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MARKET REVIEW

Preliminary reports show that primary distributors sold 1,127,000 tons of sugar, raw value, during August 1974. This was 70,000 tons less than the 1,197,000 tons sold during August of last year. Sales for September 1-14 totaled 459,000 tons, down from 478,000 tons for the same period last year.

Sales in 1974 through September 14 totaled 8,312,000 tons, according to preliminary reports. This compares with 8,195,000 tons and 8,067,000 tons respectively, during the same periods of 1973 and 1972. However, at year-end 1973 there were 6,000 tons of sugar constructive delivered, i.e., sugar sold and charged to quotas during December 1973 but physically delivered in January and February 1974. Constructive deliveries totaled 130,000 tons in 1972 and 88,000 tons in 1971. Therefore, physical deliveries through September 14, 1974 totaled 8,318,000 tons compared with 8,325,000 and 8,155,000 tons, respectively, delivered through September 14, 1973 and 1972.

Deliveries of refined sugar reported by states of destination totaled 126,212,000 hundredweight during January-July 1974. This was an increase of 2.9 percent over the same period last year with increases occurring in four of the five geographic regions. The West had the greatest increase, 4.5 percent, followed by the North Central which was up 4.3 percent. Deliveries in the South and Mid-Atlantic regions were up 2.9 and 0.3 percent, respectively. The New England region decreased 0.9 percent below deliveries for the same period last year.

Thirty-one states received more sugar during January-July 1974 as compared with those months of 1973, while 19 states received less. There were 12 states with reported increases of more than 100,000 hundredweight. Illinois had the largest increase, 1,309,000 hundredweight, followed by Michigan up 586,000, California up 482,000 and Delaware up 434,000. Of the 19 states where reported deliveries declined, only Indiana, Missouri and New York were as much as 100,000 hundredweight lower. Inventories of raw and refined sugar held by all primary distributors on August 31, 1974 totaled 1,235,000 short tons, raw value, according to preliminary reports. This was 378,000 tons less than a month earlier and 219,000 tons less than at the end of August a year ago. Beet processors' stocks of 530,000 tons were 263,000 tons less than a month earlier but 84,000 tons more than a year earlier. Cane sugar refiners' stocks of raw and refined sugar were reported as 649,000 tons, or 42,000 tons less than a month earlier and 201,000 tons less than at the end of August last year.

The spot quotation for raw sugar, duty paid and delivered to New York, (No. 10 Contract of the New York Coffee and Sugar Exchange) continued to rise during August and averaged 32.60 cents per pound for the month. This was an increase of 4.25 cents from July and up 203 percent from the August 1973 average of 10.75 cents. The average price for August was 258.7 percent of the price objective as specified in the Sugar Act.

The spot quotation reached 34.50 on September 3 and held steady on the fourth. The price declined 25 points on September 5 to 34.25 cents and on September 6 the quotation was down to 34.00 cents. This price held through the twelfth. On September 13-17 the spot price was 33.50 cents and on September 18-24 the spot was 33.25 cents. The September 3-24 average of the spot price was 33.75 cents as compared with 10.94 cents for the same period last year.

Prices for refined sugar continue the climb upward to new record high levels. Cane sugar refiners announced a price increase of 2.25 cents per pound for refined sugar sold in 100-pound bags effective at the close of business August 29 in the Northeast, Southeast, Gulf, Southwest and Chicago-west territories. However, orders were accepted through September 3 at preadvanced prices for shipment through September 6. This set the new price quotation for 100-pound bags at 40.85 cents per pound.

Beet sugar refiners in the East were quoting the price for 100-pound bags at 36.10 cents per pound on September 3. This price was increased by .40 cent to 36.50 cents per pound on September 9. In the Chicago-west region, the wholesale price quotation for beet sugar was increased rom 34.95 cents to 36.50 cents per pound for 100-pound bags on September 9. The quoted price in the Pacific Coast region has held at 35.00 cents per pound since August 19 for refined cane and beet sugar. The Northwest price has held at 33.75 cents for cane and beet sugar since August 21.

Shown below are the price quotations on September 20, 1974 for refined sugar sold at wholesale in 100-pound bags and in bulk by regions. Significant variations of actual price from the quoted price may be found in certain regions, reflecting competitive discounts.

The U.S. average retail price for refined sugar sold in 5-pound paper bags averaged 34.88 cents per pound in August, up from 32.14 cents in July and 15.06 cents in August of last year for an increase of 132 percent for the 12-month period.

The spot price for world bulk raw sugar (No. 11 Contract of the New York Coffee and Sugar Exchange) f.o.b. and stowed at Greater Caribbean ports averaged 31.45 cents per pound during August, up from 25.40 cents in July and 9.09 cents in August of 1973. The world spot price peaked at an all time high of 36.90 cents on August 29 and on August 30 the price was down to 34.25 cents. On September 3 the spot gained strength to 36.85 cents. Thereafter the price was weaker with changes occurring almost every day through September 20. For the period September 3-24, the world price ranged from a low of 31.50 cents on September 13 to a high of 36.85 on September 3. During this period, the price averaged 34.00 cents, an increase of 284 percent from the 8.85 cents for the same period last year. Production of cane sugar in Hawaii through August 24, 1974 totaled 655,103 short tons 96° basis, compared with 819,874 tons produced through August 25, 1973 and 789,967 tons through August 26, 1972.

The Crop Reporting Board of the Department of Agriculture, based on September 1, 1974 conditions, forecast a sugarbeet crop of 22.8 million tons, 7 percent less than the 24.5 million tons of beets produced last year. The decline from 1973 is due to a 2 percent drop in acreage and lower yields in North Dakota, Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas and Montana.

Harvest of the crop in California continues active. Good growing conditions prevail in Washington and Oregon where water supplies are adequate for irrigation. Warm temperatures and ample water aided development of the Colorado crop which is estimated to be making normal progress. Rains throughout the sugarbeet areas of North Dakota and Minnesota are expected to improve both tonnage and sugar content.

Production of sugarcane for sugar and seed in Hawaii, Louisiana Florida and Texas is forecast at 26.7 million tons. This is 3 percent above the 1973 crop of 25.8 million tons. Average yield per acre is indicated at 35.8 tons, compared with 34.9 tons in 1973.

Survey data for sugarcane were collected prior to the time that Hurricane Carmen hit the Louisiana crop. Therefore, any losses resulting from that storm are not reflected in the above forecast. Reports from Louisiana indicate that the loss of cane due to the storm will not be as extensive as first estimates indicated. Cane that was blown down was not broken, and with good weather much of the cane will straighten up somewhat by harvest time. Topping of the cane during harvest may be a problem. The mechanical harvesters may not be able to operate efficiently nor top the cane properly if the cane is lodged or not standing erect. It is estimated at this time that the forecast of 8,016,000 tons of cane in Louisiana could be reduced by about 10 percent to 7,217,000 tons.

Production of sugarcane for sugar and seed is forecast at 8,280,000 tons in Florida, 9,398,000 tons in Hawaii and 980,000 tons in Texas.

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIONS RELATING TO 1974 SUGAR SUPPLIES

USDA ANNOUNCES ADDITIONAL DOMESTIC SUGAR QUOTA DEFICIT

September 25, 1974 the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced an additional deficit of 600,000 short tons in domestic sugar quotas. This action was required by the Sugar Act.

The deficit consists of the following amounts in short tons: Beet, 200,000; Mainland Cane 350,000; Hawaii, 100,000. The previously declared deficit of 755,000 tons for Puerto Rico is reduced by 50,000 tons, thus reducing the overall additional domestic deficit to 600,000 tons.

The 600,000 short tons deficit will be reallocated among 29 foreign countries.

Revised quotas and quota changes for all U.S. supplying countries as required by Section 204(a) of the Sugar Act are shown in the table on page 8 (Press Release USDA 2755).

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HIGHLIGHTS OF STATISTICAL SERIES IN THIS ISSUE

1. August 1974 sugar deliveries for continental U.S. consumption 1,128,000 short tons, raw value, (preliminary), up 70,000 tons from July 1974 and down 69,000 tons from August 1973. January-August 1974 deliveries 7,854,000 short tons, raw value, up 137,000 tons from January-August 1973. Final data for July 1974 deliveries 1,058,000 short tons, raw value--previously published as 1,087,000 tons.

2. Primary distributors' stocks August 31, 1974 were 1,235,000 short tons, raw value (preliminary), down 219,000 tons from the end of August last year and down 378,000 tons from July 31, 1974. During July, refiners' stocks decreased 42,000 tons, beet processors' stocks decreased 263,000 tons, mainland cane processors' stocks decreased 73,000 tons and importers of direct consumption sugar stocks decreased less than 500 tons.

3. Charges to quotas January 1 through August 31, 1974 were 7,431,125 tons leaving a balance of 5,068,875 tons to be supplied within the 12,500,000-ton total.

4. January-July 1974 deliveries, as compared with January-July 1973 were up 2.9 percent with increases occuring in four of the five geographical regions. The West increased the most--4.5 percent, followed by the North Central up 4.3 percent, the South up 2.9 percent and the Mid-Atlantic up 0.3 percent. The New England region was down 0.9 percent.

5. Second quarter 1974 deliveries of sugar were less in six of the seven industrial user groups than for the same 1973 quarter, and larger in three of the four non-industrial user groups. To industrial buyers the national decrease was 2.0 percent while to non-industrial buyers, deliveries increased 3.3 percent.

6. Through Sept. 7, 1974 the imports of sweetened chocolate (for consumption at retail), candy and confectionery totaled approximately 89.5 million pounds or about 76 percent of the 9-month quota through Sept. 30, 1974 and about 53 percent of the 12-month quota.

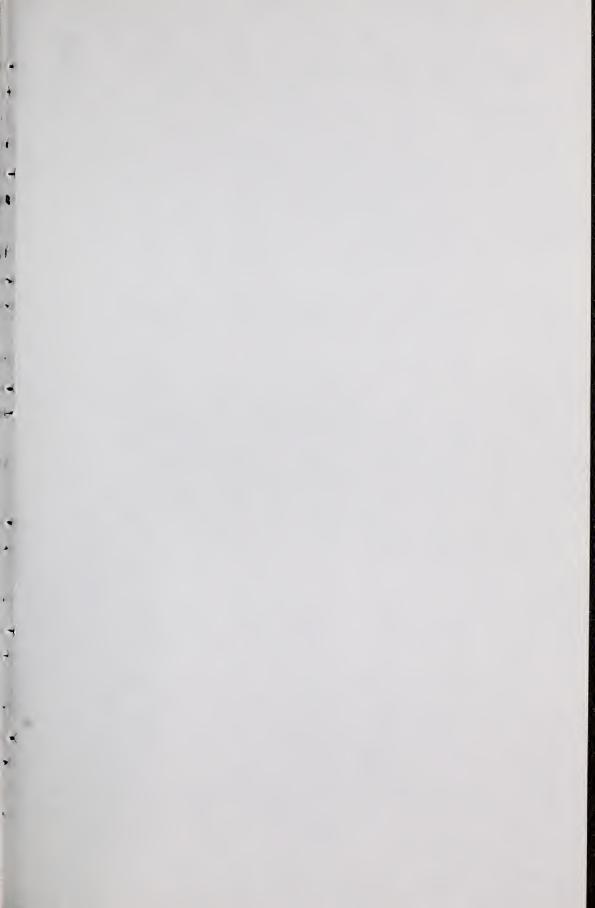
