Thank you very much for your letter of 26 February 1949, and I certainly do remember you. I believe that the information in Volume I of the General Intelligence Series Histories of G-2, SWPA, may be of some help to you. Volume I is entitled "The Guerrilla Resistance Movement in the Philippines."

This volume describes in some detail the general background, history, organization, and personnel of guerrilla groups on Leyte, Samar, Central Luzon, Northern Luzon, Negros, etc. Chapter VIII covers your particular group on Negros. This volume also includes an extensive index and list of personalities. Tab 1 of the Documentary Appendices contains a record of trial of numerous Philippine Guerrillas by the Japanese.

The Chief of Staff, Philippine Army, was mailed three copies of this volume in November 1948. These histories should be available for your perusal. I have written the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, PHILCOM, citing these references and adding my recommendations for full cooperation with your request.

I trust the action I am taking in this matter may materially assist you in your undertaking.

1. Investigation has been completed as requested above and results
thereof are forwarded in attached Summary of Information.

2. In essence, it appears that Subject had every intention of leav-
ing Japan prior to 7 December 1941; that Subject, like other foreign
nationals in Japan was subject to police surveillance and interrogation,
that White Russians as a group did not fare so well as other foreign mino-
rities here due largely to the lack of any governmental intermediary; that
there is no evidence of Subject ever having given aid and comfort to the
enemy or having supported the enemy in any way; and that there is evidence
that Subject did aid and comfort fellow White Russians.

2. VASKEVITCH Paul P. (Stateless White Russian) was interviewed and the following information obtained. VASKEVITCH stated, in substance, that he had known subject for over thirty (30) years and recalls the following personal history data: Subject was a man of considerable wealth in Russia, and in 1900 sold most of his possessions there and went to London as Attache to the Czarist Embassy. While in London he purchased a large amount of stock in various companies in England. In 1906 he went to Peking as Second Secretary to the Czarist Embassy in Peking, and in 1908 was appointed Second Secretary to the Czarist Embassy in Tokyo. In 1910 he was appointed a member of the Foreign Office in Petrograd, and in 1916 returned to Japan as First Secretary of the Embassy. From 1917 to 1925 Subject was Charge D'Affairs in the Tokyo Embassy, and even though he resided in Tokyo, was advisor to the Russian embassy in Peking. From 1925 to 1940 subject resided in Tokyo and was unemployed. He refused to have any connection with the Soviet government from the time of Japan's recognition in 1925 and thus became a stateless emigrant. From 1940 to 1946 he resided in VASKEVITCH's home in Kobe. In 1946 he left Japan for the US.

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CI Div, S/I, Subj: ABRIKOSOW Dimitry, dtd 16 December 1949.

In 1940, at VASKEVITCH's request, Subject came to live with him in Kobe. Subject had purchased considerable art items when in China and Japan, and he had disposed of these objects with the intention of emigrating to England, where he had above-mentioned corporation stock. If unable to emigrate to England, subject stated to VASKEVITCH that he intended to go to the US. During this period subject received many letters from associates in England urging him to come there. Also during this period Subject possessed no real estate in Japan.

During the war years, Subject and VASKEVITCH were interrogated on several occasions by the Japanese police. They were also subject to routine surveillance by the Japanese police, and during this period many of the White Russians were imprisoned by the Japanese without apparent justification.

According to VASKEVITCH, Subject at no time aided the Japanese in their war effort in any manner.

3. A confidential informant had the following to say concerning Subject (Evaluation B-2). After relating background personal facts generally the same as VASKEVITCH, the informant stated that Subject had graduated from a law school in Petrograd, after which he secured a position with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. After an assignment in England and later in China, Subject came to Tokyo in 1916 and reached the position of First Secretary of the Embassy and Consulate. After the October revolution in 1917, he refused to submit to the Communists and would not acknowledge the new regime in Russia. When in 1925 Japan recognized the Soviet government, Subject immediately took steps to dispose of the Russian Czarist property in Japan. This informant did not know what Subject did with the proceeds of the sale, but he has heard that Subject transferred some money to the US which, he alleged, was his personal savings. Subject then became a Stateless resident in Japan, as he had no intention of ever returning to Russia.

Before the outbreak of World War II, Subject intended to emigrate to England or the US but the war stopped his plans.

Subject's activities during the war were limited because of restrictions placed upon the White Russians by the Japanese police. These stateless emigrants had no consulate to assist them and the Japanese took advantage of this insecurity. Many of the White Russians here were impelled to work in Japanese factories and their rations were limited in comparison to other foreign minorities. All of these White Russians were closely observed by the Japanese police, who felt free to interrogate them on the slightest pretext; keeping them in prison during the interrogation.

According to this informant Subject's emigration to the US was largely made possible through the aid of Ex-Ambassador Grew.

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GI Div. S/I. Subj: ABRIKOSSOW Dmitry, dtd 16 December 1949.

Subject was also opposed to any form of totalitarian government but was always somewhat doubtful of the value of the democratic form because he claimed that the latter was an incentive for crooked politicians.

Subject has a younger brother in Moscow, an eminent scientist, and member of the Academy of Sciences in the USSR, but Subject has not corresponded with him since the revolution in 1917.

4. MOROKOFF Valentine and Fedor were jointly interviewed and stated that they had known Subject for about thirty (30) years. According to the MOROKOFFS, Subject possesses no real estate in either Tokyo to Kobe but lived on income derived from investments in England.

Subject was a close friend of Mr. Grew and also of the British Ambassador. Because of these friendships, Japanese officials in the Tokyo Areas made things unpleasant for Subject, and at the first available opportunity, he moved to Kobe where he was less well known. Subject is known to be anti-Soviet and anti-Japanese and did nothing to aid the Japanese war effort. On many occasions before the war, Subject expressed a desire to emigrate to England or the United States and to establish citizenship in one of the countries. MOROKOFF also believes that Mr. Grew's intervention made it possible for Subject to go to the US.

5. Records of the Civil Property Custodian, GHQ, SCAP, maintained in Kobe, contained no record of Subject's possessing any real estate or other assets while a resident of Kobe.

6. BERSTEIN Peter (Polish) has been acquainted with Subject for approximately ten (10) years and currently resides in the same house that Subject rented prior to the war. BERSTEIN knew Subject as a cultured, intellectual person who was considered to be a retired diplomat. BERSTEIN stated that the Japanese police definitely persecuted the White Russians and other stateless persons because they had no consulate to intervene for them. BERSTEIN, himself being stateless, was picked up by the Japanese police several times on fake charges and then subjected to intensive interrogation and mistreatment. BERSTEIN had no knowledge of Subject assisting the Japanese in any manner in the recent war.

7. A second confidential informant (Evaluation B-2), who knew subject for approximately ten (10) years, corroborated above information and added that subject frequently visited Metropolitan SERGEI of the St. Nicolai Cathedral in Tokyo and became close friends with the Metropolitan. This informant also stated that the White Russians and other stateless persons were persecuted by the Japanese police and the Kempei Tai. This informant had no knowledge of Subject helping the Japanese in any way during the war.

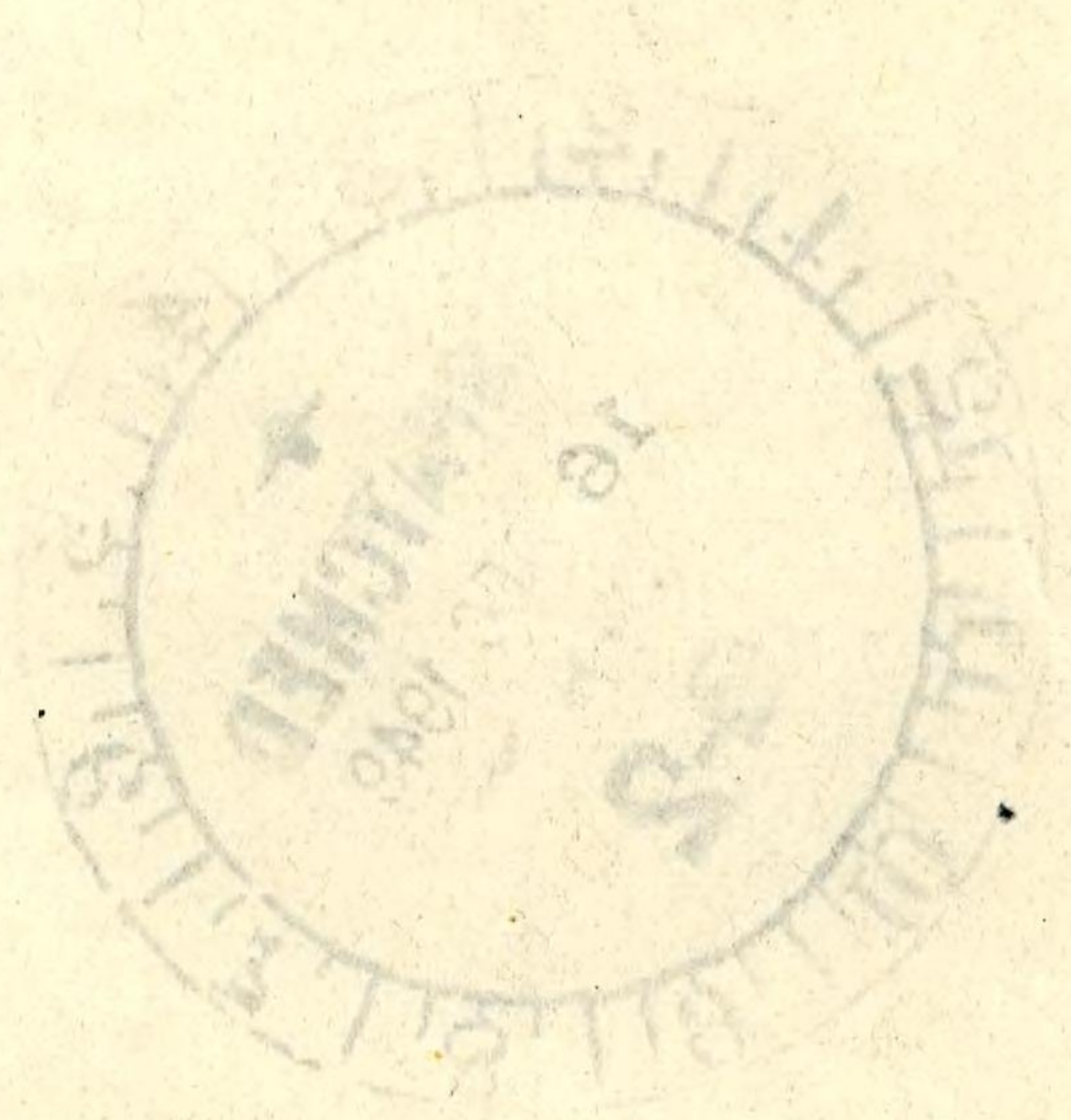

8. A third confidential informant (Evaluation B-2), who knew Subject for approximately ten (10) years, stated that all the time he knew him, Subject was unemployed and lived on his savings. Several times Subject indicated to the informant that he intended to emigrate to either England or the US. When in 1946 the Soviets attempted to influence local White Russians to take out Soviet citizenship, Subject refused to listen and would have no relations with local Soviet officials.

9. Thus it appears that Subject had taken all the normal steps preparatory to leaving Japan; that while police records are non-existent, Subject's claims of surveillance and interrogation are substantiated by various White Russians; that while there is no evidence of Japanese discrimination against the White Russians as compared to other aliens by decree, there is evidence that in actual practice this was done; and finally there is no evidence that Subject gave aid or assistance to the enemy or supported the enemy cause in any way.

1. For your information, one BARANETS Oleg and wife, Alla, stateless White Russians who have been denied entry Japan on security grounds are reported to have obtained entry permission to the Philippine Islands, and will soon go there from Shanghai.

2. Our files contain numerous references to the BARANETS, but the most pertinent here is taken from an ESD-44 report of recent date:

"Oleg BARANETS is a stateless citizen of Russian origin born on 22 September 1918 at Aleksandrovsk. He formerly held USSR Sojourn Permit #7332 issued 8 April 1946 at Shanghai. Police files indicate that this man arrived in Shanghai originally in 1941. His place of residence prior to his arrival in this city is not known. At the present time, Oleg BARANETS, who has a high school education, is employed as a clerk by Liebermann Waelchli and Co., 8-10 Kinling Road, Shanghai, telephone No. 80175. No other information is available regarding this firm, however, members of the company list themselves as merchants representing various overseas companies.

"Oleg BARANETS is married to Alla BARANETS nee BOOLE, a stateless citizen of Russian origin. This woman, a former USSR citizen, was born 27 December 1918 at Vladivostok. She arrived in Shanghai in 1930, and received a high school education in this city. Both Oleg BARANETS and his wife renounced their Soviet citizenship on 29 May 1948 at Shanghai. The above couple are presently residing at number 22A Rte. Pere Robert, Shanghai, telephone 70764."

3. The Liebermann Waelchli and Co., referred to above is reportedly a Soviet front company and agency. Local efforts to prove this have so far been fruitless, but above quoted source as well as American Consul General, Shanghai, list this as a Swiss firm operating Soviet interests in North China, and both recommended against granting BARANETS entry clearance for Japan.

1. For your information, one BARABETS Oleg and wife, Alla, a Russian wife, have been reported to have obtained entry permits to the Philippine Islands, and will soon be there from Shanghai.

2. Our files contain numerous references to the BARABETS, but the most pertinent here is taken from an SSI-1A report of recent date:

Oleg BARABETS is a Russian citizen of Russian origin born on 27 September 1918 at Vladivostok. He formerly held USSR passport #12345 issued 8 April 1946 at Shanghai. Oleg's files indicate that he was arrested in Shanghai originally in 1941. His place of residence prior to his arrival in this city is not known. At the present time, Oleg BARABETS, who has a high school education, is employed as a clerk by Lieberman, Kaelin and Co., 8-10-10th Road, Shanghai, telephone No. 20175. No other information is available regarding this firm, however, members of the company first themselves as merchants representing various overseas companies.

Oleg BARABETS is married to Alla BARABETS nee BOLO, a Russian citizen of Russian origin. This woman, a former USSR citizen, was born 27 December 1918 at Vladivostok. She arrived in Shanghai in 1930, and received a high school education in this city. Both Oleg BARABETS and his wife resounded their Soviet citizenship on 29 May 1946 at Shanghai. The above couple are presently residing at 224 Lee Koo Road, Shanghai, telephone 7074.

3. The Lieberman, Kaelin and Co., 8-10-10th Road, Shanghai, has been reported to have this man as its agent. This man is reportedly a former Soviet citizen and is reported to be a high school graduate.

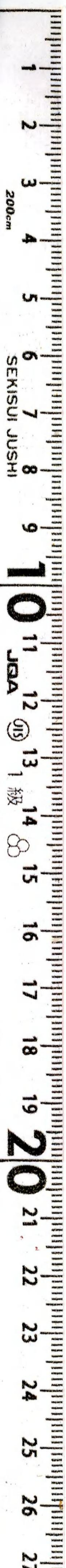

1. On 17 April 1949, Sarkosi, Olga Yanovich, Hungarian-Russian, revealed the following information. (A-2)
2. The visa of Besedish, George (Russian), owner of the Marfusha Restaurant, Dewey Blvd, Manila, will soon expire. Besedish is desperate to find a reliable person who can vouch for him. Besedish has indicated that he will ask a Williams, George, American, Department manager of Hancock's and Co., Radio Division, to vouch for him. It is Sarkosi's belief that Besedish's visa will not be renewed because the latter is believed to be a Russian Communist by Filipino immigration officials. (D-4)
3. Sarkosi's sister Lydia is married to Sarge Besedish.
4. Smirinski, Alec (Phonetic)(Russian), has arrived at Guinan, Samar Refugee Center. Smirinski is Sarkosi's former husband. The former and the latter were married in Shanghai in 1941, but were divorced inasmuch as this marriage was performed for convenience only. Smirinski displayed definite Communistic inclinations during the time Sarkosi lived with him. Smirinski has asked Sarkosi to come to Samar and visit him because he will soon be going to the United States to live with his wealthy sister in San Francisco. (D-4)
5. Sarkosi does not intend to visit Smirinski because she has a steady boy friend, George Williams, who she plans to marry. (D-4)
6. Sarkosi expressed a desire to go to the States, and further stated that she never intends to go back to Manchuria, her native land. (D-4)

Olga was reported on 10 May 1947 as a possibly undesirable character because of her association (which she admitted in applying for the above mentioned visitor's visa to the United States) with one POMUSS Edythe. POMUSS Edythe was reported as possibly connected with a B. POMUSS and Mrs. D. POMUSS who are members of the Communist Youth Organization in Shanghai; and with a Mr. R. POMUSS, Soviet businessman in Shanghai, who has allegedly engaged in illegal transfers of Japanese property through the assistance of the Soviet Trade Association. Records show POMUSS Edythe was refused entry into the United States together with her brother, POMUSS Boris, on grounds that each had interests prejudicial to the United States.

7. It was also reported that Olga sought employment with the Bank of America after her arrival in Japan, but was refused because she wanted payment in American dollars.

8. The following is information concerning CASE Harold Mugane, American citizen:

a. He was employed by the Everett Steamship Corporation in Tientsin at the time of his marriage to Helen.

b. He was reported to have spent most of his time while in China in the city of Tientsin.

c. On 2 April 1948, he entered Japan as service representative to manage the Kobe Branch Office of the Everett Steamship Corporation.

d. In early October 1948, he was dismissed from the Everett Steamship Corporation for inefficiency, and at present is employed as Secretary of the Marine Shipping Federation in Yokohama.

e. He and his family (Helen and Olga) are presently residing at Hyogo-ken, Kobe-shi, Ikuta-ku, Kitano-cho, 3-chome, 41-1.

f. He originally had three year agreement with the Everett Steamship Corporation and was expected to remain in Japan until 1951.

g. His home address in the United States is 324 West Town Street, Glendive, Montana.

9. Investigation revealed that CASE family associates with American and Allied personnel, but no associations or activities have been noted within the Russian community in Japan.

SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

SUBJECT: DEANE, Hugh, Jr.

1. Information on the subject has been previously forwarded to the Director of Intelligence in a Summary of Information dated 5 January 1948 and in a Radio from CINCPAC to Department of the Army (for SAOAS, Information copy to CSGID) dated 18 June 1949. Deane's status is unchanged; he remains the accredited representative of Telepress, turning out copy constantly reflecting the Communist line. Two recent developments set forth below are forwarded to the Director of Intelligence to make available to him all the pertinent information on the subject.

2. On 1 September 1949, Deane was married to Miss Beverly Mary McCarthy by Vice-Consul Kline at the American Consulate in Yokohama. Miss McCarthy had been employed by GHQ, FEC from 1946 until her marriage. She sailed for the United States on the USAT Grant on 5 September 1949 with the announced intention of returning to Japan as Deane's dependent. Miss McCarthy is a British subject, a New Zealand National. Her parents, also New Zealand Nationals, live at #5 Cook Street, Whangarei, New Zealand. Like several other Australian and New Zealand girls, she was employed under contract with the permission of the New Zealand Government and held the status of a DAC. Miss McCarthy was granted an immigration visa to enter the United States in May 1949, and did not have to marry Deane in order to gain admission to the States.

3. An instructive example of the methods used by fellow-traveling correspondents and the Communist-dominated press services in manipulating their front organizations is furnished by the well-timed repercussions of a dispatch initiated in Tokyo by Deane. One MORIOKA Shichiro, a Japanese National, was charged in the Provost Courts with violation of the Press Code, SCAP directive 19, September 1945. MORIOKA as an editor of the RENGO Agency published items which were falsely and destructively critical of the Occupation Powers. (Incls 1, 2 and 3). In the date line of Inclosures 1 and 3, the "TP-RENGO" reflects the contract existing between Telepress and Rengo whereby Telepress furnishes services to the latter. Radios from Deane to, first, Telepress, New York and second, to Telepress Prague were intercepted by G-2. These messages were both designed to actuate the loud-speaker mechanism conveniently provided by the so-called "International Union of Journalists" General Secretariat in Prague. The end-products of Deane's slanted dispatches and the ready apparatus of this IOJ front are shown in Inclosures 4 and 5. Inclosure 4 is a full translation of the resulting article as it appeared in AKAHATA and Inclosure 5 is the "Daily Worker" version.

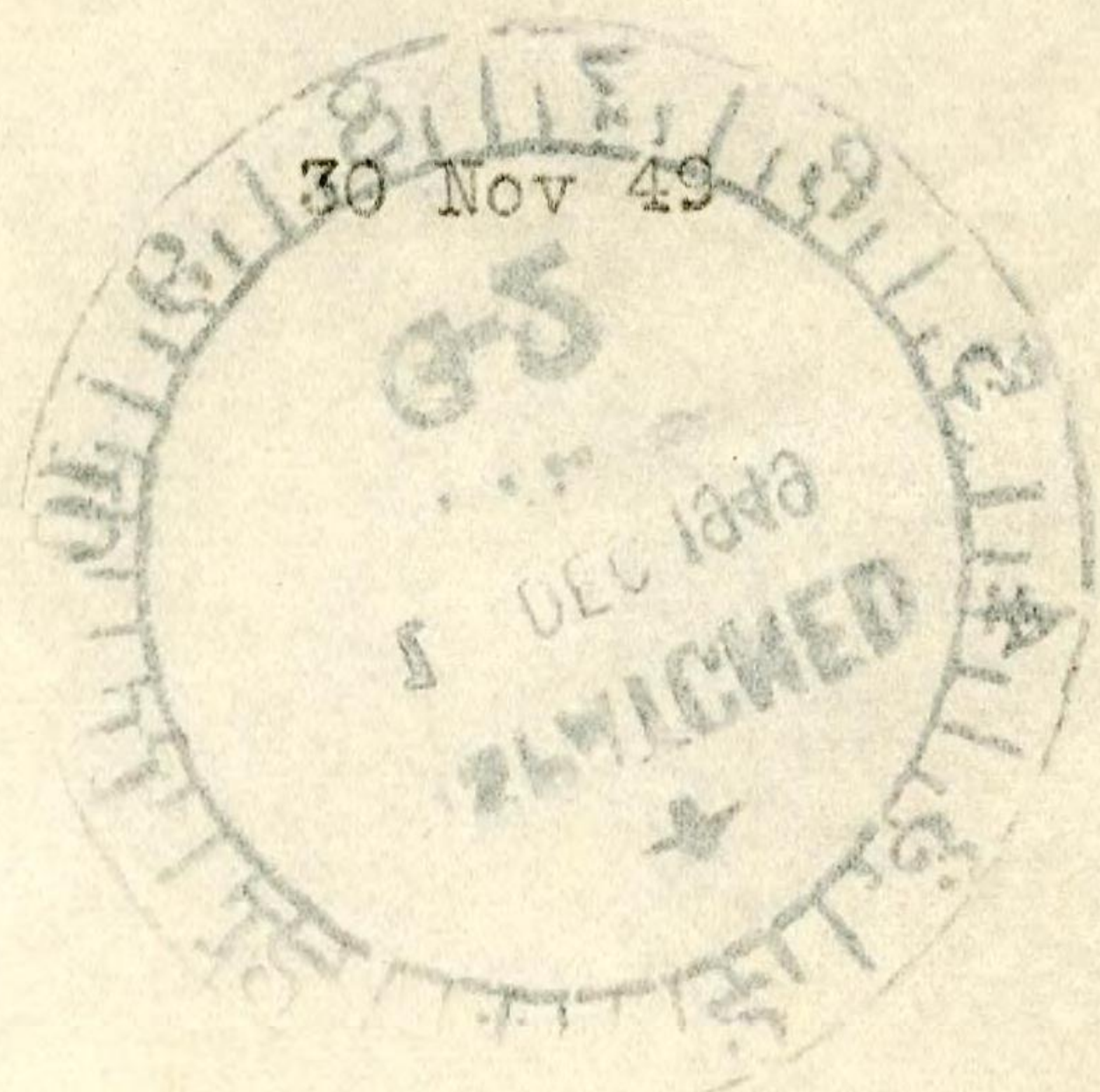

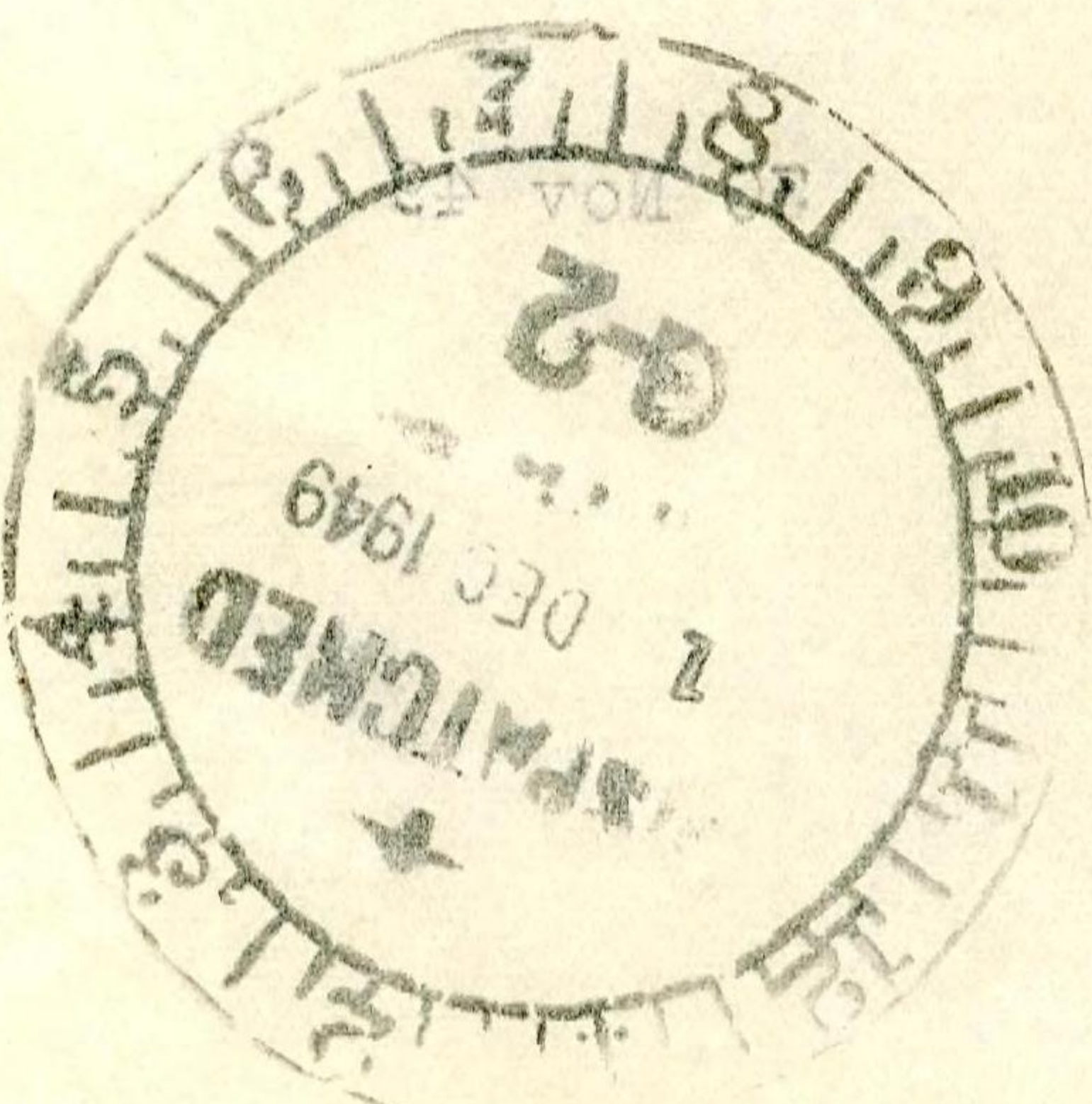

SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

SUBJECT: Charlotte EBENER, Correspondent

1. Subject was accredited International News Service Correspondent in Tokyo from about September 1946 to about December 1946, at which time she departed for Saigon, Cochin China. Subject also worked for Newsweek Magazine.

2. Subject is from Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and a graduate of the University of Wisconsin. She is about 30 years of age, is argumentative and known to speak her mind. Subject is keenly interested in labor movements, politics, and agricultural reforms.

3. Subject worked for a time as crime reporter for a Chicago paper. Her first assignment in the Far East was in India for International News Service in 1944. In the summer of 1945 she went to China, and while there she covered the Peace Mission, the Nationalist and Communist armies. She was in Manchuria during the Soviet Occupation in the fall of 1945 and there became acquainted with various Russian officers. At one time subject had been held in restraint along with other correspondents in a Mukden hotel. After her return from covering the activities of the Communist Army in Manchuria, it is alleged that she was interrogated by General Marshall for a period of three hours. We do not vouch for this report. As a result of conversation with her, a reliable informant believes that Miss EBENER's sympathies were with the cause of the Soviet Union. Her convictions were that the "United States should immediately withdraw troops and all aid from China -- she asserted that United States planes bearing US markings were being used to bomb Communist-held villages."

4. Subject, when in Tokyo, was a member of the "leftist clique" at the Tokyo Correspondents' Club. This group, at that time, was dominated by the leadership of Mark GAYN, pro-Communist and aggressive Far East correspondent for the Chicago Sun. Others prominently associated with the clique included such Communist suspects and sympathizers as Davide CONDE, unaccredited correspondent for Reuters, whose membership in the Communist Party was established by Military Intelligence Division; Hugh DEANE of Telepress, contributor of innumerable articles to Communist organs; Gordon WALKER of the Christian Science Monitor, described by USAFIK radio as a "penetrating Communist"; Margaret PARTON, New York Herald Tribune, a devoted GAYN follower; Bill COSTELLO of Columbia Broadcasting System, an occasionally outspoken leftist; and Joseph FROMM, formerly of World Report.

5. Miss EBENER was closely associated with Mark GAYN, and in October and November 1946, she travelled with him to Korea as Newsweek correspondent. During this Korea junket, she gave every indication of pro-Communist leanings. Soon after her arrival in Korea, she met an officer acquaintance she had known in China. Her immediate request was that he make arrangements for her to visit the Soviet Liaison officer in Seoul. The request was made for her, but was denied by Headquarters, USAFIK, with instructions that such arrangements must be made by her personally.

6. On 21 October 1946, she participated in a round table discussion: "The Future of the United Nations", at the Red Cross Bankers' Club. During the discussion, subject took the lead and got off the subject to criticize United States policies in China, Japan and Korea, stating that it was not right for the United States to extensively aid Chiang Kai Shek when Russia

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was giving very little, if any, aid to Chinese Communist forces. American aim to establish democracy throughout the world, she states, was being defeated because the United States chose to deal with factions in governments that were far from democratic. She further cited the incident of the arrest, allegedly without warrant, of MOON, Eun Chong, Korean labor leader, while being interviewed by subject and GAYN. She pointed out that it was difficult to understand that the Military Government in Korea, after a year of existence, had not yet set up a police system which required the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of an individual.

7. SUL, Kook Hwan, staff member of the "Korean Pacific Press", Seoul, who acted as interpreter for EBENER and GAYN, had been referred to them by Joseph FROMM, fellow-member of the "leftist clique". FROMM had used SUL as an interpreter when he was in Korea.

8. Subject in a conversation with a confidential informant inquired whether it was customary for a G-2 representative to accompany correspondents on trips outside of Seoul; she had noted that she and GAYN were closely watched and followed during their Ongjin trip, which took them along the 38th parallel.

9. Subject reportedly attempted to collaborate with Mark GAYN on several articles for the Newsweek Magazine, but the stories were rejected by the editors because they were considered too "red".

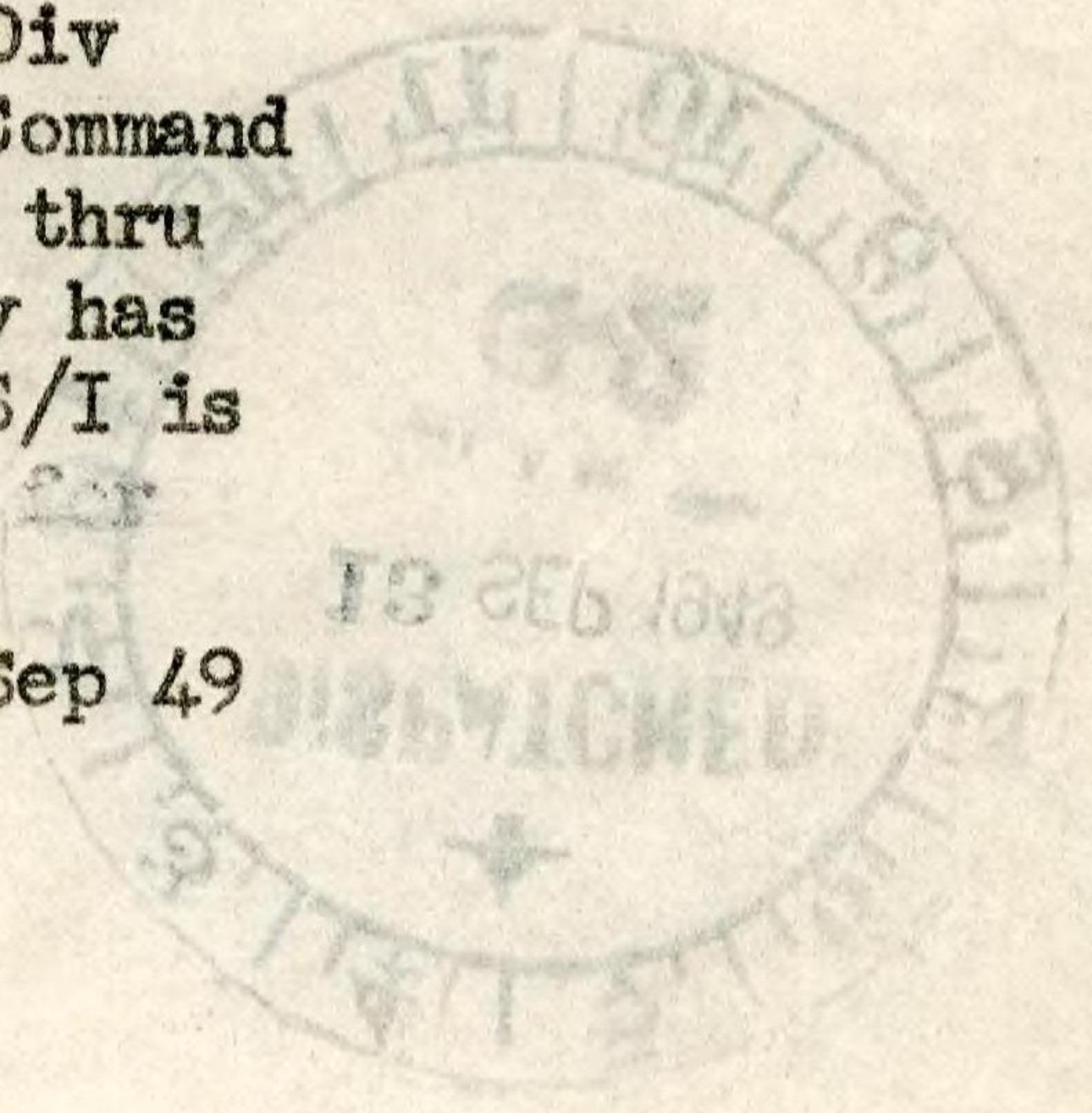

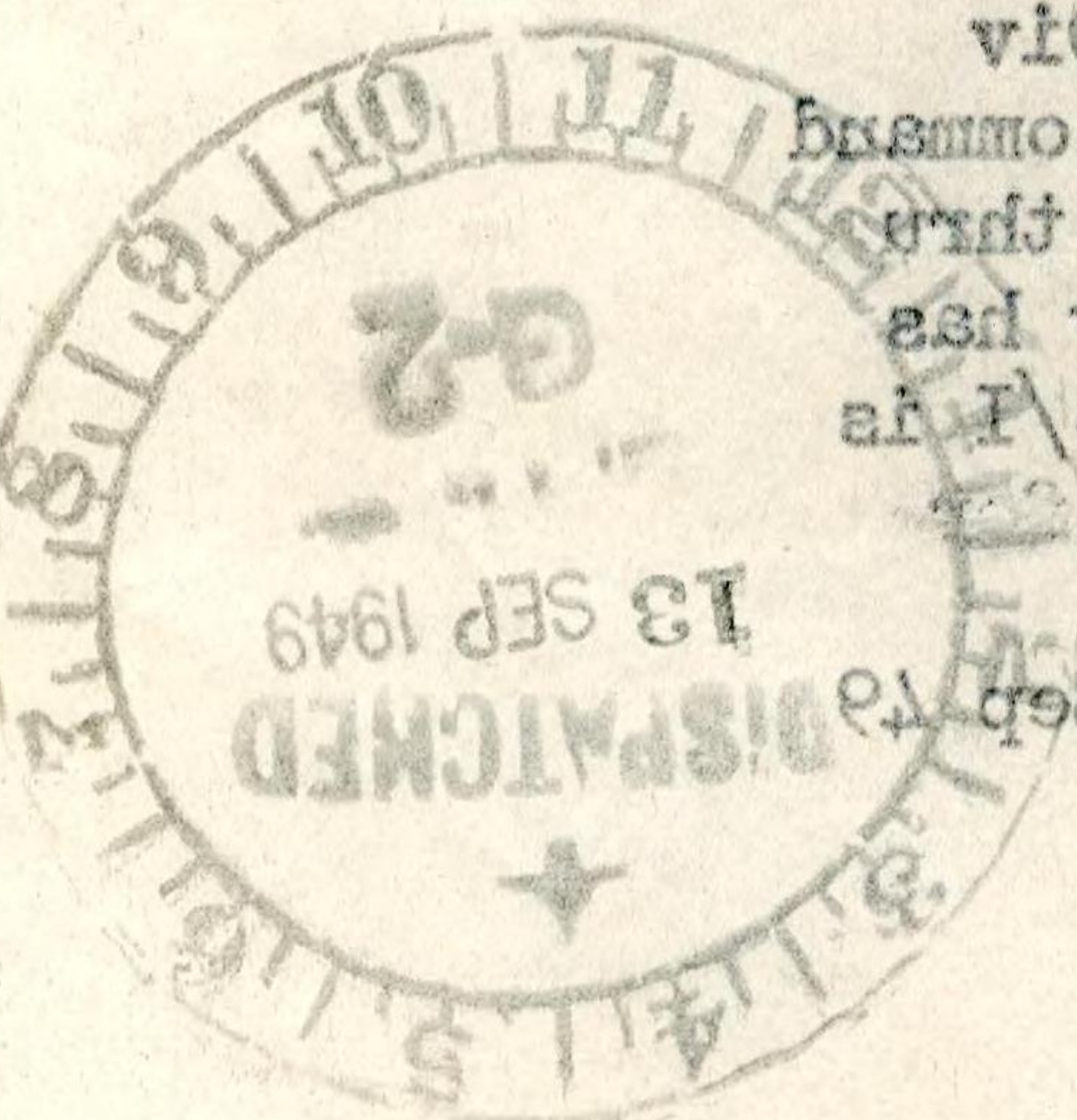

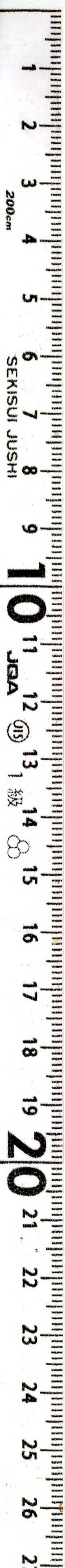

SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

SUBJECT: SHENITZ Helen Alexander, nee NIKONOVITCH

1. Subject was born 9 May 1895 in Kursk, Russia, and became an American citizen by naturalization in 1936.

2. Results of a Counter Intelligence Corps investigation, conducted in November 1947, show that Subject was married to a Russian officer who was killed by the Communists in 1924. During World War II Subject was a WAC and worked for the Alaskan Defense Command under Dr. S. A. Miller, Professor of Geology at Stanford University, performing research on the "Perma-frost" project. Subject was cleared by a Partial Background Investigation, Headquarters First Army, 24 October 1947.

3. Subject speaks five languages and was employed in the Civil Information and Education Section, GHQ, SCAP, as a librarian from 4 April 1947 to 12 July 1947. From 13 July 1947 to 28 May 1948 she was employed by ATIS, GHQ, SCAP, with a civil service rating of P-3. All personnel data from GHQ, SCAP, was forwarded to Civilian Personnel Records Branch, St. Louis, Missouri, on 22 June 1948, after she had resigned her position here and returned to the United States.

4. Subject's difficulties with G-2 of this Command came to a head when a letter was received here from the Office of the Chief of Staff, U. S. Army, forwarding a letter concerning Subject from one ELLIOTT Guy B. Mr., Yreka, California. A copy of Mr. Elliott's letter and its enclosure are attached hereto (Incls 1 and 2). The gist of this communication is that Subject was forced to resign her position here because she refused to appear in a group picture to be included in a classified history of the operations of the section wherein she was employed. The charges brought by Elliott on Subject's behalf have been completely refuted. A statement by her Section Chief, Lt. Col. Richard C. Zalesky, and a statement by the Division Chief, Col. E. H. F. Svensson, are attached as Incls 3 and 4. A copy of the G-2, GHQ, SCAP, reply to the Chief of Staff, U. S. Army on this matter is also attached for your information (Incl 5).

5. The matter of Subject having made derogatory statements regarding Military Personnel is inconsequential in comparison with her unauthorized disclosure of classified information to Elliott, as evidenced by Elliott's communication (Incl 2). The following information concerning Elliott was obtained from the Sixth Army, G-2:

SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

SUBJECT: FUJIKAWA, Mrs. Hannah R. (nee Reichenberg)

1. The State Department on 12 December 1947, through the United States Consul at Yokohama, expatriated Subject from United States citizenship, as a result of her participation in Japanese elections 20 and 25 April 1947. Since the loss of her citizenship she has been a continual source of trouble to the Consul at Yokohama.(1)(Evaluation: A-2)

2. Repeatedly, Hannah FUJIKAWA has falsely announced to her Japanese neighbors that she is an American, a pretense which, to the Japanese, has lent weight to her communistic utterance(2) Subject's husband, FUJIKAWA Yoshitaro is stated to be a communist, and a leader in the Japan Electric Power Workers Union in Tokyo. Subject, acting in accord with her husband, is giving all her time to communist propaganda, making public speeches and writing articles for leftist publications.(3) (Evaluation: C-2)

3. Subject publicly declared herself to be a Communist Party member at the termination of hostilities and subsequently has gradually intensified her activities. Her residence appears to be a meeting place and contact point for Communist Party members.(4) (Evaluation: C-2)

4. Upon the dissolution of the "League of Koreans Residing in Japan" Subject is reported to have made the following statements to her neighbors: "A government which persecutes the League of Koreans is unjust. I sympathize with the Koreans. Korean women are taking action against such oppression, but only with real enthusiasm can a democratic government of the people be established. The present government (Japan) is corrupt.(5) (Evaluation: C-2)

5. Subject, in spreading communist propaganda, seizes upon any and every opportunity as evidenced by the incident set forth below: In the presence of a crowd in a railroad station, she directed the following remarks to police officers who were enforcing economic controls: "My husband is a communist. The police are always suppressing the communists. I am also going to join the Communist Party tomorrow. The Japanese police are always molesting the laborers and the weak. Look at the faces of the people; they have hardly any color on their faces from eating only sweet potatoes. Don't you agree with me, everybody? Why don't you stop enforcing the law? There is no need for any detectives (presumably referring to economic police) in Japan. The police support the government and the capitalists. The laborers receive low wages and consequently they strike. Then they receive police interference.(6) (Evaluation: C-2)

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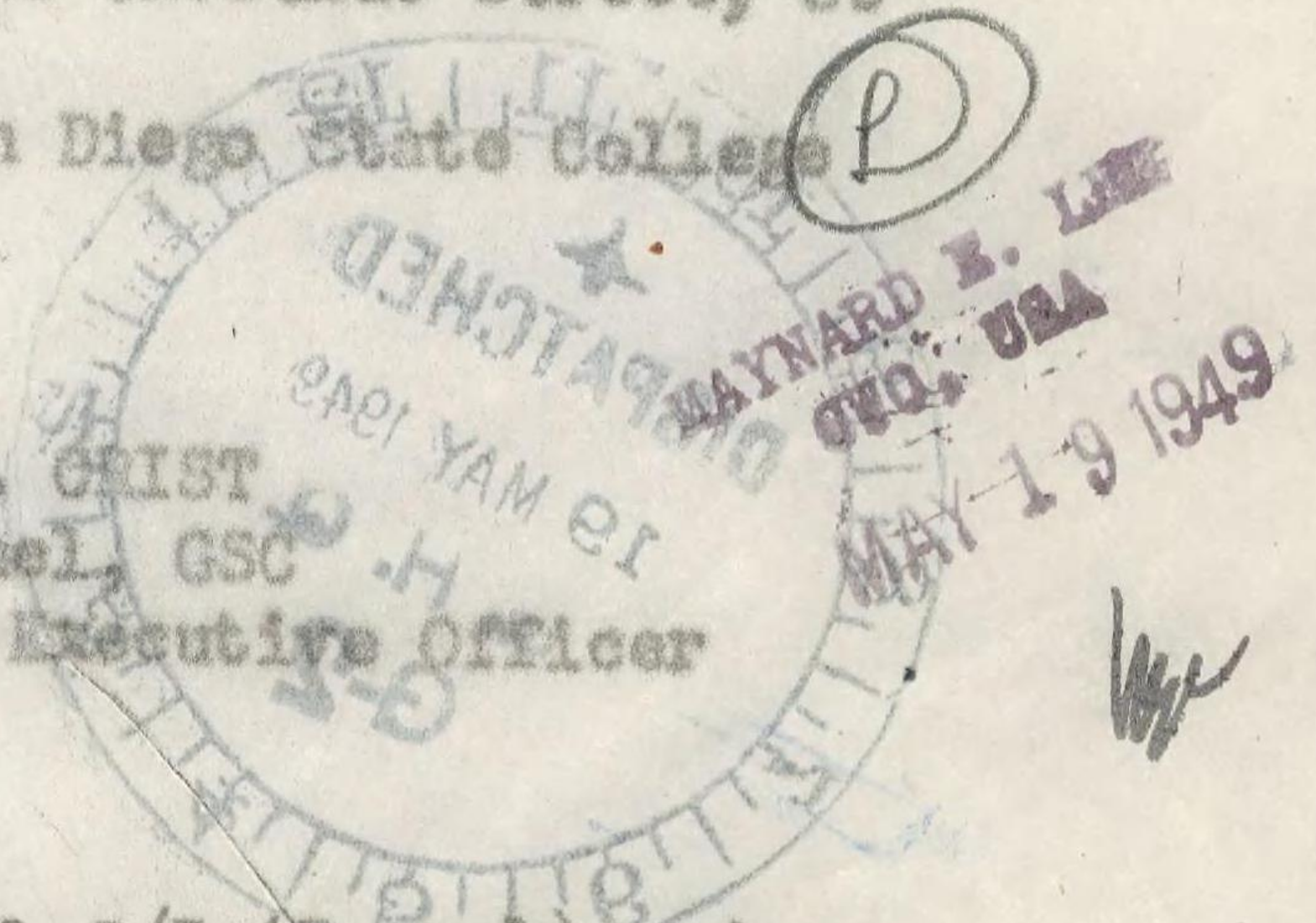
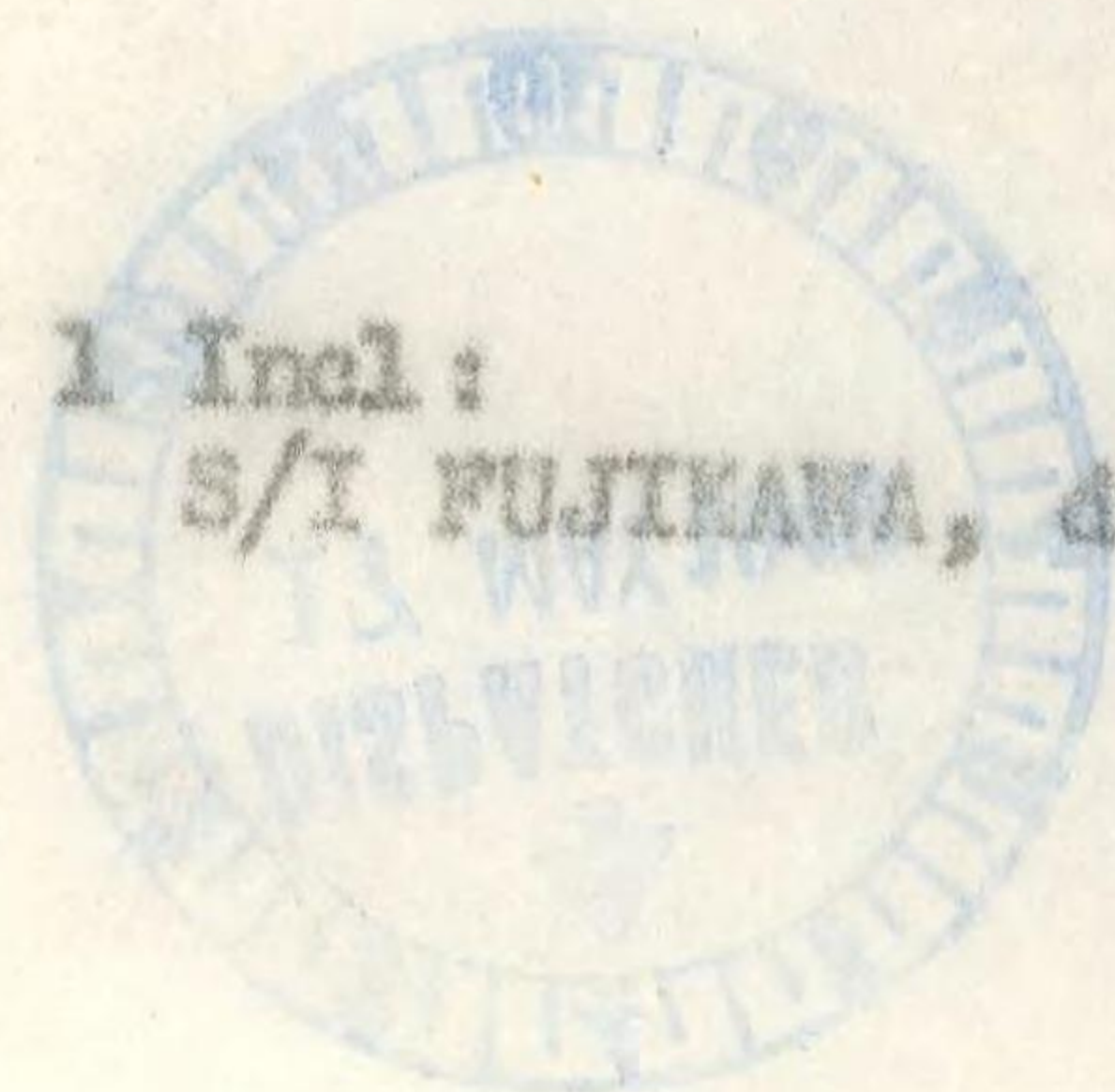

SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

SUBJECT: FUJIKAWA Hannah (nee REICHENBERG) alias STERN Barbara alias RICHMOND Annette.

1. According to a November 1947 CIC report rated reliable and probably true, Subject stated that she was planning to use the pen name of STERN Barbara in her writings.
2. A reliable informant reported that, on an occasion when looking through Subject's photograph album, Subject pointed out a picture of a blonde female, claiming it was of her (Subject) and was taken in California approximately twelve (12) years before (1935) when she was operating a tobacco shop near the waterfront. Informant noticed that the name RICHMOND Annette, was written on the reverse side of the picture and commented that the "waterfront" referred to by Subject was probably located at SAN PEDRO, California.
3. Subject, although an American citizen, elected to remain in Japan through the World War II period. Despite the fact that her Japanese husband, FUJIKAWA Yoshitaro (Fred), well-known Communist, was with her in Japan, she dispatched a "next-of-kin" wire to him at a Los Angeles address and managed to persuade an American Recovery Team to "recover" her on 1 October 1945 and return her to the U.S. for the ostensible purpose of joining her husband. In June 1946, she petitioned the Joint Chiefs of Staff for permission to rejoin her husband who was, on this occasion, truthfully reported as residing in Japan. Sailing as a fare-paying passenger aboard the SS Marine Falcon, Subject was outspokenly anti-American and pro-Soviet. She volunteered the information that she had been an active participant in the 1936 communist-sponsored SAN PEDRO Waterfront strike.
4. Subject has complained to an informant rated as being reliable that her father, REICHENBERG Harry, although an excellent dress designer, was unable to find work in New York City because he had been "black listed". REICHENBERG Harry is now residing in the LOS ANGELES SANATORIUM, 1500 East Duarte Road, Duarte, California and is the recipient of frequent letters posted into APO channels without permission by Subject.
5. According to an informant, CHAMBERS Carol, teacher in the Tokyo-American school system, is an associate of Subject. This informant states that CHAMBERS was told to contact Subject by STEINMETZ Harry C.,

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professor of the San Diego State College and that the contact between Subject and CHAMBERS began in November 1947. Local files show the following information regarding CHAMBERS:

6. An individual who has known CHAMBERS since her student days in 1946 states that CHAMBERS is not, to the best of her knowledge, a member of any political organization; however, she states that CHAMBERS has "very liberal ideas, such as favoring socialized medicine and the distributing of wealth from the capitalists class to the poorer class of people". This informant states that Subject visits CHAMBERS in her Tokyo billet on an average of twice each week and has, on "one or two occasions", persuaded CHAMBERS to abuse her APO privileges by mailing letters and clippings for Subject to STEINMETZ Harry C. The informant

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reports that CHAMBERS was reluctant to mail the letters but, upon being assured by Subject that the action was not illegal, did so.

7. In her visits to CHAMBERS, informant states, Subject invariably advocates leftist ideas to CHAMBERS and others and always condemns Occupational policies and procedures. On one occasion, in the presence of others, Subject asked CHAMBERS if she (CHAMBERS) hadn't been sent to Japan to help the "Party". CHAMBERS replied in the negative.

8. Four other informants state that CHAMBERS is an extremely naive person with liberal views but without leftist inclinations and that Subject, an opportunist, has taken advantage of CHAMBERS.

9. According to statements made by CHAMBERS, STEINMETZ Harry C., a professor of San Diego College, became known to CHAMBERS in 1942 as a fellow member, and later a fellow trustee, of the San Diego Unitarian Church. The CHAMBERS and STEINMETZ families, because of their church association, are on very friendly terms. STEINMETZ, a professor of psychology, has both liberal and radical ideas and advocates the assimilation and dissemination of these ideas to the masses by means of education and "not through aggressiveness or force".

10. CHAMBERS states that, in August 1947, upon learning that she (CHAMBERS) was going to Tokyo, STEINMETZ told CHAMBERS that he (STEINMETZ) had a correspondent in Tokyo who could tell CHAMBERS what was going on politically and economically in Japan and that it would be of advantage to CHAMBERS to contact this correspondent -- thereupon STEINMETZ gave CHAMBERS the name of Hannah FUJIKAWA c/o Hugh DEANE, Telepress Ltd, Tokyo.

11. CHAMBERS claims that in November 1947 she telephoned DEANE Hugh requesting information regarding Subject. DEANE stated he would contact Subject and advise her that CHAMBERS wanted to meet her. About a week later Subject telephoned and made an appointment to meet CHAMBERS. Subject, according to CHAMBERS, is a neurotic person who always advocates communism and who invariably criticizes the Occupation and its policies. CHAMBERS claims that she dislikes Subject on account of these traits but continues to see her for educational purposes and because she does not desire to be abrupt with a friend of professor STEINMETZ.

12. CHAMBERS admits that she has mailed letters and clippings to STEINMETZ for FUJIKAWA, claiming she (CHAMBERS) did so on the Subject's assurance that it was a legal act used by Subject only to expedite delivery. CHAMBERS states that she visited Subject at her home on two occasions and on both visits the FUJIKAWA'S expounded the virtues of communism.

13. Subject habitually attempts to evade censorship by sending her letters to the U.S. via military APO channels. Almost invariably her letters contain information of leftist nature, such as: expressions

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of sorrow for the down-trodden workers, so-called exposures of police brutalities and echoings of the party line as mouthed by communist-infiltrated labor unions and culture societies.

14. Among Subject's known correspondents in the United States are:

- a. REED Mr. (fnu), Los Angeles Sanatorium, 1500 East Duarte Road, Duarte, California.
- b. SENTNER William - c/o UER & MWA, 706 Chestnut Street, St. Louis, Missouri.
- c. REICHENBERG Harry C., Subject's father - Los Angeles Sanatorium, 1500 East Duarte Road, Duarte, California.

15. The tenor of the messages being written to each of the individuals above by Subject indicates strongly that they are at least communist sympathizers.

16. Subject recently attempted to send a letter to SENTNER which was seized before entering mail channels. This letter incloses photographs purported to show police brutality toward striking workers and tells of an incident wherein Subject claims that 1000 police were called out to quell 400 strikers. This material, Subject writes, is being forwarded to SENTNER for use in the U.E.'s organ. Subject also makes vague charges that the deconcentration law is a farce and that high ranking Japanese officials are misusing government funds by spending them on women and alcoholic beverages and, in order to continue their merry-making, even take baby carriages and bedding from the people in lieu of taxes. Subject charges that the press generally withholds stories on these swindles and that only "our press" issues special sheets giving details of the scandals. Subject concludes by asking SENTNER to persuade the U.E. to wire the companion Japanese Union their expressions of sympathy and support.

17. Subject's letters frequently comment "pass this on to Pat", or "I am forwarding news stories and photographs to Pat". The person referred to as "Pat" is believed to be KILLORAN Patricia, Los Angeles Staff Writer for the Daily People's World. This belief is based on the fact that the 5 June 1946 issue of the Daily People's World carried a by-lined article by KILLORAN in which she wrote in detail of Yoshitaro (Fred) FUJIKAWA, describing his (FUJIKAWA's) work with Japanese labor unions and commenting that "Mrs FUJIKAWA is reported to be in Los Angeles where she is contacting trade union leaders and others interested in America's current and future role in Japan".
