
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

Ageratum Mexicanum Capella

This new Tom Thumb Ageratum differs essentially from all other dwarf varieties by the decidedly distinct and pretty rosy-chamois color of its large flower clusters.

Antirrhinum Majus "Ruby"

A strikingly beautiful new variety and main color of the very popular Tall Snapdragon. The flowers are self-colored, bright ruby red, and of surprising effect. This novelty is at the same time a charming plant for tall beds and groups, and highly valuable as a cut flower. Pkt. 15c.

Antirrhinum Majus Defiance

Tall Snapdragon with vermilion scarlet flowers, as bright and effective in color as that of the demi-tall variety of the same name. Pkt. 20c.

Aquilegia Coerulea Candidissima

Very pretty and graceful new Columbine of the long spurred tribe with large flowers of the purest snow white. Foliage light green. Pkt. 25c.

Begonia Gracilis "Prima Donna"

The plant is of very sturdy and even habit, growing to about 10 inches, and forming a freely branching bush, 10 to 12 inches across. The colors of the flowers, 1¾ to 2 inches across, vary in all shades from rosy-carmine, light and dark crimson to deep blood red. Elegant and decorative border plants. Height about 1½ feet. The cut flowers are greatly prized for vases and bouquets.

Orange Crown

Very handsome new annual, forming elegant, many-branched bushes of 1½ to 2 feet in height. The flower heads, 1½ to 1¾ inches in diameter, are carried on long, slender but self-supporting stems well above the graceful linear foliage. Ray florets golden yellow with a broad conspicuous circle of a rich orange around the disc, a pleasing combination of colors. As the plants produce a constant succession of bloom throughout the Summer and the flowers lasting well in water for days, this novelty will prove to be very useful for cutting purposes.

Its Marguerite-like blossoms, 2½ to 2¾ inches in diameter, show a unique glossy rich orange-gold, which brilliant coloring is rendered the more conspicuous by the dark colored disc surrounded by a black zone. This splendid annual is well adapted for groups or borders; it produces its pretty flowers very early after being planted out in the open ground in sunny situations in the open ground in sunny situations and will continue to flower during the Summer months. A bed in full bloom is a magnificent sight on bright days.



A deep, rich, sandy loam is best adapted for this plant. The seed should be sown thinly in drills $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep and one foot apart. When large enough, transplant to permanent rows 3 feet apart, allowing two feet between the plants. They reach maturity the second year, and in the northern States should be protected in winter by a covering of leaves or coarse manure. A bed will continue in bearing for several years,

One ounce will sow 50 ft. of row, and produce about 1,200 plants.

Sow the seed as early in spring as the soil can be worked, in drills 12 to 14 inches apart, and when well started thin out to three inches apart. When one or two years old, transplant into permanent beds, thoroughly trenched, two feet or more in depth. Set the plants in rows two feet apart and not less than 18 inches apart in the row. Care should be taken that the roots are well spread, and set at a depth of six inches below the level of the bed. level of the bed. Cover only two or three inches, and fill in gradually as the plants grow. Very little, if any, should be cut the first year after transplanting, but a fair crop can be cut the second year. Every fall after the tops have been cut down apply a dressing of coarse manure, and in the spring fork it in. An occasional top dressing of salt at the rate of one-half pound per square yard is also beneficial, and keeps down the weeds.



BEANS

Beans like a well-drained, rich and light loam, and should not be planted too early, as they are very sensitive to cold and wet. Plant about planted too early, as they are very sensitive to cold and wet. Fiant about the middle of April when warm and favorable, and at intervals throughout the season for a succession until the latter part of August. Bush varieties should be planted in drills 2 feet apart, and from two to six plants to the foot in a row. Keep them well cultivated and draw the earth up to the

Keep them well hoed, and bring the earth gradually up to the stems, watering freely in dry weather, and especially when they begin to head. Cauliflower will not head in hot, dry weather, therefore planting should be regulated so that it will head early in summer or autumn.

About the middle of August earthing up is necessary for blanching and whitening of that which is wanted for early use. After the soil has been drawn up against the plant with the hoe, it is further pressed close around each plant by the hand, firm enough to keep the leaves upright and prevent them from spreading, using care to prevent the soil falling into the heart of the plant.

ELLIOTT'S SURE-CROP MUSHROOM SPAWN

Ten pounds will spawn about 10 feet square.

Mushroom beds may be made in a warm, dry cellar, or in any building where the frost does not penetrate, and in the open air during the summer and fall months. Having procured the spawn, the next thing to be attended to is to make preparations for the beds. About a fortnight or three weeks before the beds are to be made, collect a quantity of fresh horse manure without the straw; place it in a heap under cover, and as it heats keep turning it over once or twice a week, until the fiery heat has become exhausted, which will require from ten to fourteen days' time. When the manure is in a condition to be made up, lay out your bed according to your requirements, say three feet wide, ten feet long, and from two to three feet deep; beat it well down with the back of the spade as the process of building goes on. When the bed has been made some time, say a week or thereabouts, and the heat sufficiently declined to a temperature of 65 or 75 degrees, the spawn may be put into it. Break the spawn in pieces two inches square, and put them six inches apart all over the hed, then cover the bed with two inches of rich soil. When the soil looks dry, give a gentle watering with topid water, using a rose on the watering-pot.



Herbs for Culinary and Medicinal Use

Herbs should have a place in every garden. Any good housekeeper knows the value of the little patch of herbs upon which she makes daily drafts in the summer, and which furnishes such a nice collection of dried herbs for winter seasoning, while as domestic medicines several kinds are held in high repute. The culture is very simple; the best way is to make a little seed-bed in the early spring, and set the plants out in a bed as soon as large enough. They should be harvested on a dry day, just before the blossom develops, dried quickly and bottled, or closely packed in dry boxes with the air entirely excluded.

As fertilizer, a liberal use of bone meal worked into the soil will give excellent results.

HOW TO GROW GLADIOLI

They succeed in any ordinary garden soil a d will repay any care in cultivation bestowed on them. The ground should be liberally enriched and dug over to a d-pth of fifteen to eighteen inches. Plantia the open garden from April until June, setting the bulbs seven or eight nices apart and about four inchesdeep. By planting at intervals up to the first of July, blom can be had all through the Summer and Fall. About the end of October, when the leaves begin to wither, the bulbs should be taken up, dried in the open air and stored in a dry place, free from Irost, until planting time the next season.
