1. Memorandum to Ministry of International Trade and Industry, Iron and Steel Bureau from General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, Economic and Scientific Section, 23 January 1950, subject as above, is rescinded.

2. Effective immediately, all producers of blast furnace pig iron may consume up to a fifty percent (50%) ration of imported United States coking coal and may consume an unlimited amount of imported coking coal from any other source.

3. The provisions of this memorandum are not to be construed as applying to coalite operations.

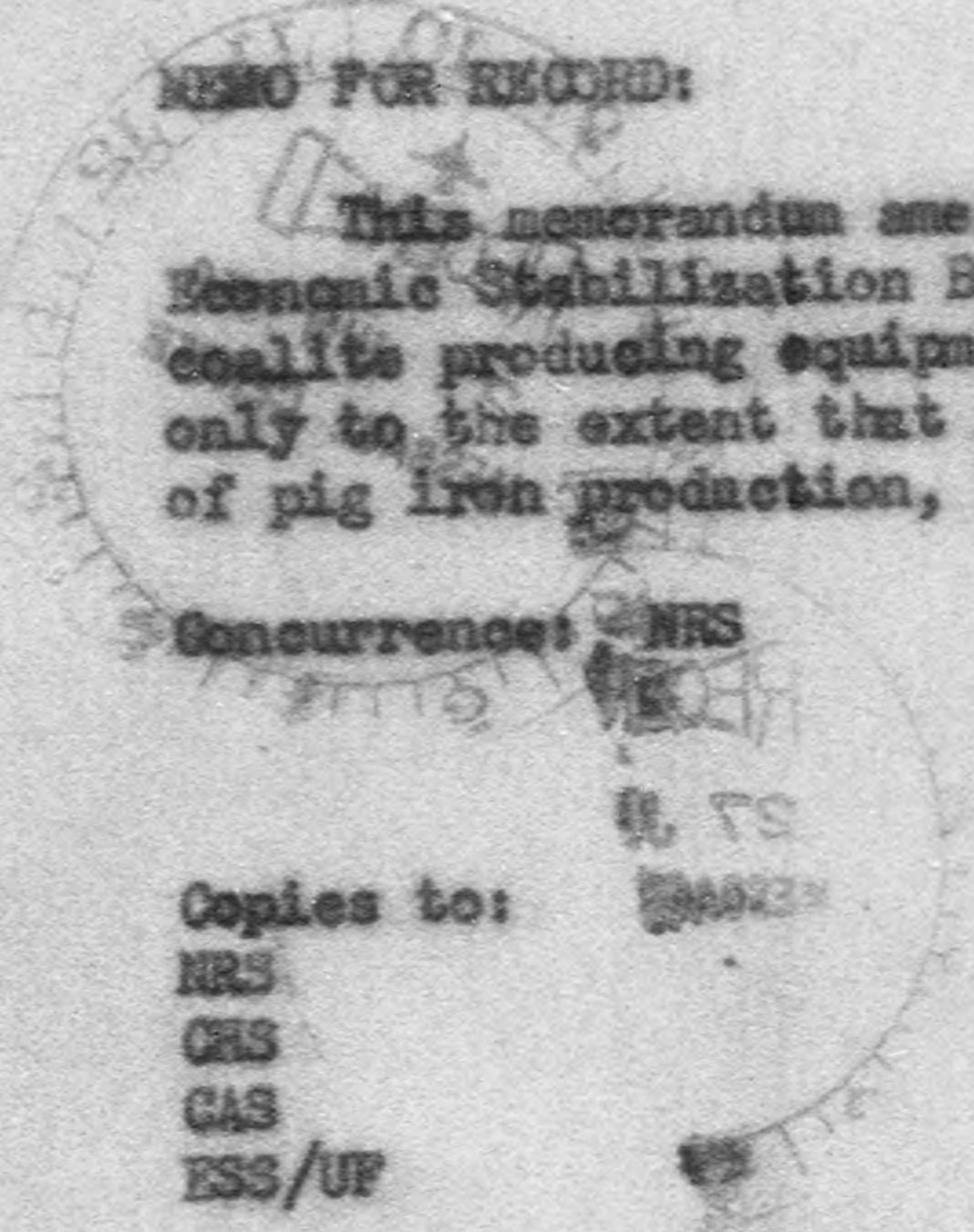

SUBJECT: Imported Coking Coal-Domestic Coking Coal Consumption Ratio for Blast Furnace Pig Iron Production

1. Confirming previous verbal instructions to the Ministry, the following is repeated as a matter of record.
2. The ratio established by the Ministry to the consuming industry is not to exceed a maximum of 40 percent imported coking coal to 60 percent or more of domestic coking coal at each installation.
3. It is desired that corrective instructions be issued immediately in order that existing variations from this ratio be brought in conformity with the above.
4. Provisions of this memorandum are not to be construed as altering the present "coalite" program now being conducted at the Wanishi Plant of the Japan Iron and Steel Company.

SUBJECT: Instructions for the Prevention of Spontaneous Combustion
of Coal Stockpiles

TO : Commanding Officer
Tokyo-Kanagawa Military Government District
APO 503

1. In order to reduce the fire hazard caused by spontaneous combustion of large stockpiles of coal of high sulfur and moisture content the following information will be disseminated to military government teams in coal mining areas under your command, for their use in advising the Japanese:

a. If mining must be continued without interruption, necessitating the stockpiling of an amount of coal in excess of available transportation, only coal from which sizes less than one inch in diameter have been eliminated, should be stockpiled.

b. Coal should not be piled in depths greater than six feet, and stockpiles should be made only where good surface drainage can be provided.

c. If it becomes necessary, in emergencies, to stockpile coal that is of sizes less than one inch in diameter, resistance to spontaneous combustion can be improved by maintaining the depth of stockpiles at less than six feet, preferably in layers of less than two feet, compacted by rolling, in order to minimize the circulation of air.

2. The problem of coal stockpile fire prevention has been brought to the attention of the Japanese Government.
