Over Two Score of Passengers Injured-Eleven of Victims Not Identified

Manchester, N. Y., Aug. 28.—A car-oad of rough pine boxes was delivered ners to-day and before daylight far-ners and villagers began carting them to the temporary morgue, where lay mers and villagers began earting them to the temporary morgue, where lay twenty-two bodies of those who were killed yesterday in the wreck of the Lehigh Valley train on the trestle over Canandalgua creek. These twenty-twe with three others in the morgue at Rochester, probably will complete the list of dead, unless more deaths occur among the fifty or sixty injured. It is now established that the wreck was caused by a broken rail. Three cars out of the train of four plunged from the track.

The train was bound from Buffalo to Jersey City and a majority of those on board were on their way to their homes in New Jersey and eastern Pennsylvania. One woman, now at Thompson Memorial hospital, Canandaigua, has a fractured skuil and cannot live, but so far as known the other injured will recover.

Coroner Eiseline has been making careful efforts to obtain the names of the injured, but so many were taken

careful efforts to obtain the names of the injured, but so many were taken away to various cities, including Geneva, Canandaigua, Rochester, and smaller intermediate places that a complete list is almost impossible to compile. Linemen have strung temporary wires around the wreck and across the creek and inquiries are now being received from anxious persons which, it is expected, will lead to additional identification.

This morning eleven of the twenty-two bodies in the Shortsville morgue had not been identified. They include nine women, one man and a six-year-old child whose mother is said to be one of the unidentified dead.

Coroner Eiseline said this morning: "I have decided to hold the inquest Monday in the town hall in Shortsville. I am getting out subpoenaes for the train crew railroad track inspectors, passengers and eyewitnesses. It will be impussible to hold any inquest to-day. The public service commission of the second district has three officials here under the direction of Archibald Buchanan."




