long range rifle-fire of the enemy in the bush. The *Pall Mall Gazette* described Huyshe's work for his paper as the best war despatches that had appeared in it for many years."
