Japan Sends Troops

### **DEFENCE LEAGUE** TO INVESTIGATE EMPIRE'S TRADE

frid Laurier's Proposal at Conference

Ottawa, March 5.—Hon. George E. Foster has been recommended for appointment as representative of Canada on a royal commission which has for its purpose the investigation and reporting upon the natural resources of each part of the empire, the development attained and attainable and the facilities for production, manufacture and distribution of these resources. The commission has also for its object inquiry into the trade of each part with others, and with the outside world, the food and raw material requirements of each and the sources available. The commission will also investigate to what extent, if any, trade between each of the different parts has been affected by existing legislation in each, either beneficially or otherwise.

This recommendation of the appointment of the minister of trade and commerce to the sommission is the direct result of the imperial conference held last June in London, During that conference Hon. 


Some attempt was also made to rally Kaffirs, meeting with little response. Trouble at one or two continental centres, notably Berlin, afected Americans, Kaffirs and some

other sections, and there is certainly evidence that a good many small peo-ple on the London Stock Exchange are working on a narrow margin with their bankers. Men fall for very small amounts nowadays and it is discussed as though something really important had occurred."
